

# County Nixes Request for Hurd Well Repairs

Lincoln County Commissioners agreed with the county manager to not fund a \$8,937 request to repair a private well in San Patricio. At their meeting November 18 in Carrizozo, county manager Tom Stewart reported that he finally heard from a representative of Michael Hurd who in October had requested the county provide \$8,937 to repair the

well on his polo field in San Patricio. Hurd claimed the county used the well often for road work and fire fighting needs.

At the October meeting, county commissioners authorized Stewart to contact Hurd for more details about the request. Stewart at the November meeting said he sent a letter to Hurd and on October 28 he received a call from Hurd's staff indicating they wanted the

county to pay the amount for the well. Hurd offered to absorb the cost of operation of the well for four years.

Then on November 4, the county received a letter from a nearby property owner, Walter Limacher, offering the county use of his well for no cost.

"In discussing the issue with the two concerned chiefs of Gilencoe and Hondo fire departments, they cannot remember the

last time they used the polo field well," Stewart said. "It was at least over a year ago." Stewart said both chiefs thought the Limacher proposal was sufficient.

"My recommendation is to thank Mr. Hurd for his past support of fire fighting efforts in the Hondo Valley and direct me to make appropriate coordination with Mr. Limacher," Stewart concluded.

County commissioner

Maury St. John said valley resident Ken Nosker offered use of his well for no cost. All county commissioners concurred with Stewart about the funding requested by Hurd.

In other business, county commissioners:

--Approved a final plat for Alpine Village Cabins Subdivision as requested by developer Kenneth Keegan. County commissioner Earl Hobbs voted no on an amendment to allow a vari-



## Carrizozo Gives Nod to New City Hall Plans

Plans are underway for the new Carrizozo municipal building.

At a special meeting Thursday, November 20, Carrizozo town trustees unanimously approved the concept plans for the new municipal facility. Cory Collins, associate architect for the firm Becker, Perich, Sabatini, presented several concept design boards to a crowded full house. Collins explained the plans for the facility that has a 1,229 square foot meeting room, large lobby, separate offices for the town clerk, deputy

clerk and motor vehicle clerk, a break room for employees and separate offices for the municipal judge and clerk and lots of storage.

Town employees will be separated from the public by an open counter, which town clerk Leann Weibrecht requested be longer than shown on the preliminary concept plans. Although a glass wall was proposed, such as the one in the new magistrate court building, budget constraints and the clerk's request to be in closer contact with the public eliminated that idea.

The new facility will be

constructed over what is now the end of 4th Ave. Plans are to close the end of Fourth Ave., remove the city hall building, tear out the old pavement, curbs and sidewalks, and remove trees in the small park across from city hall. Weibrecht told THE NEWS the town has been told the trees are dying.

As a way to save money, trustees authorized seeking bids to remove the city hall building structure. With a minimum bid of \$6,000 required, the town had received no bids as of Tuesday, December 2. Deadline

for bids to be submitted is 5 p.m. Friday, December 5.

The new facility will have its main public entrance and parking along 9th Street. Fourth Ave. will dead-end at the new facility where parking, featuring handicapped access places, will be along the front of the building. The entrance will feature a window wall facing to the south and a large tiled floor lobby. Mens and women's restrooms that will be to ADA code will be located just off the lobby.

Windows are planned in

## Work on Highway 70 Continues this Month

Shoulder and lane closures will continue along the 38 mile Highway 70 project area through the month of December.

Blasting will become more frequent Monday through Friday in Section B which is at mile marker 272 to 275 located west of Gilencoe and east of Fox Cave. Lane closures will begin at 12 p.m. and last up to one hour.

Finish grading and paving, excavation, drainage wall and bridge work will continue from Fox Cave to about San Patricio.

Various lane shifts, detours and roadway re-striping will occur as the work progresses, including the opening of the four-lane roadway in one section.

Travelers need to allow an extra 20 to 30 minutes to

accommodate the construction activities.

Sierra Blanca Constructors will cease construction activities beginning 12 noon Wednesday, December 24 until 7 a.m. Monday, December 29 in observance of Christmas. Construction activities will also cease at 12 p.m. Wednesday, December 31 through Monday, January 5 for the New Year's weekend.

The US 70 Hondo Valley Citizens Task Force meeting is set for 7 p.m. Thursday, December 11 at the Hondo Valley Schools.


Bear Historical Park to give out special goodies to the children. Refreshments will also be served.

ance to the 16 percent steepness grade of the driveway into the subdivision. The development is a former rental cabins area off of north Mecchem Drive and has two private wells and will have an aerobic septic system for wastewater.

Approved 4 to 1, with Hobbs voting no, the summary review plat for Lincoln Valley Estates Subdivision as requested by Blaney Enterprises. The subdivision will have five lots from the 10.5 acre tract. Hobbs gave no reason for voting against the development.

Authorized the county manager to draft a resolution requesting Governor Bill Richardson nominate the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District as an emergency watershed area to make the area eligible for federal watershed initiative grants. Sally Canning, a member of the county Public Land and Use and Rural Affairs Advisory Committee (PLURAAC), asked for county support to seek grant funding for the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District. She estimated the cost of the project would be \$1.2 million including state funding. However, when asked what organization would administer the grant and who would be the fiscal agent, Canning said that would be established. When she was asked if the county would run the program, Canning said the county would provide money to hire someone.

County commissioner Leo Martinez said for the county to do such a project would be duplicating the work of other groups, such as the South Central RC&D council. After more discussion county commissioners voted to draft the resolution to nominate the upper Rio Hondo watershed for restoration.

County resident Jerry Carroll asked if the project came before the PLURAAC, since it was placed under the PLURAAC agenda item. Canning said the subject did not come up at the last PLURAAC meeting.

Acknowledged the minutes from the October PLURAAC meeting, as no

report was given because PLURAAC member Jay Walley who was supposed to have given the report had a stroke and was hospitalized.

Approved a resolution setting the 2004 county commission regular meeting dates. Monthly meetings will begin at 8:30 a.m. the third Tuesday of each month, except January which conflicts with the annual Association of Counties conference in Santa Fe. The January 2004 meeting will be held Thursday, January 22. Commissioners discussed going back to Thursday meetings, but agreed to stay with the Tuesday meetings. The change to Tuesday meetings

was done at the request of a county resident who said the Thursday meetings were unfair to Lincoln County News.

Approved a resolution setting the 2004 official holiday calendar with days off to be Martin Luther King, Jr. birthday on January 19; Presidents' Day on February 16; Good Friday on April 9; Memorial Day on May 31; Independence Day on Monday, July 5; Labor Day on September 6; Columbus Day on October 11; Veteran's Day on November 11; Thanksgiving on Thursday and Friday, November 25 and 26; Christmas on Thursday December 23 and Friday December 24; New Year's Day on Friday, December 31.

Adopted the Open Meetings Act resolution that requires agendas to be posted at least 24 hours prior to the meeting; allows special meetings to be called by the county commission chair or majority of commissioners with three days notice; and emergency meetings may be held with three hours notice for circumstances which demand immediate action of the county commission. The resolution also specifies the county commission operates under modified Roberts Rules of Order and allows for going into executive session for specific reasons and allows members to participate in meetings by conference telephone.

Awarded the low bid for two water tanks for White Oaks Fire Department to Challenger Process Systems of Odessa, TX for \$14,522 which includes delivery and set up for the two oil field type 500 barrel tanks to hold water for fire fighting purposes. Five bids were received with the highest at \$134,800.

Appointed Tom Mann to the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board.

Reappointed Mary Young and Barbara Ward to the Lincoln County Senior Citizens Olympic Committee.

Appointed Carrizozo area resident Dean Lollar as alternate member to the PLURAAC.

Heard that the Boundary Commission meeting for the requested annexation by the City of Ruidoso Downs will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday, December 18 at the Ruidoso Downs city hall.

Approved, after public hearing during which there were no objections, a recommendation by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Local Law Enforcement Block Grant advisory committee to use \$4,046 in grant funds to enhance communications equipment for the sheriff's dispatch.

# County Lodgers Tax \$\$ to be Spent for Radio

Lincoln County Lodgers Tax will provide \$9,000 to the KEDU community radio station in Ruidoso to do tourist related advertising. Lincoln County Commissioners during their meeting on November 18 approved a recommendation from the county lodgers tax committee to provide the radio with the \$9,000. Rick Anderson and Harvey Twite representing the station were at the meeting to discuss the plans for the \$9,000.

KEDU was organized and licensed as a subsidiary of the non profit Fort Stanton, Inc. that is now operating a museum at historic Fort Stanton. Twite said as a private held non profit organization, the radio station cannot be sold. The 100 watt radio station has its broadcast tower on Pikes Peak Drive in Ruidoso.

During discussions about the funding request, county commissioner Earl Hobbs said he was concerned about the amount of funding requested. He asked if the county would be looking at funding commercial radio stations for the same tourism purpose.

Twite said KEDU will be doing fund raising twice a year and will always take donations. Also businesses can underwrite programs and will be given a brief business name and phone number as credits.

"It has been a two and a half year project to get our license," Twite said. "We must document how we will spend this lodgers tax money," Twite added. "Which we plan to use to promote Lincoln County."

The station would like to broadcast in three languages and currently is broadcasting Spanish music.

"We have a lot of opportunities for locals to get involved," Twite said. "We're even open to have a county commissioner's hour to provide information about county problems, needs and so on."

Hobbs asked how the station plans to use the lodgers tax specifically.

County attorney Alan Morel said lodgers tax money must be tourism related. "Not Spanish for three hours," Morel said. "It's important they verify their spending."

Twite again said the station has no problem documenting and following guidelines with notarized affidavits.

Morel asked how the money will be used as the state statutes require, for advertising, promotion of tourist attractions, facilities and events. Anderson said the radio station plans to do a half hour program every week to focus on Lincoln County tourism, such as the Carrizozo Fairs and other area events. And the station

plans to have several hour long programs about different activities related to tourism.

Twite said the station plans to provide a telephone information line. Also the station will interrupt broadcasting immediately for emergency messages to get information out to the people.

As for emergencies, Twite said the station is planning to have generators at its station and transmitter sites. "We are obligated to have power at all times," Twite said.

County resident Jerry Carroll asked if the station would broadcast county commission meetings at night and call them "tourist attractions"? Twite said they have the capability if the station gets the volunteers. "Most of our staff are volunteers," Twite added.

Carroll volunteered to help with taping county commission meetings as long as he attends the meetings. He also asked if the station has any transponders to boost its broadcast area.

Twite said the station does not now, but would need something like "Friends of KEDU."

County commissioner Rick Simpson said the \$9,000 request made a "red flag" go up for him, since most lodgers tax requests are small amounts. However, he thought the idea "sounded good."

County commissioner Leo Martinez said Alto resident Dick Weber and Harvey Twite have been volunteering for the radio station project for a long time.

County commissioner Maury St. John said some things not normally thought of as tourist attractions could be featured. She said the cancer treatment center she works for was featured on the radio, telling how people can get cancer treatments here if they are on vacation or are part time residents.

"I see this radio station as a great asset," St. John said.

When Simpson asked about the range of the station, Twite said with 100 watts the station broadcast cannot be picked up in Carrizozo and mostly can be heard in the Ruidoso-Ruidoso Downs area, north to some areas around Capitan. Twite said the station will soon be on a website which will allow anyone to hear the station live over the internet world wide.

"Locals first is our policy," Twite said. "But we want visitors to stay an extra day in Lincoln County."

County commissioners also heard a report from auditor Dan Austin who had conducted the annual audit of lodgers. Austin said the audit was completed on October 23 and sent to the New Mexico Dept. of Finance and Administration (DFA).

"One of the lodgers was not in so good of shape," Austin said. "The four others were good."

County commissioners selected names of the four lodgers for the recent audit by pulling folded numbers out of a hat. Names of the lodgers and the audit report are confidential and are not available for public review. The fifth lodger was selected by the county manager, mostly because of past problems, Austin added.

Austin said there was some concern this year the lodgers selected were ex-

tremely small, with annual reports of less than \$120,000. He suggested that in the future, the lodgers be placed into two separate pools, one for the "larger" lodgers and the other for the "small" lodgers for a better audit process.

Austin said all lodgers audited this year were very cooperative.

One of the lodgers was in not so good shape, Austin continued. The business was licensed and in existence for a while. "It was a unique situation, involving a di-

vorce," Austin said. "They did not know they had to register and pay their gross receipt taxes."

County manager Tom Stewart said he asked the one problem lodger be audited based on an analysis. "We're monitoring the situation," Stewart added.

Austin said in the audit he looks at tax returns and gross receipt taxes to reconcile. "We have real problems with a vendor when his tax return and the numbers he generated are different," Austin said.

Sunday, December 7

This Sunday, December 7 will mark the 62<sup>nd</sup> anniversary of the attack on Pearl Harbor. The devastation caused that day will "Live in Infamy" according to President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. His speech will go down in history, just as December 7, 1941 will go down in history. Our nation survived, but it took five years for the war to finally end.

Extraordinary valor by our military forces, Merchant Marines and people at home helped us win that war. There were no TVs back then and the only way people knew what was happening on the front lines was by listening to the radio, reading newspapers and watching newsreels at the movies. The term "Rosie the Riveter" started when women donned hard hats and went to work in factories building airplanes, ships, and necessary equipment for the fighting forces. Essential items were rationed, such as meat, sugar, tires, gasoline, green paint, leather for shoes, and butter.

Receiving mail from loved ones overseas was a treat and letters were re-read many times. Often there would be holes cut in the letters because all mail was censored and censors would cut out any information that might be useful to the enemy. Blackouts were common, even in the middle of the United States. Windows were covered with heavy material to keep any light from being seen from anywhere outside.

Ration books were issued and certain ration coupons could only be used on specific days. Tires were patched and re-patched and travel was curtailed because of gas rationing. Recycling, though it probably wasn't called recycling back then, was important. Aluminum foil from chewing gum and cigarette packages, tin cans, and newspapers were carefully saved to be used for the war effort. Everyone tried to help.

It was a time when everyone was working for the same thing, to win the war and bring loved ones home. There was a special day at school when children would take a dime to buy a Savings Stamp, paste it in a folder. A filled Savings Stamp folder, which cost \$18.75, would buy a War Bond, which would be worth \$25.00 at maturity, in ten years.

Blackouts, air raid sirens, rationing, saving tiny scraps of tin foil, and listening for news on the radio made everyone aware of the war. Children were involved by taking a dime to school to buy Savings Stamps. It was a national effort.

Long years, five long years, before many loved ones returned home, and many never came home. And Sunday, December 7, 1941 just 62 years ago this Sunday, was the day when it started, the day when Pearl Harbor was attacked.

Eventually there may be no wars, but there are wars and the wars being fought today are quite different from World War II when it took days to find out about events. Now you can watch battles on TV and hear up-to-the-minute reports of what is happening where. Essential items such as meat and tires are not rationed. There are no Savings Stamps or War Bonds. Different? Yes, but this Sunday is a day to be remembered as a day that will live in Infamy.

**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** -- Several times in the past year, this column has remarked about the striking similarities between the prosecution of Wen Ho Lee and that of David Hudak, the Canadian owner of a Roswell anti-terrorism training school.

Those similarities continued last week with Hudak being found not guilty on all nine counts brought against him after spending over 15 months in jail, where he was held without bond. Dr. Lee plead guilty to the most minor of the 59 counts the government had brought against him and was sentenced to the nine months he had served without bond.

Hudak's treatment by prosecutors was even worse than Dr. Lee's, but there was no one to take up his cause. Dr. Lee's family, especially daughter Alberta, spent full time rallying the scientific and Asian communities to protest his incarceration. Hudak's family was in Canada. His children were young and prosecutors threatened to arrest his wife if she came to New Mexico to assist in his defense.

His parents did help by offering to put up their house for bail, but prosecutors kept convincing the judges in the case that Hudak was far too dangerous to our nation's security to let him out.

In both the Lee and Hudak cases, the prosecution fired a volley of charges at the defendant and then set about trying to find the evidence to prove those charges. In both cases they failed miserably. After ransacking Lee's home on two occasions, they found nothing incriminating.

Hudak's case was even more egregious. Federal agents seized millions of dollars worth of his property as forfeitures. In fact, Hudak's lawyer even suggested that the forfeitures, which law enforcement authorities get to keep, might have been the motivation for bringing charges against Hudak in the first place.

That's a pretty serious suggestion, but it could be believable in light of the handling of the case. With Dr. Lee, the Justice Department was looking for someone convenient to label as a Chinese spy in order to get Congress off its back. In Hudak's case, it was a disgruntled former partner, who put the feds on his tail and urged his prosecution. Now that Hudak has been found innocent of all charges, the government is saying it hasn't decided whether it will return any of his property.

As further indication of the govern-

ment's malicious intent, Hudak wasn't released after being acquitted on all charges. The prosecution said there were still immigration questions left to settle. Those guys don't give up.

This mistreatment of suspects can't all be blamed on Attorney General John Ashcroft and the Patriotic Act. Dr. Lee was prosecuted by Janet Reno during the Clinton administration under the laws in effect then. It should be evident, however, that further laws to strengthen Justice Department prosecutions aren't needed. It already is able to violate civil rights of innocent people far more than should ever be tolerated in a democracy.

In Dr. Lee's case, Judge James Parker apologized to him for his treatment by the government. And Parker sat on the front row of the gallery on the final day of Hudak's trial. A judicial apology wasn't necessary in this case. The jury took care of that: it was expected to spend days wading through more than five weeks of testimony, but instead reached a unanimous verdict in less than a day.

Let's hope this sends a message to government officials that judges and juries don't appreciate the prosecutorial zeal with which some people are pursued.

Dr. Lee has sued the government for his treatment. Hudak was in jail six months longer than Lee, as the government stalled for time despite constitutional guarantees of a speedy trial. As an independent businessman, Hudak lost all his property. And he was acquitted by a jury of all charges.

These prosecutors turned persecutors would deserve it if Hudak finds some way to redress his grievances.



several walls and the exterior will be a split block and stucco. The final color of the building will be a buff and creme, similar to the health clinic.

Landscaping plans call for mostly desert plants that use little or no extra water, and a very small area of lawn. Weibrecht said the landscaping will depend on the amount of funding the town has after all construction is completed.

Trustees were impressed with the plans and excited because the town was going to get a new facility.

Collins expressed again how he has enjoyed working on the plans for the town where he grew up.

The audience at the special meeting was given opportunity to look at the concept plans before the session. It was then most people had comments and questions about the design. Weibrecht said. Then after the meeting some audience members expressed concern the exterior design is not a southwestern look such as the new facilities in Tularosa and Corona. Weibrecht said Collins explained that the new city hall design is very similar to the health center, courthouse and other

buildings in the community such as the Wells Fargo Bank.

This week, after THE NEWS reviewed the plans further, THE NEWS provided Weibrecht with some comments about the plans. THE NEWS was most concerned about the plans for meeting room which is shared with municipal court. Plans show the north wall of the meeting room to be all glass. THE NEWS commented that a glass wall will use more energy to keep the room cool in the summer and warm in the winter, and will be harder to maintain and keep clean than a solid stuccoed wall.

Also THE NEWS stated that in that reporter's 20 years of attending meetings, most municipal meetings are held at night, when a glass wall will not provide any light. Also THE NEWS stated there could be security issues when the room is used for court.

Weibrecht said trustee Eileen Lovelace has expressed a desire to put curtains over the window wall, which would result in more cost.

Display boards of the colored concept plans can be seen at the town hall offices in Carrizozo Recreation Center.

An update report about the project will be given at the regular town meeting set for 6 p.m. Tuesday, December 9.

No other business was conducted at the special meeting.



### RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF SPECIAL PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Capitan Municipal School District No. 28 (herein the "Board" and the "District," respectively), in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has determined that a Special Capital Improvements Tax Election, (herein the "Election") be held on February 3, 2004, pursuant to Sections 1-22-1 through 1-22-19, NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 22-25-3, NMSA 1978, the Board has determined, and does hereby determine, that there should be submitted to the electorate at said Election, the question of whether or not a property tax of \$2.00 per \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of property allocated to the District under the Property Tax Code should be imposed for the property tax years of 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008, for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CAPITAN MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 28 CONSTITUTING THE GOVERNING BODY OF SAID DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTY OF LINCOLN AND STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. On the 3rd day of February, 2004, there will be held in the Capitan Municipal School District No. 28, Lincoln County, New Mexico, a special school district election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the question of whether or not a property tax should be imposed for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

Section 2. The Voting Districts for this Election shall be as follows:

Election Precincts	Polling Places
1, 2A, 2B, 3A, 3B, 4, 5, 6, 7A, 10, 12A, 12B and 12C within the District	Lincoln County Fair Building Capitan, New Mexico
Absentee Voting in Person	Lincoln County Clerk's Office Lincoln County Courthouse Carrizozo, New Mexico

In addition, there will be an Absentee Voter District established as described in Section 7 herein.

Section 3. The polls for said Election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day of the Election.

Section 4. At such Election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified, registered electors of the District:

#### PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX QUESTION

"Shall the Board of Education of the Capitan Municipal School District No. 28, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, be authorized to impose a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of the property allocated to such District under the Property Tax Code for the property tax years of 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007 and 2008 for the purpose of the following capital improvements in the District, i.e., erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings, purchasing or improving school grounds and purchasing computer software and hardware for student use in public school classrooms; maintenance of public school buildings and public school grounds exclusive of salary expenses of employees of the District; and purchasing activity vehicles for transporting students to extracurricular school activities?"

Section 5. The tax contemplated by the capital improvements tax question shall be in addition to any tax imposed to pay debt service on general obligation bonds or for any other purpose. Such capital improvements tax shall be authorized pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act, i.e., Sections 22-25-1 through 22-25-10 NMSA 1978 (being Chapter 5, Laws of the New Mexico, 1975, Special Session, as amended and supplemented).

Section 6. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the Election and a resident of the District on the day of the Election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County or any voter registration agent in accordance with law. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such Election should register during regular office hours prior to 5:00 p.m. on January 6, 2004 being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico or with any registration agent at a designated agency as provided in Section 1-4-47, NMSA 1978 and 1-4-48, NMSA 1978; provided that for federal qualified electors and overseas voters, the County Clerk shall accept a certificate of registration by electronic transmission from a voter qualified to apply for and vote by absentee ballot in the County if the transmission is received before 5:00 p.m. on January 30, 2004 being the Friday immediately preceding the election.

Section 7. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by Section 1-6-1 et seq., NMSA 1978; provided, however, that pursuant to Section 1-22-19, NMSA 1978, qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., January 9, 2004, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m., January 30, 2004, being the Friday immediately prior to the Election. Absentee ballots shall be mailed or, if requested, electronically transmitted to each such applicant or registered voter who is a federal qualified elector and overseas voter, not later than January 29, 2004 being the Thursday, immediately prior to the date of the election as provided in Section 1-6-5 NMSA 1978.

Section 8. Voting on election day and absentee voting in person, as provided in Section 7 above, shall be by a voting system defined in Section 1-9-1 et seq., NMSA 1978, as amended. Other absentee voting shall be by paper ballot. At least one voting system shall be used at the polling place for each Voting District.

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1(D) of the Open Meetings Act requires the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District to determine annually what constitutes reasonable notice of its public meetings.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Carrizozo SWCD on this 11th day of November, 2003, that:

1.) Regular meetings of the Carrizozo SWCD shall ordinarily be held each month at 6:30 P.M. on the second Tuesday at the District and Natural Resources Conservation Service Office located in First Federal Bank Building at 409 Central Avenue. A proposed agenda will be available from the District Administrative Assistant. Notice of regular meetings will be given seven days before the meeting to parties who request it in writing. F. Persons desiring to register to vote at the regular municipal election, must register with the County Clerk of Lincoln County not later than Tuesday, February 3, 2004 at 5:00 P.M., the date on which the County Clerk will close registration books.

G. All declarations of Candidacy shall be filed with the Municipal Clerk on Tuesday, January 6, 2004 between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.

H. The casting of votes by qualified municipal electors shall be recorded on printed paper ballots.
