

# Camp Sierra Blanca Will Remain Open

Camp Sierra Blanca facility for juvenile male offenders will remain open.

At a town hall meeting on Wednesday, July 7 in Ruidoso Village Hall, Governor Bill Richardson announced to a capacity crowd that he was directing the Children, Youth and Families Secretary

Mary Dale Bolson to keep Camp Sierra Blanca (CSB) open.

Last month Bolson advised American Marine Institute (AMI) officials, who operate CSB on a per pupil contract basis, that CYFD was going to no longer send offenders to CSB. During a series of conversations, Bolson and her deputy director indicated

the closure was due to a change in philosophy toward more community-based juvenile corrections programs.

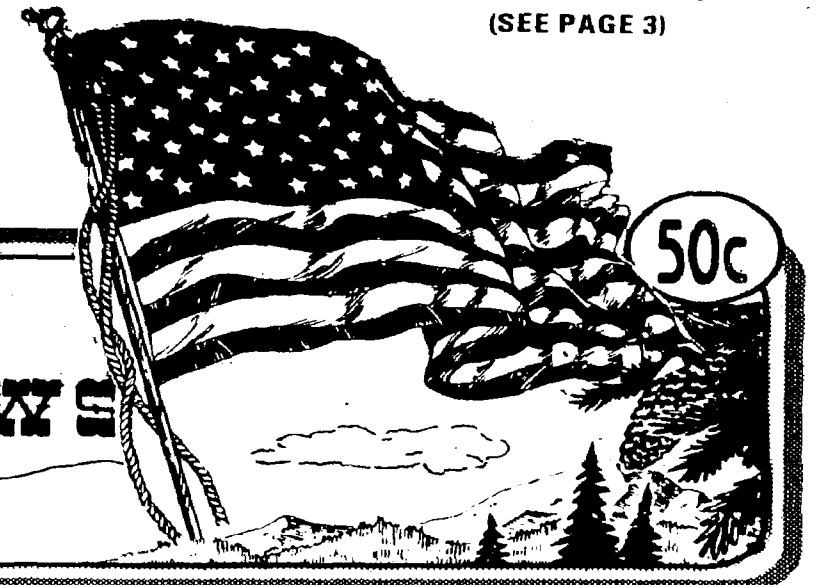
The announced closure prompted many from the county, including District Judge Karen Parsons and county commission chair Rex Wilson, to plead with the governor's office to reconsider the decision.

"I want to stress that I've listened carefully to everyone from this community who wants to keep Camp Sierra Blanca open," Gov. Richardson said in a prepared speech. "I've met personally with supporters. I've talked on the phone. I've read letters." He said many CSB supporters have shown up at his office hours. The gover-

nor explained his program of office hours in Las Cruces, Albuquerque and Santa Fe, whereby every 10 days any New Mexican can spend five minutes with him.

"The strongest support for Camp Sierra Blanca came from two young kids who showed up at my office hours in Albuquerque," the governor continued. "They had

## Billboard Owner Given 30 Days to Comply

The owner of a newly erected billboard in Carrizozo will soon get a letter from the town advising him he has 30 days to comply with the town zoning ordinance that limits the size of signs.

At the July 13 regular meeting of Carrizozo Trustees, town attorney David Stevens told the public that he was instructed by trustees

in closed session to write a letter to the billboard owner providing him 30 days for his billboard to become compliant with the town zoning ordinance. There will also be provisions to extend that time period if necessary, Stevens added.

The billboard in question is a 627 square foot sign which violates the town zoning ordinance that limits signs to 300 square feet. The billboard

was allowed to go up because of oversights and mistakes to which town officials have admitted making.

As an after the fact attempt to remedy the out of compliant sign, the sign owner and property owner submitted a request for variance to the town ordinance. That request was denied by the town planning and zoning committee and also by the town trustees at a special meeting on June 30.

At the June 30 special meeting sign owner Hans Brakob told the town trustees that a sign of 300 square feet was not an option for him, and if forced to remove the sign he will take the town to court.

Discussion about the billboard came up at the July 13 regular meeting after trustees held a closed session to discuss threatened litigation. An audience member asked Stevens if he think there is a credible threat of litigation over the billboard, because the community believes the sign is illegal according to the zoning ordinance. Stevens said "illegal" is not the correct description for the sign, rather it is in non-compliance with the town zoning ordinance.

"The town's concerns are mistakes were made by the

Other activities will include a fundraising jail. You can buy a warrant for \$5 that will be served by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse and the person arrested can pay \$5 for a get out of jail card. Other events include a blacksmithing demonstration, cowboy poets, youth fiddlers, and the special exhibit of the inaugural attire of Gov. McDonald and Mrs. McDonald at the Carrizozo Heritage Museum.

## Triple Murder To Go To Grand Jury

Lincoln County Grand Jury will be convened sometime late this month to determine if there is probable cause for adult sanctions to be available as options for sentencing of a 14 year old Lincoln County boy accused of murder.

According to 12th Judicial District Attorney Scot Key, 14 year old Cody Posey will be tried as a juvenile for the alleged murders of his father, step mother and step sister at the Sam Donaldson ranch last week.

Posey is accused of allegedly murdering his natural father Delbert Posey, step mother Fryon Posey and his 14 year old step sister Mary-Lee Schmid at the Sam Donaldson ranch in the Hondo area. Delbert Posey was ranch foreman at the Sam Donaldson ranch, according to a press release from Key's office.

Donaldson called in the report of the apparent crime scene to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office at about 4:45 p.m. on Tuesday, July 6. According to a press release from Sheriff Tom Sullivan, he, undersheriff Rick Virden and deputies responded and determined it was a crime scene. They then requested the New Mexico State Crime Scene Investigation Mobile Unit and Team which responded to assist with the processing of the crime scene.

A subsequent search of the area revealed the bodies of one male and two females in a shallow grave. The Office of Medical Investigator (OMI) also assisted in exhuming the bodies.

Officers with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and the 12th Judicial District Attorney's office took Posey into custody on July 7. According to Virden, Posey was at a home of a class mate in the Hondo area.

The 12th Judicial Juvenile Probation Office authorized detention of Posey and a petition alleging Posey is a youthful offender being charged with having committed three open counts of murder and four counts of tampering with evidence were filed on July 8.

Posey and his attorney Gary Mitchell made first appearance and detention hearing on July 9 before District Judge Waylon Counts in Alamogordo on the formal

charges of three open counts of murder and four counts of tampering with evidence.

Key said Mitchell entered a statement of denial of all allegations on behalf of Posey. In the detention hearing it was found there was probable cause to detain Posey in a certified juvenile facility "somewhere in the Albuquerque area."

Key told THE NEWS.

Key said if the grand jury finds the juvenile can be sentenced as an adult, it will give the courts six months to go to jury trial as opposed to going to trial within 30 days as with a juvenile sentencing.

Authorities are continuing to investigate the crime.

been in Camp Sierra Blanca and they told me it worked for them. So I said to Secretary Bolson, let's make this work."

"I've also seen the statis-

tics. Nine out of 10 residents who leave the Camp do not commit more crimes," the governor said. "And they become productive members of our communities."

"Any primary concern is that any decision to close any facility must be in the long term best interest of New Mexico's kids," Gov. Richardson continued. "That is why, after careful study and my discussions with community leaders and Sec. Bolson, I've decided to keep Camp Sierra Blanca open," he said.

That prompted an outcry of relief as the capacity crowd came to its feet with applause of approval.

The governor said several other factors came into his decision, including how the rural areas of the state tend to get forgotten, and the effectiveness of the program. "I am impressed with the suc-

cess the kids have at the facility and the support and commitment from the community which is very important."

"There is no doubt Camp Sierra Blanca has seen a great amount of success in creating low-risk juvenile offenders," the governor continued. "I not only want that trend to continue, I want to make it better. My administration will work with the community of Ruidoso and throughout Southern New Mexico to identify the best options for the facility."

The governor said Sec. Bolson had met with members of the community and AMI earlier that day to brainstorm about Camp Sierra Blanca.

The governor then recognized District Judge Karen Parsons, county commissioner Rex Wilson and Carrizozo police chief Angelo Vega and many others who spent their own time and money to visit with the governor's office and Sec. Bolson about the issue. He said Bolson and Parsons would be partnering to come up with options for CSB.

In the short term, the immediate solution is that Bolson will be looking for juvenile offenders who are eligible for CSB.

Other options considered are bringing girls, although the number of female juvenile offenders in the juvenile justice system has decreased to 27 from a previous 70 statewide; consideration of other populations; and review of the existing issues in the juvenile justice system.

The governor recognized Vega for his support of the CSB program and for expressing this in a letter to the governor. Vega said CSB is a great program and facility. He said Sec. Bolson is passionate and caring and is moving the state forward.

Wilson said the community support for CSB is "what Lincoln County is all about." He thanked the community for realizing it was time to pull together and express itself about the CSB issue.

Also introduced at the meeting was General Ken Montoya of the New Mexico National Guard who told about the guard's youth programs, including the military based Youth Challenge Academy in Roswell, the "About Face" after school programs; and a new charter school in Espanola. "When the governor told the National Guard to get involved in the communities, that is what we did," Montoya said.

Ruidoso Mayor Leon Eggleston, who hosted the meeting and introduced the governor and others, commended the audience. "This is the citizens of Lincoln County," Eggleston said, making a broad sweep of his hand. "And we do have a governor who will listen."

A question and answer/comment period followed. Ruidoso councilor Ray Nunley introduced Doug McCloud, editorial cartoonist, who presented the governor with framed original cartoons about CSB.

Selsono Vigil, youth consultant and retiree from

## Pitched Battle; Two Killed

As a result of the forest fire in the Capitan mountains -- mention of which was made last week -- two men lost their lives. T.J. Shoemaker, the man who had fired two shots the day previous at Lloyd Taylor, was killed by the officers who sought to arrest him, and Shoemaker, in the battle gave Robert White a death wound from which he succumbed a few hours later. White was ranger in the forest service in his county until he was transferred to the supervisor's office in Alamo-gordo some time ago.

A warrant had been issued for Shoemaker, charging an assault with a deadly weapon, and Sheriff Kelsey and deputies went out to execute the warrant. Deputies were stationed at various points at some distance from the Shoemaker house, with the hope of intercepting the wanted man and if possible effect his arrest with out bloodshed; for the officers had been informed that Shoemaker would resist.

However, the car that bore Deputy P.E. Johnson, Supervisor Arthur and Ranger White and which had been to the camp of the fire-fighters, was returning to-point west of the Shoemaker place where the three occupants of the car were to stand watch.

Shoemaker was standing at the mail box by the roadside as was also Mrs. William Nix, waiting the arrival of the mail carrier. The officers recognized Shoemaker, but their car went about 50 yards beyond the mail box before it came to a stop. Deputy Johnson alighted and started, unarmed, toward Shoemaker, and the latter reached for his rifle which was in its scabbard on his saddle. Shoemaker's belligerent action caused the deputy to turn back to the car for his gun, and securing it passed around in front of the car and settled into position, when he heard a shot and White fell by his side, mortally wounded.

The deputy and Supervisor Arthur then began firing. Several shots were fired, six of which were credited to Shoemaker and about an equal number to the officers, and when the smoke of battle had cleared away Shoemaker was dead and White in a lying condition. White was hurried to Fort Stanton and expired about 8 o'clock that evening. The fight occurred about 11 o'clock Friday morning.

Mr. and Mrs. J.B. Mocho, former residents of Encinoso, Mrs. Mcho being a daughter of Mr. Shoemaker, came from Albuquerque; a son also came from Arizona. Undertaker T.E. Kelly prepared the body for burial and had charge of the funeral arrangements. Interment was made in Carrizozo cemetery Tuesday.

Ranger White's body was first conveyed to Alamo-gordo and later shipped to some point in Texas for burial. White is survived by a wife; Shoemaker had no relatives in this particular section.

## Public Health Service

This is to inform the public that there are a few cases of scarlet fever in Lincoln county -- a few at Corona and one case reported from Ruidoso. Public quarantine has been established to prevent further spread of the disease. We would like to establish conscience quarantine and get the assistance of all the citizens of Lincoln county.

A boy or girl may be 100 percent physically, and may have had excellent mental training in health habits, and yet be absent from school a year on account of scarlet fever, measles or diptheria, resulting in damaging eye, ear or heart conditions and eventually conscience disability.

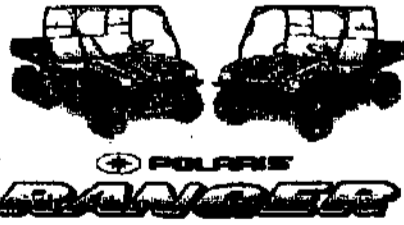


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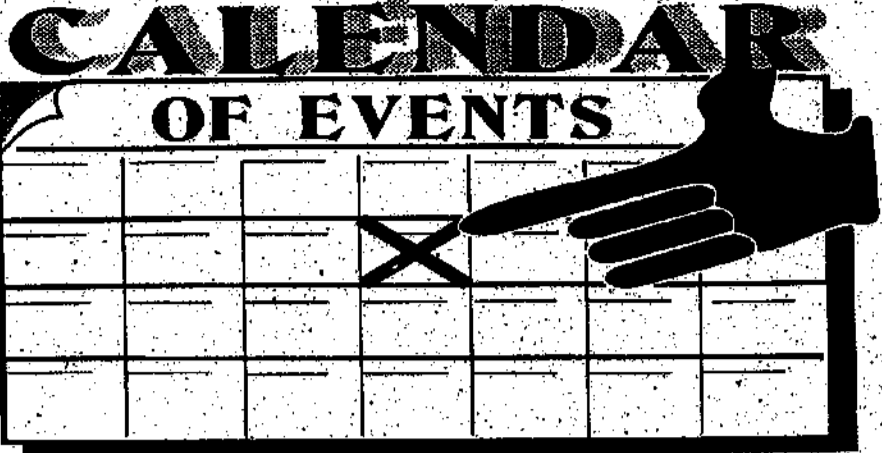

**Carrizozo Okays Loan Resolution for Fire Truck**

Carrizozo Town Trustees approved a resolution that could result in lowered fire insurance rates in the town.

At their regular meeting Tuesday, July 13, trustees approved a resolution authorizing the execution of a loan agreement between the town and the New Mexico Finance Authority for \$30,000 for the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department to purchase a "service truck". Trustee Lee Roy Zamora, fire chief, said the truck will be used to carry all the fire equipment. Zamora said once the department gets the new truck they will apply for a new "ISO" rating from the state fire marshal.

The discussion came up when a new resident said she was told she could not get fire insurance in Carrizozo. Resident Ray Dean also asked for an update on the efforts to improve fire insurance ratings in Carrizozo. Zamora said the fire department has done all the paper work necessary to obtain the improved fire rating. "All we are waiting on is the service truck," Zamora added.

Once the truck is purchased and delivered the department will submit all paper work for the ISO rating change, Zamora said.

Fire insurance rates could go down as much as one-

third of current costs, once the rating is adjusted, Zamora added.

An audience member asked about the non working fire hydrants that were discussed at the June 29 special meeting. Zamora said out of 10 that are listed as non-working only four or five actually do not work. The rest have very low pressure.

The mayor said after the June 29 meeting he instructed the town clerk to purchase kits to repair the hydrants that don't work.

In the letters to the mayor at the end of the meeting, the mayor read a letter from Ned Cantwell of Ruidoso who was concerned about the public being allowed to shoot off their own fireworks at the July 4 fireworks display put on by the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department.

Trustee Eileen Lovelace said there was an area zoned off for this and the town is trying to prevent any problems.

An audience member said by designating a place for fireworks it gives an official approval to do so. They said the town should not allow fireworks except for the official display by the fire department.

Zamora said Ruidoso does

**Bush Bashing**

Here in rural New Mexico when "Bush Bashing" is mentioned, locals immediately think of getting rid of noxious weeds, not political folderol. Noxious weeds are not always of the vegetation type, which may be difficult to eradicate but not impossible. These noxious vegetation bushes or weeds may be eliminated by using chemicals or by using physical force to pull them out to be disposed.

Eliminating human noxious weeds or bushes has to be handled entirely differently. Identifying which humans are noxious is the first step in the process. Just as with vegetation which may be pleasant to look at but deadly to animals ingesting the substance, noxious humans can be quite charming at times while underneath they are vicious and deliberately cause suffering to others around them.

Doing nothing is what many people do, trying to not get involved in problems other people are having, instead of voicing their opinions about the wrong-doings. Apathy or unconcern about others is often as cruel as joining in with the wrong-doers. Not reporting child abuse makes you guilty of a misdemeanor, yet not reporting injustice to an adult may only affect your own personal conscience.

Getting involved doesn't mean you have to march and carry banners, usually all it takes is attending meetings and being aware of what is happening and maybe learning why governmental officials are doing the things they do.

If more people would attend meetings and participate by asking questions and getting involved, it might show the officials that people do care about their area. One of the best examples is that being involved and voicing opinions helped keep Camp Sierra Blanca open, which not only is helping juvenile boys rebuild their lives but keeps jobs in the county. Sincere appreciation goes to every person who made the effort to be involved in this.

Numerous other situations might have had different results if more people had gotten involved. Some things are predetermined, but some things are at the whim of the people in charge at the moment and may not benefit the majority of the people. When Fort Stanton was closed, even as a geriatric facility that had a waiting list of more than 60 patients, the majority was deprived of a needed service in this area of the state as well as the loss of jobs.

Governmental officials are not always correct in their decisions and it is a duty of the public to attend meetings and ask questions and participate. The few hours a month you might spend at a meeting could make the difference between life as you would like it to be and the way it is. No chemicals are needed, maybe a strong tonic when you get home after listening to the spouters, and little physical effort is needed, but you could help with bush bashing and help eliminate the human noxious weeds invasion.

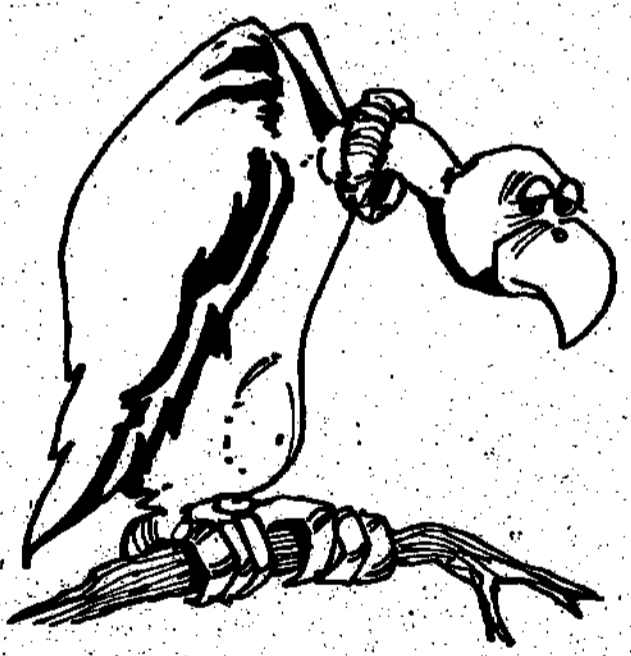

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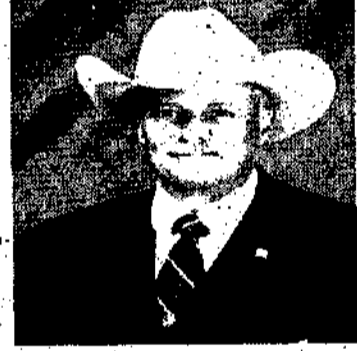

## Charity Checklist

Thinking about donating to a charity? The Federal Trade Commission advises that you consider the following precautions to ensure that your donation dollars benefit the people and organizations you want to help. They're good practices whether you're contacted by an organization's employees, volunteers or professional fund-raisers; soliciting donations by phone, mail or in person.

- \* Be wary of appeals that tug at your heart strings, especially pleas involving patriotism and current events.
- \* Ask for the name of the charity if the telemarketer does not provide it promptly.
- \* Ask what percentage of the donation is used to support the causes described in the solicitation, and what percentage is used for administrative costs.
- \* Call the charity to find out if it's aware of the solicitation and has authorized the use of its name.
- \* If the telemarketer claims that the charity will support local organizations, call the local groups to verify.
- \* Discuss the donation with a trusted family member or friend before committing the funds.
- \* Don't provide any credit card or bank account information until you have reviewed all information from the charity and made the decision to donate.
- \* Ask for a receipt showing the amount of the contribution and stating that it is tax deductible.
- \* Understand that contributions made to a "tax exempt" organization are not necessarily tax deductible.
- \* Avoid cash gifts. They can be lost or stolen. For security and tax record purposes, it's best to pay by check -- made payable to the beneficiary, not the solicitor.

**Carrizozo to Hold Special Meeting July 19 and 21**

Town of Carrizozo will hold two special meetings next week, one for planning and zoning (P&Z) and the other to hold public hearings to consider changes to the animal control ordinance and personnel policy ordinance regarding employee drug testing.

The P&Z meeting will begin at 5:30 p.m. Monday, July 19 in the town offices in Carrizozo Recreation Center.

The special trustee meeting begins at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, July 21 in the town offices.

Trustees authorized the two special meetings during their regular meeting Tuesday, July 13.

Police chief Angelo Vega requested the July 21 special meeting to hold public hearing on proposed changes to the animal control ordinance to bring it up to date with the state statute that allows three year rabies vaccinations. Also other proposed changes are the kennel and adoption fees with kennel fees to be \$25 the first day of impoundment and \$7 a day thereafter; \$25 adoption fee; \$35 deposit refundable upon proof the adopted dog is sterilized; and kennel license of \$25.

A second public hearing will be held during the special meeting on July 21 as a request from the mayor to update the employee policy manual on legalities of drug testing. Vega provided trustees with the proposed changes and asked if they had any problems with the wording. Trustee Lee Roy Zamora asked if the drug testing will be just for police or for all employees. Vega said it will be for all employees.

Vega said he submitted the proposed changes to the New Mexico Municipal League attorney to review, and "he had no problems". When asked why Vega did not have Stevens review the language, Vega said Stevens had reviewed the proposed changes for "the last two years" but

CYFD, thanked the governor for keeping CSB open because of its positive outcomes.

Judge Parsons thanked the governor for his decision and appreciated the ability to talk with Sec. Bolson. "I am encouraged because Sec. Bolson has committed to having boys back at Camp Sierra Blanca as soon as possible," the judge said.

Sec. Bolson then said the boys would be back at CSB by Monday (July 12).

The judge said she is glad to see the state focus serving low-risk, low need juveniles in their communities. "CSB does the best job with children who are medium to high risk," she added.

Governor Richardson said there would be no job losses at CSB.

Tony Moreno, missionary who has worked with the boys at CSB, said "God Bless You."

Boy Scout director for Lincoln and Chaves Counties Jim Prehm said he had been to CSB several times and was "treated like a king." "It is cheaper to change the boy around than a man," Prehm said.

OB Stander, AMI president said he has never seen so much community support for any of their programs in the United States.

Bill Lynch, District Judge from Roswell who is also on the CSB board, said CSB has

a different mission than does the Youth Challenge.

Resident Sandy Adecock said she has seen wonderful changes in the boys sent to CSB. "This is leading with integrity," she said.

State Rep. Dub Williams said to the governor, "We knew you would do this, because you have a heart."

Amanda Montes, whose father worked at CSB and who made a passionate appeal for CSB at the June 29

this was a "newly drafted policy."

Another item on the July 21 special meeting will be approval of a resolution listing all surplus inventory that will allow the town to dispose of the items in an auction tentatively set for August 28.

Trustees unanimously approved holding the special meetings. Agenda for the Monday P&Z meeting will be available from town hall by Friday, July 16, and agenda for the July 21 meeting will be available by Tuesday, July 20.

Copies of the proposed changes to the ordinances are also available at town hall.

Vega also reported on the First Street issue and how he met with surveyor Tim Collins. He said Stevens has written letters to all adjoining property owners in the issue and once they respond Stevens and Collins will make a presentation to the trustees.

Trustees also confirmed Vega's hiring of John Tate as patrol officer for 30 days.

Vega said Tate offered his services as officer to help the town until it can locate and hire a full time certified police officer. In response to a question, Vega said Tate is not certified, but by state law he can serve up to a year without certification. Vega said although Tate is not certified, he is well-experienced and has been an instructor at the New Mexico Police Academy.

At the end of the meeting, in letters to the town, the mayor read a letter from Children Youth and Families Department Secretary Mary Dale Bolson, in which she thanked chief Angelo Vega for his support and "level headed" advice regarding the recent discussions about keeping Camp Sierra Blanca open for juvenile offenders.

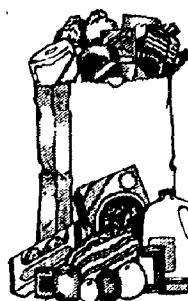
