

# LCMC And Clinics Have Flu Vaccine

Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) and its health clinics, including Carrizozo Health Clinic, now have adult doses of flu vaccine.

LCMC administrator Jim Gibson told the Lincoln County Commissioners at their meeting Tuesday, October 19 in Carrizozo that LCMC received all 2,000 doses of flu vaccine that it had ordered.

"We got lucky," Gibson said. "We got what we or-

dered and they are here."

Gibson said LCMC is reserving flu shots for all of its LCMC/Presbyterian Health-care System (PHS) health-care workers first. Then, Gibson said, he directed LCMC and the LCMC/PHS clinics to inventory all their high-risk adult patients who are county residents and who received flu shots last year and reserve doses for these patients and reserve doses for these individuals.

Gibson estimated about half of the available doses

will be reserved for LCMC and clinic workers and high risk patients.

"The remainder, about 1,000, will be donated (by LCMC/PHS) to the Public Health Department for high risk adults," Gibson added.

The flu vaccines cost \$90 per vial which is enough for 10 shots, Gibson continued. At that price the LCMC donation is worth about \$90,000, he said.

Gibson said they had not finalized how they would restrict who would receive

doses other than for high-risk adults who are residents of the county.

"We don't want these doses to go to non-residents," Gibson said. He said LCMC has turned away people from Texas, even those who live in the county part time.

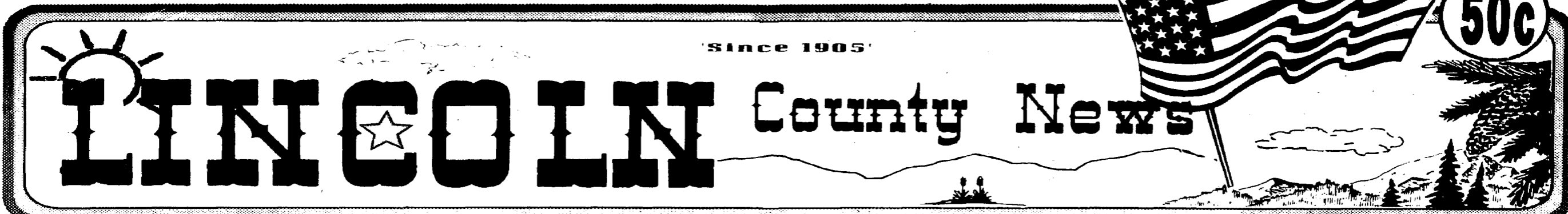
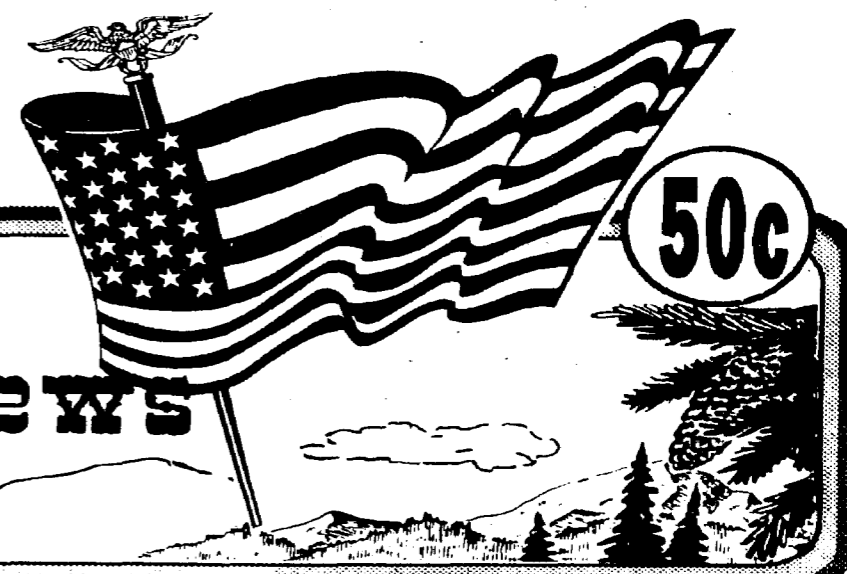
County commissioner Maury St. John said the oncology clinic in Ruidoso received 90 doses which will be given to the oncology patients in active treatment first, then the remainder to

their other high risk patients. They will not give any shots to spouses or family members of the high risk oncology patients, she added.

LCMC/PHS has no pediatric doses of the flu vaccine, but the Public Health Department has doses for children, Gibson said.

Carrizozo Health Clinic told *THE NEWS* that they also received all the flu vaccine doses they had ordered. Health care workers at the clinic will get the flu shots first, then they will give flu shots to their regular high-risk patients who received

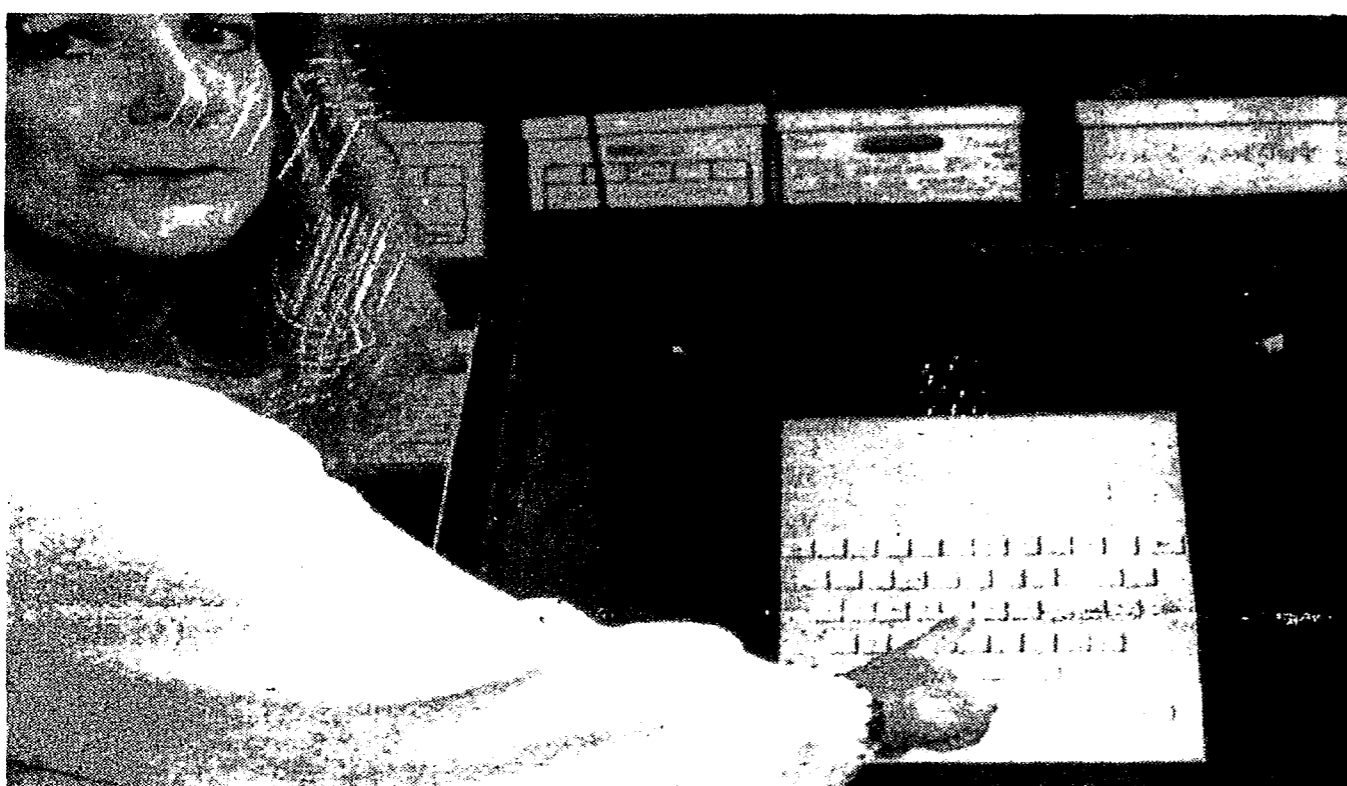

## Early Voting Underway

More than 468 Lincoln County voters have cast their ballots at the early in-person absentee polls that opened on Saturday, October 16.

Lincoln County Clerk Tammie Maddox told *THE NEWS* that the very large number of voters at the early in-person polls around the state the first few days overwhelmed the NM Secretary of State voter registration information website, causing the system to slow down so much that long lines formed at the satellite polls.

Maddox said that the Secretary of State office has upgraded the capacity of the system which is now working faster.

Early vote poll workers access the registration information for voters who come to the early polls via computers that are connected with the secretary of state internet information site. Slowness of the secretary of state information site caused delays in providing the proper information for each voter at the early polls, Maddox added.

Slowness of the secretary of state registration information site was not due to anything being done in the Lincoln County Clerk's office, Maddox said, because her office has direct satellite link (DSL) internet service.

The internet registration system from the secretary of state provides information about the voters' precincts for

early voting. The system also flags the voters who cast their ballots at the early in-person absentee polls and those who voted by the paper absentee ballot. This information is listed on the registered voter rosters provided to the individual precinct polls on November 2 general election day.

On election day, November 2, anyone shown on the registration roster to have early voted on the electronic machines or by paper ballot will not be allowed to vote at the polls on November 2.

As of Wednesday morning, the county clerk's office had received 1,535 requests for the paper mail in absentee ballots.

Early in person voting on the touch screen electronic machines will continue at Ruidoso Senior Center off Sudderth Drive in Ruidoso (next to the swimming pool/park) and at the Lincoln County Clerk's Office in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Registered voters, regardless where they live and vote on the regular election day, can vote on the electronic machines either at the clerk's office in the courthouse or at the Ruidoso Senior Center at the Ruidoso early vote satellite poll.

The final day for early in person absentee voting is Saturday, October 30 at the Ruidoso Satellite Poll at the Ruidoso Senior Center and at the Lincoln County Clerk's

Office in the courthouse in Carrizozo.

Hours for early in person voting at the Ruidoso Satellite Poll are noon to 8 p.m. Tuesday to Friday and 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday, October 23 and 30.

Hours for early voting at the Lincoln County Clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo are during regular working hours 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The only Saturday the clerk's office will be open for early voting is Saturday, October 30 from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. October 30 is the final day of early in person absentee voting in both Ruidoso and Carrizozo.

The last day for the clerk's office to mail out absentee ballots is October 28. Voters who receive an absentee ballot in the mail must complete the paper absentee ballot process and either mail the completed, sealed and signed ballot back to the clerk's office, or hand deliver it to the clerk's office before 7 p.m. Tuesday, November 2 (election day) in order to have their votes counted.

Voters who have received a paper ballot will not be allowed to vote on the voting machines either at the early vote polls or the regular polls on Nov. 2 election day.

Voters who applied for the paper absentee ballot but did not receive the paper absentee ballots by November 1 may go to their precinct poll-

## Another New Police Officer for C'zozo

Town of Carrizozo has another new police officer. Trustees during their regular meeting Tuesday, October 12 unanimously approved the request from police chief Angelo Vega to hire Tim Winrow as town police officer. Having recently earned the criminal justice law enforcement certification from Western New Mexico University, this is Winrow's first police job.

Vega said Winrow comes with good references and is the brother of a district attorney prosecutor and has another brother who is an Alamogordo police officer. Winrow was hired with a 12 month probationary status.

A long term lease agreement is in the works between the town and the Carrizozo Heritage Museum for the museum to use the old electric plant. Rene Burton with the Museum told trustees the museum received \$30,000 in grant funds to pay for its lease of the old electric plant. She said the present lease between the town and the museum for the old ice plant (which houses the museum) is for 50 years and the museum foundation would like to have a similar lease for the electric plant building next door. "We hate to do much to the building until we have the long term lease," Burton said.

As with the lease for the

ice plant, the lease for the electric building would include a clause that if the museum closes the facilities will revert back to the town. Trustee Eileen Lovelace said the town would come up with a lease by the next regular meeting. Museum volunteer Ray Dean said the town attorney was going to write a long term agreement for the museum but had never done so. Burton suggested the electric plant lease basically be the same as for the ice plant. With that trustee Wes Lindsay made the motion to have the agreement on the November meeting agenda. All trustees voted in favor.

A lease agreement for the Carrizozo Recreation Center was to have been discussed at the meeting but Peter Wolfe who has requested the lease was once again absent. The bowling leagues organized by Wolfe are already in progress. Trustee Eileen Lovelace said the town needs an agreement with Wolfe to provide some liability coverage for the bowlers.

Weihbrecht said she spoke with Wolfe who told her he wanted to take over the recreation center then lease to the town the office space for the town offices. "I said no," Weihbrecht said. "We own the recreation center and we will not lease our own offices."

Weihbrecht suggested the town do a temporary agreement with Wolfe until the

town moves out of its current space and into its new city hall. She said with the temporary agreement Wolfe would pay \$150 to \$200 a month for utilities from the money he collects from the bowling leagues. "However

## Carrizozo Alternate Municipal Judgeship Remains Vacant

Carrizozo still has no alternate judge.

At the Carrizozo town council meeting Tuesday, October 12, the mayor reported that he was found to be in conflict if he appointed trustee LeeRoy Zamora as alternate judge. The mayor was prepared to make the appointment at the September regular town council meeting, but postponed that action saying he wanted to wait until Zamora was at the meeting. (Zamora was absent from the September meeting.)

On October 12 the mayor said because of the potential conflict in choosing between Zamora and Mike Gieb, he has sent a letter to District

he wants the town to carry the insurance now and after the town moves out of the building," Weihbrecht added.

As for the town covering insurance for Wolfe after it moves out of the recreation center, Weihbrecht said the town will not be able to do this.

Weihbrecht asked trustees for permission to have town attorney David Stevens draw up the temporary agreement. "It will cost us to have David

do this agreement," she added. Weihbrecht also said she wanted to do more research on the cost of utilities.

Lovelace said the building leagues are a service to the public and the town needs a temporary agreement for liability coverage. "We are already liable because the leagues are there now," she added. "David works for us and he should do (draft) this agreement."

Lovelace made a motion to

have Stevens draft the temporary agreement and have it ready by the special town meeting on Monday, October 18. All trustees voted in favor of the motion.

Weihbrecht also said the town has found a place in the recreation center for food commodities to be delivered. The agency that provided the commodities delivery discontinued the service to Carrizozo. Weihbrecht said the rumor that the fire department would not let the commodity delivery driver into the fire station was not true, rather she was told the agency responsible for the commodities deliveries had a lack of funding and thus cancelled the Carrizozo route. She said the town will contact the agency and let them know there is now a place for the food delivery.

Carrizozo Masonic Lodge is offering to provide a cornerstone and stone setting ceremony for the new city hall when it is constructed. Dicky Winchester of Corona and a member of the Carrizozo Lodge made the proposal for the cornerstone. He said the Carrizozo Lodge and the Grand Lodge of New Mexico would lay the cornerstone and provide a ceremony and party for the community. He said while the cornerstone these days is mostly symbolic it would be laid on the traditional northeast corner of the building and would have the Masonic symbol and could have a companion stone that includes the names of the mayor and trustees.

"We just ask for participation by the mayor and council and we do the rest as an honorary event," Winchester said.

In the last 100 years in New Mexico the Grand Lodge has laid more than 100 stones on municipal buildings, schools and churches statewide, Winchester added.

Carrizozo Lodge will do all publicity for the stone laying ceremony and will pay for the stone and event. Winchester suggested the ceremony be held in the spring or some time when the weather is moderate. Trustee Lindsay said "it can be worked out" whether the Carrizozo Lodge provides the food for the ceremony.

Trustees made no commitment to the proposal from the Masonic Lodge.

Carrizozo Airport manager Bill Hayes reported that the final inspection of the airport improvements project was done last week and everyone was happy. The mayor congratulated Hayes for the good job he is doing of maintaining the airport property. Trustees discussed the need to repaint one of the buildings at the airport and gave Hays authorization to purchase paint for this.

Hayes also reported that the airport beacon light was fixed and is now in operation. He said under the next phase of airport improvements he plans to have the beacon light rewired because the old underground wiring is not in conduit and is exposed to gnawing rodents.

## Here 'Tis'

The following article, by Chester Foust, appeared in a recent issue of "Law", a publication of the Police and Sheriff's Association of New Mexico, and was reprinted in the Otero County Times. Inasmuch as The News-Outlook received several requests for copies, it is being reprinted in this week's issue through courtesy of the Otero County Times:

"I have offered from Sheriff Ortiz to write a piece for "The Law" about Lincoln County and I oil the typewriter gleefully, for this command suspends the libel laws, and there's a heap needs telling by somebody who can't be sued. If you don't like it, Sally is your man.

"Lincoln County is a great big hunk of New Mexico and contradiction. For example, it is inhabited by mild, God fearing, kindly folks who hold fierce reverence for two things (1) the Bible, and (2) Billy the Kid.

"Now Billy the Kid was nothing but a wet-nosed, trigger-happy punk from the East. That he has attained the status of a legend is due to his luck in getting shot -- and a book (The Saga of Billy the Kid) by my old pal from Chicago, Walter Noble Burns, which Hollywood converted into schmaltz.

"Lots of Lincoln County people who should know better are, by action of consent, still perpetuating the myth that Bonney was somewhat of a Robin Hood or Nathan Hale, instead of a sniveling little rat and cop-killer. So persists the reputation of Lincoln County throughout the U.S. as a piece of the wild and woolly west.

"Another point that needs clearing up, or at least ventilation, concerns that claims made for Lincoln County as a health resort. Some of the same characters who like to remark that Billy the Kid wasn't really a bad feller insist that 'th' scientists' have proved this area to be good for what ails you. Anything. These 'scientists' are always unidentified but may be presumed to be graduates of some mail-order vet course, for reference to vital statistics reveals no such rosy picture. The mortality rate is slightly higher than the average. Getting born, even, is more difficult.

"Some will tell you between schnozzles into a kleenex, or frog-freeing harumphs, that it's great country for sinus or asthma sufferers. The prevailing southwest winds that bring us a section or two of Otero County almost weekly are discounted.

### Big As Apples

"Romance and fact clash again on the mineral wealth of Lincoln County, which is dotted with prospector holes and abandoned shafts. If you care to listen you can hear about wagon loads of gold nuggets as big as apples that came out of these old workings.

"But investigation of the records usually reveals that the big mining profits of Lincoln County came out of the pockets of eastern investors. The depression of 1907 shut down most of Lincoln County mines; that of 1921 put them on the tax sale lists.

"Once, coal was guaranteed to be the source of great wealth for Lincoln County, and it's to be found all through these mountains. A scuttle here, and a scuttle there. And one faint whiff of methane gas when drilling for a windmill sets of wild rumors of petroleum discovery!

"For some reason which everybody seems to have forgotten, Carrizozo is the seat of Lincoln County. The seat -- get that. By all laws of logic, geography, and sentiment, it should have remained in Lincoln Town where it still would be more accessible to a majority of the county's taxpayers.

"Anyway, they moved the court house to Carrizozo, which is a point on the dusty flats that had been pinpricked by some engineer as a likely place for a roundhouse on the El Paso & Eastern R.R.

### But Not Water

The railroad drilled one well, and then another, and miraculous are the stories of cures effected by what came out of those wells. It was medicine, but not water. It also ate out the boilers.

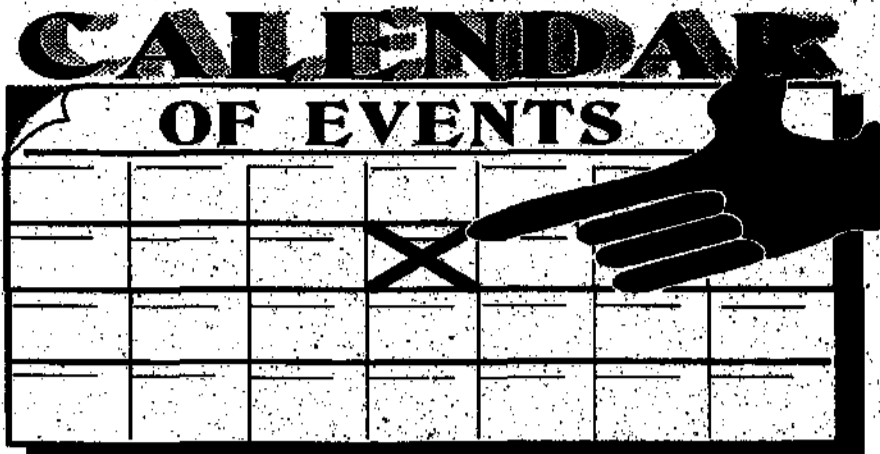
"So, they built a pipeline to Hell & Gone, which is a place up in the mountains, to get better water -- which is now provided, at a price, and by Grace of God and the S.P. Railroad, to the capital of Lincoln County. It still tastes like medicine. They say it's good for you, but I'm not going to argue. Give me another Budweiser.

"Enough for Carrizozo. Let's look at Lincoln County's No. 2 settlement, Ruidoso.

"This was one of the county's most valuable assets, a picturesque hamlet, high, high in the mountains, garnished with lush forests, giant timber.

"Awkward exploitation as a summer resort and failure to enact suitable zoning laws have seriously

# COUNTY MANAGER'S REPORT

The following is the report given by Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart to the Lincoln County Commissioners at their meeting Tuesday, October 19 at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

**Test Well Completion**

At the regular meeting of September 21, county commissioners gave authorization for a test well on county property. On September 22, three wells were dug, two on private property and one on county property. The well diggings smelled of gas/petroleum products at a depth of about 15 feet. The water table is shallow about 25 to 30 feet in this area. Further analysis of the results are required to confirm the extent of the contamination. The wells are capped so as not to interfere with the use of concerned properties, Stewart added.

County commissioner Maury St. John asked what will be done with the wells. Stewart said the petroleum contamination seems to be migrating northwest along a shelf of sandstone. He said the wells to the south of the courthouse appear to have no contamination while the wells to the north do. New Mexico Environment Department Petroleum Storage Tank Bureau paid for the drilling and testing of the wells for gasoline contamination from the old gas station across Central Ave. from the courthouse. Corrective action on the old gas storage tanks has been underway since 2002 according to a letter from the NMED sent to the county in September. The test wells are part of an investigation to define the contamination plume.

Eric Vigil of the Albuquerque office of USDA visited Stewart's office on September 22. Vigil concurred with the eventual movement of

the GREC arena assets (bleachers) to the Lincoln County Fairgrounds in Capitan. Vigil requested additional documentation demonstrating the assets would be used in conjunction with small business development. Stewart said he had contacted the fair board to provide documentation. Commission chair Rex Wilson said the Smokey Bear Stampede is one of the largest number of contestants in PRCA events in the nation. In response to a question about bleachers at the fairgrounds in Capitan, Stewart said those bleachers are the ones from the GREC.

**Impact Fee Waiver Request**

On October 5 the Ruidoso Village Council disapproved of the county's request to waive the impact fee for the construction of the Public Health Facility in Ruidoso. Stewart included a letter of notification in his information to county commissioners. "I'll be danged," responded commissioner Rick Simpson. "Who'd a thunk it."

**2005 Capital Outlay Request Processing**

The governor is attempting to improve the manner in which capital outlay items are requested and approved. A letter was sent to the county from the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) specifying that input was to be made for these requests by October 15 over a DFA web site. After reviewing the county Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan (ICIP) submission and the county commission guidance given, Stewart submitted Priority 1 request of \$123,577 for construction of the county detention center annex; Priority 2 for \$80,000 for the renovation of the old county detention center area in the courthouse; Priority 3 for \$133,000 for fairgrounds improvements.

**New Public Health Facility Is Operational**

The new Public Health Clinic in Ruidoso became operational on October 18. Stewart reported. Movement to the new facility began on October 14 and was completed on October 15. "We will be coordinating the movement of the Indigent Health Care (IHC) Rhonda Burrows coordinator to the old substation facility," Stewart said. "I am wrestling with how to staff and maintain the old facility now."

**Emergency Services Activities**

Bill Martin, Lincoln County Emergency Coordinator, has been able to secure funding for a Lincoln County Fire Service coordinator's office in the old county substation in Ruidoso. Expect the funding to be about \$43,000. These funds are considered "Fire Protection Funds" and as such can not be spent for salaries. Also, Stewart said there are plans for a county mobile command post to be

purchased under homeland security appropriations by the state.

**Mid-year Budget Adjustments**

Would like to plan on beginning mid-year budget adjustments at the November 16 commission meeting to include caring (consideration for possible pay increase) for county employees.

**Help America Vote Act (HAVA) Survey**

Stewart reminded commissioners that the county clerk had conducted a survey of all voting places for accessibility, as required by the HAVA. The survey report for the most part indicated a requirement for signage to reserve accessible parking for disabled. "I surveyed each site and I have ordered handicap signs and will ensure that they are placed appropriately the day of the election to facilitate access," Stewart reported. "Long range, if we want to resolve this (access) issue once and for all, we will have to construct regular handicap parking facilities at each location at an estimated cost of \$2,000 per site."

Stewart said seven sites needed accessible signs and one needed a pressure sensitive door that can be taken care of on election day.

New SNMEDD Director County commissioner Earl

Hobbs advised that Hubert Quintana has been named to replace Tony Elias as executive director of the South-eastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD). Hubert is the former Chaves County manager. Quintana will start his employment on November 1. County commissioner Simpson commended the decision to hire Quintana who will get things done for the district.

Assessor Appointed to National Committee  
County assessor Rick Silva has been appointed by the National Association of Counties (NACO) to the NACO Public Lands Steering Committee.

**Conservative or Liberal**

According to the American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language, with a capital C, Conservative is adhering to or characteristic of the Conservative Party of the United Kingdom. Also according to the American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language, with a capital L, Liberal is of, designating, or belonging to a Liberal political party, the Liberal Party was formed in Great Britain in about 1830. Neither are USA parties.

Fading into the background is not the way to fight this recent label that some people tag onto political parties. It is incorrect to say that one political party is conservative while another political party is liberal when many parties have both conservative beliefs as well as liberal beliefs.

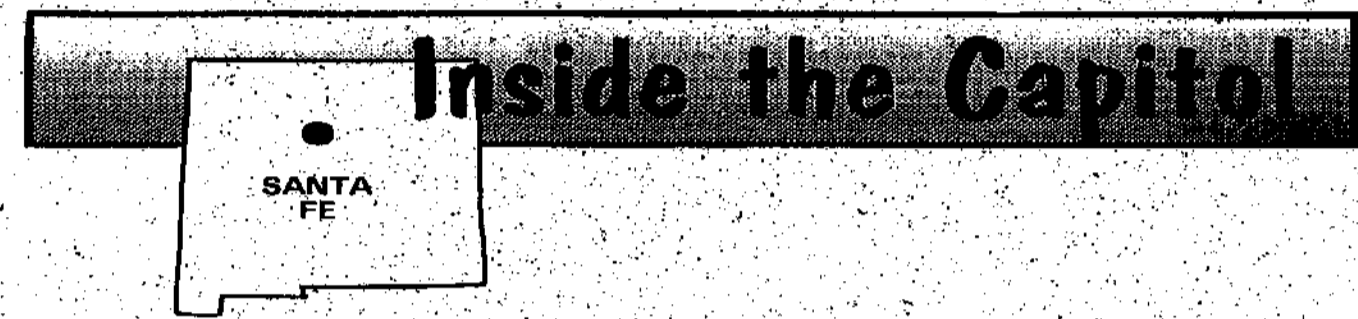
Unless the people unite and refuse to allow their party affiliation to be labeled as conservative or liberal, soon those titles will be listed on election ballots. And when that happens, expect a mad rush by many of us to change our voter registration to "Decline to State" or "No Party."

Surrendering to a label you disagree with is not right and if you do accept the label, you might consider moving to the United Kingdom or Great Britain where both the Conservative Party and the Liberal Party were started.

It was similar circumstances where people objected to what was being forced on them that caused the uprising and the Revolutionary War and the Boston Tea Party when the original colonies won their freedom from England and then became the United States of America.

Our freedoms here in the United States of America should not be taken lightly. Our ancestors fought for our right to have these freedoms. And the main freedom we should be fighting for at this time is the right to refuse to be labeled incorrectly simply because of party affiliations.

Name calling should be abolished. And putting labels, especially incorrect labels, on people is a form of name calling. Name calling is a tactic used by children, adults should never resort to name calling. And it is up to us, each of us to stop the name calling now and refuse to be labeled incorrectly because of our political affiliations.



**SANTA FE** -- How can political candidates cast so many horrible votes on issues dear to our hearts when they know it will damage their political careers?

How could people like U.S. Reps. Heather Wilson and Steve Pearce, with distinguished military service, cast votes that hurt our armed forces? And how could Richard Romero, a career educator, cast votes detrimental to our education system?

The answer is they really didn't have a choice. Their predicament is commonly referred to as "Hobson's Choice," which really isn't a choice at all.

Thomas Hobson was a 17th century English liveryman, who required every customer to take the horse nearest the door. The term has come to mean a situation in which a person with an apparently free choice actually has no alternative.

If every piece of legislation coming before Congress or a state legislature dealt with only one narrow issue, there would be no problem. But that's not the way it works. The New Mexico Legislature requires that bills deal with only one subject. But within one subject can be many issues.

In Congress, it's wide open. Omnibus bills deal with a variety of subjects. And then there is the favorite practice of tacking unrelated riders on a bill that is sure to pass. Those riders often are bills that already have failed or have never been debated. So members of Congress are faced with having to weigh the merits against the demerits of a great many bills before them.

That means the next time they run for office, their challengers can comb through their many votes and pick out distasteful features of otherwise meritorious bills. It is called opposition research and it has become quite a specialty in the political world.

A case in point took place in Congress last week. A bill authorizing the Pentagon to initiate another round of controversial military base closures was being pushed

by the House leadership in order to avoid a pre-election showdown with President Bush over the issue. Many members of Congress had promised their constituents they would stall the process as much as they could lest a base in their district be closed.

But the bill also authorized an increase of 20,000 troops for the Army, 3,000 for the Marines, a pay hike for the troops and more body armor. With all the recent fuss on those issues, there wasn't any choice but to let the Defense Department go ahead with preparing its list of recommended closures and realignments.

From listening to the ads on television, you may think you have little choice between equally distasteful candidates. But the next time you hear of a candidate casting some very suspicious votes, stop and think of whether they might have been faced with a Hobson's choice.

Here in New Mexico, our battleground state status continues to attract presidential candidates like flypaper. President George Bush and Sen. John Kerry were both in New Mexico on Monday. Kerry stayed in Santa Fe another day to prepare for Wednesday's debate.

President Bush has given quite a thrill to southern New Mexico with his many visits to towns that never have seen a presidential candidate before, much less a sitting president. The communities, such as Hobbs, probably already are firmly in his column, but the president is certainly energizing his base.

New Mexico isn't new to hosting presidential candidates who want to escape for some quiet time to prepare for a debate. President Bill Clinton spent a few days in Albuquerque in 1996 to do a little prep work and play a lot of golf.

President Bush also escaped to Santa Fe a year or so ago, completely for a vacation at an old chum's house in the Las Campanas gated community northwest of Santa Fe. He played two rounds of golf and drew some squawks from club members who had their reservations cancelled for security reasons.

# New Lincoln Historic Ordinance Adopted

A last minute attempt to delay action on the newest version of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance was not enough to stop county commissioners from adopting the rule, but was enough to prompt them to

call another public hearing to reconsider controversial Lincoln Historic Zone B. County commissioners will hold the public hearing about Lincoln Historic Zone B at their November 16 regular county commission meeting. At their meeting Tuesday, October 19, Lincoln County

Commissioners held the final public hearing on the newest proposed Lincoln historic preservation ordinance as presented by county attorney Alan Morel. Morel said for more than a year and a half the county commission and Lincoln Historic Preservation board have held public hear-

ings to take comments and suggested revisions to the existing Lincoln historic ordinance. Most of the hearings were held in Lincoln. "A great deal of input was given in the seven to eight public hearings and the more than 20 meetings," Morel said. "The mood of people at

the meetings ranged from contentious to docile with the last meeting so docile it scared me," he added. Morel said in the proposed ordinance he tried to address all the input and concerns expressed by Lincoln residents and others during the long public hearing process. Morel said the appendices of the proposed Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance, which provide written and

visual guidelines and photo documentation of existing historic structures, were completely redone. Morel thanked Sandra Smith of Lincoln who was contracted by the county to redraw many of the architectural features in the appendices. All photos, which were in the original preservation ordinance, were enhanced but not replaced, Morel added.

When county commissioners opened the hearing to the public, Lincoln valley ranch owner John Thomas spoke extensively. A decorated veteran, Thomas thanked the county commission for the Veterans' Day proclamation in which all veterans were honored and thanked for their service. "This is the first time in my life anybody said thank you for my military service," Thomas said.

He then said the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance has an adverse effect on property owners and property rights which should be compensated according to the 5th amendment of the US Constitution. "The Lincoln ordinance hurts ranch profits," he added.

Thomas was concerned the Historic Zone B, which extends about five miles east and five miles west from Historic Zone A which is the actual Lincoln town, would be extended. He also was concerned about the ordinance having the potential to prohibit development rights. Thomas said he and ranch owner James Taylor talked with property owners and got signatures on a petition in protest of Zone B especially. Thomas said most who signed the petition favor Zone A.

Zone B differs from Zone A in that manufactured homes are allowed in Zone B if they are not visible from the roadway, or if they are they must be modified to appear "historic." Otherwise, all structures in Zone B must adhere to the same rules as

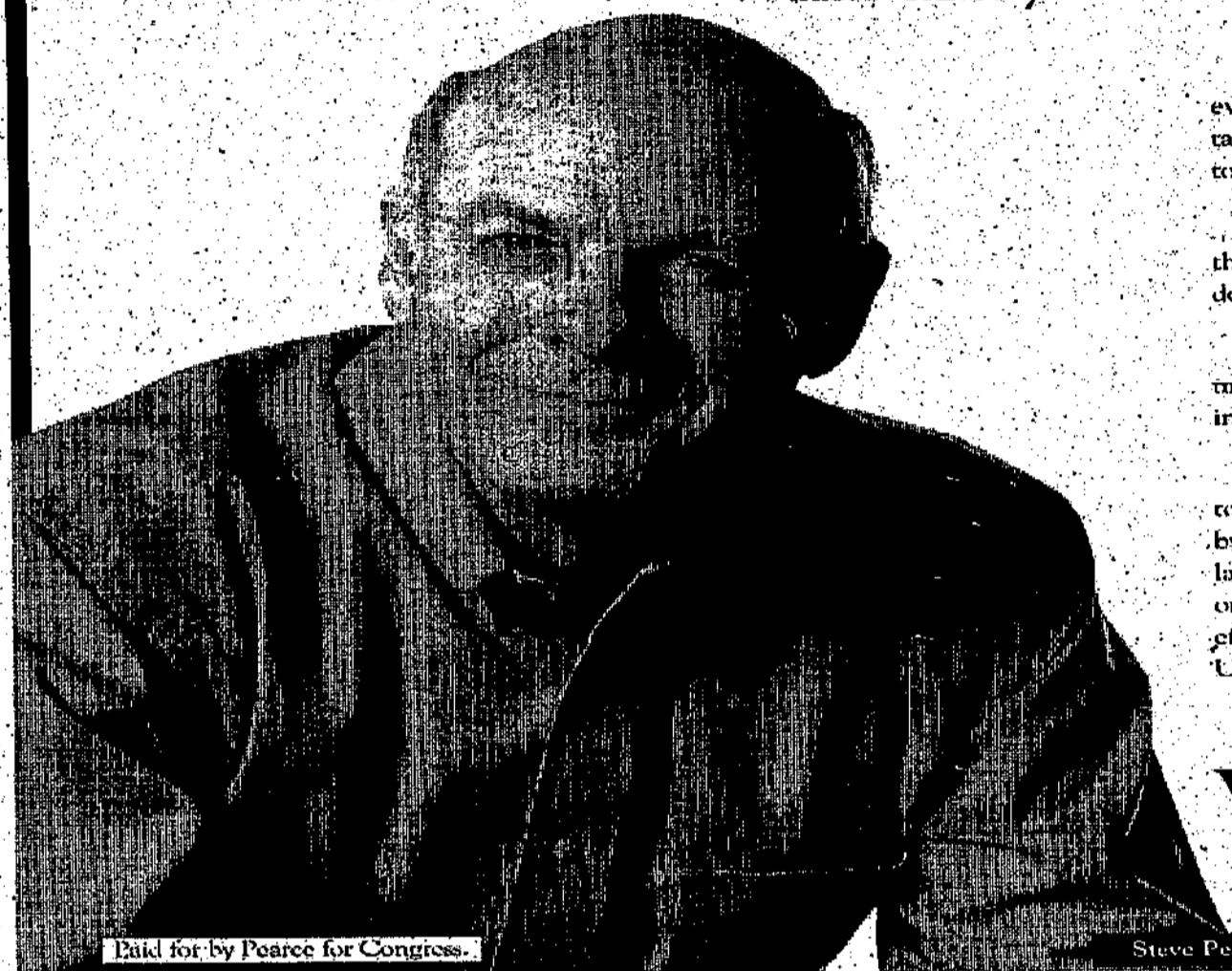

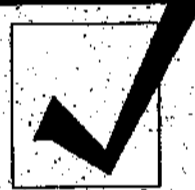

Ammel Bevill was presented with a pin for over 50 years as a member of the FCE Clubs. (Extension)

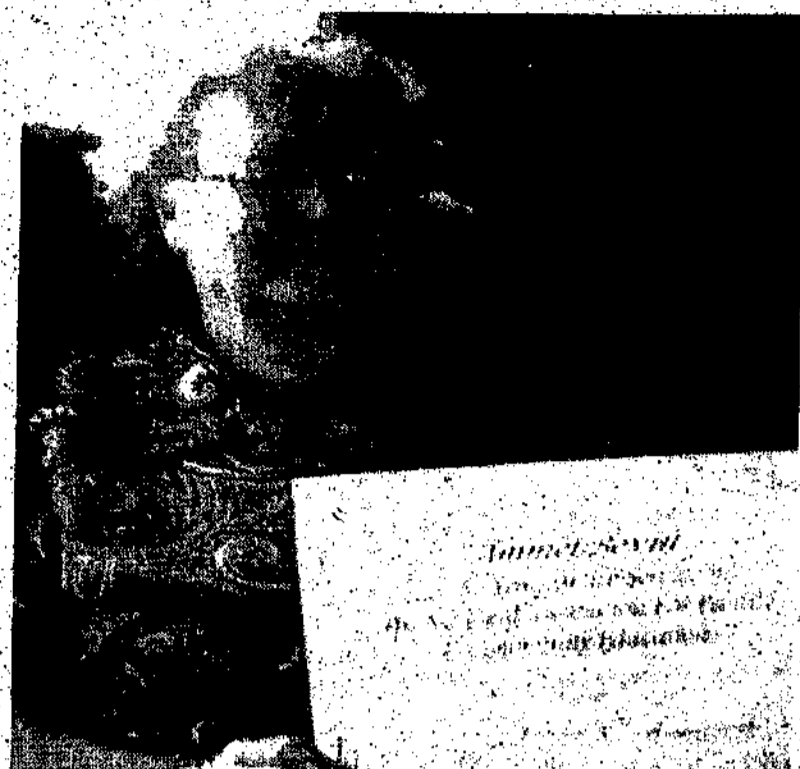
The upcoming state convention was discussed. It was voted to disassociate from the national organization. Angie Provine and Barbara Vangorder were the delegates to the state meeting.

ing place on November 2 election day and sign an affidavit of non-receipt. The person may then vote on a paper "In Lieu of Absentee Ballot". On October 14, Maddox, election bureau clerk Billie Jo Guevara, the Ink Impressions representative (the company that produces the ballots and software), Duane Williams chair of the Lincoln County Republican Party and Doris Cherry chair of the Lincoln County Democratic Party completed the certification of the electronic touch screen voting machines for

the early in person absentee polls. The electronic machines were opened, tested for every precinct with various combinations of votes and certified as being correct. All test numbers were cleared to zero and each machine was sealed with seals that will not be broken until after 7 p.m. on election night November 2 when poll workers begin counting. The scanner reader for the paper absentee ballots was also tested with 147 "dummy" ballots all of which tal-

lied correctly. The machine counter on the reader was also cleared to zero and sealed.

A problem with an incorrect name for the county clerk which was detected when the machines were first opened on Tuesday, October 12 was corrected by the October 14 testing.

for structures in Zone A. The Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance also gives authority to the Historic Preservation Board to review and act upon applications for construction, remodeling or altering any structure within the district.

Thomas said the increasing police power of the historic ordinance was not a way to get people to work together. He also said the ordinance discriminates against people of low income because of the requirements it imposes on construction.

"Let's canvass all the land owners and bring their ideas," Thomas said.

Morel said the ordinance does include an economic hardship provision which allows a landowner to re-

quest such consideration from the preservation board.

County commissioner Rick Simpson said in his opinion the issue with the Lincoln historic ordinance is Zone B.

In response to a request from Thomas to have all Lincoln Historic Preservation Board minutes on a special website, board secretary Sandra Smith said that is already occurring. The website address is [www.oldlincoln.org](http://www.oldlincoln.org) and includes information about civic events in Lincoln and minutes from the Lincoln water board, she said.

Neil Girard who owns property in Zone B said the county should put all of Zone B into Zone A or eradicate Zone B altogether.

Cele Dickenson, a 33 year Lincoln resident who helped

write the original historic preservation ordinance, said people come to Lincoln knowing it has a historic preservation ordinance. "I think it should all be Zone A because there are historic structures in Zone B," she said. "If we have mobile homes next to a historic building it will ruin the ambience."

Tom Mann, preservation board chair, thanked everyone for the time and efforts spent on revising the preservation ordinance which he requested be adopted. He encouraged those who with concerns to come to the preservation board meetings and work with them to continue to recommend changes.
