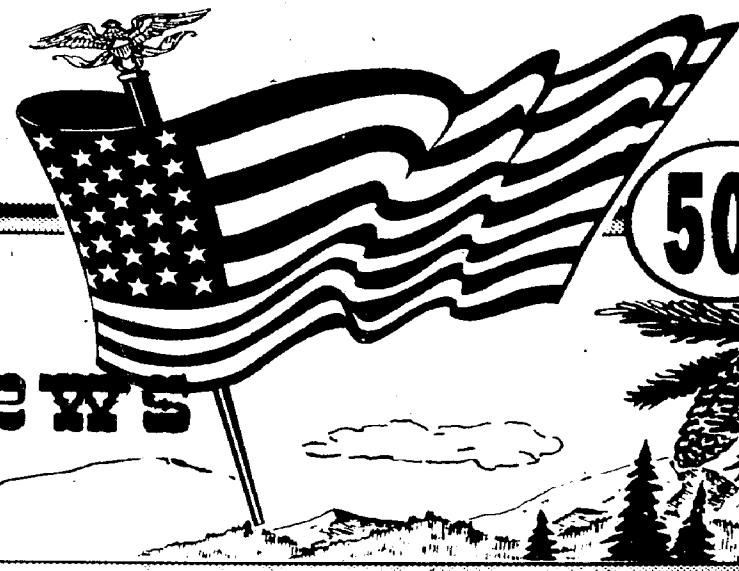
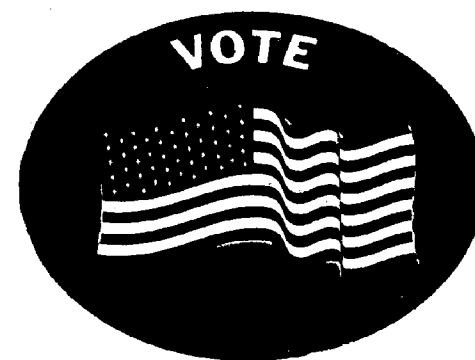
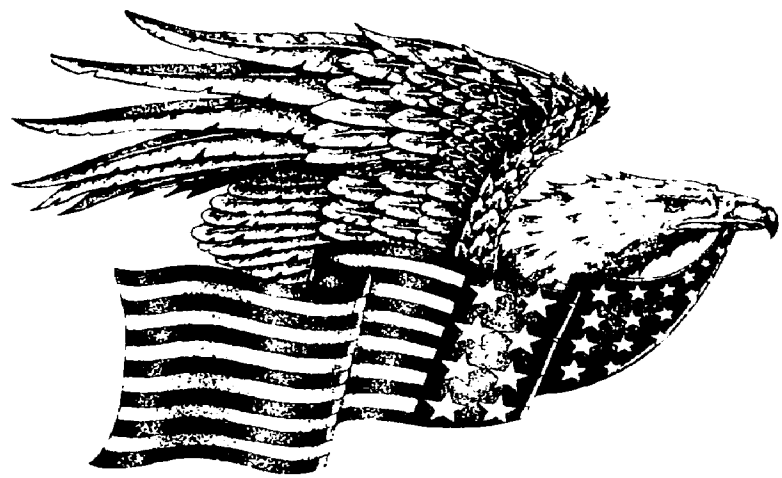

## Ruidoso, Lincoln County ETZ Battles Continue

How to reconcile the difference in philosophy between Lincoln County and the village of Ruidoso over the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zone Commission continues to trouble county commissioners.

At the October 19 Lincoln County Commission meeting, county commissioner Earl Hobbs reported that the Ruidoso-Lincoln County ETZ Commission at its October 18 meeting adopted county attorney Alan Morel's compilation of several ETZ ordinances into one ordinance.

Hobbs said the action taken by the ETZ Commission was the "good news." Then Hobbs reported on the hostile response from some audience members and lack of interest from the ETZ Commission in changing the actual substance of the ETZ compilation.

"If beheading is unpleasantness," Hobbs commented about the mood at the October 18 ETZ meeting. "I felt attacked last night."

Hobbs said there was very little discussion about changing or revising the substantive workings of the ordinance. "When the subject of actual change came up, the tone of the discussion became confrontational and very bitter," Hobbs said. "I find that unfortunate and it may be an indication of the future."

Hobbs said at the October 18 ETZ Commission meeting he presented several suggested minimal changes to consider in a revised ETZ ordinance. He said that the county commission has seen people standing very tall for individual private property rights and he too wants to give the individual the maximum rights to his property. "But it seems the difference is very clear between the county and municipality that seems to want to control individual private property rights," Hobbs said.

"I am troubled as to how we can reconcile the county with city view points," Hobbs added.

"I was bothered because

when I got up to present my view point (at the October 18 ETZ Commission meeting) I was almost attacked," Hobbs continued. "I am troubled by that and I do not know how to reconcile it."

"I favor a properly drawn and administered ETZ ordinance," Hobbs said. "And I am not seeing that presently."

"I was very disappointed by the harshness of the rhetoric," he added.

County commission presiding vice chair Rick Simpson asked if Hobbs was treated rudely. Hobbs said there were so many accusations on how the county commission had treated the village of Ruidoso staff who had attended a special county commission meeting on the ETZ. Simpson asked if the rude treatment came from private individuals at the meeting. Hobbs said it was from individuals who were "exercising their rights."

County commissioner Maury St. John said she was unsure where they were going with the ETZ meetings.

## Early Vote Is Heavy

More than 3,600 voters had cast early ballots by Wednesday, reported the Lincoln County Clerk's Office.

Of the 3,605 who voted absentee, 1,956 had voted early in-person on the electronic machines at the early vote polls in the Lincoln County Clerk's Office in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo and in the Ruidoso satellite poll in Ruidoso Senior Center, and 1,649 had returned the paper absentee ballots to the county clerk's office.

The last day for early in-person voting is Saturday, October 30.

The Lincoln County Clerk's Office in the courthouse in Carrizozo will be open from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. today and tomorrow. The satellite poll in the Ruidoso Senior Center off Sudderth Drive will be open from 12 noon until 8 p.m. today, Thursday, Oct. 28 and Friday, Oct. 29.

Both the clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo and the Ruidoso satellite poll will be open from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. on Saturday, October 30.

Long lines at the Ruidoso early vote poll have been caused by so many people waiting to use a voting machine. Lincoln County election bureau clerk Billie Joe Guevara told *THE NEWS*.

*THE NEWS* received a complaint that the Ruidoso senior center doors were locked at 7 p.m. Tuesday, October 26, causing a voter to have to search for another entrance that was open. Guevara said she was on the telephone with the early vote poll presiding judge Edith Dobbins until 8 p.m. on Tuesday, October 26 and no problems were indicated except for several voters having to wait for a voting machine.

A computer problem last week that caused a shut down of the Secretary of State voter registration internet connection, which provides the voter registration information for the early voting polls, was resolved and has not reoccurred, Guevara said.

Today, Thursday, October 28, the clerk's office will be the last day for the clerk's office to mail out the voter absentee ballots to voters who applied for them. All paper ballots must be returned, either by mail or hand delivered by the voter or an immediate family member, to the Lincoln County Clerk's office in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo by 7 p.m. Tuesday, November 2 in order to be counted.

Tuesday, November 2 is general election day, the final day to cast a ballot for the 2004 election. Voters on November 2 must go to their precinct polls where they are registered to vote. Voter registration cards from the county clerk's office show the voters' precinct and polling places. Or voters may call the county clerk's office at 648-2385 ext. 8 or toll free at 1-800-678-2705 ext. 6.

On Tuesday, November 2, the polls are open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Voters who are in line by 7 p.m. must be let in to vote. After the last person who was in line at 7 p.m. is inside the poll, regardless the time of night, the doors will be locked. After the last person has voted, poll workers will go through the process of closing the polls and starting the print out of votes from each machine.

The names of people who voted early in-person, or who were mailed an absentee ballot, will be indicated as having voted as such on the voter signature lists at the individual polls.

Individuals who voted early or received a paper ballot will not be allowed to vote at the polls on November 2. However, any person who sent in an application for an absentee ballot from

the county clerk's office and did not receive the ballot before November 2 may vote at their poll on a provisional paper "in lieu of absentee ballot" on Nov. 2.

Schools of instruction for all election poll workers, including absentee will be held today, Thursday, October 28 at Ruidoso Convention Center and Friday, October 29 at the Lincoln County Commission chambers in the courthouse in Carrizozo. The public is invited to attend these schools.

Election returns on November 2 will be available on the Secretary of State website on the internet.

All votes are considered "un-canvassed" in Lincoln County until the county commissioners approved the canvass, the final vote tallies, presented by the county clerk. The county clerk's office staff rechecks all print out tapes and numbers from all the precinct machines, and they add in all provisional ballot votes before they print out the canvass to present to county commissioners.

County commissioners have scheduled a special meeting at 2 p.m. Friday, October 29, in their chambers in the courthouse in Carrizozo to accept the canvass.

## Public Hearing On Proposed Billboard Ordinance In Nov.

Lincoln County Commissioners will hold a public hearing on a proposed billboard ordinance at their November 16 regular meeting.

County commissioners unanimously approved of the hearing during their regular meeting October 19 in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

County attorney Alan Morel presented a proposed billboard ordinance that requires permits for all signs larger than 16 square feet; limits the size of sign to a maximum of 300 square feet per side; allows any sign smaller than 16 square feet without a permit; requires that signs larger than 16 square feet and less than 300 square feet be spaced at least 1,000 linear feet apart.

The proposed ordinance will not allow flashing night lights, requires the sign

owner to comply with all Night Sky regulations for lighting; includes definition about how signs affect property values and other specifics.

Loma Grande property owner Karen Smith asked that language be added to require the signs to be a radial distance of 1,000 feet apart, instead of just linear distance. "With linear spacing they can just go across the highway and put up another sign," Smith said.

Caroline McCoy of Nogal, who was the first to bring the issue of billboards to the county commission, asked what coverage the proposed billboard ordinance would have. Morel said it would include all areas of the county outside a municipality.

Smith also asked for clarification on when the current billboard moratorium will expire. County Commissioners had approved a morato-

but she appreciated the time individuals were giving to the ETZ ordinance revisions. St. John said the conflict

between the control and power is what concerns her. "The problem everyone identifies as the number one ma-

job problem with the ETZ is the administration," St. John said.

Oscuro resident Jerry Carroll said the situation is one of economics for the village which makes money off of the ETZ permits. Carroll said if Ruidoso wants to require those in the ETZ to have business licenses when neither the county or state requires them, then let Ruidoso annex the ETZ.

County Commissioner Leo Martinez said he has supported the village of Ruidoso, but does not support the ETZ and its administration. Martinez suggested the county take over the administration of the ETZ and have the state issue permits and do building inspections.

With that Martinez introduced Fermin Aragon, the New Mexico General Construction Bureau chief. He said all construction in New Mexico requires a building permit, and construction by a licensed contractor. Homeowners, however, may obtain an individual home building permit to do construction themselves. Permits can be obtained from the state Construction Industries Division which has offices in Las Cruces, Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

Morel asked how the division determines who will issue the building permits, especially in an ETZ. Ruidoso now administers all building permits and inspections for construction in the "planning and platting zone" that goes out three miles from the Ruidoso municipal boundaries. "Does the state have agreements on who issues the building permits in the ETZs?" Morel asked.

Aragon said the state honors the political subdivision that administers the ETZ to issue permits.

Morel then asked if the state has the power to issue building permits in the three-mile plan and platting zone. Aragon said if the entity has requested to administer the ETZ the state allows them to issue permits. "But we can issue permits in the ETZ," Aragon said. "We have total jurisdiction statewide."

Martinez said the problem is Ruidoso is making money in the ETZ, \$150,000 in nine months. "That is a lot of money that could go to the state or county if we decide to (issue permits)," Martinez said. Aragon said the state does not receive any of the money for building permits issued by Ruidoso.

Martinez then asked whether a permit is needed to do up to \$5,000 worth of maintenance type work. Aragon said people can do up to \$5,000 worth without a building permit. "We do not issue building permits to a commercial business owner," Aragon said. "We always require a licensed contractor for commercial buildings."

Once again Martinez asked if the state can issue permits in the ETZ. Aragon said yes. Aragon then introduced Ron LeClare the building inspector for this area. Martinez said there are complaints that jobs are being held up because the inspectors are so slow in getting to a site. LeClare said he is in Lincoln County Monday, Wednesday and Friday and to his knowledge he had not caused any major construction delays because of his inspections.

LeClare said he thinks the three mile planning and platting zone with Ruidoso is a good system. Contractor Mike Buchter said he also thinks the system works well with someone at Ruidoso village hall to answer questions and to handle the permit process. If the county took over inspections and building permits, contractors would have to travel to Carrizozo for these. "It is very convenient and the staff is extremely helpful," Buchter said about the Ruidoso planning office. "There is not a problem and it does not need to be fixed."

County planning officer Patsy Sanchez said all building permits issued from Ruidoso or from the state should come to the county to be properly addressed. "This is something they are not doing," she added.

rum on all new billboards for a 60 day period which is set to expire November 16, the day of the county commission meeting. County commission chair Rex Wilson said the commission could stretch the moratorium if that is needed.

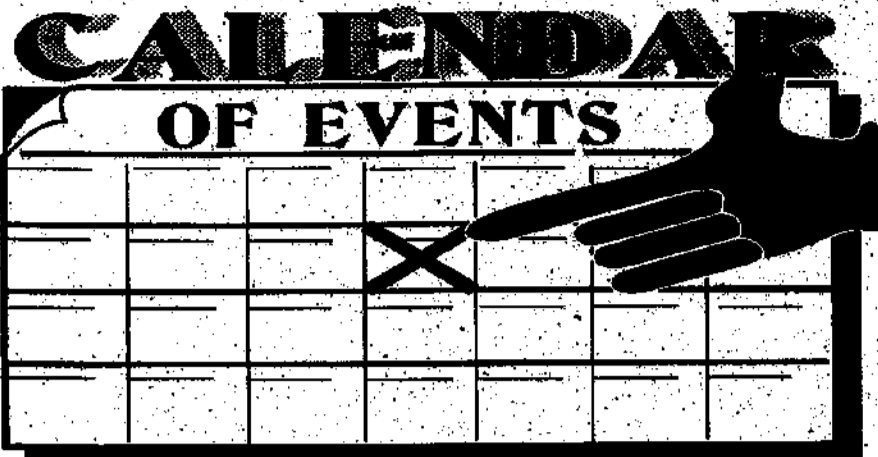

## Ruidoso Village Budget On Target

With 25 percent of the fiscal year completed, the village of Ruidoso has received 26 percent of the revenues budgeted.

Ruidoso Village Councilors during their meeting Tuesday, October 26, heard the budget report from Elaine Beltran, village finance director. She said the village has collected \$2,131,383 in gross receipt tax revenues since July 1. "This represents an increase of \$13,994 over the revenues received this time last year," Beltran said.

Overall, general fund revenues were at \$1,703,185 which is 22 percent of the budgeted revenues for this time of year, and the same percentage as this time last year, Beltran added.

Some funds had higher revenues with the water fund revenues at 30 percent, airport fund revenues at 42 percent budgeted and lodgers tax revenues at 37 percent budgeted. The solid waste fund revenues were only at 22 percent.

Overall total expenditures so far this fiscal year are at 23 percent or \$6,430,670. Last year at this time, expenditures were at 27 percent.

Of those overall expenditures the general fund expenditures were at 24 percent of the budget at 1,937,278. Last year at this time, expenditures were at 26 percent of the budget.

Utility fund expenses were at 19 percent; recreation expenditures at 26 percent; solid waste expenditures at 26 percent.

Investments for the village total 81 percent or \$9,397,944 of the total cash of \$11,568,812 in all funds. The investments include \$6,112,944 in certificates of deposit in local banks and \$3,285,000 in the State Investment Pool. The remaining cash of \$2,168,838 is in interest bearing checking accounts also held in local banks, Beltran reported.

"We are doing very well so far this year," Beltran concluded.

## Blood Drive Monday Nov. 8 at Carrizozo Woman's Club

The Carrizozo Woman's Club is hosting a community blood drive on Monday, Nov. 8 from 12 noon to 6 p.m. Donors may schedule an appointment or drop by any time between 12 noon and 6 p.m. Call Cherril Goad at 648-2238 to schedule an appointment.

Anyone 17 years old or older and weighing at least 110 pounds is eligible to donate blood. Donors are asked to bring a complete list of medications they have taken in the past month.

United Blood Services personnel will conduct the blood drive. United Blood Services is the supplier for all New Mexico hospitals as well as hospitals in the Four Corners Region, a total of 42 medical facilities in the state and area served.

The reasons for donating blood include: someone in the United States needs blood every three seconds, 280 donations are needed each day to meet patient needs in the United Blood Services New Mexico service area, there is no artificial substitute for blood, when people are ill or injured and need blood.

Each donation is separated into components that can help many patients. Red blood cells are for surgery patients and accident victims, platelets are used for cancer and leukemia patients, and plasma is used for burn and trauma patients.

**Election Endorsements**

Before you enter the voting booth, please take time to get familiar with what will be on the ballot. Candidates for each political office as well as the four bond questions and three constitutional amendments are on the ballot.

Apparently some people don't care whether the bond questions and constitutional amendments are approved or not, and apparently some people may choose to not cast a vote for any of the candidates in certain positions, and that is their choice, but remember your vote does count.

Considering how close the election for president was four years ago here in New Mexico, and the fact that New Mexico is one of the four or five swing states, it is very important for you to cast your vote for a candidate for president as well as for the other positions on the ballot.

Knowing which candidates will receive your vote is a decision you must make. We urge each voter to decide how to cast votes. If two of the candidates for a certain position were the Atlantic Ocean and the Pacific Ocean and you asked us to recommend which candidate should win, it might be interesting. If we endorsed the Atlantic and you preferred the Atlantic, but objected to us telling you what to do you might vote for Pacific just for spite. Or you might be unhappy about the devastation caused by the hurricanes in the Atlantic and vote for the Pacific.

Being told what to do and how to vote is not the way it is supposed to be. It really doesn't matter which ocean we prefer, it is your choice. If we endorsed the Pacific and you had enjoyed a vacation to Hawaii and wanted to go back someday, you might agree and vote Pacific but if you wanted to show us we were wrong you might cast your vote for the Atlantic. Our endorsement would not be appreciated regardless of which ocean we wanted to win.

Our choices are not necessarily your choices and it is your choices and the way you cast your ballots that will make a difference. If a small stream was opposing both the Atlantic and Pacific you might vote for the stream.

Next week hopefully the votes will be counted and our nation can return to so-called normal. And hopefully the animosity between factions will settle and the main thing will be doing what is best for everyone. Getting along is the main thing and everyone needs to work together to help improve the many things that need to be improved.

Except for the election hoopla, the next important thing is to remember to set your clocks back one hour on Saturday night because Daylight Savings Time ends at 2 a.m. Sunday morning. We wonder at times about whether Daylight Savings Time is doing what it was supposed to do. If taking an hour off one part of the day and putting it on at the other end of the day works, OK. And we definitely endorse the end of Daylight Savings Time.

**ENMU Ruidoso Is Now Closer To Branch Status**

The first step to bringing Eastern New Mexico University learning center at Ruidoso to branch college status has been cleared.

At the Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday, October 26, mayor Leon Eggleston said he attended the Commission on Higher Education meeting in Los Lunas last week to provide testimony on behalf of ENMU-Ruidoso. He said the request and preliminary plan for ENMU-Ruidoso to be considered as a branch college was approved unanimously by two committees of the Commission on Higher Education. The request and preliminary plan was then sent to the full sitting Commission on Higher Education, Eggleston added.

The Commission on Higher Education unanimously authorized the ENMU-Ruidoso staff to prepare a detailed plan for bringing ENMU-Ruidoso to the branch college status which will be presented to the Commission on Higher Education at its November meeting, Eggleston added.

At its January meeting, just prior to the 2005 legislative session, the Commission on Higher Education must act on the detailed plan submitted by ENMU-Ruidoso. If the commission approves the detailed plan, the request for ENMU-Ruidoso to have branch college status must be

approved by the state legislature and signed by governor.

Eggleston said he was one of 20 people from Lincoln County and Mesquero who attended the commission meeting on behalf of ENMU-Ruidoso at the Commission on Higher Education meeting in Los Lunas.

"The commission members seemed to be pleased with the representation of people in support of the change in status for ENMU-Ruidoso," Eggleston said. He said that Lincoln County Commissioner Maury St. John, many people from the Ruidoso

chamber of commerce, schools and Lincoln County Medical Center were among those at the commission meeting. "There was a lot of varied support from the communities," he added.

ENMU-Ruidoso director Dr. Jim Miller told THE NEWS he was pleased that the Commission on Higher Education had taken the action. "The second detailed plan now required is in the process of development," Miller said. Some of the details required are a 10 year

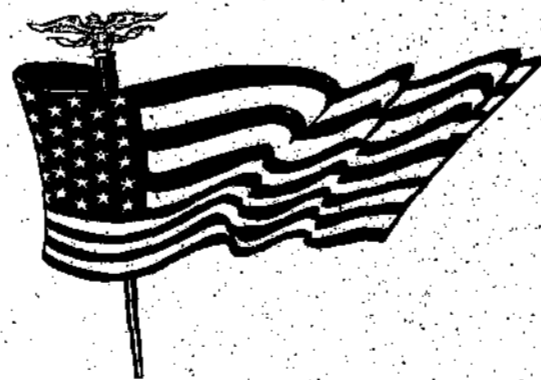

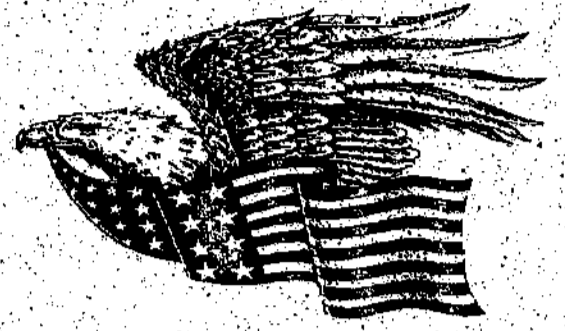

## Ruidoso Okays Resolution for Community Center

by Doris Cherry

A site for a possible future community center in Ruidoso has been found.

Ruidoso councilors at their meeting Tuesday, October 26, approved a resolution to "consider possible use of land for community center". The resolution states that the governing body of the village of Ruidoso will consider the village owned land located near the White Mountain Recreation Center (near White Mountain schools, soccer fields and Kids Connection playground) as a possible location for the future development of a community center. The resolution further states that "locating a community center on the proposed land will be contingent upon voter approval, proper funding, in accordance with anti-donation laws, and will have a sunset clause to be reviewed annually by the governing body of the village of Ruidoso.

The resolution supports the location for the possible community center by stating

enrollment forecast, five year operating budget projection, 10 year capital outlay plan and an economic impact study on how the branch college would affect the regional economy.

Miller said the most significant detail required is the survey of people who currently use or would use ENMU-Ruidoso if it became a branch college. This survey is used to determine if a branch college is needed to provide a more diverse level of education.

"Most of these details are already done, except for the survey," Miller said. He said ENMU did a similar survey in 1990 which took six months. "We have 20 days to deliver the survey to the Commission on Higher Education on November 18," Miller added.

The November 18 meeting of the Commission will be in Santa Fe, Miller said. The only thing required for ENMU-Ruidoso at that meeting will be to submit the final detailed plan for branch status, Miller said.

Miller also said that one of the commissioners at the October meeting expressed that while he appreciated the leaders who attended the meeting in support of the ENMU-Ruidoso branch status, the contingency was not necessary at the November commission meeting. Miller said he plans to take a small group to the November meeting anyway.

The Commission on Higher Education will make its final decision on the request for branch status at its January meeting, just prior to the 2005 legislative session, Miller added.

"If the commission approves the final plan in January, the next step is to have legislation drafted," Miller said. State Rep. Dub Williams has agreed to sponsor the legislation for the branch college status, Miller added.

The legislation for making ENMU-Ruidoso a branch college will have to go through several legislative committees, be approved by both the house and senate, then signed by the governor before April 6 to become effective.

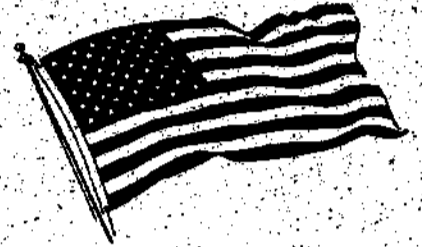

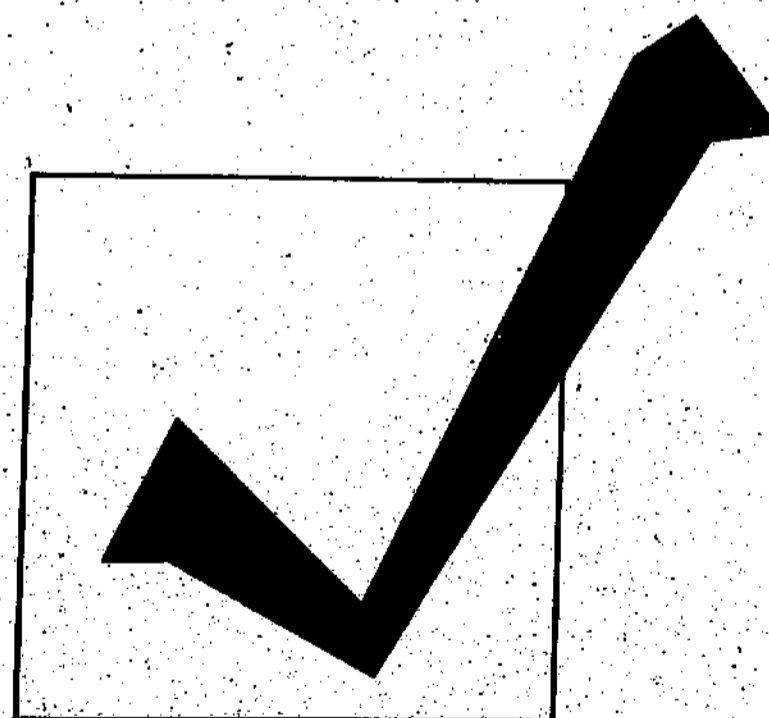

**County Okays \$\$  
Furnishings For  
Corona Clinic**

Lincoln County Commissioners approved spending up to \$4,600 in clinic mill levy money for furniture for the Corona clinic waiting room.

At their meeting October 16, county commissioners got an update on the Corona Health Clinic from county manager Tom Stewart and a request for spending the mill levy money. Stewart said the Corona Clinic became operational early October and Dr. Jackson and PA Ernie Gonzales have been providing services at the clinic.

"The village of Corona has agreed to provide an additional room to Presbyterian Healthcare Services (PHS) for their operations and the county will begin to provide PHS the operational supplement of \$1,333 a month as previously agreed," Stewart said. The monthly supplement will come from the clinic mill levy fund.

"The issue of furniture for the common waiting area was brought to my attention," Stewart said. "We have some \$16,749 remaining in the clinic mill levy capital outlay for the Corona clinic remaining in the budget."

Stewart then asked county attorney Alan Morel if the mill levy money can be used for furnishing the common area. If not, would the county commission be willing to provide support from the general fund.

Morel said the clinic uses a small part of the complex (shared with village offices) and the issue is how the facility is used when the clinic is not in use. Morel said the appropriate use of clinic mill levy funds is clearly to be used for the clinic.

After some discussion on how the original request from Corona was for much more furnishing than just the commons area, and how the clinic is in need of better furniture, county commission chair Rex Wilson made a motion to authorize the spending of up to \$4,600 from the mill levy fund for the furnishing. The motion got a second and unanimous approval from the county commission.

Also at the October 16 meeting, county commissioners approved Indigent Health Care Program Medical Provider Agreement No. 38 with Pathology Consultants of New Mexico. The agreement allows the medical services provider to be eligible to receive indigent health care funds for services provided to county residents who qualify for the low income program. Pathology Consultants of New Mexico provide services to 13 physicians in Ruidoso.

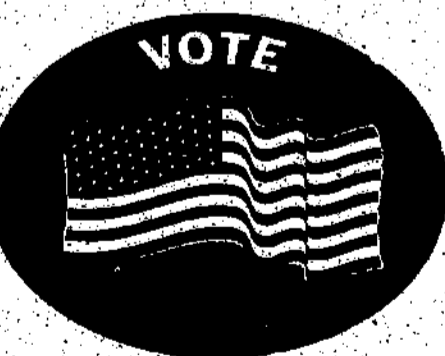

that the village comprehensive plan shows the village hall area as the recreation center for locals.

Also at the October 26 meeting, village manager Lorri McKnight said the public is invited to make comments on the proposed village comprehensive plan during the village planning and zoning meeting at 2 p.m. Tuesday, November 2 at village hall.

Another plan considered a big achievement for the village is the Community Wildfire Protection Plan. Ruidoso village forester Rick Delaco reported that Wildland Interface Working Group has been renamed the Greater

Ruidoso Area Wildland Interface Working Group. The group made up of representatives from the village of Ruidoso, the county, US Forest Service, State Forestry and Mescalero Tribe has worked together to draft the Community Wildfire Protection Plan which has since been approved by all entities involved.

Delaco said the community wildfire protection plan is a key to open the door for funding from the federal Health Forest Act.

Under the plan, a thinning project in the southwest quadrant by Ruidoso is the priority project for forest treatment in 2005. Delaco said.

Delaco said a group working closely with the wildland group is working on water modeling, which appears to show that thinning a specific area of the forest to help capture more water will also

help reduce the high fire hazard. He said the group will make a presentation in January on the water modeling.

An example of how forestry is more involved with commercial development within the village is the new construction project in the 500 block of Mechem Drive. Delaco added. He said the

project contractor worked very closely with the village forestry department with the final landscaping design. "You will see how the ma-

ture trees have been left and will become the highlight of the project," Delaco added. "This is a good example of the (forestry) ordinance compliance and commercial development."

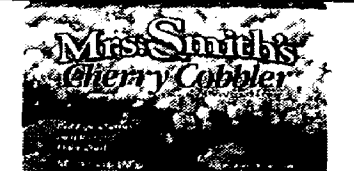
