Election Night Error Favored Libertarian By Mistake

An input mistake on election night put Libertarian candidate for House Dist. 56 Richard Obergfell ahead of incumbent Dub Williams in Lincoln County.

Lincoln County Clerk Tammie Maddox told *THE NEWS* that the mistake that

gave Obergfell the lead over Williams in Lincoln County on election night tallies came from an input error. Maddox said the hand tally sheets given to the early vote/absentee board on election night did not include Obergfell's name. The board wrote in the name on each sheet, but they were not consistent on which line Obergfell was put. As a result, the clerk's office staff put in numbers from each line without double checking the name for the line, thus

giving Obergfell some of Williams' votes and vice versa.

Maddox said in canvassing the votes of November 2 to present to the county commission on November 5, her staff checked all numbers on the absentee hand tally sheets with the print out tapes from the early vote machines and the optical scanner used to count the paper absentee ballots and found the input mistake. All numbers were rechecked with the machine

tally tapes, she told *THE NEWS*.

The corrected total votes for Obergfell were 382, Williams 2,653 which were listed on the official canvass documents presented to the county commission on November 5.

On Friday, November 5, while some New Mexico counties were still counting votes, Lincoln County Commissioners in their chambers in the courthouse in Carrizozo approved the official can-

vass of the Lincoln County General Election votes. The official documents for the canvass of the votes were print out sheets showing the entire number of votes per candidate or question on the ballot and the votes per precinct.

Maddox opened her pre-

sentation of the canvass by thanking all involved. She especially thanked her deputy clerk Loree Vallejos, bureau of elections clerk Billie Jo Guevara, all the staff in the clerk's office and all 110 precinct workers. "They all

C'zozo Official Holiday Lighting Set for Dec. 3

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce will officially light the new Christmas Train Display at 5 p.m. Friday, December 3 at McDonald Park.

Community businesses, government offices and residents are invited to join in by putting up and plugging in their lighting holiday displays on the same night as a way to kick off the holiday season in Carrizozo. The official lighting will also highlight the Carrizozo Woman's Club Holiday Hoedown on Saturday, December 4 at the Woman's Club building.

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce members at their monthly meeting on Tuesday, November 9 heard from Eileen Lovelace who spearheaded the Christmas train project. Lovelace reminded members that everyone who would like to help assemble and put up the lighted train display in the park to meet at the Otero County Electric Cooperative storage facility by the Carrizozo museum at 1 p.m. Wednesday, December 1. At the same time volunteers will check the large Christmas light displays for burned out bulbs, etc. Anyone interested in helping is invited to show up and be ready to help.

During discussion about the train, a chamber member suggested the official lighting of the Christmas Train which the others thought was a good idea. Lovelace was to work on the lighting event by inviting the mayor and contacting the county to coordinate its holiday lighting for the same night.

The official lighting of the Christmas Train will open the holiday season in Carrizozo which includes the Chamber Christmas After Hours Open House set for 5 to 7 p.m. Friday, December 10 at the Walker's Blue Auction Barn on Central Ave. Chamber members voted unanimously to have the event catered by Fran Mack. Everyone in the community is invited to attend the open house.

The next day, Saturday, December 11, beginning at 9 a.m. chamber volunteers, members of the Carrizozo fire department and anyone else wanting to help will prepare the 5,000 luminarias for the Christmas Eve display. The sacking will take place at the fire station on 8th Street. Snacks and lunch will be provided to all who participate in the sack preparation. Candles, sacks and strikers will be purchased from Sturges Venture Store.

Prepared luminarias will be stored until Christmas eve when the luminarias will be set out along major streets and lighted. Lovelace invited everyone to come out on Christmas eve to help with the luminaria display.

Chamber members voted unanimously to advertise both the sacking event on December 11 and the placing and lighting of the luminarias on December 24 in Lincoln County News and the Ruidoso paper.

As night falls on December 23, the chamber will conduct the judging of the annual Christmas Lighting Display contest. Chamber members voted unanimously to increase the amount of the residential prizes to \$100 for first, \$75 for second and \$50 for third.

Everyone agreed to invite guests staying at Chaparral Motel to serve as judges of the contest. Also everyone agreed the contest area will include all of Carrizozo and a two-mile radius around the town. Lovelace volunteered to contact the town police chief to have him assign an officer to drive the judges around town and the surrounding area to judge the lighting displays. The commercial winner will receive

Lovelace Can Be Town Trustee and County Commissioner

Carrizozo Town Trustee Eileen Lovelace can serve as trustee and county commissioner at the same time.

At the November 9 Carrizozo Town Council meeting town businessman Peter Wolfe questioned how Lovelace can serve on the town council at the same time she is county commissioner.

Lovelace was elected on November 2 to County Commission District 1 and will assume her new position on January 1, 2005. She will replace Rex Wilson who was at term limits.

Weihbrecht said she contacted the New Mexico Municipal League and was told Lovelace can serve on both boards at the same time. However, Lovelace will have to abstain from voting as a county commissioner on any issue involving the town such as the animal shelter.

"It seems an absolute conflict of interest (serving on both boards)," Wolfe said about Lovelace. "I don't understand how she could do both jobs."

The mayor said the same question came up when Cynthia Morales was elected to the trustee board while working as the municipal judge's clerk. The town was told by the Municipal League that Morales would not have to step down as clerk.

Weihbrecht said Lovelace had told her she would hold both trustee and county commission positions. Lovelace was not at the meeting during the discussion because she was ill.

Wolfe said he also contacted the municipal league about the issue and was told the same information. "But it will be hard for her to hold down both positions, especially when Ruidoso is trying to get Carrizozo's water," Wolfe said.

When some in the audience said Commission District 1 represents Carrizozo, another

audience member said County Commission District 1 includes much more than just Carrizozo. County Commission District 1 includes Carrizozo and surrounding county areas, Oscuro, Ancho, White Oaks, Corona, the ranch areas north of the Capitan Mountains, Nogal, Nogal Mesa, Loma Grande, county areas west of Capitan and the western subdivisions of the Village of Capitan.

After the discussion about Lovelace, Wolfe turned his attention to the reason he was at the meeting—to consider the town's proposed temporary agreement with Wolfe to manage the Recreation Center. While Wolfe took a copy of the temporary agreement he did not commit to any of the conditions because he said he would have to review the agreement which Weihbrecht said was basically the same as before.

(Wolfe and the temporary agreement have been on the trustees' meeting agendas for two months and have been postponed because Wolfe was not present at either meeting.)

Wolfe said the last time the Recreation Center made any money was in the early 1970s. "There is no money to be made in the center, which is a good facility," Wolfe added.

Currently there are 27 bowlers in six teams using the recreation center with 25 from Carrizozo, Wolfe said. He also said he recently spent another \$300 in repairing the old Brunswick bowling lane equipment which requires constant maintenance.

really did an excellent job," Maddox said.

Maddox also thanked the treasurer's office for staying up late beyond 2:15 a.m. until all the early/absentee votes were delivered. Maddox said the absentee counts were also late for the primary, due to the requirement that all absentee votes be listed per precinct.

At the regular polls on election day, everything went well with most precincts calling in their preliminary results within an hour of closing the voting, Maddox said. She also thanked the voting machine technicians, Snooks McDaniel who has been

technician for 40 years, Paul Baca who has been technician for 20 years and Rhonda Burrows who is technician in training for the last year. Also she thanked members of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Posse for delivering the ballot boxes to the county clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo on election night.

In the days after the election, the clerk's staff twice compared the numbers with the actual voting machine tapes from each precinct, Maddox said. "So if you see any changes in the election numbers that is where they came from," Maddox added.

"There can be human error." County commissioner Rick Simpson asked if the staff had checked and rechecked all the numbers until they were satisfied the numbers were correct.

"I believe these are very good numbers," Maddox said. "And the Secretary of State will do another audit (of the votes before the election results become official)."

Oscuro resident Jerry Carroll asked if there was any evidence of voter fraud, such as attempts to use false IDs, in the election. Maddox said she did not recall any blatant attempts at fraud.

Carroll asked if there were any challenges for the voters' IDs. Maddox said poll workers did ask those voters required to do so for their IDs and she did not recall any problems or incidents with this.

Maddox said 63 percent of the eligible voters in Lincoln County cast ballots in the general election. Of those 3,330 voted early; 1,548 returned absentee ballots; 4,250 voted on election day on November 2.

There were 52 provisional ballots with 21 of those qualifying and 31 rejected. Maddox said mostly people who voted on the provisional ballots were outside the precinct in which they are registered to vote. (Editor's note, under new rules these type of voters must be allowed to vote on the paper provisional ballots at the polls where they present themselves, even though their names do not appear on the register roster in that poll.

All provisional ballots are checked for eligibility after the election before their votes are added.)

The main reason the provisional ballots were rejected was the persons casting the

ballots were not registered to vote or they registered after the books were closed. One ballot was from someone who lives in Rio Rancho who presented himself to vote in Lincoln County. "He voted provisional ballot but we have no mechanism to forward these type ballots to other counties," Maddox said.

Before county commissioners gave approval to the canvass, Maddox had one last task of them—to decide if an overseas ballot should be counted. Maddox said the federal ballot, which allows the person who is overseas to vote only for president and congressional candidates, involved a husband and wife. In the early days of the absentee voting, the husband and wife requested federal absentee ballots from the clerk's office.

However, that was before the issue of allowing Nadar for president on the ballot was resolved, Maddox said. Trying to make sure the overseas voters would get the ballot, the clerk's office sent a "non-Nadar" ballot. The next day the Secretary of State advised that Nadar was certified to be on the ballot, so the clerk's office sent another federal absentee ballot with Nadar's name for president to the wife, Maddox added.

The wife got both ballots, Maddox said. Then the husband wrote Maddox a letter and said he had not received an absentee ballot even though he had requested one. So he used his wife's first ballot.

Simpson said he would accept the husband's ballot if each had a chance to vote only once. County commissioner Earl Hobbs simply said to count the ballot and he made the motion to accept the ballot. Simpson seconded the motion and Hobbs, Simpson and county commission chair Rex Wilson voted in favor of accepting the ballot. County commissioners Leo Martinez and Maury St. John were absent.

Hobbs asked Maddox if the Secretary of State office gave her any guidance on how to deal with the federal ballot situation. Maddox said she did not consult the Secretary of State because she believed it was a decision for the county commission. County manager Tom Stewart said county attorney Alan Morel looked at the ballot and said to hold it until it was decided if the individual voted elsewhere and if not to count it.

So advised, Wilson read the special federal ballot, with votes cast in favor of John Edwards and John Kerry for president and vice president and Gary King for Congressional district 2. The numbers were added to the final tally, giving Kerry 2,833 votes and King 2,324 votes. The votes did not change the outcome of the election with George Bush and Dick Cheney for president and vice-president receiving 6,079 votes in Lincoln County and Steve Pearce for Congressional District 2 receiving 6,445 votes.

Simpson commended the clerk's staff for a job well done. "It's gotten where we expect that (well-done job) to happen," Simpson added.

Wilson also commended the staff, especially since there was so much election night anxiety, and attention and focus from the major parties.

With that Simpson made the motion to certify the canvass of the November 2 general election vote, including the one added federal ballot vote. Hobbs seconded the motion, all voted in favor.

County commissioners conducted no other business at the special 20 minute long meeting.

REA Claims Purchase Price Set With City

W.L. Wingfield, Cloudcroft, REA manager, said this week the city of Carrizozo and REA have been in agreement on the purchase price of the local power plant for more than a year.

Wingfield stated he and P.B. Hendricks, Cloudcroft, former manager for REA, had appeared before Carrizozo City Council sometime ago and that the council and REA were in agreement upon the price, but the sale is held up pending settlement of several legal questions. He added Carrizozo's power will come from a main line at Tularosa.

Wingfield also told The News-Outlook work was started this week on lines serving Alto, Angus, Bonita, Nogal and ranches in the area. He explained the lines are for distribution only and are not transmission lines. The lines will come to within six miles of Carrizozo, according to Wingfield, and about 40 men are needed for the work. He said seven of the crew have arrived at Capitan and that local men will be used wherever possible.

The work started at Hollywood. J.D. Neece is in charge of the crew of workers. Wingfield added they have experienced difficulty in locating housing in Capitan for their crew.

Wingfield stated he felt confident Capitan's power troubles have been eliminated by the repairs which REA has made on the Hondo Valley line. He pointed out Capitan electric rates under REA are approximately half those now current in Carrizozo.

Carrizozo's mayor, Vernon Petty told The News-Outlook REA men had talked with the city officials sometime ago and various surveys were made, but the city has not as yet received an offer from REA to buy the plant, and no purchase price has been quoted.

Petty said the city had informed the REA by letter, after the initial verbal discussions, they were willing to consider any offer the REA might care to make. The mayor added the REA attorney had consulted with the bondholders, but no offer was made to the city officials.

Petty stated Carrizozo residents can be assured if and when REA makes an offer, it will be brought to their attention, and the city's offer to REA for proposal of negotiations is still open.

Two Escape Injury In Train-Track Car Crash

Jack Turner, Carrizozo, signal maintainer for the Southern Pacific Railroad, narrowly escaped death or serious injury last Tuesday in the collision of his track motor car and train 39. The collision occurred about 2:50 p.m. at Robsart, six miles east of Carrizozo.

No. 39, a doubleheader westbound passenger train, was traveling about 60 miles per hour on the main track when it struck the track motor car. Turner was in charge of the car and had a helper with him.

They had been painting signals until their spray gun got out of order.

Engrossed in the repair of the gun, they failed to notice the approach of the train until too late to remove the motor car from the main track. The men escaped by jumping but the motor car was demolished.

No damage was done to the train, although the engine presented a somewhat unusual appearance as a result of being sprayed with the paint Turner and his helper had been using.

Postmaster Knows The Consequences

Some citizens of Truth or Consequences were up in arms this week over refusal of the U.S. Post Office Department to recognize the town's new name.

According to Vincent Burke, deputy assistant postmaster general, the town will continue as Hot Springs.

The town voted March 31 to change the name to Truth or Consequences in honor of the tenth anniversary broadcast in the health resort on April 1.

Burke wrote Robert R. Smith, president of the chamber of commerce in T. or C., that it was "inadvisable" to use a three word form on a cancellation and that it also was "inadvisable" from a service standpoint.

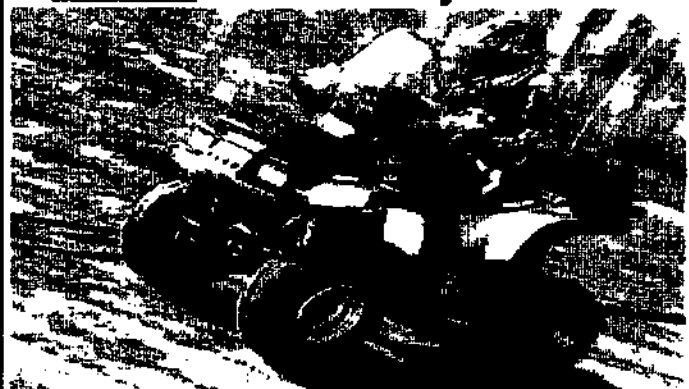

County FCEs Join Extension Association

The Lincoln County Family & Community Education (FCE) clubs have returned to a former name--Extension.

According to information provided by Lincoln County Home Economist Marsha Palmer with the Lincoln County Cooperative Extension Service, the organization once known as Extension Homemakers and more recently FCE, has a new identity. No longer affiliated with the national FCE organization, the Lincoln County groups are now associated with the Extension Association of New Mexico.

Lincoln County branch of the Extension Association of New Mexico (EA/NM) is an all-volunteer organization affiliated with the state EA/NM. The goal of the association is to strengthen individuals and families through education, leadership and action.

The name change came about at the annual state FCE meeting in Angel Fire this summer. There FCE organization delegates from groups statewide voted unanimously to disassociate from the national FCE and reorganize as

a state Extension Association.

"The reasons were many, varied and quite valid," Palmer stated. "The prime motivation was a National Association FCE proposed bylaws change that stated 'in the event of the dissolution of an affiliate, the assets owned by the affiliate shall be transferred to National Association of Family Community Education (FCE)'"

Upon recommendation of the NMFCE board at the state annual meeting, the temporary name of "Extension Association of New Mexico" was voted on and passed by delegates. The name will be used at club, county and state levels. Plans were to continue with a state organization. However, the FCE name will no longer be used for any reason.

Any FCE member who wishes to remain a member of the National FCE may do so as a "member at large."

The change from FCE to the EA/NM means that member dues are considerably less, local Extension Associations have control of their

own money and the state EA/NM has control of its state programs.

Annual dues to the EA/NM provide leadership training opportunities for all members, program materials, public service announcements and newsletters.

Child Welfare To Be Considered First: Welck

Too many high school teachers are more concerned with academic subject matter than they are with the welfare of their students, according to Dr. A.A. Welck, head of testing and counseling at the University of New Mexico.

By student welfare, Dr. Welck takes in every aspect of the development of the high school pupil: his intellect, emotions, physical being, moral values, skills and aptitudes, recreations, esthetic values, religious concepts, social adjustments, and his environment situation.

Basing his lecture on the hope that counseling will soon become an integral part of professional training for all high school teachers, Dr. Welck outlined before the delegates to the south-central district of the NMEA meeting in Ruidoso last Friday, 14 aims in dealing with all types of students.

Among the principal goals were: making the student feel at home in his school environment, create satisfactory living conditions in home and school, assist students in wise selection of studies, help students achieve a sense of being accepted by suitable groups, develop good mental and physical habits.

Aid in developing acceptable and effective ways of expressing emotions, develop lively and significant interests, learn value of time and money and wise use of each, urge progressively more mature vocational interests and plans, bring out individually and a sense of social responsibility.

Foster sense of values, encourage flexibility and consideration for others, teach youngsters socially acceptable adjustments in dealing with opposite sex, and create a feeling of responsibility in assuming obligations as a citizens of the community.

The tree planting at the new park has started. Hopefully the others will come in and be planted this week. There will be a total of 18 trees of different varieties - all drought resistance.

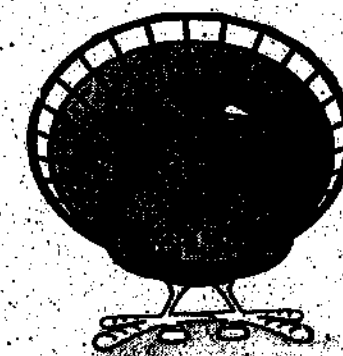
The Creative Memories group held their retreat at Ft. Lone Tree over the week-end with 16 in attendance.

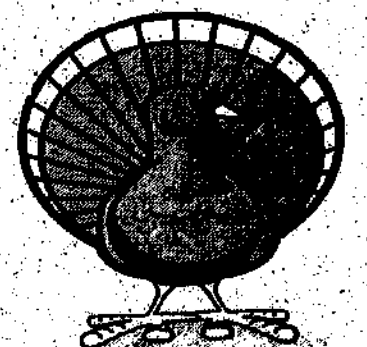

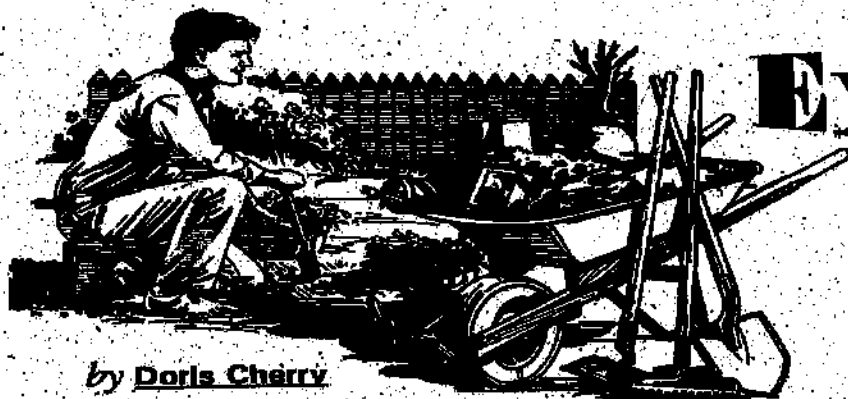

to string an extension cord and put up the twinkly lights in the tomato house. As a result, about five pounds of beautiful large green tomatoes half froze, making them unusable to store for slow ripening or for making green tomato chow chow.

Had this gardener not been so preoccupied with the November 2 election, this gardener would have pulled all the tomato plants and either hung up the entire plant for the fruit to ripen slowly, or would have picked the fruit and wrapped it to store in a box in a dark place.

This gardener did pick much of the green fruits the weekend prior to November 1 and thus saved some of the late season tomatoes. The advice from this gardener to those who maybe saved their tomato plants in a cloche or tomato house with twinkly lights is to go ahead and pull the plants now. As November progresses, the nights can dip into the 20s unpredictably, even though our nights have been very mild for this time of year.

What a year for gardeners. Because of the spring drought and very late summer rains, including a demolishing hail storm on August 11, the extreme garden was very late in producing fruit and vegetables.

Even within the protected tomato cloche, everything was late. However, the tomato cloche did protect the plants through the first frost in mid October and some cool nights through the month.

Lettuce was one of the better crops, and is still growing. However, the leaf looper caterpillars (inch worms) found the lettuce, even under protective cloth and enjoyed their share of the tender leaves. The heavy rains of September and early October also caused the lettuce to have "rust" which is a wilting on the leaf edges.

It's doubtful that there are more than an handful of people outside Washington who know the full facts about the spending program being persistently pressed on Congress by the executive department. To get the facts and correlate them would require a considerable staff of specialists. And to present the findings in an objective manner, justifying public acceptance, would require nonpartisan handling. Fortunately, such a study has been made and such an objective report has been presented -- by the staff of the Senate's own committee on executive department expenditures.

Shocking Facts

The facts revealed are enough to shock every free and independent person in the country. If the Congress should enact the 15 new major spending programs being urged by the President, the aggregate annual cost within the next five years would exceed \$25 billion. The committee staff added this figure to the requested regular budget of \$40-plus billion and got \$65-plus billion, or about 30 per cent of the earnings of all people in the USA.

The People Must Pay

A report on the committee's findings was made to the Senate by Committee Chairman John L. McClelland (D. Ark.). The committee's study of the new program costs and the present budget showed, he said, that to support such expenditures on a pay-as-you-go basis will impose a tax burden of \$433 annually for every man, woman and child in America. This added to the amount of taxes already levied for state, county and municipal governments will make the annual tax obligation of the American people more than 40 cents out of every dollar they earn.

Some of the costliest new items being urged are: national health insurance, social security expansion, housing and public works, the Brannan farm program, aid to education. The total new \$25 billion is recommended in spite of the fact that the executive department is already deficit spending to the tune of \$5 or \$6 billion a year, and the national debt has climbed beyond the quarter trillion dollar mark (\$256 billion).

No Aladdin's Lamp Available

Certainly there can be no question about the fact that too much government spending, at all levels of government, is based on a prime consideration of political expediency. To heap new spending programs on top of the present staggering federal budget is outrageously unsound. Though there isn't any Aladdin's Lamp, if the public actually becomes awakened to the seriousness of this they will put a stop to it.

Extreme Gardening

Swiss Chard that came up volunteer is thriving even with the cold nights. Given plenty of mulch around its roots, Swiss Chard can survive into the snowy months and if mild enough, through to spring. Often Swiss Chard is the first green vegetables growing in the spring.

For those with a green house, whether stand alone or attach to your home, lettuce is a good inside winter plant. A plastic box about six to eight inches deep will work for a lettuce box. Poke three holes in the bottom, put a thin layer of gravel, then fill it with good potting soil (not the kind with mixed-in fertilizer as this is only for ornamentals). Water until the soil is dampened, then sprinkle the tiny lettuce seeds. Sprinkle over these seeds a very thin layer of dirt with no sticks or large stuff.

Set the lettuce box in a sunny spot in the greenhouse, or in a very sunny window inside the home. Lettuce will sprout very soon if the soil is kept moist with a spray bottle.

Once the lettuce sprouts and has two sets of leaves, begin to thin it slightly. Keep the soil damp but not soggy.

Let the lettuce plants get a little bigger before you thin them again, then you can have some of the tender leaves in a salad. As the plants get bigger make sure each has enough room to spread out, as this will prevent disease and makes it easier to watch and pick off bugs. You can pick the lettuce leaf by leaf, or pull the whole plant if the box needs thinning.

The warm days of November are a good time to clean up the garden. Start by pulling and removing to an

outside compost pile the frozen tomato plants. Compost these with some good manure if you have it or kitchen scraps and other flower bed and/or garden clean up plant debris. Water the compost.

Frozen bean, corn or squash plant debris can be composted right into the garden beds where they grew. Or the debris can be moved to a separate compost, even with the tomato debris.

If you turn your garden beds this fall, once turned, mulch the soil with manure and/or mulch. This mulch can be pine needles, leaves (oak leaves are very good), grass clippings or even newspaper. By mulching the soil stays moist. If the soil is left bare to the elements, the wind especially will dry it out and turn it very hard. With mulch, the soil will retain the winter moisture and will be much more productive the next spring.

Another reason to clean up around the garden before the snow falls is to prevent insects and disease next year. Insects burrow into debris and lay eggs; disease can survive on plant materials even through the cold. Leave those strange egg pods that are light brown in color that are attached to the underneath of things, as these are most likely the eggs of the praying mantis, a very beneficial bug in the garden.

With the gardening season at an end this is also time to evaluate which methods worked in the garden and which did not. One big disappointment for this gardener is the remay cloth for the cloches. The remay this gardener used was good for only one season. Trying to use the material for another season proved useless as the August 11

hailstorm tore big holes and left shreds and the sunlight caused the material to be extremely fragile.

The old bed sheets turned out to be the most durable of cloche materials and served almost the same function as the remay, although rain did not penetrate the tight weave as easily as with the remay. Also old bed sheets are much cheaper than the remay. This gardener will reconsider the material to be used on the cloches in the 2005 growing season.

As true winter gets here, and the days are too short and too cold to be in the garden, that is the time to take out the seed catalogues. If you do not receive such catalogues in the mail, there are many outlets over the internet. Go to your favorite search engine and type in "seed companies" and take your pick.

When ordering seeds through the mail consider where the company is located. And make sure your seeds will produce in our growing zone. Traditionally Lincoln County is in zone 6, but consult your seed company catalogue for its zones. All plant seed packages, and catalogues list what zones their seeds will grow in.

Next month, Extreme Garden will give some tips on holiday gifts for gardeners. So until then, get out there and save your tomatoes, clean up the frozen debris and go on the hunt for those hanging on grasshoppers, and other insects that would love to winter over in your garden.
