

# Public Hearing June 29 On Yard Waste Fees

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) is holding a special public hearing at 2 p.m. Tuesday, June 29 on a proposed rate increase for yard waste.

The hearing will be held at the LCSWA offices in Ruidoso Downs and the public is invited to attend and give input.

During the LCSWA meeting Tuesday, June 22, LCSWA board members ap-

proved the hearing on the increase of monthly rates from the current \$3 an acre for up to three acres, to \$5 an acre for up to three acres and \$1 an acre for an additional acreage. The additional monthly fees for yard waste service is only for property owners who have signed agreements with LCSWA to participate in the LCSWA yard waste program.

LCSWA operational supervisor Debra Ingle said the

rate increase is needed because of several factors - the success of the forest and yard waste program; people are not complying with the rules on how forest waste must be cut and stacked in order for the truck to pick it up; LCSWA is having to pick up forest and yard waste left along county roads in areas where property owners opted not to participate in the program; and the increased price of fuel.


LCSWA has purchased a new grapple truck to help deal with the forest waste, but the new truck will not be delivered until fall. Ingle reported. The rate increase also will help pay for the truck, Ingle added.

County representative on LCSWA Leo Martinez said he did not like the paying customers to have to pay to take care of those who chose not to participate in the program. "Those who aren't pay-

ing seem to be squawking the most," Martinez added. Ingle said even those who are participating in the program landed LCSWA with a tremendous amount of waste, more than LCSWA thought.

She said in some cases, people are clearing lots. Also some people are clearing lots that are not in the participating areas, then they expect LCSWA to pick up all the waste, or they place it along

## County Mobile Home Ordinance Public Hearings Set For July

In July the public will have a chance to comment on a proposed county ordinance that would require notification to the county assessor of all mobile homes brought into and set up in the county.

Lincoln County Commissioners at their June 15 meeting in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo unanimously approved setting a public hearing to consider a proposed mobile home ordinance.

County assessor Rick Silva in the past complained that mobile homes were coming into the county and were never reported for taxation purposes.

County attorney Alan Morel drafted a proposed ordinance presented to county commissioners on June 15 that would require mobile home owners and the electric companies to notify the assessor office when mobile homes were set up.

County commissioners earlier this year rejected on a narrow vote a proposed mobile home ordinance that would have required site plans and permits for all mobile homes moved within or into the county.

San Patricio resident Ken Nosker said the electric companies should not be burdened with reporting.

County commissioner Rick Simpson asked if the draft ordinance would allow penalties plus interest if a mobile home is discovered years after it was set up. Morel said the proposed ordinance would allow such if the county could prove the date the mobile home was set up. Simpson said such a provision would get the attention of mobile home owners, mobile home movers and com-

panies.

County commissioner Leo Martinez said there are problems all over the county with mobile homes and septic tanks in county rights of way. Morel said such situations usually end up in litigation because the cost to move a home and septic can often be in the thousands of dollars.

"We're real lax about mobile homes in this county," Martinez said. "We're trying not to make an invasion of privacy (with a mobile home ordinance) but we have to protect the neighbor's privacy with a minimal ordinance."

County commission chair Rex Wilson said there are laws already in effect giving the assessor taxing ability even for mobile homes. "No more laws (on mobile homes) are needed," Wilson said. "Not everyone is for that issue."

AS for mobile homes encroaching county rights of way, Wilson said the county "can't ordain everything out of possibility." He said he thought site built homes even have potential for problems.

Wilson said the assessor has a half-million dollar budget which should be enough funding to cover the costs of finding mobile homes without an extra ordinance.

Shammie Euband, member of the county planning commission, showed pictures of mobile homes that infringe on other "private property rights." She said the problems of clear cutting trees, erosion, water retention and

### Carrizozo Will Go To A New Trash System After July 4th

Carrizozo residential trash poly carts will go to a new system of collection soon after the July 4 holiday.

Under the new Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) system, residents will put out their poly carts with the front of the carts facing the curb and the


handles facing their houses on the day assigned for pick up. All trash inside the carts must be bagged, and nothing should be placed next to the carts.

The new system will be automated and the LCSWA truck driver will not stop to pick up any trash sitting beside the poly cart. If any trash is placed next to the cart, and the automated pick up cannot lift the cart, trash for that location will not be emptied.

Carrizozo representative to the LCSWA Ray Dean, at the LCSWA meeting Tuesday, June 22 in the LCSWA offices in Ruidoso Downs, said the new automated poly cart system will be used to help keep solid waste rates for Carrizozo residential customers of LCSWA from going up.

Dean said it would be fun to have a contest on whose street can be picked up the fastest in Carrizozo when the new system is started. The new truck is expected to be delivered to LCSWA the week after the July 4 holiday, with residential collections to begin soon after delivery. No plans for a contest were


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### REMEMBERING THOSE WHO HAVE PASSED.

# Andy Willingham Wins Super Stock Main Event

For the third week in a row, a Lincoln County driver dominated the Super Stock race at Sertoma Speedway on Friday, June 18 when Capitan's Andy Willingham took the checkered flag, but not before a tight race that often saw four cars abreast.

Jeff Tanner blew his third motor in as many weeks on the opening lap, and expressed his displeasure in the middle of the infield, then Will Sewell took the lead briefly before Willingham saw a chance.

"The hole opened and I just went for it," he said. "There was a little bit of banging and stuff going on as we got through the hole, but once we got through the hole we settled down on the bottom of the track and just kept it there for the rest of the night."

For much of the way, Alamogordo's Danny Efrid was sandwiched between Willingham and Ruidoso's Grant Dean, with the three just inches apart.

But on the 14th lap, Efrid knocked a tire marking the infield boundary onto the track, and was penalized one spot. Efrid later protested the ruling, but he finished in third behind the Lincoln County drivers.

Willingham said the race was nip and tuck all the way. "When the track's kind of dry-slick like that, it makes everybody equal. Everybody's equal. The cars are equal so you've just got to hold your line and try to keep anybody from coming under you down on the bottom of you."

And he's proud of how his county's drivers are doing. "It makes us feel good. We've been running hard. Trying to keep the cars together."

Alamogordo Legends driver Don Reynolds made it two main wins in a row at Sertoma Friday, but his wire-to-wire win was marred by two close calls by his wife, Bernadette. After stalling on lap 12 and forcing a yellow, Bernadette was involved in a three-car crash right in front of the stands on the final lap.

Lamar Skarda slipped on the track and spun around, and in an effort to avoid him, Carrizozo's Ryan Gaines and Bernadette both hit the wall. Reynolds saw the pileup as he came around for his vic-

tory lap.

Although Reynolds led fairly easily most of the way, Ruidoso's Don St. John and Skarda chased the Alamogordo driver through 16 of the 18 laps, but then were knocked out, he said. Seeing his wife tangled on the track did affect his concentration.

"I don't care how safe these cars are, you still worry about other people in them. You do. Especially your loved ones," he said.

But once he knew Bernadette was fine, Reynolds was happy to take the win. "The track was a little slick, but it was fun," he said.

"Hobby Stock driver Kevin George should be cursing the racing gods. After leading for 18 laps in the main, at some points by as much as a half lap, the Alamogordo driver flatted with two laps to go and was forced into the pits.

That opened the way for Tularosa's Lee Gilpin, who, despite battling Levi Roberts, Sharon Loveland and Ryan Dubois for most of the way, held on to take the checkered flag.

The win was the first this season for the 59-year-old Gilpin - who said he was determined to get a win before he turned 60 and had come back to racing after a 29-year absence. But since he finances the car himself - "I'm the man. I'm a one-man band," he said - the race winnings will come in handy. "I can buy new plugs and new oil and a tire and that's it," he said. And if George hadn't broken down, well, that would have been OK too.

But on the eighth lap, with Dubois and Josslyn side by side, it appeared that Josslyn tapped Dubois, sending him into the infield and last place. No yellow came out and officials let the race continue, but many thought Josslyn should have been penalized and sent to the back of the pack.

He didn't disagree. "I did bump him, but he should have stopped, for one. I went up and apologized to him and he didn't know I touched him. That's how close it was. But I did bump him. Yeah, I did bump him. I threw my hands up because I was ready to go to the back, yeah. But he didn't stop. That's where he messed up. He should have stopped. If he had stopped, we would have got a judgment call. I don't know how they saw it. But he didn't know I touched him, that's how close it was." Josslyn said he told Dubois to chalk the mistake up to experience. "I've been there before. I would have gone to the back if the yellow had come out. And I told him, I says, 'Next time, stop, and make them make a call. Even if you thought you spun out because you don't have nothing to lose.'"

And when he realized the yellow hadn't come out, Josslyn accepted his good luck. "When I went around turn 2 and saw the green light still on and I looked over and saw him going, I said, 'Go. Because the yellow isn't coming on.'" Josslyn never trailed the rest of the way.

The Renegade Sprints also had what seemed like a sure winner until late in the race. Las Cruces driver Mike Archuleta led most of the way, with only John Carney of El Paso giving him much competition.

Carney was happy to take the win, and also happy to be racing at Sertoma. "It's a blast here," he said. "I wish more cars would come up here. A lot of them guys are kind of discouraged because of previous track conditions, but as far as I'm concerned, it's like this every time, everybody should come up here."

Expect it to be hot while watching the parade or at the rodeo arena. Wear hats or use an umbrella. And don't forget to drink fluids while out in the hot summer sun.



**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** -- The X Prize will have a winner this summer, says Dr. Peter Diamandis, CEO of the St. Louis-based X Prize Foundation that recently awarded the X Prize competition to New Mexico.

The inaugural X Prize competition will award \$10 million to the first team to privately finance, build and launch a spaceship capable of carrying three passengers 62.5 miles into space and back, then repeat the feat within two weeks.

That's pretty good, considering NASA can't get anywhere close to that turnaround time after 40 years in the business. So why should we expect a bunch of under-funded amateurs to do any better? Well, the Wright Brothers, Henry Ford and Charles Lindbergh didn't work for the government either.

A number of individuals and small companies throughout the world say they are on the edge of accomplishing the feat. In this first year, the X Prize Foundation will allow launching from anywhere in the world at any time between now and January. Next year, the foundation is planning an exhibition that likely will be held at White Sands Missile Range.

By 2006, an annual competition will be started at the missile range or at the Southwest Regional Spaceport to be built at Uplham, an undeveloped area 45 miles north of Las Cruces that is on the edge of the missile range. The long-term goal is to hold the competition at the proposed spaceport.

That annual competition is what New Mexico won. Prizes will be awarded in a number of categories, such as most people carried into space, most weight, highest altitude and quickest turnaround. Sponsors already have been signed for some events.

The X Prize folks are enthusiastic about the possibility of a private spaceport hosting their private sector competition. But they don't seem as sure it is going to happen as some of us New Mexicans do. The people in Las Cruces and the surrounding area have been on that project for over 10 years.

The site is on state trust land that was used as a base camp by the Ova Noss Family Partnership during its search for the fabled gold beneath Victorio Peak, which lies a few miles beyond the fence on the missile range.

This year, Gov. Bill Richardson and the Legislature appropriated \$9 million in capital outlay funds to develop the spaceport and host the X Prize Cup. Approximately half will be used to build launch and landing facilities for the competition and the rest will go toward constructing the spaceport and covering various operational X Prize Cup expenses.



The governor and Legislature could move right into construction plans because time-consuming technicalities such as site selection, environmental impact statements and coordination with the missile range and neighboring ranchers already had been completed.

Since the early '90s, many states have been interested in building a spaceport. When an appeared NASA was interested in developing a reusable space vehicle that didn't require an expendable rocket to get it into orbit and didn't land like a brick, the competition got fierce. But then other priorities nudged that NASA mission aside.

But New Mexico got ready during that period. It also was encouraged by private space ventures that promised if we would build it, they would come. When the X Prize came along, New Mexico, California, Florida and Oklahoma were at the point they could compete.

We won, and it may help launch the southern New Mexico economy as well as spaceships. The X Prize founders suggest the competition could bring \$80 million into the local economy. And there still are commercial companies that want to privately lunch satellites.

Governor Richardson calls this "the NASCAR of space races". However, X Prize representatives quickly correct him, contending it is the CHAMP CAR of space races. It seems CHAMP CAR is one of their early sponsors.

This parent has NOT received a letter to date, nor have any others with whom I've spoken. We were also told that this decision was made because Coach Holland has an established relationship with our children. Mr. Castanon will be acting as superintendent/principal. The other personnel changes are the hiring of two new coaches.

The superintendent assured the community that there were no monies available to retain one of the best, or should I say, the best math teacher we have had in years, but we are hiring two new coaches. The superintendent adamantly denies releasing Ms. Kobelnik for budget constraints or any other reason for that matter, because he cannot discuss personnel issues. We know that Ms. Kobelnik received an excellent evaluation and was recommended by Mr. Barron for rehire. We also know that the superintendent on more than one occasion has stated that he would be releasing one teacher due to budget constraints which he denies. He assures us that there are to be no changes in the budget, thus we are still not sure why we lost another valued employee at our school, but we are hiring two more.

On the same note, the superintendent gave the school board the results of the Terra Nova tests. In math and in science, Carrizozo schools scored within the 20 percentile nationally. (That means the bottom 20%). Superintendent Castanon attributed this failure in math and science to the fact that Carrizozo schools concentrated on reading and the students did not get enough rest the night before. But, Mr. Castanon decided, against strong parental opposition, to fire

## World War Turned U.S. Into Saboteur's Utopia; Will It Happen Again?

New York -- There are many good arguments for repeal of the embargo against arms shipment to belligerents in the European war. Maybe this is an argument to retain the embargo:

Should the United States try selling munitions abroad as in the World war, would another plague of terrorism raise havoc with our industrial production?

Searching newspaper files from the 1914-16 period, history students find that America's attempt to aid Great Britain and France in their last war brought a rash of general sabotage, the responsibility for which was usually placed on the Central Powers' doorstep.

Reads Like Fiction.

In the 33 months while America tried with one hand to remain neutral and with the other to help her European friends, there were scores of munition plant explosions, attempts were made to dynamite trains and bridges, spy plots were uncovered almost daily (often snaring folks in high places), assassinations were attempted and at least one effort was made to get the United States involved in a war with Mexico. Dumba Sent Home.

Many of the plots were strange as fiction and were traced to the highest diplomatic representatives of Austria and Germany. On August 30, 1915, a sensation was created by seizure and publication of an official letter from Constantin Dumba, ambassador from Austria-Hungary. The letter disclosed he planned "to disorganize and hold up for months, if not entirely prevent, manufacture of munitions in Bethlehem, Pa., and the Middle West, which, in opinion of the Germans attache, is of great importance and amply outweighs expenditure of money involved."

A few days later Ambassador Dumba was recalled and the government began investigating the unnamed "German attache." In December, Germany as asked to recall Capt. Franz von Papen (now a high Nazi and ambassador to Russia) and Captain Boy-Ed, for "improper activities in military and naval matters."

Within a few months some interesting data was collected concerning Captain von Papen. The government seized papers of Wolf von Engel, former secretary to von Papen in a New York "advertising office". Later the state department said these papers disclosed maintenance of a spy system and the financing of a spy system to stir up labor troubles in munitions plants, "the bomb industry and other related activities." Propaganda and subornation of American writers and lecturers was also financed by the "agency," it was alleged.

## Pool Safety

Supervision is the key word when it comes to pool safety, but supervision combined with a variety of barriers and safety devices -- fences, latched gates, locked doors, pool covers and more -- goes even further toward drowning prevention.

### Drowning Prevention Tips

- \* Never leave a child unattended in the water or pool area for any reason. Don't be distracted by doorbells, phone calls, chores or conversations. If you must leave the pool area, take the child with you, making sure the pool gate latches securely when it closes.
- \* Always keep your eyes on the child or children. Designate a child watcher, whether you or someone else, when you attend a party or have friends or family over.
- \* Talk with baby-sitters about pool safety, supervision and drowning prevention.
- \* Post rules such as "No running," "No pushing," "No dunking" and "Never swim alone." Enforce the rules.
- \* Don't rely on swimming lessons or "floaties" to protect your children in the water.
- \* Don't assume that drowning or a drowning incident couldn't happen to you or your family.
- \* Don't have a false sense of security just because you think your pool area and home are secure. Always watch your children, whether in the house or outside.
- \* Attend a CPR class. Make sure your baby-sitter knows CPR.
- \* For the nearest cardiopulmonary resuscitation class, contact your fire department, Red Cross or hospital.
- \* Encourage your neighbors to follow pool safety guidelines, including keeping their back gates and doors locked, and their pool gates securely closed and latched.



**Manager's Report**

Lincoln County manager Tom Stewart gave the following report to the Lincoln County Commissioners at their regular meeting Tuesday, June 15 in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

**IRS Compliance Check**  
On May 20, Lincoln County administration received an "employment tax compliance check" from the Internal Revenue Service (IRS). The check focused on a myriad of filing documents. A weakness detected by the inspector was the issuance of Form 1099s. County manager's staff is taking actions to remedy the finding for the past years of 2001 and 2002. Clarification of the issuance of these documents which have to do with individual receipts is as follows: if only a product is received, there is no need to issue any tax related documents; if services and product are received, a Form 1099 is to be issued; if

services only are received, a W-2 form should be issued. "We await further action by the IRS," Stewart concluded.

**Budget and Infrastructure Capital Improvements Plan (ICIP)**  
**Submission and Assessor Audit Request**

The 2004-2005 budget and ICIP for the county were forwarded to the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) by May 24, on time. In a phone conversation coordinating the submission, the county's budget analyst (at DFA) stated to Stewart that the county's budget would be "held up" because the county assessor was unhappy with actions taken on the appraisal fund. "Accordingly, I wrote a letter requesting specifics for holding up our budget in writing," Stewart said.

In addition the county assessor is requesting a 15 year audit of the county's reap-

praisal fund. In the letter from Stewart to David Ruiz at DFA, Stewart told of how he was verbally advised by a Susan Rodriguez in the DFA that she had been instructed to hold up approval of the Lincoln County pre-

## Recall 'Black Tom' Case.

In 1917, while pro-war sentiment was mounting swiftly in the face of repeated bombings, two west coast German consulate officials were convicted of conspiring to injure American shipping, railroad trains, bridges and munitions.

That same year, on January 12, occurred two history-making explosions. At Kingsland, J.J., a munitions plant of the Canadian Car & Foundry company was destroyed at a loss of \$16,000,000. Nearby, at Haskell, N.M., an explosion of 400,000 pounds of powder in a duPont plant was felt in four states.

The Kingsland explosion and destruction of ammunition trains at Black Tom, N.J., on July 30, 1916, are still in the news. The latter sabotage killed four men and resulted in a loss of \$45,000,000. Only this year a special United States tribunal placed responsibility for these explosions on Germany's shoulders and demanded payment.

## Mexican Aid Sought.

In February, 1917, the United States published a note from German Foreign Secretary Zimmermann proposing a German-Mexican alliance for which Mexico would be paid by annexation of southwestern American states. It was later revealed that many German spies headquartered in Mexico and that both the Black Tom and Kingsland explosions may have been plotted there.

The year 1915 was a banner one for the saboteurs. Explosions were almost a daily event. At least 21 were recorded during the year. In a period of three months the duPont plant at Carnegy's Point, N.J., suffered three explosions which destroyed a mixing house, still house and two other buildings.

To a lot of people that advertisement is lost in the traffic. But experience has taught me that this same advertisement will seek out for me enough people to whom the merchandise is highly important to make it pay."

liminary budget, because "our county Assessor is unhappy with several decisions made by the Board of County Commissioners." "Per our previous discussions and your instructions to me, the reappraisal fund is being used totally in the assessor's office for reappraisal activities in strict accordance with all provisions of (state statutes)."

Stewart goes on to write that the assessor has yet to gain approval of his property valuation program as required by state law. "Should a decision be made to hold up our budget due to our Assessor's dissatisfaction for the lack of a \$4,000 uniform allowance; a questionable lobbying trip by the Assessor to Washington D.C.; and across the board elected official pay increase; a 5 percent COLA for the assessor's employees; and certification incentive pay for the assessor and his deputy? I request you do so in writing with specific reasons for such action." Stewart wrote.

County commissioner Maury St. John asked if DFA can hold up the county's budget. Stewart said only Ruiz, the director of Local Government Division in DFA can hold up the budget. "I have discussed this situation with Mr. Ruiz," Stewart answered. But Stewart had not yet received any written responses.

"Does our Assessor have that power (to hold up the budget)?" St. John asked. "The Assessor doesn't," Stewart answered. "But the state Property Tax Division does."

## 9-1-1 Data Correction Assistance

Valor phone company officials will be meeting with staff at the courthouse on June 24 to define the progress and anticipated actions in solving the county's 9-1-1 data base management problem.

## USGS Hydrologic Study

The results of the county-USGS cooperatively funded study of water resources in the Rio Ruidoso and Rio Bonito basins are being finalized and will be reported to the Board of County Commissioners in the month of August. The study agreement ran from October 1, 2001 to June 30, 2004. The county contributed \$130,000 to the project and USGS contributed \$110,000.

## Regional Water Plan Meeting

County commissioner Earl Hobbs and county planning officer Patsy Sanchez, among several other county residents, attended the second regional water meeting hosted by the South Central Mountain RC&D in Carlsbad on June 7.

## CDBG Monitoring Visit on June 8

In accordance to a letter from the DFA Local Government Division, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program manager Gerald Garcia made a site visit to the county's Public Health Facility in Ruidoso. The visit was to monitor for compliance the county's financial management, citizen participation, environmental review record, fair housing and equal employment opportunity, labor standards, eligibility and national objective and general program administration. "There were

no significant findings," Stewart said.

## Peppin Fire

At last report (as of June 15) the Peppin Fire in the Capitan Mountains had burned more than 50,000 acres and was 80 percent contained. Estimated cost to fight the fire as of June 15 was \$5,418,000. "We may be asked to help in moving barricades to protect property from floods," Stewart said.

Buck Sanchez, ranger for the Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest which includes the Capitan Mountains, gave an update on the fire. He told of mistakes and miscommunications in the transition of different type teams when the fire whipped by winds, expanded into the Pine Lodge area destroying 12 cabins.

For now all of the Capitan Mountains are closed to the general public. "Until we see how the monsoons affect flooding," Sanchez added.

Sanchez said of the acreage burned, only 20 percent was destroyed, and 80 percent of the area was "clean up." He said the upper and lower water sheds are basically intact.

# Lincoln National Forest Increases Fire Restrictions

The Lincoln National Forest (LNF) implemented Stage II fire restrictions on Friday, June 18.

Stage II restrictions include prohibition of campfires, charcoal, coal, wood stoves, citronella candles, etc., anything that has a flame, (no campfires in developed

campgrounds or in dispersed recreation areas); smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle or building; possessing, discharging, or using any kind of firework or other pyrotechnic device; using an explosive; operating a chainsaw or other equipment powered by an internal combustion engine; welding, or operating acetylene or other torch with open flame; possess or use a motor vehicle off Forest System Roads, Federal or State highways, or county roads within the Lincoln National Forest, except when parking in an area devoid of vegetation within 10 feet of the roadway; and except for parking overnight in developed campgrounds and at trailheads.

The Stage I restrictions were effective June 2 and allowed limited fire use at developed camp and picnic grounds where grills are provided. This no longer applies. Pressurized liquid or gas stoves, lanterns and heaters meeting safety specifications are allowed. The restrictions apply to all National Forest lands on the Smokey Bear and Sacramento Ranger Districts. There are no restrictions on the Guadalupe Ranger District, Carlsbad.

"Forest personnel have been monitoring fire potential indicators and I have agreed that we should move to Stage II restrictions due to the continuing above normal temperatures and dry conditions the Lincoln is experiencing," said Lincoln National Forest Supervisor Jose Martinez.

Fire prevention and fire safety are at the top of our lists, and the public's cooperation will help keep our communities safe. The Villages of Ruidoso, Clouderoff and other surrounding mountain communities look forward to the public visiting during this time of the year. Camping, hiking, bike riding or enjoying a relaxing picnic within the local area or within the Lincoln National Forest can be a very enjoyable and memorable experience.

county roads and the county road department contacts LCSWA to remove the waste.

Carrizozo representative Ray Dean said the forested properties have decades of growth and debris accumulated and now that the fire danger is extreme people are scared and are cleaning their lots. "Someone has to pick up this debris or we'll have bigger problems," Dean said.

Dean said LCSWA needs an enforcement person for illegal dumping of yard/forest waste and construction waste. Ingle said illegal dumping of construction waste continues to be a major problem and LCSWA has someone in the field who investigates the illegal dumping. However he must contact the Sheriff's Office or a police department for a citation, because he is not certified to issue citations, Ingle said.

Martinez said the state police do not want to be "trash police" and there is a reluctance from the sheriff's office

also. Dean suggested LCSWA send a request in writing to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office asking that they provide an officer to issue citations for illegal dumping, so the office will have to make a written response to LCSWA's request.

Ingle said Village of Ruidoso is cooperating with LCSWA on illegal dumping and even helped with a major situation in Fawn Ridge which is in the county next to Ruidoso. She said LCSWA will move the Fawn Ridge dumpsters to a new location soon after the July 4 holiday.

The yard, forest waste pick up fees apply only to those property owners in areas that have made agreements with LCSWA to participate in the yard forest waste program.

Interested property owners (in the county) can call LCSWA at 378-4679 to see if they are in a participating area, or for more information about the proposed rate increase.
