# County Prepared To Fight For CSB

The New Mexico Juvenile Justice Service department plan to shut down the privately run juvenile program at Camp Sierra Blanca has local officials and residents pleading to the secretary of Children Youth and Families Department (CYFD) and the governor to keep the program going.

Camp Sierra Blanca supporters filled the Ruidoso Village Council meeting room on Tuesday, June 29 to

hear from CYFD Juvenile Justice Services director Art Murphy.

"We have 100 people here tonight on their knees asking you to keep Camp Sierra Blanca open." Ruidoso Councilor Ray Nunley said to Murphy.

"That means all of us in Lincoln County, not just Ruidoso," added Ruidoso Mayor Leon Eggleston. "If needed we will get a good group to go to Santa Fe and talk with the governor about CSB."

District Judge Karen Parsons, who is a member of the CSB board, said it is not common for judges to get involved with local situations but the judges' code of ethics does allow involvement when a subject impacts the judiciary.

"I applaud (CYFD) Secretary Mary Dale Bolson attempts to place juveniles out of institutions," Judge Parsons said. "But she is not considering that all the potential juvenile programs will not be enough to keep some of these juveniles in their communities."

### County Road Dept. To Be Closed For July 4 Holiday Weekend



## LCSWA Starts RFP For New Facility

A request for proposals is being sent out for engineering services for construction of a new Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) facility.

During the LCSWA meeting Tuesday, June 22 at the overcrowded LCSWA facility in Ruidoso Downs, the LCSWA board approved the request for proposals (rfp) be solicited for specification plans for the proposed facility. LCSWA members were shown conceptual plans for the new offices, recycling building, mechanics shop, and roll off containers on the LCSWA property located on Highway 70. The new office will be of metal construction with a stucco exterior to give it a southwestern pueblo look. All other buildings will be metal exterior.

Ingle said the LCSWA office building has expanded to allow for additional archival storage of billing and other information, and the building features a meeting room and restrooms that can be isolated from the rest of the

building. This will allow the use of the meeting room by non-LCSWA groups, she added.

Already cost estimates are higher than anticipated, Ingle added. She said she is reviewing the cost estimates.

County representative on LCSWA Leo Martinez asked that the specifications and design be simple enough so local contractors can bid on the project. Ingle said she has

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"So we will still have a set number of juveniles who will be served in institutional settings," the judge continued. "There is no question that Camp Sierra Blanca offers

the best possible placement for medium to low offenders."

"Springer (boys school for juvenile offenders) cannot be one size fits all," Judge Par-

sons added.

Nunley said he had requested the CSB closure be an item on the regular meeting agenda.

Eggleston, in a letter, had invited Sec. Bolson to attend the Tuesday meeting, however Murphy was sent to report on the CSB closure.

Nunley said the boys from CSB are an integral part of the county and have been in parades and in the churches. "We have grown to like what is going on out there at CSB," Nunley said. He admitted he had a personal interest in CSB because his daughter works there.

Murphy said American Marine Institute (AMI) which operates CSB has an excellent program with very skilled and trained staff. However, the Juvenile Jus-

tice Services is undergoing a change in philosophy to develop and place offending juveniles in community based programs. Because of this change in philosophy fewer juvenile offenders are being sent to the current juvenile facilities in the state, resulting in numerous empty beds, Murphy said.

"We understand how committed CSB is for the kids," Murphy said. "But we have to consider where to put resources for the long term."

Councilor Angel Shaw said there is a significant difference between what they do at CSB - great mentoring - and at Springer. She said people in the community are not afraid of the kids from CSB, but in Springer it is a different story.

Murphy said significant changes have been made in the Springer programs, where they are trying to develop juvenile programs that are equivalent or better than what AMI offers at CSB. "But it takes time to develop these programs," Murphy said. Murphy also said the overall Juvenile Justice Services goal is to develop and offer juvenile programs that will keep juvenile offenders in their homes and home communities.

Councilor Ron Hardeman asked if CSB programs do not fit in the current Juvenile Justice Services current philosophical approach. Murphy said that is not what he said, rather the state will still have to have institutional facilities for juvenile offenders.

Councilor Deborah Byars said it appears most juvenile facilities in New Mexico are for medium to high leveled offenders, while CSB takes mostly medium to low leveled offenders. "What I have observed is the CSB programs work," Byars said. "And I don't know of other communities asking to keep their juvenile facilities, like those here tonight asking to keep CSB."

"Why don't you look to close some of these other facilities than CSB?" Byars asked which prompted applause from the capacity crowd.

## Governor Looking At CSB Closure

Governor Bill Richardson is reviewing Children, Youth and Families Department Secretary Mary Dale Bolson's recommendation to close the American Marine Institute juvenile justice programs at Camp Sierra Blanca.

Governor Bill Richardson, through his press secretary Billy Sparks, delivered that message to *THE NEWS* on Wednesday.

"The governor is very concerned about any decisions that could jeopardize the economy of Ruidoso," Sparks told *THE NEWS*. "He is equally concerned about any long term implications of closing the facility that has such successful juvenile justice programs."

Murphy said he appreciated the comments from the community, but it was not an easy thing to close a facility.

Nunley questioned the community based programs to keep juvenile offenders in their homes. "Some at-risk children have at-risk parents," he added.

Eggleston said many juvenile offenders do not have the support of their families and at CSB they get mentoring from a caring staff.

Audience member Robin Parks asked if judges were allowed to sentence juveniles to CSB if the program would

## The Glorious Fourth

One Hundred and Thirty seven years ago today the old liberty bell in Philadelphia rang the announcement of the passage of the Declaration of Independence. From that day to this, not only in America, but throughout the civilized world, the principles enunciated in that document have been the inspiration of freemen.

Noting to equal it in its fervor, in its spirited declaration, in its firmness of purpose and in its recognition of the Rights of Man -- and in its sublimity -- is to be found in the pages of profane history. It announced the broad principle that "All men are created equal," and that "Governments derive their just powers from the consent of its governed."

And the principles enunciated in the Declaration of Independence have been the guide for our great and growing country to this day, and we have those true and tried men of colonial days to thank for the permanent manner in which they laid the foundation for our government. That the principles of the Declaration have, at times, been forgotten; that they have, indeed, been violated by certain practices, is not to be denied; but to the end the people have been wise enough, strong enough and patient enough to cause their representatives to see the rocks upon which our ship of state was drifting -- when it was proposed to govern without the "consent of the governed --" and the helmsman -- the people -- have steered our craft into safe harborage.

Therefore, it is but natural that every American, under whatever sun he may be when it rises on the Fourth, should feel and show that he is proud of the fact that he is an American, but prouder still of those Noble Men, in whom breathed the spirit of liberty so strong and in whose veins coursed the rich, red blood of freedom and independence that they were willing to lay down their lives, if need be, in defense of those principles.

In commemoration of the adoption of that imperishable Declaration people today all over this broad land will assemble; songs will be sung, utterances made and devotion paid to its authors, the founders of our government -- A government rich in everything, but richest in its millions of liberty-loving people who are able to rule themselves wisely and well.

## Declaration of Independence

July 4, 1776

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.


-- We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.

-- That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.

-- That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, where evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. **Road Blocks Can Be Deceiving**

Warning signals include flashing red lights, the ones you see on the road ahead, indicating either an accident or a routine road block. Stopping is required, and if it is a routine road block you must show your drivers license and motor vehicle registration and proof of insurance, or that is usually what you have to do. You understand that routine roadblocks, while a nuisance, are not drastic.

Another type of road block is when an individual puts a lock on a gate on a public road, denying public access to areas such as forest lands. These road blocks often end up in court, or the lock putter-on is charged with doing something wrong. Again this road block is a nuisance.

There is another type of road block that most people know about but is too often ignored. This road block is when a governmental official gives the impression of being open with information when actually the opposite is happening. Or it could be that the governmental official says one thing and later in the same series of statements contradicts what had been said earlier. Or it could be the governmental official talks gibberish instead of giving actual facts to the people wanting to know the true facts.


Could this be happening in this day and age? Would our elected officials and governmental employees and those appointed to committees and commissions try to deceive the very public they are supposed to be serving?

How many times have you questioned actions being taken by officials and asked for more information? Many people objected to the double talk when former governor Gary Johnson closed Fort Stanton and ousted people with disabilities from their home, saying it was the best thing to do. Officials talked but did not really answer questions.

Objections may be valid, but don't expect anyone to listen. Now officials want to close Camp Sierra Blanca and send the juveniles back to the communities, and it is important to remember that these are the communities where these juveniles got in trouble in the first place. If there was a viable program, why wasn't it started then?

Using officialdom rationale, communities are the best place to be, even though the communities failed these juveniles when they needed guidance and care. Will the government do the same thing they did with the people with disabilities who were dumped out of Fort Stanton and use them as guinea pigs or maybe letting them die?

The main thing to remember is that road blocks should be used on physical roads, not in meetings or memos or in avoiding telling the truth. We need to be able to believe officials instead of wondering if they mean what they are saying or if they mean the opposite or what. Government should be of the people not against the people. Officials should practice the true meaning of Independence Day.

\* As soon as you become comfortable with a computer program, it will be upgraded and become incompatible with whatever you're trying to do.

\* When you have a computer problem, the maker will say it's the operating system. The operating system people will say it's a peripheral. And the peripheral folks will say it's the maker.

\* There are three reasons why journalists should not hold public office. Warren Harding, Benito Mussolini and V.I. Lenin were in that line of work before getting involved in politics.

Kin Hubbard, editorial cartoonist for the Indianapolis News in the early 1900s, observed, when a feller says it's not the money but the principle of the thing, it's the money.

Miami Herald columnist Dave Barry has a couple good maxims to keep in mind.

\* No matter what happens, someone will find a way to take it too seriously.

\* If you had to identify, in one word, the reason why the human race has not achieved its full potential, that word would be "meetings."

And finally, advice that is attributed to a Bill Gates graduation address at Whitney High School in California. This came off the Internet and I can't find it in any of his books, but it should be in print.

\* Life is not fair. Get used to it.

\* The world won't care about your self esteem. It will expect you to accomplish something before you feel good about yourself.

\* If you think your teacher is tough, wait 'till you get a boss.

\* Flipping burgers is not beneath your dignity. Your grandparents had a different word for burger flipping. They call it opportunity.

\* If you mess up, it's not your parents' fault. So don't whine about your mistakes, learn from them.

\* Before you were born, your parents weren't as boring as they are now. They got that way from paying your bills, cleaning your clothes and listening to you talk about how cool you are.

**Forests To Receive \$1.7 Million to Reduce Wildfire Threat and Restore Forest**

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced that the Lincoln and Apache-Sitgreaves National Forests will receive a combined \$1.7 million to work with counties on forest restoration and community protection projects on an additional 5,000 acres of federal land.

The funds support projects developed through the National Forest County Partnership and Restoration Program, an innovative partnership between local communities and USDA Forest Service to restore forest health on three national forests.

"New Mexico's Lincoln National Forest will receive \$750,000 to thin approximately 1,500 to 2,000 acres of overgrown stands of trees adjacent to communities in Lincoln and Otero counties," said Deputy Secretary James Moseley. "An additional \$100,000 will be contributed to promoting economic development through biomass utilization such as developing biomass markets and infrastructure."

Arizona's Apache-Sitgreaves National Forest will receive \$750,000 to thin approximately 3,000 acres of overgrown stands of trees adjacent to communities in Navajo County. An additional \$100,000 will be used for biomass utilization efforts.

Since 2000, the Forest Service has invested more than \$10.8 million to reduce hazardous fuels on more than 46,000 acres on the Lincoln National Forest. During the same period, the Forest Service invested more than \$8.5 million to treat more than 79,000 acres on the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forest. Funding on the Lincoln and Apache-Sitgreaves in 2004 is nearly three times the 2000 level and the agency is treating nearly three times the number of acres in 2004 that it treated in 2000.

In 1999, the National Forest County Partnership and Restoration Program was established to address restoration of watersheds and landscapes and threats to homes and lives from wildfire on the Lincoln, Apache-Sitgreaves, and Grand Mesa, Uncompahgre, and Gunnison (Colo.) National Forests. The program promotes achieving outcomes outlined in the Healthy Forests Initiative and the Healthy Forests Restoration Act. Communities support this investment by providing a 20 percent matching contribution for economic development funds. The Forest Service and the counties have already put in place cooperative agreements that outline how projects are selected through a collaborative process.

The departments have developed a new inter-agency website that will serve as a clearinghouse for information on the President's Healthy Forests Initiative and track the results of projects. In a written statement submitted and read prior to the approving vote, I brought these problems, and others, to the Commissioners' attention.

The Commissioner's excuse to press on with this folly? "We must so word our ordinance because the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) requires it." (If the feds would tell our Commissioners to jump off one of the piers at our many ship building and ship repair facilities . . .)

The federal government, having gotten its camel's nose under our tent, and recognizing that it must be dealing with the proverbial confederacy of dunces, sought more, and came back to demand that we contravene hundreds of years of constitutionally guaranteed due process and presume not innocence, but guilt, to any suggested violations of the flood plain ordinance.

usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.

-- Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these over these states. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.

-- He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.

-- He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

-- He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large district of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.

-- He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.

-- He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of people.

-- He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.

-- He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.

-- He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary powers.

-- He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.

-- He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance.

-- He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures.

-- He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil power.

-- He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and acknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation

-- For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us.

-- For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States.

-- For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world.

-- For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent.

-- For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury.

-- For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences.

-- For abolishing the free System of English Laws, in a neighboring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies.

-- For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our Governments.

-- For suspending our own Legislatures; and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.

-- He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.

-- He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the Lives of our people.

## Pool Safety

Supervision is the key word when it comes to pool safety, but supervision combined with a variety of barriers and safety devices -- fences, latched gates, locked doors, pool covers and more -- goes even further toward drowning prevention.

### Drowning Prevention Tips

- \* Never leave a child unattended in the water or pool area for any reason. Don't be distracted by doorbells, phone calls, chores or conversations. If you must leave the pool area, take the child with you, making sure the pool gate latches securely when it closes.
- \* Always keep your eyes on the child or children. Designate a child watcher, whether you or someone else, when you attend a party or have friends or family over.
- \* Talk with baby-sitters about pool safety, supervision and drowning prevention.
- \* Post rules such as "No running," "No pushing," "No dunking" and "Never swim alone." Enforce the rules.
- \* Don't rely on swimming lessons or "floaties" to protect your children in the water.
- \* Don't assume that drowning or a drowning incident couldn't happen to you or your family.
- \* Don't have a false sense of security just because you think your pool area and home are secure. Always watch your children, whether in the house or outside.
- \* Attend a CPR class. Make sure your baby-sitter knows CPR.
- \* For the nearest cardiopulmonary resuscitation class, contact your fire department, Red Cross or hospital.
- \* Encourage your neighbors to follow pool safety guidelines, including keeping their back gates and doors locked, and their pool gates securely closed and latched.

# LCSWA Rules Change For Recycling Plastic Bottles

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) will soon take plastic bottles for recycling, in order to gain a better price.

At the LCSWA meeting Tuesday in Ruidoso Downs, LCSWA operational supervisor Debra Ingle reported she had found a new plastic recycling company that will pay higher prices for recycled plastic. However, the company will take only recycled plastic bottles. "They won't take the little butter tubs or other plastic," Ingle said.

Food storage plastic is often contaminated because the containers are usually not cleaned well before they are recycled. By taking only Number 1 and 2 plastic bottles, LCSWA can make up to \$40 a ton on the recycled plastic. Now LCSWA gets \$10 a ton for all recyclable plastics and LCSWA recycling workers must throw away containers that are not rinsed because of the contamination situation.

As for bottles, those too should be rinsed before recycling if they contained anything but water, Ingle requested. Plastic recycling bins are located in Carrizozo by the recreation center, by Capitan Senior Center, at Eagle Creek Shell station, and at the LCSWA offices in Ruidoso Downs. For more locations of recycling bins call LCSWA at 378-4697.

Ingle said at the recycling conference there was considerable talk about the state legislative memorial to study on making recycling mandatory. Ingle said the cities and urban counties are pushing for the mandatory recycling, but those in the rural areas do not favor making it mandatory. "If we go to mandatory recycling the state should give us money to do so and help with a bottle bill to pay people to recycle bottles," Ingle added.

We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That the United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. # Emergency Preparedness Field Day In Corona Area

Three times in the past six years, members of an Indianapolis-based amateur radio club have traveled to the Lincoln National Forest (near Arabela) for Field Day, an annual event that tests their ability to communicate under simulated emergency conditions.

But this year, their excursion had to be relocated because of an actual emergency.

Mike Koss, Bill Kennedy and Brian D. Smith, all residents of the Indianapolis

area, had planned to join former Indy resident Al Olson, now of Coal Dale, CO, at their usual 6,200-foot campsite.

On Monday, June 21, they discovered that the Peppin Fire had prompted the U.S. Forest Service to declare their favorite spot off-limits only four days earlier.

They considered canceling their plans (the Field Day operation is voluntary), but Kennedy and Smith had already purchased airline tickets to El Paso and had reserved a rental car. So, af-

ter considerable discussion, phone calls, and research, they decided the show would go on from a different location.

On Saturday, June 26 and Sunday, June 27, they set up on or near Gallinas Peak, west of Corona (and welcomed any visitors who wanted like to learn about amateur radio). Though they didn't determine their final location until they rendezvoused in Roswell on Thursday, they were easy to find on the mountain: Koss was accompanied by his trusty car, a blue 1971 Volkswagen beetle. In fact, even the club's call letters are W9VW.

Field Day Information: First held in 1933, Field Day, an annual emergency preparedness exercise, always takes place on the fourth full weekend of June. From noon Saturday through 3 p.m. Sunday (New Mexico time): about 2,200 amateur ("ham") radio clubs and 35,000 licensed radio operators from across North America set up in fields, on mountains, in backyards and at diverse other locations. Besides radios, their equipment includes antennas,

coaxial cable, portable generators and of course, the usual tents, sleeping bags, coolers and camping supplies.

The object was to assemble

a working radio station, or stations, and contact as many other stations as possible during the weekend. Their two-way communications involved more than

microphones. Some operators used Morse code, radioteletype, television cameras and even satellites to make contact with other stations.

## West Mountain, Capitan Mountain Forest System Lands Are Closed

"In the interest of the public's health and safety, all Forest Service lands on West Mountain and Capitan Mountain will be closed to the general public. This closure does not apply to private property holders and residents of the area.

It is anticipated that the area closure will remain in effect throughout the monsoon season.

she added. Murphy said CSB does not serve just Lincoln County or southern New Mexico.

Hardeman said that CSB has done a good job on educating the juveniles and he asked how it compares with the other state juvenile facilities. Murphy said CSB percentage wise is doing a better job than the rest.

Audience member Paul Patterson said he lived in Springer and lives now in Ruidoso. He said Ruidoso opens its heart to the boys at CSB, while in Springer people don't.

A missionary who visits CSB said most of the boys do not want to go home because they want to change their lives. He said 70 percent of the boys have no male or female role model in their lives, while CSB staff serve as father mentors.

Robert Gomez, educational director at CSB, said 123 boys who went through the CSB program have gone on to higher education schools.

Pat Mattsburg said CSB is a successful proven program that should be a model for the state juvenile programs and the state should continue the partnership with CSB.

Murphy said the closure is not a matter of resources, rather a change in practices.

Eggleston asked if there is anything to change the CYFD idea of CSB. Murphy said he will convey the mes-

sage to Sec. Bolson and the governor, who are both committed to find a viable use for CSB.

Audience member Amanda Montés, whose father works at CSB and who has "grown up" with some of the CSB kids who do not want to go home, also spoke emotionally in favor of CSB. She asked if CYFD is prepared to help the kids when they go home. "Parents do have a lot to do with kids getting in trouble," she added.

Hardeman asked if the state plans to develop community based programs in very small isolated communities such as Lordsburg and Questa.

Murphy said in the past they had problems with such community programs working well in very rural areas. "This is a cultural philosophical change for Juvenile Justice and CYFD," Murphy said.

County commission chair Rex Wilson, also a member on the CSB board, was at the meeting but did not speak.

After some more discussion, Nunley made a motion that the Ruidoso Village Council on behalf of the whole Lincoln County community send a letter to Sec. Bolson and the Governor asking them to reconsider the decision to close Camp Sierra Blanca. All councilors voted in favor of the motion.


