

County Facing Deficit, Considers Options

If revenues into the county coffers do not increase in the next fiscal year, Lincoln County will start 2006 with deficit spending and possible tax increases.

Such was the gloomy budget forecast from county manager Tom Stewart at the county commission meeting Tuesday, November 16 in Carrizozo. "We are in a dilemma," Stewart said. "We can make it through if we don't expend anything extra."

County commissioners were scheduled to review the budget with consideration for a possible pay raise to employees, as well as purchases and appropriations postponed from budget discussions in July and August. Stewart said by state law the county commission must ensure that the budgets for the newly elected officials—assessor, sheriff and probate judge—have at least 50 percent revenue remaining in those department budgets when they take office on January 1,

2005. Figures provided by Stewart, county treasurer Beverly Calaway and the manager's financial staff showed the county's expenditures are growing at a rate of five percent, while revenue is growing only 3.59 percent. "We continue to spend more than we are taking in," Stewart added. "My calculations estimate that without spending any of the current (surplus) of \$618,764 over required reserves that we will begin dipping into the 3/12ths re-

serve (of the general fund in the county budget) in July of 2006," Stewart reported. "Of course dipping into this required reserve is not an option by Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) requirements." Stewart recommended the county not use the \$618,764 reserve by making no additional capital outlay expenditures for equipment or vehicles and no pay increases of any kind. "Direct me to scrub the budget to the core and return to you in December

with a list of cuts, instead of additions to expenditures," Stewart said. "I believe it will be necessary to explore options for additional revenues in the future." Revenue options for Lincoln County include imposition of the last 2.5 mills avail-

able and several new county gross receipt taxes approved by the New Mexico State Legislature this year, Stewart said. Those include a one-eighth percent county infrastructure gross receipt tax; one-eighth percent county correction tax; one-eighth

Lincoln Historic Zone B To Stay

Lincoln Historic Zone B will continue to exist as designated in the 2004 version of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance.

Lincoln County Commissioners held a public hearing about the Lincoln Historic Zone B on Tuesday, November 16 in their chambers in the courthouse in Carrizozo. At the October county commission meeting, two Lincoln valley property owners voiced objections to the Historic Zone B. The land owners wanted more public discourse with possible action to remove the historic designation which they contended took away their private property rights to use their lands as they wanted.

County commissioners took another morning to hold another public hearing about the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance, specifically Zone B. It was the eighth hearing on the Lincoln Historic Ordinance since the beginning of 2004.

Zone B extends about five miles east and five miles west of the Zone A which is the core of the old Lincoln village where the old courthouse and other museums are located. The appearance of any development on properties in Zone B is regulated by the historic ordinance, and property owners must come before the historic board to get proposed construction plans approved.

Large acreage owners John and Stan Thomas, and James and Nita Taylor objected to Zone B and wanted their lands taken out of the designation. While they did not

object to the Zone A, they wanted to keep the restrictive historical zoning to the Zone A area only.

The property owners were also concerned that they and others were not given notice about the public hearings and revision of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance. (Notice about all seven hearings held in Lincoln were published prior to each meeting.)

John Thomas said private property rights is the most important issue facing America today. He said there is a great deal of fear of development in Lincoln and he challenged the right of the Historic Preservation Board to stop his land development rights or road improvements to Highway 380. He said he sees the no growth policy as a way to increase the values of property now available and to deny others the ability to develop their properties.

"Balance the historical flavor with the right to use our property as we want," John Thomas said. "There has been no balance in the last 20 years on the Historical Preservation Board."

Stan Thomas said a lot of the animosity in Lincoln is from ignorance of what the historical board is doing. He then said he just found the web site for the Lincoln board done by Sandra Smith. He suggested the county send all Lincoln land owners notice of any changes in the ordinance and to guarantee a web site. "This way everything can be out in the open prior to a vote (by the Lincoln Historic Board)," Stan Thomas said.

James Taylor said he circulated a petition last winter to do away with Zone B after the issue over "landscaping" which would prevent development on any slope more than 20 degrees. He said of the 120 land owners in Zone B, 33 signed the petition to get out of Zone B. "These 33 own 90 percent of the land in Zone B," Taylor said.

People who want the Zone B are newcomers, Taylor said. "We have geraniums growing here longer than the board members have been," Taylor added. "This is small tract homeowners dictating, not the large tract owners."

Nita Taylor, who grew up in the Lincoln valley, also asked to do away with Zone B because property owners in that zone would self regulate the development of their properties to retain the his-

Carrizozo Is Still Waiting For Billboard To Comply

Town of Carrizozo has been informed by attorneys for the Casino Apache billboard sign company asking if the company can install lights on the out-of-compliance billboard located in town.

At the regular town council meeting Tuesday, November 9, the town mayor responded to a question from a resident who wanted to know the status of the billboard. Two months ago the town gave the billboard company 30 days to bring the sign into compliance to the town zoning ordinance which limits sign size to 300 square feet. The sign is more than 640 square feet.

The mayor said town attorney David Stevens received a letter, which the mayor offered to the public to view, from the sign company attorneys asking if the owner could put lights on the billboard. "Our attorney is to meet with them and say no, because the sign does not comply with our ordinance," the mayor said.

When asked if the state highway department had done anything more about the sign, the mayor said Stevens had said the state is working on the matter.

"I'm thrilled you said no to the lights (on the sign)," said resident Marie Watkins.

The mayor said the com-

pany "should have known better than to ask for lights."

When Watkins asked what comes next, the mayor and town clerk Leann Weihbrecht said they will keep

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Carrizozo Approves Sewer Bond Ordinance

Sewer Rate Increase To Follow Shortly

An overdue replacement of the Carrizozo Wastewater Treatment Facility is officially underway as town trustees approved an ordinance that uses sewer revenues to pay for a \$409,850 loan.

Carrizozo town trustees during their regular meeting Tuesday, October 9 unanimously approved the Carrizozo Wastewater System Improvement Revenue Bonds Ordinance. Trustee Eilene Lovelace who was not at the meeting because she was ill was called in to vote on the ordinance which needed a three-fourths supermajority approval.

The \$409,850 loan is coming from the US Department of Agricultural Rural Utilities Services (RUS) and will be used in conjunction with \$1,221,000 in grant money from RUS for the new sewer facility. The loan is for 40 years at 4.5 percent interest with annual payments of \$22,282.

Payments will come from net revenues from the town sewer rates, which will have to be increased to cover the loan cost. Town clerk Leann Weihbrecht said the town will have to raise sewer rates because currently the sewer

rates only bring in \$70,000 a year to operate the sewer. The new sewer facility will require more operational money as it will have electricity and other maintenance costs.

Weihbrecht said the engineer for the wastewater facility project will work with her to help determine the needed sewer rate increase. After some in the audience pressed Weihbrecht for an idea on what kind of increase, Weihbrecht said the town might need a minimum of \$5 a month more for residential accounts, but she was unsure as to the exact amount of increase needed.

"We don't have a choice (but to raise rates)," Weihbrecht said.

Bond counsel Chris Moorehead from Modrall Spertling who helped prepare the ordinance for the loan, said the

percent for county corrections; one-eighth percent for county emergency services and one-eighth percent for county fire services. An eighth percent gross receipt tax provides about \$560,000 a year to the county, Stewart said.

Stewart said if the county commission decides to impose any of the additional county gross receipt taxes, it must do so by January 1 or July 1. "If we target for July 1, we must have an ordinance in place (for the taxes) by the end of March," Stewart said. "If we are looking for January 1 we must have the ordinance (to impose the gross receipt tax) adopted by the end of September."

County commissioner Leo

Martinez, who will be leaving at the end of his term on December 31, suggested the commission delay any action on the budget revisions until January (after he and county commission chair Rex Wilson are gone). Stewart said his concern with waiting until January to deal with the budget is he was faced with buying a bulldozer now. The county had opportunity to purchase the bulldozer which has only 2,480 hours of use on it, for \$95,515, when it usually sells for \$140,000. "If we don't purchase it, I'll have to find one to lease at the end of November," Stewart said.

Wilson then asked about an employee raise. Stewart provided figures that show a 1.9 percent raise will cost an ad-

ditional \$65,622 in the coming year. A 3.8 percent raise will cost an additional \$128,804 in the coming year. Stewart said according to the US Department of Labor the consumer price index has increased by 2.4 percent overall and 4.4 percent for medical items.

County commissioner Earl Hobbs said he hated to raise taxes but will do so only with "full concurrence with all elected officials." Stewart said he will take the budget to absolute essentials. "I do not like the idea of tax increases, but I see disaster coming in 2006 (without them)," Stewart added.

County assessor Rick Silva said property tax growth rates will not provide the needed revenue as they are capped at three to six percent because of yield control. He said the state speaker of the house supports yield control, which if removed would allow the county to assess all properties at current market values. This would increase revenues and improve the county's bond rating, Silva said. "If yield control caps are removed there will be drastic tax increases," Silva added.

Stewart said the property tax issue was why the legislature looked at and approved new gross receipt taxes for counties.

"So we're looking at a tax increase no matter how," commission chair Rex Wilson commented. "The only real growth in the county property taxes will come from new construction and we can't assume we can raise values by 10 percent."

Stewart also reminded commissioners that in March, the county's contract to operate the detention center will come up for re-bid. Currently the county pays the contractor Corrections Systems Inc. more than \$1.5 mil-

lion a year to operate the jail. Wilson reminded that most of that operational cost is coming from the one-eighth gross receipt tax imposed to finance construction of the facility and operations. Wilson said in the early 1990s the jail was a \$50,000 a year line item in the sheriff's budget.

County commissioner Maury St. John said she did not want to go with the 2005 fiscal year budget first proposed by the county. Currently the county is operating on the 2004 fiscal year budget, the same as used from July 1, 2003 to June 30, 2004.

Martinez asked if Stewart will impose a hiring freeze. Stewart said that is what he is looking at, however he has two individuals in key positions--planning and purchasing--who are retiring in 2005. He said he would like to delay a hiring freeze until after those two positions are filled.

Stewart said historically each department reviews its budget to determine if requested purchases are valid and to consider the needs of employees. As an example of increased expenses, Stewart said the county clerk's office was hit with tremendous election costs with "postage out of sight."

Martinez made a final comment about the budget concerning the lease of the hospital to Presbyterian Healthcare Systems (PHS). He said the county would have more money if PHS was required to pay a fair market rent for the facility. "The time has come to look at the \$1 a year rent (by PHS for the hospital) when the hospital has a \$7 million surplus and a \$1 million in year in profits. The rent should be more like \$600,000 a year," Martinez said.

Resolving none of the budget issues during their discussion other than to direct the county manager to come back in December with more figures, county commissioners only acted to authorize Stewart to purchase the bulldozer for the county road department.

The young couple will make their home in Carrizozo.



responding. But Watkins said that can go on for years. Then Watkins asked if it would help if she got a lawyer. "I'm not content to wait 10 years," Watkins said. The mayor said the town can push its attorney but not the attorneys for the sign company.

When Watkins continued to request the billboard be taken down, Weibrecht said the town can only ask the billboard company to bring the sign into compliance with the town ordinance.

The mayor then said that maybe the company could put lights on half of the sign because that would be about the (300 square feet in) size required by the ordinance. But that comment was met with an audience member asking if the town has a fine in the ordinance for things such as the billboard that are out of compliance. The mayor said he had not seen any such fines. Watkins suggested fines be put in the ordinance, for the future.

"We have to ride it out and wait," the mayor said.

Watkins said she will get a lawyer to see that something happens. The mayor suggested Watkins get that lawyer and see if they can get more response from the sign company.

Watkins said she would rather work with the town than against it. The mayor said he has an open door policy and Watkins could talk to him or anybody but the town attorney. Watkins said she is talking with Weibrecht.

Weibrecht said she will ask Stevens what the next step will be with the sign situation.

torical look now required by Zone B.

Ken Nosker who owns lands in Zone B, recommended all of Zone B be removed from the historic ordinance because of the property rights issue. Neal Girard who has been against Zone B since the start because of issues with the Historical Board, was for doing away with Zone B. Paul Slaten who purchased a large acreage property 25 years ago also wanted out of Zone B.

Those speaking in favor of keeping Zone B were Tom Mann, Lincoln Historic Preservation Board president, John Amistae, Sandra Smith, Francis Gallegos, Alfred Sanchez, Ralph Dunlap, James Sanchez, H.L. MacArthur, Ed Hyman, R.G. Luce-ro, Jeremy Jordan, David Lee, Kay Rucker, BLM field staff Paul Happle and New Mexico State Historic Preservation Department (SHPD) officer Dorothy Victor.

Victor summarized the opinions of those in favor of keeping Zone B when she asked the county commission to let the newly revised Lincoln Preservation Ordinance work for a while. "There are very positive steps in the ordinance revision," Victor said. "I hope you retain Historic District B."

In response to a comment that Zone B has nothing to do with the history of Zone A, Victor said Zone B has everything to do with Zone A. She said the area of Zones A and B are included in the boundaries of the Lincoln National Historic Landmark designation. She said the whole area is considered part of the landmark because of 19th century events that occurred in the farm settlements along the valley, including Fort Stanton. She said removing Zone B from historic designation could affect the historic landmark status.

Victor reminded of the two to three year process of revising the historic ordinance and the six public hearings in Lincoln. "It is our view (SHPD) the Lincoln Historic Preservation ordinance was done in an open process," Victor said.

Happle said the BLM lands would not be affected if Zone B was removed from the historical designation. Later James Taylor said he resented the BLM being able to give input about the issue. "This is a private land issue, and the BLM is the worst neighbor I've ever had, they never fix fences, ditches or roads," Taylor said.

County attorney Alan Morel, who drafted the revised historic ordinance, said the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board does not control land subdivision in either Zone A or B. Proposed subdivisions must go through the county

planning department, Morel added. "The Preservation Board only regulates aesthetics and appearances, not development," Morel added.

County commissioner Maury St. John made the motion to retain the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance 2004-5 as adopted October 19, retaining Zone B, and link the Lincoln website to the county web site. County commissioner Leo Martinez seconded the motion and requested that it be made clear to all property owners in Zones A and B that they have an appeal process to the county commission for all decisions of the Lincoln Historic Preservation Board. Martinez also requested that county commissioners in their future appointments to the Lincoln board consider people of differing points of view.

County commission chair Rex Wilson said the arguments and dissension is a "good example of what these kinds of ordinances cause." Wilson gave his sympathy to the who wanted out of Zone B and said there should be some avenue for these property owners to remove themselves from Zone B, depending on the "lay of the land."

Martinez said that was his point in making sure there is an appeal process directly to the county commission. "This should be fully informed to the land owners," he added.

County commissioner Rick Simpson whose district includes Lincoln valley, said he believed the 2004 version of the Lincoln Ordinance is the "best it has ever been." However, he agreed the ordinance is not finished. "This needs to be a living ordinance and open to change," Simpson said.

When the vote was taken,

St. John, Martinez, Simpson, Earl Hobbs voted in favor of keeping the Lincoln Historic Ordinance with Zone B. Wilson voted against it.

The Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance was first adopted in 1984.

Consider the poor turkey

This will be the last week that many of our feathered friends will be alive. A week from today the poor turkey will be the center of attention gracing many dinner tables.

However, some people will feast on roast beef or tacos or enchiladas or roast pork or whatever they prefer and not deprive the poor turkey of a long life. Thank goodness the poor turkey is not aware that his days are numbered.

And aren't you glad you don't have to tromp around out in the woods trying to locate that turkey? Back in the old days people had to find and then kill a wild turkey and go through quite a process before it could be cooked.

Nowadays all you have to do is buy one at the grocery. Nowadays they are usually frozen and someone else had the pleasure of removing the feathers and innards, not that it is all that pleasurable, but it is one less job for you.

Keeping work to a minimum is not the main reason you might want to avoid obtaining your turkey in the old fashioned way. After killing the poor bird, then a fire had to be built under a large pot filled with water, better if it was outdoors. Then the dead bird was dipped in the hot water, it helped loosen the feathers to be plucked off.

Somewhere in the process the head, feet and innards were removed, of course saving the liver, gizzard and heart for giblet gravy. All this without a word of sorrow.

Giving thanks is what Thanksgiving is supposed to be about, but have you really given many thanks that you don't have to kill and process a turkey before you cook it?

If they had to go through all the things they did in the old days before baking a turkey, many people probably would decide on another main course for a holiday meal.

Vexing as it must have been for people in the old days going through that process to bag a turkey, their holiday meals were something special, just as they are today. And they were aware that thanks should be given for having the opportunity to hunt and find a magnificent turkey.

It seems that people sometimes forget that the way of life we have today is much easier than it was back in the old days. Few of us have large cauldrons out in the yard to use to blanch fowl. And few of us have the energy or desire to get a license, hunt and kill and process a turkey.

INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE -- New Mexico projects a dual image to the world as a state rich in history and science and also as a state awash in trash history and pseudo-science.

We are known as the birthplace of the atomic age and the location of continuing cutting-edge research in nuclear energy at two national scientific laboratories in Los Alamos and Albuquerque.

Rocket science began in New Mexico with Dr. Robert Goddard's experiments at Roswell in the 1930s. It has continued at White Sands Missile Range since 1946. And now we have landed the X-Prize competition for commercial rocketry, which should bring space-age industry to our state.

The Mercury, Apollo and shuttle programs also have had a close association with our state. Besides supplying a number of astronauts for the programs, the Mercury astronauts were screened and partly trained here, largely using information obtained from the acceleration and deceleration experiments of Col. John Paul Stapp at Holloman Air Force Base, near Alamogordo.

And astronaut Harrison Schmitt of Silver City, not only walked on the moon, he trained the Apollo astronauts in moon geology in our state.

New Mexico Tech, at Socorro, is conducting earth-shaking experimental research on explosives that is helping with the war on terror, in addition to advances in mining and law enforcement. It also is pioneering research on thunderstorms, lightning and other meteorological phenomena.

Just west of Socorro, on the St. Augustine Plains, the Very Large Array radio-telescopes have enlarged our understanding of the universe to include objects the eye cannot see. They are a magnificent sight from Highway 60, just west of Magdalena, and a favorite of movie makers.

Besides all this futuristic research, New Mexico has a rich scientific past. The projectile points found at Clovis, Folsom and elsewhere in the state, have revolutionized anthropology by setting back the time for the earliest presence of humans in the Americas by thousands of years and revealing surprising technological advancement.

In addition, New Mexico also has been the subject of much groundbreaking research in many scientific fields, including archaeology, anthropology, sociology, and biology.

But New Mexico also has been home to UFO lore throughout the state. The late Rep. Steve Schiff got a congressional investigation into the Roswell incident. And now Gov. Bill Richardson wants another one. Despite the VLA's cutting-edge science, its telescopes mainly are known as backdrop for movies about little green men.

Former Sen. Schmitt got an FBI investigation of cattle mutilations in the state. Former Rep. Bill Richardson got an investigation into the Taos Hum. Now Gov. Bill Richardson wants Billy the Kid dug up. That not only trashes good science but good history too. We're back to dime-novel lore.

New Mexico's spirituality, dating back to ancient cultures, also must be mentioned. Centered in Santa Fe, the state has more than its share of alternative medicine, New Age lifestyles, crystal fields, force fields, past life regressions, you name it.

Can legitimate science and history coexist with pseudo-science and history? There is a market for both. But does pseudo-science and pseudo-history erode our appreciation for the real thing and allow important sites to fall to development, for instance?

What is important is to differentiate between the two. And sometimes they are divided by a rather fine line. For awhile, the X-Prize competition was thought to be a bit far out. But now it has moved into the realm of possibility.

Historian Dave Clary of Roswell has recently tried to draw that line in some important areas. First he investigated the popular UFO phenomena in his book "Before and After Roswell: The Flying Saucer in America 1947-1999."

Then he moved on to rocket pioneer Robert Goddard and demonstrated how his work in Roswell contributed to Americans walking on the moon just 30 years later. That book, "Rocket Man: Robert Goddard and the Birth of the Space Age" is now out in paperback and available in bookstores.

stock and bread crumbs, and sweet potatoes, of course! To prepare the bird, follow these three steps: in achieving the feast: Stuffing, trussing and roasting.

PRUNE DRESSING

(For 10 pound turkey)

- *3 cups cooked prunes
- *1 small grated onion
- *1 cup finely chopped celery
- *2 1/2 cups fried bread crumbs
- *1 cup prune juice
- *1/2 cup chopped pecans
- *1 tablespoon nutmeg
- *Salt and pepper

Wash and soak the prunes. Cook them in water in which they were soaked, until tender. Cool, remove pits and chop. Fry onion and celery in two tablespoons of fat until soft. Mix thoroughly with fried bread crumbs, prunes, prune juice, pecans and seasonings.

Season the neck and body cavity of the bird lightly. Fill neck with dressing and skewer the neck skin to the back. Bring wing tips onto back. Fill body cavity with dressing, but do not pack it tightly. Skewer or fasten opening to hold in the dressing. Tie leg ends down to the tail.

To roast the bird first grease the skin with melted or softened fat. Place the bird on a rack, breast down, in a shallow pan which is open. If the bird does not have a generous layer of fat, cover with a fat-moistened cloth that is large enough to go over the top and sides. Roast in preheated oven set at proper temperature.

An 8 to 10 pound bird is set in a 325 degree oven for 3 to 3 1/2 hours.

A turkey four pounds heavier requires the same temperature oven but is allowed four hours longer to cook. For birds larger than 14 pounds use a 300 degree oven and add 1/2 hour of cooking time for each four pounds. A 20-pound bird, for example, will take five to six hours to roast.

Do not add water or cover pan while roasting. If drippings burn, the over is too hot. If the cloth covering the bird dries during cooking, remoisten from fat at bottom of pan. Turn bird breast up when about 3/4 done. Remove cloth if more browning is desired.

Test for doneness when meat feels soft. This is done by pressing the thickest part of the drumstick with fingers. The leg joint also should move readily when turkey is done.

SAVORY BRUSSELS SPROUTS

Cook three pounds of carefully washed brussels sprouts until done in salted water. Drain and place in saucepan over low flame with two tablespoons of melted butter, tossing until all are coated. Pour in 1/4 cup strong chicken stock, season with salt and pepper.

Place in serving dish and cover with 1/2 cup of coarsely rolled bread crumbs which have been browned in butter.

SWEET POTATOES (Serves six)

- * Six medium sweet potatoes
- * 3/4 cup brown sugar
- * 2 tablespoons butter or substitute
- * 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- * 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg
- * 1/4 cup water
- * 1/2 cup sliced brazil nuts

Boil sweet potatoes until almost tender; peel and cut in half. Place in shallow baking dish. Combine brown sugar, butter, spices and water. Bring to a boil. Pour over potatoes; sprinkle with brazil nuts. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees) for 30 minutes or cook in a heavy skillet on top of the stove, basting frequently.

CRANBERRY SHERBET

- * 2 cups sugar
- * 2 cups water
- * 1 quart cranberries
- * Juice of 1 1/2 lemons
- * Juice of 1/2 orange

Make a syrup of the sugar and water, cooking five minutes after it starts to boil. Add the cranberries and cook until clear, then run all this through a fine sieve. Cool and add the fruit juices. Freeze in refrigerator trays. This may be made the day before using.

- * 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin
- * 1/4 cup cold water
- * 1 1/4 teaspoons cinnamon

- * 1 teaspoon salt
- * 1/2 cup brown sugar
- * 1/2 cup milk

Watch What Your Face Says

Probably it isn't right, but it certainly is human nature to pass judgment upon every stranger within a few seconds after you are introduced. Later you often-times have to reverse your judgment. That doesn't keep you from going ahead and judging everyone you meet.

Some of the men or women you meet win your heart immediately, even before they say a word. This they do by the expression on their faces. Others win you only after days or hours or weeks of association, which causes you to overlook their dad-pan expression and recognize their worth.

The faces we like, the faces of personality, are beautifully described by Rosamond Lehmann in her novel, "The Weather in the Streets." One of Miss Lehmann's characters says to a friend:

"I like what -- what breaks out behind the features and is suddenly there and gone again. I like a face to warm up and expand, and collapse and be different every night and from every angle... and not be above looking ugly or comic sometimes."

In other words, what this woman liked and what others like in a face is life, expression, vitality, animation. We all like faces that betray the emotions that go on behind them rather than the dull, colorless, cold, unresponsive faces. We want to know that there is friendship behind the faces we see.

Study the expression on your face. If it isn't what you think it ought to be, do what Napoleon did, what Cleopatra did. Practice facial expression until you develop this important outward evidence of personality into a great and enduring asset.

town is obligated by the covenants in the ordinance to set sewer rates to cover the cost of the bond payments, in addition to the cost of operations and maintenance of the

sewer system. He said the payments cannot come from gross receipt taxes or property taxes, rather only may come from revenues from the sewer rates.

Currently the town has no other outstanding debt on its water system. Moorehead said once the ordinance was adopted it will be published and there will

be a 30 day public comment period. Once that has closed, Moorehead said, he will come back to the council to sign documents to receive the funds. Weibrecht asked if the town would get "a big cardboard check." RUS traditionally has a ceremony with a "big cardboard check" when funds are signed over to a community receiving RUS loans/grants.

Moorehead said all engineering work and letters of conditions are now done and ready for the project to begin once the funding is approved. No indication was given as to when the sewer rate increases are to be considered. After adopting the sewer

ordinance, trustees also approved unanimously the Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance. The mayor said the town needed to pass the ordinance especially since people in town were complaining about problems with flooding. Weibrecht added that the ordinance is required by state law. Weibrecht said town resident Kay Cochran has volunteered to serve as town flood plain manager. Weibrecht works with her.

There were no public comments about the flood plain ordinance which designates and regulates flood plain areas that have flood hazards; prescribes standards for constructing, altering, installing or repairing buildings and other improvements under a permit system within a designated flood plain area; requires review by the local flood plain manager for development within a design-

ated flood hazard area to ensure that all such proposals are consistent with the need to minimize flood damage, all public utilities and facilities such as gas and sewer are designed to minimize or eliminate flood damage and adequate drainage is provided to reduce exposure to flood hazards.

The flood damage prevention ordinance will also require new or replacement water supply and/or sewer systems within a designated flood hazard area to be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood water and require on-site waste disposal systems to be located so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding and to designate and regulate floodways for the passage of flood waters.




