

# County Sets-Off Alarm Ordinance

Tuesday's county commission meeting seemed to produce more questions than answers in regard to the proposed ordinance to regulate security alarm systems. The alarm systems affected by the ordinance are those systems that send an automated alarm to law enforcement agencies, specifically the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

The large number of false alarms in the county, responding officers' inability to access the structures where the alarms originate, and the fact that some automated systems are able to tie-up emergency phone lines for long periods make regulation necessary, according to county attorney Alan Morel.

Lincoln County Sheriff Rick Virden told county com-

missioners that "35 companies have alarms out there. There are 2,500 alarms in the county. We get a lot of calls," he added.

Morel said that his attempts to discuss possible solutions to the problems netted a response from only one alarm company.

Part of plan is to have the companies register the systems as they are sold or in-

stalled, but the likelihood of cooperation from those companies appears to be questionable. Of the 35 identified alarm companies with systems in Lincoln County, 33 are based outside of the state.

The design of the ordinance is to register each system and issue permits to the system owners, restrict the use of automated telephone dialing systems and require the re-

sponse of a keyholder prior to a response from law enforcement.

Included are regulations directed to maintenance, operation and record keeping of dispatches, as well as permit fees and penalties for ordi-

nance violations.

County commissioner Tom Battin asked what kind of administrative burden the ordinance, originally planned to be managed by the sheriff's department, would place on

## New Scoreboard At Capitan Tiger Field

Health and safety issues and an expansion of the school's athletic facilities top the Capitan

Board of Education's priority task list. At the school board's regular meeting of October 13th, ASA intern Architect Greg Holman reported that responses to a call for construction bids for two planned baseball fields were less than satisfactory. He recommended an extension of the bidding period to October 21st, with the bid award to take place next week. Holman expressed confidence that the second round of bidding will be more in line with the school district's budget and design plans, and added that the slight extension of bidding time would not affect plans to have the fields ready to use at

the start of baseball season in mid-February.

A request by school superintendent Dr. Larry Miller for a call for bids for architectural services to remedy some drainage problems on school grounds, including the elementary school playground and the sand volleyball pit, passed unanimously.

Plans to form a Facilities Master Plan Priority Committee continue. The school board hopes to recruit employees from each level of the school system as well as members of the PTA and Capitan community to assess

## C'zozo Gets Offer For Aspen Street

Debra Ingle, operational supervisor of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA), gave a brief review of the proposed Greentree Transfer and Recycling Facility for LCSWA at the Carrizozo Town Council meeting Friday, October 14. Ingle encouraged the town council to approve a proposed loan agreement with the New Mexico Finance Authority to achieve funding for the project.

"The new facility should meet the authority's needs for 90 years," Ingle said. Trustees will vote on approval of a NMFA loan for the project on November 8.

A motion to approve the business registration application of Rachel Niederstadt of Carrizozo passed unanimously. The new business, Aprons Extrodinaire, will market homemade aprons from a location stated only as highways 54 and 380.

A variance request from Daniel and J'Lane Zamora for a special exception to the zoning ordinance for the purpose of expanding The Rocking Horse Daycare on 18th Street was approved.

Barbara Culler reported that a benefit auction raised \$1,646.46 on behalf of the animal shelter's adoption program, which currently has two dogs in need of homes.

Trustees approved a \$15,800 contract for the design and engineering of a new 250,000 gallon water storage tank. The town's existing tank holds 500,000 gallons. Jim Massengill of Engineers, Inc. in Las Cruces explained that once the new tank is operational, the old tank can be drained, cleaned, repainted and the plumbing upgraded before it goes back into operation.

In discussion regarding a livestock premise permit for Glenn Mochel of 1502 I Avenue, town clerk Leann Weibrecht stated that the permit applicant lived in a fully residential area. The mayor said, "but there's horses all up-and-down that street". Action on the request for a permit was tabled until the council has more information on the number and kinds of livestock Mochel hopes to keep on the property.

The town has received an offer from Richard Vega wanting to purchase Aspen

Street where it ends at the highway 380 overpass. The mayor estimated the parcel to be approximately one-and-a-quarter acres of land. The dead-end street divides the property of Richard Vega and, serving no real use to the public, has allegedly become a place for mischievous youth to hang-out.

The mayor said Vega has had problems with kids loitering there and throwing bottles at his horses.

Trustees agreed that Aspen Street would have to be vacated prior to any sale. The mayor added that no easements or rights of way exist on the site, but there is a drainage ditch that must be maintained. Vega has made an offer of \$500 for the land. The town council approved a motion to send a counter offer asking \$1,000 for the land and stating that the buyer must pay for all pertinent fees.

Trustee David LaFave mentioned that there have been a lot of rumors about the status of Carrizozo's new police of-

icer, Mark Dauster, and asked chief of police Mike Howard to shed some light on the facts.

Howard explained that Dauster was a certified police officer for 10 years in another state before coming to Carrizozo, and is fully qualified except for a failure to pass the running portion of

the county. Morel said that the application is simple enough, but pointed out that no person has been designated to manage it and he hadn't initially intended to create a new position.

Morel went on to say that "it's going to take somebody a lot of time to set this up. We'll have to designate an entity or individual to manage this if the ordinance passes; we're looking at 2,500 to 3,000 individual permits."

When county commissioner Earl Hobbs expressed a con-

cern that it might require a full-time position, county manager Tom Stewart replied that, with the expected number of permits each generating a \$25 registration fee, the county should have about \$80,000 to allocate. "So we can pay someone and provide a vehicle," Stewart told him.

Hobbs questioned whether or not \$80,000 would be enough to cover all of the expenses of managing and enforcing the ordinance, and suggested commissioners consider setting the annual

permit fee at \$50. He also expressed concerns about establishing cooperation by out-of-state companies, and wondered if the ordinance could require the alarm companies to have a physical presence within the county.

Morel said that the county commissioners do not have the power to regulate interstate commerce but, requiring a property keyholder to respond to an alarm within 30 minutes does address the physical presence issue.

County commissioner Eileen Lovelace added, "maybe it'll make the people of Lincoln County use local alarm companies. It'll send a message of, if you move to Lincoln County you better support Lincoln County businesses".

After the motion to approve Lincoln County Ordinance 2005-5 with the condition of making undetermined changes and setting permit fees at \$25 was made by commissioner Maury St. John, Hobbs stated his belief that passage would be premature pending a reexamination of the fees and determining who would enforce the ordinance. "I want to know how this will be administered and who will be in charge of it before we put it in place," Hobbs said.

County commission chair Rick Simpson seemed to agree, stating that waiting one more month wouldn't make much difference. "That gives us time to make changes," he said.

The approval of the new ordinance passed with Hobbs

casting the only dissenting vote. It is expected that owners of alarm systems covered by the ordinance will have four to six months to obtain the required permits.

## County Oks Ordinance For LCSWA Loan

Lincoln County Commissioners approved an ordinance authorizing a loan agreement between the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) and the New Mexico Finance Authority at the county commission meeting Tuesday, October 18.

The loan, for more than \$2,710,000 will make the construction of a proposed new waste processing facility and recycling center possible. An ordinance to secure the loan is required by the County Finance Revenue Board.

In addition to monies secured through the loan agreement, the new facility will require a dedication of the county's Environmental Services Gross Receipts Taxes (EGRT) for a period as long as up to 20 years. County EGRTs are currently committed to a bond issue that runs to 2009 and, according to Chris Mearhead of the NMFA, the LCSWA loan will take second position in utilizing those funds.

Net system revenues from LCSWA should be the primary source for repayment of the loan, with the EGRT funds held as secondary resources, but operational and maintenance costs of the facility will remain the first priority for expenditures.

## Hunter Safety Class Set For Next Week

A hunter safety class will be held Monday, October 24 through Friday, October 28 from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. each evening in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo in the commission chambers.

Anyone age 17 and under is required to participate and complete this class in order to purchase a hunting license and hunt with firearms in the state of New Mexico.

Children age 10 and younger must be accompanied by a parent/guardian.

A \$5 donation covers the cost of materials.

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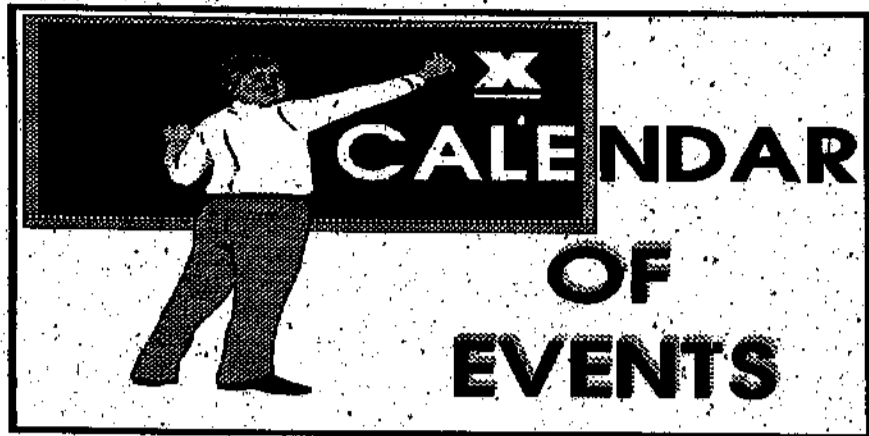

**Letters TO THE EDITOR**

**EDITOR:**

I am responding to Alan Morel's letter of October 11, 2005, attached. Mr. Morel is addressing the proposed annexation of approximately 3400 acres of land into the Town of Carrizozo.

Mr. Morel says that the proposed annexation is being pursued according to New Mexico Statutes. The annexation statute is merely the enabling requirements to document the act of annexation. The Annexation Section does not address the potential catastrophic financial consequences the proposed 3400 acre annexation would have, as proposed, upon the residents of Carrizozo.

The Town of Carrizozo does not have professional engineers and planning staff and ordinances to regulate the proper review and process of development of a large annexation as proposed, essentially a completely new city. See my attached Letter to the Editor of Lincoln County News. These minimum requirements are not being met by Dan Dattola of New Mexico Land and Ranches, Inc.

It is well recognized today that development should pay for itself and not be a burden to existing residents. Dan Dattola's proposal will most assuredly bankrupt the Town of Carrizozo. This is why the State cannot ignore the process now underway in Carrizozo. This letter to you should serve as an early warning system to become alert to a Town Council unaware of the dire financial consequences related to an ill conceived annexation proposal not based on any known market studies or investment capacity.

Dan Dattola tells the Town: "It is all or nothing." Small town leadership is always susceptible to promises of economic boom and a path to financial prosperity. Carrizozo is no exception. But prosperity rarely emanates from such promises. Every city, small and large, must always deal at arms length with developers who use intimidating language such as that noted above. Due diligence is almost financially impossible for small towns. Some prosperous towns and cities are financially able to employ professional planners and engineers trained to deal with large developments and following adopted ordinances and procedures that require national standards for phased development and annexation with accompanying development agreements protecting the town or city. Performance guarantees must also accompany this work by use of surety bonds and front-end funds deposits. National infrastructure development standards for roads, traffic control lights, water and sewer systems, parks, fire protection, flood control, school property set-asides and related impacts for new developments and annexations are lacking in Carrizozo ordinances.

The proposed 1000 plus or minus unit annexation would require, at a minimum, a \$5,000,000 investment in a sewer treatment plant alone based upon a \$10 per gallon cost, not including engineering, overhead, surveying, staking and inspections. Based upon \$35,000 to \$40,000 per acre for all infrastructure development, the total projected cost would approach \$136,000,000. Virtually no financial plans have been submitted expected of a large, well known developer such as Dell Webb.

State attorneys and engineers employed by the State are well aware that cities and towns must provide water and sewer service to all areas within the boundary of the municipality. The "all or nothing" proposal of Dattola would devastate the entire water and sewer infrastructure of the town. Dattola wants access to this infrastructure without paying the full cost of the development. The local citizens would end up paying the cost of new water and sewer infrastructure, because the unfunded development would consume the capacity of the existing system. Water and sewer rates would become unaffordable to this modest income community.

Mr. Morel's statement that the "... legislative process governing annexations with the State of New Mexico is more than adequate to ensure public participation and the necessary oversight of the process. ... that 'oversight' by various State agencies is [not] necessary or warranted." is an attempt to avoid the truth of the matter and keep state agencies at bay.

The real truth is that the State would be remiss not to be concerned and intercede with active oversight to prevent

**All or Nothing Annexation**

People seem to be in favor or against, none seem to be ambivalent about the request for annexation of thousands of acres adjoining Carrizozo. Others object to the "All or Nothing" ultimatum given when it was suggested that only a portion be annexed and developed prior to annexing the entire thousands of acres. One person said it sounded like a bully threatening to take his toys home if he didn't win.

Rather than take sides, some people are sitting back and waiting to find out what happens. Some believe decisions and promises have been made without public approval.

Eventually this will be settled, but we certainly hope the facts are presented to everyone, as they should be. And we do hope that the pertinent issues will be addressed. The cost of operating a sewer treatment plant is the main reason sewer rates will escalate for residents. There has been no announcement as to whether the new sewer treatment plant will accommodate an additional few hundred structures.

Some other concerns are that the water rights will not be deeded to the town, thus leaving the possibility that those water rights might be sold to Ruidoso or whoever. And if Ruidoso got the water instead of drilling here in the basin and pumping all the way to Ruidoso there could be a trade for Bonito water that is presently coming to Carrizozo.

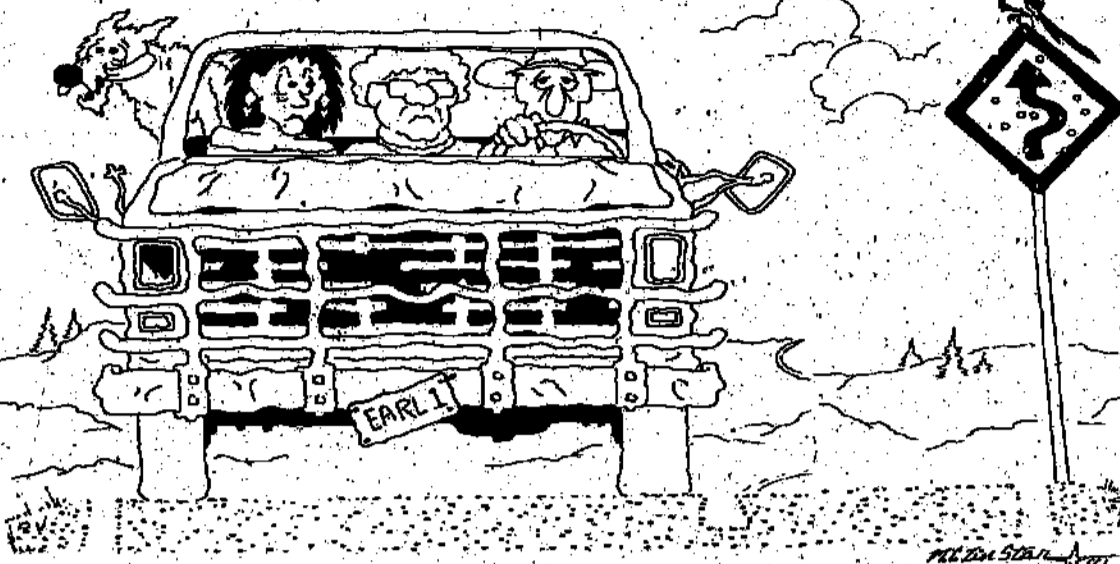
Surely that would be a problem. Bonito water is much softer than the well water Carrizozo is now using. Bonito water is also treated at the water treatment facility, where the well water is not treated and is extremely hard water. In addition, there are many old water lines in town need to be replaced. If town crews have to take care of new lines in the proposed subdivision, when will existing water lines be replaced? Or is that one of the concerns being addressed?

Using the theory that growth is necessary and will be good for the area is not valid. There is quite a battle going on about a proposed subdivision in another part of the county. If growth is good in one area of the county, why would it not be good in another portion of the county? One of the main issues there is about availability of water. Even though water is not a main concern in Carrizozo at this time, other water issues need to be taken care of before a final decision is made about annexing thousands of acres.

Reasons for concerns are not necessarily objections to the proposed annexation. Some people are asking questions that they want answered before making up their mind as to whether they are in favor or against annexing thousands of acres. These concerns are valid and should be addressed.

Evidently some people prefer not to have any of these issues explained. They dream of the spouted end results, unaware that it will take work and sacrifice to get even near those desired results. It has taken a long time for Carrizozo to get where it is today. Good things are worth waiting for.

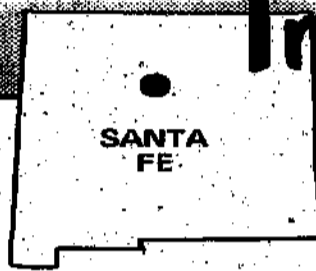

**SANTA FE** -- New Mexico's U.S. Sens. Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman are cooperating on efforts crucial to our state.

They now have legislation on the floor of the Senate prohibiting the Pentagon from withdrawing any assets from Cannon Air Force Base in Clovis until Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld has actively looked for a new mission for the base.

The fear has been that since the Defense Department wants to close Cannon, it will leave the base looking like a ghost town and use that as justification that no new mission is appropriate.

The Base Realignment and Closure Commission overrode the Pentagon's closure recommendation and directed that a new mission be sought for Cannon after its fighter wings are realigned to other bases.

Our congressional delegation took a back seat to Gov. Bill Richardson during the battle to keep Cannon open. Or at least that was the public appearance. This effort by Domenici and Bingaman should help change that perception.

Domenici and Bingaman, who are of opposite parties, but who often work together, especially on New Mexico issues, also have teamed to protect Fort Stanton's Cave's recently-discovered Snowy River Passage.

The passage is a unique continuous white crystalline calcite formation that has been mapped for two miles, so far. Scientists believe it could lead to new discoveries in areas such as water chemistry, weather trends and flood and drought cycles.

The bill calls for protection, not only of the passage, but of the land surface above it. That is sure to impact the proposed land development surrounding Fort Stanton that has been the subject of hot debate in Lincoln County.

In a related development, the state Environment Department has awarded Cannon Air Force Base its highest recognition level for excellence in its environmental efforts. It was alone in that category.

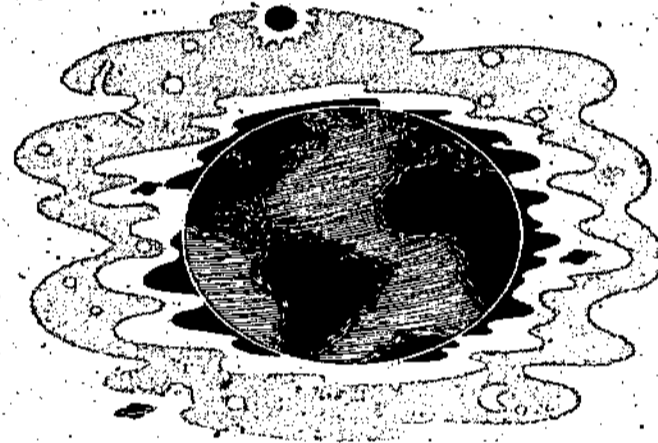
Cannon reduced its hazardous waste by 80 percent, its solvent waste by 96 percent and diverted more than 7,000 tons of reusable materials from its landfill. Environment Secretary Ron Curry says these actions also saved Cannon \$200,000.

Should this recognition cause the Pentagon to be more likely to find another mission for Cannon? Military bases are notorious for degrading their environment. The cleanup cost overruns for closed bases are a major reason why projected savings from base closures became increased costs instead.

So if Cannon is closed, cleanup costs there may not be as high. Apparently the astronomical costs of cleanup at some bases assures they will remain open forever.

New Mexico Gov. Bill Richardson and Utah Gov. Jon Huntsman have formally joined forces to promote a Western States Presidential Primary. They contend that since this is a bipartisan effort, it will have a better chance than previous efforts at a

regional primary. But they've been working behind the scenes for several months with no success.

the elementary, middle, and high school needs.

Dr. Miller also addressed the need for a comprehensive site development plan that looks five to ten years into the future.

Miller offered a list of school district-wide priorities - building upgrades and a possible study to improve heating, cooling and ventilation in all buildings, and the need for handicapped accessibility changes to some doorways and Tiger Field.

Also included in the Facilities Master Plan priority list are several architectural recommendations. Among them, the need for additional restroom facilities and replacement of part of the roof at the elementary school. A priority for the middle school is an additional computer lab while the high school is badly in need of more book shelves, cabinets and storage areas.

"The Cummins gym needs floor repair, improved ventilation and expanded restroom facilities," said Miller.

More work needs to be done to improve math and reading skills, according to statistics in the school's Educational Plan for Student Success, or EPSS. While the per-

centage of elementary students reaching proficiency in reading is 76 percent, only 54 percent are considered proficient in math and that number drops to 47 percent in the high school. The EPSS goal is to raise the numbers school district-wide by three to five percent this school year.

In other discussion, Dr. Miller reported that enrollment is down slightly from last year, primarily due to having 10 fewer kindergarten students and about 13 fewer seniors this year.

Also, a new scoreboard has been erected at Tiger Field thanks to a very generous contribution from Mr. Mike Rice.

Wednesday, October 19, is Bring Your Dad to Lunch Day at Capitan Schools, and parent-teacher conferences take place on the 20th and 21<sup>st</sup>.

More than just a physical improvement, it is an investment in education that will pay big rewards in future citizenship.

The school is only one of about three hundred throughout the state that have been built through the help of the PWA and WPA.

Through WPA, Gov. Clyde Tingley initiated a program of rural school construction and improvements that extended into every district in the state. It is a distinct contribution to the educational system of New Mexico.

The interest the governor has taken in seeing that these projects are undertaken has made it possible in many communities for the children to have a decent class room for the first time.

## Camp Capitan

Four months of intensive training in cooking, sewing, sanitation and various crafts are available to New Mexico girls at Camp Capitan, which reopens November 5.

Attendance at the camp is restricted to 100 girls between the ages of 18 and 25 from families certified for relief. All county NYA supervisors and county relief and security authorities can take applications for the camp now.

Camp Capitan is located in the Capitan mountains, 15 miles from Capitan, in an abandoned CCC camp. Three barrack remain for the girls' use, all in good condition and each in charge of a house mother.

Situated eight miles from Fort Stanton marine hospital, the girls are taken there for medical care when necessary. The hospital medical staff cooperates most generously.

In addition to lodging, food and laundry while attending camp, the girls are given a monthly allowance of \$5.00 each.

Beside their regular classes they are allowed freedom to develop any craft which interests them. Tinwork, colcha embroidery, wool spinning, dying and weaving, making jackets and moccasins from sheep pelts are but a few of the vocational opportunities open to them.

All work in cooking and sewing is taught with the limited equipment to which they are accustomed, in order that they may learn the widest use of simple household articles.

Camp Capitan still has a few vacancies for which application may be made.

## Labor for Chavez

Belen, NM, Oct. 22 -- Labor, organized and unorganized, now faces a brighter future than ever before in America's history, Senator Dennis Chavez declared at a Democratic rally here Thursday night.

Addressing a crowd that included a large percentage of union workmen, Chavez pointed to the several major labor reforms enacted under the New Deal Administration.

"President Roosevelt is the best friend labor ever had in the White House," the Senator said. "And the Wagner National Labor Relations act will prove of more benefit to organized workers than any other law we've ever had on the books."

"The President recognized the fact that the labor's right to organize and bargain collectively was nothing but a mere theory unless it was enacted into law Congress agreed, and so we find that right guaranteed under the Wagner Act. Would any candidate, Democrat or Republican, dare declare for the repeal of that law?"

"The Social Security Act provides State-Federal pensions for our needy aged, aid to needy dependent children, and to our blind. And soon it will provide retirement pensions for our aged workers in most major industries. Is that 'radical' or 'un-American' I ask you."

"Then too there's the Railroad Retirement Act, under which our railway workers are assured a competence in the autumn of their lives. I challenge anyone to criticize that law."

Chavez commended the action of State officials of New Mexico in co-operating with

# Indigent Care Alive and Well in Lincoln County

In a memorandum to the Lincoln County Commissioners dated October 13, county manager Tom Stewart indicated that the county's indigent health care program is financially sound.

At the county commission meeting Tuesday, October 18, Stewart admitted that he had a little case of the "the fits" after reviewing the medical claims for September, which were higher than average.

Rhonda Burrows, Indigent Healthcare Administrator, reported to the county commissioners Tuesday that there is no discernable pattern to high and low months, but the annual cost of indigent health care claims seem to stay about

the same, averaging approximately \$400,000 per year.

Larry Mulligan of the Glencoe Fire Department asked what percentage of the program's costs are attributable to the Lincoln County Detention Center inmates. According to Stewart, inmate medical costs account for about 10 percent of the program's budget; 15 percent if psychiatric services are factored in.

Burrows further explained that payments to out-of-county hospitals eat up a lot of funds and many health care providers favor eliminating those reimbursements. "Otero County currently does not reimburse out-of-county services," she said.

Jim Gibson, Lincoln County

Medical Center Administrator, said that the county relies heavily on the ability to ship

patients out-of-county. "Fortunately, we ship more than we get," Gibson said. "More of our trauma patients go to El Paso now due to overcrowding at other hospitals."

## Corona Lending Library Gets New Children's Books

The Corona Lending Library qualified to receive to a matching grant of \$1,000 from the Libri Foundation by hosting a community-wide yard sale in June 2005 that netted over \$500 for the li-

brary. As a result, the library was able to acquire 85 brand new hardcover children's books which are now on display at the library. These books will complement the Corona Public Schools library as, thanks to Day Moss, each book has received the appropriate Accelerated Reading level.

Approximately three-fifths of the books are non-fiction or informational for grades 6 - 8 while another one quarter are fiction for grades 4 - 6 and the remaining are books for younger readers. Informational books include many U.S. history as well as technology, the fine arts, and other cultures. Fiction books include many Newberry award winners.

These additions greatly expanded and updated the library's collection for young adults. Whether you are a young reader or an older one, these books are gorgeous and the staff of the Corona Lending Library encourage all to stop by, look them over, and check out a few!

The Libri Foundation is a 15-year old organization dedicated to providing children's books to small rural public libraries. Awards are made via matching grants which reward

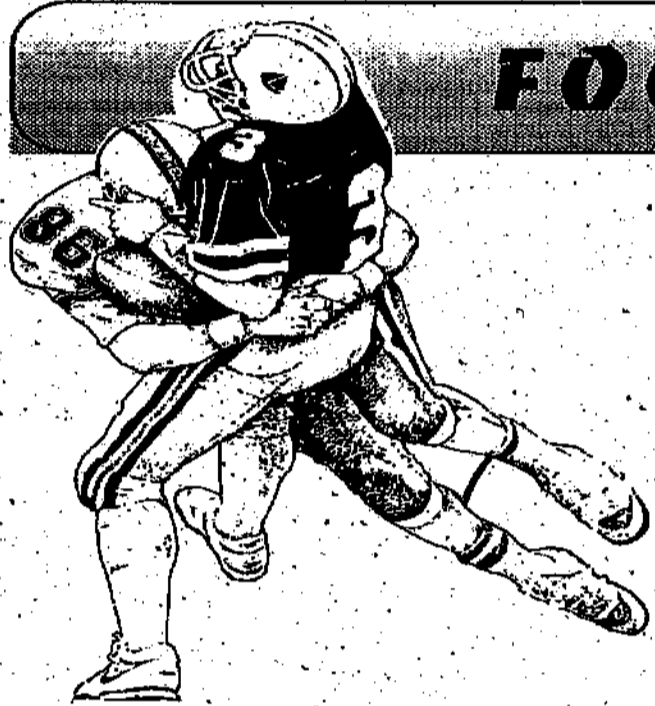

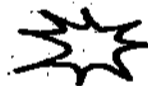

Bullets of Justice

EDDIE GREEN

Eddie Green, St. Paul gunman and bank robber, who had the underworld distinction of active membership in the Dillinger and the Karpis-Barker gangs at the same time, invited death -- and got it.

Circumstances surrounding the fatal shooting of Green by federal bureau of investigation agents, who set a trap for him on April 3, 1934, at a house in St. Paul, were the subject of an under-cover inquiry recently by secret service agents.

The "ill-advised" secret service activities apparently were prompted by recurring rumors that G-men fired at Green without knowing his identity, that they only learned who he was by questioning him on his death-bed at the hospital, that Green was "mowed down" mercilessly and without warning and that he was a "minor hoodlum" who deserved better treatment.

Well, let's look at the record.

With the co-operation of Director Hoover of the F.B.I., I have gone thoroughly over the bureau's heretofore confidential files on the Green case and, I believe, have found the answer -- officially -- to the questions which puzzled curious secret service men.

In the first place, a study of the criminal record of Edward Green -- alias Eugene Green, George Graham, Charles Ryan, George Green, Fred Rogge, Frederick Riley, Fred Graham and Eugene Riley -- fails to support the rumor that he was just a bad boy who became involved innocently with big-time killers.

He started out as a small-timer -- his first sentence having been served in the house of correction for grand larceny, but he graduated into such select ganland company as that represented by Frank Nash, cause of the Kansas City massacre "trigger men"; Alvin Karpis and the Barker brothers of kidnaping note, and, finally, John Dillinger.

He robbed banks with the Karpis-Barker gang and with the Dillinger gang.

His home was the haven to which members of both gangs would flee in time of trouble, the "post office" through which they received their mail, the clearing house

through which they kept in touch with one another, the headquarters where many desperate crimes were plotted.

At the time of his death he was custodian of much of the heavy artillery composing the arsenal of the Dillinger mob.

A second point supplied by the records is that Hoover's men knew exactly whom they were shooting when they opened fire. They had set their trap for Green and no one else.

A third point is that Green was shot only as a final resort -- as he answered a command to halt by starting to run and reaching for his hip pocket.

That instinctive, menacing gesture was a fatal one - it was the signal for the agents to fire, or seek safety and let another gangster escape without so much as a struggle.

Actually, that impulsive sweep of Green's hand toward his gun pocket was a futile move. He had left his guns at home -- and it proved to be quite an arsenal, when G-men found it later.

The fact that he lived for eight days after his shooting and was conscious until a few hours before his death belies reports that he was "riddled with bullets."

This was the "bad boy" whose death appears to have aroused the sympathies of some critics of the G-men.
