

Ruidoso Downs GRT From State Increases

· Ruidoso Downs City Administrator John Waters updated city councilors at the November 28 council meeting of the Gross Receipt Tax (GRT) the city has received from the state financial office, including the adjusted numbers after receiving a "rather large check in the amount of \$375,000.00."

Using the gross receipts tax chart, Waters compared the amount of that check to the amount received in the previous month's check from the finance office. Waters pointed out the deposit of the check into the city account brought the annual cumulative GRT account to within five percent loss over the previous year during the same billing period. Making reference to the percentage comparisons in relation to the last month's deposit. Waters made the observation that it looks better to be five percent down than 22 1/2 percent last month. "I am somewhat happy but certainly we are not where we need to be and we are even a full percent down of where we were last year. Our lodgers tax is up. Ruidoso's gross receipt tax is up; there is really no reason why we should be down a full percentage point."

Waters said "We have asked the Municipal League and the Taxation and Revenue Department to review how grocery gross receipts tax exemptions are reported, and make sure from now on they are reported properly."

Ruidoso Downs firefighter Travis Atwell addressed the councilors about two upcoming "live fire" training exercises being scheduled when weather permits. Of the two training fires scheduled to be set so the fire fighters can train putting them out, one will be a small to medium pile of slash, and the other is a single wide trailer. A controlled fire will be set inside the trailer, and the fire department will respond, and extinguish the fire. Once the training exercise is completed the trailer will be burnt to the ground. Atwell assured the councilors, "Everything will be under controlled conditions." Part of the controlled conditions criteria includes "Winds will be less than 12 miles per hour."

Councilors voted and approved the planning and zoning commission recommendation to allow Bio-Grind, Inc. to operate a grinding and composting business in the Santa Claus Ranch subject to

PRC Approves Zia Gas Co. Purchase of C

New Mexico Public Regulation Commission on December 6 unanimously

adopted the order for Zia Natural Gas to purchase the Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas Company (CCNG) distribution system.

During their formal meeting December 6, PRC Commissioner David King (Dist. 2 which includes Capitan) said he strongly favored the order, and he made the motion for approval, PRC Commissioner E. Shirley Baca (Dist. 5 which includes Carrizozo) seconded the motion and said she understood that the communities

involved are in favor of the sale and that CCNG customers should experience a reduction in rates of up to 20 per-

Information provided showed that once Zia acquires CCNG, rates for CCNG customers should decrease 14 percent for residential, 17 percent for small commercial and 20 percent for larger commercial, based on November 2005 cost of gas.

The cost of service rates for Zia Gas will not change in the near future because of its purchase of CCNG. The only changes in rates will be due to

the actual cost of gas.

With approval of the final order, Natural Gas Processing/Zia Natural Gas is authorized to own and operate the CCNG system providing natural gas service to Capitan. Carrizozo and areas of Fort Stanton, Loma Grande, Nogal and Sweetwater Hills under Zia's existing rates.

According to the order, within 30 days of the closing of Zia Gas Co.'s purchase of CCNG gas distribution system, at the bid price of \$250,000. Zia must file with the PRC copies of all applicable documents of the transac-

tion. An allocation of the depreciated net book value of CCNG must also be reflected in Zia's 2005 Annual Report to the PRC.

Notice of Zia Natural Gas Co.'s application for expedited acquisition of CCNG was provided to the CCNG and Zia Natural Gas custom-

> Higher than 4.04 percent pay raises were also recommended for county information specialist Connie Stone and planning sirector Curt Temple. Stewart said Stone has been "overwhelmed with the rural addressing requirements," and has proposed a \$6,390 increase in her current salary of \$23,953. According to Stewart, Stone also helps maintain the county's website and expedites the manufacture of all street signs. Stone works with the GPS (Global Positioning Satellite) system to accurately record the location of new homes within the county and has attended conferences to try to keep-up with what's going on, Stewart said. Along with the 911 rural addressing protocols, Stone will be asked to face the challenges of future tracking of computer-based emergency communications.

> Stewart proposed supervisory-level pay for Stone, as he is also recommending the county add a new position of addressing technician to assist her The new technician would handle the duties connected with the master street addressing guide and be available to answer street-related questions over the telephone.

Stewart recommended that county planning director Curt Temple be elevated to a supervisory position due to the hiring of a new code enforcement officer who will work out of Temple's office. Under Stewart's proposal, Temple's pay would increase from \$25,405 to \$30,343. The permit revenue generated by the county's new alarm ordinance is expected to offset most of the cost of the code enforcement officer position.

Stewart has also recommended a three-step increase in pay for Rose Ann Romero, deputy treasurer. Her title would be changed to mobile home specialist, and duties will include file maintenance and field work related to the collection of delinquent property taxes. According to Stewart, Romero is expected to become a state vehicle identification number inspector. The suggested pay raise would bring Romero's salary to \$21,871 per year.

Regarding the manager's office, Stewart recommended a three-step increase for Charlene Schlarb, citing increased responsibility for the finance officer and an attempt to bring her salary in line with the county's purchasing officer. The recommended increase would raise the annual pay of the finance officer from \$32.854 to \$34.854.

Another recommendation was to increase the salary of the chief deputy to the Sheriff to that equal to 95 percent of the Sheriff's salary. That position would see an increase from \$41,080 to \$42,883.

Lincoln County Road Superintendent Albert Hernandez, after 20 years as a county employee, is currently earning \$38,473. Stewart's proposed. six percent increase to Hernandez's salary would bring that figure to \$40,815. The county's former road superintendent, who left the position in 1995, was earning \$42,697. Stewart also proposed a two-step increase for the county road secretary.

County commissioners approved a 4.04 percent increase for all classified county employees, effective December 3, but withheld any decisions regarding the proposed higher increases for some employees. Those increases will be discussed again at the county commissioners' December 20th meeting.

Zia Natural Gas Says, **Lower Gas Costs for Now**

Zia Natural Gas Company announces that it is lowering the gas cost factor effective for customers' bill rendered on or after December 1, 2005, due to the negotiation of new gas supply contracts. Al-

though gas prices continue to fluctuate and are forecast to continue increasing, Zia's gas cost factor will remain in effect until September of 2006. For its Lincoln County system, the gas cost will be \$0.9176/ccf, down from the

previous cost of \$1.0557/ccf. Zia does not mark-up its gas supply cost in any manner, and the cost is a straight pass-through of the price paid to its suppliers.

Zia continues to encourage its customers to winterize their homes and conserve energy by lowering their thermostats when not at home.

The Truth **About Saint Nicholas**

For hundreds of years children everywhere have loved Santa Claus. And no wonder, for Santa Claus is a real person, as real as Captain John Smith, General Grant, or our beloved George Washington, only his real name was Saint Nicholas. Ages ago the Germans called him Sankt Nic'laus, which their children turned into Sankt Claus -- the Santa Claus of today.

Saint Nicholas, the patron saint of children, was a Greek who lived in Asia Minor about sixteen hundred years ago, and his life was so spotless and his good works so enduring that he is even now beloved in all lands. Many chuches have been named for him:

The parents of Saint Nicholas were rich and respected and lived in a city called Patara at the southwest corner of Asia Minor. Long they dwelt together, childless, but at length their prayers were answered and the little son Nicholas was sent to cheer their loneliness. It is said that from the very first he was the wonder. of all friends and neighbors, so different was he from other children of his age.

At school he was one of the brightest and best scholars, and so great was his love for the church, and so anxious was he to serve Christ, his master in all things, that his father and mother willingly allowed him to study for the priesthood. Thus it came that he was sent to the home of his uncle, Bishop Nicholas of Patara, under whose loving care he was instructed in all the wisdom of the church as known in that

And now we come to the story of how Nicholas, from the kindness of his heart, first brought gifts to children while they lay asleep. It so happened that in the city there dwelt a very good and learned man with his three young daughters. This man had at one time been very rich, but by taking bad advice from one he thought his friend, lost all his wealth. Now he was bitterly poor, and as he was too proud to beg, the family had no longer a crust of bread to eat. Good Nicholas heard of this and his kind heart was greatly troubled. So he filled a purse with gold and went by night to the poor man's house though he had no idea how he should deliver his gift without being seen. The moon was shining brightly and by its light he saw a trellis which was built against the house for a grapevine to grow upon. This he climbed, and peeping through the window saw the three hungry children asleep on their bed, their cheeks still wet with tears. It made his heart ache to see their distress and tears came into his own eyes. Gently dropping the purse of gold on

the floor he climbed again to the ground.

The next morning the poor man rejoiced greatly when his daughters brought him the purse of gold, and for a time the family's troubles were at an end.

When the money was at last all spent, Nicholas again climbed the trellis by night and dropped a second purse, and later a third. You can fancy how astonished the poor man was at his unexpected help, and after the second purse he determined to watch for the generous giver. This he did an the third time caught Nicholas in the very act. The poor man fell upon his knees and thanked him with tears for his act of money, but Nicholas earnestly begged him never to tell who had befriended him.

The Carrizozo high school yearbook staff consists of five sophomores. The yearbook class is made up of two sections: yearbook and journalism.



The scenario started when a press release-stated that the nation Christmas tree had been cut in New Mexico and would be making several stops throughout New Mexico its way to Washington, D.C.

Capitan Lions Club **Proposes Youth Center**

Club at the Capitan Village Council meeting on December 5, Richard Rumpf asked the council to consider the club's request to lease the old fire station on Smokey Bear Boulevard. Rumpf said the primary use of the station, as envisioned by the Lions, would be as a youth center and a headquarters for the Lions Club.

We have 30 charter members in the Capitan Lions and there are 37 clubs in the southern part of the state with 900 members we can draw on to help with this project," Rumpf told the council. The Lions are willing to lease the building in its current condition and the club has insurance from Lions Club Interna-tional that would cover any liabilities. "We feel we have the resources, through the clubs in the state and Lions International, to do the repairs, paint, fix-up," Rumpf said. He told the council that Lions International would provide grants to bring the facility's restrooms up-to--

"We want to be good part-ners with the village," Rumpf said. He suggested the facility could be used for community fund-raising events and would be available to other groups

that might want to use it.

Speaking on behalf of the poitan Smokey Bear Lions

Regarding the youth center activities, Rumpf told the council that the Lions would like to have some high school students on the board of directors so they would have input. "We'll have a fairly strict set of rules," Rumpf told the council, "kids want a safe place just to visit, just to be kids." He suggested the Lions might offer a venue for art students from all of the county's school systems. "There's not any real venue for them to get their stuff out in the public, and there's some incredible stuff out there by these kids," Rumpf said.
"We've talked to Smokey

Bear Park about using the property in back for art shows and other events," Rumpf re-ported. The Lions Club is also in discussion with the Lincoln County Tourism Council about moving the annual arts and crafts fair, Arts in the Orchard, from Lincoln to Capi-tan. He told councilors that the Lions had fund raisers planned for 2006 that he hoped would generate a fair amount of money for the

community.

Trustee George Tippin expressed support for the proposal, but reminded Rumpf that a fair-market-value lease for the property would be required, so as not to violate

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

SANTA FE -- OK, this will almost definitely be the last time we talk about the New Mexico tree that is now standing on the west lawn of the U.S. Capitol. Unless, of course, something else unusual transpires.

The two trees from New Mexico forests that have stood on Capitol Hill during the holiday season have both had some very unique experiences.

In 1991, when the U.S. Forest Service chose the Carson National Forest for the tree donation, the people of Taos decided it had to be a live tree. The many problems associated with that project resulted in that being the only year a live tree was chosen in July. Everything was on schedule.

But then a U.S. court ruling in

California narrowed the exceptions to when trees could be cut without a public comment period. Unsure about the extent of the court's ruling, the Forest Service scheduled a public comment period for the New Mexico tree.

And then the hand-wringing began. What if there were objections and the tree could never make it to Washington? Our state's two U.S. senators became involved. Following the requisite political posturing by all sides, the situation cooled. The tree was cut and on its way to the Capitol. But first, it had to make 18 stops

around the state, while on life-support. from a water pump. The tree was celebrated, serenated and worshipped by bands, choruses, parades and adoring crowds.

Hundreds of spectators crowded the enclosed truck carrying the tree, eager to take home a pine cone or even a needle as a keepsake of the momentous experience. "You'd think we were transporting gold," observed the truck driver.

After leaving New Mexico, the tree made many more stops along its way to Washington. Forest Service personnel report that at every stop people wanted to know more about the tree and the state that provided it.

The trailer hauling the tree had the words "Capitol Holiday Tree 2005

- a Gift from the Land of Enchantment" emblazoned across it. The tree even stopped traffic as motorists got out of their cars to take pictures. "People just wanted to be a part of it," said Forest Service spokesperson Delores Maese.

The public response makes it appear all the fuss is worth it. Getting the tree chosen, but, loaded, transported, and decorated consumes much time and money, considering there is a permanent tree at the other end of the Mall, known as the National Christmas Tree, which is decorated every

But that tree is administered by the White House and far be it from the executive and legislative branches of government to get together on a project, even if it is the season to be

Congress could plant its own tree on its spacious grounds and save a lot of work. But if the trip through the United States creates the stir the Forest Service claims, maybe it is worth it.

One final surprise was still in

store for the tree as it reached the Capitol on November 28. On the day of its arrival, the national sysbol that had traveled from New Mexico labeled as the "Capitol Holiday Tree" was re-named the "Capitol Christmas by House Speaker Dennis Hastert.

The word "Christmas" was dropped from its name last decade. No one is quite sure when or by whom. It is assumed the reason may have been political correctness.

But some contend that Congress was upset that the White House's "National Christmas Tree" received more attention. And maybe making the Capitol's tree inclusive of all holiday events might attract other religions and cultures to its tree.





PRC Commissioners directed the Insurance Division of the PRC to investigate and compile data on auto insurance claims and other such information to determine whether the state program to reduce the number of uninsured motorists on the highways has affected auto insurance rates, and to report whether insurers are passing along the savings to consum-

According to information from the NM Motor Vehicle Division, the percentage of uninsured motorists in New Mexico declined from one of the worst in the nation (33 percent) in 2002 to the national average (14 percent) in 2005 due to the success of the Motor Vehicle Division's "Drive Insured" program.

anti-donation laws. Tippin also referred to some village equipment still stored in the old station, and the need to find another location

to house that equipment.
Trustee Bill Martin questioned whether or not there was enough off-street parking at the facility to be in compliance with village ordinances. "I think we need to move forward on it," Martin said, "but we have some considerations we need to look at.

Members of the Lions Club agreed to meet with the Capitan Planning Commission for further discussion, and return to the next village council meeting with a review and analyses of how the proposed arrangement can go forward.

In other business, Martin recapped a November meeting between himself, Ed Tinsley, Capitan Trustee Bobbi Shearer and David Cox of the Capitan Water Department. Martin addressed the issue of a proposed water agreement between the Village of Capi-tan and Tinsley, in which the village would provide treated water to subdivisions west of town in exchange for an additional 10 acre feet of water rights from Tinsley.

We were continuing our search to determine if this is a feasible operation, for the village as well as Mr. Tinsley," Martin reported. "The original plan was to determine how the water is going to flow from the village to Mr. Tins-ley's proposed development, and now that's changed somewhat. We are now throwing in the northern Capitan group outside the village limits," he said. "One of our major concerns is going to be the cost factor of bringing the proposed water line all the way to Mr. Tinsley's property, along Dawson Road (formerly School Road) Martin said that would be a major under-taking both financially and logistically, but that he and Shearer certainly want to proceed.

One of the first issues that, need to be addressed, Martin said, was confirming that the extra-territorial residents who asked for treated water are willing to buy into the project.

We want to make sure that people realize this is going to be a costly operation if it's approved by the village," he

"One of our concerns is, do we have a sufficient number of people who are interested in signing on to this project and providing the money up-front to help us offset the cost," Martin said. "We need. a good, sound engineering study before proceeding any

farther." Speaking for himself and Shearer, Martin proposed in-viting all interested parties to a workshop to learn about the project and its estimated costs. He suggested the council schedule the workshop after the first of the year, so they had time to ensure accurate data was prepared. Martin reminded the council that before the village takes official action, the proposal must be referred to the Capitan Water Advisory Board.

"Once the water advisory board is in a position to tackle this, it should be shifted to them, with myself and trustee Shearer stepping out of the process," he said.

Trustees agreed to announce the date of the informational workshop at a special council meeting on December 19.

The village's water advisory board has one position to fill to bring its members to five. A notice of the opening will be posted in the next Capitan water bill. All board members must reside within the Capitan

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
