

# Town Considers Drug Paraphernalia Ordinance

The town of Carrizozo is now losing out on income from fines imposed on individuals in possession of drug paraphernalia.

To capture some of the fine money that now goes to the state, the town of Carrizozo is considering adopting a Drug Paraphernalia Ordinance.

Carrizozo town council

will hold a public hearing on the proposed drug paraphernalia ordinance at their May 10 meeting. Trustees at their regular meeting Tuesday, April 12, authorized the public hearing on the proposed ordinance.

Police chief Mike Howard said town trustees had considered a paraphernalia ordinance once before but it did not pass. Howard said the

proposed ordinance reads "almost word for word" from the state statutes that control the possession, manufacture or selling of drug paraphernalia. Now anytime someone is arrested for drug paraphernalia in town, that arrest and subsequent fine will go to magistrate court which is operated by the state. "If it is a city ordinance, it will go into our municipal court and

the city gets the revenue."

The mayor said the town lost a lot of revenue from (the state removing the) grocery gross receipt tax. "We need to make up that revenue and this is one way to do it," the mayor added.

An audience member recalled that when the proposed ordinance was brought to trustees before, some town residents were upset about

the items like blenders were listed as being potential paraphernalia. Town clerk Leann Wehbrecht said if there is no illegal drug or substance residue in the blender it would

not be considered paraphernalia.

Wehbrecht said people should not object to the proposed ordinance, because it



## Sierra Blanca Brewery To Build In Industrial Park

Town Council Says, "You Choose Location."

Sierra Blanca Brewery which has been a part of Carrizozo's business community since 1996 will soon be expanding to meet the expanding demand for their micro-brewed beers and sodas and to produce beer for the Albuquerque Isotopes baseball and cider for Santa Fe Cider Co.

Carrizozo town trustees at their meeting Tuesday, April 12, heard a request from Rich Weber, owner of Sierra Blanca Brewery, for the town

to allow him use of a lot in the Industrial Park for a new brewery. Weber said his lease at the current brewery location on 12th Street is up in 2006 and they are now making plans for an expanded brewery in a new location. From the first year of production with 400 barrels of beer, Sierra Blanca Brewery now produces 2,400 barrels. In March of this year, the brewery experienced a 48 percent increase in production from what was brewed in March 2004, Weber said.

After speaking with town officials about use of a lot at the Industrial Park, Weber said he surveyed the lots and decided on the lot next to the cemetery to construct a 15,000 square foot brewery, "to start with." Weber said his company also plans to purchase the old auto parts building at E. Ave and Highway 380 for the brewery's retail sales and tasting shop

on one side with the other side to house a restaurant that is currently operating in town.

Sierra Blanca Brewery now produces nine different beers and two sodas. The company is looking to double production and hiring up to three additional employees. "The labor pool here is good, and our employees like it here because of the low cost of living," Weber said.

The mayor said Weber spoke to him about possible use of the Industrial Park, and he sent them out to pick a lot. "I say give them what they want," the mayor said.

Trustee Wes Lindsay said he also spoke with Weber and he agreed the brewery could choose wherever they wanted at the Industrial Park.

The mayor then instructed Weber on the process of securing a lot at the Industrial Park. Once all documents (SEE PAGE 10)

## Fire Insurance in Carrizozo Decreases

Sam Chavez Resigns as DMV Clerk

Town of Carrizozo will take applications for the motor vehicle clerk from the Town of Carrizozo until 4 p.m. Friday, April 22.

Carrizozo trustees at their meeting Tuesday, April 12, accepted the resignation of Sam Chavez. In his letter of resignation, Chavez wrote "after careful consideration and with great regret I write this letter of resignation." Chavez wrote that he recently was offered a position as paralegal with a prominent

attorney in the Ruidoso area. "I feel that this is a great opportunity for me to gain insight into the legal system, as well as possibly going back to school in the near future," Chavez continued. "My last day of employment will be April 29."

"Leann, I greatly appreciate the kindness you and Margaret have shown me during my stay with the Town of Carrizozo, and I wish you continued happiness in the new city hall," Chavez wrote to Town clerk Leann Wehbrecht and deputy clerk Margaret LaBelle.

Wehbrecht said the notice of the position will be posted in various locations throughout town and will be published twice in an area newspaper. All applications will be due into town hall by 4 p.m. Friday, April 22.

Applications are available at town hall during regular business hours.

Trustees also approved up to \$1,400 for carpeting for the Carrizozo Heritage Museum. Museum officer Rene Burton said they recently finished the back room for the railroad display and wanted to carpet instead of tiling the floor. Of three quotes, The Home Depot of Alamogordo offered the lowest bid of \$1,250 for 102 yards of mid grade commercial carpet and installation.

Trustee Van Shamblin and the mayor both reported on the recent designation of Padens Drug Store (Roys Gift Gallery) onto the National Register of Historic Place, the second historic building in the town to be added to the national register. The Women's Club building is also on the list.

Trustee David LaFave reported that the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department just received notice from the State Fire Marshal that the town's ISO rating has dropped from 8 to 6. The drop in rating will result in a decrease in fire insurance of \$100 to \$250 a year. LaFave added.

The fire department had to undergo additional training, upgrading pumps to specs; fixing all equipment; checking town water systems and hydrants; response time, etc. in order to obtain the better insurance rating. "We have been working on this at least two years," LaFave said.

## Former Game Dept. Supervisor Pleads To Fraud In Elk Case

Ron Porter, a retired New Mexico Game and Fish Dept. supervisor, entered a no contest plea on April 5 to charges of attempted fraud for luring elk to obtain a depredation hunting permit in December 2003.

Porter made the plea before Judge Jerry Ritter in Alamogordo.


According to a press release from 12th Judicial District Attorney Scot Key, affidavits in the case indicate that Porter used mechanical

feeders, elk feed, hay and water to attract elk from the Colin McMillan Three Rivers Ranch onto a desolate desert property that Porter managed. When the elk did migrate to the property to eat and drink, Porter filed damage reports with the NM Game and Fish Dept. in an effort to obtain valuable elk hunting permits that Porter could sell to out-of-state hunters looking to hunt in New Mexico.

DA Key argued that Porter with his specialized knowledge of the Depredation Permit system, attempted to benefit from the very nuisance that he, in fact, created.

Judge Ritter sentenced Porter to one year of probation with a \$1,000 fine and ordered Porter not to hunt, fish or guide for one year and to surrender any current licenses that he possesses and to cooperate with the Department if they choose to administratively suspend any of his New Mexico hunting privileges.

"The old depredation system had become a rubber stamp approval process that many had learned to take advantage of, including Porter," Key said. "The governor's office and the Game and Fish Department have tightened up the procedures so that permits are more properly awarded to ranchers whom we have suffered losses and damages."

# C'zozo Chamber Supports Special Olympics Team

The Lincoln County Special Olympics team, based out of Carrizozo, is currently practicing for their summer sport, bocce ball, which is lawn bowling, in anticipation of the state Special Olympics in Albuquerque in May.

The Special Olympics team members and their coaches visited Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce during its meeting Tuesday, April 12. They reported on their activities and requested permission to sell refreshment at the July 4 chamber barbecue at the fireworks display.

Team coaches Fran Altieri, Becky Sanchez and Cynthia Morales said Special Olympics were started in 1963 by Eunice Shriver and has grown from 1,000 participants to 1.2 million participants from 150 countries in 2004.

Altieri said the mission of Special Olympics is to provide year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for people eight years of age and older with

intellectual disabilities (mentally challenged), giving them continuing opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community. The vision of Special Olympics is to bring people with intellectual disabilities into larger society so they can be accepted.

The Lincoln County Special Olympics team competes in bowling in the winter, Altieri said. Now they are practicing for bocce ball, which is lawn bowling, to compete in the area games in Carlsbad on Saturday, April 16. The team will travel to Albuquerque to compete in bocce ball in the state Special Olympics in May.

All expenses for the team are paid by donations and money from fund raising activities. Altieri said. She said the team is planning a yard sale soon to be held in the parking lot of Pizzazzo. Also they will sell refreshments at the July 4

chamber barbecue at Carrizozo park prior to the fireworks display.

Altieri said a Ruidoso Lions club provides support. She then requested the chamber help sponsor the team. Chamber members unanimously approved a motion to donate \$250 to the Special Olympics team.

Saturday, June 4 is White Oaks Miners' Day. Event organizer George Tippin reported to the chamber that so far nine vendors have confirmed as well as Mark Remington blues musician and Dwayne Bond who plays 1880s piano. Tippin said he has contacted the New Mexico Institute of Mines to request they bring a mining display.

New to Miners' Day this year are the Ore Cart race and the 1880s Carnival with old fashioned games. The ore cart race will feature any four wheeled non motorized cart carrying buckets of wa-

ter to and fro and whoever fills the tub the fastest wins.

The Special Olympics team will operate one of the old fashioned carnival booths, and Tippin is offering other games to non-profit groups at no cost. The event is also looking for individuals who would be willing to play the "temperance team" who will charge into the "saloon" to remove their spouses and others for drinking hard liquor.

Miners' Day has a website, accessible by typing in White Oaks Miners Day on any search engine. The site is also linked to the Carrizozo website. The site lists the confirmed vendors and their items for sale.

There will be no barbecue at Miners Day but there will be food vending.

Carrizozo Art League will be having its first ever Carrizozo Art League Studio Tour on Saturday, May 14.

Gail Majors reported on the first event for the Carrizozo Chamber Ambassadors, the Gallery 408 opening on Saturday, April 9. Majors said there were about 250 people at the opening reception, and the chamber provided a plant and participated in a ribbon cutting.


Three chamber members were appointed to review the chamber scholarship applications submitted by Carrizozo High School graduating seniors. The applications are due into the high school counselor by May 16.

# The American Plan

The fiftieth anniversary of Lincoln's death found a Virginian in the White House and an ex-Confederate soldier from Louisiana sitting as Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

No voice of sectionalism is anywhere raised to question the honor, integrity, and service of these men. Could anything have seemed more incredible to the grief and bitterness of fifty years ago? Could anything more vividly prove the unity of our nation? Lincoln may not have been "the typical American", but he did live out certain qualities of justice and fair dealing which his countrymen have always responded to in the long run. "Gentle, plain, just, and resolute", in Walt Whitman's immortal words, his spirit is not dead in the land he loved.

And the lesson of his life is plain for every people that cares to learn. The oppressed and wrangling races of Austria, the hating cutthroats of the Balkans, the tyrants and victims of Europe all the way from Aelsingfors to the Golden Horn can have peace whenever they will let other men lead their own lives in honor and in freedom under the law.

Despite anything we may say in haste, in partisanship or in despair, that, and nothing else, is the American plan, and by it our country will endure.

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# The Mexican Situation

Peace in Mexico is, apparently, so far in the future that it would be foolish to predict an early result.

General Villa, whose meteoric career, has astounded the western world, has met with a decisive defeat, if any faith whatever is to be placed in reports, during the past week at the hands of the Carrancistas under Obregon. This does not necessarily mean his elimination, as he is again marshaling his forces preparatory to the renewal of the conflict; but even his admirers realize the difficulties he is laboring under, in the face of a disastrous defeat, and feel that his star is waning, unless -- and there is the rub -- he can recover lost ground and the confidence of his troops by a sharp, decisive and overwhelming victory.

From the stand point of the NEWS the defeat and possible elimination of Villa is to be regretted. He represented, according to our belief, the best means of an ultimate solution of the Mexican problem. To him we looked for a strong hand to quell the disturbances, to restore peace and when attained, to be guided by proper advice in the formation of a stable government. We do not say this in a spirit of adoration for the man, but as a just tribute to his accomplishments -- accomplishments, when the difficulties under which he has labored are considered, mark him, untutored except in the hard school of experience and bandit though he was, as the biggest man in the Mexican republic today.

There is little hope, so far as we are able to see, of peace should Carranza finally triumph. The aged first shief is too vacillating, lacks progressive ideas and, with all, too bombastic and self-centered, too far removed in his ideas from the real interests of his people. Temporary success will surely make him arrogant, and Mexico has already had its share of that class of rulers. Carranza's victory only means confusion worse confounded; and prospects for peace are far from encouraging.


The race issue promises to be more prominent in the next campaign in this state than the political issue. This is to be regretted, but hte fact is too evident to be ignored.

That Jap scare that the Californians tried to pull on Uncle Sam has failed to materialize. A careful search by an American gunboat failed to disclose the presence of Japanese on the Mexican coast.

is already in state law. "And people complain about drug usage in town, but they wouldn't pass an ordinance against paraphernalia," she added.

The proposed ordinance defines "drug paraphernalia"; prohibits its use, possession and other circumstances of drug paraphernalia, including manufacture, sale or delivery of, prohibiting the advertisement of drug paraphernalia and provides for civil forfeiture of all drug paraphernalia and establishes a penalty for violation.

"Drug paraphernalia" is defined as "all equipment, products, utensils, mechanisms and materials of any kind which are used, intended for use, or designed for use, in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance as defined in the Controlled Substance Act (SS30-31-1 to 30-31-40, NMSA 1978).

The definition section of the proposed ordinance lists

12 subsections with examples of "paraphernalia" with 13 specifically for the introduction of marijuana, cocaine, hashish or hashish oil into the body. To determine if an object is drug paraphernalia, 13 factors must be considered, including statements by an owner concerning the object's use.

In the proposed ordinance, violation of possession of drug paraphernalia carries a fine of up to \$300 and jail time (in county jail) of up to 90 days; manufacture or delivery of drug paraphernalia is a separate violation that carries a fine of up to \$300 and jail time of up to 90 days; advertisement of drug paraphernalia is also a separate violation with the same fines of up to \$300 and up to 90 days jail time.

In addition, the proposed ordinance allows for forfeiture and disposal of drug paraphernalia found to be in violation of the ordinance. It also allows any town law enforcement officer to seize any property that is subject to forfeiture and disposal, upon an order issued by municipal court.

Seizures may occur without a court order if the seizure is made with an arrest or search with warrant; law enforcement officer has reason to believe the paraphernalia is dangerous to health or safety or the law enforcement officer has probable cause to believe the paraphernalia was possessed, manufactured, delivered or advertised in violation of the ordinance.

Property forfeited shall be destroyed or used by law enforcement agencies in the enforcement of the ordinance or enforcement of the Controlled Substance Act.

Copies of the proposed ordinance are available at the town hall offices in Carrizozo Recreation Center.

The public will be given opportunity to make comment on the proposed ordinance during the hearing on May 10.

Aubrey received his grade school and high school training in Corona School. He received his bachelor and master degrees from New Mexico Normal University in Las Vegas. When he entered college in 1929, he was chosen as first tenor in the college male quartet as a freshman. He was also invited to become a member of the adult choir at the First Methodist Church in Las Vegas. After graduation he returned to Corona.

While he was the principal of the grade school in Corona, he married Eula Grimmer, one of his fellow teachers, in 1937. They completed more than 40 years of teaching in New Mexico.

Aubrey took time out for four years in the U.S. Navy during World War II. They later moved to Aztec, NM where they taught school and in 1959 they moved to Alamogordo. Aubrey served the last 12 years of his teaching career at principal of north elementary school in Alamogordo while his wife was third grade teacher at Sierra elementary. He also taught "Introduction to Education" for eight years at NMSU-A.

Aubrey was preceded in death by his wife, Eula, in 1990. Survivors include two nieces and numerous great nieces and great nephews.

Funeral services will be held today, Thursday, April 14 at 2:00 p.m. at Corona Presbyterian Church with Rev. Steve Trout of Grace United Methodist Church officiating. Interment will follow in the Corona Cemetery.

The main thing to think about is how often people are confused as to when things happened. It might seem as if events happened recently when it was actually years ago.



**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** -- What's your opinion of our state motto? Didn't know we had one? It's those Latin words on the scroll unel the eagle on our state seal. "Crescit Eundo". Stirring, isn't it? Makes you want to move here, or move your business here, or at least visit New Mexico.

Maybe a translation would help. Officially, it means "It grows as it goes," although Latin translations aren't always very precise. Latin scholars might disagree whether the official translation is accurate. But why worry about that? Nobody can agree on what the English version means either.

Sen. Joe Carraro, an Albuquerque Republican, says he thinks it has something to do with urban sprawl. Joe lives in that urban sprawl, somewhere out on the Albuquerque West Mesa. Carraro says when he tells school children about our motto, they are confused and unimpressed.

He wants to change our motto to "Respect the past, embrace the future." He got it translated into Latin and drafted into a bill and then pushed it through two Senate committees, although the second committee had to do some major repair to undo the work of the first committee.

That committee amended the motto to "Thank God for Mississippi," a recognition that the Magnolia State keeps New Mexico from being last in some national rankings. And possibly to add to its humiliation of Sen. Carraro, the committee translated its motto into Spanish rather than Latin.

The message from the Senate Public Affairs Committee seemed to be that state mottos aren't all that important anyway. And maybe we should leave well enough alone. At least our motto doesn't have a religious reference, which so many do. That would be sure to have somebody suing the state.

Although Carraro's bill didn't get past the Senate, it did get conversation started. The news went out on the AP wire and Carraro says he got calls from newspapers around the country, including the Washington Post and New York Times.

One lively conversation concerned the worth of state mottos, or official state anything. Maybe they are important, because every year the Legislature considers proposals for new state symbols.

And the motto is everywhere the state seal appears. The only problem is that no one reads Latin very well anymore. But there is a good solution to that. Many states, don't translate their motto into Latin. They're in plain English and sometimes even do

something to promote the state.

Alaska's motto is "North to the future." California's is "Eureka." Admittedly, most state mottos probably do them more hard than good. New Mexico's is probably mildly helpful. It connotes a state that is growing and progressing.

I like this motto better than those of any of our neighboring states, although all our neighbors have learned how to go and grow better than we have.

No one knows for sure who came up with our current motto and what he meant by it. There is some evidence that it was an enterprising territorial secretary by the name of W.G. Ritch, back in the 1880s, who designed a territorial seal that resembled a mural depicting everything that ever happened in the state.

That seal contained the words "Crescit Eundo." The seal didn't last long, but the motto did.

So why not become enterprising with our state motto and symbols? That hot air balloon was adopted this year as our official state aircraft in order to promote the Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta. One reader suggests it should have been the Eclipse jet that Albuquerque and the state of New Mexico have poured so much money into. Another reader asked why they didn't choose Gov. Richardson's new airplane.

But heck, why not get even more enterprising? I'm sitting here holding the official pen of the NFL, for which the NFL obviously received a pot of loot. We could sell to the highest bidder, just as sports stadiums do.

Hey, it would save taxpayer money.

# Highway Addresses To Be Renumbered In Carrizozo

Carrizozo residences and businesses along Highway 380 or Highway 54 will soon get new address numbers.

Lincoln County Rural Addressing officer Connie Stone requested and received permission from Carrizozo Town Trustees to begin renumbering the residences and businesses on those highways based on mile marker. "We are close to having wireless 911 and we need to have the addresses 96 percent accurate for it to work," Stone said to trustees at their meeting April 12.

Stone said once the streets are renamed on the maps, she will start working on the new numbers to correspond with the phone numbers. She said she has completed the numbering per mile marker on Highway 380 from Capitan to the intersection with Highway 70 in Hondo, and on Highway 54 almost to Corona and all she needed to do was within Carrizozo. Stone said she also has gotten all reference to the highways to their specific number, instead of "Tularosa Highway" for Highway 54 south and Corona Highway for Highway 54 north of Carrizozo.

Town clerk Leann Weibrecht said Carrizozo has an addressing problem with houses numbered by water

meter and some streets have odd and even numbers on the same side of the street. "911 works where the front door is," Weibrecht said. She added that renumbering can be an expense.

Trustees voted unanimously to authorize Stone to proceed with the numbering based on mile marker, with numbers assigned 100 per each mile, on Highways 54 and 380 outside the downtown core area. Stone said her project will not include the Central Ave. portion of Highway 54.

The old TasteeFreez sign will soon get a new face. Trustees accepted a town planning and zoning committee recommendation to allow Joseph Lopez to re-face the existing 6 x 10 foot sign on a 15 foot pole. The sign will show the new name for the restaurant, MeJos.

Trustees also approved a request for use of McDonald Park on June 11 by the Cow-Belles for a beef tasting festival. No details about the event were provided to trustees. An audience member asked how the town provides insurance coverage for such use. Weibrecht said the town keeps insurance just for the parks and event organizers are not required to provide their own insurance.

Trustees approved a resolution authorizing the town to

seek a financial hardship waiver with the NM State Highway Department for funding for the town to purchase surplus equipment during the 2004-05. Weibrecht said all paperwork was submitted already and all that was needed was approval of the resolution. Town foreman Jim Payne said the town is eligible to receive up to \$25,000 to purchase used tractors and/or trucks.

Trustees also: --Approved business registrations from 15 businesses for 2005.

--Approved livestock permits for Elton Matthews at 2001 C. Ave. and Katie McDonald at 504 Aspen.

tion is obtained, the request and all proposed plans for use of the lot will go to the Town Planning and Zoning Committee for consideration and recommendation. Trustees will take final action based on P&Z recommendation. The mayor said the council supports the brewery at the Industrial Park, to which all trustees agreed.

Trustee Van Shamblyn reported on her attendance at the joint Lincoln County and Otero County Solid Waste Authorities meeting on March 19 in Tularosa. She said the city of Alamogordo is very happy the way the regional landfill is being run and Otero County Solid Waste Authority is very happy with the way the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) is being operated now also.

Shamblyn also reported that she and town clerk Leann Weibrecht had gone to Albuquerque to choose interior furnishings and other items for the new town hall.

"I think the public will be pleased with the colors and art work (in the new town hall)," Shamblyn said.

"Leann has very good taste," Shamblyn added. "She

kept to a southwestern theme as much as she could. She even hauled the new chair to make sure the colors matched."

An audience member asked how artists could participate in the art in public places state program. Under the art in public places act, a small percentage of each public works project must be devoted to the purchase and installation of qualified art. To be qualified, an artist must submit an application

and examples of art work to get on a state list. From that list a state committee picks art that they consider qualifies for arts in public places. Shamblyn said only one artist from Lincoln County was on the approved art list, and that artist is from Ruidoso.

Weibrecht said artists can contact her at town hall for a telephone number to call about more information concerning the art in public places.
