

# County's Pay System Questioned

In reviewing the county manager Tom Stewart's proposed reclassification of some county employees, and the subsequent pay increases associated with higher classifications, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners came to their December 15th meeting with more questions

than they had one month prior.

According to Stewart, the county's employee classification system is based primarily on two factors: the classification of the job itself and the number of years an individual has been employed by the county. Higher job classification numbers reflect positions that carry more responsibility,

require higher levels of training, expertise, or are otherwise more demanding. Traditionally, all county employees receive a salary increase annually, or an end-of-the-year bonus called a merit pay increase, and those increases are represented by a letter of the alphabet at the end of the employees classification that Stewart says, indicates the

employee's number of years on the job.

In opening the discussion, county commissioner Eileen Lovelace said she had reviewed the salaries of all of the county's employees, and that she didn't understand why some who have been with the county for a long time were still relatively low on the pay scale. She questioned whether

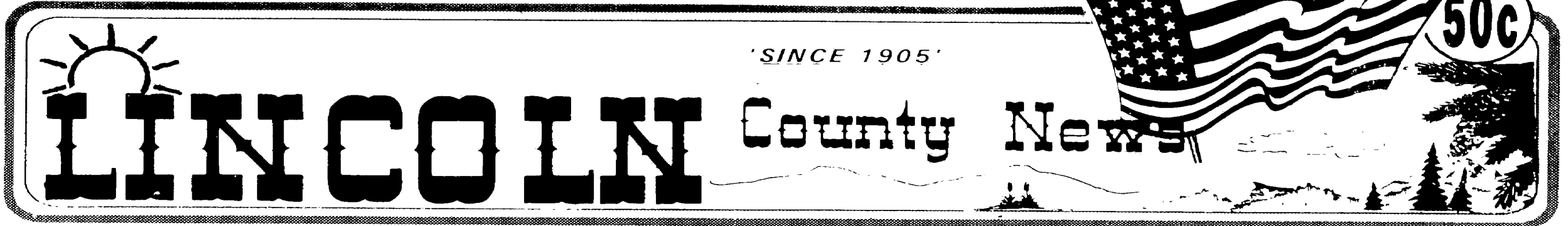
the county had been adhering to its policy of annual step pay raises for everyone.

Stewart explained that every position carries a base salary classification, and that the county adds a minimum of 2.02 percent, or one step, to

each employee's salary annually. "In this way," Stewart said, "a person's longevity is recognized."

He added that the recently approved 4.04 percent in-

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## PLURAAC Request Denied

Tom Frost, chairman of the Lincoln County Public Land Use and Rural Affairs Advisory Committee (PLURAAC), recently voiced his concerns over a lack of information concerning a land use plan that is currently in the seven-month-old PLURAAC committee. The committee members are appointed by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners.

In the county's preparation for the development of a comprehensive growth management plan, PLURAAC has been working to coordinate with the Lincoln County Comprehensive Land Use Plan. The Lincoln County Planning Commission and the Lincoln County Water Resource and Conservation Commission (WRC) are also in preparation for the development of a comprehensive

plan. They are currently working toward recommendations regarding a county subdivision ordinance.

The county's comprehensive land use plan became a county resolution in 1998, but much of the information and data presented in the resolution dates back further. The land use plan often refers to the importance of, but fails to identify, the customs and culture of Lincoln County. The plan is otherwise primarily devoted to the use of and access to publicly owned lands, private property rights, water, wildlife, and mineral resources, forest and range land and environmental services, with emphasis on the needs of the agricultural industry and the ranching and mining elements of the Lincoln County population. PLURAAC members have recently indicated an interest in a broadening of the scope of issues addressed by PLURAAC.

Speaking at the December

15th meeting of the Board of County Commissioners, Frost defended the PLURAAC request for a renaming of the Lincoln County Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

Frost referred to a perceived misconception that the PLURAAC deals only with land issues. The comprehensive land use plan deals with a lot of other issues, Frost said. "We think it would clarify it if we just changed the name to Lincoln County Comprehensive Plan." Though the plan is active due to a county resolution, Frost expressed his belief that if other committees within the county will, by law, have to operate under the name of the plan currently under review by the PLURAAC.

The land use plan name change request came from the PLURAAC shortly after the county commissioners approved an application for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to fund the development of a comprehensive plan, which, when complete, could likely be called the Lincoln County Comprehensive Plan.

## County Hears the Poop on Wastewater Treatment

Capitan public utility inspector David Bryant said he and the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners on December 15. Ruidoso Village Attorney Dan Bryant reported on the condition of the Ruidoso Regional Wastewater Treatment plant. The perception is that we're dealing with a broken plant," Bryant said, "that is not functioning properly and is destroying the river quality of the Rio Ruidoso."

Bryant cited the findings of an audit and inspection of operations performed by the New Mexico Environmental Department (NMED) on August 30, 2005, that indicated

that the inspectors were impressed with the capabilities of the staff and concluded that the maintenance of the plant is working well. The plant is doing what it is designed to do, which is treating wastewater," Bryant said. The wastewater treatment plant is an old plant with a deteriorating infrastructure, but due to operator expertise, it's well run.

Bryant showed two small vials of clear liquid, a sample of the water flow directly out of the treatment plant's effluent pipe, he said, and a sample from the Rio Ruidoso above the plant. One of the bottles has water out of the

river, the other vial for water out of the plant. "I had a sample and a statement and told the difference," Bryant announced.

The attorney reported that phosphorous comes from fertilizer and agricultural applications, ash from coal fires and household detergents. If the wastewater treatment plant were putting out drinkable water, we would only try 30 to 40 percent of the phosphorous problem in the river system," Bryant said.

In reference to the amounts of phosphorous detected at the plant and in several local

crease in salaries across the board reflected a two-step raise for all of the county's classified employees.

Lovelace told Stewart that she had noticed that people in the county assessor's office who have been there for more than 20 years are receiving relatively low pay compared to some people who have been recently hired. "They've got all these years of experience but yet they're making \$10 an hour. That doesn't make sense," Lovelace said.

Stewart argued that some positions may exist for a long time without an increase in responsibility. "If a person comes on as a cook and stays a cook for 20 years, their responsibilities haven't changed but we recognize that the person's been a cook for 20 years. It doesn't mean they should be at the top of the pay scale," Stewart said.

Lovelace referred to the assistant county manager position held by Martha Guevara. "She's classified as a manager," Lovelace said, "but there's no doubt that her responsibilities have increased." Guevara, who was hired in 1979, is classified as a "301" employee. Lovelace

said she worried that newly hired employees might start at a higher wage than someone who has "been with the county forever."

Stewart told Lovelace that, if a replacement for Guevara were hired today, that person would start with the "30" job classification of assistant county manager but, after a probationary period, would only be classified as a 30A, in relationship to his or her length of employment.

Confusion over the pay system includes information that the classification levels don't all seem to follow the formula as explained by the county manager. In a list of the classifications, salaries and hiring dates of all county employees, one position classified as a 17P shows a hiring date in 2005, a similar position, also with a hiring date in 2005 but listed as a 17C, carries a salary of almost \$2,000 more.

County Commissioner Earl Hobbs asked Stewart if anyone else was working with him in his efforts to determine what the proposed salaries should be and Stewart said no. Then Hobbs asked "how do we avoid the appearance of subjectivity with regard to

an employee's pay raise or lack of pay raise?" Hobbs stated his agreement with Lovelace in that there appeared to be people who had been in a job for a significant period of time and had not received the stepped increases that appear to be normal for some similar positions.

Stewart told the county commissioners that, in proposing a new position, he examines the associated duties and tries to establish a classification logical with the level of responsibility.

Hobbs suggested to Stewart that, to avoid undue criticism, he might want to seek input from the county's department heads.

"It would give the appearance of more objectivity, with regard to pay, if the employees had more than one person that they looked at as a sole provider," Hobbs said. He proposed that perhaps a group of people making such decisions would be better.

"I may have overstated my sole discretion," Stewart told Hobbs, "but it is my ultimate decision." He went on to say that he does confer with department heads whenever he recommends changes.

County Commissioner Maury St. John also stated that she was very confused by the pay system, particularly the job classification number. "The number, 16, 18, 20, 24, whatever," she said, "doesn't make a whole lot of difference. It seems to be the alpha behind it." St. John then said that she understood why Stewart would like to give Lincoln County Emergency Services Director Bill Martin, the county's information specialist Connie Stone, and planning director Curt Temple a big pay increase, but said the increase was more than it should be if the manager wanted to set some kind of a standard. "If I were an employee," St. John said, "I would be really upset if someone got that big of an increase, even though their responsibilities had changed a great deal and they'd taken on more work." Stewart has proposed a \$3,900 increase to Temple's pay and \$5,400 increases to Martin and Stone's salaries, bringing each to an annual amount of \$30,343.

Paul Baca, the county's chief appraiser and highest paid classified employee at \$41,841, thanked the manager and the county commissioners for the 4.04 percent increase

granted to all county employees, then read a letter from the staff of the assessor's office. In the letter, the assessor's office employees stated their opposition to some pay increases and the creation of new positions in some departments. The reason given for their opposition was that the other county departments tap into the data base, knowledge and extensive years of experience of the assessor's office workers and then reap the financial benefits of that office's labors. "We are mapping specialists, mobile specialists, livestock specialists, property specialists, appraising specialists, sales and data specialists and the majority of the appraisers are New Mexico certified," Baca read, "which requires four years of schooling and continued re-certification." In the letter, the staff objected to awarding some pay increases based on supervisory duties, suggesting that the hiring of additional employees might actually result in a decreased workload for the employee elevated to a supervisor's pay. The letter further stated, "it is a misleading notice and a sham to allow these raises and new designations, since so many couldn't have even gotten started without the assessor's office help."

Baca told the county commissioners that the assessor's office employees have an average of 22 years of service with the county and described how, in the course of those years, the department's workload has increased. Salaries among classified employees in the assessor's office range from \$21,372 to \$41,841, and county assessor Rick Silva receives \$43,301. Baca said that he currently supervises six appraisers and the mapper. He also said that the duties of employees in the clerk and treasurer's offices have increased as well.

Robert Moeller, of Nogal, told the county commissioners that payroll systems like the one used by the county are intended to "pay the job, not the person" in order to remain objective. "When you think of it that way (paying the person) it becomes very subjective and that's the danger of it," Moeller said.

"You have to have good job descriptions, good analysis of the factors and responsibilities involved in the jobs, and build a classification scheme based on those factors," he said. "The outcome is to price the job and determine what price should be paid for the performance of those particular tasks." Moeller also recommended that performance reviews, done uniformly and by the direct supervisor of the employee, be established. "It is on the basis of those performance reviews, and consideration of seniority, that you wind up with decisions about advances in grade and salary," Moeller said.

Stewart responded to Moeller's comment about paying the job. "That's what I'm trying to do," the county manager said. "You're not going to get an emergency services coordinator for a cook's salary. I'm sorry, it's just not going to happen," Stewart said. "We've brought in a code enforcement officer at about \$21,000. I can't pay that person more than the emergency services coordinator for the county, who is also the county fire marshal. I'm frustrated," Stewart said. "Everybody de-

County commissioner Tom Battin acknowledged that the PLURAAC had received little guidance from the county commissioners, and told Frost that the issues addressed by the PLURAAC should be more clearly identified. Battin also suggested the PLURAAC's lengthy name be changed at some point. Battin then proposed that any PLURAAC changes be preceded by a re-examination of both the ordinance that created the PLURAAC and the

resolution that created the Lincoln County Planning Commission. He suggested the development of mission statements to define the focus of each agency. The result, Battin said, would be committees that complement each other rather than compete, and the elimination of duplicated efforts.

County manager Tom Stewart told Frost that, once the county begins to outline the process of creating a master plan, both the planning commission and the PLURAAC should be re-examined. "Certainly, we can't do away with the commission," Stewart said, "and we might need to keep what we're currently doing with the committee." He added, "I don't want them stepping on one-another over this comprehensive plan." Stewart suggested the county commission leave things as they are for now. "Let's do a lay-down, as part of this comprehensive plan, to figure out if we're doing things right governance-wise," Stewart said.

the PLURAAC, as well as information gathering and the monitoring of proposed actions by other agencies.

In response to a question from Lovelace, Frost said that the PLURAAC used to get information from the planning commission through Patsy Sanchez, who would also forward notices from the Forest Service. Stewart told Frost that he electronically forwards those types of notices to all members of the PLURAAC, but that he hadn't received one in several months. When Frost explained that some of the PLURAAC members have difficulty receiving electronic transmissions because they are "computer-challenged", Stewart suggested those members "get with it".

For now, the PLURAAC will continue to review the Lincoln County Comprehensive Land Use Plan, with no change to its name. Battin and Stewart both alluded to the possibility that, should the county receive the CDBG funding and begin the devel-

inter-agency coordination to opment of an all-encompassing plan, a re-examination of the PLURAAC and Lincoln County Planning Commission's scope of practices and authorities may be forthcoming.

serves a raise, but the difficulty is trying to pay the job."

Hobbs said he would like to see the county institute some type of a pay board that would make recommendations to the manager, upon which he could base decisions. County commissioner Tom Battin added that he would also like to see performance evaluations included in the process.

A motion to adopt the salary recommendations was passed 3 to 2, with St. John, and Lovelace voting no.

Because the protection of private property rights is among the issues specifically ordained to the PLURAAC, county commissioner Eileen Lovelace suggested that a change in the PLURAAC's definition could result in a weaker representation of private property rights issues in the final plan. Lovelace told Frost that she would like the future comprehensive plan committee to work closely with private property rights proponents and the PLURAAC members.

Frost said that his committee did not get cooperation from other committees. "They don't tell us what they're doing," Frost said. "We have open meetings. We don't know where the other committees are or what they're doing," he said. Frost told the county commissioners that the monthly PLURAAC meetings used to be attended by representatives of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the Forest Service, but the PLURAAC currently has received no correspondence from those agencies in more than six months. "We are a joint-lead agency, the county is, with the BLM and the Forest Service," Frost said, "and if we don't know what's going on, how are we supposed to make recommendations to the commission?" Frost told the county commissioners, "I don't know where the wheel is broken, but there's a spoke missing somewhere."

If you have been complaining about what is going on in your municipality, next Tuesday you will have opportunity to possibly make changes. Tuesday is candidate filing date for the municipal elections that will be held in March. If you have questions as to the requirements for filing, contact the clerk in your municipality for more information.

National elections will be held later this year, starting with the primary in June and then the general election will be held in November. But the saying is that the grassroots level of politics begins at the municipal level. If you want to weed out the crabgrass and plant bluegrass, don't let this opportunity to enter politics slip by without participating.

Instead of continuing to complain, put on your thinking gloves and duke it out with the other candidates. It will be easier than getting down on your knees to take out those pesky sticker plants that are in abundance, and you may be elected. That way you would know what goes on when the closed door sessions are held and might understand why closed door sessions are necessary at times, but not always.

And most importantly, you would be trying to do what is best for your community. You would know why decisions are made that are not always popular with everyone, and you would understand the inner workings of government.

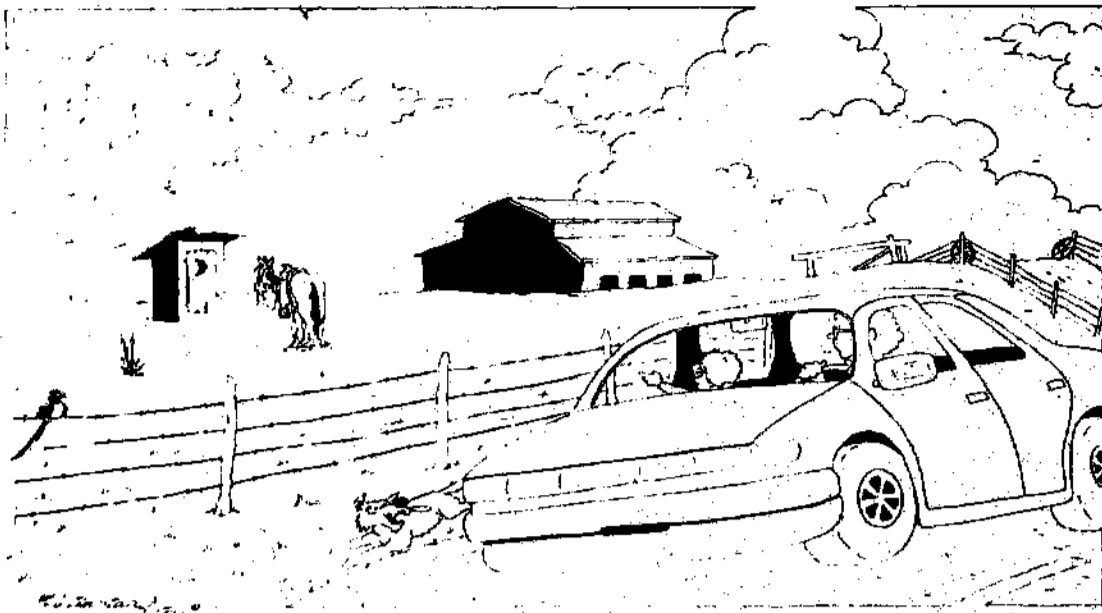
There are numerous issues that should be brought out in the open in most municipalities. The main complaint is that too many things are decided in private. If you believe this is happening in your municipality, run for elected office. Don't say you wouldn't know how, because the majority of the information is provided to elected officials in packets by the municipal clerk prior to meetings. It is crucial for the elected officials to be prepared prior to their meetings.

If you want to help your community, be a candidate. If you want to continue to complain without being involved, let someone else be a candidate. If you know someone else who would be a terrific candidate, ask them and offer your support during the campaign. If you believe that being an elected official is what you want to do, file next Tuesday.

Very often it is easier to sit back and let others do the work, but improving a community takes joint efforts, not only elected officials but the residents as well. Being an elected official would mean that you have responsibility in the decision making process, working with all interested.

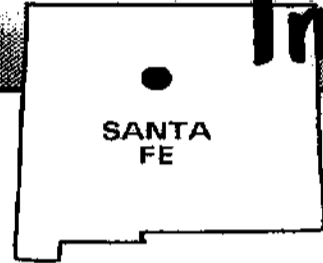

**Inside the Capitol**



**SANTA FE** -- New Mexico has an opportunity to be "the launch pad for the new space industry," as British entrepreneur Sir Richard Branson puts it.

Becoming the world's first commercial spaceport is exciting. We have an adventuresome governor and possibly the world's best businessman to lead us in this quest. We also have a huge state surplus that can provide us the stake to get into the game.

But it's not a done deal yet. New Mexicans still have to approve the gamble. Gov. Bill Richardson will ask the next three legislative sessions for a total of \$100 million in severance tax bonds to build the spaceport. The state's transportation budget will kick in another \$35 million.

Congress and local communities in southern New Mexico will be asked to come up with the other \$90 million. The local government contribution would be in the form of a gross receipts tax.

There is sure to be lively discussion at all levels of government about whether this Buck Rogers venture is meant for us.

The odds on the gamble aren't a complete roll of the dice. Paul Allen and Burt Tutan, who sent SpaceShipOne 65 miles up to win the \$10 million X Prize, will build SpaceShipTwo for Branson. It will accommodate seven or eight passengers, instead of the three of its predecessor.

Branson is known as a Midas, whose touch turns all his projects to gold. He parlayed a single record store in London into a global conglomerate of entertainment, communications, airline and railroad companies, all bearing the Virgin brand.

The guy is amazingly charismatic and would make a great salesman for New Mexico. But his new Fox-TV show "Rebel Billionaire" hasn't turned to gold yet, although it is doing well in Australia.

The first of SpaceShipTwo's launches are sure to make major headlines. Branson is scheduled to be on the first flight, along with actress Victoria Principal. But the first year or so of launches will be from the Mojave air strip in California, while New Mexico's spaceport is being completed.

By-the time they reach New Mexico, will some of the newness have worn off? Maybe not all of it. Gov. Richardson says he plans to be on one of the first flights after the launches begin in New Mexico.

Assuming he wins the governor's race next year and doesn't go anywhere before his term is over, he'll still be governor in 2010 for that flight. New Mexico would then have the first governor to climb Mount Everest, followed by the first governor into outer space.

Safety will be of paramount importance on these flights. Over 50 test flights are planned before the SpaceShipTwo will be ready for passengers. Trouble with any of the

flights would greatly diminish the value of New Mexico's investment.

But if all goes well, it appears the sky is not the limit. Branson says he already has 100 fully-paid reservations for \$200,000 and nearly 40,000 deposits from 126 different countries. The 100 reservations equal \$20 million and the nearly 40,000 deposits, at \$20,000 apiece, fully refundable, appear to have put another \$800 million in the bank.

So that brings up the question of why Branson can't foot the \$225 million for a spaceport himself. Development of SpaceShipTwo will be expensive, but the prototype already has been developed and tested. SpaceShipOne reportedly cost \$20 million to build.

If Branson built the spaceport himself, would he build it here? I'm guessing he would build it in California, from where the first flights will occur.

So we have to make some investment to get him here. We've been beating ourselves up for 20 years because we let Microsoft get away. Knowing what we do now, we'd have seen to it that Bill Gates and Paul Allen got the \$35,000 loan they needed in 1978. But keeping Microsoft would have been much more complex than that.

Maybe Richardson and Branson have all the questions answered. And maybe they don't. In the coming weeks and months, we'll pose some of the questions that may help New Mexicans and their public officials make an informed decision.

tions along the stream system. he said that the plant operators could spend millions and millions of dollars and still only fix 30 to 40 percent of the problem "Which means," Bryant said, "you still have algae growing in the stream system."

"The big problem," Bryant said, "is septic systems that don't treat waste." Bryant then cited a recent NMED report on the pollution levels near the Palo Verde Slopes area east of Ruidoso Downs. "Because of the nature of the soils at Palo Verde Slopes, there is a serious water pollution problem that is affecting the water table for the wells that those folks use to get drinking water," Bryant said. Bryant then held up a jar of brown liquid that he said was a sample of what comes out of a drain field hooked to a septic system.

The Joint Use Advisory Board, which manages the operation of the treatment plant, decided in 2003, according to Bryant, to implement a plan to remove as many septic systems from the watershed as they can "Increasing the capacity of the treatment plant is important, for sure," Bryant said, "but it won't fix the whole problem."

In reference to complaints

about the addition of some large volume customers on the Mescalero Apache reservation to the treatment system, records kept at the plant over the last four months show average volume amounts of 1.1 to 1.3 million gallons of wastewater treated daily. The plant's permit allows for a volume capacity of twice that amount, Bryant reported. "I bring that number to you so that you will see there is excess capacity at the plant," Bryant said.

Bryant, in response to a question from county commissioner Earl Hobbs regarding period shock loads, said that Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs have ordinances requiring grease traps for restaurants, car washes and service stations, to prevent grease from entering the system. "Those systems are only as good as the maintenance programs that are in place at each of the restaurants, car washes, and garages that operate them," Bryant said. "Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs will be stepping-up their inspections and enforcement to take care of those constituents in the system." He explained that large loads of grease will upset the balance of the treatment process.

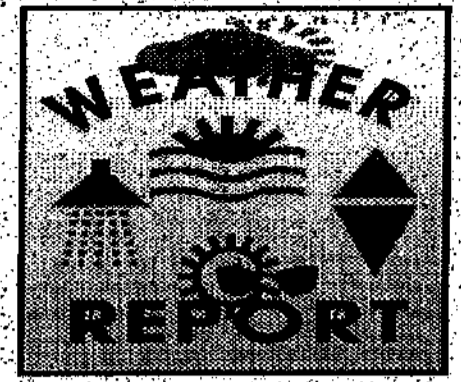

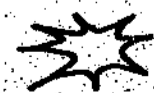
Ralph and I both wish you all a very Happy and Prosperous New Year. It will be a better year for so many after the troubles of last year.
