

New Road Closure Procedures for 380

Drivers heading west on. Highway 380 from Carrizozo will soon begin to be notified in advance of highway closures stemming from activities on the White Sands Missile Range, in a November 15th memorandum from Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart to the county commissioners, Stewart reported having spoken with representatives of the missile range and the state highway department regarding the inconvemiences associated with the sometimes hours-long road closures.

Stewart wrote that, in response to his inquiries, Rich-Department of Transportation (NMDOT) office in Roswell has agreed to erect a fold-down sign just outside:

of Carrizozo that will be used to notify motorists when there are road blocks west of town. Stewart also reported speaking with Frank Chavez, director of Range Operations at White Sands. According to Stewart, Chavez has agreed to ensure that some type of portable restroom facilities will be placed at the location of any future road closures caused by testing on the missile range. "I hope these actions will better serve those headed westward on Highway 380." Stewart wrote in the memorandum.

In a letter to the NMDOT. Stewart acknowledged that the highway department is retty good about notifying him of planned road closures. and that he normally forwards such information to the local media outlets.

LCSWA Board Approves Legislative Lobbying Contract

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board approved its 2007 Legislative session professional services lobbying contract with Ruidoso attorney John Underwood. Underwood has represented LCSWA for the past three years in the New Mexico Legislature.

LCSWA requests for the 2007 Legislature total \$1.1 million to support construction of the new Greentree Transfer Station and Recycling Center in Ruidoso Downs.

Other actions by the LCSWA board at its November 17th meeting included;

-Heard a progress report on development of a countywide recycling advisory committee including creation of a local recycling committee with high school student representation by the Village of Corona. Final nomination and action on LCSWA committee membership is expected December 29th.

-Approved removal of \$221.62 in accounts receivable on vacated residential property verified by the county assessor.

-Heard the monthly operational supervisor report highlighted by the final statistics on the November 4 E-waste. recycling event, and on three grant opportunities, \$246,000 for recycling infrastructure, \$13,000 for a pilot illegal dumping program and \$750 to assist the Ruidoso High School SADD programs recycling efforts. The Ewaste event collected over 45,000 pounds of discarded electronics. Discussions are already underway to create similar events again in April: and November, 2007.

-Approved All American Buildings Inc. in the amount of \$141,540 as contractor for development of the Chapparal convenience station in southern Otero County.

-Heard a report on construction progress at the new LCSWA Green Tree Center in Ruidoso Downs.

The next LCSWA board meeting has been moved to Friday, December 29th

taking claims cases have been cited as reasons for opposition to the bill. Some opponents argue that the bill would even reduce a local government's ability to regulate or limit pollution and protect open spaces.

Those who support HR-4772 say that the bill would allow private property owners to access the federal courts with claims that stem from disputes over land use regulations and are protected by the U.S. Constitution. The Fifth Amendment to the Constitution mandates that citizens cannot be deprived of property without due process of law, and that private property cannot be taken for public use without just compensation.

Proponents of the bill argue that land use disputes over private property rights are civil rights issues and that other such claims, as in cases disputing freedom of speech rights as protected by the First Amendment, are already granted direct access to the federal courts.

The National Federation of Independent Businesses and the National Association of Home Builders have stated their support of the bill, and allege that it would remove some of the obstacles and expenses that affect a property owner's access to justice, and enable property owners to hold the government accountable when its actions violate constitutionally protected property rights.



People of This Land of Plenty Lack Humility?

Thanksgiving day has become associated, in a natural enough manner, with the idea of plenty -- an idea that is transisted into the concrete on all American tables this day. Our is the land of plenty, a fat land, a rich land, and on this day of the year Americans commemorate and celebrate the fact by partaking of good cheer.

The custome comes down to us, as we all know, from a generation of Americans which did not have plenty and had the best of reasons for being thankful and testifying their gratitude when the lean season was past and a fat one came.

There have been vast changes in our land since the Pilgrims inaugurated this practice which their descendants still follow. The early givers of thanks were thankful for the little that came to them after faithful labor and harsh struggle. We who have much, and have it without hard struggle, also are thankful for what we have, but probably are a trifle too complacent about it and a little too likely to imagine it comes wholly through our deserving.

Having much, and regarding what we have chiefly as means of administering to our pleasure and comfort, we rather curiously testify our thankfulness for it by administering to our pleasure and comfort to extra fashion on the day of thanksgiving. We suppose it really would be more appropriate if we should fast on that day.

Some Cause for Thought

But all this is to consider only one phase of our plenty, the plenty represented by a full table. This is a symbol of our material prosperity, and perhaps is not the one we shold too fixedly contemplate. What we should do, probably, on this day, is to look about and inquire a little to see whether our plenty exists in other forms. If we find it doesn't, perhaps we shall have occasion some time to make Thanksgiving day what it originally was, a commemoration of our success in supplying by our own labor and struggles what we have lacked. Then we would have a little better understanding of the true meaning of Thanksgiving.

Most of us will agree, we think, that America's plenty is not as well rounded out as it should be. Our fatness is a little too much in our turkey, so to speak; our richness in the material tokens that are useful only in giving us possession of material things. Our plenty does not extend to our education, our patriotism, our culture, justice, tolerance or public intelligence. In these possessions America is deficient, and for the very sufficient reason that we have not inbored and undergone sacrifice and hardship to get them. Nor can we get them in any other way. We cannot buy them with our wealth as we do turkey; and if we could, we never would have occasion to be thankful for them. Thankfulness implies some humbleness of mind, and that can come only through a sense of sacrifice. Nobody can be truly thankful for anything that has come without personal effort. That's why the British have created such a tremendous social and industrial problem by instituting the dole system. Nobody is thankful for it, least of all those who receive it.

and there has to be adequate water to furnish that line." He said that because the village has water lines going all the way to the Nogal mesa, the water board also decided to limit growth of the system to within two miles of the village limits. "I just wanted to set the record straight," Taylor said.

Capitan resident Tom Sullivan then spoke, referring to the resignation of a former Capitan police officer in September. Sullivan asked if any investigation into allegations made by the police officer had been performed. In his letter of resignation the officer reportedly stated that Capitan presented a hostile work environment. Hammons reminded Sullivan that the officer was not fired but resigned, and village attorney Zach Cook stated that he had done his job regarding the

Former Capitan Mayor Steve Sederwall asked if newly hired Capitan Police Officer Steven Dobbs was a certified police officer. Sederwall then played a brief portion of what he said was a taped telephone conversation with a state employee named Erica. In the conversation, which Sederwall said occurred at 2:15 on Tuesday afternoon, he said, "let me get this straight. Steve Dobbs, as of August 20th, 2006, can't be a policeman until we send him back to the academy." The woman he called Erica replied, "right."

In response to questions from Hammons, police chief Spear said that he had performed a background check on Dobbs and that the department has a copy of his certif-

Spear said that he also spoke to someone in Santa Fe who assured him that Dobbs is a certified officer. Spear reported that Dobbs has yet to be officially transferred to the Capitan police department because the Ruidoso Downs police department has not sent documentation to the state reporting that Dobbs has left that department.

The Capitan council also heard from a representative of the Fort Lone Tree. High Adventure Camp and her request for village lodgers tax funding to have some brochures printed.

During the meeting's regular business, the trustees approved the purchase of the town of Carrizozo's half of a mutually owned gooseneck trailer used by the previous Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Company. The trustees agreed to pay \$1,000 dollars to Carrizozo for its share of the trailer.

Trustees also approved the advertisement of a request for proposals to purchase base course for village's roads.

An easement agreement that would provide three village water taps to Don Brewer of Brewer Oil Company and the Brewer Ranch in exchange for an easement for a planned loop line water system expansion project was approved as well. Brewer would pay the village its going rate for water drawn from the additional taps, According to Hammons, the metered taps will still require approval of the village's water and planning boards. He said that Brewer intends to use the water primarily to fill

livestock tanks.

The council approved the hiring of police officer Steven Dobbs and to promote road crew operator Don Hendricks to the position of street foreman. Monty Forney was officially dismissed from the water board, and Ruidoso resident Ed Brown was appointed to that board. Hammons explained that Brown was eligible for the position on the water board because he owns properties inside the village. The resignation of Larry Holt from the Capitan Cemetery Board was accepted. Hammons reported that Holt is busy working on the Fort Stanton cemetery committee, and trustee Diane Riska, who also serves on the cemetery board, said that Holt is a wonderful person to work with and will be missed. The council also approved the appointment of Hammons as the Capitan representative on the Lincoln County Comprehensive Plan Committee.

Some village water taps that have been in use for 20 years, according to Hammons, have never been documented with the Office of the State Engineer. "They need to be documented," Hammons said. "It involves the city putting in a change of use and location permit and advertising for three weeks." Hammons said that there are 27 undocumented water taps that are extra-territorial to the village. The trustees approved the advertisement of the tap permit. According to Cook, the owners of the taps have been regularly paying water bills to the village for

The village council approved a grant of \$500 in lodgers tax funds to Fort Lone Tree to help with brochure printing costs.

Water Records Status Report

Discussion at recent meetings of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners prompted county manager Tom Stewart to question the wisdom behind a decision to move water rights documents stored in Roswell to Santa Fe. Stewart wrote a letter to State Engineer John D'Antonio last June to oppose the move of the records and to encourage the Office of the State Engineer to seek alternative procedures.

After learning in October that the relocation of the records had begun. Stewart drafted a letter to Governor Bill Richardson stating that the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners wished to join the Pecos Valley Artosian Conservancy District and the Pecos Valley Water Users Organization in protest of the action.

In a memorandum dated November 13th, Stewart reported to the county commissioners that he had received a phone call from D'Antonio who explained that the relocation of the vital documents. was the result of a Legislative Finance Committee

Coy Duff May, a former resident of Carrizozo, died November 15. He was born May 15, 1918 in Paluxy. Hood County, Texas, the youngest of eight children.

Eat turkey by candlelight

If you plan on a scrumptious dinner tomorrow, turkey with all the trimmings or posole or tamales or roast beef or roast pork, you might consider eating your dinner by candlelight. Not because you don't want anyone to see what they are eating, but because it might save on your electric bill, and even small savings would be helpful.

Needless to say, it was a joit earlier this week when the electric bill came in the mail. There was not only an increase this month but an explanation that our electric bills will continue to increase the next several years. The three new generating units, two in Kansas and one unit in southern Colorado are in the works but it will be another six years or more before they are operating commercially.

Considering that these generating units are desperately needed now, it makes us wonder why it will take six or more years for construction. Modern equipment should expedite construction, not delay it. Maybe they need to hire more qualified workers to get the project moving along faster which would benefit all electric consumers.

Rationale is that there might be another reason for these construction projects to take an extended length of time. Could it be a way to extend price increases until consumers accept the increases? After a few years some people might forget that prices should decrease when the new generating units are providing commercial service.

Evidently some people are questioning the increases. if not why the lengthy explanation? Using a smoke screen may be effective in combat at times, but utility service is not a battleground, or shouldn't be. Using the argument that national energy trends are partly responsible for the increases is a smoke screen. Just because people in New York use more electricity to light skyscrapers should have no effect on what we are charged in rural New Mexico.

Another excuse given was growth in some areas. Do these new consumers get their electricity free or will they be paying for electric service just as we are? Yes, there will be more electricity consumed, but new consumers should be paying for the additional electricity consumed.

Substations need to be upgraded, but these upgrades should help decrease consumer costs, not increase them. Using energy efficient heaters has helped cut costs for many people relying on space heaters. Is the same not true for upgrades to substations and transmission lines? If the upgrades don't improve service, why do upgrades?

Eating by candlelight may not be a luxury but could be a necessity as electric costs increase drastically. Years ago candlelight dinners were considered romantic, but the only romance for candlelight dinners now would be that you might be able to afford to buy food if you cut your electric bills. Enjoy Thanksgiving, even if in the dark.

Thanksgiving Day Trivia

The first Thanksgiving celabration took place in December, 1621, and lasted for three days.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of November as a national day of thanksgiving.

During Franklin D. Roosevelt's presidency, Thanksgiving Day was declared to be the fourth Thursday of November, to encourage earlier holiday shopping in the years that November has five Thursdays.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates that 265 million turkeys will be raised in the United States this year. 45 million will be raised in Minnesota, our largest turkey producing state. The average American consumes about 14 pounds of turkey per year.

The average cost of a traditional Thanksgiving dinner for a family of eight will be \$38.53 this year.

That flabby skin that hangs from a turkey's neck is called a wattle.

Wisconsin is expected to lead the states in cranberry production with an estimated 375 million pounds. Total cranberry production in the U.S. is expected to be 664 million pounds this year. Most of the cranberries im-

ported to the U.S. come from the Dominican Republic.

An American Indian tribe. the Wampanoag led by Massassoit, helped the pilgrims survive their first winter in New England.

1.6 billion pounds of sweet potatoes are grown annually in the U.S., with North Carolina producing more than any other state. Americans eat an average of four-and-a-half pounds of sweet potatoes each year.

Though wild turkeys can only fly short distances, they can reach speeds of 55 miles per hour. Turkeys can trot at speeds up to 25 miles per

The last time Senate Democrats were in power, Bingaman and Domenici switched chairs and it appears it will happen again.

Between them, our two senators will have 60 years of Senate service at this time next year. That kind of seniority puts them in the committee chairman category.


