Narrow roads and no guardrails along cliffs are a problem

Residents of the Deer Park Valley subdivision in Alto, represented by Lincoln County Commissioner Earl Hobbs, would like some help in dealing with the condition of their roads.

The issue of roads in that

subdivision was a topic of discussion during the September 19th meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, and prompted county commissioners to create a road task force.

According to Hobbs, sometime around 1998 Antler and Reindeer Drives in Deer Park Valley had been designated as emergency escape routes by the Alto Lakes Property

Association. "I talked (to county commissioners) about the roads in Deer Park Valley at that time," Hobbs said, "and county commissioner Rick Simpson very kindly worked out a deal with the other commissioners."

Hobbs said the county's board of commissioners agreed at that time to provide occasional maintenance of Reindeer and Antler Drives, so as to keep them open and

passable for emergency escape. "It has been a workable solution except for one thing," Hobbs said. "In 1997 there were (about) 11 houses in all of Deer Park Valley. Today, there are 44 houses on these roads and two more

under construction."

Hobbs told the county commissioners that traffic has greatly increased on Reindeer Drive, Saddleback Drive and the cul de sacs that connect to Saddleback. According to Hobbs' report,

those roads are rough and the drainage is inadequate.

Deer Park Valley residents are looking for solutions to their road problems, but opinions vary regarding any special taxation assessment to fund the solutions. Hobbs

Senior Center In San Patricio Needs New Home

The San Patricio Zia Senior Center was closed in August due to the discovery of a damaged beam in the roof of the center, which is hosted by the St. Eleanor Church. Repairs were made, and an inspector hired by the Las Cruces Catholic Diocese reportedly found the work to be sound, but a report from a state building inspector deemed the repairs inadequate.

Relying on the state inspector's report, the gas company is unwilling to return gas service to the building pending assurance that the building is safe. Faced with the prospect of the additional repair costs that would be necessary before the facility could again house the senior center, church officials have decided to terminate the county's lease on the building.

The county's senior center program director, Ada Hendryx, addressed the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners at their meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 19 regarding the status of the San Patricio center.

Hendryx reported that a potential new home for the center had been located about four miles from the old location. The potential new location, owned by Ralph Montes, includes a building that is currently being used


as a restaurant, and Hendryx said it would meet the needs of the senior center very well. "It sits on an acre of land, so there's ample parking," Hendryx said. "It also has ample room for us to establish our meals programs as well as all of our other center activities."

The building is located on Highway 380, about one mile from the Highway 70 intersection.

"We have contacted our aging and long-term services department and our area agency on aging and they have committed to support us in going to the legislature," Hendryx said, and asked the county commissioners to consider purchasing the building. Hendryx said that she had received approval from the state to amend the county's current Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP) if the county commissioners would agree to do so. "A legislator has agreed to introduce the bill (for legislative funding)," Hendryx said, "which would be classified as a critical need."

Lincoln County's five Zia Senior Centers make regular nutritious meals available to any of the county's senior population, and deliver meals to those who are frail, homebound or otherwise unable to

County Plans to Amend PLURAAC Ordinance

Lincoln County government includes several committees that are staffed by citizen volunteers who donate their time without salary but are eligible for mileage and per diem reimbursement when out of town travel is required. The committees are the Lincoln County Water Research and Conservation Committee (LCWRCC), the Lincoln County Planning Commission, The Public Land Use and Rural Affairs Advisory Committee (PLURAAC), the

Lincoln County Lodgers Tax Committee and the Lincoln County Road Review Board.

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners scheduled public hearings for their regular meeting of September 19th to consider a re-examination of the county ordinances that dictate the objectives and procedures of the Lincoln County Planning Commission and the PLURAAC. The hearing to amend the Planning Commission ordinance was opened and closed without any proposed changes. The county commissioners' decision

to make no changes to the planning ordinance was reached unanimously.

Speaking during the September 19th hearing, county attorney Alan Morel said he had drafted some changes to the PLURAAC ordinance, some of which were at the request of county commissioners Maurice St. John and Tom Battin. "Basically, they provide for having PLURAAC under the direction of the county commission and meeting quarterly unless asked to take on a particular project," Morel said. As proposed, the amendment

placed the PLURAAC under the oversight of the county manager as well. Morel added that another proposed amendment was to change the PLURAAC ordinance to a resolution.

During the August 15th meeting of the county commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart offered to resign his position unless granted control over correspondence sent from the PLURAAC to other local, state and federal entities. According to Stewart, an unap-

New Police Chief for Carrizozo

Carrizozo will have a new police chief on Monday, October 2. Ken Jones, a former deputy with the Lincoln County Sheriff's office has agreed to take the position. Present chief of police Don Lyles has agreed to step down and assist Jones.

It had been reported that Lyles had resigned on Friday, but further investigation showed that it was a verbal resignation and a written resignation had not been submitted. Former police chief Mike Howard had asked Lyles to come help the police department, and when Howard resigned as police chief Lyles agreed to be chief temporarily.

According to town trustee Wes Lindsay, Jones and Lyles appear to be pleased with the planned arrangement. The agreement was reached last Wednesday and confirmed for *THE NEWS*.

During a special town council meeting Tuesday, September 19 several people spoke in favor of Lyles. The matter was not on the agenda, but the town council did listen to what people had to say and announced that Lyles was on duty at that time as police chief.

Lyles had told *THE NEWS* a few weeks ago that he had agreed to come to Carrizozo to help, after having had many years of law enforcement.

said that when a special paving assessment was implemented around 1980, Deer Park and High Mesa Drives in Alto Village were paved, and Deer Park Valley residents were assessed for a portion those improvements.

"The problem arises because the county did not do its job, in the first place, by securing adequate surety that the roads and utilities would be completed," Hobbs said. "Secondly, the county did not provide the proper oversight to the special paving district, or some of that money would have been used for roads in Deer Park Valley." Hobbs went on to say that there is no justification for additional paving assessments in Deer Park Valley, "unless there is a full repayment of the previous assessments, plus interest and inflation."

Lynn Price, who said she lives on Deer Valley Drive, told the county commissioners that she nearly slid off of a cliff last winter trying to get to the grocery store shortly after a snow. She complained that the road is too narrow and there are no guardrails in areas where the land falls away from the roadway at steep angles. "It's wonderful living in the country, but there are basic safety needs that need to be met," Price said.

Charlotta Stewart, who identified herself as a Realtor

and contractor, said she and her husband own several lots in Deer Park Valley and have built several homes there. She said the mud has been so deep on Antler Drive that her 4x4 recently got stuck when she was attempting to show property to potential buyers. Stewart compared Reindeer Drive to driving down a river bed. "And that's the maintained road," she said. She told county commissioners that she and her husband have spent about \$8,000 of their own money for grading and base course application on a public road.

Hobbs added that several Deer Park Valley property owners have invested their own money to try to alleviate the problems with their roads and to repair damage to private property caused by the poor drainage of those roads.

Joe Zagone said he owns property in Deer Park Valley that he eventually plans to build on. He said that a few years ago residents of Deer Park Woods requested that their roads be maintained by the county. "It was approved and, as memory tells me, there was one vote against it," Zagone said. He said that former county commissioner Leo Martinez voted against accepting the Deer Park Woods roads because it would set a precedent, and that the residents of Deer Park Valley might someday

expect the same treatment. "I'm calling your attention to that precedence, and that it needs to be done," Zagone said.

As a Realtor, Zagone said, he had sold three lots in Deer Park Valley in the past two weeks, and expected homes to be built on those lots within two years. Zagone said the area offers housing prices that are affordable to mid-salaried professionals, which is why he expects the subdivision to continue to grow. According to Zagone, the Lincoln County Road Supervisor estimated four or five years ago that the cost of

paving roads in Deer Park Valley would require an assessment of about \$1,600 for every lot in the development. Of the 247 lots in the Deer Park Valley, only about 44 currently have homes on them.

County commissioner Maurice St. John and county commission chair Rick Simpson acknowledged that the heavy summer rains caused damage to roads throughout the county. St. John described the situation in Cedar Creek where a county road grader sunk in the middle of

care for themselves. The centers also provide assistance with transportation and in dealing with health and medical issues faced by seniors, as well as encouraging and providing venues for social interaction.

County manager Tom Stewart reported that the Montes property is actually about six acres in size. "The senior center could be accommodated on one acre of that," Stewart said, "and Ralph said he'd split that out for us."

Stewart explained that there would be some issues with utility services if the property were divided, because the well and septic system service parts of the property other than the single acre. "My thoughts are to amend our ICIP, and ask for \$200,000 from the state," Stewart said, and suggested that a lease/purchase agree-

ment might be worked out in the interim.

"But then the question becomes, what about the remaining five acres," Stewart continued. "I think it would probably be a good investment for the county to buy the remaining property." Stewart suggested that the county might use the additional five acres to install a water storage system for fire suppression use and to house some county equipment and materials. He also said the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) might be interested in utilizing a portion of the land.

County commission chair Rick Simpson agreed that the restaurant would be a good home for the senior center, as it already has the amenities required to operate the center. "All they have to do is move in," Simpson said. "The building is ample size and already has a commercial kitchen, bathrooms, everything on this place is perfect."

Hendryx said that she would like to enclose a space inside the building for office use, and that the kitchen range hood should be replaced, which she estimated would cost about \$1,500 to \$2,000.

The county commissioners agreed to authorize the county manager and county attorney Alan Morel to investigate the possibility of entering into a lease/purchase agreement with Montes, and the possible purchase of the property when funding is gained. If a lease agreement can be arranged, the center could begin to offer its normal services to San Patricio senior citizens almost immediately.

When No One Is There

This has been an interesting couple of weeks. First there were reports that both Capitan and Carrizozo were without police protection except for the sheriff's office and State Police. It was determined the chief of police in Carrizozo had not resigned. Officials announced Tuesday that they were negotiating to hire a new police chief but the actual agreement was not made until Wednesday, too late for publication in the News last week. Story page 1.

Even though the Carrizozo situation was resolved, it was different in Capitan. The chief of police in Capitan was removed and a few days later the two police officers tendered their resignations. TV reports were that people in Capitan were frightened. Apparently that fright caused some people to make other plans and not travel through Capitan, quite a detriment to the county tourism industry.

Rejuvenating a non-existent department, whether it is water, trash or police, can be exhaustive, especially when not everyone involved is in agreement. It appears that there is some grumbling in both Capitan and Carrizozo as to the actions that have been taken. Capitan appointed a new police chief during a special meeting Tuesday night.

Rumors of rampant criminal activity may ease a bit as the two new chiefs of police assume their duties. Capitan is without additional police officers until new personnel is hired, but the Lincoln County Sheriff's department and State Police will assist in law enforcement in the interim. Through the years when there was a shortage of police officers anywhere in the county the sheriff's deputies and State Police have assisted with law enforcement duties.

Other than the law enforcement disagreements, life in Lincoln County remains fairly trouble-free, except for the complaints about roads in the county. As has been stated in this column, the county road department will be kept busy replacing damaged culverts after recent monsoons. But it appears that is not the only problem with the roads. Residents in some subdivisions want to have their roads improved, even though their roads are not in the county road inventory and have not been accepted by the county.

Regardless of whether the brouhaha is about roads or law enforcement or something else, there will always be nay-sayers. It is past time for everyone to work together for the betterment of their communities and the county. Even during the apparent lack of local law enforcement in Capitan and Carrizozo the sheriff's department and the State Police assisted. During the flooding and extreme damage to roads, the county road department kept busy. It is only when no one is there to assist that problems can escalate. Thank goodness we have qualified and willing people to eliminate the problem of no one being there.

Cost Comparison of County Committees

In a memorandum from Stewart to the county commissioners dated September 8, Stewart compared the county's expenditures for advertising and travel costs for its various committees.


The Planning Commission incurred 21.6 percent of the county's expenditures or an average of \$911.59 per year over the last three years. That commission is tasked with overseeing, reviewing and presenting recommendations regarding development proposals to the county commissioners, and coordinating with the Office of the State Engineer to acquire information on water issues within proposed development areas.

Less than 10 percent of committee funding, \$412,977, went to support the Lodgers Tax Board, which hears requests for funding from local agencies, private groups and businesses that are promoting

tourism events within the county.

The county's road review board, which examines requests for road closures and vacations and serves as the county's liaison on public road issues received an annual average of \$186.57, or only 4.4 percent of committee expenditures.

The remaining 64 percent of Lincoln County's expenditures for committee activities served the PLURAAC with an average of \$2,705 per year, or three times that of the planning commission. The duties of the PLURAAC are primarily associated with the monitoring of the agencies that administer state and federal lands, and notifying the county commissioners when outside agency activities might threaten current land use policies or individual private property rights.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- Rejoice, gasoline prices have gone back down and everyone is happy.

Well, almost everyone. Democratic strategists think it was something the White House manipulated for the coming election. And U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici is not too sure that lower oil and gas prices are healthy for the nation in the long term.

Pete's for high oil prices? That's impossible. No politician in his right mind would do that. But political blogger Joe Monahan says our senator advanced the idea last month in the Congressional Quarterly magazine.

Domenici has long been an advocate of energy independence. I can remember speeches of his dating back to the early days of his 33-year Senate career in which he proposed ways to getting out from under the thumb of the "OPECers."

Now, as chairman of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, Domenici has more power than anyone in the country in influence energy policy.

Pete never has been particularly big on conservation as a solution to energy independence, his solutions have been in the areas of opening more domestic oil and gas production and bolstering alternative energy sources.

His biggest push has been in the area of revitalizing the nuclear power industry, which fell into disfavor after the Three Mile Island and Chernobyl incidents.

Since then, nuclear safety technology has improved to the extent we are told there will be no such problems in the future.

The biggest problem remaining with nuclear energy is waste storage. No one wants it. Maybe the answer lies in recycling the waste. Meanwhile, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, has recently licensed a \$1.5 billion uranium enrichment plant near Eunice, NM and uranium claims throughout the West are being reopened.

But Domenici says America will never achieve energy independence without utilizing every avenue available for increased energy production.

So, our Pete has suggested the politically unthinkable. Instead of the government imposing a ceiling on oil prices, he told Congressional Quarterly a floor would be a "very, very interesting proposition."

Domenici says high oil and gas prices spur innovations and investments in advanced energy technologies. But fear of a reversal in soaring prices is a primary factor in scaring investors from continuing progress toward alternative energy sources.

In the current Middle Eastern political climate, independence from their oil becomes ever more attractive, so the idea could grow legs. But how will it sell to New Mexico voters? Pete already has said in a fundraising letter that he will be running again in 2008.

Is it because Pete is invincible? What would it take for voters to shun him? Certainly nothing that Democrats have discovered in 33 years. And he can always claim he was just brainstorming

for the magazine.

Or what if Pete doesn't really plan to run in '08? There's no law against raising money for a possible campaign. What if he's just trying to keep the field clear for the candidate of his choice to step in at the last minute?

Domenici's good friend, former U.S. Rep. Manuel Lujan did just that for his brother, Ed Lujan, in 1988. District Attorney Steve Schiff messed up the plan by jumping into the race anyway and winning the GOP primary. But the stakes are higher in a Senate race, so the switcheroo might have a better chance of working.

And who might Domenici choose to succeed himself? Pete laid his reputation on the line for Heather Wilson in 1998, when the state GOP central committee placed state Sen. Bill Davis above her on the primary election ballot.

Might he be willing to put it on the line for Wilson again? Wilson has positioned herself as a moderate Republican, in Pete's image, with Albuquerque voters. That certainly wouldn't hurt in getting his support as a successor. If, that is, Pete has any plans to step down.

Public Hearing On Proposed Fire Code Revisions Friday

New Mexico Public Regulation Commissioner David King (Dist. 2) is hosting a public hearing tomorrow, Friday, September 29 in Alamogordo to provide information and take comments about proposed revisions to the State Fire Code. The public is invited to attend. The hearing will be held at 10 a.m. at the Alamogordo City Council Chambers at 1376 East 9th Street in Alamogordo.

State Fire Marshal John Standefer petitioned the PRC to begin the rule making proceeding to adopt the proposed new rules, that have been reviewed by the New Mexico Construction and Industries Division (CID) and fire officials. The proposed rules will conform to current nationwide building

standards and also provide a process for permitting and licensing the sale of fireworks.

The PRC Commission, as the State Fire Board, is directed by state statute to "formulate, adopt and promulgate, and amend or revise regulations for fire prevention and safe conduct or use of public occupancies." (59A-52-15 NMSA 1978.)

Proposed revisions include: update of citations to the laws throughout the rules; replace National Fire Protection Association codes with those published by the International Code Council (formerly the Universal Building Code) for fire prevention and public occupancies; a new general provisions rule, with



definitions, procedures for filing documents and applications; a new rule on the process for obtaining certificates of fitness for the design, installation, inspection, maintenance and repair of fire protection equipment; clear standard process for review of fire protection designs for new and remodeled buildings; process for issuing licenses and permits for the sale of fireworks; repeal of current rules for portable fire extinguishers, flammable and combustible liquids, storage of flammable and combustible liquids at farms and isolated sites (these are included in other rules); repeal of current rules for Use of Public Occupancies because it has been merged into the rule for Fire Prevention and Public Occupancy.

If adopted, the rules will be contained in Title 10, Chapter 25 of the New Mexico Administrative Code.



Spring Canyon Road and where some residents were unable to access their homes due to flooded roadways. St. John said that lots of culverts will have to be replaced because they are too tightly packed with debris to be salvageable and that many existing culverts that serve private roads and driveways are too small. "It is going to be expensive to the county," she said, "and I think there needs to be a plan for moving around the county and replacing them systematically. It's not just Deer Park Valley." St. John also suggested that residents should take some responsibility for keeping the culverts open, as the county does not have the resources to do so.

County attorney Alan Morel said he would be inter-

ested in knowing what disclosures have been made to people who are buying property or building homes in Deer Park Valley. "We've known for 25 years that these roads aren't being maintained, and they're still moving in," Morel said. "I just wonder if they're being told that there is no maintenance."

One Deer Park Valley resident said that she knew the roads were not maintained when she bought her property and built a home. "But we need to know what to do from here," she said.

Morel said that the lack of services from the county is partly why Deer Park Valley properties are affordable to mid-salaried professionals. "There is no obligation on the county to maintain," Mo-

rel told the board of commissioners. Morel said that he has requested a list of all of the subdivisions that have been filed in Lincoln County but have not completed the roads according to development plans. "I expect that list to be between 50 and 75 subdivisions," Morel said.

St. John said that many subdivision plans include roads that are private and never planned for dedication to the county. Roads in Deer Park Valley are considered to be public roads, but not accepted by the county and therefore not the county's responsibility to maintain. "So, what happens is," St. John said, "it comes back in 20 or 25 years and people want the county to fix roads that were never set up as county roads."

Morel reported that letters of credit associated with the Deer Park Valley subdivision were ineligible for renewal after the developer's bankruptcy and subsequent death. "In the late 1990s, the county had about 30 or 35 lots dumped on them when this thing went through a bankruptcy," Morel reported, "and the county did sell a bunch of lots. But it wasn't put p as security. The banks didn't want them, so they gave them to the county," Morel said. He acknowledged that the properties were of negligible value, selling for between \$500 and \$1,000 each.

County commissioner Tom Battin said that road issues are a county wide problem, and moved for the formation of a committee or task force to evaluate all of the roads in Lincoln County, and to try to estimate the financial consequences associated with improving the roads. Battin's motion included establishing a priority list for road improvements with emphasis on Deer Park Valley. Battin also said that possibilities for alternative sources of funding should be investigated.

Glenn Remington, who said he is building a spec house in Deer Park Valley, asked the county commissioners to mandate a special assessment for a paving district there. "Either we can get together as property owners and do it ourselves, which would be a daunting task, or you can mandate it," Remington said. "It seems to me that's what we need to do instead of wasting time with a task force. I want to focus in on Deer Park Valley," Remington said.

Hobbs responded by telling Remington, "I will fight it tooth-and-nail. These people have already paid for a special assessment district and got nothing."

County commissioner Eileen Lovelace spoke in favor of establishing a task force, but objected to placing emphasis on Deer Park Valley. "I think it's a great idea to have a committee to check out all of the roads in the county, but these are not county roads," Lovelace said. "It doesn't make sense to make them a priority when we have all of these actual county roads that have problems."

St. John indicated her agreement with Lovelace, and suggested that the residents of Deer Park Valley form a homeowners association to address their problems. Battin's motion passed on a 4 to 1 vote, with Lovelace voting against it.

Airport Passenger Service Proposed and Cancelled

In an effort to bring commercial passenger air service to the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, Tom Wylam, airport director, spoke before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners last month to drum up financial support. "In September of 2005, the Village of Ruidoso applied for a Small Community Air Service Development Grant

with the Department of Transportation, and we were awarded that grant," Wylam told the county commissioners. "The Department of Transportation has appropriated \$600,000 to us for the program, the State of New Mexico has also appropriated \$200,000 to the program, and we are seeking a commitment on behalf of the local community of \$200,000," Wylam said.

The airport director reported having made significant progress toward bringing regular commercial flights to Ruidoso. "We have selected an air service consultant, Ken Meyers, and Ken has done his best to attract an airline for us," Wylam said.

He reported that the most desirable type of aircraft and the time and nature of the daily services that would be

best for the airport have been determined. "It has all boiled down to the fact that we need to negotiate with an airline on a fare type basis, and we also need to negotiate what location they're going to serve," Wylam said. He sug-


gested that the best possible service would be flights from Ruidoso to Houston and Dallas. "If we have only one to choose from, we're looking at Houston," he said.

Wylam said the flights would be seasonal, operating

from just before Memorial Day into September until sometime after Labor Day.

County commission chair Rick Simpson said that he would like to see the airline operate into October to accommodate out of state hunters.

Capitan Appoints Police Chief

In a special meeting of the Capitan village council held Tuesday, September 26, trustees approved the hiring of Randy Spears as the new Capitan Chief of Police. Spears is a former member of the Capitan police department, serving from around 1978 until 1990 as a police officer and then chief of the department.

Spears left the Capitan department to serve as an officer of the Ruidoso Police Department.

Spears returns to Capitan under some controversy, following the termination of former Capitan police chief Robert Bird on September 12th and the resignations of Capitan police officers Randy Haskins and Harry Bailey a few days later.


According to Capitan Mayor Sam Hammons, Spears is a long time acquaintance of the mayor. "I've known Randy since he came here and worked with him in the past. I've got all of the confidence in the world in him," Hammons said Wednesday of last week, "and he's a person I can work with." Hammons cited Spears' experience on the Ruidoso police department's drug task force and a state organization of police chiefs as valuable assets to the Capitan police force.

Hammons and Spears met with Lincoln County Sheriff Rick Virden on Wednesday last week, and Hammons reported that the sheriff's officers and members of the New Mexico State Police Department will continue to assist the village of Capitan in its law enforcement needs until more officers are hired in Capitan.

"Rick Virden has been a blessing to us, and is one champion of a fellow," Hammons said. Spears has been officially sworn in as Capitan Chief of Police and was to take charge of the department beginning sometime this past weekend.

When asked about a timetable for the hiring of new officers, Hammons acknowledged that he was to meet with a candidate in Alamogordo last Thursday. "But I'm not going to rush this," Hammons said. "I want Capitan to have the best police force they have ever had," Hammons said that

Lynda Sanchez Appointed to BLM Advisory Council

Lynda Sanchez, vice chair of the Fort Stanton Development Commission, has been appointed to serve on a Bureau of Land Management Resource Advisory Council (BLM-RAC). The purpose of the council is to provide input from local community members, concerned citizens and government officials from all levels regarding BLM decisions on public land issues and policies.

Sanchez told *The News* that she will be a representative of archaeological and historical groups with concerns about cultural resources.

According to Sanchez, others serving on this council represent the holders of grazing, oil, gas and mineral rights on public lands, the timber industry, hunters, wild horse and burro organizations, outdoor recreation organizations, elected officials within the state and Indian tribes within or adjacent to the BLM-RAC's jurisdiction.

Sanchez said the RAC will develop recommendations for the BLM regarding the preparation, amendment and implementation of land use plans, gather and analyze information, conduct field

studies and hear public testimony. The council is also expected to help advance federal, state and local cooperation in the management of both natural and cultural resources on public lands.

Sanchez has an extensive background in issues surrounding the research, documentation and preservation of the history and traditional culture of Lincoln County and New Mexico. She serves as the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners' representative on the Boots and Saddles Committee under the direction of the U.S. Department of the Interior, the BLM and the National Park Service. That committee was established in 1989 to study innovative preservation methods for the state's seven historic military forts that were active during the Civil War and Indian campaigns. "I am hopeful that I will be able to help with heritage and historical issues even more now, and especially with regard to Fort Stanton and the many wonderful cultural resources that are on Bureau of Land Management lands throughout the state of New Mexico," Sanchez said.

County Makes Purchases

On September 19th, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners elected to pay \$41,763 to Sierra Blanca Motors of Ruidoso, for the purchase of a 4x4 dual wheel, diesel engine, 4500 series, General Motors truck chassis for the Bonito Fire Department. The fire department has ordered the vehicle body separately and that will be equipped as a brush truck for the Bonito department. Sierra Blanca Motors submitted the only bid for the chassis, though Request for Proposals (RFPs) were sent to several major car dealerships, according to county manager Tom Stewart.

Responses to an RFP for the construction of a 40 by 60 foot metal warehouse behind the Lincoln County Detention Center came from Sombretto Construction of Capitan. The proposals were evaluated by Stewart, the county's finance director Fran Altieri, and Orlanda Samora, purchasing agent for Lincoln County. Sombretto Construction bid \$81,000 for the job and was awarded 249 points on their proposal. CG Construction bid \$65,377 and received 290 points.

County commissioner Eileen Lovelace said she was not familiar with CG Construction, and asked the county manager if the company had proven experience in such construction. "I've never heard of them, that's why I'm wondering," Lovelace explained.

Stewart said that the bid packet received from CG Construction indicated that the company had completed several projects in the Capitan area that are similar to the warehouse construction planned by the county.

Lovelace said she was concerned about the bid. "I know about people that put up these buildings," Lovelace said, "and I just want to make sure they know what they're doing."

Stewart said that his biggest concern was associated with the concrete pad under the metal building. Stewart explained that the metal building will be designed to specifications in accordance with the county's needs. He

said the metal building and plans for assembly will be shipped to CG Construction, who will erect the structure according to the manufacturer's assembly directions.

Stewart reminded the commissioners that the ultimate goal is to be able to relocate records stored in the basement of the old detention center annex and to house the county's emergency services mobile command unit. The command unit is currently housed in the Capitan Fire Department firehouse. The new firehouse will feature a fire command vehicle.

The county commissioner voted unanimously to award

the warehouse construction bid to CG Construction of Capitan, pending receiving a required statement from the company regarding any political campaign contributions of \$250 or more.

A bid from Sombretto Construction for \$29,950 to renovate the county's old detention and convert it to a new dispatch center was also accepted by the county commissioner on September 19th. Stewart reported that Neal Plumbing and Remodeling of Carrizozo, and Alamo Framing Plus Construction of Alamogordo, responded to the county's RFP, but declined to submit bid on the project.

Old Angus Fire Station for Sale

Back in 1963 the volunteers of the Bonito fire department decided to Lincoln County a small plot of land that houses the single bay Angus fire station. The Bonito Volunteer Fire Department has owned quite considerably since then. A new fire station is located nearby in the Copper Canyon community development on Highway 380, and the old Angus

station has become almost obsolete.

In response to a request from county manager Tom Stewart and Bonito fire chief Carl Bartley in 2005, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners agreed to approve the sale of the old fire station, with proceeds from the sale returning to the Bonito fire department. Debra Ingle, operations supervisor for the

County Commissioner Eileen Lovelace suggested that it would make more sense to offer daily flights to Albuquerque or El Paso year-round, but Wylam said that two airlines have made attempts to provide those services in the past, and both discontinued flights when financial subsidies expired.

County Commissioner Maurice St. John asked Wylam to estimate the possible fees for flying in and out of Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, and Wylam said those rates would have to be negotiated. Wylam did sug-

gest that the public would likely pay up to \$100 more than the cost of flying out of Albuquerque or El Paso, due to the savings in time and fuel required to drive to those airports. "I think that's something that most people will go for," Wylam said.

Former county commissioner Ken Nosker told the board of commissioners that agriculture is no longer the economic base for Lincoln County, as it has been replaced by tourism. "This would further our growth, and I support it whole heartedly," Nosker

said about the airport plans.

St. John agreed that passenger air service could benefit the local economy, but wanted to know the bottom line. "To begin with, the numbers come up to one million bucks," St. John said. "What are we going to get?"

Wylam told her that the airport would carry one flight per day for four months during the summer and, if that service is successful, he would hope to add winter service sometime in the future. The one million in funding that the airport officials hope to raise would be used to offset losses or unprofitable expenses to the airline if ticket sales fail to support the flights. Wylam said that the program would be reviewed after the second year, and cancelled if it fails to become self-sufficient.

Wylam indicated that Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs have each committed \$60,000 to the project, and requested the same from the county.

County Commissioner Tom Battin questioned whether or not the county would reap benefits equal to those of the municipalities. Wylam admitted that the program might use all of its funding during the first season, and that he could be forced to ask for additional funds in the second year.

Lovelace said she was thinking of how much base course for the county's roads \$60,000 would buy.

During a break in the county commissioners meeting, Wylam apparently left the courthouse complex and did not return. The county commissioners shared concerns regarding the level of priority that should be attached to supporting the airport.

County commissioner Earl Hobbs, who holds an airline transport pilot's license and worked for 23 years as an air traffic control specialist, stated his belief that an investment of \$60,000 of the taxpayers' money to support the airport project would not be wise. "I am well schooled in all aspects of airport operations," Hobbs said, "and this is a fool's mission. This is not a business proposition," he added, "because there's no return." Hobbs told his fellow county commissioners that similar projects have been tried repeatedly across the country and all have failed. "If the market were there for an air carrier, the air carrier would go in and operate," Hobbs said. "It's not economically viable and it's not going to be economically viable."

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners voted to table any decision regarding support of the airport proposal, because Wylam was no longer present. The item was reopened briefly later in the meeting at the request of county manager Tom Stewart. Stewart reported that the air carrier with whom airport officials had been negotiating had just withdrawn from the project, and no further action would be required of the county commissioners.

E-Cycling Event Nov. 4

A free county-wide electronic recycling event will be held November 4 at Sierra Mall in Ruidoso from 10:00 a.m. to 2 p.m. The event is sponsored by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) in conjunction with the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, Keep Ruidoso Beautiful, EEM Scrap of Alamogordo and Lawrence Bros. IGA, New Mexico and National Recycling coalitions are also participating in the event.

LCSWA operational supervisor Debra Ingle said arrangements are being made to assist county residents in outlying areas to drop off their discarded electronics earlier at their own community solid waste convenience site for transport to the November 4 event.

The LCSWA board of directors during their regular meeting September 29 adopted a resolution assigning Joe Lewandowski and Ingle as signatory authority on a \$300,000 grant of which one percent has been set aside by law for Arts in Public Places. The purpose of the grant is for construction of the LCSWA new Greentree

Transfer Station and Recycling Center in Ruidoso Downs.

In other business, the LCSWA board approved removal of \$331 in accounts receivable on vacated resident property verified by the county assessor.

Received notification by the state of its approval of the LCSWA 2006-07 operating budget.

Discussed the county's counter offer to sell to LCSWA the Angus fire station property. LCSWA had offered \$3,000, not to exceed \$5,000. The county is asking \$6,500. LCSWA declined the counter offer. County commissioner Tom Battin abstained from voting. Ray Nunley, mayor of Ruidoso was excused from the meeting.

Approved an agreement for website hosting and website development agreement with Shonny's Web Design at a cost of \$1,179 for site hosting, development and first year maintenance. The new LCSWA website is www.lcswa.org.

\$6,500," Stewart said. "If that's not acceptable to Lincoln County Solid Waste, he'll continue to use it as a sub-fire-station."

In efforts to secure a water tender apparatus for the Nogal Volunteer Fire Department, county commissioners agreed to enter into an inter-local purchasing agreement with the Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC).

Stewart said the purchasing agreement is similar to a contract with the state, and allows the county to purchase equipment without seeking bids. He said there are only two companies in the region that can provide water tenders as needed by the Nogal Fire Department, one in New Mexico and one in Texas.

Through the H-GAC agreement, county officials may choose the company that offers the best price on the apparatus. County commissioners agreed to enter into the agreement with H-GAC for the purchase of the tender.

The historic site is open only two days a year, the first Saturday in April and the first Saturday in October.

There are two entrances to Trinity Site:

The Stallion Gate entrance. Located 54 miles west of Carrizozo on US Hwy 380 and 12 miles east of I-25 on US Hwy 380, will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Visitors are allowed to enter and exit unescorted any time between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. through the Stallion Gate.

There is a change this year in the departure for the Alamogordo tour caravan. During previous years the caravan would meet at the Otero County Fairgrounds in Alamogordo for departure about 7:45 a.m. This year the caravan will meet at the

Tularosa High School for departure by 8 a.m. This escorted caravan will arrive at Trinity Site about 10 a.m. and depart Trinity Site at 12:30 p.m. Those who wish to stay longer may exit through the Stallion Gate.

Photo ID will be required of all visitors to Trinity Site. Cameras will be allowed only at Trinity Site and McDonald House. Cameras must not be used on either of the drives from gates to Trinity Site. Vehicles should have a full tank of fuel and a spare tire because no services are available between the entrance gates. Visitors are encouraged to bring a lunch.

Time to Take Aluminum Can Re-cycling "Up A Notch"

You've just finished a 'tall cold one' a soft drink or alcoholic beverage and you're left with a damp, empty aluminum can. Or one of those new 'energy drinks' but you have the same old problem - what to do with the empty can. Many are tossed in the trash. Others are tossed along mountain roadsides. Too few find their way into the recycling stream. Toss no mas. It's time to take recycling of aluminum cans up a notch.

Believe it or not, aluminum can recycling has fallen in the US since 1991 when 65 percent of all cans produced were recycled. In 2004, the beverage can industry reported that 51.2 percent or 51.5 billion cans were recycled, an increase of 1.2 percent, the first since 1997. Recycling figures from industry and environmental groups vary though from a low of only 43.9 percent to a high of 51.2 percent in the same time period. In 2005, more than 800,000 tons of aluminum cans still ended up in landfills. Despite the general drop over the past decade, the aluminum can today is the most recycled consumer beverage container in the United States, at more than twice the recycling rate for beverage packages of other materials such as glass or paper. The aluminum can is 100 percent recyclable into new beverage cans. In 2005, Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) bought back and recycled 17.2 tons of aluminum in Lincoln County, delivering 1,500 pound crushed aluminum bales four times a year to a reprocessor in Roswell. Similar figures for Otero County are unavailable for 2005.

"There are tremendous social, economic and environmental benefits to recycling aluminum cans," according to industry spokesman from the Aluminum Association. Recycling saves energy. For example, recycling 40 aluminum cans has the energy - saving equivalent of more than a gallon gasoline. 30 empty aluminum cans weighs approximately one pound. Collecting and recycling cans makes a contribution to cleaner air, energy efficiency and reduced landfill use. Using recycled aluminum rather than raw bauxite ore (the source of aluminum) produced abroad is also becoming a national strategic and defense priority.

Many types of used aluminum, primarily beverage cans, find their way into recycling through buy-back centers or by donating cans to charitable organizations. Recycling partnerships with national or local charities such as Habitat for Humanity, the Ruidoso High School SADD program and the Community Methodist Church Parish Health program account for much of this activity. The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority is willing to work with groups in Lincoln or Otero counties who collect aluminum cans and will write a check directly to the organization or club. The SADD group at Ruidoso High School for example has been conducting a recycling drive since early in 2006 with a can collection trailer at School House Park in Ruidoso.

Cans are not the only type of aluminum that is accepted at buy-back centers. Structural aluminum such as

automobile tire rims, discarded aluminum siding, trailer house sheeting, and used door and window frames are accepted with buyback prices just over 20 cents per pound. Aluminum cans are currently purchased at 28 cents per pound for under 100 pounds and 30 cents per pound for over 100 pounds. The LCSWA buy-back program prices for all metals change weekly according to fluctuations in the national and worldwide metals market. LCSWA purchases empty aluminum cans from individuals and organizations at its recycling center at 222 2nd street in Ruidoso Downs.

A variety of practical and attractive recycling containers can also be purchased for home or business use. Can crushers or 'canpactors' - a 30 gallon container with a mounted can crusher - are also available from retail outlets. This equipment reduces the bulky size of the can and deposits the crushed can in a lined container, later to be dropped off at any one of several local buy-back centers.

Lesson plans and other materials on aluminum recycling are available for use with young people by area school teachers at www.aluminum.org.

County Could Change Contour

As new proposed developments proceed, they will have an effect on the countryside. The skyline will change in many places. Buildings will rise at almost unpredictable speed, and homes will clutter once barren spaces. School bus stop signs will adorn roadways, and there may be additional no passing zones on highways.

Questions have arisen as to whether this will be good for the county or not. Some people are encouraged about new business opportunities in remote areas. Others object to the urban sprawl atmosphere in once pristine locations. The debate will no doubt continue, but the fact is that the county is growing. Very few areas in the United States are not experiencing growth, with the possible exception of wilderness areas that have no access. Growth has also not been rampant in desolate areas of Nevada and a few of those other western states with their wide open spaces.

Using the census as a guideline, there will be more and more people. There are several reasons for this, medical advances help keep people alive longer, more babies are being born, and life is less harsh than umpteen years ago.


It isn't logical to return to the harsh living conditions of a few hundred years ago, which means that growth is inevitable. The best thing to do is regulate that growth.

Frequently people assume (note the first three letters of that word) that someone else will do the regulating and those do-nothing people provide little input in helping devise logical growth plans. Not true, everyone has the responsibility to be involved. When everyone assists with the growth plans, the results could and should be in the best interests of the environment as well as the people.

Environmental concerns include water, the availability of water and the quality of that water. Hard water versus soft water is not the question, it is whether adequate water is available not only for the next few years but for many generations in the future. Hydrological studies may help with this dilemma, but it will be an ongoing problem that will have to be resolved and regulations put into place. There is much controversy about requiring meters on all residential wells, and who will pay for those new meters. But the water issue will continue to be a major concern.

Regardless of whether you are "fer" or "agin," growth is coming to Lincoln County. Future generations will not remember when the area on Hwy 380 between Carrizozo and Capitan had very few buildings or when Nogal was sparsely populated. They will take for granted the homes and businesses between communities. They may even consider that the last decades of the 20th century and the first few years of this century were the "dark ages" when life was simple. Remember what you thought about the way your ancestors did things? Contours and life changes.

Due to the high pressure systems settling down over northeastern Texas, the cold front moving in from the north Pacific coast will have most of the moisture that would have landed on the high plains of central New Mexico. The cold front that does arrive will dump most of the remaining moisture it carries on the northwestern, four corners area of the state.

We will be experiencing winds mostly out of the east in the morning and turning to come from a more southerly direction in the late evening hours.

because they had talked too much around her at their wild parties.

The story that circulated for 50 years among politicians was that she accidentally was run over when she jumped out of a car full of top state officials headed for party time in Anapra.

But that may not be what happened, according to a new book by Peter Sandman, the son of a deputy sheriff who continued investigating the murder, gambling and political corruption on his own, long after the case was closed.

As Ray Sandman was getting close to solving the case in April 1953, he was murdered gangland style. He also knew too much. So Cricket Coogler's murder remains unsolved.

But after poring over his father's notes and diaries, Sandman feels he can identify the killer,

which he does in "Murder Near the Crosses," from Barbed Wire Publishing in Las Cruces.

Ironically, Sandman doesn't like Coogler's presumed killer to corrupt politicians or to the mob. It was a brutal sex murder that the sheriff likely would have solved if he wouldn't have been so busy trying to protect the politicians he presumed were responsible.

But Sandman thinks the politicians bungled their attempt. He thinks Coogler expected the politicians to kill her and she fled them into the car of someone she knew and thought she could trust.

Although the murder remains unsolved, it precipitated events that ended the Mafia's attempt to take over New Mexico. It also ended some political careers: Ed Mechem, a Las Cruces

SANTA FE -- Can you imagine Santa Fe as the world's gambling capital? Or Las Vegas, Nevada as a dusty, little desert town, a fraction the size of Las Vegas, New Mexico.

It almost happened. Were it not for the brutal murder of a young waitress in Las Cruces and an outrageous cover-up attempt by the local sheriff, the Land of Enchantment likely would be very different today.

In the late 1940s, the Cleveland Mob decided to expand its gambling operations to New Mexico, Arizona and Nevada.

Bugsy Siegel was sent to scout around. He chose the little town of Las Vegas, Nevada to build a hotel and casino he called the Flamingo. It was a \$5 million bust.

So he set his sights on the much more attractive town of Santa Fe that already was teeming with tourists. He found the New Mexico's politicians friendly and easy to buy.

Soon he set up gambling dens in other resort towns like Ruidoso, Eagle Nest and Red River. He also found a friendly political climate in Dona Ana County. He opened a hotel in Radium Springs and three gambling halls in Anapra, on the border with Texas and Mexico.

He learned that state politicians loved to escape to Las Cruces, away from the glare of publicity in Albuquerque and Santa Fe. And he found the county sheriff, Happy Apodaca, extremely accommodating. Soon the big boys from Cleveland were visiting New Mexico and making friends in the state capital.

But in the spring of 1949, the good times began to change with the murder of Cricket Coogler, a favorite girlfriend of the Santa Fe politicians. The murder was tragic but what infuriated the public even more was the incredibly botched job of investigating it.

Everyone assumed that Sheriff Apodaca was covering up for his political friends who wanted Cricket out of the way

attorney became the first Republican governor in 20 years by vowing to wipe out gambling.

There were other heroes too. A citizen-called grand jury ignored the district attorney and conducted its own gambling raids. The state Supreme Court chief justice and a district judge, both from Roswell, stepped in and "virtually kidnapped the executive branch of the state government," as Sandman put it.

Sandman spent many years obtaining and scrutinizing FBI files and court documents. He names those his father thought were crooked and identified those he could trust.

The book is a stranger-than-fiction look at an era of New Mexico political corruption that rivals the Santa Fe Ring of the late 1800s.

A 33-year resident of the historic town of Lincoln, Sanchez is a member and former president of the Lincoln County Historical Society and a member of the Archaeological Society of New Mexico. Sanchez studied the history and culture of the Sierra Madre Apaches while serving as a research associate professor at the Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU) in Portales.

She has authored more than 100 articles; co-authored a curriculum on archaeology for K-college entitled *Save the Past for New Mexico's Future*; and co-authored, with Eve Ball and Nora Henn, *Indeh: An Odyssey of the Apaches*. Ball was awarded the 1984 Saddleman Award from the Western Writers of America and all three co-authors received the Zia Award of the New Mexico Press Women.

Sanchez acknowledged the challenges that the RAC will likely face, but expressed the importance of such councils. "I believe that the BLM is really beginning to look at cultural and natural resources in a more critical manner, as we are losing so much of our heritage everywhere to development and habitat destruction," Sanchez said.
