

# Historic District Hwy. Improvements Planned

According to Robert Kurtz, the engineering support manager for District Two of the New Mexico Department of Transportation (NMDOT), the improvement of U.S. Highway 380 from Hondo to Capitan has been contemplated for years. The first of a new round of several planned meetings with residents of the historic town of Lincoln

held there on October 5th, was designed to gather input from residents regarding improvements to the highway.


Kurtz told those in attendance at the October 5 meeting that the NMDOT has been reviewing the Highway 380 project for 10 or 15 years. He recalled a point in the process that occurred four or five years ago, when department engineers presented plans to the Lincoln

community that he described as "grandiose." "We kind of got run out of town," Kurtz said. He told the Lincoln residents that there is now a five year plan in the works for improvements to Highway 380, with separate phases for sections east and west of the Lincoln Historic District. Those separate phases will not begin until the improvements to the highway within the historic district are finished, he said. "We may be able to take advantage of what we do in this district itself, and tie in the same geometrics so that we have consistency all the way from Capitan to Hondo."

"The department is hoping to build a consensus and move off of square one," Kurtz said, "in making improvements to the roadway, and improvements to the drainage system." He reported that the bridge over Priest Gulch is poor shape

and plans are to reconstruct the bridge. "We want to make improvements in such a way that they will improve safety and blend aesthetically with the historic nature and context of the valley," Kurtz said.

## LOGIC Protests Capitan Gag Order

Last weekend an email notice began to circulate around Capitan and surrounding areas announcing the formation of a group calling itself LOGIC, an acronym for Legal and Open Government in Capitan. The email message requested that anyone "concerned about the political, economic, and social health and future of Capitan" attend Tuesday, October 10, evening's meeting of the Capitan Village Council. "We need a major show of support for those of us in opposition to the actions and attitudes of our current administration," the email read.

The email also asked that those of LOGIC mind bring a scarf, bandana or tape to cover their mouths in silent protest over the recent announcement that future village council meetings will be closed to public comment. That announcement was made through the mayor's monthly newsletter distributed with Capitan water bills. The letter was scripted by Capitan village clerk Kay Strickland on behalf of mayor Sam Hammons who is away on vacation.

By 6:00 p.m., 30 minutes before the council meeting was scheduled to convene, LOGIC supporters were gathered in the parking area

and on the porch of the village hall. Many sported T-shirts printed with the word LOGIC in large type. A good number of the 50 or so people who filled the village hall and overflowed outside wore bandanas around their necks.

Mayor pro tem trustee Diane Riska, in Hammons' absence, preceded the meeting with a statement to the public. She referred to two portions of the New Mexico Open Meetings Act that apply to the rights of the public. "One section is designed to let (all citizens) attend all of our public meetings. It also provides for agendas to be posted in advance, so that no business can be added to the agenda at the last minute," Riska said. She further explained that the Open Meetings Act prevents the village council from meeting in closed session without advertising that intent in advance. "In our seven meetings, we've gone into closed session one time, so I don't think we have abused that in any way," Riska said.

"The other part of the act that is important to us as a council, and to you as a community, is designed to allow us to keep our meetings orderly and not let it become an open forum," Riska said the announcement in the mayor's letter was intended to prevent the council meet-

ings from getting out of hand, as occurred in September. "I think that (meeting) truly hurt our whole community," she added. Riska told the meeting attendees that the village council does not want "to shut them up, or shut them out," and suggested that a village policy should be established to allow for public input.

Riska then offered a 15 minute period for public comment before the meeting was officially called into session. "We do not want to have this conflict that is going on in Capitan," she said, "and it was never our intent to cause the hurt feelings and bitterness that has happened in this community."

One Capitan resident expressed a disappointment in the council's seemed disinterest in the opinion of the citizens. "There's a lot of people out there right now who fight every day for our freedoms; one of those freedoms is the freedom of speech," he said. "If some of them were here today, they would be pleased, because we're having a conversation." The resident said his biggest issue was the firing of police chief Bird. "I know first hand what the drugs are doing to our community," he said. His eyes watered up as

## New Solid Waste Compactors Now at Cedar Creek and Nogal

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) has announced that new solid waste trash compactors are now operational at Cedar Creek and Nogal Fire Stations for residents in those areas. A simple three step process taking

LCSWA is in the process of replacing many older dumpsters with new compactors across rural Lincoln County in other locations to be announced as sites are developed and as equipment is acquired. New compactors takes the place of the older dumpsters previously in both areas.

## Pat Aguilar selected for Induction to NM Highlands U. Athletic Hall-of-Fame

Patrick Aguilar, a 1959 graduate of Carrizozo High School, and a 2-year track letterman at Highlands, has been selected for induction into the New Mexico Highlands University Athletic Hall-of-Fame (coaching category).

Aguilar coached for 21 years in New Mexico and Texas and included stints at Clayton High School and Farmington High School in New Mexico; Abilene High School in Texas, Texas A&I University in Kingsville; Hanks High School and Austin High School in El Paso.

His football tenure at Clayton included four years as head football coach, and was selected Class AA Coach of the Year by the Albuquerque Journal in 1971, when his Yellowjackets went 10-0 in the regular season, before being eliminated in the playoffs by a strong Ruidoso squad.

Aguilar's Clayton track team won nine district championships and were second at the Class AA State Meet in 1967. While at Abilene High School in Texas his Eagles were second at the Class AAAA State Meet in Austin in 1975 and were state champions in 1976. He was selected Texas High School Coach of the Year by the Texas Sportswriters Association that same year. His Eagles relay teams were consistently among the best in the state and in 1975 and 1976 had the top times in the nation in the 440 Relay -- registering times of 41.0 and 40.6, narrowly missing the national record.

The NMDOT has contracted CH2MHill, an engineering firm in Albuquerque, to design the highway improvements. Mike Brazie, the senior project manager for CH2MHill, said he wanted to emphasize at the onset that the design process had not yet begun. "We want to hear from you, your issues and how you would like to see this project done from a community standpoint," Brazie told the meeting attendees. "This project is only concerned with that portion of U.S. 380 that is in the Lincoln

Historic District, which is from mileposts 91 to 102.5." Brazie said that his team will perform a detailed evaluation of design alternatives, study the environmental impact, and prepare a preliminary design package for approval.

After researching the project's history and speaking with some Lincoln residents and agencies associated with the project, several issues had been identified prior to the October 5th meeting, Brazie said. "To this point, we've identified issues on safety and speeding, preservation of the historic buildings and context of the community, and parking," Brazie said, "and we've heard two opinions on parking. Some people said they like the on street parking; others said they'd like to get the parking off of the street." The design team was also hoping for input regarding the nature of sidewalks in the district and the concept of designing walkways that are compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). "The DOT has asked us to look at some drainage problems; the bridge over Priest Canyon has been determined to be structurally inadequate and the district wants to replace the bridge as soon as possible," Brazie said. "There have also been concerns about rock hazards and rock falls from some of the slopes."

The overall project team will include representatives from the NMDOT, the Federal Highway Administration, CH2MHill and some specialty subcontractors hired by that firm and others. According to Brazie, Eric Johnson of Albuquerque's Marron Associates will manage the environmental assessments, local resident Reginald Ritchie will assist the design team with context sensitive issues, Thomas R. Mann, Albuquerque surveyor, will do the mapping of the project. TBE Engineering firm based in Florida and with offices in

more than two dozen states including New Mexico, will engineer the sub-surface utility plans and AMEC, an international infrastructure solutions provider, will offer the geo-technical consultation services associated with the bridge and rock slopes. Along with concerned Lincoln citizens, representatives of the Partners in Preservation of the Lincoln State Monuments, the Lincoln Preservation Board, the National Park Service, the manager of the Lincoln State Monuments, Bureau of Land Management (BLM) recreation and archeology representatives, a Fort Stanton Development Committee member, a Lincoln Water Board member and the Lincoln County manager were also present.

Dan Andersen, also of CH2MHill, reported that the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish (NMDGF) and wildlife services will be involved, as will the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers where water crossings are affected. Archeological and historic sites will be identified, inventoried and protected, and Native American groups will be consulted regarding any possible sacred sites in the area. Any design plan must comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). Andersen addressed some of the previously identified issues associated with Highway 380 within the Lincoln Historic District, and asked those interested in the project to help establish an evaluation process to determine the best possible ways to manage those issues. Andersen said that CH2MHill planned to set up a stakeholders working group made up of citizens of Lincoln and other interested parties who would assist in the identification of specific issues and in weighing alternative design proposals. "We will also have a project steering team," Andersen said, "made up of some high level representatives to make sure that whatever ideas we come up with can be implemented and fit within the standard codes and laws." The Department of Transportation will make the final decisions regarding any design proposals.

Concerns presented by those who attended the meeting included drainage and water run off management, safety issues associated with truck traffic, pedestrian and equestrian access to public land and facilities, and the possibility of the installation of underground utilities including new water lines that would run under the highway. Andersen said that some of the proposals may not fall within the jurisdiction of or budget of the NMDOT, and alternative funding sources may be required to implement them. The CH2MHill representatives came to the meeting with an extensive list of safety, accessibility and historic preservation issues that have been previously identified, and several more during the course of the meeting.

Brazie explained to the Lincoln residents that the highway project will be handled differently than traditional engineering projects in that certain preservation concepts have priority over standard solution methods.

he told the trustees, that his own son had a drug problem. "Chief Bird was doing everything he could to try to (rid us) of this meth that's invaded our community. If you let the war fighters fight the wars things will get done, but when politicians start trying to tell the war fighters how to fight, it turns out just like Viet Nam," he said.

Another resident suggested that Capitan trustee Lilly Wood has compromised her position as a representative of the people. "I think Lilly needs to do the right thing by stepping down, or the council needs to ask her to step down," she said. "We all make bad decisions in life," she told Wood, "and I think you've made a bad decision." Wood recently made a public denial regarding her participation in the drafting of a letter condemning the actions of former Capitan police lieutenant Randy Haskins. She later admitted to assisting a Capitan resident with writing the letter.

After that comment, Capitan village attorney Zach Cook warned the trustees

that there may be some legal issues associated with the Open Meetings Act if the public comment period continued. Council members are restricted to discussion of only those items included in the public agenda, which the comment period was not. Also, any meeting of a quorum of trustees must be held as a public meeting, which the comment period was not officially a part of. Upon cancellation of the 15 minutes offered for public comment, many of the Capitan citizens pulled their bandanas over their mouths, some used duct tape, to show their displeasure.

The last item on the agenda for the council meeting was for discussion of an open meetings and public input policy. Capitan trustee Bill Martin said he asked for that item to be placed on the agenda for a variety of reasons. "Partially because I believe that we have a strong commitment to the public that, above and beyond our ability to simply receive their comments, suggestions, recommendations and com-

plaints outside of the meetings, there needs to be some mechanism in place to having the public have some say within the meetings, beyond that of the legal requirements for ordinances," Martin said. "Of all the jurisdictions and municipalities in the county, we are the only jurisdiction that does not permit, on a regular basis, the issue of

The Capitan trustees agreed to plan a workshop to draw up a resolution dictating an official policy to accommodate some level of public input at future council meetings. They indicated that the resolution should be ready for adoption at the November village council meeting.

### Public Comment of Controversy?

Suggesting that people work together is the mainstay of this column. However, some people insist it is their way or no way. There is no middle ground, to mediation, no possibility of settling differences. What a shame that those people are missing out on one of the most gratifying experiences of a lifetime, that of accomplishing together.

Perhaps that standoff one-way attitude is why there is as much dissension in the world as there is. Not being able to accept another person's viewpoint starts leads. It also starts wars that have continued for decades. There are no winners, only losers. Why can't people accept the fact that not everyone has the same desires and wishes?

Expecting everyone to conform to one way of thinking is not logical. As an example, if one person believes that suits are the only proper types of clothing to be worn, all other clothing would be discarded. Can you imagine what would happen if oil field workers were wearing suits? It would mean having to buy a new suit each and every day. And what about nurses? Having sick patients upchuck on a uniform is not pleasant but it would be ridiculous to have to have suits cleaned daily because of sick patients. And how would you know which people are nurses and which people are imposters waiting to kidnap a baby?

Keep in mind that there is a proper place for wearing suits, just as there is a proper place for wearing uniforms. Hunters often prefer camping gear. Waders are popular with some fishermen, and can you picture football players on the three yard line trying to hike the ball to someone in a suit? Many professionals are recognized by clothing, such as referees and umpires. And race car drivers need to wear protective safety gear, not be dressed in suits.

It may sound preposterous, but some things people insist on are as ridiculous as requiring everyone wear suits. If there weren't differences of opinion, there would be no need for governments to be established. The nice thing would be that there would be no wars, but everyone would wear the same type clothing, eat the same foods, drive the same type vehicles, and life would be very dull.

Needless to say, that won't happen. Individualism is a way of life, thank goodness. Accepting individualism in others should also be a way of life. Don't expect others to agree with you on everything. Appreciate their right to do things their way just as you have a right to do it your way.

Grumbling is not effective, but working together to settle differences is effective. Public comment should be productive, not controversial. Public comment should be concise, not repetitious. Public comment should be just that, public comment. Officials may be more receptive to constructive public comment than to outbursts of temper. Try working together, not pulling different directions.

**Capitan Library Receives Grant for Computers**

Following a \$500,000 grant to 57 libraries across New Mexico, Capitan Public Library has added two new computers for public use. The grant is funded by the New Mexico Community Foundation, which, in partnership with the NM State Library, received the award from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation.

The grant is designed to continue to improve public access to technology in libraries across the state. The NM State Library provided technical assistance to the grant and will continue to provide service to community libraries.

Nelly Dominguez, program director of the New Mexico Community Foundation, and Richard Akeroyd, New Mexico State Librarian, have worked closely with the Gates Foundation on the grant. The mission is to empower libraries to support the educational, economic and health goals of their communities. With the addition of these new computers the public can access the latest, most efficient technology.

Pat Garrett, director of the Capitan Library, said the new computers have been purchased and are available for public use. The library currently has six public computers, all with internet access. With six stations, the free Tuesday evening computer classes are able to accommodate students. Wireless service is also available.



**Report to Voters on Judicial Retention Elections**

Voters throughout New Mexico will be asked whether to retain one Supreme Court justice and three Court of Appeals judges standing for retention. Under the state's constitution, these individuals must receive at least 57% voter approval to remain on the bench.

**Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission**  
In 1997, the Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission (JPEC) was established by the Supreme Court of New Mexico, in part, to provide useful, credible information to New Mexico voters on all judges standing for retention during general elections. Our nonpartisan Commission is made up of 15 members (7 lawyers and 8 non-lawyers) from throughout the state.



Simmons tells the fascinating story of Roberts' trip to New Mexico in 1950 to ask Gov. Tom Mabry for the pardon former Gov. Lew Wallace had promised.

Brushy Bill claimed to be 91, which would have been Billy's age at the time. But Mabry told him he looked more like a man in his 70s and rejected his request.

# Huge Response Delays Decision

The tremendous response of comments from the public, from the 18 public hearings, postings on the 575.org website, and by phone, has delayed the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission's decision on a new area code alternative plan.

NeuStar, the company that administers the North American numbering relief plans (area codes), petitioned the PRC to make a decision in early October. However, tabulation of the comments, 1,231 received on the www.nm575.info website alone, has just been completed, and other pressing issues have come before the commission, requiring the delay, said PRC general counsel Carol Rising.

Rising has advised the commission that she will bring the information, which will be based on public interest considerations, to the commission within the next few weeks.

The commission anticipates making the decision soon, in order for the new area code to be implemented by the last quarter of 2008. Implementation of a new area code plan could take up to 27 months.

The commission has been asked to decide on one of two alternatives - a geographic split with two areas that each have similar populations, with Area B to include Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Belen, and the northwestern quadrant, and Area A to include the rest of the state; and the overlay under which all new numbers in the state will be assigned the 575 area code once the current numbering under the 505 area code is exhausted, and all calling will require input of 10 digits.


