AG Investigates Capitan Council

After receiving a letter from Capitan resident Mary Brothers, New Mexico Attorney General Patricia Madrid has initiated an official inquiry into the actions of members of the Capitan Village Council prior to the dismissal of former Capitan Police Chief Robert Bird.

In the letter, dated September 26th and addressed to Attorney General Patricia Madrid, Brother alleged that village council member may have met at private home or at a local restaurant and had conversations over the telephone to discuss the possible action to remove Bird. "What our Mayor and Trustees have done appears to be in direct conflict with all rules of government," Brothers write to the Attorney General. She referred to a petition which she said was signed by 300 people in support of Bird and ignored by the village council, and to the fact that the village council has refused to allow public comment on the Bird firing. "They appear to be having meetings that are closed to the public which is a violation of the Open Meetings Act," Brothers stated in the letter.

Brothers also referred to Capitan Trustee, Edly Wood's participation in the drafting of a letter of complaint about the Capitan Police Department. Wood's denial of her role in writing the letter, and her eventual admission that she did in fact assist a Capitan resident with writing the letter. "It is my belief that a Trustee who lies to the Public cannot be trusted in any situation. This is a matter she should have remained above and directed to someone not a part of Village Government. She appears to have interfered in this matter without giving Chief Bird the benefit of the doubt and decided he should not be there without taking into consideration the Villagers who stand behind him," the letter from Brothers states.

According to Brothers, one Capitan resident who is a strong supporter of Mayor Sam Hammons appeared to know that a replacement for Bird had been chosen prior to any public meeting on the matter of a new police chief. In her letter to the Attorney General, Brothers questioned how the resident, LaMoyné Carpenter, would have such information before any official decision was reached. "How did he know this information?" Brother wrote. "Seems to me that there must have been some meetings, whether by phone or in person, going on among our Mayor and certain Trustees that violate the Open Meetings Act."

Brother acknowledged in the letter to Madrid that she had been a candidate for Mayor of Capitan in the 2006 election, and refers to the firing of Bird and the mayor's memorandum on public comments at council meetings as a recent travesty inflicted on Capitan on Tuesday, September 12 by our current Village Government.

On October 17th, Assistant Attorney General Sonny Swazo sent a letter to the Capitan Village Trustees notifying them of Brothers' concerns. Swazo acknowledged that the New Mexico Attorney General's office is statutorily charged with enforcement of the Open Meetings Act. Because Brothers' letter suggests a violation of that act, Swazo wrote, he requested that the Trustees explain in writing any conversations about the dismissal of Bird that may have occurred prior to the Capitan Village Council meeting of September 12th.

Swazo has specifically asked to be informed of the content of any such discussions and the names of the council members or other citizens who may have been a party in those conversations. Swazo also wants to know when and how the idea

Capitan Recall Not An Option

As petitions in favor of a recall election in Capitan are being distributed, members of the recently organized group of Lincoln County and Capitan citizens calling itself L.O.G.I.C., short for Local and Open Government in Capitan, may find that Local and Open Government is confusing at times. Although one member of the organization has reported that a lot of people have signed the recall petitions, it appears that a recall is simply not an option afforded to citizens of municipalities like Capitan.

The state of New Mexico recognizes, basically, three forms of municipal government. The rights, restrictions and authorities of municipalities vary depending on the type of government that is in place. Of the three types, mayor council, commission manager or charter, sometimes known as a home-rule municipality, Capitan is a mayor council municipality. In that form of government, voters have no right to recall a municipal official.

According to the New Mexico Municipal League (NMMLE), a nonprofit international research and legal services organization that assists municipal officials, understand the laws that govern their villages and towns, mayors are the chief executives and organizers of municipalities like Capitan. The mayor is expected to preside over public meetings and cast a vote in the meetings only in the case of tie. Mayors are tasked with the supervision, appointment of officers and municipal employees, and, with the approval of a majority of the village council members, hire and fire those employees.

In mayor council governments that have no merit system of pay, municipal employees are considered to be at will employees. That means that all municipal employees serve at the will of the mayor and the board of trustees, and

County Employee Compensation Plan

Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart has drafted a plan that he says is designed to bring employee salaries in line with the open market competition and insure fair compensation for all of the county's employees.

Stewart presented a letter to the Lincoln County Classification and Compensation Plan to the board of county commissioners in October, which he said resulted in discussions with John Martinez who served as a consultant in the development of the plan. Stewart said that he will present a final version of the plan, in the form of a county resolution, at the November 21st meeting of the county commissioners.

The plan calls for a five percent cost of living allowance (COLA) and a three per cent longevity pay increase for all non-exempt county employees to be implemented in December. Each employee will

There are also four constitutional amendment questions on the ballot and three bond questions on the general ballot, each one is for or against:

Constitutional Amendment 1
Proposing to repeal article 2, Section 22 of the Constitution of New Mexico, in order to protect the right of all persons to acquire and to possess real property.

Constitutional Amendment 2
Proposing to amend the Constitution of New Mexico

to allow the state and school districts, including charter schools, to enter into agreements for the leasing of buildings and other real property with an option to purchase.

Constitutional Amendment 3
Proposing an amendment to Article 16, of the Constitution of New Mexico to add a new section to provide for a water trust fund.

Constitutional Amendment 4
Proposing an amendment to Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico to permit the state, an instrumentality of the state and local governments to provide or pay a portion of the cost of land, buildings or necessary financing for affordable housing projects.

Bond Question A
2006 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of senior citizens facility improvements and construction bonds, obligation bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed fifteen million, nine hundred fifty-eight thousand dollars (15,958,000) to make capital expenditures for certain senior citizen facility improvements and construction projects and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and collection of the tax as permitted by law?

Bond Question B
The 2006 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of higher educational capital improvement and acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed one hundred eighty million three hundred sixty thousand dollars (118,360,000) to

make capital expenditures for certain higher education capital improvements and acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

Bond Question C
The 2006 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act, authorizes the issuance and sale of public library, acquisition bonds. Shall the state be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed nine million ninety thousand dollars (9,090,000) to make capital expenditures for public library acquisitions and provide for a general property tax imposition and levy for the payment of principal of, interest on and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the bonds, and the collection of the tax as permitted by law?

Lincoln County Clerk Tammie Maddox said that during the election three voting machine technicians will be on call, head voting machine technician Paul Baca, certified voting machine technician Rhonda Burrows, and voting machine technician in training Chris Barela.

Election results for all counties in the state may be viewed online at www.sos.state.nm.us, which is the program sent down by the secretary of state.

Maddox said that after the canvass by the county commissioners on Thursday, November 9 that her office will have election results available by precinct. These may be viewed at the county clerk's office or purchased for 25 cents a page.

receive a description of the specific duties of his or her position with the county as well. According to the draft document reviewed in October, those descriptions will also be used in the recruitment and evaluation of candidates for county employment, training development and performance evaluations.

A compensation advisory board consisting of a county

commissioner, the assistant county manager, and the five elected department heads; the county treasurer, clerk, assessor, sheriff and probate judge, will maintain the duty descriptions and update as needed, and evaluate requests for reclassification of employees.

The overall eight per cent pay increase will add a little more than \$300,000 to the county's recurring budget, which Stewart said is justified by a review of the history of salary increases for county employees.

County commission chair Rick Simpson expressed his support of the proposed in-

crease. "If we can afford it, I think we owe it to our people. When you have people as good as we do, if we don't treat them right someone else will, I think we should pay them as much as we can," Simpson said.

County commissioner Maury St. John suggested that the proposed five per cent COLA increase could become effective in December, but that the county might withhold the three percent longevity increase until the start of the next fiscal year.

"I'd rather do it once," Stewart told her, "because that would create a fit back there in the finance depart-

ment. It creates an interesting dilemma when you start tinkering with it more than once a year," Stewart said. He reported that he would likely bring a draft of the mid-year budget to the county commissioners in November, with the employee salary increases added in.

County commissioner Earl Hobbs asked for verification that the five per cent COLA increase would serve to bring the county's salary packages in line with similar employee pay scales in the region, and that future COLA increase would be in the three per cent range. Stewart said that was correct.

of taking action on the chief of police position originated, and the how and when the decision regarding the selection of a new police chief was made. Assistant Attorney General Swazo asked that the Capitan trustees provide the information he has requested, as well as any other pertinent information, by November 1st.

Capitan Mayor Sam Hammons reported on Monday that he plans to speak personally with Swazo regarding Brothers' allegations. Hammons said that the allegations against his administration are ridiculous.

Regulations defined by the New Mexico Open Meetings Act provide an exemption for certain limited personnel matters including the discussion of the hiring, promotion, demotion or dismissal of, or the investigation of complaints or charges against public employees. Final actions regarding public employees must be taken in the course of an open public meeting, as was done by the Capitan village council on September 12th. A violation of the Open Meetings Act is a misdemeanor offense, punishable by fines of up to \$500 for each proven violation.

THOUGHTS FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

Vote - Tuesday, or Earlier

Early voting numbers are increasing by the minute. The count in Lincoln County shortly before noon yesterday was 1,039. The main complaint that has been received is that voters don't understand why they can't vote for Madrid or Wilson. But Lincoln County is not in that Congressional District and is not on the ballots here.

Listening to some of the complaints in other portions of the state really makes us glad we are in Lincoln County where elections run smoothly. Through the years there has been little, if any, complaints of errors in elections. But other counties have had many problems, and there could be delays in counting the votes in other counties.

Evidently some of the workers in those other counties should come to Lincoln County for lessons about how elections should be conducted. The staff in the Lincoln County Clerk's office is efficient and professional. They are well trained and pleasant working with the public. On election night things will go smoothly again, we hope.

Counting votes years ago took much more time. Paper ballots had to be counted and tallied. Now the electronic machines do much of the work. Each person early voting places the ballot in the machine and it is counted at that time. The totals won't be available until Tuesday night.

The absentee precinct, with 981 votes cast by noon on yesterday, will take more time because precinct workers must take the ballot envelope out of the outer envelope and then remove the ballot and place it in the machine. If you can imagine opening more than 1,000 envelopes two different times, you can feature the work they must do.

It will take time, and the absentee precinct may be the last precinct to report results to the county clerk's office on Tuesday night. Many candidates, their families and friends will be anxiously awaiting the results, though they will not be official until the canvass Thursday afternoon.

One thing to remember is that none of the totals will be available until after the polls close at 7 p.m. Years ago in Missouri when we went to vote the precinct workers were counting votes in another room, yelling out tallies where voters could hear. We often wondered if the voters were influenced by the tallies being shouted out loud.

Numerous predictions will be wrong, just as many of the endorsements will be incorrect. *The NEWS* will not endorse candidates, especially local candidates. It is our belief that voters should ask the candidates the questions they want answered. The voter has the right to decide.

Sadly, not all voters will ask questions and may even use the dart board method of choosing candidates, which is not what elections are supposed to be. Winners should be the best qualified, not the most popular. Please vote and it is our hope the best candidates will be the winners.

may be dismissed at any time by a majority vote of the governing body and without due cause.

In municipalities that have elected to adopt the commission manager form of government, voters have the right to hold an election to attempt to force the enactment of an ordinance or to overturn an existing one, and the right to recall elected officials. In this form of government, the manager of the municipality holds the hiring and firing responsibilities. Citizens of any municipality with a mayor/council government and a population of at least 3,000, may vote to become a commission manager type government.

Diane Lang, the assistant information services director of the NMMI, stated the facts regarding a recall election in Capitan simply on Monday. "They do not have powers of recall," Lang said. She also acknowledged that finding the state laws that govern New Mexico's municipalities can be difficult. "If a power has not been granted by the legislature, they don't have it," Lang explained. "That power (to recall officials) is granted to commission manager forms of government." She estimated that only about 15 of

New Mexico's 102 incorporated municipalities have the power to hold a recall election to unseat its elected officials. Ten of those municipalities have adopted the home-rule form of government, which Lang said is a long and complicated process.

"Most of them are large municipalities," Lang said. "There's really no benefit to the smaller communities." Home-rule municipalities may theoretically do things not specifically authorized by state statutes, so long as those things are not already prohibited by the state.

Although some Capitan residents await the opinion of an Assistant New Mexico Attorney General regarding allegations of violations of the Open Meetings Act, it seems that a recall election is off-the-table.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- With somewhere around 25 percent of the electorate already having voted, few New Mexicans yet know much of anything about the congressional candidates on their ballot.

That's with the notable exception of the 1st Congressional District, where we know too much about the candidates, and little of it is good.

The situation is not unusual nationwide. Only about 30 seats out of the 535 in Congress are competitive, and the incumbent still wins most of those. But this year, with Republicans in trouble nationally, the competitive seats held by the GOP definitely are in play.

That is where both parties are putting their money. Gobs of it, with almost no attention being paid to the other 500 seats. So the rest of us have to suffer while the House candidates in Albuquerque slug it out and we hear almost nothing about our Senate and House races.

The majority of New Mexico voters probably can name their U.S. House member and the incumbent U.S. senator who is up for election. But it's unlikely more than about one percent can name the challengers.

Those three candidates have received no help from their state or national party so we won't be seeing them on TV. That's too bad, because they're OK guys, but they're anonymous.

In the 3rd Congressional District, Republican Ron Dolin still hasn't filed a campaign report. He doesn't have to because he hasn't raised \$5,000 yet.

When a group wants to schedule a debate between him and incumbent Rep. Tom Udall, Dolin takes vacation leave from his Los Alamos employer. Otherwise he stays on his job as a Ph.D. mechanical engineer for Bechtel, the new national lab contractor.

The site also contains a blog with many interesting observations, not all of which agree with GOP philosophy.

In the 2nd Congressional District, Democrat Al Kissling gets around a lot more than Dolin does. Kissling is a retired Presbyterian minister with a great amount of energy. He has been in every county in his district at least once and has appeared on may talk shows.

Kissling makes a very good presentation, as one might expect of a preacher. He has a good grasp of the issues facing our nation and knows his party's position.

He would love to be able to debate Republican incumbent, Rep. Steven Pearce. But Pearce, like Gov. Bill Richardson, won't hear of it.

In order to quiet Kissling's criticism's of his unwillingness to debate, Pearce agreed to a joint appearance in Las Cruces on a weekday afternoon, with no television coverage.

But that was it. As it did with Gov. Richardson's refusal to debate, KOB-TV in Albuquerque gave Kissling a half hour with its evening anchose

to get his word out. Kissling put the time to good use with a polished performance.


Pearce doesn't have presidential ambitions, but otherwise his reasons for not debating are about the same as Richardson's. Basically, he doesn't have to. People will put him back in office anyway, so why go to the trouble?

Debates seldom do incumbents much good. The risks they might trip up their opponent might hit a home run are greater than anything they might gain. And voters don't seem to punish them for not debating.

Dr. Allen McCulloch of Farmington is the GOP challenger to U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman. McCulloch was impressive in winning the Republican primary last June against a state senator, who had run for statewide office before, and a Sante Fe city councillor.

But the win didn't give him enough of a boost to get his blip up on the radar screen in the general election. The Farmington urologist reportedly has family money but this race just doesn't look promising enough for much of an investment.

Last week the jet stream took an unexpected turn towards the north when a turn to the south was what was forecast. What that did was bring moisture from both the Gulf of Mexico and from the Baja regions straight into southern New Mexico. Gym Construction Can Be An Inconvenience

As anyone who has attended a Carrizozo High School athletic event can testify, the renovations at the New Gym have definitely changed the landscape of Grizzly Athletics.

However, most people do not know the extent of the renovations nor completion date.

The National Construction Co. from Alamogordo is currently working to, in the words of Mr. Castejon our superintendent, "not only remodel but also enlarge the concession stand, bathrooms, and lobby area."

This \$250,000 project will also include new amenities such as an ice machine and warming stove. Also, there will be new access to the concession stand from the outside for football fans.

The area to be renovated includes 5,160 square feet. Of the total construction footage, the concession stand represents 237 square feet. There will be two main lobby areas with only one being open during football games to control disorder in the area during the games.

Originally set to be completed in November, the renovations have been subject to many delays due to "discovered needs" such as underground waterline replacement. Now the project is scheduled to be finished before Christmas.

Not only have fans of the Grizzlies and opposing teams been inconvenienced, but coaches and players have also felt the repercussions of the construction.

Volleyball Coach Mandy Baca has said the construction, "I know it will all pay off in the long run, and we are very lucky to have the opportunity to do this remodeling. However, it's difficult to have team discussions with constant interruptions, since our locker room must be used as a public restroom. Also, quite frankly, it's embarrassing to tell opposing teams that they can't buy any food for their players, not even a bottle of water."

Freshman Tessa Hendricks comments that, "It's hard to get ready for a game, mentally and physically, when we can't even stay in our locker room. We have to warm up either in the coach's office or outside."

Fortunately, the new facilities, including the larger concession area with dual access from the football field as well as the gym and more spacious bathrooms with an increased number of stalls, will terminate crowding issues in the future. So, despite these delays and temporary inconveniences, the finished product will definitely be much appreciated and will be put to good use for years to come.
