

# County's VIPER System Unveiled

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department opened its dispatch center for public viewing last Tuesday morning to officially unveil the new, technologically state-of-the-art communications system that was recently installed.

The VIPER system, (Voice-over-IP for Emergency Response,) is the first of its kind in New Mexico, according to Lincoln County

Sheriff Rick Virden. The \$458,000 system has been installed in a remodeled area of the sheriff's department that used to be the county jail, streamlining the dispatch system and giving the dispatchers more room to work.

During the open house, dispatchers demonstrated the VIPER's digital satellite mapping system that allows them to hone in on the location of an emergency or law enforcement event. The system has the capability of en-

abling dispatchers to alert responders to things like potential hiding places or escape routes at the scene of a crime or geographic concerns in wilderness rescues, by electronically viewing an aerial map of the site prior to the arrival of officers. Along with determining the location of an emergency, the system will identify the nearest fire department and law enforcement agencies. Another monitor tracks the status of on-duty law enforcement and

emergency response personnel.

Art Rios, the project manager from the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), explained that the address associated with a telephone will appear on one of the system's monitors even before the dispatcher says "911, what's your emergency?" When fully operational, the system can reportedly pinpoint the location of a wireless phone with GPS (Global

Positioning Satellite) capability to within a foot, which can be an invaluable tool for search and rescue teams.

"We are now working on

the wireless technology," Rios said. "With the wireless capability, we'll be able to either triangulate it or GPS it." Rios said that, on a na-

## Ribbon Cutting at The Nest

Lincoln County's first shelter for victims of domestic violence was officially dedicated Friday, July 13th. The Nest, a temporary residential facility offering sanctuary, guidance and care to those fleeing often life threatening dangers at home, is operated by H.E.A.L. (Help End Abuse for Life). H.E.A.L. is directed by an 18 member board of volunteers, and last Friday's ceremonies were in honor of that board, a multitude of dedicated volunteers from the community and the staff of The Nest.

New Mexico's First Lady Barbara Richardson was on hand for the dedication of The Nest as were Senator Rod Adair and his wife Dana, State Representatives Nora Espinoza and W.C. "Dub" Williams and his wife Katherine. New Mexico Children, Youth and Families Department (CYFD) cabinet secretary Dorian Dodson, Sharon Pino, New Mexico's Domestic Violence czar and Carla Romero, CYFD Domestic Violence Unit supervisor took a tour of the new facility, guided by one of The Nest's driving forces, executive director Colleen Widell.

three bedroom house, now boasts 14 bedrooms, two adjoining kitchens, a laundry area, craft room, six bathrooms and counseling and office space. Two of the bedrooms are wheelchair friendly. The security system at The Nest is state-of-the-art. Victims of domestic violence can stay at The Nest for up to 90 days while receiving counseling in life skills, bud-

geting and banking, communication skills and assertiveness training. The staff at The Nest also assists clients in career and job training, computer skills, resume development and earning a G.E.D. (General Education Development degree).

H.E.A.L. board member Chuck Harrison announced a plan to bring Pet Partners to The Nest through a project that he said employs therapy dogs to help victimized children overcome trust issues. Pet Partners members from Roswell and Carlsbad brought their canine companions to the dedication ceremony as well.

John Lovell, a representative of Steve Pearce's office, read a congratulatory letter from the Congressman and told the audience that New Mexico Senator Rod Adair "almost single handedly helped us open The Nest".

Adair was among the first to support the project and play-

The National Day of the Cowboy will be commemorated in Carrizozo next week, Saturday, July 28. President George Bush, New Mexico Governor Bill Richardson and Carrizozo Mayor Lee-Roy Zamora have all proclaimed July 28 as Day of the Cowboy.

The celebration will include cattle roundup on Spencer Ranch, stage show, cowboy music with cowboy and cowgirl singers, cowboy poetry, chuck wagon food, kid's rodeo, western fashion show, rope twirling demonstration, western art show, longhorn cattle exhibit, cowboy parade, horses and wagons, and fun.

The western art show at Malkerson Hall on 12th Street in Carrizozo will begin Friday, July 27 at noon and continue throughout Saturday.

Saturday events start with a demonstration of a working cattle roundup on the Spencer Ranch, Bar W from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. The Bar W is one of the oldest ranches in the area and was begun by New Mexico's first elected state governor William C. McDonald and remains in the family. People will have the opportunity to see cowboys at work rounding up cattle and heading them into pens on an actual working ranch. Biscuits and gravy

will be served by Cowgirl American and Canyon Cow-Belles.

The Carrizozo Town Cowboy parade will start at 10 a.m. There will be cowboys.

ed a large role in getting funding for the shelter from the state legislature.

"Today we have come full circle with the completion, opening and the successful day to day operation of Lincoln County's first and only domestic violence shelter," Lovell said. "From the 17 cameras, the five magnetic lock off doors, the fire protection security system to the handicapped accessible wing, the board of HLAL gives this gift of hope to our communities."

First Lady Richardson spoke, telling the crowd that the opening of The Nest was the realization of a dream.

"Three years ago, Lincoln County had the highest rate of domestic violence of any county in the state," Richardson said. "It was then that a number of community leaders came to me during the Legislature at the capitol in Santa Fe and said we need to do something and this is what we need to do."

Richardson said the group from Lincoln County had already "scoped everything out" and found a building. "I was so impressed and amazed by the determination of your community leaders, from churches and businesses, and I must say that Debbie Haines was the real fire behind that effort," Richardson said. "It has been truly a community grass roots effort that brought this about." She thanked the state legislators and the governor for providing more than a million dollars in funding for the project. "I know that already 47 women and children have been served since (The Nest's) opening in early March," Richardson said.

Senator Adair provided a bit of The Nest's early history. He said that at the time he was first approached by Debbie Haines, in the fall of 2004, Lincoln County's domestic violence victims were

taken to facilities in Alamogordo for shelter and counseling. "No longer do we have to do that," Adair said. "Thanks to the governor, my friends Dub Williams, Nora (Espinoza), Senator Jennings, Representative Foley, and someone I don't want to forget, who also was part of this and died almost a

year ago, the late Avon Wilson from Roswell who cared about this issue a lot," Adair said.

The Nest operates a 24 hour hotline to assist domestic violence victims at any hour of the day or night. The toll free number is 866-378-6378.

tional average, 75 to 80 percent of the 911 calls now come from wireless phones.

Lincoln County is expected to have its wireless 911 capabilities up and running in about a year.

Rios said that Lincoln County had formerly been a red flag county when it came to its ability to identify the location of 911 emergency calls. "With the tenacity of the sheriff, the deputy sheriff and Connie (Stone, Lincoln County's Rural Addressing agent), you guys got it done," Rios said. He said that he encourages the public to test the system by calling 911 from their home phone and asking the dispatcher to verify their address. If the dispatchers are too busy, he said, they'll ask you to call back at another time.

Rios said that every dispatcher is trained in the use of Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) which provides prompts to the dispatcher to

aid him or her in asking the right questions to assess the nature of a medical emergency and an appropriate response.

We have a four-bed ICU that is outstanding. We have great staffing from the nurses, excellent equipment, and can offer full services for people who are critically ill. Being able to get services here also helps the families avoid the extra expense and the hassle of having to travel out of town.

**What about the overall quality of LCMC?**  
The quality of care and what we are able to provide for the community is second to none. We have specialists that are just unheard of in a small community like this, and our patients from big communities in Texas and Arizona are generally surprised how much we can do. We hear it all the time, "Wow, I didn't know you could do that here." And our people - we really care about 'em. I had a guy the other day who said, "You know the nurses were in here so many times I can't believe it. They never do this in other places."

**What's a good day for you?**  
A good day for me is when we see the patients that need to be seen. I feel good when we can say that we saw everybody that we needed to see today and gave them good quality care, the time they needed and not felt rushed with anything.

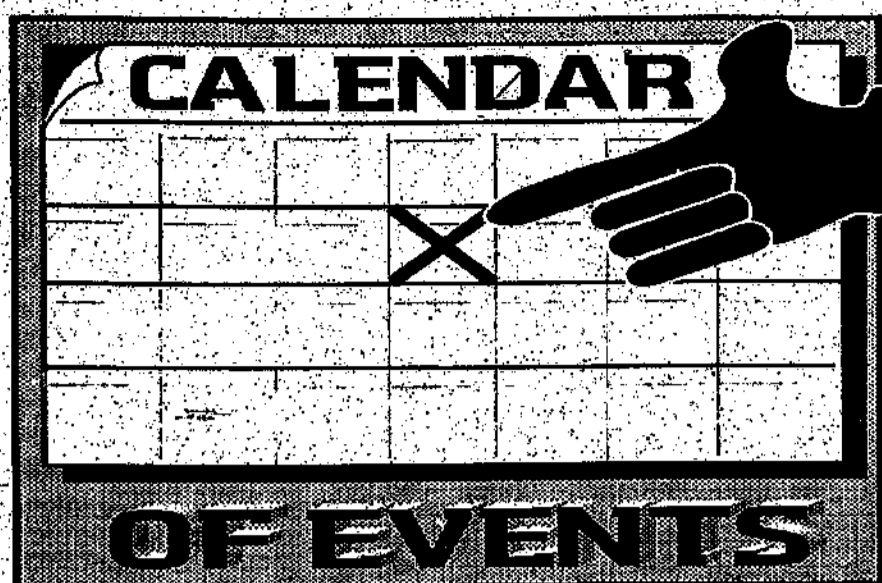
If Billy the Kid should return today, his greatest danger would be threading his way through automobile traffic.

Davis Mountains since 1890. Joe Evan's family was one of the early organizers of the Camp Meeting. Evans became friends with Presbyterian missionary Ralph Hall, a circuit riding preacher. With his saddle and pack horse, Hall traveled the southwest to preach.

When Hall arrived at an isolated ranch, he joined in the work of the day, whether it was rounding up cattle, branding, fence building, or bronc busting. When the work was done, Hall would preach.

Evans persuaded Hall that New Mexico needed the same type of summer family camp where far-flung neighbors could congregate for fellowship and worship.

When the cowboys and the missionary met on the Nogal Mesa they felt they had found the perfect site for their new camp meeting.

At first, ranch families came in wagons and horseback to hear the preaching and teaching. Today cars, pickups, Motor homes and trailers are used. Those who can't come to camp are invited to come for the evening meal and services.

Today, more than 50 families make up a local committee which carries on the work begun in the middle part of the last century. Over the years this committee has built a wooden tabernacle. There is also a wooden cook shack where three meals a day are cooked over open fires in huge, cast iron kettles. A large dinner bell rings seven times daily to summon campers for services or meals. No camping fees or meal fees are collected, as the camp meeting is run entirely on free will donations. Tabernacle services will be

led by Phil Bob Borman of Kerrville, Texas, and Rod Skelton of Palestine, Texas. Phil Bob is well known in the Capitan area and has led music at camp meeting in previous years. Jereme Woodruff is in charge of the youth work and a mission group from Dora, New Mexico will lead the Children's Ministry. Children four to six years of age will meet in the pink trailer and grades one through six meet at the striped tent at 11:00 and 5:00 each day.

The youth will have their own services at 9:00 and 2:00 each day. A hayride and watermelon bust is planned for Friday and Saturday, as well as volleyball games and a special youth service on Saturday night. All area youth and youth groups are encouraged to attend and participate.

The breakfast bell will ring at 6:00 a.m. Bible study starts at 9:00. The first youth event of the day is at 11:00; children will meet and adults meet in the tabernacle. Lunch is served at 12:30. Youth gather under their tent at 2:00, while their elders wait until 3:00 p.m. for the next service under the tabernacle. Children meet again at 5:00 while the women meet in the tabernacle and the men meet at the prayer tree. Supper is served at 6:00 and the evening service is scheduled for 7:30. Sunday's schedule is different only because Sunday School takes the place of the morning Bible study.

Today, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, weather permitting, a bonfire will follow evening services. Stories are told, songs sung, and memories made at the flames throw the sparks skyward into the star spangled night.

The Nogal Mesa Ranchman's Camp Grounds may be reached by turning off of

highway 380 at a sign 15 miles east of Carrizozo and five miles west of Capitan, or by turning at the sign on Highway 37 on Nogal Mesa. Ranchman's Camp Meeting is inter-denominational, meaning that people of all

Christian faiths come together to worship. All are invited to join in this year's encampment on the mesa. For further information, contact Opal or LaMoyné Peters at 354-2302 or Rex or Carol Wilson at 648-2428.

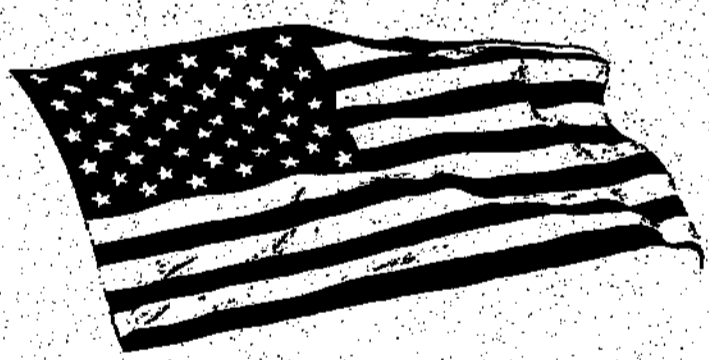
### STELLA WARNER SALAS

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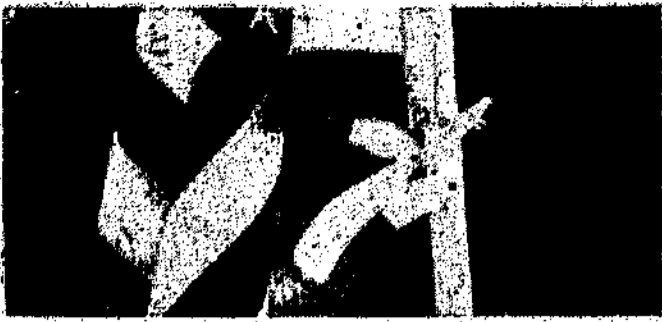

# Manager's Report

In accordance with state statute, Lincoln County officials must certify the amount of roads maintained by the county and report that amount to the state Department of Transportation every year.

During his regular monthly report to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart said that he had received notice that the state concurs with the county's report of 802.45 miles of road maintained by the county.

Stewart said that he had been informed by 12th Judicial District Judge James Waylon Counts that the New Mexico Supreme Court has directed each judicial district to form a security committee and draft a security plan. Counts wrote a letter to Stewart asking for his participation in committee activities, and Stewart said that he and Lincoln County Sheriff Rick Virden agreed to participate. A review of potential security improvements at the Lincoln County Courthouse resulted in a recommendation to assign a full time court security deputy, and more training for deputies, court personnel and courthouse workers in emergency procedures for incidents that might occur at the courthouse. A re-evaluation of the security camera system, the

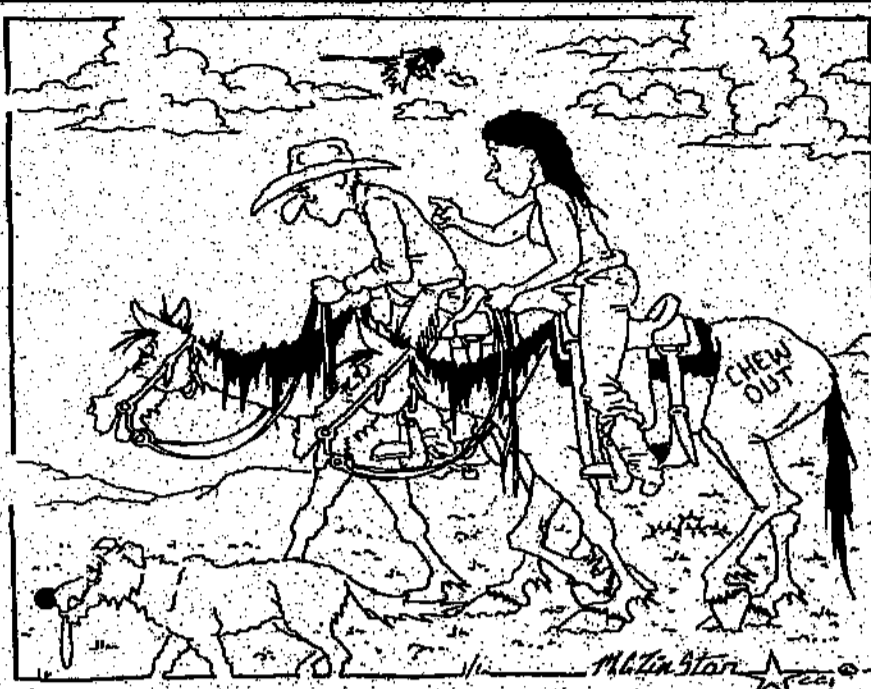
establishment of written policies and procedures and a review of prisoner handling procedures was also recommended.

The manager reported that the county road department has completed 20 of the 32 FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) projects that resulted from flooding in September of last year. The remaining projects are scheduled for completion by March of 2008.

As mandated by county ordinance, the county commissioners performed an annual audit of lodger's tax payments from four randomly selected lodging establishments. Stewart said that the county's 29 lodging businesses were divided into two groups, representing large and small establishments. Two businesses were selected from each group. The results of the audit, performed by Dan Austin, were that one of the lodging establishments has gone out of business, two were found to be in compliance, and one had issues that are being addressed by the county treasurer, Stewart said.

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- July 14 is the 126th anniversary of Billy the Kid's killing by Pat Garrett in Fort Sumner. Last year Fort Sumner hosted an observance of the event, which received some good publicity.

At the request of Gov. Bill Richardson, the 2006 Legislature appropriated \$200,000 for similar events throughout this past year to celebrate the 125th anniversary year throughout Billy the Kid Country.

Fort Sumner kicked it off with a July 14 event. But poor coordination by the state and a delay of five months in getting Fort Sumner its reimbursement caused other locations to be a little gun shy about jumping into the act.

We are going to get a series of four brochures for communities to use in explaining their part in the Billy story. The first two will be available soon. Other events will depend on whether last year's legislative appropriation can be carried over into this year.

But then, maybe Billy wasn't killed 126 years ago. Maybe he died of natural causes only 70 years ago, or even 57 years ago. Two Texas museums claim local character, Brushy Bill Roberts, was Billy.

In 1950 Roberts came to New Mexico, claiming he was Billy the Kid and asked Gov. Tom Mabry for the pardon. Gov. Lew Wallace had promised, Mabry wasn't impressed with Roberts's knowledge of the Lincoln County War.

In addition, Roberts couldn't speak any Spanish, whereas Billy was fluent. Roberts also was illiterate. Billy's letters to Gov. Wallace reminding him of the promised pardon were well written in very good handwriting.

A niece of Roberts didn't believe a word of her uncle's story. She produced a family bible showing Roberts was born in 1879. Garrett shot the Kid in 1881. Billy was a young gun, but not that young.

John Miller died in 1937, at the Arizona Pioneers Home in Prescott. Although no one has ever opened a museum on his behalf and only one book has ever been written about him, Miller bore much more resemblance to Billy and shared most of his traits.

The problem is that although Miller knew a great deal about Billy, he never openly claimed to be him. Occasionally he would tell a friend but take it back the next day.

Miller died without ever standing for questions. But if he were the real Billy, he likely wouldn't have wanted

to publicly reveal himself after killing three lawmen and incurring the eternal enmity of the Santa Fe Ring.

A body, which may have been Miller's was dug out of the Arizona cemetery last year. DNA samples were taken to compare with blood from a bench on which Billy supposedly was laid. No announcement has yet been made about whether there was a match, but one would assume that if there were a match, the world would have heard about it.

There is question about the bench on which Billy bled and whether his was the only blood on a bench used for carpentry.

The provenance on the bench is shaky and the possibility of matching DNA this old for this purpose is dubious.

But I will say, I was on the trail of the same bench,

which had been sitting in an old chicken coop for many years. If the bench still is in existence, that is probably it. You can see it at the Albuquerque Museum until the Billy the Kid exhibit closes July 22.

I've received some reader responses concerning a recent column about that Albuquerque Museum exhibit. In one, I was scolded for not mentioning that Bob McCubbin, of Santa Fe, was a major contributor to the exhibit.

I should have mentioned McCubbin. I've been privileged on several occasions to see his outstanding collection of original photographs, books and artifacts of the old West.

I had praised McCubbin's collection in previous columns and never had mentioned the other contributors to the exhibit because they were on the other side of whether Billy and his mother should be exhumed.

Perhaps we are entitled to federal and state aid in such a project -- those and any other possible sources of help should be kept in mind by our city officials in their study of Carrizozo's water problem.

Once it is determined whether or not the project is possible, let us go all out to obtain a water system of our own. The News-Outlook feels sure it will pay rich dividends in the long run.
