Three Kesign from County Planning Commission

Upon receiving letters of resignation from three members of the Lincoln County Planning Commission in one week, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners held a special meeting on Monday, August 6th to appoint new members.

The planning commission, generally made up of five members appointed to repre-sent each of the county's voting districts and two at large members, was already short one member prior to the lat-est wave of resignations. One of the remaining members, Bob Moeller of Nogai, has only served on the planning commission since his appointment in April.

The county's planning commission is tasked with the job of reviewing subdivi-sion proposals for compliance with county and state laws, and coordinating and reviewing the findings of other agencies, like the Ofregards to those proposals.
The three resignations from

the planning commission came just a few days before a scheduled public hearing on a controversial 253 unit subdivision proposed for the Nogal area, Heritage Pre-serve at Ruidoso.

During the county commissioners' special meeting of August 6th, county attorney. Alan Morel reported that the resignations came from Jon



Heritage Preserve Asks for Approval

Representatives of the Heritage Preserve at Ruidoso, a 253 unit subdivision planned for the 1.365 acre Mesa Ranch presented their pro-posal to the Lincoln County Planning Commission on Wednesday, August 8th. The land slated for development sits atop the Nogal Mesa near New Mexico Highway 37, and borders land along the Nogal Canyon ridge and the Loma Grande Estates subdi-

The subdivision has been called a conservation development and, through its covenants, incorporates many restrictions that surpass the regulations spelled out in the county's subdivision ordi-nance which is currently under revision.

Desdre Shelley, who said she worked for the devel-oper, Heritage Preserve, began the presentation to the county's planning commission in the first step toward county approval of the project's preliminary plat. Shelley told a mostly newly approval of the project o pointed planning commission that the 253 parcels resulting from the subdivision will range from two to 10 acres in

Heritage Preserve has developed six subdivisions within New Mexico, Shelley said. "We've been in busi-ness 10 years and in 2004 were purchased by Verde

Realty. Verde Realty is based in El Paso, Texas, and its primary businesses are multifamily, retail and industrial real estate and master planned communities," Shelley said. "Verde has investments

of over one billion dollars with operations in 10 different states and on both sides of the U.S. and Mexican borshe said. Shelley said that the Heri-

tage Preserve at Ruidoso is unique in its open space design concept in that certain areas of the property are pro-tected. "This may include wildlife corridors, natural drainage areas, view sheds or archeological sites that have

Legality of Subdivision Questioned

Speaking before the Lincoin County Planning Com-mission on August 8th, Den-ise Leja raised some ques-tions regarding the legality of a proposed development on the former Mesa Ranch near Nogal. Leja is a member of a group of residents in the Nogal and Loma Grande areas near the former ranch that have met with developers to attempt to work out some issues they have with the proposed development.

Among those issues, and a topic that has been touched upon in many discussions of the Mesa Ranch, is the belief by many locals that the ranch is protected by a conservation easement and cannot

legally be developed.
Leja told the planning commissioners that the possibility of a conservation easement protecting the Mesa Ranch was a big issue that would require more time to substantiate or disprove.

"it's been common knowledge since 2002 that Mesa Ranch was under a permanent conservation easement. which means that it cannot be developed in perpetuity," Leja said. She alleged that the former owners of the ranch had received tax breaks and other incentives to guarantee that the land would not be developed.

"Commissioner Battin, who is on the board of trustees and is the treasurer for the Southern Rockies Agri-cultural Land Trust, which was started in 1999 by Sid Goodlee, knows all about conservation easements," Leja said. She pointed out that Goodloe is the father of

Cindy Smith, an owner of the Mesa Ranch before selling

the land for development.
Leja said that the conservation easement protecting the Mesa Ranch was used as a selling point for properties near the ranch in 2002 and 2004. According to Leja, two large realties offering properties for sale in the Nogal area issued statements that the Mesa Ranch was under a permanent conservation ease-ment and would never be developed.

"No one seems to be able to find this information now, Leja said. She told the planning commission that Lincoln County Manager Tom Stewart had, in a conversation the week before, stated that he had also been under the impression that the ranch was protected by a conservation easement. However, Leja said, he did not realize that this was land proposed to become the subdiviion Heritage Preserve at Ruidoso.

Leja went on to say that the conversation easement was likely put into effect by Thomas L. Clinton before signing a quit claim deed to Wes and Cindy Smith. "This was done in 2002 and the land was valued at agricultural prices," Leja said. "And the land was valued at \$719,000, I think, off the top of my head." Leja said it was at the time that the Mesa Ranch became the property of the Smiths that neighbors of the ranch were told of the conservation easement. "That understanding has been in effect from 2002 until now," she said.

There's a problem here

that needs to be investi-gated." Leja said. "In all fairness to the people who live around Mesa Ranch, this has to be investigated before this subdivision can be ap-

Lincoln County Attorney Alan Morel said that some documentation establishing a conservation easement would have to be filed with the county. "Do you have any evidence of any easement or anything reflecting there's a conservation casement having been filed of record?" Morel asked Leja.

She answered no, but suggested that evidence of that nature would be easy to "take

"I'm curious about that because there is a complaint at the Attorney General's office that's been filed and received and has now disappeared."
Leja said. "They can't find it. and that's at the Criminal Investigations Unit at the Attorney General's office,

Morel suggested that the issue may be a matter for the Internal Revenue Service, but it may not be something that

would actually affect the sub-division itself, he said. Planning commission member Bob Moeller asked for further clarification from Leja. "I just want to be clear about what you're saying here," Moeller said. "Are you actually accusing these folks of committing some kind of a

fraud?"
"I don't know. Possibly,
yea, I don't know," Leja said. Morel suggested that it was time to move on to other is-

As the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS goes into its 103rd year of being in existence (1905-2007), we will again be randomly publishing articles that have been published in the NEWS from old files. The following articles appeared in the "Lincoln County News".

Friday, May 30, 1930

If Carrizozo Thinks It Can, It Can.

CALENDAR LE Resignations Stall Subdivision Approval

A public hearing called for by the Lincoln County Plan-ning Commission to discuss the proposed Heritage Preserve at Ruidoso subdivision met with some obstacles on August 8th.

The resignations of three members of the planning commission just days before the hearing and an additional vacancy forced the appointment of new members who are unfamiliar with the planned subdivision and unqualified to render a decision. on the preliminary approval of the development proposal. Those new members of the planning commission, Jennifer Dorgan, Wayne Stephens, Fred Hansen and Dave La-Fave were appointed during a special meeting of the county commissioners just two days before the public hearing on the subdivision.

At the August 8th meeting of the planning commission, county attorney Alan Morel reported that he and counsel for the Heritage Preserve at Ruidoso had agreed to allow. the planning commission two additional weeks to become familiar with the development proposal before voting to recommend approval or disapproval. Morel recom-mended that the Heritage Preserve representatives be allowed to make their presentation on the 8th, and that the hearing of comments from the public be postponed until August 22nd. He said that the planning commis-sioners would be able to offer their own comments at that time as well. "It's impossible for them to listen to testimony, and try to under-stand, when they've had zero opportunity to actually review the documentation that they're going to be making a decision on." Morel said.

me. Williams appointed Jennie

Dorgan to the District II po-sition on the planning commission, and the county commissioners voted four to one in favor of that appointment. Lovelace again cast the only vote in opposition.

Battin chose an appointed from a list of citizens who have expressed a willingness. to serve on county committees. Dave LaFave is a resident of Carrizozo and serves on the town council there. He is also a county employee working as a mapper in the assessor's office. Battin's nomination of LaFave was supported by Parks and Carroll and his appointment to the planning commission was

approved unanimously.
To fill the District V position Powell nominated Joe Torres, and Wayne Stephens as an alternate appointee if Torres declined to accept the position. Powell's nominees were also approved unanimously.

Several people had requested that the entire public hearing be postponed, according to Morel. "They daike to do it all at one time. They feel it would give the developer a leg up if they have an opportunity to speak and no one else has an opportunity to speak. Morel said. If there's someone who is unavailable to speak on the 22nd that wants to, you should take that testimony tonight if you proceed tonight," he added. Morel-said the planners had the option of either tabling the en-tire hearing until the 22nd, or taking some testimony and continuing the hearing on the

Planning commission member Bob Moeller, also of Nogal; made a motion to allow the developer to go ahead with a presentation, but Moeller's motion made no reference to comments from the public.

Morel attempted to clarify the issue. "This is a public hearing and the public is ab-

any means to deny anybody. the right to make public com-ment, Morel said. He sug-gested that the commissioners make an effort to take in some information from the public before continuing on the 22nd. He explained that the planning commission already had a hefty agenda for its meeting of August 22nd, with revisions to the county's subdivision ordinance expected to take be-tween two and three hours: "If we do this entire presentation on the 22nd, you need to bring a sleeping bag." Morel told the planning commissioners.

Opinions on how to proceed varied among the planning commission members, with Crouse questioning a need for a continuance and LaFave suggesting that a special meeting be scheduled for a date before August 22nd to hear comments from both





Thirty Years Ago Today

Some people can't remember what they did yesterday, but certain events adhere in their minds. We all know that Christmas is December 25. Independence Day is July 4 and New Year's Day is January 1. But what about other important days? Most people can remember their own birthdays and it is a toss up as to whether they remember anyone else's birthday, the same with anniversary dates,

Perhaps other important events make an impression on people, just as this date 30 years ago affected my family. New Area Code is Coming

In compliance with the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission's (NMPRC) implementation plan to add a new telephone area code in New Mexico, telecommunication companies are beginning to notify customers of the plan's timetable.

As mandated by the NMPRC last winter, telephone users in what is about to become Area Code 575 will have a little more than one year to adjust to having a new area code.

Only the northwest region of the state, including Santa Fe and Albuquerque, will continue to have the 505 area code.

For one year, beginning on October 7th, telephone users in the new 575 area code have been granted what the NMPRC calls a "permissive dialing period". During the permissive dialing period, telephone customers should begin to use the new 575 area code, but calls will still be connected if the old 505 area code is dialed. After October 5th, 2008, callers using the old area code will be connected to a recorded message instructing them to redial the number using area code 575

instead of 505.

After January 11, 2009, callers using the old area code will hear a recorded message telling them that the call cannot be completed as dialed.



lengthy permissive dialing period will allow ample time for customers to use up or make changes to stationery supplies and advertising products. Adding the new area code will make it possible for telecommunications companies to issue duplicate seven digit phone numbers to customers with different area codes.

Lincoln County is within the region of New Mexico that has been assigned the new 575 area code. The change will not affect how tocal calls are dialed, but will affect long distance dialing. Calls to three digit numbers like 911 Emergency Services will also not be affected. Telephone customers, especially those using wireless communications, should carefully review the information being sent out by their telecommunications services provider to learn how specific elements of the service may or may not be affected.

For most, it will simply be a matter of changing the area code they dial for long distance calls to southern or eastern New Mexico.

Felecommunications companies are required to notify customers of the change before the October 7th implementation date, and at least one company has already begun those mail outs. The notifications will also include information on and a map showing the areas of the state that will use the new 575 number and those that will retain the old 505 area code.

"I think we've identified an issue that needs to be addressed," Morel said, "but it's up to the people who wish that issue to be considered to present evidence that it is, in fact, an issue." Morel said that it was not up to the planning commission to go out and do research as to whether there is or isn't a conservation easement protecting the Mesa Ranch from development.

When Leja requested time to further investigate the easement status of the ranch. Morel suggested that she use the two weeks until the next hearing on the development, which is scheduled for August 22nd.

In a conversation Tuesday, Goodloe told The News that the Mesa Ranch had never been protected by a conservation easement. "It's totally untrue," Goodloe said. "There's a connection, I'm sure, because my daughter owned the Mesa Ranch and I'm president of the Southern Rockies Agricultural Land Trust which holds conservation land easements," Goodloe said. "But there never was even a mention of any kind of an easement on the Mesa Ranch." he said.

Goodloe also stated that no owner of the Mesa Ranch was ever granted tax breaks or other incentives associated with conservation easements.

Another point at issue with the Loma Grande community is the use of Juniper Springs Road to access the subdivision. Leja said. "They say they re not going to use Juniper Springs Road, but they say they can't prevent anyone from driving on Juniper Springs Road. Their traffic study says they're going to use the point of shortest path and, coming home from Ruidoso, the shortest path for over half their subdivision is Juniper Springs Road," Leja told the planning commission. The traffic study, Leja said, acknowledges that there will be a need for a left hand turning lane on New Mexico Highway 37 at Mesa Ranch Road, a primary access for the subdivision. "If they need one there, they need one at Juniper Springs Road, she said, adding that Juniper Springs Road is already facing problems related to condition and maintenance. "It's not acceptable. It's not safe,' she said.

Leja reported that after speaking to an agent of the State Engineer's office she found out that much of the data used by that office to determine water availability dates back to before 1971. "If you put in inaccurate data, you get inaccurate results," she said, "I was a research scientist. I know about experimental design,"

Moeller asked Leja if she had an independent hydrologist of her own, although even the county cannot afford to hire one.

ford to hire one.

She explained that she was addressing basic experimental design. "We know we don't have the right data," she said.

Planning commission chair Jim Crouse, of Nogal, agreed with Leja on the data issue. "I've been harping on this for ages, but what the OSE (Office of the State Engineer) says, we have to go by. We have no choice," Crouse said.

Leja told him that the OSE puts the responsibility on county commissions to go beyond the capabilities of that office.

"That's right," Crouse said.
"We couldn't get a moratorium to get our land use plan
finished before this came
up," he added.
Leja described several in-

Leja described several instances where she believed inaccurate datum, or no data at all, was used to prove that domestic wells near the proposed subdivision will not be affected by 253 new homes pulling water from the ground. Their own reports show negative effects on wells in the Tularosa Basin," Leja said.

Moeller again spoke up, telling Leja that her presentation was interesting, but he would be more comfortable with her opinions if they were backed up by an independent geo-hydrologist.

Leja responded by explaining that the faulty well data associated with the subdivision is backed up by water reports that the planning commission will use in reviewing the subdivision application.

"Well, are you a hydrologist?" Moeller asked her. He

echoed Crouse's comment that the planners must go by data provided by other agencies

Leja told the planning com-

mission that other residents of the area near the ranch will present more issues on August 22nd.

That meeting will commence at 2:00 p.m. in the chambers of the county commission at the Lincoln County Courthouse.

Morel told the county plan-

Morel told the county planning commission that they would be visiting the site of the proposed subdivision, and warned them against discussing the matter outside of a planning commission meeting. "It is not appropriate for you to discuss this with anyone who is actually going to appear before you," he said. "You need to have every discussion involving this project in this room," he said. Morel thanked the newly

Morel thanked the newly appointed planning commission members for agreeing to "come on board" at a crucial time in the planning of Lincoln County.

To accommodate those wishing to speak on the proposed subdivision before the planning commission on August 22, the review and revision of the county's subdivision ordinance was rescheduled for September 5th.

been identified," Shelley told

the planning commission. She said the subdivision is designed to allow minimum. disturbance of the land and attempts to maintain 70 percent open space. Building envelopes within each parcel will dictate where and how much land can be disturbed. "Those building envelopes

will range from one to two acres in size," Shelley said. The building envelopes are, however, big enough to accommodate guest houses.

Building height is restricted to 25 feet through

restrictive covenants and all utilities will be installed underground. Shelley said. Building restrictions also limit the colors and styles of structures within the subdivision, she added. "The lots are deep restricted so that there can be no further subdivision, and we have mandatory water conservation," Shelley said, "including rainwater harvesting and rainwater recycling. We limit landscaping to native plants and to an 800 square foot area. We also mandate water saving fix-tures within the households," she said.

The development will include equestrian trails and facilities, a community cen-ter and shared wells with as many as six homes per well, according to Shelley, and wells will be metered to ensure compliance with state regulations. "All the roads within the development and County Road 016, also known as Forest Road 131 or Ranger Road, will also be paved," she said.
"We did an extensive hy-

drological report and con-eluded that the water sup-plies are physically available and practically extractable for a 40 year period, "Shelley said. She told the planning commission that those calculations were based on a sce-nario that would bring 40 years without rain or snow. "There's no recharge calcula-tion in that," she said, and went on to say that neighboring wells would show no significant affects from the subdivision and that the state ineer agreed

findings.
"Water availability per each home site will be .25 acre feet." Shelley said. "This water budget that we've provided is conservative because the Office of the State Engineer asked that we include guest houses on approximately one-third of the homes within the project. The guest house use projections are equal to that of a full time resident, but in reality that's not really going to happen," Shelley said. "Wa-ter quality tests were per-formed and it was found that the water does not exceed the maximum contaminate level for contaminates listed in New Mexico drinking water regulations. It does, however, exceed the secondary stan-dards for four parameters," she said. Those are total dis-solved solids, manganese, sulphates and iron. "These water parameters were con-sidered acceptable in an opinion from the New Mexico Environment Depart-ment," Shelley said.

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) will set up dumpsters at the subdivision headquarters, which will be replaced by a which will be replaced by a compactor when 100 residents occupy the subdivision. Shelley said. Liquid waste will be managed with individual septic systems that meet the regulations of the county's subdivision ordinance. "This choice is supported by a favorable opinion from the New Mexico Environment Department," Shelley added.

Heritage Preserve mandates a 100 foot defensible space around each home. in house sprinkler systems. and nonflammable roofing materials, as well as spark arresters on all fireplaces, Shelley said.

The Lincoln County Planning Commission is expected to reach a decision on whether or not to recommend approval of Heritage Preserve at Ruidoso's preliminary plat after a continuation of a public hearing on the subdivision scheduled for August 22nd.


