

# Restoration Project for Bonito Watershed Proposed

The U.S. Forest Service is in the preliminary stages of designing and implementing a forest restoration project in the Bonito watershed. The project has been proposed to reduce the possibility of a catastrophic wildfire and improve the condition of the watershed.

District Fire Management officer for the Smokey Bear Ranger District and team leader for the Bonito Forest Restoration and Watershed

project, Kim Kuhar, briefed the Lincoln County Commissioners on the project in August during the regular county commission meeting. Kuhar said the Bonito project is a fuels reduction project that will encompass an area of approximately 30,000 acres. About 16,000 acres of the project is land included in the Ruidoso Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP). The project also includes the White Mountain Wilderness Area where only

prescribed burning methods will be used, Kuhar said. "We would not be doing any kind of mechanical treatment, as far as people coming in with chain saws and what-not," Kuhar said of the Wilderness Area.

Forest Service officials would like to have the option to use prescribed burning methods throughout the entire 30,000 acres of the project, according to Kuhar, utilizing a mixture of burning and mechanical extraction

methods outside of the Wilderness Area. Kuhar said the first priority will be the land included in the Ruidoso CWPP and lands in the immediate area of the Bonito reservoir. The Bonito watershed is a municipal watershed for the city of Alamogordo, and the reservoir also provides water to Carrizozo, Nogal, Holloman Air Force Base, and Fort Stanton.

In its current stage, the project consists mainly of data

collection, Kuhar said. "We're assessing what the conditions are, what's out there and we're looking at what type of treatments we

can do to affect some change on the landscape," she said. Among the issues to be considered are vegetation condition and composition and the

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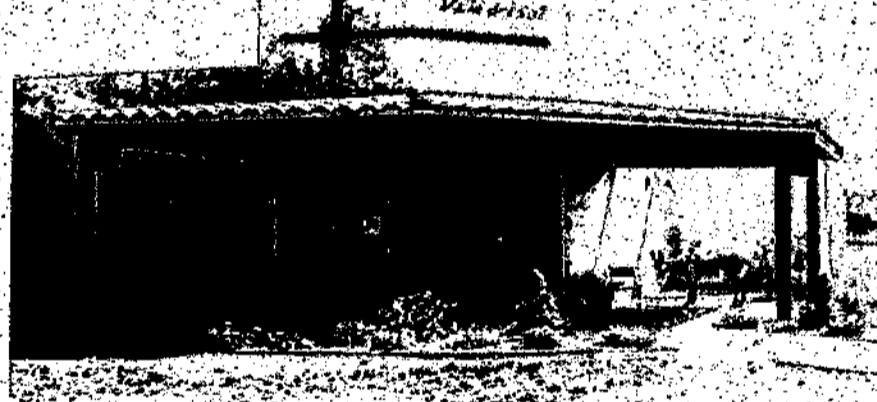

## Capital Outlay Workshop Set For Thurs., Sept. 27th

A Capital Outlay Application Workshop for Legislative Capital Outlay funding will be held in the Lincoln County Courthouse on Thursday, September 27 at 10 a.m. The workshop will be conducted by the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District/Council of Governments (SNMEDD).

Local governments, water associations, community ditch associations, school districts, fire districts, community based non profit organizations and others seeking assistance in acquiring funding for capital construction or equipment projects from the State of New Mexico are encouraged to attend the workshop.

Hubert Quintana, executive director of SNMEDD, in making the announcement of the workshop added, "It is important that communities and organizations seeking Capital Outlay funding assistance attend one of the workshops."

The workshops will provide those seeking funding the opportunity to meet and learn first hand how to properly apply for assistance and ask questions regarding their application and project funding needs. The proposed projects must have a project life of at least 10 years and cost no less than \$25,000. Capital Outlay projects that are approved by the Legislature and Governor will be funded by State issued Severance Tax Bonds or General Fund Bonds.

Additional workshops will be held throughout the five county region covered by SNMEDD. Workshops will take place in Alamogordo, Carlsbad, Lovington and Roswell as well as Carrizozo. SNMEDD is the area wide planning organization serving Chaves, Eddy, Lea, Lincoln and Otero counties and the 21 municipalities within the five counties. ## Developer Requests Golf Course Lease Extension

The Carrizozo Municipal Golf Course has undergone a remarkable transition over the past year or so, due to its association with the Valle de Sol subdivision located just across Highway 54. In 2006, when the Carrizozo Town Council and former mayor Manny Hernandez agreed to annex the land planned for the large subdivision, developer Dan Dattola also asked to lease the town's golf course, promising some major improvements. Since that lease was signed, the improvements to the golf course have been continuous.

Dattola faced hard scrutiny from a portion of the Carrizozo citizenry when he presented his subdivision and annexation proposal to the town, but it appears that he has kept his word regarding the lease of the golf course. The construction of a new clubhouse, cart barn and pump houses, cart paths and fencing, along with the subdivision's large Valle de Sol signs, all draw attention to a valuable municipal asset that has gone unnoticed and neglected for years.

During the Carrizozo Town Council meeting of September 11th, Dattola and attorney Alan Morel presented a

request to extend the terms of the golf course lease agreement. Morel said that the agreement currently included a five year lease with a five year renewal option. He said the reason behind the request to expand those terms was that the developer has spent far more than he originally expected to at the time the agreement was made. "At the present time, the developer has expended \$1.2 million to actually improve the golf course, reseed the greens, tear down and rebuild the clubhouse, build a cart barn," Morel said. "The actual budget that we're projecting for operation of the golf course is between three and four hundred thousand dollars a year."

Morel told the Carrizozo Trustees that an extended lease would enhance the developer's ability to ensure that a golf professional will be available to manage the course for the long run. He said that a new agreement would also benefit the town. "We don't want to pass this burden on to the town," Morel said. "If you were to operate a golf course, pay for the utilities, pay for the employees, the water, fertilizers, cutting, maintenance; it's an

incredibly expensive operation," Morel said. He added that the improved golf course will certainly be beneficial to the new subdivision. "That's precisely why we did it," he said. "But it probably wouldn't have made sense for a town of this size to expend that kind of money when you have roads and other things that you have responsibility for."

The proposed change in the lease agreement will require approval of the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), which oversees the financial workings of counties and municipalities across the state. Morel said the request, if approved, would change the term of the lease to ten years with a ten year renewal option.

Carrizozo Trustee Dennis Dunning asked how the lease agreement would be affected if the golf course wells were to go dry.

"If the wells dry up, we have to make a hard decision as to whether there's going to be a golf course there, whether we can afford to buy water from the city or whether the city has enough water to sell

## Mounted Patrol: Legal or Not?

During the Carrizozo Town Council meeting on September 11 police chief Carrie Spencer told the council that using the mounted patrol would help provide coverage for the town. The town has repeatedly advertised for a police officer and increased the salary to \$16.50 an hour with no response.

Spencer scheduled three mounted patrol officers to assist with patrolling the town.

Apparently a letter was sent by FAX to Spencer from the town attorney on Friday.

The town attorney was also in Carrizozo on Saturday, September 15 for a meeting with mayor LeeRoy Zamora, town trustee Wes Lindsay and Spencer. That meeting at city hall lasted more than an hour and a half, and was of course closed to the public.

After Spencer left city hall the meeting with the town attorney, Zamora and Lindsay lasted more than another 30 minutes.

When that meeting ended and the three came out of city hall The News asked

Zamora what was going on. Zamora's response was that the town attorney had some concerns about the legality of using the mounted patrol.

Monday, September 17 when The News learned that a letter had been sent by FAX to the chief of police, Ruth Hammond presented a request for the copy of the most recent correspondence between the town attorney and the chief of police. The request quoted the New Mexico State Statute NMSA 1978, Article 14, Chapter 2 RE: The Inspection of Public Records Act.

Town clerk Leann Weibrecht said she was unaware of any correspondence. While she was phoning the town attorney Zamora came in city hall, read the request and said it was probably the letter sent by FAX on Friday.

After speaking with the town attorney on the phone

Weihbrecht told Hammond the town attorney said the letter concerned personnel and was not subject to being open.

Apparently the letter concerned the mounted patrol, though the letter has not been made public.

According to New Mexico State Statutes 29-6-4: It shall be the duty of the New Mexico mounted patrol and the members thereof to assist in the enforcement of law by cooperating with all law enforcement agencies and regulatory bodies of the state of New Mexico when requested by them and under their direction and control. New Mexico State Statute 29-6-5 A. states: Members of the New Mexico mounted patrol may be detailed to assist and render aid in specific instances involving law enforcement or other matters when request is made for such assistance and aid by the New Mexico state police or other state or local law enforcement agencies. When acting upon such call, members shall be deemed to be the agents or deputies of the authority issuing such request, shall be possessed of the same powers and duties as such requesting authorities and shall be completely covered by Workmen's (Workers') Compensation Act....

The commission card issued to members of the mounted patrol includes the following information on the reverse of the card: State of New Mexico, New Mexico Mounted Patrol. This identification certifies that the bearer of this card is vested with full power and

authority of a conservator of the Peace, with commission to apprehend, arrest and bring before the proper court all violators within the state of New Mexico under the authorization of the Governor of New Mexico and the Chief of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol pursuant to the provisions of Section 29-6-1 et. Seq. N.M.S.A. 1978. The card is signed by the Chief of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol and Bill Richardson, New Mexico Governor.

The News has received conflicting information about a special meeting to be held by the town council. First reports were that the special meeting was to be held Monday, September 24 but at press time yesterday Weihbrecht said no special meeting was set.

When a special meeting date is set the town is

required by the open meetings act to post the agenda 24 hours in advance. According to the town open meetings resolution the agendas are to be posted at city hall, Wells Fargo Bank, Branch of City Bank, Lincoln County Courthouse, United States Post Office and the Lincoln County News.

to the golf course." Dattola said. He added that the wells that are used to irrigate the golf course have been there a long time, and that he contracted engineering tests on the pumping capacity and recovery rate of the wells. "There's no reason why they shouldn't produce," Dattola said.

Dunnun also asked if the lease could be amended to stipulate a price break for Carrizozo school students who want to use the golf course, and Dattola said that there are plans in the works for several golfing programs. "We're going to do women's programs, high school programs, kids programs," Dattola said.

Plans are also underway to hold a community weekend event in October to introduce the course to locals and let them try it out.

When questioned about the amount of the lease, which is one dollar per year, Morel said that the lease amount was not reflective of the developer's investment in the municipally owned property. "If you tie in the cost of operations and the fact that we've put in a million-two, it's about \$300,000 or \$400,000 per year," Morel said.

The Carrizozo Trustees voted unanimously to amend the lease agreement as proposed by the developer. Dattola and the town council will have to wait for the DFA's approval before the amended lease becomes official.

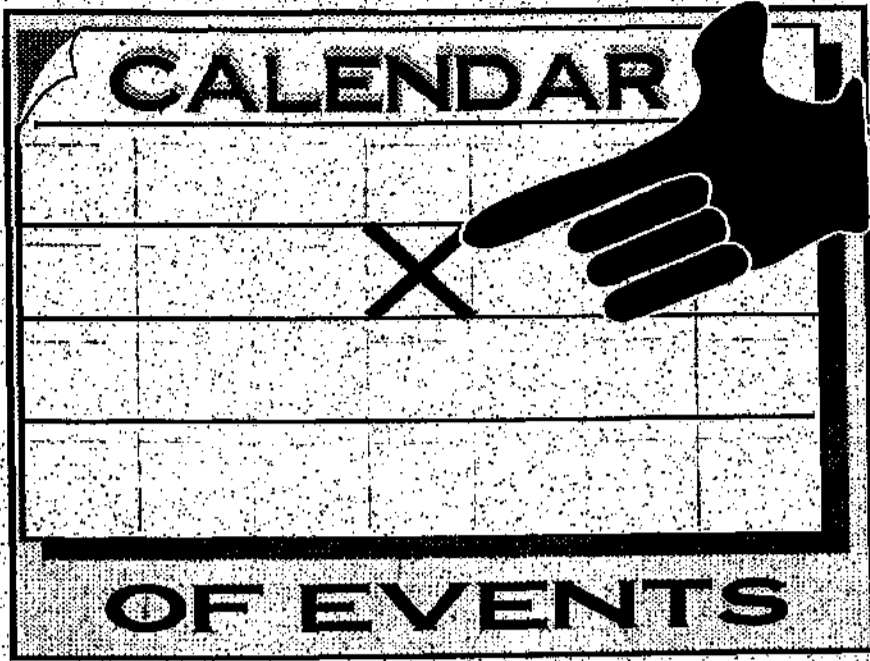

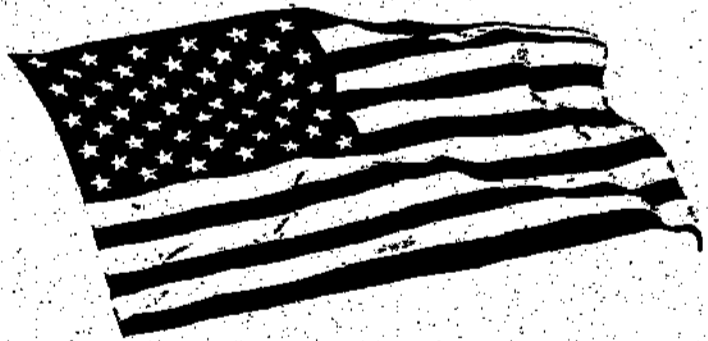

presence of sensitive or endangered plant and animal species. "They're there," Kuhar told the county officials. "There's owls; there's goshawks. There are some sensitive plants out there too," she said. "It doesn't mean we won't do treatments, it'll just change how we do it," she added. Kuhar reported that some animal and stream surveys of the area have already begun.

Jerry Carroll, a private citizen, asked Kuhar if the Forest Service was considering privatization of logging operations associated with the project, to allow commercial wood harvesters access to the

forest products.

"We want that," Kuhar told Carroll. "We prefer to sell our timber. We don't have a lot of stuff that's high quality, that's going to make a lot of money," she said, but added that the development of economic opportunities is part of the proposed project.

Kuhar said the Bonito project team will begin to gather public comment sometime this winter to help in determining its plan of action. "It's a big deal. It's got wilderness; it's a heavily used recreation area; it's got some private land," Kuhar said, "so there's a lot of things to consider."

The encouraging news is that more people seem to be showing an interest in town business. Less encouraging is the fact that they are getting mixed signals. Many were told there would be a special Carrizozo Town Council meeting on Monday, and they were prepared to attend and ask questions, or rather wait for someone else to ask questions and wait for answers. Yesterday *the News* was told no special meeting was scheduled. What gives?

Answering questions from the public should be easy. And at no time should anyone assume (note the first three letters of that word) that anyone is being accused of doing anything wrong. During the last town council meeting the thing we heard was that people wanted answers, not a shrug or an "I don't know." People wanted to know where town money had been spent, when and why. That seems simple enough. The only thing officials had to do was to provide the documentation that is public record.

SANTA FE -- Millie and Billy. Few towns in the world have the opportunity Silver City does to promote a madam and an outlaw as its most famous residents.

Mildred Clark Cusey, immortalized in award-winning New Mexico author Max Evan's book "Madam Millie: Bordellos from Silver City to Ketchikan," and William Antrim, better known as Billy the Kid, give Silver City two of the most colorful characters imaginable to publicize their town.

But a decade of tourism success as the World UFO Capital is beginning to convince the dubious that maybe there are some advantages to getting their teeth and going along with the joke.

Silver City isn't there yet, but the four-year-old Millie and Billy Ball, sponsored by the Mimbres Region Arts Council, is evidence that the idea is taking hold. The Arts Council isn't just any organization. It regularly is honored as New Mexico's top arts organization. The ball is held yearly in June. Tickets are \$100 and include a barbecue dinner and \$10,000 raffle. Attendees are invited to dress in period garb of the 1870s and 1880s for Billy or the 1920s to 1970s in honor of Millie.

Millie, the madam, has a better reputation around town than Billy, the gunslinger. Millie was a generous donor to local events and charities. She ran as decent an operation as a brothel can be. My very proper mother had kind words about their meetings at the beauty shop and dress shop.

Billy didn't shoot his first man in a café at the corner of Broadway and Bullard as local lore had it when I lived there. But he was a juvenile delinquent as a teenager, running the streets after his father disappeared into the hills hunting gold and his mother died of tuberculosis.

Surprisingly, Billy is said to have produced and starred in minstrel shows to raise money for his high school class.

The visitors center in Silver City features cardboard cut-outs of a young Millie and Billy that are used for picture taking at the ball. Next door to the center is a log cabin similar to the one in which Billy lived.

When I lived there, we

knew Billy's mother was buried in Memory Lane Cemetery, but we weren't quite sure where, because her grave was unmarked. Now, it not only has a gravestone, it has a historical marker. So do other graves in the cemetery. In fact, the county is full of historical markers, something it would be nice to see throughout the state. Fairview Cemetery in Santa Fe is full of famous gravesites. But they are unmarked and overgrown with weeds, including the grave of T.B. Catron, head of the Santa Fe Ring and one of our state's first two U.S. senators.

We paid a visit to Silver City on Labor Day weekend to take in its annual Gem and Mineral Show. In return for a few hours of shopping, I got to show our group some of my favorite haunts from a half-century ago.

While in Silver City, I picked up a copy of *Desert Exposure*, a monthly magazine for Southwest New

Mexico. The issue featured winners of a writing contest. The Grand Prize winner was Phillip "Pep" Parotti, a high school friend who recently moved back from a teaching career at Sam Houston State in Texas.

It was an essay about high school pranks at Mildred's mansion on Hudson Street. Most any boy who grew up in Silver City has a similar bag of stories. It was a rite of passage.

My story is of the night we bravely threw a can of cat food on Millie's back porch. She reported to police that it had broken a stained glass window and she had seen "Y. Toy" on a black delivery truck. Herb Toy took the rap for several of us who likely would be grounded to this day had our parents been notified.

## Changes Needed

After attending the last Carrizozo Council meeting it would probably be safe to say that things at city hall have to change, and the sooner the better. Many questions have been left unanswered, and if any questions are posed to anyone on our governing board, whether it be at a town council meeting or if you walk into city hall, they will stare you straight in the face and say they don't know and then get on the phone to the town attorney for further instructions.

I can sympathize with some of our trustees and the mayor, since they are somewhat new at their position. The circumstance/problem they find themselves in now might have already been there before they were elected. But that doesn't excuse them from breaking town ordinances and making them obsolete, and not having any remote kind of answer to simple questions. It is sad to see people who run for office, get elected, and then have absolutely nothing to say, except unstudied yeas or nays at a town council meeting, where the well being of a community is at stake.

A bad circumstance/problem that someone all of a sudden finds himself in, can if not corrected ASAP have a negative effect for an indefinite length of time, and this present circumstance/problem seems headed in that direction. Sometimes the only answer is prompt action on a gut feeling. Being afraid or even cautious in acting on a bad circumstance is only human, but not taking any action and waiting for someone else to do your job can also spell disaster.

Someone will promptly respond to me and tell me that you can't run a town on a gut feeling, but what I do know is that the way it's being done now isn't working... Carrizozo is at a crossroads: of having a great future within its grasp, if the right decisions are made, or being just another small town with no future, because no one has any answers or the leadership to bring our community together.

As former president of the Lincoln County Medical Center Auxiliary, Maxine Roberson oversees a team effort to raise more than \$88,000 annually to support the hospital.

**What does the Auxiliary do for the hospital?**  
Primarily, we raise money to help the hospital purchase some of the things it needs to improve patient care and to help hospital employees take better care of our patients.

Right now, for example, we're in the middle of a three-phase expansion and so far have raised more than a half a million dollars to purchase new stretchers, electrocardiogram machines, and a special pump that allows patients to control their own pain medication.

Four years ago we bought new, more versatile patient beds that can automatically weigh a patient or go directly from the patient room into the operating room, so very ill patients don't have to move as much. We also furnished a room for hospice patients, which looks and feels more like home.

#### How do you raise the money?

Our Thrift Shop located off Sudderth and behind the Allsup's store is our major moneymaker. Everything is donated, and people here are very generous with their donations. Often, we get very nice clothes and furniture, and everything goes at a ridiculously low price. Most items cost three dollars or less. It takes a lot of sales to come up with \$350 or \$400 dollars a day, but that's what we do. If we had a few more volunteers, we could stay open longer and maybe make an extra \$200 per day. Maybe more.

We also have the Gift and Gab located inside the hospital. We have great buyers who are selective about having unique gifts. For the most part, they are not duplicative of the things sold in town. Sales are tax-free and our items are reasonably priced. We also have a Christmas sale where everything is forty percent off, so our customers really appreciate the selection and the prices.

#### What do you enjoy most about Ruidoso and Lincoln County?

The people are the best asset really. Everyone's here because they want to be here. If I could, I would thank them for their generosity and their patronage, because it's not wasted. Everything that is donated is used one way or another.

**ORDINANCE 2007-06  
ADOPTING 2007 CHANGES TO THE  
2004 COMPILATION OF THE UNIFORM TRAFFIC ORDINANCE**

WHEREAS, the Village of Capitan has adopted the 2004 Compilation of the Uniform Traffic Ordinance, and

WHEREAS, the legislature adopted changes amending the following sections: Adding Section 12-6-16.1 Neighborhood Electric Cars to the Traffic Regulations Index list. Section 12-6-12.1, B (1) deleting *who and adding to drive a vehicle in this state if the person, delete his, add the person's, delete to drive a vehicle within this municipality, add within three hours of driving the vehicle and the alcohol concentration results from alcohol consumed before or while driving the vehicle;* Subsection B(2) delete *who, add to drive a commercial motor vehicle in this state if the person, delete his, add the person's, add within three hours of driving the commercial motor vehicle and the alcohol concentration results from alcohol consumed before or after driving the vehicle. Delete to drive a commercial vehicle within this municipality. Subsection D (1) add drives a vehicle in this state and, delete his and add the person's, delete while driving a vehicle within this state, add within three hours of driving the vehicle and the alcohol concentration results from alcohol consumed before or after driving the vehicle. Delete to drive a commercial vehicle. Add a new Subsection O stating If the test performed pursuant to the Implied Consent Act is administered more than three hours after the person was driving a vehicle, the test result may be introduced as evidence of the alcohol concentration in the person's blood or breath at the time of the test and the trier of fact shall determine what weight to give the test result for the purpose of determining a violation of Sec. 12-6-12.1(66-8-110 NMSA 1978). Each Subsection letter thereafter increased in ascending order.* Section 12-6-12.2 Subsection C deleting *and not more than forty eight hours.* Subsection D (1) adding *not less than.* Subsection D (2) adding *not less than* - Section 12-6-12.19 Subsection B (3) adding *vehicle* and deleting *cycle* Section 12-6-14.2 Subsection A deleting *upon the half of the street upon which the vehicle is traveling, or when the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the opposite half of the street as to be in danger* and adding *in the crosswalk.* Section 12-6-16 Subsection C adding *secretary* and deleting *director of the traffic safety bureau.*

**New Material  
12-6-16.1**

**NEIGHBORHOOD ELECTRIC CARS**

A. A neighborhood electric car means a four-wheeled electric motor vehicle that has a maximum speed of more than twenty miles per hour but less than twenty-five miles per hour, complies with the federal requirements specified in 49 CFR 571.500 and shall be equipped with head lamps, stop lamps, front and rear turn signals lamps, tail lamps, and reflex reflectors, a parking brake, at least one interior and one exterior rear view mirror, a windshield, a windshield wipers, a speedometer, an odometer, braking for each wheel, seat belts and a vehicle identification number.

B. Except as provided for in Subsection C or D of this section, a neighborhood electric car properly registered pursuant to provisions of the Motor Vehicle Code, in compliance with the Mandatory Financial Responsibility Act and driven by an individual with a valid driver's license, may be operated on any street, roadway or highway under the jurisdiction of either the state or a local authority if the posted maximum speed limit is thirty-five miles per hour or less; provided, a neighborhood electric car may cross at an intersection or permitted crossing point at any street, roadway or highway that has a maximum speed limit higher than thirty-five miles an hour.

C. A local authority may prohibit the operation of neighborhood electric cars on any road under its jurisdiction if the governing body of the local authority determines that the prohibition is necessary in the interest of safety.

D. The department of transportation may prohibit the operation of neighborhood electric cars on any road under its jurisdiction if it determines that the prohibition is necessary in the interest of safety.

E. Neighborhood electric cars are exempt from the following provisions:

- (1) the emblems or flashing light requirements for slow-moving vehicles in Section 66-3-88 NMSA 1987;
- (2) any requirements for vehicle emission inspections adopted by a local authority pursuant to Subsection C of Section 74-2-4 NMSA 1978; and
- (3) the minimum motor displacement requirements of Paragraph (2) of Subsection A of Section 66-7-405 NMSA 1978. (66-3-1103 NMSA 1978)

Section 12-9-9 Subsection A deleting *disabled*, adding *accessible*, also adding for persons with significant mobility limitation, designed for access by persons with significant mobility limitations.

Section 12-12-8 Subsection A deleting *his* and adding *the peace officer's*. Subsection B changes are deleting *handicapped* and adding *access*, and adding for persons with significant mobility limitation, adding *the*, deleting *said*, deleting *his*, and adding *the security guard's*. **ORDINANCE 2007- 07  
AMENDMENTS TO EXCAVATION CODE**

WHEREAS, the Village of Capitan has adopted an Excavation Ordinance; and  
WHEREAS, the Village of Capitan desires to make amendments to the existing ordinance pertaining to pavement and road cuts and permits; and  
WHEREAS, the Village of Capitan Governing Body recognizes a need to amend the ordinance as follows:

- Section 7-2-1: Add the following subsections:
    - A. Road cuts will be allowed on base course and dirt surfaces. The cuts will be tampered to 100% compaction to repair the street or road to its original condition. The permittee will be held liable if the repairs are not made correctly.
    - B. Asphalt or chip sealed finishes to the streets or roads shall not be cut. Boring under these streets or road surfaces will be allowed.
  - Section 7-2-2: Definitions - Excavation - delete pavement
  - Section 7-2-3: Subsection C deleting ten (10) days and inserting three (3) days.
  - Section 7-2-4: Subsection D (3) deleting thirty (30) and inserting ten (10)
  - Section 7-2-5: Permit Fees rewording Subsection B (2) as follows: Inspection Fee: Each excavation project involving the boring of a paved or chip sealed village roadway or cutting a village roadway which has base course or is a dirt road will be subject to an inspection fee of twenty five dollars (\$25.00).
  - Section 7-2-11: Subsection B amending the section to read as follows: In the case of boring of paved roads and chipped sealed surfaces, the permittee will have the responsibility to maintain the repair for a period of five (5) years, excluding reasonable wear and tear. If the bore patch or other repair has settled, shifted, or otherwise caused an uneven or dangerous condition in the roadway, the permittee shall repair the road surface within fifteen (15) working days of the date permittee receives such notification or make other arrangements as mutually agreed by the parties. (Amended 2007-07)
- THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Governing Body of the Village of Capitan that Section 7-2-1, Section 7-2-2, Section 7-2-3, Section 7-2-4, Section 7-2-5, and Section 7-2-11 of the Village of Capitan Codes be amended to read as set forth herein.

**ORDINANCE 2007- 08  
VILLAGE OF CAPITAN  
CLEAN INDOOR AIR**

ENACTING THE VILLAGE OF CAPITAN CLEAN INDOOR AIR ORDINANCE, PROVIDING FOR SMOKEFREE AREAS; PROVIDING PENALTIES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF CAPITAN:

- Section 4-3-1: Short Title
- Section 4-3-2: Purpose
- Section 4-3-3: Definitions
- Section 4-3-4: Smoking Prohibited
- Section 4-3-5: Smoking-Permitted Areas
- Section 4-3-6: Prohibition of Smoking Near Entrances, Windows and Ventilation Systems
- Section 4-3-7: Responsibilities of Employers
- Section 4-3-8: Posted Smoke free and Smoking-Permitted Areas
- Section 4-3-9: Enforcement
- Section 4-3-10: Violations
- Section 4-3-11: Penalties
- Section 4-3-12: Nonretaliation -Nonwaiver
- Section 4-3-13: Severability

4-3-1: **Short Title:** This ordinance may be cited as the Village of Capitan Clean Indoor Air Ordinance.

4-3-2: **Purpose:** Whereas one of the duties of government is to protect the public health, safety and welfare of its citizens, the Capitan governing body recognizes environmental tobacco smoke as detrimental to the public health and declares as the purpose of this Ordinance to protect the public health and safety by prohibiting smoking in indoor public places and indoor workplaces.

4-3-3: **Definitions:** As used in this Ordinance:

A. "bar" means an establishment that is devoted to the selling or serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by patrons on the premises and in which the serving of food is only incidental to the consumption of those beverages, including taverns, nightclubs, cocktail lounges and cabarets;

B. "cigar bar" means an establishment that:

- (1) is a bar as defined in Subsection A of this section; and
- (2) is engaged in the business of selling cigars for consumption by patrons on the premises and generates ten percent or more of its total annual gross revenue or at least ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) in annual sales from the sale of cigars, not including any sales from vending machines. A cigar bar that fails to generate at least ten percent of its total annual sales from the sale of cigars in the calendar year after December 31, 2006, not including sales from vending machines, shall not be defined as a cigar bar and shall not thereafter be known as such regardless of sales figures. A cigar bar shall agree to provide adequate information to demonstrate to the Village's satisfaction compliance with this definition;

C. "department" means the department of health;

D. "designated outdoor smoking area" means an area where smoking may be permitted, designated by an employer or manager, outside an indoor workplace or indoor public place; provided that the following conditions are maintained:

- (1) smoking shall not be permitted near any building entrance, including a door, window or ventilation system of any facility where smoking is prohibited under the provisions of this Ordinance, so as to prevent secondhand smoke from entering the indoor workplace or indoor public place; and
- (2) employees or members of the general public are not required to walk through the smoking area to gain entrance to the indoor workplace or indoor public place;

E. "employer" means an individual, a partnership, a corporation or the state that employs the services of one or more individuals and includes the Village of Capitan;

F. "enclosed" means any interior space predominantly or totally bounded on all sides and above by physical barriers, regardless of whether such barriers consist of or include uncovered openings, screened or otherwise partially covered openings or open or closed windows;

G. "indoor public place" means the enclosed area within any governmental or nongovernmental place to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted regardless of whether work or public business, meetings, or hearings occur at any given time;

H. "indoor workplace" means any enclosed place where one or more persons engage in work, including lobbies, reception areas, officers, conference and meeting rooms, employee cafeterias and lunchrooms, break rooms, and employee lounges, classrooms, auditoriums, hallways, stairways, waiting areas, elevators and restrooms and includes all indoor workplaces and enclosed parts regardless of whether work occurs at any given time;

I. "private club" means an organization, whether incorporated or not, that is the owner, lessee or occupant of a building or portion thereof used exclusively for the organization's purposes at all times, that is operated solely for recreational, fraternal, social, patriotic, political, benevolent or athletic purposes, but not for pecuniary gain, and that only sells alcoholic beverages incidental to its operation. The organization shall have bylaws or a constitution to govern its activities and shall have been granted an exemption as a club under the provisions of Section 501 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended;

J. "restaurant" means a coffee shop, cafeteria, private or public school cafeteria or eating establishment and any other eating establishment that gives or offers for sale food to the public, patrons or employees, including kitchens and catering facilities in which food is prepared on the premises for serving elsewhere or a bar area within or attached to the premises;

K. "retail tobacco store" means a retail store used primarily for the sale of tobacco products and accessories and in which the sale of other products is merely incidental, including smoke shops, cigar shops or hookah lounges, and does not include establishments that offer for sale alcoholic beverages for consumption by patrons on the premises;

L. "secondhand smoke" means smoke emitted from lighted, smoldering or burning tobacco when the smoker is not inhaling, smoke emitted from the mouthpiece during puff drawing and smoke exhaled by the smoker;

M. "smoke free area" means any building or other enclosed space where smoking is prohibited;

N. "smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning, carrying or holding any lighted tobacco product, including all types of cigarettes, cigars, and pipes and any other lighted tobacco product; and

O. "smoking-permitted area" means any building or other enclosed space where smoking may be permitted; provided that secondhand smoke does not infiltrate any area where smoking is prohibited pursuant to this Ordinance.

4-3-4: **Smoking Prohibited:**  
A. It is unlawful for a person to smoke in any indoor workplace or indoor public place or in buses, taxicabs or other means of public transit not specifically exempted pursuant to the Ordinance.

4-3-5: **Smoking-Permitted Areas:** Notwithstanding any other provision of this Ordinance, smoking-permitted areas include the following:

- A. a private residence, except during hours of business operation while it is being used commercially to provide child care, adult care or health care or any combination of those activities;
- B. a retail tobacco store;
- C. a cigar bar;
- D. the facilities of a tobacco manufacturing company licensed by the United States to manufacture tobacco products that are operated by the company in its own name and that are used exclusively by the company in its business of manufacturing, marketing or distributing its tobacco products, provided that smoke does not infiltrate other indoor workplaces or other indoor public places where smoking is otherwise prohibited under this Ordinance;
- E. a state-licensed gaming facility, casino or bingo parlor;
- F. an indoor workplace to the extent that tobacco smoking is an integral part of a smoking cessation program that is approved by the department or of medical or scientific research that is conducted in the indoor workplace and in which each room of the indoor workplace in which tobacco smoking is permitted complies with signage requirements;
- G. designated outdoor smoking areas;
- H. private clubs;
- I. a limousine under private hire;
- J. hotel and motel rooms that are rented to guests and are designated as smoking-permitted rooms; provided that not more than twenty-five percent (25%) of rooms rented to guests in a hotel or motel may be so designated;
- K. enclosed areas within restaurants, bars, hotel and motel conference or meeting rooms while these places are being used for private functions; provided that none of these areas are open to the general public while the private functions are occurring and provided that smoke does not infiltrate other indoor workplaces or indoor public places where smoking is otherwise prohibited under this Ordinance;
- L. a site that is being used in connection with the practice of cultural or ceremonial activities by Native Americans and that is in accordance with the federal American Indian Religious Freedom Act, 42 U.S.C. 1996 and 1996a;
- M. a business of a sole proprietor or a business with fewer than two employees that is not commonly accessible to the public; provided that:
  - (1) the business is not a restaurant or bar;
  - (2) the employer or manager of such business shall provide a smoke-free work environment for each employee requesting a smoke-free environment; and
  - (3) cigarette smoke does not infiltrate other smoke-free work environments as provided for in this Ordinance; and
- N. a theatrical stage or a motion picture or television production set when it is necessary for performers to smoke as part of the production.

4-3-6: **Prohibition of Smoking Near Entrances, Windows and Ventilation Systems:** Smoking is prohibited near entrances, windows and ventilation systems of all workplaces and public places where smoking is prohibited by this Ordinance. An individual who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls the use of any premises subject to the provisions of this Ordinance shall establish a smoke free area that extends a reasonable distance from any entrances, windows and ventilation systems to any enclosed areas where smoking is prohibited. The reasonable distance shall be a distance sufficient to ensure that persons entering or leaving the building or facility shall not be subjected to breathing tobacco smoke and to ensure that tobacco smoke does not enter the building or facility through entrances, windows, ventilation systems or any other means.

4-3-7: **Responsibilities of Employers:**  
A. Employers shall provide that their places of employment meet the requirements of this Ordinance.  
B. An employer shall adopt, implement, post and maintain a written policy pursuant to the Ordinance.

4-3-8: **Posted Smoke free and Smoking-Permitted Areas:**  
A. To advise persons of the existence of smoke free areas or smoking-permitted areas, signs shall be posted as follows:

- (1) for each indoor workplace or indoor public place where smoking is prohibited pursuant to this Ordinance, a "No Smoking" sign shall be posted where it is clear, conspicuous and easily legible at each public entrance. Post of "No Smoking" signs is the responsibility of the owner, operator, manager or other person having control of the indoor workplace or indoor public place; and
- (2) for each indoor workplace or indoor public place where smoking is permitted pursuant to this Ordinance, a "Smoking Permitted" sign shall be posted where it is clear, conspicuous and easily legible at each public entrance, unless an owner, operator or manager chooses to prohibit smoking in all or part of an indoor workplace or indoor public place where smoking is otherwise permitted.

B. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be construed so as to require the posting of signs at a residence, except during the hours of business operation while it is being used commercially to provide child care, adult care or health care or any combination of those activities.

4-3-9: **Enforcement**  
A. Enforcement of this Ordinance shall be by citation from the Fire Department, Police Department and Code Enforcement officers.

B. A person may register a complaint regarding an alleged violation pursuant to this Ordinance to initiate enforcement with the Fire or Police Department.

C. The designated enforcement agencies may inspect an establishment for compliance with this Ordinance.

4-3-10: **Violations:** It is unlawful for a person who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls the use of premises subject to regulation under this Ordinance to violate its provisions. The owner, manager or operator of premises subject to regulation shall not be subject to a penalty if a person on the premises is in violation of this Ordinance as long as the owner, manager or operator has posted signs, implemented the appropriate policy and informed the person that the person is in violation.

4-3-11: **Penalties:** A person eighteen years of age or older who violates a provision of this Ordinance is subject to:

- A. a fine not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100) for the first violation;
- B. a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200) for the second violation;
- C. a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500) for the third and each subsequent violation within any consecutive twelve-month period of a previous violation.

4-3-12: **Nonretaliation -Nonwaiver**  
A. A person or employer shall not discharge, refuse to hire or in any manner retaliate against an employee, applicant for employment or patron because that employee, applicant or patron exercises any rights afforded by this Ordinance or reports or attempts to prosecute a violation of this Ordinance.

B. An employee who works in a setting where any employer allows smoking does not waive or otherwise surrender any legal rights the employee may have against the employer or any other party.

4-3-13: **Severability:** If any section, subsection, paragraph, phrase or other portion of this Ordinance shall be declared invalid for any reason whatsoever by a court of competent jurisdiction, then such decision shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.
