

Rancho de Caballos Gets Preliminary County Approval

The application for approval of the preliminary plat for the Rancho de Caballos subdivision came before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners during their regular monthly meeting on November 20th.

The application met the approval of the Lincoln County Planning Commission in November. The planners raised concerns about water quality and full disclo-

sure of the possibility of a potentially large mining operation opening up about two miles from the subdivision, and added some suggestions for consideration by the subdivider and county commissioners regarding fire protection issues.

Clayton Harrison, of Smith Engineering, reported that the development will be located about two and a half miles north of the village of Capitan and west of New Mexico Highway 246 which

will be the primary access to the site. An area of about 240 acres will be divided into 55 residential lots and about 100 acres of open space.

The estimated annual water use for the subdivision, based on every home site including a guest house, is slightly more than 16.5 acre feet with an additional need for a half acre foot to support an equestrian center.

The issue that raised the most discussion was regarding how much information

the subdivider should disclose to potential buyers about the proposed mining operation.

"This is one of those issues that I think you can consider based on health, safety and welfare, as to whether or not that's something that would tend to have somebody want to buy property or not buy property," county attorney Alan Morel said. "I know a developer would not want to have this in their disclosure statement because it's not a

happy thing," Morel added. County commission vice-chair Eileen Lovelace said that she was hesitant to approve even the preliminary

plat application for Rancho de Caballos, because of a number of questions that are yet to be answered about the mine. Lovelace said she had

Geraldine Perkins Celebrates 100th



Wrote Corona Column For More Than 55 Years

Geraldine Marie DuBois Perkins will celebrate her 100th birthday Saturday, December 8, 1907 in a Kansas farm house between Longton and Elk Falls. Her parents were Frank A. DuBois II and Mary C. McKay DuBois.

Geraldine graduated from high school in Silver City, NM at age 15. She attended the University of New Mexico where she was president of Chi Omega Fraternity and signed a personal note to buy the lot for the first Chi Omega house. She served as student body vice president and was tapped for Mortar Board.

She is eligible for membership in Mensa. She worked as a biology assistant for two and one-half years and even taught the class while the biology professor was all with a bug she picked up in Africa.

Geraldine's pre-med studies earned her a B.S. in Biology and Chemistry at age 19.

After a diagnosis of retinitis pigmentosa ended her dreams of studying at Johns Hopkins to become a surgeon, she taught school

for one year at Park Center near Corona in a one-room school house for \$1000 a month and earned a \$1000 annual \$1000 annual salary. She roomed with one of the families and walked two miles to school with the children.

The next year, she taught 7th and 8th grade in Latun. She still corresponds with some of those students and encourages them in their literary and artistic endeavors.

She bought the first home in Corona in 1944. She and her husband, the late W. L. Perkins, lived there until they moved to the first Chi Omega house. She served as president of the house and was featured in the New Mexico Woman's Journal in 1950. She was a member of the Chi Omega Fraternity and the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society. She was also a member of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society.

She helped with the first hospital in Corona, the Corona Hospital. She was appointed by the governor to the New Mexico Health System Agency which set the number of beds in each area according to population and was responsible for establishing

health clinics in rural areas. Perkins and her husband gave talks at the Corona drug awareness and fire safety club.

Her grand father, Frank A. DuBois, Sr. was the founder of the town site of Corona and Geraldine's mother died several years later in the same town site. She still has her home there.

Geraldine's mother, FR. Archibald Perkins, and father, the late W. L. Perkins, were both teachers. She and her husband, B. O. Perkins, lived in Corona until 1950. Perkins was a member of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society and the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society. She was also a member of the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society.

County Supports Nogal Water Users

In an October report to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, the Nogal Mutual Domestic Water Users Association president Rick Rotert explained the problems faced by the association in its efforts to acquire ample water resources to support the needs of its members. Upon failure of an antiquated filtering system that facilitated the use of surface water from the Bonito Reservoir, the association drilled a well to provide unfiltered ground water to its members.

Rotert reported that the well provides the association to draw three acre feet of water from the well annually, but the 30 some households served by the system used more than the three acre feet permitted and must now pay back that over-use, leaving even less water available to its members.

The water users association has applied for an additional three acre feet annually, but Rotert reported that two applications for water permits must be heard by the State Engineer (OSE) before Nogal's request can be heard.

One of these applications, submitted by Greg Dugger of Dell City, Texas, is for 500 acre feet annually for domestic, livestock, irrigation, municipal, industrial, environmental and commercial purposes.

The other application is for 1,500 acre feet annually and was submitted by Good-Sawyer Development. That request is connected to the former Lem Sawyer Ranch which is planned for development of approximately 1,000 rental units, a recreational vehicle park, campground, an equestrian facility, a visitor center, a museum and retail shops. Representatives of Good-Sawyer Development have publicly stated on numerous occasions that the ranch already owns all of the water rights it needs for the development, yet the application for 1,500 acre feet annually has been verified by the OSE.

The Good-Sawyer application also lists the purposes of the application to be for domestic, livestock, irrigation, municipal, industrial, environmental and commercial usage.

The Good-Sawyer and Dugger applications are both under protest, so the Nogal residents have no idea when their request for three acre feet of water might be heard.

During the November 20th meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart reported sending a letter to

State Engineer John D'Antonio, expressing his disappointment in the OSE's failure to respond to a request to attend the county commissioner's October meeting to discuss the Nogal association's issues. In the letter, Stewart also mentioned that the county commissioners would likely adopt a resolution for distribution to New Mexico legislators and the Governor, proclaiming support of the Nogal association and citing indifference on the part of the OSE. Stewart suggested to the State Engineer that, if the 20 or so households currently relying on the Nogal system in their sole source of water elected to drill individual domestic wells, which they have a right to do under state law, they would be entitled to draw far more than the three acre feet allocated to the association.

Rotert told the county commissioners on November 20th that his request for information from the OSE regarding procedures for determining an emergency status for the water users association has gone unanswered.

In a letter from Jim Sizemore, chief of the OSE Water Rights Division, dated August 6th, Sizemore explained that the Lularosa Water Basin is a mixed basin, which means that the

amount of water allocated from the basin is greater than the aquifer recharge. Water right applications are administered by basin in order of receipt, and the Nogal residents are far from the top of the list.

Besides the applications from Good-Sawyer and Dugger, three other entities have applications pending for Lularosa Basin water which were filed before the Nogal association's application of March 24, 2006.

The town of Carrizozo has requested 3,500 acre feet of water for municipal, commercial, residential and soil conservation purposes. The town of Ruidoso has applied to draw 3,500 acre feet of water from the Lularosa Basin for municipal, commercial and industrial purposes, and Robert and Darla Crenshaw of Carrizozo have requested 1,000 acre feet for municipal, commercial and industrial purposes. All of the water applications mentioned are for permits to draw from proposed or existing wells located within 6 to 8 miles of Carrizozo or the town site of Nogal, and all were filed in the first half of 2003. All are still pending almost five years after the application filing dates.

"Looking Back" THROUGH OLD 'NEWS' FILES

As the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS goes into its 103rd year of being in existence (1905-2007), we will again be randomly publishing articles from old NEWS files. The following article appeared in the "Lincoln County News".

Thursday, August 3, 1972

Pat (and ghost) Told It Like This . . .

EDITOR'S NOTE -- Not long after the escape, Pat Garrett, the sheriff who killed the Kid at Pet Maxwell's ranch near Fort Sumner, published a book with the involved title of "The Authentic Life of Billy the Kid, the Noted Desperado of the Southwest, Whose Deeds of Daring Have Made his Name a Terror in New Mexico, Arizona and Northern Mexico." Like many a latterday celebrity, Pat had a ghost -- Ash Upton, a sometime newspaperman and later a partner with Garrett in an ill-fated real estate venture.

The life of the Kid ended and my history thereof is finished. Perhaps, however, some of my readers will consent to follow me through my actions, questions my immunity from legal penalty for the slaying of The Kid. I did think I was fully advised in regard to this matter before I undertook the dangerous task of his re-arrest, as I contemplated the possible necessity of having him to kill. But I must acknowledge that I did not consult with the San Francisco editor, and can, at this late hour, only apologize, humbly, for the culpable omission. The law has decided as to my amenability to its requirements -- should the opinion of the scribbler to adverse, I can but abjectly crave his mercy.

During the time occupied in preparing the foregoing work for press, some circumstances have occurred, some newspaper articles have appeared, and many remarks have been passed referring to the disposal of The Kid, his character, disposition and history, and my completed publication of his life, which I have resolved to notice, against the advice of friends, who believe the proper and more dignified plan would be to ignore them altogether. But I have something to say, and propose to say it.

A San Francisco daily, in an article which I have never seen, but only comments thereon in other journals, among other strictures on my actions, questions my immunity from legal penalty for the slaying of The Kid. I did think I was fully advised in regard to this matter before I undertook the dangerous task of his re-arrest, as I contemplated the possible necessity of having him to kill. But I must acknowledge that I did not consult with the San Francisco editor, and can, at this late hour, only apologize, humbly, for the culpable omission. The law has decided as to my amenability to its requirements -- should the opinion of the scribbler to adverse, I can but abjectly crave his mercy.

I have been portrayed in print and in illustrations, as shooting The Kid from behind a bed, from under a bed, and from other places of concealment. After mature deliberation I have resolved that honest confession will serve my purpose better than prevarication. Hear!

I was not behind the bed, because, in the first place, I could not get there. I'm not "as wide as a church door," but the bed was so close to the wall that a lath could scarce have been introduced between. I was not under the bed, and this fact will require a little more complicated explanation. I could have gotten under the bed, but, you see, I did not know The Kid was coming. He took me by surprise -- gave me no chance on earth to hide myself. Had I but suspected his proximity, or that he would come upon me in that abrupt manner, I would have utilized any safe place of concealment which might have presented itself -- under the bed, or under my article which I might have found under the bed, large enough to cover me.

Scared? Suppose a man of The Kid's noted gentle and amiable disposition and temper, had warned you that when you two met you had better "come a shooting," suppose he bounced in on you unexpectedly with a revolver in his hand, whilst yours was in your scabbard. Scared? Wouldn't you have been scared? I didn't dare to answer his hail -- "Quien es?" as the first sound of my voice, which he knew perfectly well, would have been his signal to make a target of my physical personality, with his self-cocker, from which he was wont to pump a continuous stream of fire and lead, and in any direction, unerringly, which answered to his will. Scared, Cap? Well, I should say so. I started out on that expedition with the expectation of getting scared.

attended a meeting with U.S. Forest Service officials in which she was made aware of a lot of misinformation regarding the mining operation, and some activity on the site that even the Forest Service had not been aware of.

Attorney John Underwood, speaking on behalf of the subdivider, read from the current disclosure statement which explains that El Capitan Precious Metals, Inc. is in the process of applying for test core drilling approximately three miles from the development, and that it is uncertain whether or not the application will be approved. Underwood told the county commissioners that the application, if granted, could take as long as two years to process. "We're happy to be very open about that," Underwood said, "but I believe that there's no sense in saying things that are not true or not yet approved."

Lovelace pointed out that, if the mine's owners meet all of the requirements associated with the application, the Forest Service will be bound to approve it.

County planning commission vice-chair Jerry Carroll reported that the proposed mine site is two miles from the subdivision, and that the intent of the planning commission was to have the subdivision's disclosure statement clearly state the potential for a large mining operation in near proximity. "The (mining) company obviously owns the claims," Carroll said, and suggested that, if the miners follow the laws governing such enterprises, the application will be approved.

Carroll also said that he had requested an engineering report to more clearly define the methods of removing radioactive alpha particles from drinking water in the subdivision. "They should produce the data for information purposes, not that they're required to, but they said that they would," Carroll said.

As to the mining proposal, county commissioner Don Williams questioned why the developer should be required to disclose something that may not ever happen. "There could be an earthquake out there. Have you got calculations on that?" Williams asked. "There are a lot of things

that could happen that you can't foresee, and if it's in the disclosure statement it could influence somebody and it could cause them not to buy when there's no risk whatsoever," Williams said. He suggested that the county commissioners could require that the disclosure statement be amended if and when the mining application is approved.

Ed Tinsley, owner of the land planned for subdivision and a candidate for Congress, told the county commissioners that there is a bill currently under consideration that would allow local governments to petition the federal government to have mining claims removed from certain portions of public lands. "We certainly want any potential buyer to be aware of what is more than just a remote possibility. We could actually even flag the fact that UFOs might fly over our development as well. We want our buyers to be informed, but not in such a manner that will create undue alarm about issues that I believe are not greater than a remote possibility," Tinsley said.

Carroll said that, because the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and other federal agencies are opposed to the bill, the chances of it passing are also remote, and that applications already filed for mining ventures would be grandfathered-in if the bill does pass.

Bob Burgland, the local representative of El Capitan Precious Metals, Inc., said that they have already identified 141 million tons of mineralization that contains 6.1 million ounces of gold equivalent metal, almost five billion dollars worth of metals. "The potential is there to greatly enlarge that tonnage and possibly improve the grades," Burgland said. "This is much more than a long-shot process," he said, and estimated that it will be a very substantial operation. "A business like this will bring a lot of high paying jobs with benefits to Lincoln County," he said. "When you start talking about UFOs and stuff like that, I think we're off base," he added.

Regarding the alpha particles found in a test well on the subdivision, county planning director Curt Temple reported that he had spoken with an official of the state's Water Quality Bureau. "He said it could be an anomaly of the testing itself, and he recommended taking another test because it could just be the way it was drilled," Temple said. "It could have been a release of gasses or something like that."

Temple recommended that the water be retested prior to final approval of the subdivision application, but subdivision representatives argued that the complicated testing cannot be completed before the third week of December, when they plan to request final approval of the subdivision. It was also pointed out that water quality testing is not a requirement of the

county's current subdivision ordinance.

Harrison told the county officials that the particles found in the test well are naturally occurring and are most easily treated through ion exchange processes or simple water softeners. "An R.O. (reverse osmosis) system can be used as well," Harrison said.

The county commissioners approved the preliminary plat for the Ranchos de Caballos subdivision in a 3-to-2 vote. Commissioners Jackie Powell and Eileen Lovelace voted against approval.

Lovelace said she could not vote to approve the application because she likes to see everything in black and white before approval. Powell said that she also voted against approval because the ever-growing number of developments in Lincoln County do not contribute to its infrastructure needs and place a constantly increasing burden on the taxpayers. She thanked Tinsley for creating a plan that he said will dedicate \$2,500 from each sale of land within the subdivision to a fund to support projects for the youth of the Capitan area.

Rita was born in Carrizozo on February 9, 1935, and was raised there during her young to adolescent life.

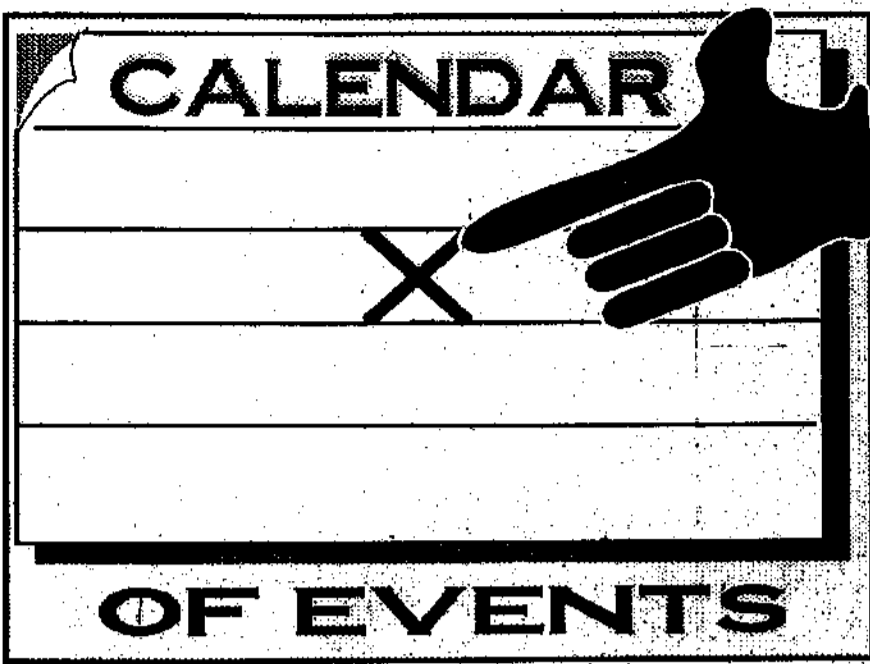

According to Andrea Mendoza, the OSE's District 4 Water Resource Specialist Supervisor, the application filed by the Nogal Mutual Domestic Water Users Association for three acre feet of water will not likely be heard before the other five applicants, who are requesting a combined total of 10,000 acre feet annually from a mined basin.

Rotert said that he had been contacted by Mayor Nunley of Ruidoso and Mayor Hemphill of Carrizozo, both offering to try to work out a water transfer or other means of assisting the Nogal association in dealing with its dilemma, but no solution has been found.

"We can't seem to get a willing ear to hear our complaints or claims from the Office of the State Engineer," Rotert said. "But I want to make it very clear that we appreciate the efforts of both of these municipalities on our behalf."

In his letter to Rotert, Sizemore suggested some possible solutions to the water shortage, including the diversion of water from private wells in the area. About one-third of the families who are connected to the Nogal water system also have domestic wells, and some have additional rights for irrigation purposes. Another option is to seek funding to repair and upgrade the defunct filtering system, would make it possible to use the one and a half acre feet of water per annum from the Bonito reservoir.

The board of county commissioners unanimously adopted a resolution in support of the Nogal association, and has also agreed to assist the association in applying for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for a Preliminary Engineering Report on the condition of the water system and the potential costs of improvements.

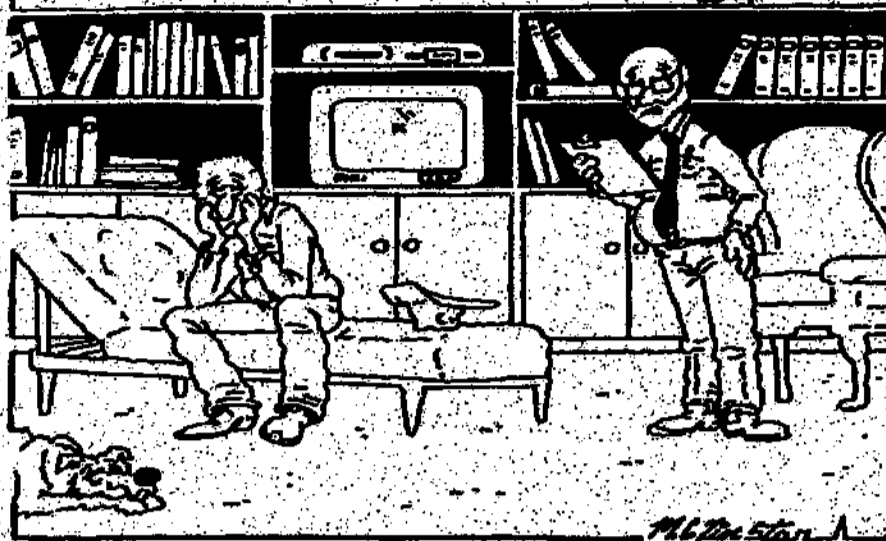

Scalping of tickets to events is illegal in many places, scalping of water rights should also be illegal. Maybe someone will act like John Wayne and come to the rescue of the downtrodden.

★ Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE - On Pearl Harbor Day, Dec. 7, 1941, New Mexico's National Guard troops, deployed to the Philippines, knew the Japanese would attack them the same day.

They had been watching reconnaissance planes fly over every day, but had orders not to fire. Our reconnaissance planes saw the huge buildup on Formosa. Japan had captured everything to the north, including China. The Philippines were the last major obstacle on the way to Australia.

Our men just didn't know when the attack was coming. When Pearl Harbor was attacked, it was about 4 a.m., on December 8, in the Philippines, on the other side of the International Date Line. The attack on the Philippines was planned for 8 a.m., but clouds over Formosa delayed it until noon. That gave eight hours advance notice. During that time, rumors of the attack spread among various units of our troops, but they received no orders to mobilize. Some of the delay was attributed to sabotage. Clark Field was a prime target of the air attack. Tommy Foy, later a New Mexico state legislator, was unable to get through to Clark Field from his post. Neither could anyone else. The warning never got through. The planes and trucks, lined up with military precision made perfect targets for strafing runs.

Washington had not shared everything it knew with its military commanders in the Pacific, but many still wonder why Gen. MacArthur wasn't better prepared for alerting his troops. The 200th Coast Artillery still hadn't gotten all its guns and equipment unpacked. That task had to be finished under fire.

The story of the equipment was the same as before. It was either defective or out-moded. The ammunition was corroded and most of the shells were duds. As box after box was opened, our men realized that these were their rejects from Fort Bliss, where they had trained outside El Paso. Much of it was left over from World War I.

But despite only one out of 10 shells being good, they scored five confirmed hits the first day. Four years later, in a speech at Deming, Gen. Jonathan M. Wainwright confirmed that the 200th had been the first unit in the Philippines to fire on the enemy. It didn't take long for the competence of the New Mexico guardsmen, who comprised the 200th Coast Artillery, to be noticed. That first night, the undermanned 200th, too small to defend Clark Field, was split. A

third of the regiment was sent to Manila and christened as a new regiment, the 515th. It was America's first war-born regiment, composed of only 500 men. Instead of the usual 1,800. The following day, another 200 men were transferred to other units in need of their expertise. "The old 200th" was now down to only 1,100 men.

The equipment situation was just as bad in Manila as it had been at Clark Field. Nearly everything, including communications equipment, was World War I vintage. But our guys got everything working well enough to go into action within 24 hours of their arrival.

As our troops were approaching Manila on December 9, the Navy was pulling out, headed south to the Dutch East Indies. But reinforcements for our anti-aircraft units were on the way.

Seven ships and a heavy cruiser were headed to Manila with planes, artillery and ammunition. Later that day, however, Washington redirected the convoy to Australia and turned four troopships, bound for Manila, back to San Francisco.

MacArthur was not told, nor was he informed of the secret Roosevelt-Churchill accord to "get Hitler first." Instead Gen. George Marshall radioed him to "expect every possible assistance."

On December 10, Japanese assault forces began landing, preparatory to a full-scale invasion, and Japanese bombers and fighters began massive assaults on air fields and Manila Bay.

And thus began a terrible four months, holding the line to disrupt Japan's quick advance to Australia, and control of the entire Pacific.

Then, "the lucky shot," as they put it. It was not the shot, but the opportunity that was lucky and everybody may rest assured I did not hesitate long to improve it. If there is any one simple enough to imagine that I did, or will ever, put my life squarely in the balance against that of The Kid, or any of his ilk, let his divest his mind of that absurd fallacy. It is said that Garrett did not give The Kid a fair show -- did not fight him "on the square," etc. Whenever I take a contract to fight a man "on the square," as they put it, (parenthesis -- I am not on the fight), that man must bear the reputation, before the world and in my estimation, of an honorable man and respectable citizen; or, at least, he must be my equal in social standing, and I claim the right to place my own estimate upon my own character, and my own valuation upon my own life. If the public shall judge that these shall be measured by the same standards as those of outlaws and murderers, whose lives are forfeit to the law, I beg the privilege of appeal from its decision.

I had a hope -- a very faint hope -- of catching The Kid napping, as it were, so that I might disarm and capture him. Failing in that, my design was to try and get "the drop" on him, with the, almost, certainty, as I believed, that he would make good his threat to "die fighting with a revolver at each ear;" so, with the drop, I would have been foreed to kill him anyhow, I, at no time, contemplated taking any chances which I could avoid by caution or cunning. The only circumstances under which we could have met on equal terms, would have been accidental, and to which I would have been an unwilling party. Had we met unexpectedly, face to face, I have no idea that either one of us would have run away, and there is where the "square fight" would, doubtless, have come off. With one question I will dismiss the subject of taking unfair advantage, etc. What sort of "square fight," or "even show," would I have got, had one of The Kid's friends in Fort Sumner chanced to see me and informed him of my presence there, and at Pete Maxwell's room on that fatal night?

A few words in regard to criticisms from two isolated rural journals published, I think, somewhere in the hill-tops of the extreme northern counties of this Territory -- at Guadalupitas, or Las Golondrinas, or La Cueva, or Vermejo. I have never seen a copy of either of them, and should have been ignorant of their existence had not a respectable newspaper copied their "puff". These fellows object to my writing and publishing a Life of The Kid. Their expostulations come too late; it is written and I will quarrel before I abandon the design of publishing it.

One of these weekly emanations is called "The Optician," or some similar name, which would indicate that it is devoted to the interests of an industry, which is, or should be, the exclusive prerogative of the disciples of Paul Pry. Perhaps it is a medical journal, edited by an M.D., who did not get the skull, nor the finger, nor any of the bones of The Kid's body, and is proportionately incensed thereat.

The other, judging from the two or three extracts I have seen from its columns, must, also, be a medical journal, published in the interest of an asylum for the imbeciles. I would advise the manager to exercise more vigilance in the absence of the editor, and try to keep patients out of his chair. The unfortunate moonling who scribbled that "stickfull" which reflected upon me and my book, judging from his peculiar phraseology, must be a demented fishmonger.

You may spatter, you may soak him
With ink if you will,
But the scent of stale catfish
Will cling 'round him still.

Both of these delectable hermits charge me with intent to publish a Life of The Kid, with the nefarious object of making money thereby. Oh asinine propellers of Faber's No. 2; Oh! ludificatory lavishers of Arnold's night-timed fluid; what the Hades else do you suppose my object could be? Their philosophy is that I must not attempt to make any more money out of the result of my "lucky shot," because, forsooth, "some men would have been satisfied," etc. Anybody, everybody else, authors who never were in New Mexico and never saw The Kid, can compile from newspaper rumors, as many lives of him as they please, make all the money out of their bogus,
