

Primary Election June 3rd

The primary election will be held next Tuesday, June 3. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Only registered voters for the two major political parties - Democrat and Republican - will vote in the primary election.

The voter registration books closed May 6 and if voters were not registered by that date they will not be eligible to vote in the primary election. According to the Lincoln County Clerk's Office

there are 3,496 Democrats eligible to vote in the primary election and 7,314 Republicans eligible to vote in the primary election.

Absentee voting began May 6. Friday will be the last day the clerk's office may mail out absentee ballots. Absentee voting will continue in person through May 31. If a voter wants to vote absentee the voter must request an absentee ballot.

Early in-person voting began May 17 and will end Saturday, May 31. Early in-person

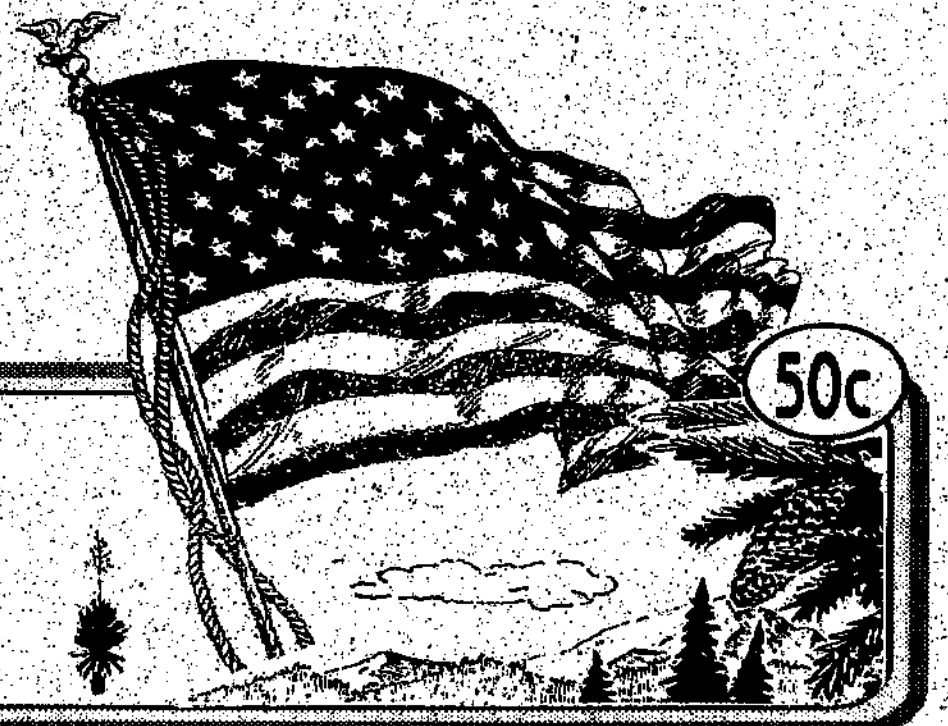
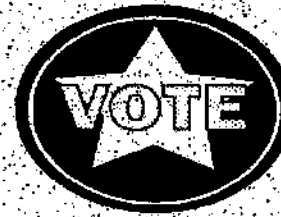

Counties Burdened by Prisoner Health Care Costs

When a person otherwise eligible for Social Security income, Medicare, or Medicaid benefits is incarcerated, those benefits are immediately withdrawn, often long before the suspect is brought to trial to determine innocence or guilt. The policy resulted from Medicaid reforms passed back in 1997 but, according to county manager Tom Stewart, rapidly rising health care costs are placing too high a burden on counties that are obligated to provide necessary treatment for the prisoners they keep.

The absence of adequate facilities to treat the mentally ill have forced counties to cover the increasing costs of mental or behavioral care for patients who would be better served outside of the prison system but wind up there for lack of alternatives.

In a report to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners on May 20th, Stewart talked about the burden that has fallen upon counties nationwide in providing care management for prisoners who have yet to be convicted

of a crime. "They lose all of their Federal benefits just for being incarcerated," Stewart said. "They haven't been convicted, yet the county is expected to step up to the plate and pick up the bill for their care. This has been something that has bothered me for quite a while. I don't think it's fair," Stewart added.

County commissioner Fifteen Lovelace suggested that the pretrial withdrawal of benefits gives the appearance of the presumption of guilt, and county commissioner Tom Battin said that the loss of benefits amount to punishment without a trial.

"I'm surprised that there hasn't some sort of civil rights action," Battin said.

Stewart reported that 157 counties and state organizations have teamed with the National Association of Counties (NACo) in efforts to get a bill passed through Congress to relieve counties of the burden of providing health care for the pretrial incarcerated.

Stewart said that the Medicaid reform bill of 1997 irreparably damaged the state's mental health safety net, thereby moving thousands of mentally ill persons

EMS Week Honors Those Who Serve

Any time of the day or night, any season and in even the most severe weather conditions, the dedicated staff of Lincoln County's Emergency Medical Services (EMS) respond to the call to help those in need. When a car rolls over along an isolated road in a remote part of the county or a child has difficulty breathing in the middle of the night, Lincoln County EMS responds. When the fullback on the high school's football team suffers an injury during a game, Lincoln County EMS is there to help. Patients at our medical center or health care clinics that need to be transferred to an out of county facility for emergency care rely on EMS

to see that they are promptly taken to where they can get the help they need. Infants to elderly, those in need of emergency medical assistance can be assured that the Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs), paramedics, doctors and nurses of the county's emergency medical services department will be available to assist.

Most of the county's EMTs are on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days of the year. Those serving in rural communities only get paid when they are actively assisting with an emergency call. They log hundreds of hours of training at their own expense and suffer the stressful demands of proving their skills at state testing sites to

achieve the licensing needed to practice those skills.

To honor those who dedicate so much of their time to protect and serve us all in our most dire times of need, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners proclaimed the week of May 18 through May 24 as Lincoln County EMS week. To further serve their communities, the EMS workers went to local schools and civic organizations last week to educate people and our children about the services they provide.

Reverse 911 Notifications Is Proposed for County

Dialing 911 on any telephone will connect a caller to emergency assistance, but some county emergency personnel rely on media broadcasts, door to door notification

or telephone networking to spread the word of a potentially hazardous situation.

County manager Tom Stewart told the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners last week that he was working on a plan to upgrade the county's ability to issue emergency notifications.

Earlier this month, Stewart received a letter from Chief Deputy Patrick O'Brien, of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, outlining the costs of an interactive community notification system, or reverse 911. O'Brien wrote that citizens had been asking why the sheriff's department didn't already have the system in place.

With the reverse 911 capabilities, an emergency alert could be sent from the county's dispatch center in Carrizozo to every telephone within a designated geographic area. "It's an instantaneous notice to the public that something's amiss," Stewart said last week.

The Ruidoso Police Department paid a little more than \$56,000 for the reverse notification system two years ago. O'Brien indicated that, after the initial purchase, the county should anticipate fees amounting to about \$1,000 per month for the service plus three cents for every completed phone call sent through the system.

Stewart said that the county's Emergency Services Director, James Mason, had been researching the possibility of acquiring Department of Homeland Security grants to fund the reverse notification system. He also

into jails that lack sufficient funding to meet their needs. The New Mexico Association of Counties (NMAC) is leading an effort at the state level to support the actions of the NACO in its attempt to get a Federal House Resolu-

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Rhonda Burrows, Lincoln County's Indigent Health Care administrator, serves on

a state task force created to examine the costs of health care in jails and detention centers across the state. She said that reports indicate that health care costs are approaching 40 percent of the operating costs of many detention facilities.

The majority of health care costs for inmates at the Lincoln County Detention Center (L.C.D.C.) are paid through the county's indigent care fund, which is supported through the recently passed mill levy.

Prescription medication for detainees is paid for through the county's general fund.

Health care management problems are compounded by a shortage of mental health care providers in the area, and a limited number of health

care professionals who bill for services at the rates approved by Medicaid and Medicare, Burrows said. She suggested that, by contracting with a health care service that would provide care to detention center prisoners, the county might be able to better control costs.

"You can only squeeze a provider for so much," Burrows added, "and then they're going to say they're dealing with the most litigious population, the worst health risk population, and the most noncompliant population, so there's got to be some incentive for providers to continue to treat them," Burrows said.

Regarding mental health treatment and behavioral counseling, Burrows described a sort of revolving door tendency that results from an inability by released prisoners to get the counseling they need after returning to society.

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of their probation or parole that they have to get counseling," Burrows said. "They've been in jail so they haven't had a job. If we don't give them some assistance in getting that counseling, they're in violation and go right back into jail. It's a vicious cycle," Burrows said.

A recent study shows that there are more than 7,000 people being held in county detention facilities in New Mexico, and about 6,000 in state run facilities, Burrows said, and as the population in state facilities continues to drop, county detention populations are on the rise. "The impacts to the county budgets are significant," she said.

Another factor in rising care costs for detainees stems from what can often be lengthy periods of pretrial incarceration, which Lovelace said should provide incentives for District Attorneys to more rapidly bring the accused to trial.

The county commissioners adopted a resolution in support of the efforts of the NMAC and NACO to change the policies that cancel federal health care benefits for incarcerated suspects.

Commissioners Renew County Mgr's Contract

With the renewal of his contract having been approved by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners last week, county manager Tom Stewart will enter into his 11th year in that position.

Stewart is an at-will contracted employee, whose employment can be terminated at any time and without cause by a vote of the county commissioners. The contract, as presented to the county commissioners, called for an annual salary of \$90,000, three weeks of paid vacation and one week of personal time during the year, the same compensation he has received for the past year. Stewart does not qualify for automatic annual cost of living or merit increases to his pay, and cannot participate in the public employees' retirement program. All of the terms of the manager's contract, as presented, were the same as last year.

During discussion of the contract at last week's meeting of the county commissioners, county attorney Alan Morel mentioned that Otero County's new manager is getting a starting salary of \$92,000.

County commissioner Eileen Lovelace made a motion to approve the contract, but with Stewart's annual salary being increased to \$100,000. She also moved that Stewart be granted permission to carry over one week of vacation time from last year. The county commissioners approved the motion unanimously.

The commissioners also reappointed Stewart and county commissioner Don Williams to represent Lincoln County in the Southeast Regional Planning Organization (SERPO).

The county commissioners again postponed appointments to the Lincoln County Planning Commission. Those positions will be considered again in June.

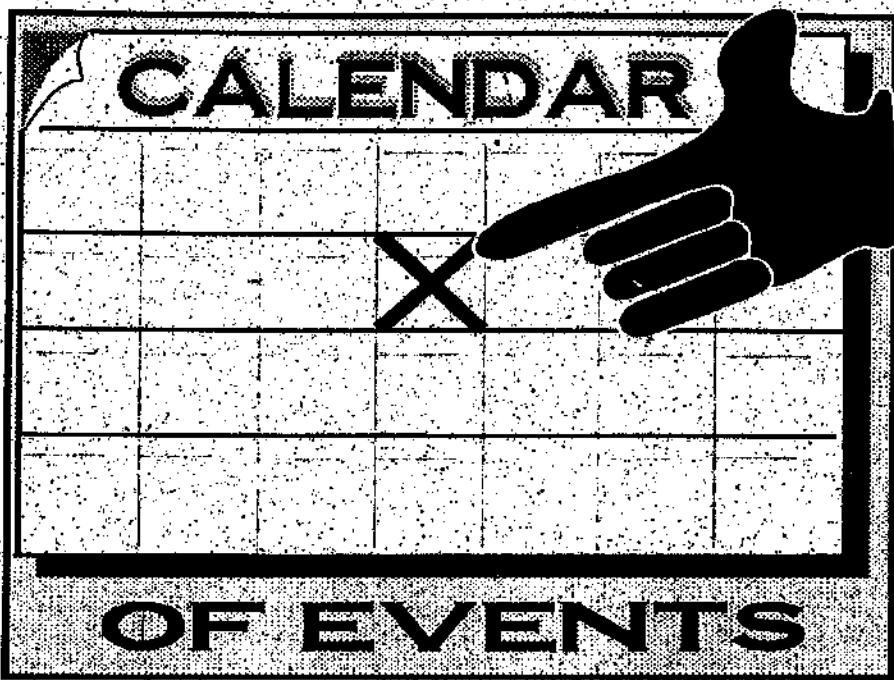

County Prepares to Lease Hondo Clinic

County attorney Alan Morel reported on May 20th that members of the Hondo Board of Education approved a proposed lease agreement with Lincoln County on May 19th. The agreement will allow the county to lease, for one dollar annually, the Hondo Community health clinic which is owned by the Hondo Valley School District and currently operated by La Casa Family Health Center.

Morel presented the lease for approval by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners during their regular meeting of May 20th.

The lease between the county and the school board is the first step toward making county mill levy funds available to support the continued operation of the health care clinic in Hondo. Upon establishment of the lease agreement, the county can then enter into a sublease agreement with La Casa for operation and management of the medical facility, Morel said.

The sublease will also require the approval of the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA).

"We'll have to go through the same fight and explain why the lease should be a one dollar lease rather than for value," Morel said of gaining approval from the DFA. "We're having to fund the clinic for it to be in operation, and there simply isn't enough money generated from providing services to operate the clinic," Morel said, "so it is going to be a subsidy forever, or as long as you have a clinic there."

Morel said that the lease agreement with the Hondo

said that he thought the system would be valuable enough to justify paying for it through the county's general fund.

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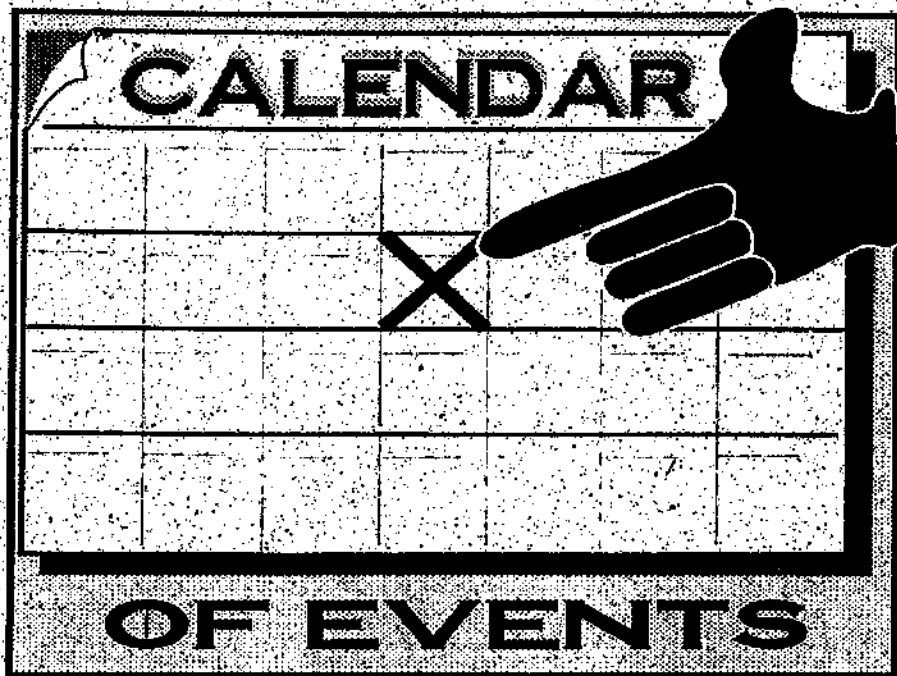

County Prepares to Lease Hondo Clinic

County attorney Alan Morel reported on May 20th that members of the Hondo Board of Education approved a proposed lease agreement with Lincoln County on May 19th. The agreement will allow the county to lease, for one dollar annually, the Hondo community health clinic which is owned by the Hondo Valley School District and currently operated by La Casa Family Health Center.

Morel presented the lease for approval by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners during their regular meeting of May 20th.

The lease between the county and the school board is the first step toward making county mill levy funds available to support the continued operation of the health care clinic in Hondo. Upon establishment of the lease agreement, the county can then enter into a sublease agreement with La Casa for operation and management of the medical facility, Morel said.

The sublease will also require the approval of the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA).

"We'll have to go through the same fight and explain why the lease should be a one dollar lease rather than for value," Morel said of gaining approval from the DFA. "We're having to fund the clinic for it to be in operation, and there simply isn't enough money generated from providing services to operate the clinic," Morel said, "so it is going to be a subsidy forever, or as long as you have a clinic there."

Morel said that the lease agreement with the Hondo

said that he thought the system would be valuable enough to justify paying for it through the county's general fund.

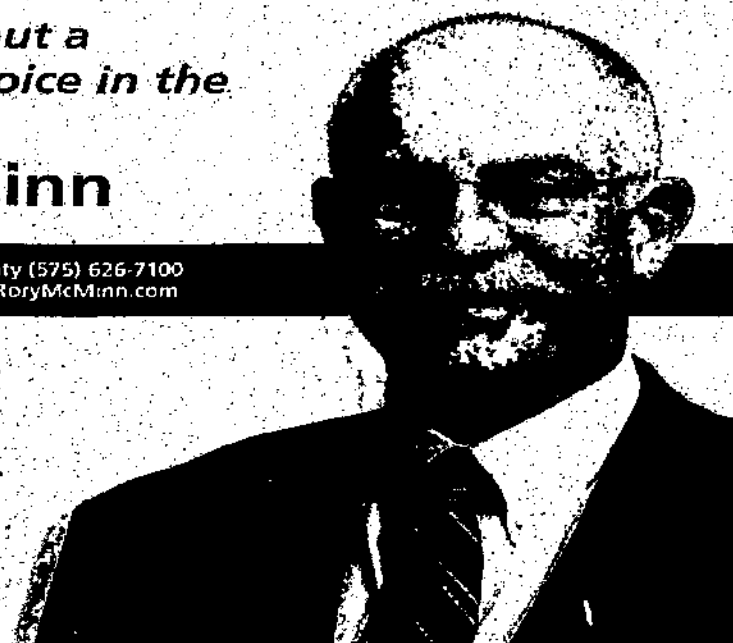

Albert Einstein is reported to have stated, "If you take my problem and work it my way you will get the same answer I get." That may or may not have happened and Einstein may or may not have said it, but the premise is that the answer to any problem can be changed if there are stipulations as to the process for obtaining an answer.

Guess what? That sounds much like the political phone surveys that have been interrupting quiet daily life for much too many people. According to what people are saying, about 38 percent hang up when they realize it is a political phone survey. Another 38 percent listen and may or may not answer the questions. The remaining 24 percent are threatening to disconnect their land phones.

If you haven't experienced a political phone survey, the idea is to get the answers they (the callers) want by phrasing questions differently. The first question is if the election were held today would you vote for candidate Y or candidate Z? And the next thing will be publicized reports of how candidate Z is leading in the polls" but neglecting to say which poll. The actual voting booth polls will not be open until next Tuesday, though in-person and early voting polls are open through Sunday. And even if you have voted in person or early absentee, the computerized machine will continue to dial your land phone number.

There must be a way to stop the nuisance calls. Maybe if we can survive until Wednesday, the day after the June 3 primary election, the political phone surveys will stop.

It will then be a few months before they start again. If the money being spent on political phone surveys was put to better use such as finding a cure for cancer, it would benefit many more people than these annoying surveys. However, it might keep the candidates unaware of what is happening until the final election votes are counted.

One thing to remember is that the questions asked by the computer may not be about height but could be about fatter or skinnier, or about color of eyes, or about shoe size. Can you imagine casting a vote according to what size shoe a candidate wears? Would that mean the person with the largest foot is a better kicker or booter?

Not all politicians depend on surveys, thank goodness. Please take time to research the issues and cast votes not in retaliation for interrupted meals but on actual facts.

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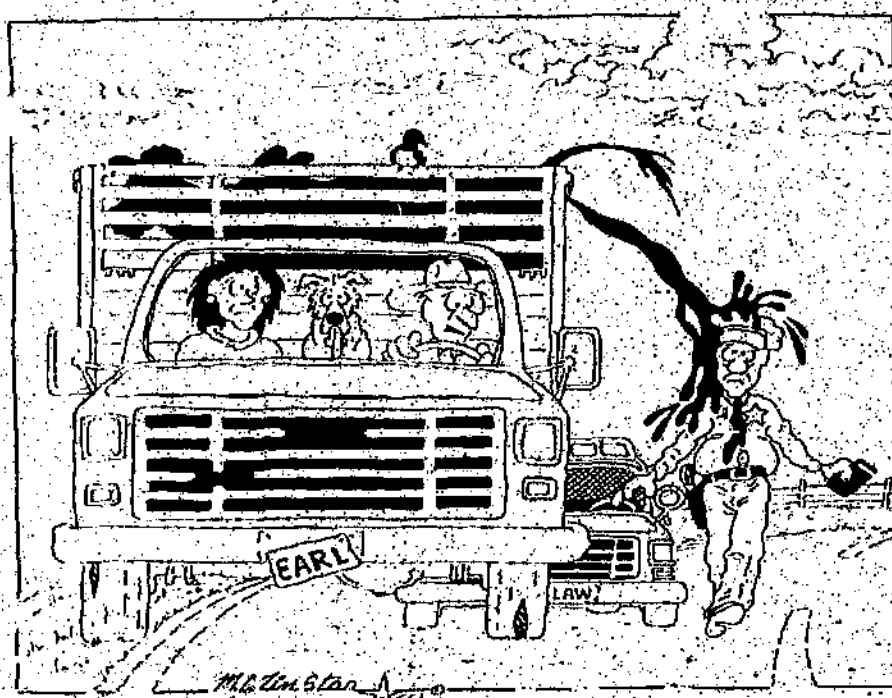

Transboundary Water Supplies Target of Institute's Research

Are the United States and Mexico running out of water along their international border? Scientifically, researchers don't know because little is known about the common underground basins both countries tap into. There is only speculation and theory on how large, how deep, what is the directional flow and what is the quality of the water.

Most importantly, researchers don't have specific measurements on how fast the supply of underground water is being used.

"One of the greatest problems with water along the border in southern New Mexico is that we don't know much about our aquifers," said Karl Wood, director of New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute (WRRRI) at New Mexico State University, in describing the results of a field meeting they hosted for U.S. Sen. Jeff Bingaman, D-N.M., in 2002.

Researchers will now begin to find answers to these crucial questions regarding underground water supplies with a recent appropriation of \$500,000 from the United States-Mexico Transboundary Aquifer Assessment Act created by Senate Bill 214, which became Public Law No. 109-448 on Dec. 22, 2006. Bingaman and U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., were the sponsors of the bill.

The Act authorizes \$30 million for fiscal years 2007 through 2016 to allow the Secretary of Interior and the U.S. Geological Survey to

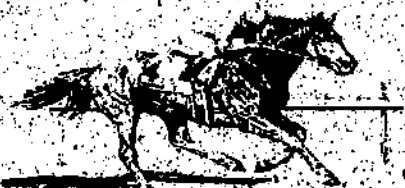
cooperate with the Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas Water Resources Research Institutes, state water resource agencies, and other relevant entities to conduct hydrogeologic characterization, mapping and modeling programs for priority transboundary aquifers. The Mesilla and Hueco Basins are the designated priority aquifers in southern New Mexico, west Texas and Mexico.

Even though the Act was passed in 2006 no funds were appropriated in fiscal year 2007 because of the continuing resolution. Some funds were appropriated for 2008 and this has allowed the program to begin some startup work in the Mesilla Basin aquifer. The funds are shared between the three states, USGS, water science centers and the three states' water resources research institutes.

In future years and with sufficient appropriations for the program the WRRIs can provide funds to state water agencies, Sandia National Laboratory and other agencies including counterparts in Mexico.

"We've got three tasks that we have initiated this first year: First, is to review some of the previous work and existing information and assess the data gaps. Second, we will review and update previous hydrogeologic work that has been done in the U.S. as well as explore its expansion into Mexico. And the third task will initiate a review of

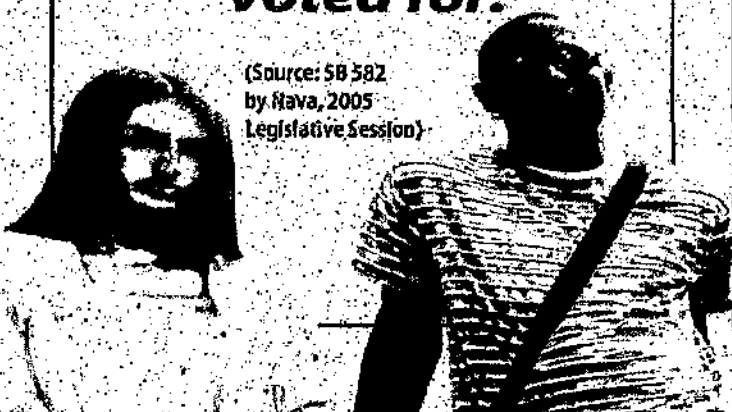

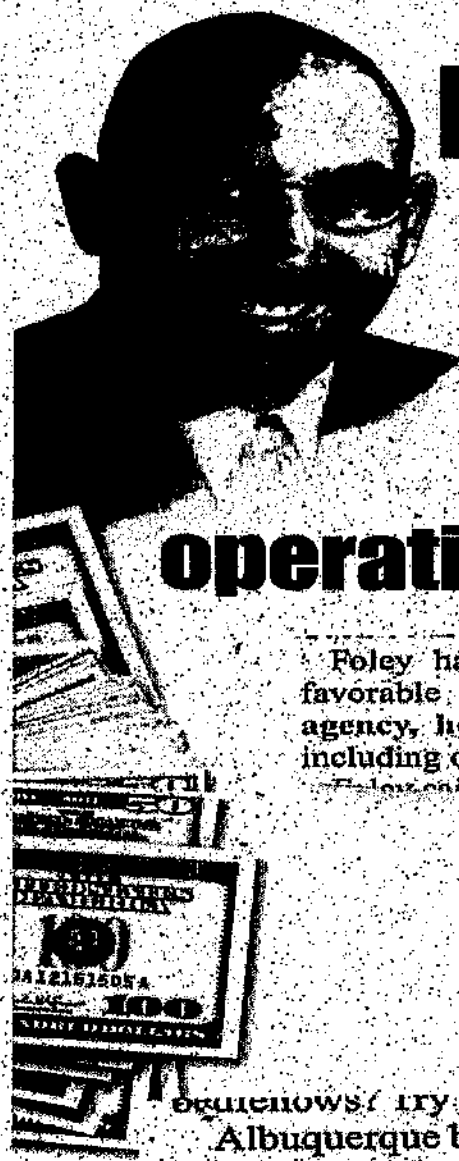

previous groundwater modeling programs. We want to assess which model would be the best model to use for the whole basin, which includes the Mexican part," said Bobby Creel, associate director at the New Mexico WRRI.
 Southern New Mexico, west Texas, Arizona and northern Mexico are considered one of the fastest growing areas in the U.S. and Mexico. The El Paso region alone is projected to get an influx of 65,000 people by the year 2013 due to the military's Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) figures.

"Water is a major factor in the economic development of these areas," Wood said. Groundwater is used for all of the drinking water in southern New Mexico, all of Juarez and half of the El Paso area. The use of groundwater for irrigation is also a factor due to the continuing drought

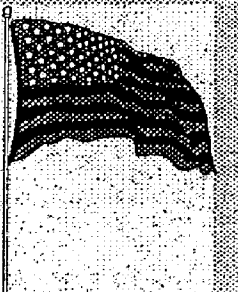
that has affected these areas, he said. When future allotments of the transboundary money are released, other underground water basins will be studied and more extensive analysis done on the priority aquifers, Wood said.
