County Rejects Construction Rids ounity iscierts onlight arthrit Dias

Two bids for the construction of a security fence at The Nest domestic violence in Ruidoso Downs were rejected by the Board of Lincoin County Commissioners during their regular meeting on September 15th. County manager Tom

Stewart reported that the bids, one from Tri-State Construction in Ruidoso Downs and the other from Cabo Construction of La Luz; both came in above the county's budgeted costs for the project. Stewart said that, after the addition of gross receipts taxes, the lowest bid would amount to \$190,444.

Stewart said that the county has two outstanding state capital outlay appropriations for The Nest that total \$171,993. "This is \$18,451 short of covering the bill," Stewart said. He added that The Nest's board of directors discussed making up the difference in cost but decided against it.

Stewart recommended that both of the bids be rejected because of cost and said that he would review the project to see what could be changed to bring the costs within the parameters of the allocated

funding.

tant that communities and organizations seeking Capital Outlay funding assistance attend one of the work-

The workshops will provide those seeking funding the opportunity to learn first nand how to properly apply for assistance and ask questions regarding their applications regarding their applica-tion and project funding needs. The proposed pro-jects must have a project of life of at least 10 years and cost no less than \$25,000. that title, the fence, it's actually a substantial wall," Stewart said. He said a portion of the project is a fence, but another portion that would provide protection for children and abused spouses from their abusers would have to be much more substantial.

"I think that that portion of the wall probably needs to remain the same, but perhaps we can look at other areas," Stewart said.

"They had in their request a kind of sally port entrance to this thing. I think if they take out that entrance, it might bring the bid into the required amount."

Stewart said he would meet with The Nest directors and the architect to reduce that item. "I think the substantialness of the wall is something that should remain that way. We don't need spousal abusers and children abusers coming up to that wall and being able to converse or harass the children and family on the other side," Stewart said. "It's a good design, but we need to look at bringing it into compliance with the bud-

Stewart told The News last week that he has met with representatives of The Nest and the architect who drew up the wall design, adjustments have been made and the project is again in the

bidding phase. Stewart said that he thought the design changes might very well bring the cost of the project to within the budgeted amount.

County Discusses Concerns About Water Transfers

During a recent discussion of new water right transfers in Lincoln County, county commissioner Jackie Powell expressed a concern that continued transfers of water rights from the Hondo Valley and the communities down-stream of Ruidoso will crip-ple the ability of those com-munities to grow in the fu-

The discussion, held during the county commissioners regular meeting of September 15th, was prompted by a notice from the Office of the State Engineer regarding the transfer of water fights from Hondo to The Hideout subdivisions near Angus.

"I just want to remind people over and over again that there are not just two communities in Lincoln County, Ruidoso and Ruidoso life. She l Downs," Powell said, still alive. "There's Glencoe, Hondo, She San Patricio, Picacho, and there are so few water rights left in the valley. For those

rights," she said.
Powell told her fellow commissioners that, while water for agricultural use is vital in the valley communi-ties, water will also be need-ed in the future to promote the development of those communities

"We all need to keep in mind that we are one large community made up of several smaller communities,"
Powell said. "This transfer of 100 acre feet, that's a lot of water for a small commu-

County Clerk's Records To Go Digital Soon

Finding and copying records stored by the office of the Lincoln County Clerk will eventually be easier for not only county employees but also for members of the public, thanks to a contract for services approved by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners during their regular meeting on September 15th.

The contract with Professional Document Systems, Inc., of Albuquerque, will provide for the digitization of records that are currently kept as microfiche images.

This is for transferring the documents that we have on microfiche into documents for the computer," Maddox explained. "It will make it simpler and easier for people who come in doing research to find their information on the computer. It's an easier search method for them and it prolongs the life of the doc-uments," she said. "This is another step in the process of digitizing all of the records in the clerk's office."

Once the microfiche records are transferred to the digital format, the next step will be to digitize all of the records kept as hard copy documents, Maddox said. The cost of scanning and digitizing the more than 530,000

microfiche image documents will be paid for through a fund established by the New Mexico Legislature a few years ago, she added.

Terms of the contract indicate a completion date for the conversion project of about December 15th, 2008.

Gas Cost Factor to be Adjusted for 2008-2009

According to information provided by town trustee and Carrizozo Works member Dennis Dunnum, since being accepted into the program last week, the town of Carrizozo will now be added to a list of New Mexico communities that is provided by the state to businesses inter-

ested in locating, or relocating, within the state.
"Whenever a business contacts the state looking to locate their state looking to locate look cate their business or industry in New Mexico, they will look at their list of certified communities to see which ones might have the re-sources that the company

Because Carrizozo Works is the official economic development organization for the town of Carrizozo, the organization will receive a grant for \$5,000 a year for the next two years to help cover the costs of promoting the town to businesses and industrial companies looking to establish a presence in New Mexico.

Dunnum reported plans to meet with the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce and its economic development committee to help that organization begin the process of qualifying Ruidoso as a certi-fied community next year. His philosophy is that fostering cooperation among all of the communities in Lincoln County will make everybody. better off in long run.

"The (certificate of de-posit) will just be with the county's tax ID number, but it takes both the county and Mr. Sager to sign off on it to get those funds out," Morel said. "So we can't take your money without you knowing," he told Sager.

"I already have an engage-

ment letter from bond counsel and the engineer that they're going to utilize for this project. We'll engage their services as soon as the (certificate of deposit) is in place," Morel said.

Sager told the county commissioners that the Deer Park Valley group received checks from an additional 20 residents who did not sign the petition requesting the special taxation district, but who want to support the project financially.

Morel agreed to keep the group updated on the pro-ject's progress and to allow them to be involved throughout the process of getting the road paved.

Paden's Drug Store Passes Into Hands of New Owners

Paden's drug store, built in 1908, was sold on July 1, 1938 to Elmer Eaker, "Red" as he is popularly called has been in the employ of Rolland's drug store, off and on since boyhood. He is also an employee of the Southern Pacific railway company.

Dr. Paden, former owner has decided to retire from active business life. He has been so closely identified with the business life of the town, it will be hard to realize he has sold.

Dr. Paden came to Lincoln county first in 1880, and located at White Oaks. He received his medical training in Louisville, KY., where he graduated in 1886.

He won high honors in his class also won the gold medal in surgery which was a great achievement in those days. He later devoted several years to post-graduate work in the Hudson street hospi-

tal in New York City.
In 1906 De. Paden moved from White Oaks to
Carrizozo and in 1908 had the present drug store built, which was at that time, with the exception of the Exchange Bank building, the finest business structure in town. He was appointed railroad surgeon for the old El Paso and Southwestern which position he held for twenty-two years. After the Southern Pacific bought the Southwestern out Dr. Paden was appointed surgeon for the S.P. and served for three years at which time he reached the age limit and he was presented upon his retirement

an annual pass by the company.

Dr. Paden will move to his home in White Oaks, where twenty of his successful years were spent. He owns all of the Paden addition to White Oaks, except one lot, on which the Paden drug store stood, but which he sold to Jack Cleghorn who enlarged the building and transformed it into a dance hall, one of the most popular pleasure

a dance hall, one of the most popolar pleasure resorts in this part of the country.


During the World War Dr. Paden added another story to hos drug store and had it all equipped for a hospital. For years Paden's hospital was the only one in Carrizozo. The fruits of his labor have not all been "juicy," for it was back in the days of horseback riding that he gained recognition. He trudged through Lincoln county on horseback, braving the most inclement weather conditions, but he "carried on" with determination. The path was not always "rosy", but during his medical career he has seen the times change from saddle pockets and horseback riding to the most saddle pockets and horseback riding to the most luxurious streamlined cars and airplanes.

Dr. Paden was born in Paden's Valley, West

Virginia. He was married to Miss Belle Williams of the same place in 1886. Mrs. Paden passed away in 1910. In 1928 he lost his younger son, Dr. Melvin Paden, whom he had educated for a medi-

true. Cosmologist Giordano
Bruno was burned at the
stake for his ideas about an
infinite universe and Galileo,
the father of modern astronomy, was forced by the church to recent his views and spend the last years of his life under house arrest.

Our world still has religious disagreement with scientific views but such harsh punishment no longer is in vogue. The Pluto debate is not about religion and to a large extent, it isn't much about Pluto either.

Two years ago in August, the International Astronomical Union decided that Pluto doesn't meet its new definition of a planet. Its leadership, being scientists making it look like a demotion rather than a reclassifi-

This got all sorts of juices flowing. The human tendency to stand up for the little guy who is getting pushed around surfaced worldwide. Since Pluto was the only planet discovered by an American, some scientists from this country charged that the decision was made by people who disagreed with our polities.

Also affecting America is NASA's New Horizons mission to Pluto, launched in 2006 and due to arrive at the planet in 2015. American scientists asked why a decision couldn't be postponed until we find out more about

And then there is Disney, which renamed Mickey Mouse's dog, Rover, shortly after Pluto was discovered in 1930. Everyone loves Pluto.

There also is division in the IAU, with planetary scientists threatening to form a new organization. The reclassification of Pluto gives them further reason because the definition of a planet adopted by the IAU is very imprecise.

And there are those who just don't like change. But science is about new discoveries, which involve changing -- after consider-able debate. And that is what we are having now, in public.

Two months ago, Johns Hopkins University hosted a planet definition conference, which included a debate between astronomer Neil deGrasse Tyson, of NOVA fame, and planetary scientist Mark Sykes. Tyson took the IAU side. There were many fireworks and no agreement.

Besides conferences held by universities and observatories, songs, poems and essays have been written about Pluto's demotion. T-shirts are offered online. A festival was held in Streator, Illinois, birthplace of Clyde Tombaugh, Pluto's discoverer, who spent the last 50 years of his life in Las Cruces, NM.

Streator has been the hub of much Pluto activity. Former Councilor Siobhan Elias, who organized the festival, also has persuaded her congressman to introduce a resolution in the U.S. House supporting reinstatement of Pluto's planetary status. New Mexicans wanting to honor Professor Tombaugh can contact their member of Congress urging support of the resolution.

The most popular song to come out of the Pluto controversy was written and performed by Elias' husband, Kevin. The CD is called "New Horizons: A Tribute to Clyde Tombaugh and the New Horizons Mission." The mission is carrying some of Tombaugh's ashes to Pluto.

Pluto supporters weren't blindsided by the planet's reclassification. The debate already had started in 1999 when the New Mexico. State University Astronomy Department began an effort to influence the IAU not to reclassify Pluto as one of the nearly 10,000 trans-Neptunian objects.

The IAU effort then was to make Pluto number 10,000 as an honor. The NMSU Astronomy Department said it preferred to remain planet number 9.

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



Introduction- El Capitan Precious Metals Inc., a Nevada based corporation, has submitted a Plan of Operation per 36 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 228 Subpart A. locatable minerals: and entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for the purpose of conducting environmental analysis with the U.S. Forest Service, Lincoln National Forest - Smokey Bear Ranger District. This Plan of Operation and subsequent MOU has been submitted for a proposed gold exploration drilling project on patented and un-patented lands near the Capitan Mountains, about five (5) miles north of Capitan, New Mexico in portions or all of Sections 9, 10, 11, 13, 14, 15, and 16, Township 8 South, Range 14 in Lincoln County.

Proposed action- El Capitan Precious Metals, Inc. seeks to drill approximately 112 holes, in 5 sequential phases (see attached map). Drill sites would be accessed utilizing existing U.S. Forest Service roads, new temporary roads, and 2 temporary roads constructed during previous exploration activities. All roads constructed during the exploration activities will be decummissioned and rehabilitated upon completion of the project. Road locations would be approved by U.S. Forests Service prior to construction. An effort would be made to access drill sites over land without constructing additional temporary access roads. Efforts would be made to avoid removal of or damage to trees and other vegetation. Some trees would be removed to access drill sites along ridges and slopes. The table below displays estimated surface impacts

P3.3 miles (12 feet)	19.8 acres

The average drill hole depth would be 400 feet with a maximum drill depth of 500 feet. Drill diameter would be 8 inches or smaller. The drilling rig has its own power source, consisting of a generator. Drilling would occur through out the year depending on weather conditions. If weather conditions are adverse, drilling would cease until favorable conditions return. The length of the project is estimated to be 3 years.

Drill pads would be 20 feet by 20 feet in diameter. The total acreage impacted for all of the sites is approximately 25 acres. However, 25 acres would not be disturbed at one time. Surface disturbance associated with drilling would be reclaimed each fall, following drilling operations. El Capitan Procious Metals, Inc. anticipates the rig would be at each location for several weeks, which would allow for the drilling activities. The area occupied during the drilling phase would be seeded with grasses per Forest Service specifications.

Water would be used to support drilling activities. Water would be supplied by the drilling contractor by water tender truck. Equipment would be fueled by a fuel truck on site.

Decision Framework- The District Ranger of the Smokey Bear Ranger District will decide at the conclusion of the environmental analysis process which mitigation measures are sufficient to limit, minimize, or eliminate environmental impacts. Your comments will be most beneficial if received by November 7, 2008; however, we will continue to accept comments up to the official notice and comment period anticipated to occur next summer. Issues, concerns, and/or opportunities that you have regarding this proposed action can be mailed to: Smokey Bear Ranger District, Attn: Public Comment for El Capitan Exploration Project, 901 Mechem Dr., Ruidoso, NM 88345 or can be emailed to el_capitan_exploration_project@fs,fed.us.

As the NEPA process moves forward, we will consider your comments as we develop issues that could lead to alternatives to the proposed action. The NEPA environmental analysis would include chapters that describe the: 1) project area; 2) purpose and need for the project; 3) proposed action; 4) alternatives ... the proposed action; and 5) analysis of the effects of the proposed action and the alternatives. The NEPA environmental analysis would lead to a decision on how to proceed with a mineral exploration project.

Presently we anticipate the development of an Environmental Assessment (EA) for the proposed exploratory drilling. Prior to initiating scoping, El Capitan Precious Medals Inc. and the Forest Service initiated public meetings/contacts to provide preliminary information about the proposal. In response to these meetings/contacts, we have received numerous letters encouraging the Forest Service to move ahead with the NEPA process for authorization of the proposal. Conversely, we have received numerous letters requesting that the Forest Service prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). In either case, please provide a thorough explanation if you have a preference for an EA or EIS.


