

Republicans Win In Lincoln County

Republicans were the big winners in Lincoln County Tuesday night when the general election votes were counted but the remainder of the nation voted predominately Democrat.

In the contested races in Lincoln County four Republicans were the true winners while other Republicans took Lincoln County and later lost to their opponents in contests that

encompassed a larger area.

Republican Lincoln County Sheriff Rick Virden won his race with 6,464 votes. His opponent, Independent Steve Sederwall received 2,342 votes.

The other three contested races were for State House of Representatives, District 57 with Republican Dennis Kintigh receiving 2,959 votes to Democrat Mary Frances Barron's 1,931. Kintigh was also the state winner. The State House of

Representatives, District 59 county results were Republican Nora Espinoza receiving 459 votes with Democrat Ellen E. Wedum receiving 186. Espinoza was the state winner. Both of the state house seats had few precincts in Lincoln County.

The race for district attorney results were 5,519 for Republican Diana A. Martwick and 3,485 for Democrat Linda S. Burson. Martwick was the winner. The district attorney race

includes Otéro County as well as Lincoln County.

Republicans won in other Lincoln County races but finally did lose.

Votes for the presidential candidates were quite high. Republican John McCain and Sarah Palin received 5,894 votes compared to Democrat Barack Obama and Joe Biden receiving 3,482. Other presidential candidates were Green Cynthia McKinney and Rose Clemente with 16 votes, Constitution Chuck

Baldwin and Darrell Castle with 39, Independent Ralph Nader and Matt Gonzalez with 67 and Libertarian Bob

Barr and Wayne A Root with 35.

These totals did not include about 141 absentee votes that were being hand tallied into the wee hours Wednesday. There were also 50 provisional votes. These 191 votes are to be included in

County Acquires Two Refurbished Ambulances

Both Lincoln County EMS units put into service last month

Lincoln County EMS acquired two refurbished ambulances in mid-October. Existing mill monies were used for the purchase. Both units are part of 11 in the fleet of emergency vehicles serving the 4,831 square mile Lincoln County area.

The units are commonly referred to as "remount" when an emergency vehicle chassis is replaced however the original box is retained and usually upgraded in the process.

"By refurbishing these two ambulances, Lincoln County taxpayers saved at least \$100,000," said Jim Stover, Lincoln County EMS director.

Professional Ambulance refurbished both vehicles. It was the same company who supplied the new state of the art ambulance for Lincoln County EMS in April 2008. Professional Ambulance is based out of Texas with two locations, Alvarado and Comanche, and is the exclusive dealer of American Emergency Vehicles and Horton Emergency Vehicles serving New Mexico, Texas, Arizona, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

"Each of the unit's lighting systems have been upgraded with LED lights which reduces the electrical load by as much as 50 percent as that has been a major issue for emergency vehicles," said Stover.

Stover added that each unit also has a spray-in liner on the floors and compartments. It's much easier to clean and is slip resistant for emergency personnel during any type of call as well as protect against any biohazard or infection control issues since it is completely sealed.

"These two units are workhorses. They will primarily

be used daily for emergency calls within the Capitan, Ruidoso Downs, Alto and Ruidoso areas," said Stover. "These were the first two units of four that will be refurbished. We'll begin the process for third one this month and the fourth one early 2009, probably in February," Stover added.

Stover said the next two units to be refurbished each have 210,000 miles. Each unit had more than 210,000 miles on them and one was originally purchased in 1997 while the other was originally purchased in 1999.

"Quality units were purchased 10 years ago knowing that we could refurbish them," said Stover. "We spent a little more money upfront and now we're reaping the reward."

getting two new ambulances and saving the taxpayers money in the process," he added.

"The vehicle has every piece of state of the art equipment possible that meets the needs of Lincoln County EMS," said Jim McGregor, owner of Professional Ambulance, the vendor who supplied this vehicle to Lincoln County EMS. "Working with Lincoln County EMS made this process go much easier," said McGregor. "They did much of the research themselves and had an idea of what would work best for their staff and service area. They were extremely involved in the process and I think the end result is something every one in Lincoln County can be proud of," he added.

All citizens have the right to inspect the records and documents created or maintained in the course of governmental business, with some exceptions. Documents dealing with confidential personnel matters, medical records and certain law enforcement documents that might include names of protected sources or methods of investigation are among these exceptions.

Reviewing public documents and records can often be accomplished without an associated cost other than one's personal time, but copying those documents can result in substantial fees.

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Escapee Back in Custody

Sheriff R.E. (Rick) Virden issued a statement this morning in response to numerous requests from the press regarding an escape from custody by an inmate at the Lincoln County Detention Center yesterday. This statement is as follows:

During the early evening of Sunday, November 2, 2008, corrections officers from the Lincoln County Detention Center (LCDC) discovered an inmate, Tyrone Riordan, 34, who is currently incarcerated at LCDC awaiting trial on an open count of murder and another of

tampering with evidence.

As a result of this injury, Riordan was taken to the infirmary where the facility nurse ordered that he be treated at Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC). Arrangements were made for institutional staff to transport Riordan to LCMC. However, upon arrival at the Emergency Room it was discovered that there would be a two to three hour wait for treatment due to overcrowding at the facility.

As a result of the delay in treatment, Riordan is currently being held in charges of


rections personnel to take Riordan to Ruidoso Downs Department of Public Safety where he could be secured in a jail cell. After the two hour wait, LCMC notified corrections that Riordan could now be treated at the Emergency room. Corrections Officers then moved Riordan from the cell at Ruidoso Downs DPS to a transport van. During this process, officers told investigators that they checked the handcuffs and shackles which had been placed on Riordan's wrists and ankles. These restraints were in place and properly secured.

At approximately 9:30 pm, Corrections Officers opened the door to the security compartment of the transport van and were immediately attacked and injured by Riordan whose hands were no longer in restraints. Riordan then escaped on foot, fleeing into a residential area near the hospital. Ruidoso Police Department was notified of the escape by corrections personnel at 9:52 pm and immediately assigned officers to the area. They then contacted neighboring agencies for assistance. A perimeter around the area was quickly established to contain the subject in the area.

the totals that will be canvassed by the Lincoln County Commissioners tomorrow, Friday, November 7 during a special meeting. All votes reported are unofficial until canvassed by the county commissioners.

Other Republican winners in Lincoln County were Steve Pearce for U.S. Senator, the seat being vacated by the retirement of

Pete Domenici. Pearce's county totals of 5,682 were higher than Tom Udall's 3,770, however Udall was the eventual winner of the U.S. Senate seat.

Republican Ed Tinsley's 5,256 votes put him ahead of Democrat Harry Teague's 4,064 votes in Lincoln County but Teague was the eventual winner of the US Representative District 2

seat.

The non-partisan judge retention votes were in favor of Supreme Court Justice Patricio M. Serna, Judge of the Court of Appeals Jonathan B. Sutin, District Judge Division 1 Jerry H. Ritter, District Judge Division 2 James Waylon Counts and District Judge Division 3 Karen L. Parsons. The for votes for each of the five judges ranged from 5,437 to 6,602 with the no votes being less than 2,000 for each of the judges.

Other candidates in uncontested races fared well.

Lincoln County Clerk Tammie Maddox reported few problems during the election. She did praise her staff for their work far into the night.

There was a delay when the early machine from the Ruidoso Senior Citizen precinct had a memory card failure. Another machine was brought in, certified as per state law, and the ballots had

to be re-fed into the machine.

The first returns in Lincoln County were reported shortly after the polls closed at 7 p.m. when the 4,117 votes cast in the early precinct were tallied. The majority of the votes in all except the absentee precinct were tallied by 8:15.

Then there was a long wait as the workers in the absentee precinct began their tallies. Each of the absentee votes were fed into the machine but 141 of the ballots were rejected for

various reasons such as not being filled in properly.

There are 13,783 registered voters in Lincoln County and more than 70 percent of those registered cast ballots either by early voting, absentee or in person Tuesday.

As of yesterday afternoon all the provisional and hand tallied votes had been entered in the Secretary of State's website. Those are the numbers that will be canvassed by the Lincoln County Commissioners tomorrow, Friday, Nov. 7

Along with Ruidoso Police personnel, officers from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, New Mexico State Police, and Ruidoso Downs DPS responded to assist. A command post was set up in the Beall's parking lot using the Lincoln County Office of Emergency Services Mobile Command post. Multi-agency search teams were assigned and began a grid search in the area for Riordan and shortly after 10:00 pm the shackles, handcuffs, and orange jump suit were discovered at the rear of the offices of Dr. Chris Robinson on Mesclero Trail. Found with the shackles was a home-made key to those handcuffs and shackles.

At approximately 11:55 pm, Riordan was discovered on the roof of a maintenance shed in an apartment complex on Nob Hill Drive. Ruidoso SWAT surrounded the building and Riordan surrendered without incident and was returned to custody at 12:01 am on November 3. He was treated for his initial injury at LCMC under the direct control of Ruidoso SWAT then transported to Ruidoso Police Department for processing. He was eventually taken back to LCDC for incarceration.

Expensive Telephone Area Codes

There are three area codes you should not ever call. These area codes are 809 and 284 and 876.

A recent email has been received with information about the danger in calling any of these area codes. The phone company agrees.

Apparently what happens is that you will receive a call telling you that a family member or friend is ill or has been in an accident or has died or that you have received a fabulous prize, etc. Whichever case it is, you will be told to call a number with one of the listed area codes.

If you call from the United States you will apparently be charged \$2,425.00 per minute. Or you might get a long recorded message because they will try to keep you on the phone as long as possible to increase the charges. When you get your phone bill you may be charged more than \$24,100.00.

According to phone company personnel, these area codes are located in the British Virgin Islands, which is the Bahamas, or in Jamaica or some other country.

The charges can become a nightmare if you did actually make the phone call.

Your phone company and/or your long distance carrier may tell you that they are only providing the billing for a foreign company. You will then have to deal with a foreign company that insists it has done nothing wrong.

Please tell everyone you know about this.

Friday, November 9, 1917

Our Soldier Boys Moved

The greater number of the soldier boys Lincoln county sent to Camp Funston, Kansas, have been transferred to camp Kearney, California, near San Diego. We understand that only eleven of the ninety four sent to Camp Funston from Lincoln county remain there. Among the number are ten first five, viz: E.C. Baker, Ralph M. Dow, Morgan Reilly, William Gallacher and E.T. Brown. We also understand that Jefferson Claunch, captain of the second quota to leave there remains at the original camp, with some of the other boys who went with him. These boys, most of them at least, are non-commissioned officers and have been assigned special duties.

Zieglers Burglarized

A front plate glass window at Ziegler Bros. store was smashed on Monday night, and goods to the value of about \$75.00 taken from the show window. The broken window will cost about \$75.00 to replace, but an insurance was carried on that which will partially reimburse the loss. The burglar left quite a good deal of his blood on the broken glass and frame, but that was the only trace found.

Emil Fritz

Funeral services for Emil Fritz were held in Roswell Wednesday and the body interred yesterday in the family burying ground at the Spring Ranch, nine miles below Lincoln, in the passing of this worthy citizen Lincoln county lost one of its oldest and best citizens. Coming to Lincoln county with his parents while a youth, Emil Fritz was a resident of the county for almost half a century.

He lived the greater part of this time on his ranch below Lincoln, selling his holdings there a few years ago and coming to this section of the county where he became interested with Henry Lutz in sheep raising. He was Sheriff and Ex-Officio Collector of this county during the years 1896-98, and was one of the most faithful and painstaking officials the county ever had. He married sixteen years ago to Mrs. Jas. J. Dolan who survives him. He is also survived by a sister, Mrs. H. D. Remken of Watrous, and a brother, Henry of Capitan, and a number of nieces and nephews.

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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- Columns on addressing America's energy needs have brought much response.

Among the additions to my list of what is needed for a comprehensive energy policy are an increased gas tax, natural gas as a vehicle fuel and more emphasis on American's need to sacrifice a little of their good life.

We'll start with a higher gas tax. What? Raise taxes on gas? We're trying to make it cheaper so we can again enjoy using as much of it as we want to continue our present lifestyle.

That's the point, say proponents of a higher gas tax. Gas will never be cheap again. We need to be jolted into changing our lifestyle so we don't depend on it so much.

Other nations have imposed a high tax on gas for years in order to encourage conservation. Most nations don't have big oil reserves so they always have been dependent on foreign oil and have guarded against using too much by imposing high taxes.

Higher gas taxes also help keep roads and bridges in good repair. The Minneapolis bridge collapse a few years ago made us aware of how much our nation's bridges have fallen into disrepair.

Other nations have had \$6 gas for years and now are going up to \$8, \$10 and even \$12 a gallon. How do they live with that? Well, they drive smaller cars, to begin with.

That would be difficult in the United States. Cars are a status symbol here. A person's house may look like everyone else's on the block, but with a big SUV or pick up in the driveway, people know that is someone to be reckoned with.

Car makers say the reason they have opposed higher fuel efficiency standards is because that would favor foreign automakers who make smaller cars because their customers aren't into big trucks.

Fuel efficiency standards are a big part of cutting gas use. In 1975, the nation's first fuel economy standards were passed by Congress requiring an increase from 13.8 miles per gallon to 27.5 mpg by 1989.

In 1990, legislation was introduced in Congress to further raise fuel economy to 40 mpg. Furious opposition came from Detroit, from all lawmakers in auto making states and from conservative Republicans. They were successful in blocking the legislation.

Detroit says don't blame the auto industry. Blame the American con-

sumer for wanting cars that are big and safe. Many in the auto industry suggest that raising taxes on gasoline is more effective than mileage standards because it is the easiest way to change buying habits.

Experience overseas has proven that although consumers don't like higher taxes on gasoline, they've adapted. A society can function and grow even with higher fuel prices. People get used to it.

After the 1990 failure of higher mileage standards, the first President Bush proposed a rather substantial gas tax increase, which was whittled back to 5 cents before it passed. And you know what happened to that President Bush when he ran for reelection in 1992.

Experience shows that increasing any taxes associated with people's cars is the most dangerous action in the political world. Gov. Bruce King proposed a modest state gas tax increase in the 1994 Legislature and lost

reelection to his fourth term as governor.

There were other reasons too, but the gas tax was what most of the hollering was about. A bill to repeal of that increase was one of Gov. Gary Johnson's first actions after taking over from Gov. King.

President Bill Clinton's only defeat came at the end of his first two-year term as governor of Arkansas. He had signed an increase in motor vehicle license fees. He never made that mistake again.

Supporters of higher federal gas taxes and increased fuel standards missed an excellent opportunity after the Sept. 11 attacks to take action in the name of moving toward energy independence to protect national security.
