Deer Park Valley Special Assessment Moves Forward

The creation of a Special Assessment District for street paying in the Deer Park Valley subdivision of Alto will be a long process, but Lincoln County Commissioners took another step in that direction during their regular meeting on Tuesday, February 17.

Dan Aguirre, vice-president of Wilson and Company Engineers and Architects of Albuquerque discussed with the county officials the recent completion of a feasibility study for the pro- Aguirre said that his posed Special Assessment firm performed a cost analy-

ing and drainage manage-ment in Deer Park Valley. "The key to a Special

Assessment District, and the reason why you have us do a feasibility study first, is because the benefit is the key to it being feasible," Aguirre said, "In order to be able to legally use a Special Assessment District, the construction improvements that are being proposed have to benefit the property in a greater amount than the cost of the improvements to the prop-

sis of the proposed paving and drainage improvements for the subdivision of about 240 lots, along with the legal costs, mapping and engineering costs and other "soft" costs associated with the establishment of a SAD.


"Currently, based on input from the real estate folks in the area, the benefit we're expecting on a per lot basis is about 16 to 18 thou-sand dollars in benefit by doing paying and drainage improvements," Aguirre said. "The assessment values, based on current estimates, are about \$15,500 per lot, so the District is feasible.

Goodby to Former Capitan Mayor Coker

Former Mayor of Capitan Benny Coker, 81, died peacefully of heart failure in Alto on January 19.

Coker had served as elected trustee for the Village of Capitan from 1978 through 1985 and then was elected mayor of Capitan in 1986. He served as mayor through 1989, a total of 21 continuous years serving the Village of Capitan. He was elected again as village trustee in 1998, serving until 2001, a total of 25 years serving Capitan residents.

Coker was also appointed to the New Mexico. Rural Water Association and served on that board for severed one of the most knowledgeable water people in the

Coker had spent much of his life in Capitan having owned and operated the Rusty Anchor Bar, which became a gathering place for many coffee drinkers.

He was born in Carter, OK on October 4, 1927 to Jess and Sarah Coker. He grew up in Tishomingo, OK where he graduated high school as a celebrated athlete. He served in the Korean War from 1950 until 1952. After returning home from the service, he joined Shell Oil Company in Hobbs and worked for the company in various locations for about 15 years. In the early 70's he moved to Capitan where he opened his first bar. He con-

tinued to call Capitan home until 2005. He then moved to Alto and worked part-time in Ruidoso.

Benny Coker is survived by his sister Lillie Hoedebeck of San Diego, CA: his brother Hulen Coker of El Cajon, CA: his room-mate and closest friend of 22 years, Craig Eikleberry of Alto and many nephews, nieces, cousins, and in-laws.

Benny was cremated and a memorial service will be scheduled for late winter. to early spring.

Commissioners Divided on Code Enforcement

Lincoln County currently has 68 ordinances spelling out the legal requirements for a range of things from dumping trash to putting up a sign, and county attorney Alan Morel says that he believes that it's time to bits someone to enforce hire someone to enforce those ordinances.

In a February 11th memorandum to the board of county commissioners, and again at the February 17th meeting of the board, Morel said that the need for a code enforcement officer will greatly increase if the county commissioners adopt the proposed Wildland-Urban Interface Ordinance now being

"I felt it was necessary at this time to discuss the various options the County of Lincoln has with respect Tuesday.

The attorney provided a list of the top 12 ordinances that he said generate the bulk of the county's enforcement issues. Those are: the Refuse, Solid Waste and Litter Ordinance, the Alarm Ordinance, the Rutal Addressing Ordinance, the Solid Waste Ordinance, the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance, the Billboard Or-dinance, the Animal Control Ordinance, the Roadcut Ordinance, the Right-of-Way Ordinance, the Wireless Telecommunications Ordinance, the Fire Ordinance and the Subdivision Ordinance.

"We have a Code Administrator but she's not a code enforcer," Morel said.
"If there is a violation that

to enforcement of its various we can't remedy, we're forc-ordinances," Morel said on ed to utilize the sheriff's department to file a complaint or a non-traffic citation into either Magistrate Court or District Court," he explained. "Normally you have code enforcement when you have zoning; we don't have zoning so we've never actually addressed that issue."

Morel told the county commissioners that a code enforcement officer would not have the power to arrest anyone, but could issue citations and prosecute those citations in court.

"Most times there's not an attorney involved and rarely is there a jury trial involved," Morel said, but added that there was a signif-icant increase in the number last year. He said that nine times out of 10, however, the

problem is solved by the person found to be in violation coming into compliance with the law.

One alternative to the hiring of a code enforcement officer is to hire more officers to man the sheriff's department, Morel said.
"They are the chief

law enforcement officers of the county," he said. "They're obligated by statute to enforce county ordinances, but I question whether that's the best use of resources. A code enforcement officer would probably be a better use of the county's re-sources," he said. "There's not as much training and those types of issues in-

Morel said that there of cases that went to court are probably several hundred people in the county who could be cited

non-compliance with the rural addressing ordinance.
"It would literally

take several people months to actually go through it and files these and follow up on it," the attorney said of the cases of non-compliance with the rural addressing ordinance. He also said the proposed Wildland-Urban Interface Ordinance would be "a monster" as far as enforcement goes, and would necessitate a change in the county's enforcement meth-

Morel referred to Dona Ana County, which has 18 code enforcement officers, and said that in that county those officers work from positions in the sheriff's department.

would likely take 60 days to create an ordinance that spells out the duties and authorities of a code enforcement officer and get someone hired and trained to do the job. He suggested that one person could possibly serve as code administrator and code enforcement officer.

County commis-sioner Jackie Powell was very clear in her opposition to the hiring of a code en-forcement officer. "I was born 100 years too late," Powell said. "I hate

this.

County commis-sioner Eileen Sedillo said that the idea of code enforce-ment represented just another layer of government telling people what they have to do. County commis-sioner Dave Parks responded

by saying that people know they're not supposed to rob banks, but there is still a need for laws that say you can't.

"We have given the people so much government that they don't take care of themselves anymore because "the government's" going to do it for me," Sedillo argued. Parks made a motion

to have the sheriff, the county attorney, the county man-ager, the code administrator and the Planning Commis-sion "take a look at the hiring of a code enforcement officer and provide recommendations to the board of county commissioners in March.

County commis-sioner Don Williams seconded the motion. County commissioners Tom Battin, Parks and Williams voted in favor of the motion. Powell and Sedillo voted in opposition to the motion.

March 4, 1932

Homespun Sense

Pithy Quotations from Public Addresses of MELVIN A. TRAYLOR President, First National Bank, Chicago

"It is time some leadership and some party called our attention to the fact there is no magic cure for the ills and the evils of human folly. We trod the primrose path of extravagance, of thoughtless and of almost criminal neglect of every sound principle of human conduct, from the individual to the government, and the indi-vidual was aided, encouraged, and abetted on that path by the government and those responsible for its administration."

"One of the biggest things was a watered state of mind in which we all thought we were richer than we were, and were living beyond our means."

In my opinion, no great division of human society has ever been lied to, and lied about, as much in the same period of time as has the American farmer."

"This then is my hope for our future -- that we may be rich without forgetting to be righteous; that we may be powerful without being offensively proud; that we may be nationally minded without being narrow-minded; and, finally, that we may live in a world of fact without surrendering our faith."

"Something that a lot of people aren't aware of," Dean said, "this is paid for by Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU), As a result of that, it's not high school anymore. When a person does graduate, they don't get a GI-D certificate. they get a high school diploma," he explained. "It's kind of like a second chance. If you didn't get it done the first time, we can get it done the second time.

Dean said that the Distance Learning pilot program through I NMU allows students to do most of the required school work to be done at home.

"They don't have to spend a lot of time attending class, which is not always at a convenient time," Dean said. "We have all of the materials, computers, books, whatever, so that they can do the majority of this work at home. I think that's really a big deal," he

tion Development (GED) program, often referred to as the alternative high school diploma program, is available through thousands of sources throughout the United States, including the Carrizozo public schools.


Carrizozo resident Ray Dean has been active in the Carrizozo GED program for three years, during which time 14 students have graduated.

"We have some openings," Dean said on Tuesday. "You can start anytime and finish-up any time," he said.



County Appoints Committee Members

During their regular meeting of January 20th, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners discussed the appointment of one person to serve on the Regional Waste Water Joint Use Board and another to serve with the Ruidoso Valley Economic Development Corporation.

County commis-sioner Dave Parks, who has been representing the county on the Regional Waste Water Joint Use Board said that he would step aside if someone else really wanted to serve on that board, but there were no volunteers. Parks was appointed to fill the spot again by a unanimous vote of the county commissioners.

County commis-sioner Tom Battin explained

that the Ruidoso Economic Development Corporation was a fairly newly organized group that began in the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce. He said that Carrizo-zo Trustee Dennis Dunnum had been serving as the county's representative, but has declined the re-appointment because of other commit-

County commis-sioner Don Williams also declined the appointment, saying that he was reluctant to serve with individuals who have been very critical of some of the actions he has supported as a councilman for the village of Ruidoso.

Battin agreed to at-tend meetings of the corporation until another worthy representative can be recruited.

In response to a question from county commis-sioner Tom Battin, Aguirre said that the cost to property owners might be reduced by narrowing some of the roads where little on street parking is needed or by reducing the size of some cul-de-sacs. That deviance from county requirements for a 24 foot wide public road would require that a variance be granted by the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners. Drainage along the proposed paved roads would be directed by six inch barrier curbs and bar ditches, Aguirre said. Cost estimates were based on meeting the minimum county standards plus 10 percent.

Several residents of Deer Park Valley attended Tuesday's meeting, and one resident wanted to know if his assessment cost would be less because he lives on a portion of road that has been previously paved.
"In the current esti-

mates, we've evenly split the total by the number of lots," Aguirre said. "When we get to the actual assessment process, we can do it in several ways, but doing it on a per lot basis tends to fit this neighborhood pretty well. We could do front linear footage or acres but, to make it as equitable as possible. I think that it's probably going to be on a per lot basis," he said. He added that someone owning a small lot would probably be assessed the same as someone owning a few acres.

"When you do just a paving a drainage district, the benefits come out fairly equal on a per lot," Aguirre said. "If we were putting in all the different utilities, the benefits change and play a little more to the size of the lots, but just doing pavement and drainage the benefit is to the neighborhood and not just individual lots," he said.

One Deer Park Vallev resident argued that some of the lots there are not suitable for building, and will

memberships, and the owners of non-buildable lots would not benefit from paying improvements.

"Whether it's buildable or not, those are platted lots and people are buying and selling them," Aguirre said, "therefore there's a benefit to that lot in its purchase. I'm not determining if it's buildable or not, but as we get farther into the process, we can look at that," he said.

Another Deer Park Valley resident suggested that the lot size might be an appropriate means by which to determine assessment amounts.

Morel said that Tuesday's business was basically just to see if the county and the subdivision property owners want to go forward with setting up the SAD. "For today, all we're

determining is whether we want to move forward." Morel said. "I think some people

thought this was going to come in around \$5,000 to \$6,000 a tract. Now we're at \$15,000 so it's clearly double what some people thought it was going to cost to do this," he said.

Morel said that there will be a number of public hearings along the road to establishing the SAD, and that property owners will make the final decision about whether or not to go forward with the proposal. The majority of Deer Park Valley property owners speaking at the meeting were in favor of going ahead with the SAD.

County commis-sioner Don Williams made a motion to move on to the next step in creating the SAD and commissioner Dave Parks seconded. The motion passed unanimously.





gress has corporate jets? Congress' corporation is the government. And the Air Force flies planes for the government. And it's not just in battle. The Air Force also flies members of Congress on most of their junkets. And Air Force planes are more expensive than corporate

During the long holiday Congress took to observe. Presidents Day, many members of Congress took off for all parts of the world. These weren't pleasure trips, mind you. They were fact finding missions. One plane load spent Valentines Day in Paris, with spouses, finding

The National Visitor Use Monitoring program collects information on National ·Forests and Grasslands about visitor satisfaction and use.

Why are we conducting these interviews? For years, Congress has looked intently at the reliability of existing recreation use estimates for national forest visits. Dépendable, accurate estimates of recreation use are increasingly critical dur-ing forest-level decision-making and planning processes. The surveys are necessary in assessing recreation benefits from forests and for quantifying affects on forest resources and local economies.

On randomly sedected days, recreation sites (A siderouss trails; roads. campgrounds, trails, ranger station locations, etc.,) one or two forest employees will obtain a 24-hour traffic count of use at the site and conduct six hours of on-site interviews of recreation visitors el one mile south on Highas they LEAVE the site.

Mexican Wolf Population 2008 Survey is Complete

A total of 52 Mexican wolves were counted in the wild in Arizona and New Mexico at the end of 2008, according to the annual survey conducted by the Interagency Field Team for wolf reintroduction. There were also 52 Mexican wolves recorded in the 2007 survey. Surveys are conducted in January of each year. Pups born in the summer must survive to December 31 to be counted as part of the Mexican wolf population.

Fixed-wing aircraft functional radio-telemetry were used to confirm five wolf packs on New Mexico's Gila National Forest, five packs on the Apache-Sitgreaves National Forest and Fort Apache Indian Reservation in Arizona, and six lone wolves, two in Arizona and four in New

The survey indicated that there were only two pairs that met the federal definition of breeding pairs: at

Of the 52 wolves, 45 were born in the wild. One captive born female wolf (F836) was released to the wild in 2008. In 2008, one wolf was temporarily cap-tured twice after dispersing outside of the Blue Range Wolf Recovery Area, but the animal was translocated back into the recovery area on both occasions.

In previous years, wolves were removed because of livestock depredation, for dispersing outside of the Blue Range Wolf Recovery Area or repeated nui-sance behavior. No such wolves were removed in 2008. Illegal shooting was the leading cause of docu-mented loss of wolves in

"Our interagency partnership has made strides toward obtaining the biological information needed to manage wolves in a working landscape that also supports traditional livestock opera-

tions and public recreation," said Benjamin N. Tuggle, PhD, Regional Director for the Service's Southwest Region, "Except for the illegal" shooting or suspicious de-mise of seven wolves, 2008 would have seen Mexican. wolf populations on the upswing again. These mortalities are an intolerable impediment to wolf recovery. We will continue to aggressively investigate each illegal wolf killing to help ensure that anyone responsible is prose-cuted to the fullest extent of

seven of the 10 packs produced at least 18 pups, with 11 surviving until the end of the year. However, based on the definition in the final rule establishing the reintroduction project, the count only recognizes two breeding pairs because by year's end, one or more of the mates in two packs had died. In addition, three packs. had only a single offspring survive until December 31

(survival of two or more pups until December 31 in the year of their birth is required to qualify as a breeding pair). In two of these packs, one pup died under suspicious circumstances late in 2008, resulting in both packs not qualifying as a breeding pair.
"We were fortunate

this year, we did not remove any wolves from the population for management pur-poses under the AMOC Standard Operating Procedures," said Tuggle. "In 2008, we received substantial public input on the wolf reintroduc-tion effort as part of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) process. Completing the draft EIS, and implementing a wolf-livestock interdiction program, are priorities for us.'

The Mexican Wolf-Reintroduction Project is a cooperative effort administered by six co-lead agencies: Arizona Game and Fish Department, New Mexico De-partment of Game and Fish, White Mountain Apache Tribe, USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Wildlife Services, USDA Forest Service and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. These agencies function as an Adaptive Management Oversight Committee. This management approach provides apportunities for participation by local governments, nongovernmental organizations, and individuals from all segments of the pub-

The mission of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is working with others. to conserve, protect and en-hance fish, wildlife, plants and their habitats for the continuing benefit of the Ameri-can people. 
