

Debate on Fire Protection Ordinance Heating Up

Understanding the dangers of wildfire in Lincoln County is one thing, finding a way to resolve the problem is something else altogether.

The Lincoln County Land and Natural Resources Advisory Committee (LANRAC) and the Lincoln County Planning Commission, as well as the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners, the county's emergency management personnel and at least one local expert

in forestry management are discussing the development of a new county ordinance that would mandate, to property owners in certain parts of the county, treatment of land to reduce fire hazards and create defensible space around homes and other structures.

Opinions vary among officials as to how far the ordinance should reach with its regulatory power, but there has been no disputing the need to reduce the fire fuel loads in most of the county's forested areas.

During a discussion of the proposed Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI) ordinance at Tuesday's meeting of the county commissioners, county attorney Alan Morel summarized some of the ideas brought forth by the LANRAC members in their meeting earlier this month.

"Defensible space around structures versus requiring defensible space on all land, irrespective of whether there is a structure or not, is huge issue," Morel said. "The LANRAC was supportive of the ordinance,

so long as it was in a limited area and with the caveat that no one else in the county, who wasn't within that area, had to pay for that ordinance," he said. "That was a big issue with them. They didn't want people in Corona having to pay for the administration or the cost associ-

ated with this ordinance. I think that if there's a catastrophic fire it's going to affect the entire county," he added.

Morel acknowledged that the billing aspect of the ordinance, especially as it relates to the removal and disposal of the slash, tree branches

and other vegetative debris resulting from the mandated tree-thinning, was problematic.

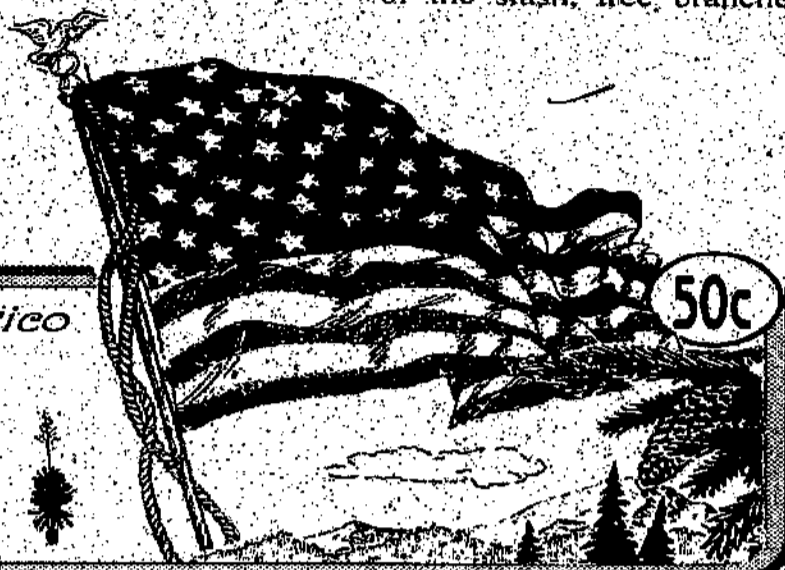
"Are we going to bill everybody in the county for having to pay for these services, are they going to be paid by the people that actually receive the (disposal) services?" he asked. "Lincoln County doesn't have any mechanism in place to bill property owners for this type of program. Lincoln County Solid Waste (Authority LCSWA) bills for the solid waste collection that takes place in the county. Maybe they can narrow it down to just those areas that the ordinance is effective in," Morel said.

How to enforce the ordinance, how to bill for disposal of the slash and what best to do with the slash beyond removal from the treated property are all issues that might take some time to work out. Members of the LANRAC have suggested that private enterprise as well as property owners might benefit if small companies were permitted to collect the slash for recycling into products like mulch, compost, and pellets for stoves.

LANRAC member Tony Davis suggested that a new forest based economy could sprout up in Lincoln County. "There is value in forest products," Davis said.

Morel pointed out that, if the publicly owned Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) was utilized for billing, opening the slash disposal services up to private companies could present another set of problems.

"It's an interesting issue

Corona to Acquire Arena

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners gave their approval on Tuesday for the an arena currently located at the Hondo Senior Citizens Center to be donated to the Village of Corona.

In a letter to the county commissioners dated March 2, Corona Mayor William Hight said that he was approached several months ago regarding the possibility of moving the rodeo arena to Corona.

Because the Corona village government would have to assume the responsibility for the removal and transport of the arena, Hight said it has taken the past few months to get organized and round up the needed equipment and labor to manage moving the arena.

"We are ready to commit and move forward with the removal and transport of the arena to Corona," Hight wrote. He told the county officials that the arena would greatly improve the existing arena facility at Corona, which he said was showing its age and in need of repairs.

"The improvements would certainly increase the opportunity for the Village of Corona to sponsor additional rodeo events," Hight wrote. He reported that the village plans to have the arena set up in time for the Corona Days Festival in July.

The donation of the Hondo arena, valued at less than \$5,000 worth of scrap, must be approved by the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), but county manager Tom Stewart said during Tuesday's meeting of the county commissioners that he anticipated no problems in getting state approval.

"We're trying to make it a nice place for our people to live in," Hight said. "We've some improvements and we have a lot more to go, but we're well on the way. We're in the process of (building) a waste water system that is under construction as we speak, and we're obviously seeking additional funding," he said.

The Board of Lincoln County Commissioners unanimously approved the donation of the arena.

County Monitoring Fire Danger Daily

County manager Tom Stewart is monitoring the fire danger in the county daily, he told the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners on Tuesday.

Stewart said that the fire danger in the Lincoln National Forest was listed as high on March 9th, while the National Interagency Fire Center, in Boise, Idaho, listed the fire danger for the Lincoln County area as low to moderate on the same day because of the day's precipitation. The Fire Center has since upgraded the county's fire danger level to moderate to high.

The manager had placed the consideration of a fire restriction resolution on the March 17th agenda for the meeting of the county commissioners but, citing the precipitation of February 10th, March 9th and March 13th and forecasts of a possibility of more precipitation in the next few days, Stewart's recommendation was to hold off on the restrictions for now.

"The county Emergency Services Director and I make a determination almost daily on whether we ought to be issuing fire restrictions," he said. "At this point, in light of the fact that we've received the three days of moisture that I've indicated and the fact that there's a front moving in that looks

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C'zozo Gets Clean '07, '08 Audit Report

Reporting to the Carrizozo Trustees at the March 10 regular town council meeting, mayor Bob Hemphill announced that the audit of the town 2007-2008 finances was completed without findings.

In addition to the clean audit for the year ending June 30th, 2008, the auditing firm of D'Aun Wiloughby, CPA, PC found that the findings of recent previous audits have also all been resolved. Previous findings for the audits of 2005, 2006 and 2007 included a personnel policy violation, patrol procedures violations, excess expenditures, a violation of the Open Meetings Act, inadequate control over cash disbursements; a required bond reserves violation and a late submission of an audit report.

One finding of a previous year and faced by other municipalities and counties throughout New Mexico was due to local governments having their financial statements prepared by outside accounting firms.

Hemphill said that no finding was issued to Carrizozo for hiring a firm to prepare the statements because the state is waiving that finding for municipalities.

"We don't have the expertise and we don't have the staff," Hemphill said. "The state auditor is waiving municipalities under a certain size."

County manager Tom Stewart has protested the county's audit finding for having financial statements prepared by a private firm.

and I don't have a good answer," Morel admitted. He said that the ordinance could simply mandate the thinning and leave the negotiations with and selection of a disposal service provider to the property owners.

Davis told the county commissioners that the LANRAC would like them to specify the values which they hoped to promote through the adoption of the WUI ordinance. "This would be educational and clarify some

of the issues that we deal with," Davis said. "To encourage a public awareness of this, an understanding of why we're going this way, you come up with good reasons for this ordinance, we thought that that would be useful," he said. "The purpose would be for clarity and for public education."

County commission chair Tom Battin said that he wanted to ensure that the proposed WUI ordinance did not inappropriately interfere

with private property rights, and that he was especially concerned about the cost to owners of large parcels of property if extensive tree-thinning was required. He questioned whether or not the cost would justify the results.

"I think this particular ordinance requires a lot of public input," Battin said.

County commissioner Jackie Powell said the area defined in the county's Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP) includes areas that don't have a lot of timbered land, and said that property owners in those areas should not be included in the ordinance.

"I think we can concentrate on Sun Valley and Deer Park and some areas that are in immediate danger with homes," Powell said. "I think we can do some projects or send out information directly to those areas where they can get in touch with a state forester and work with the local fire department. The government isn't going to solve the fire problem," she said.

Powell reminded her fellow commissioners that it wasn't long ago when property owners in some areas of the county were not allowed to cut trees.

"None of that came about until 26 homes burned in 20 minutes," Powell said of recent fire protection efforts in and around the Village of Ruidoso. "Now that we can cut trees, people are cutting trees on their own," she said.

County commissioner Dave Parks suggested that the WUI ordinance might best concentrate on the areas

around Ruidoso, between Capitan and Ruidoso, Nogal Canyon and other areas where forest lands abut urban developments.

County commissioner Don Williams recommended that the WUI ordinance define specific areas to be treated, and Morel agreed, saying that the ordinance should prioritize the most critical parts of the county, those currently at greatest threat for catastrophic fire.

"We have to address the ordinance based on the actual fuels that are there, the height of trees, the kinds of trees," Morel said. "Maybe we start with the ETZ (Extra-territorial Zone around Ruidoso) area," he said. "I think we can come up with some good priorities."

Former county commissioner and long-time resident of San Patricio Ken Nosker commented that the county has no authority over the state and federal lands, much of which are heavily forested and often surround or border on private property.

"The property owner has to do all of the work on a property that is surrounded by forest land," Nosker said. "The forest service doesn't have to help unless they agree to it."

Under consideration is whether or not the ordinance should mandate just a defensible space around structures, or include thinning of the perimeter of each affected property. It has been suggested that thinning a boundary of 120 or more feet around individual property lines would create a fire break of 240 or more feet that could prevent fire from spreading from one property to another.

Oscuro freeholder Jerry Carroll said that firefighters consider an acceptable fire break to be one and a half times the height of the trees in the area. He suggested that property owners should be given the option to base the size of the thinned area on that formula.

The county's planning commission and LANRAC will further discuss the proposed WUI ordinance during their April meetings and possibly hold an additional joint meeting before preparing final recommendations for the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners. The county commissioners will hold at least one public hearing on the ordinance before it can be adopted.

Ranch Life in Lincoln County Was Struggle

Father died of tuberculosis in October of 1907. No preacher for a funeral. No money for a grave stone. But after a few weeks we found that A.B. Fall family had placed a beautiful marble stone at the grave. Forty years later the body and stone were removed to Alamogordo when Mother died.

After Father's death and my move to Alamogordo as County Superintendent of Schools, our youngest brother, Eugene, became seriously ill with an abdominal obstruction. The nearest medical help was west of the mountains near Oscura; a homesteader doctor, Dr. Ranneger. Mother and sister Mary were alone with Eugene. Mary was not used to riding horseback but she saddled Roan, our cow pony, climbed through canyons unknown to her, 1,000 feet higher than our house, and reached Oscura at dark.

She and the doctor both returned at once on horses, but it was so dark that they lost the trail and Mary had to give Old Roan the rein so that he could lead them back home. Dr. Ranneger wanted to operate at once, but mother was afraid of the risk. He showed her how to massage the impacted area and went home. Mother "doctored" Eugene and the danger passed. She thus saved the life of the doctor who later practiced at Alamogordo for 35 years as an outstanding diagnostician.

Mother had the ability to decide firmly in an emergency. But she had another side. We remember her as happy amid adversity, singing "Pretty Redwing" as she pounded into fine bits all the bones we could find, to make lime for her white-leghorn hens, to increase egg production.

During father's last months of life I was running for the position of County Superintendent of School in Otero County. I lived six months in Lincoln County and six in Otero County to prove up on 160 acres of a homestead right. After I took office in January of 1909, mother and the three younger children moved into a pinon-pole, mud-roofed two-room shack north of the irrigated area, where she had taken a homestead right for her self. It was at the edge of an arroyo where just enough spring water ran to fill one barrel a day.

With me gone, brother Denton away, and sister Mary anxious to be married in Alamogordo to John Hutchings, ex-chauffeur for General John Pershing, mother sold everything to A.B. Fall and joined me in Alamogordo, thus ending six years of an unforgettable ups and downs life in Lincoln County.

KENNETH DEAN SCHEAR

Funeral services for Kenneth Dean Schear, 68, of Roswell, will be Saturday, March 21 at 11:00 a.m. at LaGrone Funeral Chapel in Roswell with Mike Joy officiating. Following his wishes, Ken's remains were cremated and his ashes will be scattered by his family at a later date on the Arroyo Seco Ranch northeast of Capitan. Ken died March 15.

He was born in Cortez, Colorado on April 2, 1940. At the age of 14, Ken went to work for Bill Armstrong, Sr. who owned the Arroyo Seco Ranch 30 miles northeast of Capitan. He was drafted into the U.S. Army in 1959 where he served mostly in Germany for two years. Following that, he returned to the ranch. He was recalled into the Army for another 10

months during the Bay of Pigs. Again, he returned to the ranch.

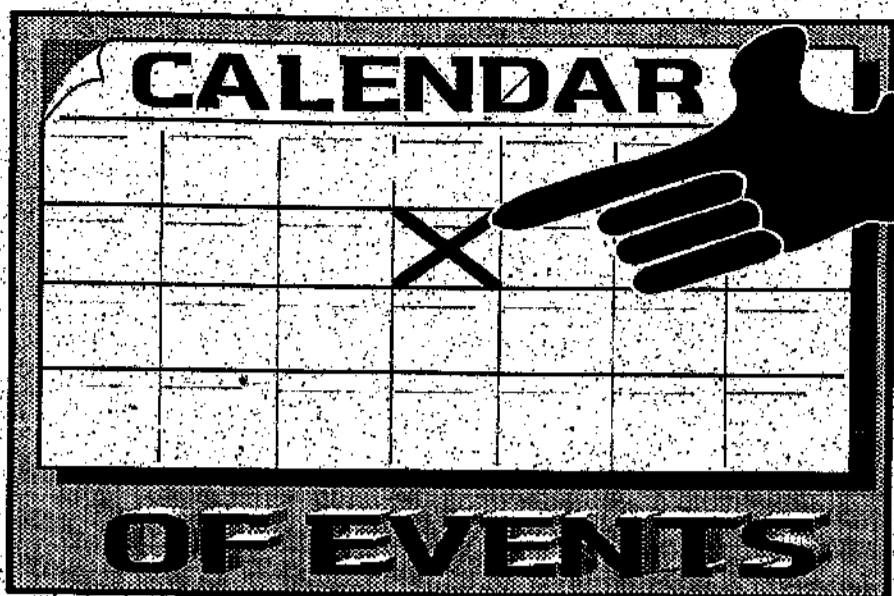
Ken left the ranch for a few years to work for the U.S. Forest Service as foreman of the helicopter crew and fought fires in Lincoln County and all over the western U.S. as part of the "Hot Shots".

On November 25, 1972 Ken married Pat Sullins in Roswell. Pat brought three young children to the marriage. In 1973, Ken, Pat and the kids moved to the Armstrong Slash X Ranch where they remained for four years. Following that he was foreman of the Penasco River Ranch. After a short stay there Ken and Pat decided to start their own business, Schear Pump and Windmill, in Capitan. They remained there until March, 1984. Ken and Pat lived on the ranch for

23 years. Ken was of the Baptist faith.

Surviving Ken are his wife, Pat, of the family home; daughter, Lisa Martin, and her husband, Mark, of Capitan and their children Dustin and Brandon of Ruidoso; Makenzie, Ashlyn, Jacob and Caleb of Capitan; son, Dean of Las Vegas, NM, and his wife, Liz and their children, Brittany, of Dallas, TX, and Kayla and Adriana of Las Vegas; son David and his wife, Veronica of Dumas, TX, and their son, Aaron; brothers Al and wife, Margie of Rye, CO; Bill and wife, Jerrie, of Silver City; Jerry and wife, Margaret, of Moriarity and Joe and wife, Janell, of Gallup; sister, Waneta Martin, of Roswell; brother-in-law, Roger Sullins and his wife, Tamara, of

The New Mexico State University Rodeo team started the spring semester strongly at National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) rodeos at Cochise College, in Fort Huachuca, Ariz., March 6-7 and the University of Arizona, in Tucson, Ariz., March 8.

The men's and women's teams placed first at both rodeos, each time leading the competition by more than 100 points.

"There were stellar performances in all the events. I was totally confident in the team to regain our top spot in the region after sitting out one competition. And that is exactly what they did. After this weekend, the NMSU rodeo men's and women's teams are first in the region," said Jim Dewey Brown, NMSU rodeo coach.

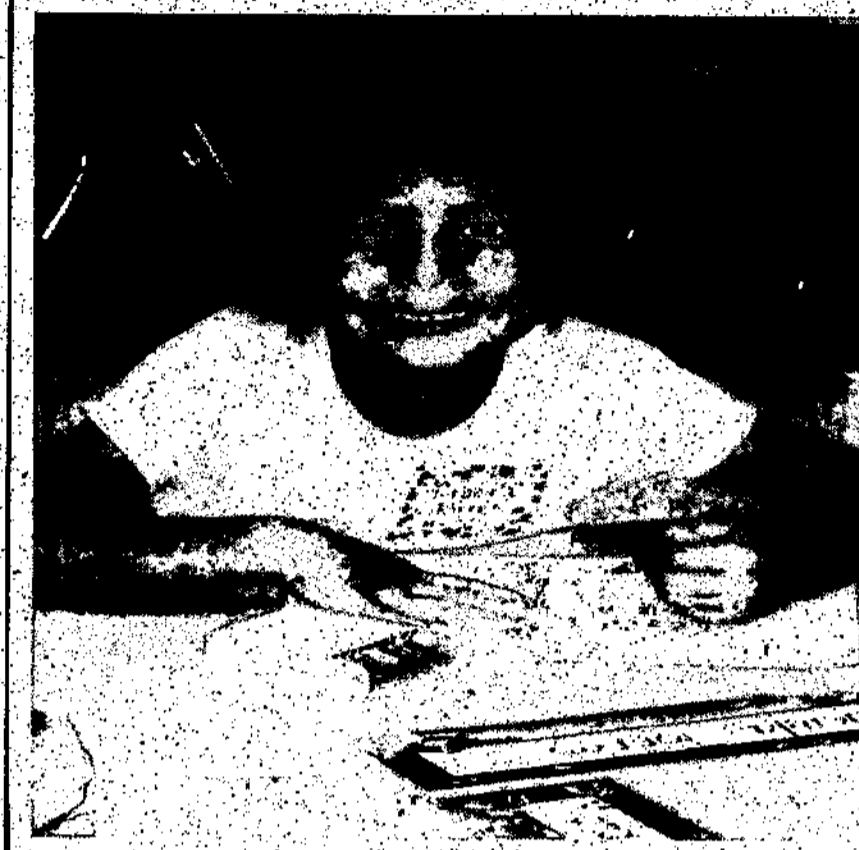

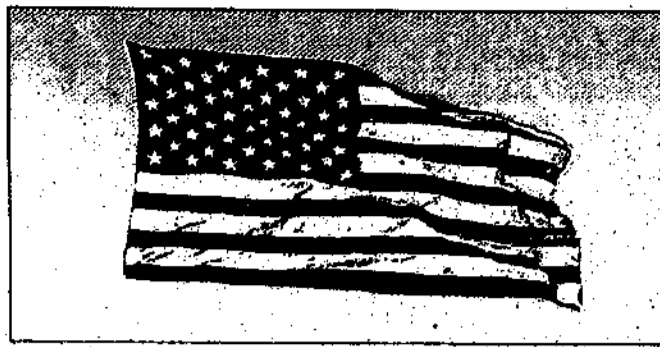

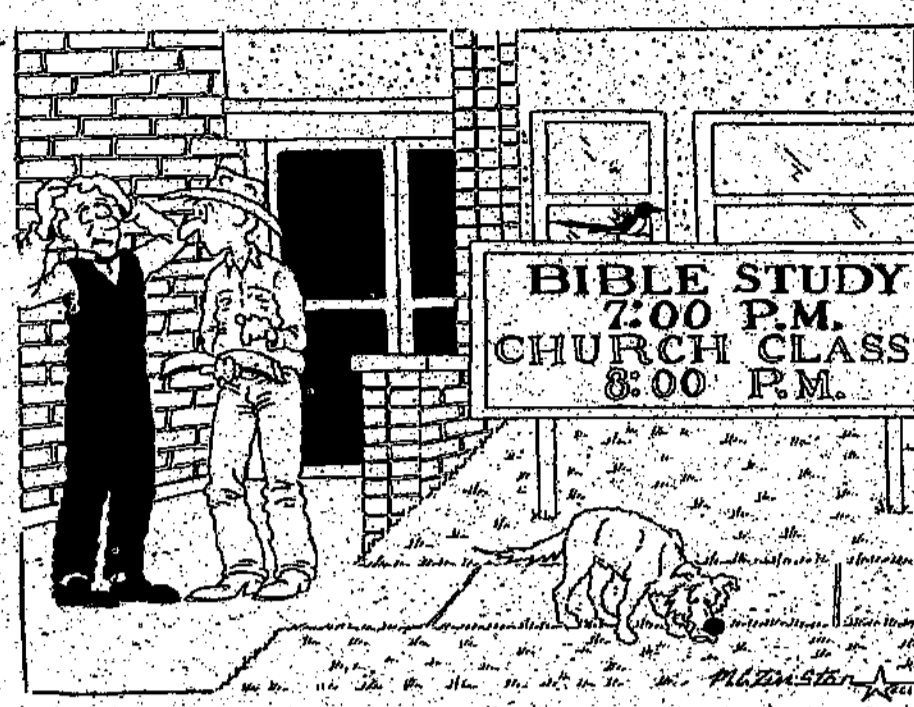

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- Actor Val Kilmer just keeps on coming. Recently he dropped in at the state Capitol for visits with Gov. Bill Richardson and Sen. Phil Griego, who represents the area where Kilmer lives.

The governor is an admirer of Kilmer's. Griego isn't. Kilmer has been quoted in national publications making disparaging remarks about residents of San Miguel County and about Vietnam vets.

Kilmer says both quotes couldn't be further from the truth. Griego isn't giving him the benefit of the doubt. Kilmer volunteered to write a letter in support of one of Griego's bills. Griego was appreciative.

Kilmer also dropped by the House chambers and was introduced. He hadn't made an appearance in the Senate at that time.

Lt. Gov. Diane Denish, who presides over that body, made her gubernatorial intentions public long ago and has raised over \$2 million for her campaign already. Senators are having fun joking that Kilmer is afraid of setting foot in their territory.

Joe Monahan, who is being seen increasingly in the company of political operatives who are showing him the ropes and doing some informal consulting.

The next step, says Monahan, would be forming an exploratory committee, which will enable him to start raising some money. It's not that Kilmer couldn't afford to self-finance a campaign but if he's smart, he knows he needs to demonstrate an ability to raise funds from others before people start taking him seriously.

The actor has 1,800 acres of his 6,000 acre ranch on the Pecos River for sale. Rumor has it that this would be his campaign money. But it certainly didn't start out that way.

Kilmer put the land on the market three years ago when he had two major movie roles back and saw himself having less time to enjoy the ranch.

Those roles are behind him and he's now doing voices for cartoons. Kilmer gained considerable weight for one of those roles. Some observers have suggested that we'll know when Kilmer is serious about running for governor when he starts taking that weight back off.

But maybe it is the other way around. Maybe Kilmer has grown tired of the constant weight gains and losses required for differing roles and wants to settle back

into something more comfortable like running for governor.

After all, New Mexicans have grown accustomed to a governor with some extra pounds on him. Kilmer would have to give up taking major roles if he were to become governor and maybe this is his way of doing it.

Kilmer says if he runs, he'll win. He says actors always win, citing Ronald Reagan, Arnold Schwarzenegger and Clint Eastwood. Hard to argue with that. Had Schwarzenegger been born an American citizen, he just might be our president now.

I can add some others. Fred Thompson was a Hollywood actor before becoming a senator from Tennessee. He then did "Law and Order" on TV before unsuccessfully running for president.

But TV isn't the kiss of death. Fred Grandy left his role as Gopher on "Love Boat" to serve four terms in Congress from Iowa. He then ran for governor and narrowly lost the primary.

Sonny Bono served as mayor of Palm Springs before going to Congress where he still would be serving were it not for a skiing accident. His widow

Mary still holds the seat.

Sports heroes also win political races. Basketball Hall of Famer Bill Bradley was a senator from New Jersey for years before running for president. Baseball Hall of Famer Jim Bunning is a senator from Tennessee.

And Football Hall of Famer Steve Largent represented Oklahoma in Congress for eight years before an unsuccessful run for governor.

Maybe the mystique wears off these guys after they leave the entertainment field but it surely helps them get in.

There is one similarity about all these guys; however, that Kilmer lacks. All but Bradley are Republicans.

like it will be here over the weekend. I'm not recommending the declaration of a fire danger emergency.

Stewart said he would continue to monitor the fire danger, and could schedule a special or emergency meeting of the county commissioners if the need for restrictions on outdoor burning and fireworks arises before their next regular meeting on April 21st.

"I'm coordinating with Buck Sanchez (Lincoln National Forest Smokey Bear District Ranger) and we don't see a need for a declaration at this time," he said. "The key is focusing on the time fireworks start to sell. Last year at this time we did go into restrictions, but I'm hoping the pattern of some moisture will keep us from having to go into it," he said.

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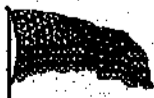

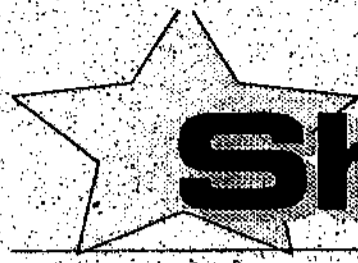
