

# Carrizozo Cowboy Days This Weekend

Over the next three days, the town of Carrizozo will host a celebration in tribute to an American icon, the true working cowboy. Events over the weekend are designed to present family-style entertainment for all ages at a price that families can afford. Excepting the cost of the gasoline it takes to get there and perhaps something to eat or drink, practically everything

going on during the second biannual Carrizozo Cowboy Days celebration is free of charge.

The event is the result of a bunch of hard working volunteers and generous sponsors that have worked steadily for the past two years planning, making contacts and organizing. Private donations, a fund raising pancake breakfast, and T-shirt and poster sales have contributed to bringing popular performing

artists, story-tellers and poets to the area at no charge to the audience.

Carrizozo's Roland Caster, chief organizer for Carrizozo Cowboy Days, says that the goal of the celebration is to remind people of the value of the cowboy traditions of hard work, honesty and loyalty.

"The concept is to honor and remember the values of the old working cowboy," Caster said, "his work

ethic and his courage, his loyalty and his bravery."

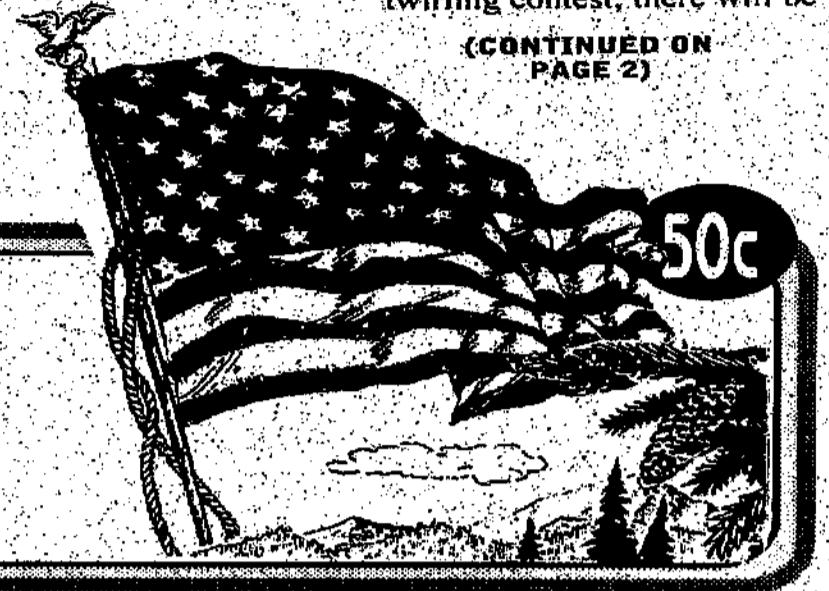
Vendors of western wares and food and beverages will set up at noon on Friday in the Carrizozo Heritage Museum annex on 12<sup>th</sup> Street, behind the Four Winds Restaurant at the intersection of Highways 54 and 380. Caster reported earlier this week that the vending area is a sell out, and some applicants even had to be turned away. Items for sale will include western

clothing and jewelry, home décor and accessories with a western theme and, of course, food and non-alcoholic beverages.

### County Awards Service Contracts

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, during its meeting of May 19<sup>th</sup>, approved the awarding of three annual contracts for services. Responses to the county's requests for proposals (RFP) were opened on May 12<sup>th</sup>. The proposals were evaluated by the county manager, purchasing agent and administrative assistant based on hourly labor rates, materials mark-up rates, travel costs and response time.

Bonito River Services of Nogal scored highest in its bid to provide heating and cooling services to the county. One other firm responded to the RFP.

ERM Electrical of Cloudcroft scored highest in the evaluation of proposals for electrical services. A proposal was also submitted by an Alamogordo firm.

Proposals for providing plumbing services came from a Ruidoso Downs firm and Ventura Plumbing and Heating of Carrizozo. The Carrizozo company scored higher in the evaluation of the proposal.

Following the recommendation of the county manager and the evaluation team, the highest scoring firms were awarded annual contracts with the option to renew for three additional years.

### County Chooses Rules Version

During just about every meeting of the county's various committees and commissions attended by Oscuro freeholder Jerry Carroll, Carroll has made an issue of questioning under which version of Robert's Rules of Order the meeting is conducted. Until the May 19<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners, there was no consensus regarding an answer to Carroll's insistent inquiries.

Carroll had suggested that the meetings follow the 1915 version of rules of order, stating that the older version can be downloaded from the internet for free.

County attorney Alan Morel remarked that he had generally used an 1893 version, but said that there is also a 1995 version and a 2000 millennium version of Robert's Rules of Order.

"I've looked through them and, quite frankly, I can't outline to you in short order what the major differences are between the various versions," Morel said. "I don't have a recommendation, but I think it would be good to outline which one we will be using, just for clarification purposes," he said.

County commissioner Don Williams, himself a parliamentarian, commented that he was in favor of using the most recent version available.

"The most current version is quite complicated and addresses any issues in parliamentarian rule, from our operation to the Democratic National Convention," Williams said. "I don't really have a problem as to which version we use except that it would make sense to use the latest version of any document that's adopted as a rule."

County commissioner Tom Battin suggested that, because the county's use of Robert's Rules of Order is limited to the functions of the various committees and the county commission meetings and the new versions of the rules are much broader, the county might just use the portions that apply to the county's methods of conducting business.

"I don't know how that can be done unless the attorney could go through it," Williams said. "We can modify it but you'd have to pick and choose those issues that you want on it," he said.

Carroll added that there is another version, the "classic" version of Robert's Rules of Order that is a 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary edition.

"All of them are revised," Carroll said of the various versions. "As far as I know, there has never been a specific version of Robert's Rules of Order adopted by this body," Carroll said. "The reason I like this 1915 version, the classic, is because it's the only version that's been authorized to be printed in paperback," he added. "You can get it off the internet free, so you

don't have to pay for it."

Welda Grider, another member of New Mexico State Parliamentarians, explained that the rules of order are being continually revised to accommodate new technologies and issues, most recently like email and telecommunications use.

"Society changes and therefore the committees that do Robert's Rules change the rules that go with them," Grider said. "The underlying principles remain the same. I would suggest that you use the latest version because that's the one that's accepted and that's the one that parliamentarians use," she said. "That's the one we're trained to use."

Williams again suggested that it didn't matter a whole lot which version of the rules the county chose to adopt, because any version could be modified to meet the county's needs.

"Everybody says they use Robert's Rules as modified," Williams said. "So it doesn't lock you in to the exact words that are in the book. My impression from my studies is that Robert's Rules of Order isn't intended to be so rigid that everybody has to raise their hand in unison. As long as the meeting is flowing well, just because somebody doesn't say the right word at the right time, 10 people don't need to jump up and say point of order," he said. "As long as the meeting is progressing along at a reasonable rate, that's the whole idea of Robert's Rules, to have an efficient meeting."

Williams again recommended that the county use the latest version of the rules, which he pointed out were not laws but simply the accepted procedures for conducting meetings.

"I think we have a very efficient meeting here," he said. "I think if we use the latest version we should be able to answer any question we might have about procedure, but we can change those

rules to meet our purposes."

Carroll partially agreed, saying that the rules can even be amended from one meeting to the next, but said he didn't agree with Williams' choice of versions. Carroll also suggested that, in not establishing specifically which rules should be applied at its meetings, the county's various meetings were being conducted without any rules at all.

"That's why I've always asked which version are you using," Carroll said. "I'm not trying to be obstructive. I just like to see things work and everybody be on the same playing table. If you want to adopt the latest rules, go right ahead," he said.

County commissioner Dave Parks said that he was "staunchly ambivalent" about the whole discussion, and explained to county commissioner Jackie Powell that he simply didn't care what was decided.

A resolution had been prepared for adoption by the county commissioners prior to the meeting, but that resolution would have revised the

Carrizozo Mayor Bob Hemphill spoke about the 2010 municipal election during the town council meeting Tuesday, June 9.

"I have no intention of running," Hemphill said. He had been appointed to the mayor position when previ-

ous mayor LeeRoy Zamora resigned. That appointment was to fill out the remainder of the term and even though he has been asked to run again, Hemphill announced he has no intention of running.

The Carrizozo municipal election March 2, 2010 will be for the mayor's

position and two trustee positions. Municipal elections will also be held in Corona, Capitan, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

Declaration day for municipal candidates is January 6. Candidates must have the certification from the Lincoln County Clerk's office to be able to file for candidacy. All candidates must be registered voters and must live inside the town limits to qualify to be a candidate.

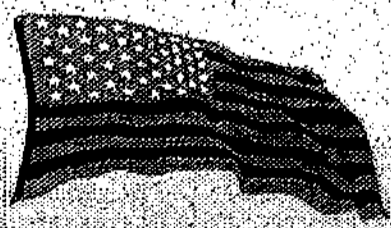

### Suspect Arrested, Charged

Lincoln County Sheriff R.E. (Rick) Virden announced this morning, that on Monday, June 8, 2009, agents from the Lincoln County Narcotics Enforcement Unit arrested Martin Castro, 20, of San Patricio on charges of conspiracy to armed robbery, kidnaping, and tampering with evidence in the May 20th beating and robbery of Phillip Genest of Ruidoso Downs.

Castro was arrested on charges brought following an investigation into the incident by the Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Unit. Shortly after the arrest of Castro, a computer bag and contents taken from Genest on the night of the robbery was recovered by narcotics agents less than 100 yards from the home of Martin Castro and Jose Angel Valenzuela, Jr., also arrested in the case.

Castro is currently in the Lincoln County Detention Center in lieu of a one million dollar cash bond.

twirling demonstrations and instructions for the kids. All participants in the Kids Rodeo will get some kind of a prize.

A street dance on 12<sup>th</sup> Street on Friday at 7:00 p.m. will feature the music of local favorites Paul Pino and The Tone Daddies. Although the band is currently based in Albuquerque, Pino's roots are local. He was born in Tularosa and grew up on the family ranch a few miles outside of Carrizozo. The band's latest CD is a mix of mostly original tunes in "New Mexico style" and is simply titled Carrizozo. The group plays a mix of music ranging from traditional rock and roll to soulful Spanish ballads.

Saturday's events begin with a sunrise breakfast of free biscuits and gravy for the first 100 people who head out to the Bar W Ranch to watch a traditional cattle round-up. Caster told *The News* that the round-up will present a rare opportunity to photograph cowboys working at their traditional craft. About 15 cowboys and cowgirls will participate in the round-up, he said.

To get to the round-up, go north from Carrizozo on US Highway 54 to about one-half of a mile past the 130 mile marker and turn left. Signs will be posted and the turn marked with a sign and a helium balloon. Caster said that the ground at the round-

up site is pretty flat, parking is very close to the observation area and every effort will be made to accommodate individuals with special needs. The gate at the Bar W ranch will be opened at about 6:20 a.m. and breakfast will be served at about 6:45, as the sun rises over the hills and the cowboys bring the herd up to the holding pens. Cowboy coffee and water will be served with breakfast.

Vendors will be back at their booths and the Carrizozo Heritage Museum will open at 8:00 a.m. on Saturday. Western authors will be on hand at the museum to discuss and sign books. The Cowboy Parade begins at 10:00 a.m. with riding teams, longhorn steer and horse-drawn wagons. The only motorized vehicles in this parade will be pulling floats, Caster said.

A free stage show begins at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday and features a performance by the Flying J Wranglers. Cowboy poets and story tellers as well as other performance artists will round out the show, which takes place in the courtyard area between the two buildings of the Carrizozo Heritage Museum.

Following the stage show, a shoot-out between lawmen and some bank-robbing outlaws will happen in the 400 block of 12<sup>th</sup> Street at 1:00 p.m., and a ranch rodeo is scheduled to start at 2:00 p.m. The ranch rodeo will take place at the Hemphill arena just one-half mile south of Carrizozo on US Highway 54. There is a charge of \$5.00 per carload of people attending the event. Five rodeo teams will compete in a variety of traditional events that test the working skills of rider and mount.

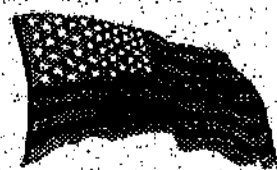

county's open meetings act resolution to make the 1915 version of Robert's Rules of Order the version of choice by the county. County commissioner Eileen Sedillo made a motion to amend the prepared resolution to indicate that the county will use the latest version of the rules, published in 2000. Parks seconded the motion.

Williams added that the 2000 edition is available in paperback form, and suggested that each county commissioner and the county manager be provided with a copy. Sedillo's motion passed unanimously; county meetings now recognize the 2000 version of Robert's Rules of Order as the official version for use in committee and commission meetings.

## Efforts recalled to locate judgment in death of 'Kid'

Letter from William V. Morrison on matters regarding the exhumation of the body of Billy the Kid

Any interested persons are welcome to the original letter I received from Mr. Ben Dalgin, Director of Art and Reproduction for the New York Times, under date of July 14, 1950, wherein it states, Quote: "We have gone through the issue in question and can not find any birth announcements. Our researcher claims that there are announcements of marriages and deaths but none of births."

After conferring with the late Colonel Maurice Garland Fulton, Curator, and insisting on meeting with the Historical Society Commissioners, in order to prove their display announcement was a fraudulent document, it was removed from display to the public at that time without further question. I am interested in knowing if this fraudulent display document is back on display to the public.

It appears that the next step will be to prove that the Kid was killed as claimed. In the absence of an adjudication that he was, it is my belief that exhumation and re-interment of all three cadavers would not "settle this matter for all time," to which I believe you will agree.

Of course, the burden of proof of death of Kid and proof of heirship of Miss Telfer falls on the moving party -- in this case it is the Lincoln County Commissioners.

However, after the establishment of these issues through court proceedings, I may be willing to enter into negotiations with them to defray all costs of proving heirship of O'Folliard and Bowdre; obtaining permission from their nearest of kin to exhume and re-inter all three in a location to be designated by them.

Provided, however, that permission be granted to me to continue my scientific investigation as previously outlined herein.

In this manner, and this only, can the matter be "settled for all time," as advocated in your editorial.

To indicate I am anxious anyone in New Mexico to see that future historians have access to the truth, I want to correct the mistaken contention of your Lincoln County Commissioners in their resolution that Kid "was sentenced to hang for the murder of Sheriff Brady in the Old Lincoln County Court House."

My investigation should have settled this issue for all time. I furnished the record of Sentence from Page 406, District Court minutes, Dona Ana County, New Mexico, on April 13, 1881, in my book, "Alias Billy the Kid." Apparently, this little book did not receive wide distribution in your State. However, armchair researchers of other States, including Frazier Hunt in his Kid book, have used my information without hinting their source. None of them prior to my appearance here, including your historian, Mr. William A. Keleher, attorney, were able to find it. Oh yes, I failed to say that Judge Bristol imposed the Sentence on Kid in Old Dona Ana County Court House at Old Mesilla, many miles from the place designated by your County Commissioners.

Now I believe it is my duty as a historian to dispose of the various contentions made in your editorial above referred to.

I have disposed of the contention in paragraph four, wherein you claim Kid was, Quote: "shot down at Ft. Sumner by Sheriff Pat Garrett in July 1881," end quote, with my preceding statements.

Recently, we have been considering filling a petition for pardon posthumously, wherein evidence would be incorporated to prove beyond

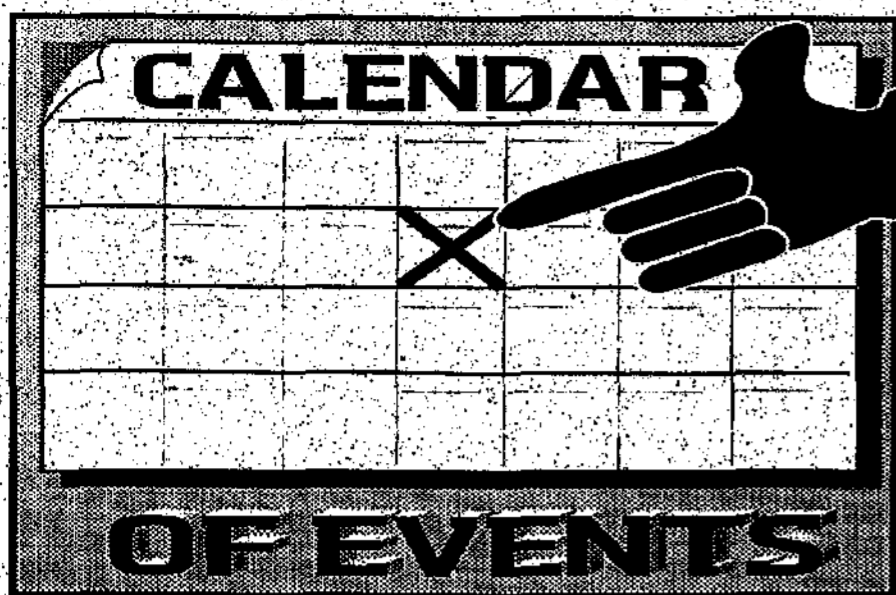

Other things mentioned during Hemphill's statement from the mayor:

\*Carrizozo Little League and T-Ball sign up will be Saturday, June 13 at the Otero County Electric building on 12<sup>th</sup> Street from 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

\*The water will be turned off in Carrizozo on Tuesday from 9:00 a.m. to possibly 11:00 a.m. for installation of isolation valves and other water line work.

\*A new sound system in town hall should make it easier for people to hear but might need some minor tweaking.

\*New policies may need to be in effect for the next clean up days. Apparently some able bodied people sat on front porches and drank beer while town workers and volunteers loaded the items put out for disposal.

"We need more townspeople to help" Hemphill said. Different solutions were discussed.

\*Hemphill spoke about the July 4 celebration. He said that Dan Dattola, developer at Valle del Sol, last year had donated almost \$10,000 for the event, hired musicians, etc. but that this year the developer's help may not be in the same level.

### TARLTON J., "Tos" BOND

Tarlton J., "Tos," Bond, Durango school teacher, cattle rancher, world traveler and wine aficionado died May 4 in Breckenridge, Texas. He was born on December 13, 1930 in El Paso.

Tarlton was raised on the family ranch near Corona. 1st Lieutenant Bond served during the Korean conflict. He and Dixie left New Mexico in 1965 and began ranching in Archuleta County, Colorado. In 1967 he began teaching 8th grade earth science at Miller Jr High in Durango, CO. He retired from teaching in 1980 and began traveling around the world.

He is survived by his wife of 55 years, Dixie Lee Bond of Durango, their daughter, Sandra Bond (Burton Cherkoff) of St. Croix, US Virgin Islands, their daughter, Joetta Bond (Gustavo Luengo) of Paris, France, their son, Michael Bond (Gretchen Schlichting Bond) of Seattle, Washington, four grandchildren and three great grandchildren. ## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- New Mexicans are always having to introduce themselves to the world. An astonishing number of people don't realize we exist.

Gov. Bill Richardson did a good job of introducing New Mexico to the political world two years ago but those memories are fading quickly.

On May 2, three cowboys from New Mexico introduced us to the horse racing world and were greeted with about as much enthusiasm as Gov. Richardson at the Iowa caucuses.

The owners, trainer and the undersized horse with an odd name, weird feet and peculiar gait, really weren't supposed to be there according to odds makers, tipsters and the elite of the horse racing world.

But Mine That Bird came out of nowhere to spoil the party at the Kentucky Derby. The victory was darned near impossible and couldn't happen again at the Preakness Stakes two weeks later, detractors said. But it almost did.

Mine That Bird closed within a head of the Preakness winner and might have won again if the short race had been a little longer. The third jewel in the triple crown was the Belmont Stakes on June 6.

That race was much longer and many owners of Derby and Preakness horses were debating whether to take on the challenge. Meanwhile the little New Mexico horse was ready to run.

The only problem was that someone had to ride him. And typical of the respect the little guy has received so far, his handlers were having to look for their third new jockey in three races. The other two jockeys had previous commitments. That's probably some sort of world record.

But Mine That Bird made New Mexicans proud. His third place finish could do good things for the career of Bloomfield trainer Chip Woolley and for the Roswell Double Eagle Ranch, owned by Mark Allen and Leonard Blach.

So much for the political world and the world of horse racing. New Mexico state government recently has introduced itself to the movie industry through some generous subsidies to companies that agree to film here.

The most generous of those subsidies is a 25 percent rebate from the state for all qualified production expenditures. That rebate was passed by the 2002 Legislature and signed by Gov. Johnson during the last year of his administration.

In its first year of ex-

istence, the rebate cost state taxpayers \$1.1 million. Last year it cost \$47 million -- evidence that New Mexico has introduced itself in a big way.

Some lawmakers have asked whether in tough economic times, the state still can afford the expenditure when cuts are being made in so many areas of the budget.

A bill, introduced in the 2009 Legislature by Rep. Dennis Kintigh of Roswell, sought to repeal that rebate. It didn't go anywhere because of pressure generated by Gov. Richardson and the state Film Office.

But the matter does deserve further consideration. Two studies of the cost of film industry subsidies found that the state gets back either 15 cents or \$1.50 for each taxpayer dollar invested.

Obviously some serious questions need to be

asked of the people who conducted the studies. A vehicle for doing that before the next legislative session was passed by the House during the 2009 Legislature.

It recommends to the legislative leaders the creation of an interim Film, Art and Culture Committee to consider not only film subsidies but how the total range of art and cultural activities benefit the state and what the state can do to most effectively support them.

New Mexico is the third largest art market in the country. Significant tourism is generated by our many cultural attractions. We need to understand these industries in terms of what they contribute to our economy and what it is worth to the state to help them flourish.

The committee should be appointed and should be composed of lawmakers who are willing to ask some tough questions.

doubt, among other things, that Kid performed his contractual obligation to the letter; and that Governor Wallace refused and failed to perform his, especially to pardon Kid if convicted.

This petition will dispose of the issues raised in paragraph seven, wherein you contend, Quote: "Kid would have accepted the pardon offered by Governor Lew Wallace had he not known for certainty that if he laid down his arms he would have been shot by his enemies before the next sun set," end quote.

Immediately following his public show in Santa Fe, Governor Thomas J. Mabry promised to grant us a hearing on the law and evidence in our first petition. However, after a private conference with Garrett faction lead by Patrick J. Hurley, he changed his mind in an open announcement to the press. Consequently, Roberts had his day in Santa Fe, but none of you, including the Governor, examined our evidence, nor offered any to disprove Roberts' claim.

Certified copies of legal records would be included in this petition, the same as before, to prove, among other things: that

Kid submitted to arrest; was placed in jail by Lincoln County Sheriff, George Kimbrel, who produced him in Court where he testified before the Grand Jury, as promised, that voted indictments on April 28, 1879, against enemies, including among others, J.J. Dolan and William Campbell for the murder of Houston I. Chapman; and Dolan was acquitted by defense attorneys of the Santa Fe Ring on trial on change of venue without ever attempting to shoot the Kid for offering testimony against him.

I agree with the remainder of your paragraphs. And I especially agree with paragraph three, where-in it is contended that Ft. Sumner is claimed to be the home of Kid.

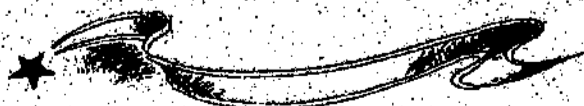

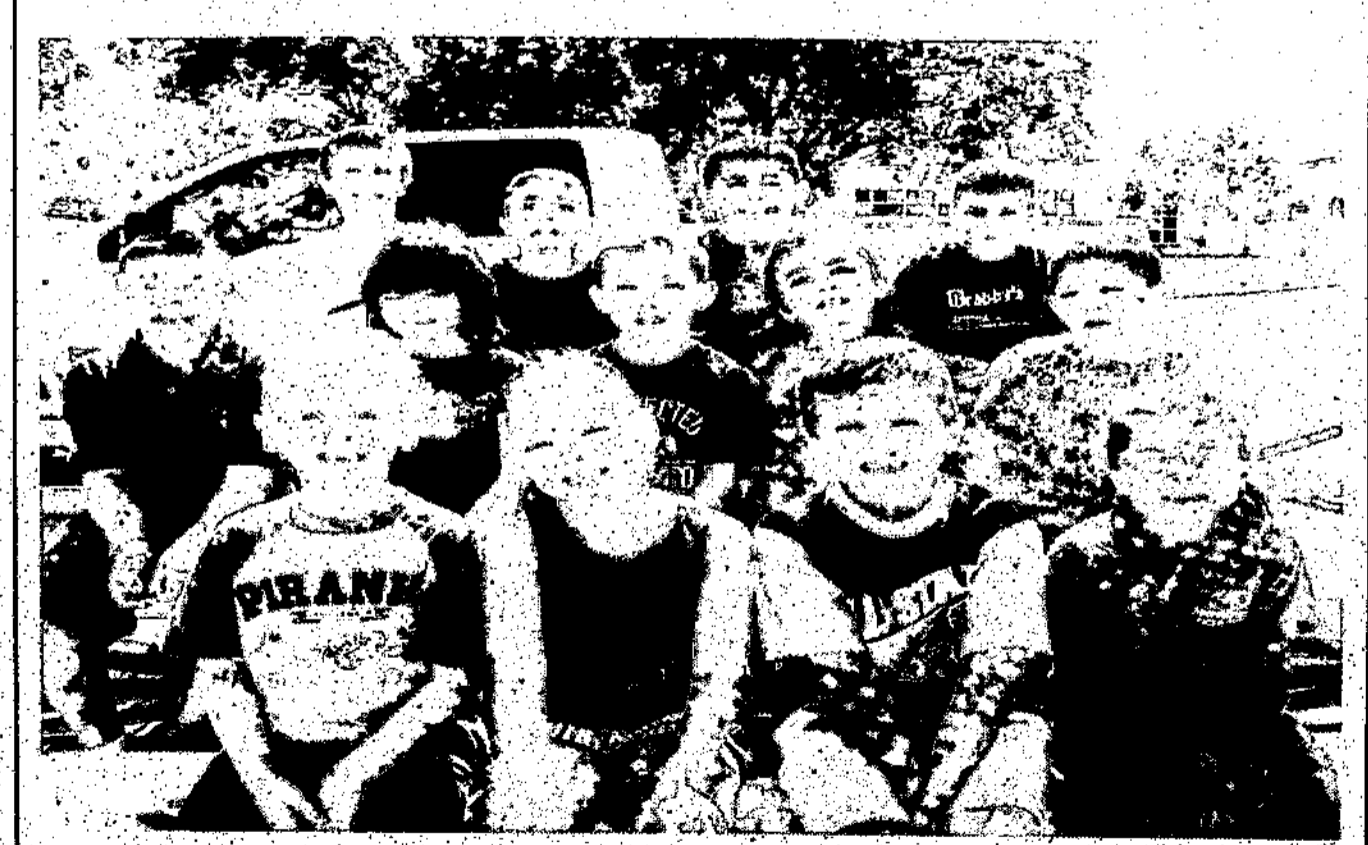
