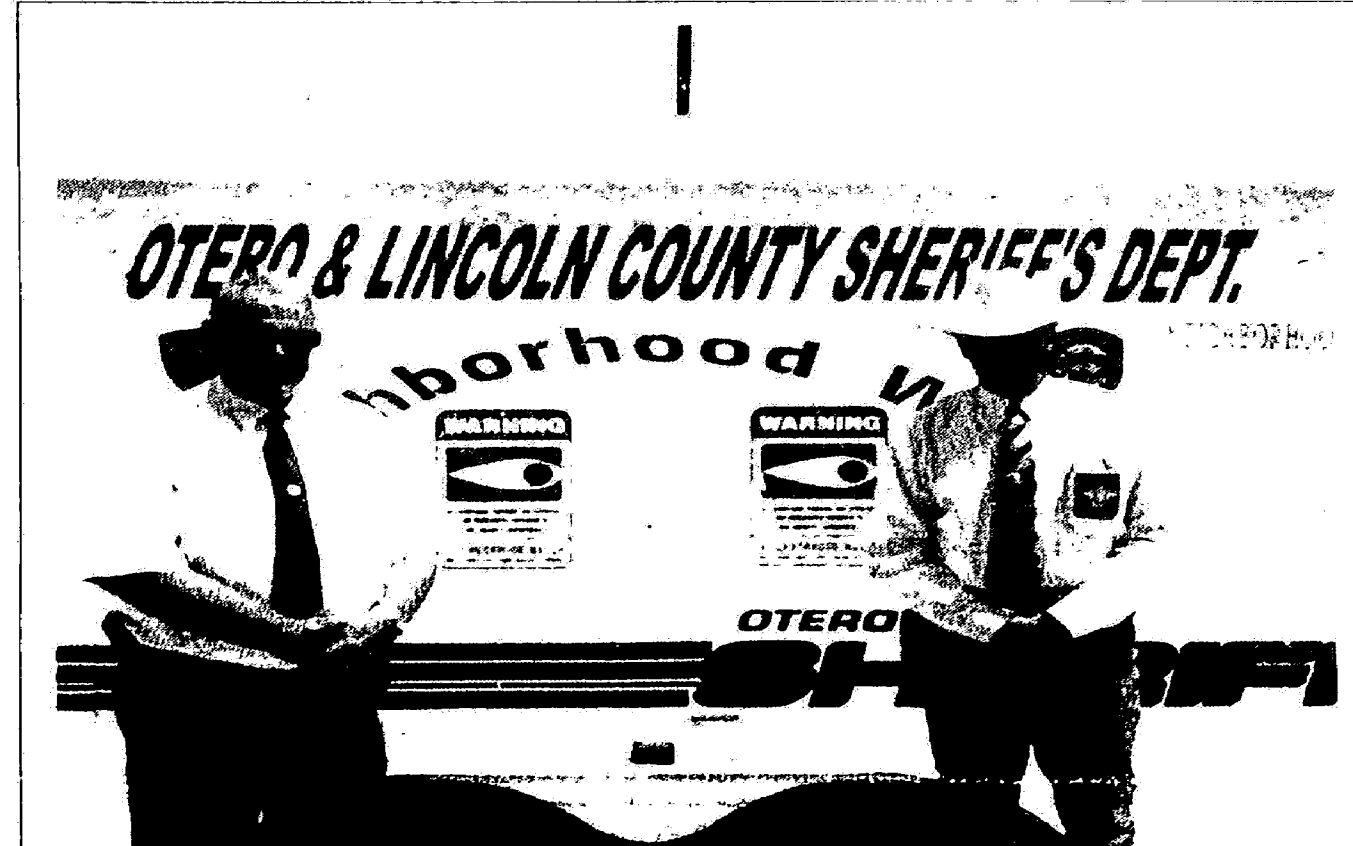

Plans Changed for Mesa Barn

In May, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners heard a report from a representative of the U.S. Forest Service Smokey Bear Ranger District on plans to move the old Mesa Barn from Ranger Road in the Nogal area to a new location in Ruidoso in order to preserve and protect the historic structure.

The Mesa Barn was constructed in 1908 and served as part of the Mesa Ranger District headquarters until the Ruidoso offices of the Smokey Bear District were built in the late 1980s. After sitting vacant for several decades with little or no maintenance, the original plan was to disassemble the structure and reconstruct it for use as a storage facility. Mendonca told the county officials that the Forest Service had received a lot of comments from the public after announcing plans to relocate the structure. That feedback ranged from support to move the

building because there is a concern that it may be lost if it were to be destroyed. People who do not feel the building should be moved because it is in its historic location. Mendonca said, "We've been working with the state historic preservation office as well as the Lincoln County Historic Society and what we have decided to make an effort to secure some government grants to try to restore the building at its current location." The state historic preservation organization, the local history society and the Forest Service have agreed that they will make an effort over the next one to two years to preserve the Mesa Barn at its location near Nogal. If the building cannot be preserved and secured at the end of that time, all have agreed to support moving the structure to a Ruidoso location.

"We're going to try to preserve it where it's at, but it's not a guarantee at this point," Mendonca explained. "One of the things we discussed was turning that entire area into a historic site including picnic areas and some plaques spread out around the area that would help demonstrate what was once there so people could actually learn from it," he said. The plan to restore the Mesa Barn at its current location is dependent upon the Forest Service being able to get the necessary funding

Alto Resident Says Trash System Stinks

Alto resident Earl Adamy, representing the Alto Lakes Water and Sanitation District, appeared before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners during its regular meeting of June 19 to update the officials on the status of a solid waste disposal site there.

"I have hundred homes are served from a single solid waste collection site," Adamy said.

Adamy explained that all of the residents living in the Alto Lakes sanitation district use a central site for disposal of their trash into dumpsters that are maintained by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA).

"Homeowners and their contractors bring their forest waste to the central yard. The green waste area was attended and open from nine to five, four days a week," Adamy said.

Adamy reminded the county commissioners of a report he presented in November, 2007, of plans to develop a more attractive and efficient waste disposal site in the Alto Lakes district. Adamy said the plan was to build a modern solid waste convenience station, with compactors to replace the rows of dumpsters. The design was to include multiple self-service islands to more efficiently handle the waste disposal in peak hours, he said.

The Alto Lakes solid waste convenience station has been completed and was opened on May 15. "I'm here to ask for the commission's help

in fixing problems which have plagued this project since inception," Adamy said.

He told the county commissioners that the multiple-compactor system, with separate compactors for household garbage, green waste and cardboard and aluminum recyclables work well when few people try to use them at once, but said that the site posed a traffic nightmare when it was busy.

"We start to get backed up," Adamy said.

He went on to tell the county officials that operational consultants were retained by the LCSWA in 2008 to work on the layout and operations of the waste disposal convenience site.

"We were informed by (LCSWA) that the state required the facility to be closed except when it was staffed. The proposal they came up with was to have this one large pad instead of the multiple self-service lanes," Adamy said. "The reasons we were given were that it would be easy for the trucks to get in and pull the compactors, and to introduce the concept of express service. A customer with small amounts of trash would drive in, an attendant would remove the several bags from their vehicle, and the vehicle would then continue to the exit without the customer ever getting out of the car," Adamy said of the site plan.

It was to be a quick turn-around for the majority of the customers. The cost for building the facility was paid by residents of the Alto Lakes district. A contract agreed upon

last September left the design specifications up to the LCSWA, although the residents LCSWA agreed to operate and maintain the facility under a 36-month lease, Adamy said.

"The (Alto Lakes) district board insisted on a minimum of six days a week, eight-hours-per day," Adamy said, with an understanding that the facility would have to be attended for those hours.

"The (LCSWA) imposed a \$20.83 staffing charge for every hour that the facility was to be open beyond 24 hours per week," he said.

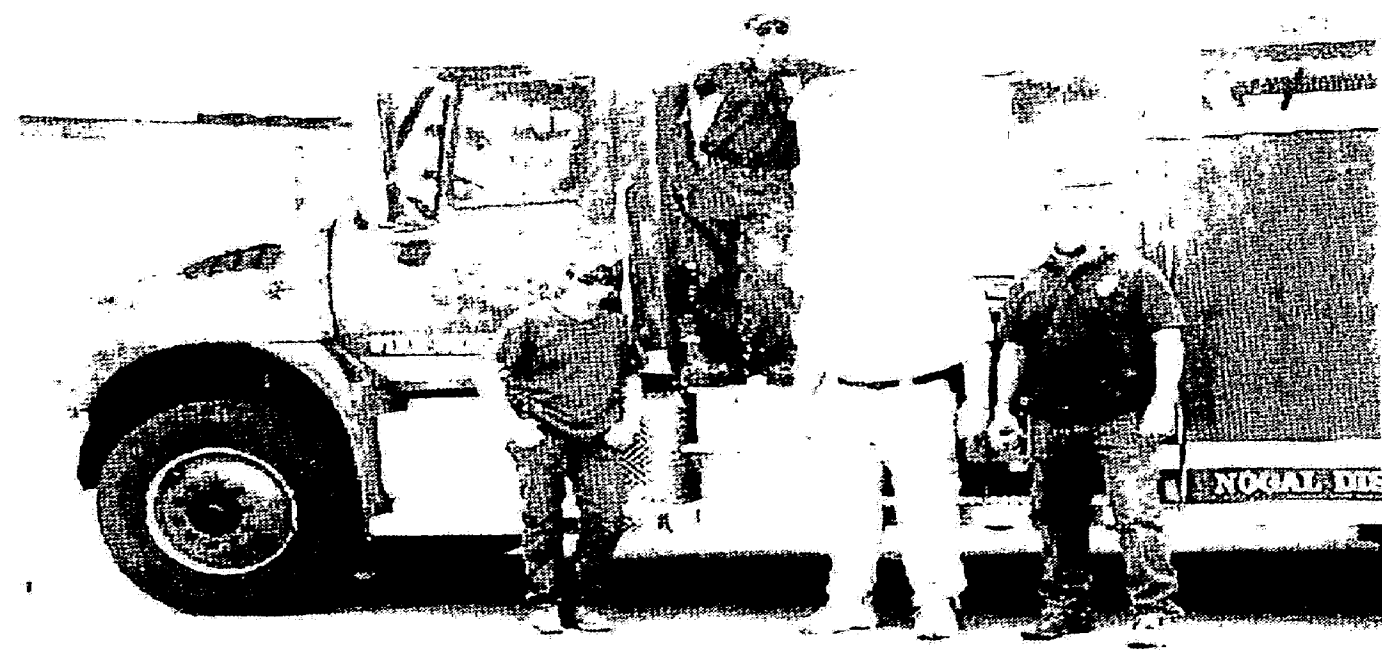
Adamy said that while the disposal facility is aesthetically acceptable to Alto Lakes residents, the design makes it difficult for people to access the different compactors. Many residents have expressed anger in regards to the situation, he said. A recent meeting in the district drew more residents than any in the past, because of the

residents' disapproval of the design of the facility.

"The question is, where do we go from here," Adams told the county commissioners. "One of the things the district board had mandated in a meeting with the (LCSWA) was that the facility was open initially on an honor system. There was discussion about taking proof of residency but we wanted no delays," he said.

Adams said that when the facility opened, an attendant at the dump site would write down the name of the resident and the type of trash being disposed of.

"These people were so mad, and felt that it was an intrusion. They're outraged," Adams said.

Adams said that the waste disposal facility should have multiple lanes for traffic to access the compactors. He recommended three or four lanes with room not only for vehicles hauling trash but also with room for another vehicle to drive around those that are stopped while trash is being loaded into the compactor. He said that the Alto Lakes customers also want a place to unload large items like air conditioners and small appliances, for which an extra fee would be charged. There is currently no place to dispose of those larger items in the Alto Lakes district, he said.

Adams said that the cost of having an attendant at the facility added about five dollars per month to the bills paid by the 1,200 home owners for solid waste disposal, and added that operation of the site probably saves the LCSWA money because it doesn't have to provide individual poly cart service to each household of Alto Lakes.

"We have long thought, and been aware that, we are subsidizing the remainder of the county," Adams said. "We had an extra

cost of about \$500 per month for staffing. That burden has been put on the Alto Lakes owners when we are already creating efficiency by bringing all of the waste to this central facility," he said.

Ted Elkins, a full-time resident of Alto Lakes, told the county commissioners that there is another side to the story, and that the LCSWA operational supervisor, Debra Ingle, should be afforded an opportunity to tell her side.

"It's not on the agenda, so she didn't show up. She didn't have to," Elkins said. "If you heard Debra's story, it'd be a 180 degrees difference."

Elkins reiterated Adams' statement about the very large attendance at a recent meeting of residents of the Alto Lakes Water and Sanitation District.

"They are not unhappy with Lincoln County Solid Waste," Elkins said. "They are unhappy with the water district."

Elkins said that Ingle had looked at keeping the disposal site open all day every day, but the Alto Lakes board insisted on having the site "closed" and monitored by an attendant.

"It was planned to be a closed facility, only open from 9:00 to 5:00, six days a week," Elkins said. "I oppose that. It needs to be open. The people line up because it is closed until 9:00 in the morning and the people have to go to work. People have left their trash at the gate sometimes," he said.

Elkins said that the facility has an emergency receptacle that allows residents to leave one bag of trash when the site is closed.

"Is that one bag a day, one bag an hour, one bag at a time?" Elkins asked. "Debra put a three-bag limit on it, but someone took that sign off," he added. "What's the deal there? I'm telling you, if you had Debra here, you'd hear a different story."

Elkins suggested that the issue be placed on the agenda for the next meeting of the county commissioners so that the county officials could hear what the residents have to say.

"There's nobody that I know that's unhappy with Lincoln County Solid Waste, other than the people on the board of the sanitation district," Elkins said. "That's the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth. It's a hoondoggle and it's out of control, but it's not because of Lincoln County Solid Waste."

Elkins said that only a few of the residents use the valet service for trash disposal. Most prefer to just place their trash in the compactor, he said.

"I haven't heard anybody complain about the \$50 per quarter that they pay for the service," Elkins said.

County attorney Alan Morel said that because he and county manager Tom Stewart are residents of Alto Lakes, they have personal interests in seeing that the waste disposal issues are resolved.

"We could try to get together with representatives of both Alto and the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority. I think there's a resolution that could be worked out," Morel said.

As it stands, the attorney and county manager will attempt to find some terms upon which all parties can agree, to improve the services available to Alto Lakes residents in regards to solid waste disposal.

Lincoln County Before Statehood

A certain old volume of the New Mexico Territory exists. Through the courtesy of Mrs. Helena Coe LaMay of Roswell, this Columnist had the privilege to pore through its yellowing pages. Mrs. LaMay is the daughter of the late Frank Cow, early-day pioneer of Lincoln County. The aged book is the 1909-1910 edition of "The New Mexico Business Directory," published before the Territory became a state in 1912.

Limits of today's Lincoln County as it was set down in the "Business Directory".

CARRIZOZO -- A prosperous and growing town in Lincoln County. The railroad division point on the El Paso and Southwestern Railway at junction with the Capitan branch. The railroad roundhouse and shops, which employ a large number of men, are located there. A large stock raising country and productive valley contributes to the prosperity of this place, which is the shipping point. In the center of the fruit growing region of western Lincoln County. The town is growing rapidly, has good churches, a \$10,000 school house. Good openings for all classes of business. Distributing point for several large mining camps. Population 1,000. Altitude 5,440.

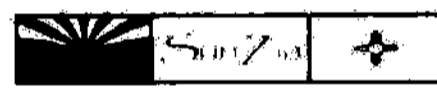

SunZia Transmission, LLC proposes to construct up to two 500kV transmission lines stretching approximately 460 miles between New Mexico and Arizona. 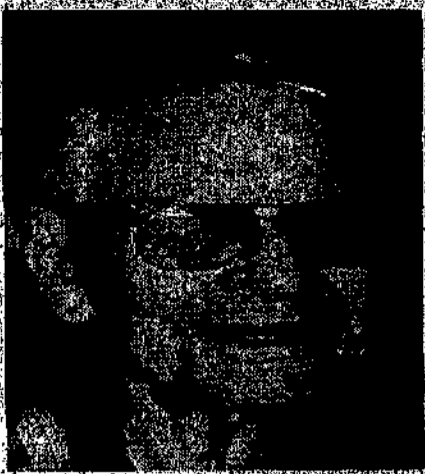

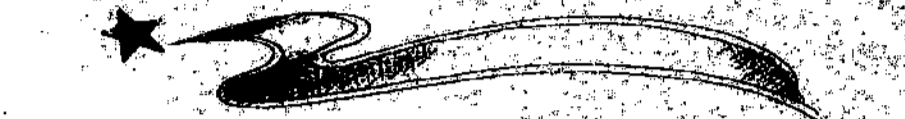
Ralph was a Mason and a member of numerous clubs and organizations and he served as school board presi-

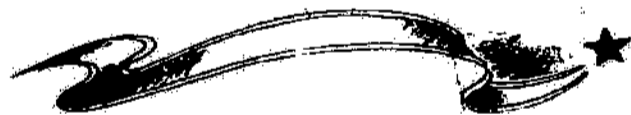

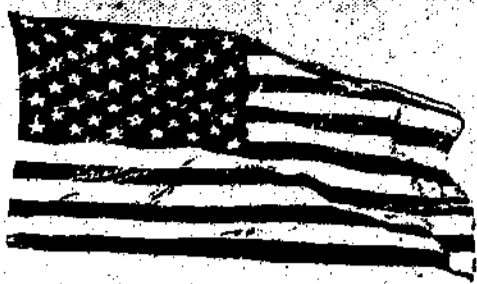

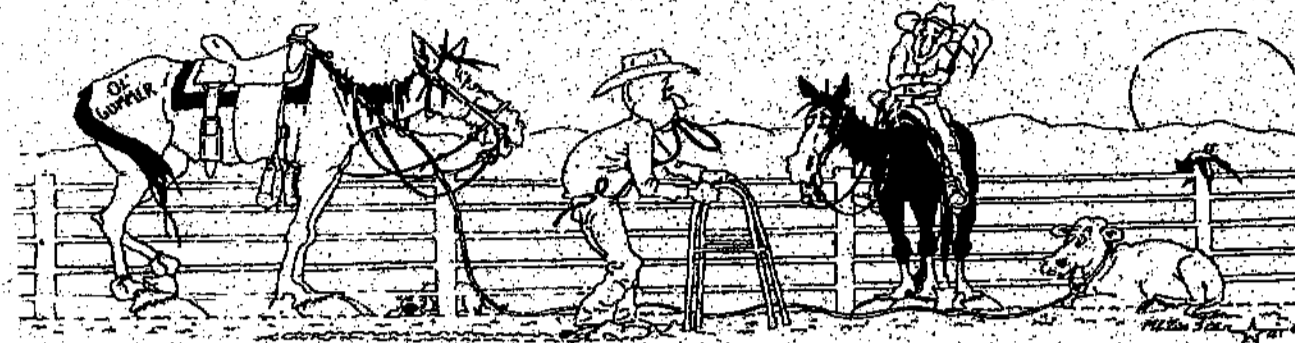

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- New Mexico Sen. Jeff Bingaman has never sought the limelight but he is poised to become more influential in Congress as a result of several factors.

Bingaman's reserved and studious nature is one of his strengths. It inspires trust from his colleagues. They know if they work on an issue with him, they can be sure he will do more than his share of the work and he won't call a press conference to take all the credit. As the years pass, Bingaman's steadiness has gained him more and more supporters in the U.S. Senate.

That approach doesn't necessarily win elections but New Mexico voters have returned Bingaman to the Senate by healthy margins ever since 1982. Even though he's not showy, it's great to send someone to Washington we know won't embarrass us.

Another reason for Bingaman's growing stature is his membership on three committees that will influence much of this year's major legislation.

As chairman of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, Bingaman will oversee all the alternative energy issues in Congress plus a huge Western land conservation package of nearly 170 bills.

In addition, Bingaman is a member of the Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee that is drawing up this year's controversial health care legislation. And he's the only mem-

ber of that committee who also serves on the Senate Finance Committee which has to figure a way to pay for the health plan.

The two committees are far apart in what they want to see in a plan and Bingaman has been put in the role of a go-between to interpret the wishes of each committee to the other.

With the illness of Sen. Teddy Kennedy, the committee chairman, Sen. Chris Dodd has taken over chairing the committee while Bingaman has taken the role of expert on the many technical issues that must be resolved. He has been commended for his ability to reduce complex issues to pragmatic choices.

A recent photo of Bingaman and President Barack Obama in deep conversation in the White House rose garden may cast some light on their relationship. A guy like "no drama" Obama would have a lot in common with Bingaman. A Washington newsman recently compared the senator with movie legend Gary Cooper.

Lest Bingaman starts feeling too good about his rising stature, a PBS interviewer recently introduced him as John Bingaman. He's had some teasing about that.

One New Mexico reporter explained that John is his father's name, which isn't correct either. His father's name was Jess. An uncle named John was the person who got Jeff interested in politics and helped guide his early career. Jeff's and Ann's son is named after his uncle John.

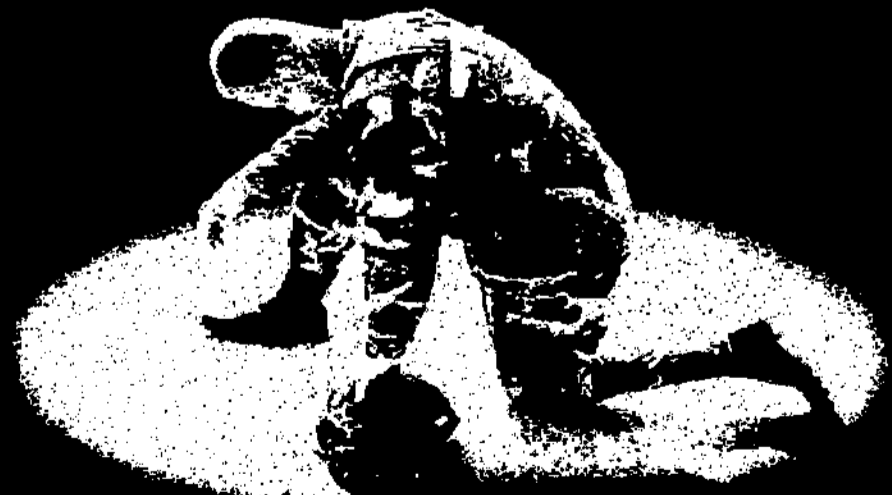

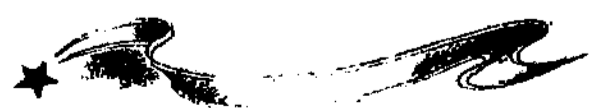
Declaration of Independence

WHEN in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.—We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.—That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn that mankind are more disposed to suffer, where evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.—Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these states. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.—He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.—He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.—He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.—He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.—He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.—He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within.—He has endeavoured to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migrations hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.—He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary powers.—He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.—He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our people, and eat out their substance.—He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies without the Consent of our legislatures.—He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil power.—He has combined

with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:—For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:—For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:—For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:—For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:—For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:—For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offences:—For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighboring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies:—For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable laws, and altering fundamentally the forms of our Governments:—For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever.—He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.—He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the Lives of our people.—He is at this time transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to complete the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty and perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.—He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.—He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known rule of warfare is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.—

We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.
