

County to Sell Glencoe Property

The Glencoe Rural Events Center was constructed in 1997 with \$130,000 from a Rural Business Enterprise Grant for the outdoor arena, \$340,000 from the State of New Mexico for the construction of the main building, additional restrooms and operations, and a county investment of \$156,400 for completion of the outdoor areas, for a total of \$626,400.

During his regular monthly report to the Board of Lincoln County

Commissioners on August 18th, county manager Tom Stewart reported that he has been working with representatives of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Development Office in Albuquerque to work out the sale of what is left of the Glencoe property to Sherry Barrow Strategies.

Stewart said that Josie Wright, of the Rural Development Office, will be researching the possible residual costs owed to the federal government, but suggested that those costs would be small, if anything at all, because most of the arena

has been moved to the Lincoln County Fairgrounds and is still being used by the county.

The Ruidoso firm, Denton Calvin and Associates, has been hired to complete an appraisal of the remaining Glencoe property. The appraisal is expected to be completed by mid-September, Stewart said.

The manager also reported on his efforts to attempt to persuade Governor Bill Richardson to consider options for Fort Stanton that do not include the housing of prisoners. In a letter to Richardson, Stewart explained that the

prisoners formerly housed by Civigenics at Fort Stanton have departed, and that sometime around September 26th the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will conduct a ceremony to recognize the Fort Stanton area's becoming a National Conservation Area highlighted by the Snowy River Cave.

"Given the history of this State Monument and all that its future holds, moving state prisoners onto Camp Sierra Blanca is simply incompatible with its future, and alternatives to include the B

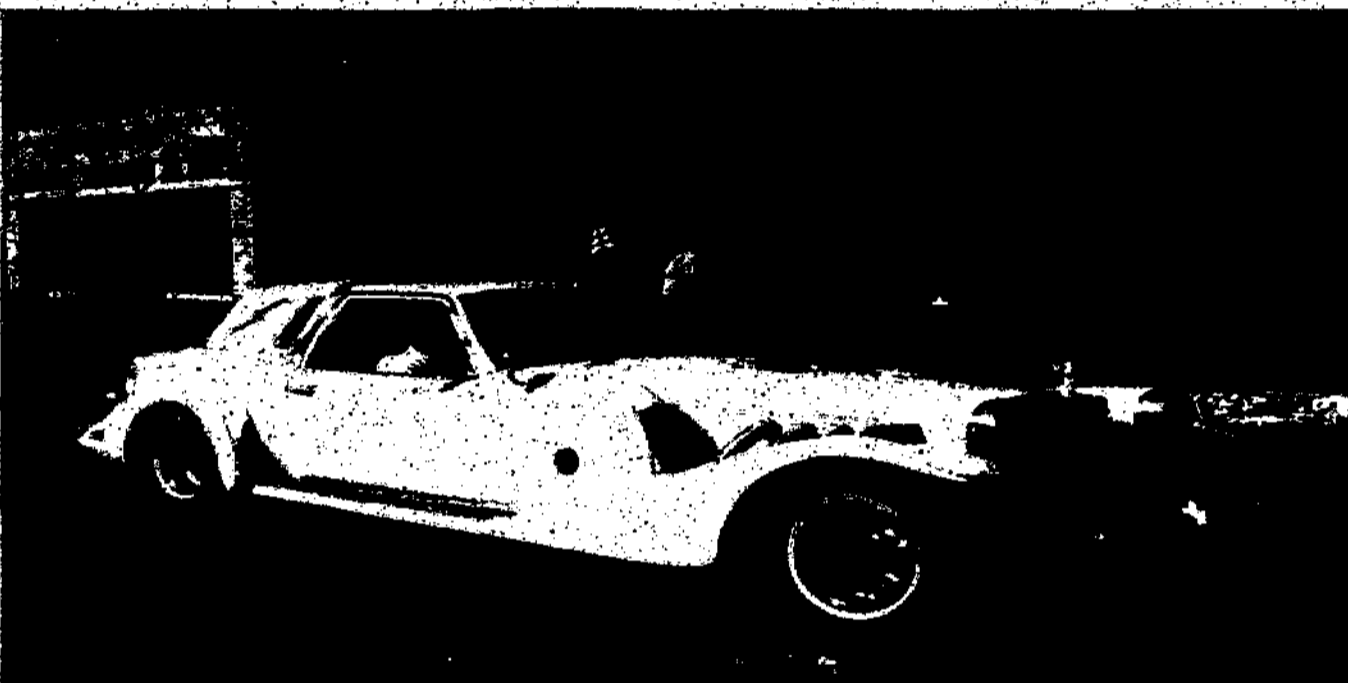

County Seeks Federal \$\$\$ for Substation

Many subdividers and developers in Lincoln County's undeveloped areas have been donating an acre or so of land with-in proposed new developments for future use by the county to build fire stations.

A recent donation of land from the R.D. Hubbard family and developers of the Copper Ridge subdivision between Capitan and Alto,

included money for the county to purchase a metal building to house a new fire station and county emergency operations substation.

The county paid to have the building erected as well as for concrete work and rock wall support for the foundation.

Much of what is required to complete the interior of the building and complete the grounds has yet to be funded.

At the recommendation

of county manager Tom Stewart, completion of the new station is included in the county's Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP), a requirement for many types of project funding applications.

In a report to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners in August, Stewart reported having learned of a potential funding source for the Copper Ridge substation

Community Art Project Planned for Carrizozo

One of the biggest and most talked events to happen in Carrizozo in recent years was the filming of scenes for a major motion picture The Book of Eli earlier this year. Construction crews transformed one block of 12th Street to look like a burned-out, devastated town in futuristic America sometime after a great world war had destroyed most of the country. People from this area were hired as extras in the film, and many Carrizozo residents formed friendships with the crews working on the film.

The town hosted a big potluck dinner party to introduce the crews to the residents of Carrizozo, and some crew members were offered housing in Carrizozo homes.

The excitement that went along with having the movie filmed on the streets of Carrizozo and the community involvement that stemmed from efforts to make construction workers feel welcome has been a boon to Carrizozo and some folks want the community spirit to continue.

According to Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce President Dirk Norris, the business agent for the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (IATSE) Local Union 480, the crews that worked on the Carrizozo movie set, took an interest in the art community of Carrizozo. John Hendry met with Norris, Carrizozo Trustee Dennis Dunnum and Mayor Bob Hemphill and suggested that an outdoor art installation might be a good way to get the community involved in another fun project.

Hendry sent six large panels normally used by the construction crews for backdrops in set designs to Carrizozo and the process of planning a community art project began.

Carrizozo is fortunate to be the current hometown of renowned cartoonist/illustrator Rick Geary, who volunteered to create a brief storyline about a movie production company coming to town in the year 1923.

"Rick kind of took the ball and ran with it and came up with this storyline," Norris said.

Geary also volunteered to outline six illustrations on the panels provided by Hendry, all about eight feet tall and six feet wide. Different aspects of the movie-making process, from scoping out a site to hiring local talent and staging a shoot-out in the street will be illustrated on the large storyboard-style panels.

The plan is to solicit assistance from local community groups to paint the panels after Geary has outlined the images onto them. Norris suggested that school or church groups might like to be involved in the project.

Geary told The News this week that he chose a sort of graphic novel approach to the storyboard panels, a style with which

Indigent Healthcare Claims are Down

On August 15th, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners approved the payment of 34 claims totaling \$10,206 to be paid through the county's Indigent Healthcare Fund.

According to county manager Tom Stewart, that was the lowest monthly amount ever paid out from the fund. "Last year, the average indigent healthcare monthly payment was \$35,136. Last year we spent a total of \$421,637 of the budget for claims," Stewart said. "I don't remember ever having a month this low."

Although August was only the second month of the new fiscal year for Lincoln County, the average monthly claims filed for indigent healthcare assistance this year is \$24,373.

"At this rate, the current projected budget requirement is \$292,487 of the \$472,069 currently budgeted," Stewart said.

County indigent healthcare administrator Scott Annala, told the county commissioners that, although he couldn't prove it, he suspected that the drop in claims filed with the county could be attributed to increased participation in New Mexico's State Coverage Insurance program.

he is quite familiar and experienced in.

"I'm going to include some rough color guides, but the people are welcome to be creative," Geary said of the storyboard panels.

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, in conjunction with the Carrizozo Heritage Museum, hopes to install the completed panels in six locations on 12th Street where the filming of the movie took place.

Norris indicated that Hendry might even send a crew to Carrizozo to assist with the installation.

"People will fol-

low the story by going from panel-to-panel along the street," Geary said.

The public unveiling of the panels will coincide with the opening of The Book of Eli sometime around January 15th, and there are plans, albeit in the very early stages, to hold some kind of event on 12th Street to celebrate the release of the film. There is talk of running a red carpet down the center of 12th Street and bringing in some of those high-powered flood lights that oscillate in the night sky.

Norris is hoping to negotiate a premier showing of The Book of Eli in Carrizozo, but if that falls

through there will still be some kind of a party. He's thinking about inviting the locals that were hired as extras to attend the event and share the stories of their experiences on the movie set.

"The big challenge will be to see if they will actually do a screening of the movie here in Carrizozo," Norris said this week. "When Michael Delheim (The Book of Eli Location Manager) was here, he mentioned something about maybe bussing

people to Albuquerque for the premier, but that would be horrendous," he said.

Geary's wife Deborah is handling the recruitment of groups to participate in painting the panels. She said that anyone interested should contact her by email at deborahgeary@tularosa.net or by calling her at 648-2191.

Once installed on 12th Street, the panels will remain on display for about two weeks, Norris said.

when Governor Bill Richardson announced on July 23rd that an additional \$22 million was about to become available to the state through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA), a.k.a. the economic stimulus package.

Eligible projects for this one-time economic boost must be "shovel-ready", Richardson announced, meaning any required preliminary work, engineering or other studies, required permitting or approvals have been completed. Grants will be awarded for dozens of projects across the state in amounts up to \$400,000, Richardson said in the July press release.

Stewart told the county commissioners that the planned substation at Copper Ridge was the only project that the county had going that would meet the ARRA funding requirements.

"It is my opinion that this project stands a good chance because we are well underway with the project and have committed some great dollar amount matches," Stewart said.

Because the deadline for funding was August 7th, Stewart said he prepared an application for \$327,000, had county attorney Alan Morel and county commission chair

Tom Battin sign it, and sent it off to Santa Fe. He asked that the board of county commissioners ratify the application during their regular meeting of August 18th.

Stewart commented that he had been bombarded with notices for things that he couldn't apply for.

"When this came across my internet email, I jumped on it," Stewart said.

Battin commended Stewart for taking the initiative in applying for the ARRA funding.

"If we do get approval of this, it's going to give us the opportunity to have a state of the art communications command center and emergency station located somewhat near the center of the county," Battin said.

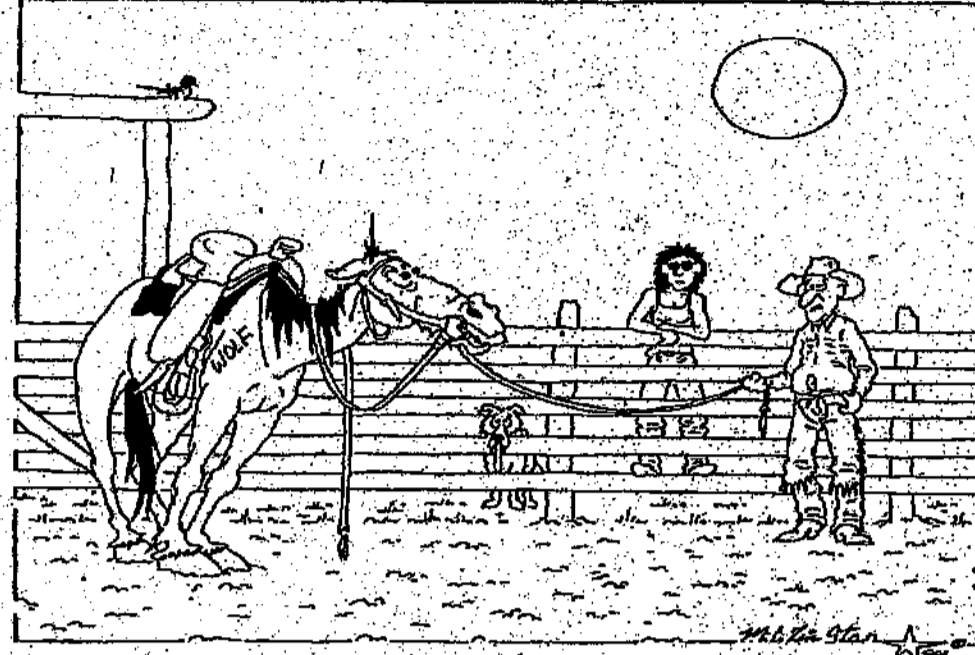

SANTA FE -- "Oh, it's a long, long while from May to December. But the days grow short when you reach September."

Gov. Bill Richardson is in the September of his gubernatorial reign and time is running out on fulfilling the bold initiatives he promised almost seven years ago.

Richardson began with a state income tax cut for the top bracket of wage earners. The idea was to attract companies big enough to pay their top executives over \$200,000 a year.

The cut had little trouble gaining acceptance. Republican lawmakers liked it. So did national conservative commentators. Rush Limbaugh loved it and gave Richardson extra credit for being a Democrat tax cutter.

In these budget-cutting times, some groups are calling for a repeal of those cuts. Richardson says we can't because the cuts have worked. I haven't seen any figures to back that up but for now, his word is being accepted.

The Rail Runner was an early Richardson project to provide train transportation from Belen to Santa Fe in order to decrease traffic congestion, improve the environment and aid spur economic development.

The project was completed at breakneck speed despite having to negotiate right-of-ways through sovereign nations and train stops with reluctant communities.

Ridership has been better than expected. But transportation projects will always be money losers and require government subsidies. The project may be helped by federal stimulus money for rapid rail systems.

The spaceport was another early Richardson initiative. The state made a huge commitment. Virgin Galactic signed on as the future anchor tenant. Other companies said if we built it, they would come. So far, UP Aerospace is about the only company to show up.

Dona Ana and Sierra counties chipped in on the financing. Otero County opted out. In comparison with the Rail Runner, it hasn't exactly blasted off. But it is a cutting-edge concept which at some point may bring big economic benefits

to the surrounding counties.

Virgin Galactic has generated worldwide publicity with its \$200,000 trips to the edge of space, which it planned to start in 2010. That date now appears to be overly optimistic.

Ground was broken in June, with international news coverage. Visits to the Spaceport America website during the groundbreaking week were close to 60,000, ninety percent of which were new visitors and many from foreign countries.

Virgin Galactic has attracted an Abu Dhabi investor to help finance the space it has leased at Spaceport America. In return, Virgin Galactic eventually will launch from the United Arab Emirates capital. The UAE originally had been seen as a competitor but this eases that worry.

Gov. Richardson went after the film industry in a big way and New Mexico now has several Academy Award winners to its credit. To a large extent the production companies have been well received despite complaints from neighbors in a few communities. Some lawmakers feel we are spending too much to attract the industry and have proposed eliminating the 25 percent rebates from state funds for money spent in New Mexico on production costs in New Mexico.

Eclipse Aviation has been a black spot on state economic development. The state invested \$19 million plus incentives in the maker of small efficient corporate jets, which now is bankrupt to the tune of about a billion

dollars.

A new owner, Eclipse Aerospace, is reopening the operation for maintenance purposes. Plans call for eventually going back into production but that appears to be years away and very uncertain.

"Oh, the days dwindle down to a precious few. September, November."

If Gov. Richardson is offered a top position in President Barack Obama's administration, he may be in the November of his gubernatorial career. Santa Fe rumors say about five more weeks.

"And these few precious days I'll spend with you."

Don't count on it. Bill has New Mexico in his rear view mirror.

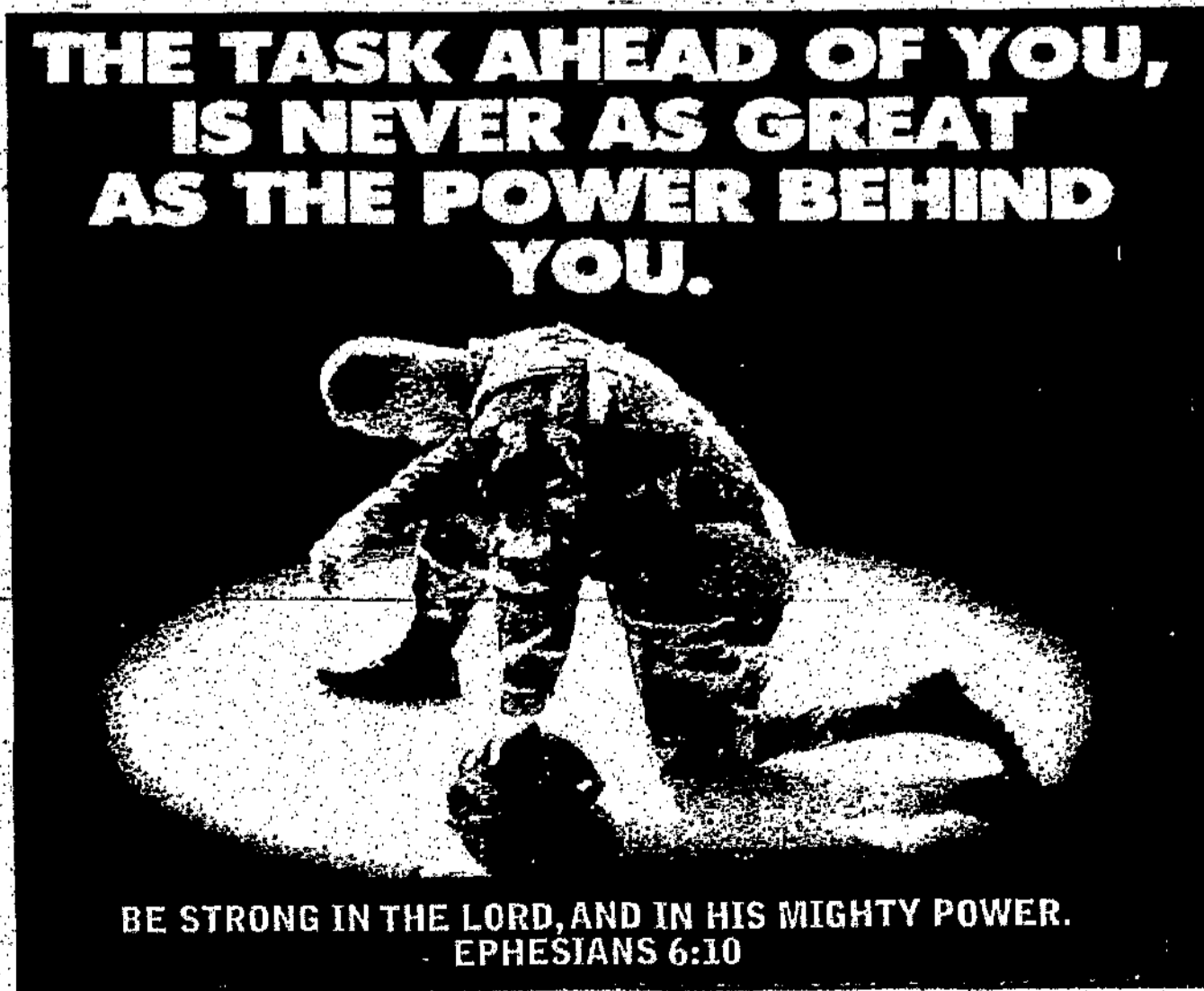
