

County Updated on Transmission Line Project

In September, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners was briefed on plans underway to build a high-power transmission line from the northern part of Lincoln County to the Tucson, Arizona area. Tom Wray, project manager for the SunZia Southwest transmission line project provided the update.

"The presentation today is basically to give you an update on the project and its status," Wray explained. "It's a transmission line project involving

500,000-volt transmission lines."

Wray said that two configurations for the lines are under consideration; the first configuration being two 500kV alternating current transmission lines that could provide the ability to transport 3,000 megawatts of power.

"In this case, up to 3,000 megawatts from Lincoln County, all the way to markets in Arizona and California and southern Nevada," Wray said, "which is really the market that renewable generation; wind generation in your area of the state and solar generation

that's planned along Interstate 10 in southwestern New Mexico, particularly in Hidalgo and Luna counties, is trying to get to. So, SunZia should be viewed as a transmission line to connect that generation and move it to tangible markets and customers."

The second configuration of transmission lines being considered would allow for the transmission of up to 4,500 megawatts of power, Wray said that could be accomplished by making one of the two transmission lines a direct current line.

"The direct current line reduces line losses substantially, down on the order of less than one percent over the entire length of the line of the project, which is some 460 miles," Wray said. "We are studying both configurations in the Environmental Impact Statement that's underway. It could be either configuration depending on the market. If there's enough generation to justify the additional cost to build a direct current line, then we will do that."

Wray said that the average person would likely not be able to recognize any

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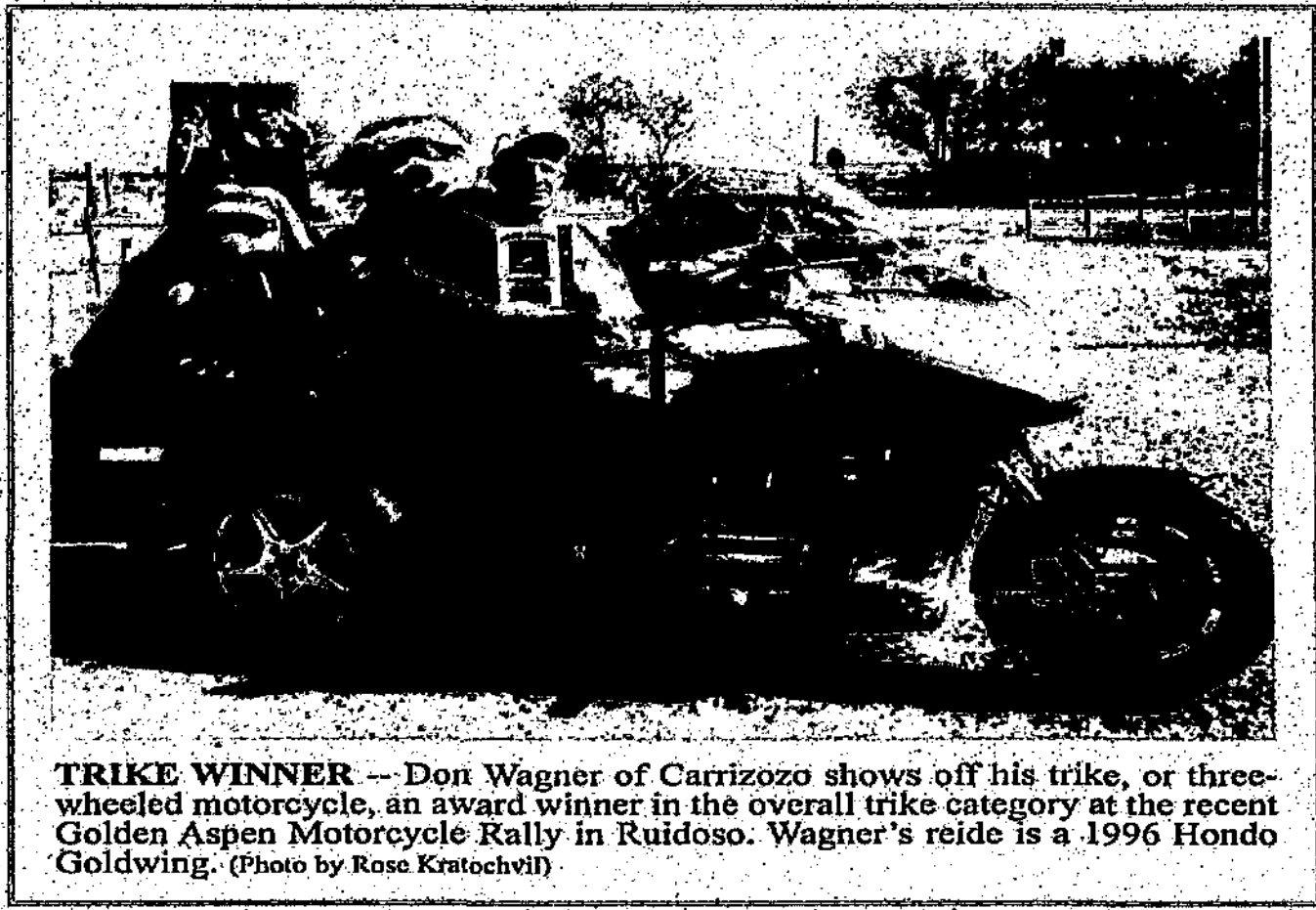

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County Selects CDBG Project

After hearing from citizens and local elected officials in a series of public hearings, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners got a pretty good idea of what the public's priorities are for the county's next application for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding.

CDBG financial awards are granted by the state for projects that meet specific criteria in areas where 51 percent of the affected population falls within the low-to-moderate income levels, and each receiving entity can have no more than one CDBG project going at any given time.

In a report to the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners on September 15th, county manager Tom Stewart summed up the public input gathered

during three public hearings on the county's CDBG application options.

"Potential projects discussed at the three hearings include a replacement for the Rose Clinic in Capitan, a replacement for the Carrizozo Senior Citizens Center with a potential renovation of the community center at Spencer Park, a youth center in the vicinity of Ruidoso and senior citizens housing," Stewart said.

He added that he didn't know what could be done in the area of housing for seniors, and said that he had scheduled a meeting with Capitan Mayor Sam Hammons and Lincoln County Medical Center Administrator Al Santos regarding the Rose Clinic.

"The clinic project is probably the most viable one at this point," Stewart said. "We have several options with the siting of that property under considera-

Altrusa and LCMC Team Up Against Breast Cancer

For the 21st year in a row, Altrusa Club of Ruidoso will partner with Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) to offer low cost mammograms to residents of Lincoln County. The program is available Monday through Friday, from October 5 through October 30, at a cost of \$55.

In order to take advantage of this program, you must be between 30 and 64 years of age, and be a Lincoln County resident, or have a doctor in Lincoln County. The program offers routine mammograms only, and cannot serve patients with implants or augmentation.

The Altrusa Low Cost Mammogram Program is designed for people who are uninsured or underinsured, and could not otherwise afford the cost of an annual mammogram.

Since the price is deeply discounted, it is not eligible for insurance reimbursement.

Call Terri Trotter in Ruidoso at 258-4615 to schedule an appointment for this life saving procedure. Terri is accepting calls Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. On Thursdays only, Shirley Neuhaus will be available at the same telephone number to assist Spanish speaking patients with making an appointment.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women begin getting yearly mammograms at age 40 if they're at average risk of developing breast cancer.

Women at high risk may want to start screening before 40. Risk factors include lifestyle factors such as

diet and exercise, and genetic and environmental factors such as a family history of cancer. A woman's chance of getting breast cancer increases as she ages.

Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death for women in the United States. Each year, over 200,000 women are diagnosed with the disease and over 40,000 die from it. In addition, 1,600 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer and 400 will die this year.

Finding the disease early with mammograms can save your life. A mammogram can show cancer that is too small for you or your doctor to feel. And smaller tumors are more likely to be early-stage tumors, therefore less likely to have spread to surrounding tissue or other parts of the body.

Mammogram screening is among the best early detection methods, yet 13 million U.S. women 40 years of age or older have never had a mammogram.

Capitan Post Office Gets A Bigger Recycling Container

Kristi Sepkowitz, Capitan Post Master and Ol' George Tippin replaced the recycling container in the lobby of the Capitan Post Office. The old container can be seen in the wagon. The larger container was necessary as the old container was frequently full to overflowing, in spite of being emptied twice a day.

From January of this year through September over a 1,000 pounds per month has been collected. By the end of September 13,688 pounds, over 6.8 tons of paper material, magazines, catalogs, store ads, flyers of all kinds, inserts in the newspapers, all matter of bulk mailing, newspapers, both local and those from other communities, and a little paper board, has been diverted from the landfill and sent to recycling, this includes 1,974 phone books some of which were from outside Lincoln County, and a surprising number from other states.

The goal is to collect eight tons by the end of the year, and it looks as if the project is well on its way to not only reaching, but surpassing that goal thanks to the very excellent cooperation of lots and lots of folks in Capitan and in the surrounding area. (Courtesy Photo)

tion." Stewart said that the necessary archeological surveys have already been completed on a piece of land next to the Capitan senior citizens center. "So, I think of all the projects that came up for discussion, we are most advanced, and most streamlined, on the Capitan clinic," he said. "The mayor and I have discussed deeding the land required for replacement of the clinic from the village to the county, to include the current senior citizen center such that we have the ability to submit the project with land that the county indeed owns," he said. "The deeding to the county would be under the stipulation that it be

used for a clinic." Stewart suggested that a \$500,000 grant would be sufficient to build a 2,500 square foot clinic in Capitan similar to the health clinic in Corona. "The Village of Capitan is currently in the process of hiring an architect for a senior citizens center and they have \$500,000 so, in essence, we'd have a million-dollar complex at the end of this," Stewart said. The plan is to build the clinic next to the proposed new senior center in Capitan, unless another parcel of land at another location should become available to the county at no charge, Stewart explained.

significant difference between the direct current (DC) and alternating current (AC) transmission lines and supporting towers, but the terminal substations would be slightly larger if the direct current

option is constructed. One of the project's substations would be located in northern Lincoln County near highway 54.

"It's just because of the equipment to rectify the DC pulse back into an alternating current wave form," Wray said. "That equipment takes more room on the ground." He estimated that an AC only transmission system would require around 30 acres for a substation while the use of direct current could double the land requirement.

Three substations for the line are planned in New Mexico, including a newly proposed substation in Hidalgo County near Lordsburg that could accommodate the transmission of solar power generated in that area. The transmission line project is proposed to run through

parts of six counties in New Mexico and four counties in Arizona.

Of the 460 linear miles making up the proposed transmission line project, about 80 percent falls within the boundaries of public lands, either State Trust land or that administered by the Bureau of Land Management, Wray said. In New Mexico, the route crosses only about 52 miles of private land, he said.

The exact route of the transmission lines is still being studied with environmental impacts in mind. Wray said that comments received from people in Socorro County reflected a strong desire to avoid having the lines cross the Rio Grande near San Antonio. Several transmission tower types are also being considered,

but Wray said the preferred tower would be of a type that can be placed by helicopter, thereby reducing both installation costs and ground disturbance.

"Since the study area has been expanded, the Bureau of Land Management will hold

some additional public meetings associated with the expanded study area. They've determined they want to hold those additional public meetings in Alamogordo and Las Cruces, and probably another one in Carrizozo," Wray said.

SANTA FE -- Eliminate waste, fraud and abuse. How many times have we heard political candidates say that is the solution to balancing the state's budget?

Legislative leaders currently are looking for all of that waste, fraud and abuse they can find. There's bound to be plenty of it but it's not labeled that way.

The governor's hundreds of political appointees, hired outside the state personnel system and scattered in every executive agency, are an easy place to start.

Actually there are too many employees in most governmental agencies, political appointees or not. A hiring freeze and across-the-board cuts get at some of that. I've always felt state employees have far too many meetings. And they all need state cars to get to the meetings.

But not all parts of government are alike. The judicial branch of government has a lean structure. We certainly don't want to cut judges and they don't have big staffs.

Public schools are much the same. Teachers are the big chunk of their budgets. If they are to be cut, state laws that put maximum limits on class sizes will have to be raised.

Teachers of specialized classes, which broaden the curriculum, may be the first to go but they can't be cut in mid-semester without impacting graduation eligibility. And furloughing teachers presents problems.

In affluent areas, parent groups raise money for elementary schools by holding bake sales and sending kids door-to-door selling wrapping paper and candy. Those same schools sometimes require students to buy their share of duplicating paper and other school supplies. But that's not a solution for all schools.

When two state senators warned school superintendents of possible 10 percent cuts in their budgets, the biggest reactions seemed to concern the elimination of high school athletics. That's not likely to happen but anything that is not a required course is subject to elimination.

State revenue projection updates later this month will make it clearer how much will have to be cut. The last projections in August revealed a deficit

in this year's budget of over \$400 million. There are indications that may climb to \$550 million in the October projections.

When the economic downturn began nationally, New Mexico was not as hard hit. But experience from past recessions tells us that New Mexico lags behind the curve, which means we're still a long way from hitting bottom.

If the October projections indicate we're \$550 million in the hole on this year's budget of \$5.5 billion, that's where the talk of 10 percent cuts emanates. And it is totally possible that revenue decreases for next fiscal year will be even worse.

How are the governor and legislature so far apart on fixing our deficit? Gov. Richardson's are short-term band-aids, depending on the economy improving next year. It is looking less and less as though that will happen.

We may have to cut another 10 percent next year. That will be very serious. The governor and Legislature seem agreed on no tax increases

in this month's special session.

Changes in tax law are difficult. They must be correct, which means careful consideration. They likely won't be popular with a majority of voters and lobbyists for the groups affected will fight it with everything they have.

But there also are groups that will push for tax increases. They already are pointing out that tax cuts during the last seven years of the Richardson administration equal about what we are in the hole right now. And they haven't brought the new industry and economic well being that was promised.

Look for increasing pressure during the next several months from groups concerned about emotional issues such as eliminating high school athletics, music programs, art programs and increased dropout rates. Public employee unions and the myriad groups advocating for social concerns also will be putting the pressure on.

"Areas of the county can now be delineated on the map to isolate problem areas and only alert those who need the notice," Stewart said. "It cost us about \$21,460 to put it into effect, and that includes 50,000 calls."

Installation of the Reverse 911 system was completed in August, and can be used to notify residents of emergency situations that might occur, like evacuation orders, prison escapes, fire or flood emergencies.

"It's a great system," Stewart said. The county manager and county commissioners have voiced their opposition to further use of Camp Sierra Blanca as a detention facility for inmates, but the state appears determined to do so.

In a letter of response from the New Mexico Corrections Department, Secretary of Corrections Joe Williams wrote that, because of current budget issues, offenders will not begin occupying the facility at Fort Stanton until the year 2012 or later, but plans are to eventually house minimum custody female inmates at the Camp Sierra Blanca site.

According to the letter from Williams, the facility will be used to help prepare female inmates for release and reentry back into the communities of New Mexico.

"It is anticipated that these women will be employed on work release and thereafter into your community, at hotels, restaurants and other important jobs," Williams wrote. "The Department does not envision the facility as a threat, but rather as a substantial benefit to the area."

Williams added that Camp Sierra Blanca is the only existing facility available at this time that is suitable to house the Corrections Department's growing population of female prisoners.

EDITOR -- I find Trustee Deninis Vega's resistance to getting a part time officer to protect the town extremely worrisome.

As far as I can see there is no logical reason for it, especially when the needed coverage comes at no additional cost to the town. Why would a town council member who is supposed to be acting in the town's best interest, fight something as basic as public protection?

Lincoln County in Bygone Years

From the files of the **Lincoln County News, October 4, 1935**

Wallace Berry was starring at the Lyric Theatre in "Billy the Kid."
Miss Julia Penfield accepted a position in the Alamogordo public school.
Mr. and Mrs. Estanislado Belio of Claunch visited Mrs. Belio's father in Lincoln, Isidro Fresquez.
Fred Pfingsten of Lincoln, prominent ranchman and superintendent of the Southern Pacific Bonito farms, passed away. He was born in Omaha, Nebr., Feb. 22, 1871.
Mr. and Mrs. Elwood Stearns of Parsons entertained at dinner honoring newlyweds, Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Skinner.
Mmes. Nellie Branum, Margie Clouse, Jean Branum and little Miss Barbara Jean Branum attended the fair in Roswell.
Mr. and Mrs. M.U. Finley returned home from their cottage on Eagle Creek.
Albert Snow went bear hunting last Monday and Tuesday.
P.G. Peters of Capitan was a Carrizozo business visitor.
Mr. and Mrs. Perry Sears and Bobby and Mrs. Ola Jones attended the Chihuahua, Mexico state fair.

From the files of the **Carrizozo News October 8, 1915**

Robert Black was working for Floy Skinner on his ranch in the Mesa settlement.
The following were the results of the sporting events at Carrizozo's Field Days: Charles White, riding Steamboat Bill, won the free for all horse race; in basketball it was the Carrizozo girls and the Tularosa boys; Ed W. Harris, first in goat roping; Carrizozo defeated Ft. Stanton in baseball 4 to 2; John Townsend of White Oaks won the cow pony race.
Ben Bechtel, contractor who built the Carrizozo court house and jail, was awarded \$3,750 in damages in a suit against the bondsmen.
The Board of County Commissioners advertised for sale the old court house and property at Lincoln.
The Lutz residence on Alamogordo in Carrizozo was nearing completion. It had a beautiful tiled roof and was modern in every respect.
Tungsten ore was being mined from the North and South Homestake in White Oaks. Much of the valuable ore was being taken from old abandoned gold workings in these mines.
The Lincoln County Road Board ordered parties to remove the gates or other obstructions on the public highway from Encinosa to White Oaks.

From the files of the **Carrizozo News October 1, 1915**

A succession of hard frosts hit the Parsons community, painting the hills with glowing colors.
A wild horse race was to be a new feature at the Roswell fair opening Tuesday.
William Merman brought in some excellent samples of sulphide gold ore which he struck on his lode claim about two miles south of the Jicarilla Post Office on the Prince Albert claim.
The Burnett Bros. at Jack's Peak were preparing to shear a herd of Angoras.

From the files of the **Lincoln County News September 27, 1935**

The first fall meeting of the Carrizozo Woman's Club was held at the home of Mrs. Carl Freeman, Miss Thelma White was installed as first vice-president.
Building of the Bull Gap Dam near Oscura and the fight for Highway 380 were two important topics at the Business Men's Club. John Hall, vice-president, was in charge of the meeting.
J.H. Gray bought the L.O. Morgan store at Ramon and leased it to Mr. Elmore of Wire Lake.
Jack Payne left for Denver to attend to matters in connection with his mine.
Two more WPA projects were approved for Lincoln County; new school buildings for Ruidoso and San Patricio.
