

# County Seeks Land in Capitan

If approved by the state's Department of Finance and Administration (DFA), Lincoln County could soon add 25 acres of land to its assets.

Without mention of the land acquisition on the agenda for the October 20th meeting of the board of county commissioners, the board went into an executive session early in the meeting to discuss it. County commission chair Tom Battin said that the executive session was

indicated by the 37th item on the meeting agenda, discussion of threatened and/or pending litigation.

Upon returning from executive session, Battin made a motion to approve authorization to enter into a contract purchase approximately 25 acres of land immediately south of the Lincoln County Fairgrounds in Capitan. The land is currently owned by Edwin and Patsy Cillessen.

The Cillessens are asking \$750,000 for the acreage. Before committing to purchasing the land, an

appraisal will be performed, as well as a survey. If the appraisal shows the land to be worth less than \$750,000, the county maintains the option to pay the appraisal price or back out of the purchase all together.

County manager Tom Stewart said that the proposed land acquisition would fall in line with the county commission's vision of the future of the county owned facilities in Capitan.

The property includes a three bedroom, two and a half bath home with a guest house, dog runs and breeding

kennels, a 160 foot x 300 foot arena, an eight stall horse barn and tack room, a shop building, hay barn, storage buildings and pastures.

Stewart said the acquisition of the 25 acres would accommodate expansion of the county fairgrounds and the county's road yard which houses the road department's graders and other large equipment. The current location of the road yard, across the street from the Capitan schools, could eventually become available for school expansion.

"This purchase will facilitate the

## County Sees Sizeable Drop in Indigent Health Care Claims

Lincoln County's Indigent Health Care Fund is in good shape after the first four months of the fiscal year, according to county manager Tom Stewart.

Speaking during the October 29th meeting of the board of county commissioners, Stewart said that the average monthly payments from the indigent care fund have been running at around \$20,000, about \$15,000 per month less than one year ago. If the trend continues at the current rate, the county could expect to pay out about \$240,735 of its budgeted

\$472,000 for the indigent health care fund.

Indigent Health Care coordinator Scott Anala reported that the decrease in claims filed is a direct result of getting people to sign up for the State Coverage Insurance (SCI) program offered to low to moderate income individuals and businesses by the state.

"The SCI has kept my numbers low," Anala said, "and although the numbers have been somewhat low this first third of the year, I would caution you that it may not remain that way because the SCI is going to implement their waiting list again starting on November 2nd."

Anala said that anyone who applies for the SCI program and has not been completely processed before November 2nd will have their name placed on a waiting list.

"This waiting list is going to be implemented again, and I think my numbers will climb," he warned. "As of last week, there were 2,000 applicants waiting to be processed. I heard they had every (available person) processing applications," he added.

The waiting list applies only to individual applicants; businesses wanting to provide group coverage for their employees will be processed as usual.

## County Manager's Report

County manager Tom Stewart recently participated in ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) coordinator training in Roswell, and reported during the county commissioners meeting on October 20th that recently completed as well as

planned changes to the Lincoln County Courthouse property will improve accessibility there.

Two curbside, wheelchair friendly parking spaces have been created along the Highway 54 side of the courthouse complex, and plans are in the works to pave the rear parking lot.

There has been a ramp in place to access the county clerk, treasurer and assessor offices for some time, but access to the District Attorney's office remains a serious problem for people with physical disabilities.

Stewart said he plans to add a \$10,000 annual line item for ADA improvements to the facilities in Carrizozo.

The county manager also attended a recent ceremony marking a five-year cooperative effort between the Environmental Protection Agency, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the New Mexico Environment Department and private owners of Atlas Missile sites in Lincoln and Chavez counties to clean up the obsolete missile

silos. Stewart said he spoke with the owner of a 52-foot wide and 175-foot tall silo with seven levels who plans to build his dream retirement home inside the structure.

Some of the silos can be purchased for about \$250,000 each, Stewart commented.

The county-owned property housing The Nest domestic violence shelter suffered damage from rain in August, Stewart also reported on October 20th. The damage included mold in the conference room. The cost to repair the damage and prevent similar damage in the future was just about \$10,650.

The office of Lincoln County Emergency Services is the recipient of \$72,500 in grant funding to equip a swift-water rescue team and purchase some additional communication equipment. The swift-water rescue team will be comprised of specially-trained volunteers from the county's volunteer fire departments.

Continuing his report to the county com-

## Savina Salcido Torrez Celebrates 100 Years

Savina Salcido Torrez, her family, and friends celebrated Savina's 100th birthday with a mass and a party.

Savina was born October 27, 1909, in an adobe house in the Alamo Canyon in the Hondo Valley to Maria Chavez Salcido and Faustino Salcido. She had one sister, Monica, whom she lost to the pandemic of 1918, and seven brothers; Diego, Rafael, Faustino, Pedro, Jose, Proceso, and Silvestre. Another brother Cleto died at a young age.

Her early life was spent on the family homestead known as the Rancho La Laguna, where she sometimes helped herd sheep and goats alongside her brothers. She attended Hondo School but was pulled out of school continuously to help cook for her brothers and the crews that worked her father's sheep ranch. Eventually Savina left school before graduating to help her mother with family obligations.

She loved to play at the edge of the Rio Hondo, going for a swim on hot summer days, a tradition she continued many years later with her family at the Torrez swimming hole. She enjoyed dancing and horseback riding all over Hondo Valley, and having parties at her Hondo House, where she and her friends played guitars and fiddles, danced, and recited "dichos" and "versos".

Savina's mother, Mama Mariita, died in 1933, and Papa Faustino, her father, soon followed in 1935.

It was in the Hondo Valley that she met Eloy Torrez and married him on October 8, 1936 at the age of 27. They had 12 children: Dolores, Virginia, Mannie, Jennie, Monica, Cecilia, Maria Cecilia (deceased at five months), Eloy, Cecilia Frances, Rebecca, Maria, Presiliano, and Martha.

Over the years Savina worked diligently at Hondo School functions where she always supported her children in their education. After moving to Roswell, she enjoyed going to the Senior Center, crocheting hangers for everyone, visiting the sick and shut-ins, praying, walking to daily mass, and making tortillas for her many grandchildren. Into her nineties, she was still the center of family gatherings, joining in the dancing, Easter egg hunts, and Halloween costume parties. At the age of 95 in 2004, she was selected as the senior fiesta queen for the St. John Church annual San Juan Fiesta. She was also selected by the Roswell Daily Record as the person of the week, and the Roswell Hispano Chamber chose her and her husband Eloy as the Don and Dona for the annual PinataFest celebration.

As she has reached the century mark, she continues to pray for her family and sing her canticos every day at Casa Maria with her children. She enjoys company but some days she just needs her rest.

# Looking Back

*'Through Our Old NEWS files'*

As the **LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS** goes into its 105th year of being in existence (1905-2009), we will again be randomly publishing articles from old NEWS files. The following articles appeared in the *Lincoln County News* on ...

Friday, November 11, 1955

## Public Roads Must Be Open, Rules District Attorney

District Attorney C.C. Bhase, in a letter to Sheriff W.G. Bradley this week said it had come to his attention that "various landowners in Lincoln County are obstructing public roads by placing locks on gates on said roads to prevent hunters from using these roads."

The district attorney defined public roads and their use in the following communication:

"Please be advised that a public road is any road used by more than one person which is not located exclusively on privately held or owned land, which provides a means of ingress and egress to property owned by or under the control of some person or persons claiming exclusive right to use such road, and which has been in continuous use by more than one person for a period of one year. A locked gate placed on such a road constitutes an obstruction under the laws of this State."

"A landowner may prohibit hunters from hunting on patented or state leased land owned and controlled by him, but he may not obstruct a road through such land if that road leads to other land not under his control. In order for the landowner to prohibit hunting on the aforementioned owned or leased land, he must have previously complied with posting laws. Federal lands, that is forest reserves, etc., are not subject to posting under any circumstances."

"If any instances of locked gates are brought to your attention, please contact the person responsible for placing the lock on the gate and request its removal. If such request is refused, remove the lock by whatever means is necessary and file a complaint against the responsible party as provided in Section 55-6-2, New Mexico Statutes 1953 Annotated. This statute provided a penalty of not more than \$50 fine or imprisonment of not more than 30 days."

## The Folklore Corner

The F K Bar Ranch, the home of the Cadys on the Lower Penasco Creek in the Sacramento Mountains, was always open to any stranger.

One night when it was raining hard, a man and his wife, who apparently had been turned away elsewhere, found haven in the Cady home.

The man did not come to the table for breakfast until the others had finished eating. He drank only coffee for breakfast.

His actions made a memorable impression on Mrs. Rachel Floyd of Truth or Consequences, than a small child.

She remembers the man sitting at the head of the table, his eyes closed, his elbow on the table with his forehead in his hand, a cup of coffee in front of him.

Only Mrs. Floyd, her mother, and the wife of the stranger, a nervous woman, who seemed always in dread of something, were in the kitchen. The man sat there apparently oblivious of their presence.

And then, as if he could no longer help himself, he groaned and said:

"I can hear him crying yet. I can hear the boy crying yet."

With a child's curiosity, Mrs. Floyd asked who the stranger was talking about, and her mother shoed her out of the kitchen. As she was leaving, the stranger's wife laid her hand on his shoulder and quickly the man sat up very straight.

"Your coffee is getting cold," his wife said timidly.

After the strangers had gone, Mrs. Floyd asked her mother why the man acted so strangely. She remembers that her mother told her that the man had been suspected of taking part in the slaying of Col. A.J. Fountain and his 9-year-old son, Henry. It was said that the man acted that way often.

(Col. Fountain and his son disappeared in 1896 while returning to Las Cruces after attending a court term in Lincoln County. No trace of their bodies ever was found.)

## The Young Preacher

E.B. Candelaria of Placitas did his first preaching in 1902 at La Joya Spanish Methodist Mission while he was a student at Albuquerque College, a training school for Spanish Methodist mission workers.

At least once a month, sometimes oftener, he traveled by train from Albuquerque to La Joya

missioners on October 20th, Stewart alerted officials and the public to the changed hours of the Carrizozo branch of the U.S. Postal Service. On October 12th, the post office there began closing for an hour from 11:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon, and closing every day at 3:00 p.m.

Some problems with the keeping of inventory records that resulted in a finding in last year's audit are nearing a resolution, Stewart indicated. He said that members of his staff have received the necessary training to work with the TRIADIC Fixed Asset Bar Coding System.

"This automation of our receiving, transferring

and inventorying processes, along with the hiring of our administrative assistant for fixed assets, Michele Caskey, are designed to address our prior year audit findings and any findings in this area that occur in this year's audit," Stewart said.

The new process will allow the county to keep track of all "theft-sensitive" items that are valued at less than \$5,000, as well as property with higher values.

"We are very encouraged and will consult our auditors for ensuring that we are on track and accomplishing things that the Government Accounting Standards Board bulletins call for in the area of depreciation," Stewart said.

## IMLS Awards Grant to Survey Health of Museum, Library, Archive Collections

The condition of collection holdings of all museums, libraries, and archives in New Mexico will be assessed by a grant from The Institute for Museum and Library Services (IMLS). The grant was awarded to the New Mexico Museum Association and the Conservation Department, Museum Resources, Department of Cultural Affairs.

This IMLS grant will result in a report on the health of these collections in New Mexico and to conduct free two-day collections care workshops, and follow up on-site visits. All New Mexico museums, libraries, and archives are invited to participate in the workshops to be held at five museums across the state.

This grant is an IMLS initiative to raise

public awareness and inspire action on caring for our nation's heritage. Connecting to Collections: Statewide Planning Grants are used to create conservation plans for collections held in libraries, museums, and archives. The Statewide Planning Grants are an important component of the IMLS initiative, Connecting to Collections: A Call to Action, a multi-year, multi-faceted national plan.

The intent of these grants is to broaden the public's perception that what they view on the walls of a museum, for example, define that institution. Rather there are many behind-the-scenes actions, especially conservation, making it possible for these works to be seen and preserved for generations.

Nationally, 19 awards were given, with funds totaling \$908,206. There was also an additional \$621,073 in matching, private funds contributed by the recipients.

"I applaud these grantees as they take

action to combat the crises in collections care that threaten to rob our heritage. They represent a wide array of approaches to planning, from a system of conservation "circuit-riders" in Virginia working with small institutions across the state to the first-ever statewide preservation assessment of material culture collections in Utah." - Dr. Anne-Imelda M. 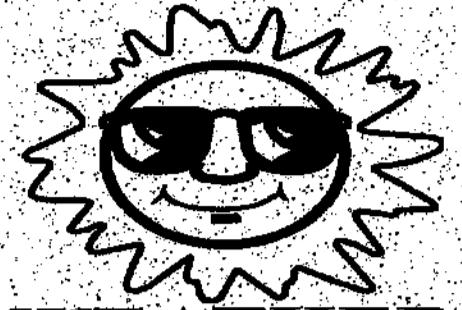
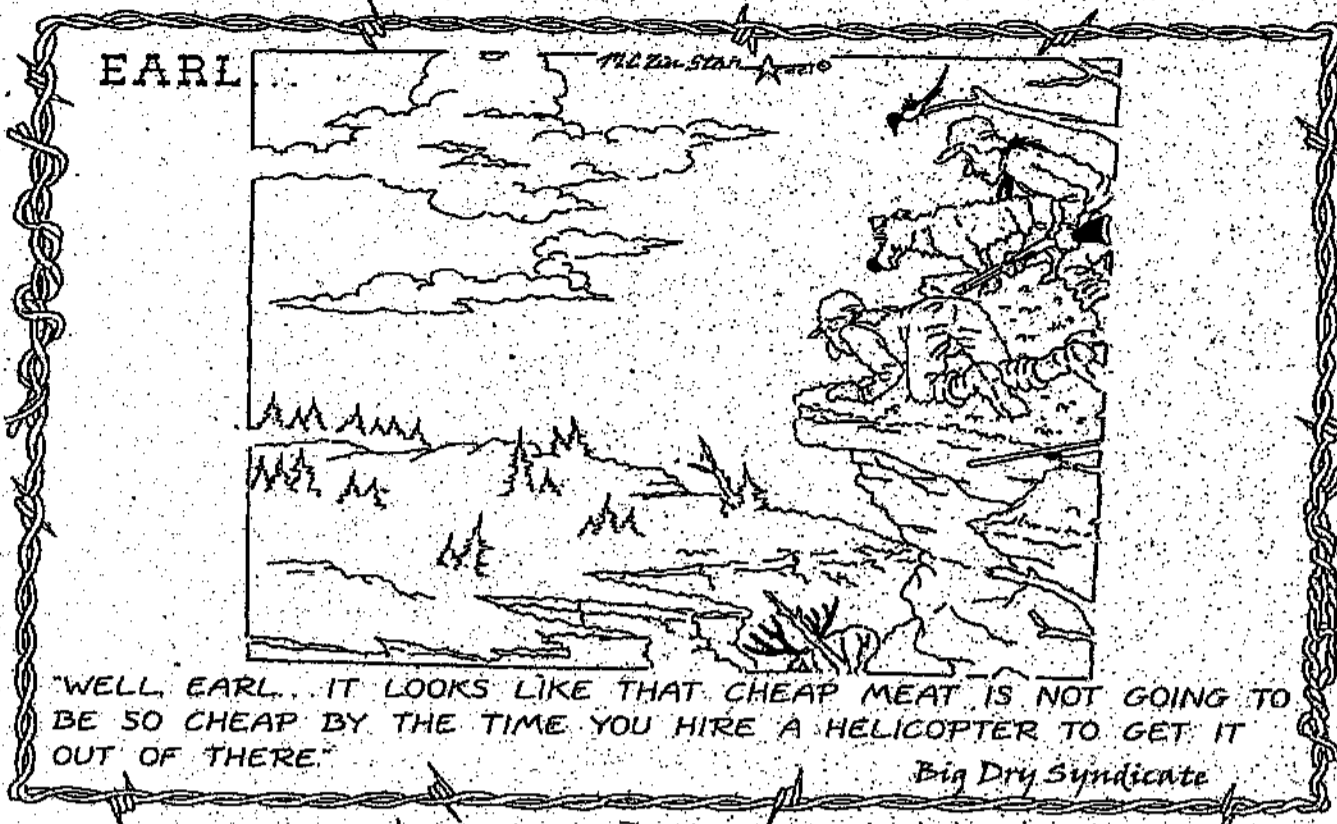

**\* Inside the Capitol**

**SANTA FE** -- We're not out of the woods yet. Have you noticed that our state budget deficit grows about \$100 million a month beyond projections?

Last March, the 2009 Legislature plugged a \$500 million hole. The budget reduction was projected to get us through until July 2010. But by August 2009 we were already over \$400 million further in the hole.

In September, that deficit rose to \$550 million and in October, it was \$660 million. At this rate, by January, when the 2010 Legislature convenes, we'll be another \$300 million deeper in the hole.

When will the slide end? New Mexico's economy runs behind the curve so the national picture will have to start looking better first. The way it's going, we'll have to start rooting for \$4 a gallon gasoline to return. Since our state's revenues depend so much on the oil and gas industry, that should take us back to financial health.

Meanwhile Gov. Bill Richardson is pushing back at those who make him the culprit for New Mexico's desperate economic situation. Even Democrats, most notably Sen. Jerry Ortiz y Pino, a lieutenant governor candidate, have criticized Richardson's big-spending ways for getting us into trouble.

Republicans are gleefully quoting the Democratic senator's remarks but Richardson reminds them that none of his bold initiatives could have happened without legislative approval.

Republicans loved the governor's tax cuts for the wealthy and many voted for his big economic development programs. But lawmakers are disregarding that information and the governor's contention that we're in a national recession that all states are experiencing.

Richardson's contentions are accurate although it must be added that some of the votes for the governor's initiatives were strong-armed with vetoes of opponent's pork projects. Pork is so important to nearly all lawmakers that they will acquiesce at the mere hint of a veto.

Why do lawmakers love their pork so much? Evidently nothing helps their campaigns for reelection more. Capital outlay projects are tangible evidence of a legisla-

tor's effectiveness. And do legislators really want to get reelected? You bet they do. They work very hard at it despite their protests that they shouldn't share in any financial cuts because they don't get a salary and can't really live on the \$159 a day per diem during legislative sessions.

Admittedly Santa Fe is expensive. Legislative per diem rates are tied to federal measures of the cost of living in the area. But off-season rates aren't as high in

Santa Fe and hoteliers are willing to give special legislative rates.

As for eating expense, a subsidized legislative snack bar is open all day serving very good food at reduced prices. In addition, there are a number of opportunities to be entertained by lobbyists or organizations over a meal.

Many lawmakers also say they lose a great amount of money from being off the job during legislative sessions and

On November 16 at 9:00 am in the Lincoln County Commissioners Meeting Room in Carrizozo, I will be holding another meeting on the animal ordinance to take comments from the general public. Please put your comments in writing, along with the section of the ordinance they address, which will be turned in to the County Commissioners along with a written general overview of all the comments made. You will be able to state them at the meeting. I am looking for comments directly concerning the animal control ordinance. Please do not include any comments about specific people or incidents. This committee is to bring to the attention of the commissioners areas of the animal ordinance that are not working and need to be updated to protect both the citizens and animals where this ordinance is in effect. If you like the animal ordinance the way it is please let them know - if you feel changes need to be made please let them know.

I am a member of Miracle's Paws For Pets, a local rescue group, however, I am doing this as an individual. Working with animals that are picked up, both locally, in Carrizozo, and in the unincorporated areas of Lincoln County, I have seen areas of the Lincoln County Animal Ordinance that just are not working. I have had people telling me of situations that are not addressed in the ordinance. The opportunity has come up to bring these to the attention of the County Commissioners. The County Commissioners have agreed to look at suggestions from the residents of Lincoln County, have not said that they would change the ordinance, but are willing to consider the possibility of doing so. Now is the time to let them hear your ideas and suggestions. Please take advantage of it in a nice polite way by addressing your comments to the ordinance alone.

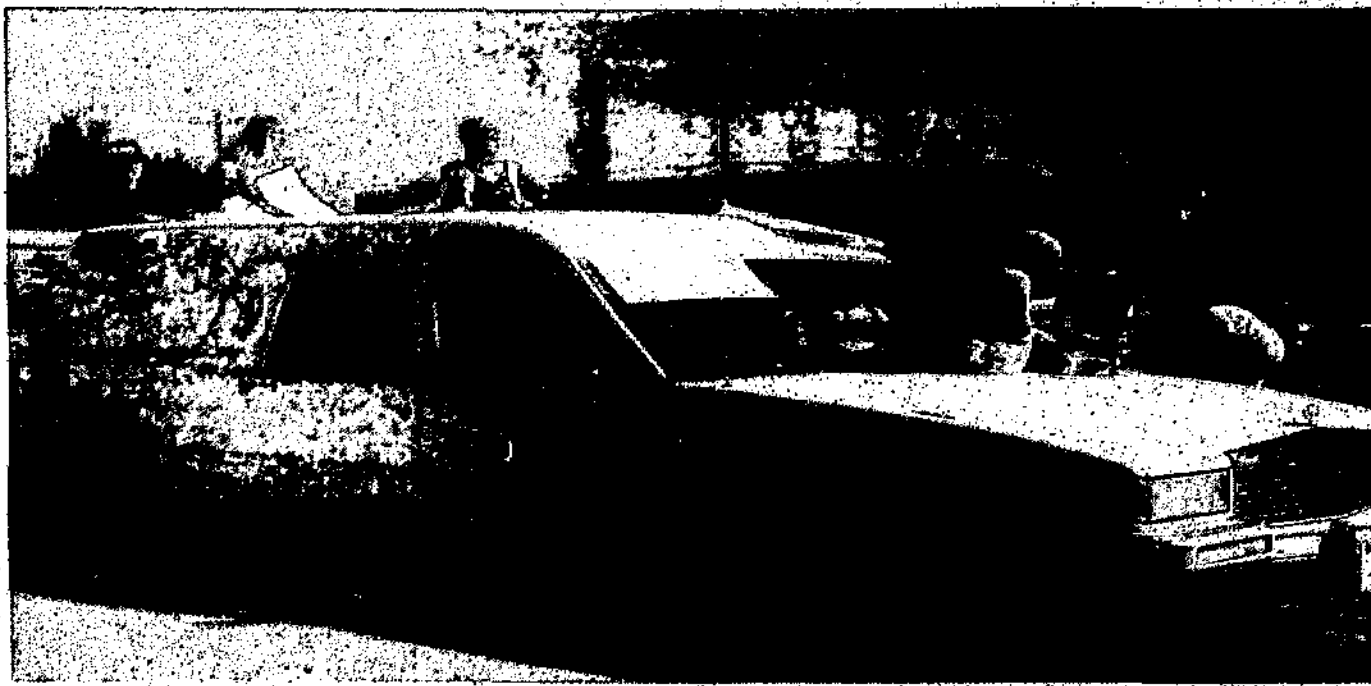

interim committee meetings. But something keeps them working very hard at getting reelected. Maybe it's just the desire to do good for one's fellow man.  
 On the positive side, New Mexicans are very fortunate to have one of the hardest working legislatures in the nation. Most states, in addition to paying their lawmakers a salary, also allow them to be in session for much of the year.  
 That means there's no hurry. None of them are as lazy as the U.S. House of Representatives that meets Tuesday morning through Thursday noon, but they certainly don't meet on weekends. National accounts of New Mexico's special session mentioned with astonishment that the session was starting on a Saturday.  
 Federal stimulus money is available to help balance this year's budget and provide jobs. But it won't be available next year unless the federal government goes deeper in the hole and authorizes more.  
 Some 2,000 road projects are underway nationally. Many of those are in New Mexico. That is very obvious to anyone driving about the state these days.

and was rowed across the Rio Grande to the mission on the west side of the river. There were between 40 and 50 families in the area, most of whom attended the mission services. Some of the older ones among the congregation said: "you are too young, how can you preach to us?"

"But," Candelaria said jokingly, "I was a good singer and they enjoyed my singing."

The young preacher had to stay overnight at La Joya. He could not spend the night in the railroad station, for the agent opened the station only when trains arrived. Candelaria spent many Sunday nights in the company of hobos along the railroad. They looked at him curiously because he was the only well-dressed one among them. He explained to them that he was a preacher, and the hobos never molested him. Later, he stayed overnight with members of the mission.

Dr. Thomas Howard, who had been a Civil War chaplain, was president of the mission school in Albuquerque. Candelaria finished his studies there in 1903.

After two years of student preaching at La Joya, Candelaria received an appointment to a mission in Cannanea in Sonora State, Mexico. From Cannanea he came to the Garfield mission for one year, and after that he went to a mission in Tucson. Then he served in Dona Ana, Socorro-Hillsboro, Clyde, San Marcial, and Deming.

After serving in Deming mission for some time, it became necessary for him to return home to take care of farming interests. He has lived for many years in Placitas, a small community just outside Hatch on the Deming road.

### May Start Mining Near Orogrande

The Alamogordo News reports that the Anaconda Copper Co. may be preparing for big scale mining operations in the Jarilla mountain range near Orogrande, 30 miles south of Alamogordo.

It was stated that A.L. Culver had sold 20 mining claims in the area to the Anaconda Company which has had a surveying party in the Jarillas for 90 days, and marked spots for drilling.

Ore in the Orogrande country is said to be of a complex nature, containing copper, gold, germanium, muscovite, mica, lithium and other radioactive minerals. Iron, sulphur, zinc, lead, silver, nickel and cobalt are also present.

There has been little mining activity in the Jarillas for a number of years.
