

# Carrizozo Begins Special District Process

The platted lots on the east end of the Valle Del Sol subdivision of Carrizozo will be modified from the original plan to increase lot size and create a natural zone along Highway 380.

The Carrizozo Trustees approved modification of the plat during Tuesday night's town council meeting. Some former one acre lots will become from three to ten acre lots with prescribed building envelopes to direct building away from the highway. A few other lots in the subdivision were reduced

in size due to the subdivider. Dan Dattola, deeding seven-tenths of an acre to a neighboring property owner.

"If he opened the barn door, he was encroaching," Dattola said of the neighbor. He said that giving the property to the neighbor was the easiest way to clean up the problem, rather than someone having to deal with easement issues.

"The cleanest approach was just to relinquish that seven-tenths of an acre," Dattola said. "So those lots on that side are smaller because we had to move the line."

The Carrizozo Trustees approved the plat modification unanimously.

Dattola also submitted a petition to establish a Special Improvement District in the Valle Del Sol subdivision. Carrizozo's legal counsel, Julie Anne Leonard, explained that acceptance of the petition is the first step in the statutory process of forming the special district.

"At this time all we can do is form an intent because there are specific things that have to be done, notice primarily to residents of Valle Del Sol, before we can have an actual formation

of the district," Leonard explained. "Now that we have a petition, tonight we can adopt resolution number one. It will form an intent to approve the district and determine how we're going to validate that New Mexico Land and Ranches does own '66 and two-thirds of the value of the district," she said.

The attorney explained that everyone who might be affected by the formation of the special district must be notified of the intent, including all property owners in the subdivision and anyone else that might travel through the subdivision to access property. The one known person who uses the

subdivision to access private property is Lincoln County Sheriff Rick Virden, Leonard said.

"If they benefit from the improvements, or maintenance of the improvements, they have to be notified as well," Leonard said. She explained that, although Virden doesn't reside in the Valle Del Sol subdivision, the developer has essentially paved the road to his property therefore providing a benefit to Virden.

Notices will be sent out to all who might be affected by the district formation, to inform them of the date and time of a preliminary hearing on the matter.

Dattola pointed out that each property owner in the subdivision has already signed a document indicating that they understand that a special district will be established, but Leonard said that the documents signed do not meet the statutory requirements for notification.

"We have to give them notice of exactly what's going to be assessed, who is included, how long it's going to be going on and how they can object if they choose to do so," Leonard said.

The first resolution to be adopted along the route to forming the district was approved and adopted by the Carrizozo Trustees on Tuesday night. That resolution recognizes the petition to form a special district, outlines the purpose of the district, identifies a person to validate the petitioner's ownership of at least 66 and two-thirds of the affected property and authorizes the gathering of information needed to complete and distribute the notices to the property owners of the intent

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



## Carrizozo Animal Shelter Hits Snag

After the completion of a set of architectural drawings for planned improvements to the Carrizozo Animal Shelter, mayor Bob Hemphill sought quotes from local contractors for the work to be done, but the process hit a slight snag when the actual cost was realized.

"We got the plans from Engineer's, Inc., and I took the plans to three local contractors, Ned's Plumbing, Ventura Plumbing and Heating and Ryan Roper Construction," Hemphill reported during Tuesday night's meeting of the Carrizozo Town Council. "All of the quotes came in too high."

Hemphill said that one of the contractors he spoke with declined to offer a quote for the project, the other two companies offered estimates of \$27,000 and \$24,000. Carrizozo's purchasing policies require that all purchases of more than \$20,000 be sent out for sealed bids, so the mayor said he would do so by the end of the week.

The town has been awarded \$30,000 from the county to finance the animal shelter work.

"I want that money spent before the 15th of June," Hemphill said. "We may hold a special meeting to accept the bids."

Without giving specifics, Hemphill said that the town has a little money to contribute to the project. The engineering work cost \$1,500.

Town trustee Dennis Dunnum asked why the mayor hadn't gone for sealed bids from the start, and Hemphill indicated that he had been surprised when the quotes came back as high as

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## Inmate Labor May Return to Carrizozo

During his opening statement of Tuesday night's Carrizozo Town Council meeting, mayor Bob Hemphill reported that he has been researching the possibility of bringing back a work release program in concert with the Lincoln County Detention Center.

"If no one is opposed, I will pursue putting the work release program back together," Hemphill said on Tuesday.

The program would allow inmates from the county owned detention center in Carrizozo to work for the town on clean up and maintenance projects. The mayor

said two of his biggest concerns regarding the program have been resolved. One of those concerns was the question of who should authorize inmate participation in the program and the other related to reimbursement for the labor.

"The statute says that they get paid or they get good time," Hemphill said. "There's another way they can be work released without doing that, and that's through the auspice of the detention center, where we don't do it, they do," he said.

Another issue to be dealt with is the matter of the qualifications of the town's

and the date of a preliminary hearing.

The second step in the process will be for the trustees to adopt a second resolution to actually form the district, Leonard said.

"We are mandated by statute to put that out for public bids," Leonard said. "We will put it up for an RFP (Request for Proposals), we will accept bids and, since the city wants to do the work, you have to meet or beat any bid that comes in. I don't think you're going to have a problem with that at \$100 per tract per year," she said.

A third resolution

will be required to establish who will do the work and how the assessment will work, Leonard said, then another public hearing will follow.

"This process is going to take a while," Leonard said.

The attorney said that the assessment of Valle Del Sol property owners for \$100 per year for maintenance of roads, parks, green spaces and other improvements in the district is not a property tax but a separate bill.

Carrizozo Mayor Bob Hemphill said that he had talked with Lincoln County

Treasurer Beverly Calaway, County Assessor Paul Baca and County Manager Tom Stewart regarding some assistance with the billing for the special district.

"They have no provision for billing for third parties," Hemphill said, "so we may end up having to bill it ourselves, and that's not the way this was designed. We're trying to find a way that they (the county) can send it out with their tax bills, but right now it looks like we'll have to do our own billing," he said.

Leonard said that, if the special district was set up like a property tax based on the assessments of real property, the town would have to issue bonds.

"I'm trying to skip the bond process because that's a lot of extra attorney fees and time involved," Leonard said. "We're just going to do a straight assessment. If we were actually doing this as a property tax, we could absolutely put it in with the property tax bills just like they do for paving districts and all kinds of things, but we'd have to issue bonds," she said. "I want to be very clear that this not a property tax, this is just a bill for maintenance."

According to the developer, there are about 180 property owners in the subdivision that will be included in the special improvement district, 15 or so of which have tapped into the town's water and sewage system.

The motion to adopt the first resolution in the special district process was passed by a unanimous vote of the town trustees.

In a related issue, the Carrizozo Town Council re-approved a lease with Valle Del Sol for the municipal golf course and club house.

"We have passed this twice already," Hemphill said. "The last time we had it changed from a five year lease with a five-year option

to 10 years with a 10 year option."

The mayor said that it had been understood by the town council that the lease was subject to approval by the state Department of Finance and Administration's (DFA) Board of Finance, but the mayor recently received a letter from Dattola's attorney Alan Morel requesting that the town council re-sign the lease agreement.

According to a letter from the DFA, the municipality is not required to have the lease approved by the state after all. Apparently as a result of confusion over the requirement for state approval, the signed copies of the lease agreement have spent approximately the last year on someone's desk in Santa Fe and have been lost.

"It got on somebody's desk up there and disappeared," Hemphill said. "Now what we have to do is re-approve and re-sign the exact same lease effective January, 2008," he said. "We have copies of the lease, but we sent the signed copies so they could stamp the originals and get them back to us."

A motion to re-approve the lease, with the same terms and conditions as originally set, also passed unanimously.

# "Looking Back"

Through Old 'NEWS' Files

As the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS goes into its 104th year of being in existence (1905-2009), we will again be randomly publishing articles from old NEWS files. The following articles appeared in the "Lincoln County News".

January 8, 1970

## Ranch Life in Lincoln County Was Struggle

Centennial Story  
by Lacy Simms

Sun-up, June, 1905, a drab front-door knock at the ranch home of Dr. J.M. and Anna Lacy Simms, Joe Wingfield, our neighbor: "Put on your britches, Lacy, and show me where to put this beef steak!" Tied to the back of his saddle was a hind-quarter of beef. Our ranch neighbors did this several times during our six years in southern Lincoln County. They knew of our straightened circumstances.

Our family had moved from Hopkins County, Texas, early that year, hoping that my father might regain his health. It was a struggle from the start, George Hyde, who sold to us, hadn't been able to make it. We soon learned that we couldn't live from selling alfalfa, vegetables, fruit, and eggs from the three irrigated acres and the forty acre pasture, even though we had our own milk, butter, chickens, eggs, fruit, and vegetables.

The Luciano Chavez family lived just across the north branch of Three Rivers Creek, three hundred yards away. The Lincoln, Otero County line ran between our houses. They spoke little English and we spoke no Spanish, but we became fast friends. They shared frijoles and chile with us. From them I had my first bite of dried green chile. It was so hot that I have often said that when I had to spit it out, it started a grass fire. Mrs. Chavez was formerly Lucas Crawford, wife of Andres Crawford.

Without other near-by Lincoln County neighbors, the Ellises, Calfees, and Nabours west of us, and the Sheffy and Truax families who were raising angora goats north of us, we would have been very lonesome. The Joe Wingfields, Frank Goodins, Fred Crosbys, and Joe Blackwells, all with children, to the south of us, meant just as much to us. Widow Susan Barber and her right-hand man, Pompey, were further away to the southwest.

Most of the above ranchers, together with all Mexican families along the river ere being bought out by U.S. Senator Albert Bacon Fall and began to leave before we did in 1911. Fall had already bought the Pat Coughlan ranch and land leases near the El Paso and Northeastern Railway depot and so was building up a great land-cattle empire, beginning at the northwest side of the Mescalero Apache Reservation and extending to the south end of the Malpais on the west. Only one rancher, Pete Crawford refused to sell to Fall.

Pete was born in 1883 near the Lincoln County line, and just recently sold to Thomas Fortune Ryan III, who bought the Fall property.

In 1906 Father secured the \$50.00 a month rural route contract for carrying the mail from the railroad depot to the Three Rivers post-office, ten miles east at the south end of the Godrey Hills. There J.W. Blackwell, postmaster, had the only store between Tularosa and Carrizozo. The mail contract, plus credit at Joe's store, enabled us to remain in Lincoln County.


When Monroe Harper just east of us, put in 40 acres of apples, there was less and less irrigation water for us. His hogs ran loose and ate most of our watermelons. Nevertheless, we were glad that the Harper children, Jim, Greichen, and Rachel, were there.

No one had electric lights, telephones, or refrigerators. Mail order catalogues were as indispensable as family Bibles. The County seat at Lincoln and Titsworth's store at Capitan were an over-night trip away.

The nearest dentist was 40 miles away. My brother Denton decided not to put up with tooth-aches, left home, found work in J.W. Prudes store at Mescalero, got near to a dentist, and found a wife, May, daughter of the Reformed Chruch missionary, the Rev. Richard Harper.

The only school was two miles south, elementary, one teacher, a post I held in 1907-09. There, under my instruction, my youngest brother,

they did. "Who would have thought that four dog pens were going to cost 20 thousand dollars?" Hemphill asked. "I had no idea it would cost that much."

He added that, because the engineer's drawing shows the work in phases, contractors will be able to bid the work in phases as well. He said the base bid would include repairs and upgrades to the interior of the shelter facility and the east side kennels, an alternate bid would be for the west side kennels.

In another matter, the Carrizozo Town Council approved an amendment to the town's animal control ordinance that changes the date upon which animal license fees are due to January 1st. Prior to amending the ordinance, annual license fees were due in March.

"The reason that they were originally done starting in March was because that's when the rabies clinics came around," Hemphill said. "One of the people from city hall would go sit on the back of the pick-up when the vet gave the shots and catch them right there," he added.

Carrizozo animal ac-

tivist Barbara Culler said that it would be much easier for pet owners to remember to pay the fees at the start of the year.

The license fee is three dollars per year for an animal that has been spayed or neutered, and five dollars for one that has not, and a current rabies vaccination certificate is required. For animals vaccinated and licensed for three years, the fees are tripled.

The Carrizozo Trustees unanimously approved the amendment to change the due date for animal licenses to January 1st.

## Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- Pluto has officially been declared a planet again -- but only in New Mexico -- and only on Feb. 18, 2009, although New Mexicans always will consider Pluto a planet.

On Feb. 18, Rep. Joni Gutierrez, of Las Cruces, introduced House Memorial 40 in the New Mexico Legislature restoring Pluto's planet-hood for a day in honor of the 79th anniversary of the discovery of Pluto by Clyde Tombaugh on Feb. 18, 1930.

The memorial, proclaiming "Pluto is a Planet in New Mexico Day," was immediately debated and after some good-natured questioning of the sponsor, it passed unanimously.

Pluto lost its planet-hood four years ago at a meeting of the International Astronomers Union in Prague, Czech Republic. The action came at the end of the meeting, after many scientists had left. Controversy quickly erupted.

Some American astronomers charged that the action was taken as a poke in the eye of the United States for its shabby treatment of science during the George Bush administration. Pluto is the only planet discovered by an American.

But the IAU had better reason than that. Better telescopes were discovering other bodies in Pluto's neighborhood exhibiting similar characteristics. It was either reclassify Pluto or add an indefinite number of new planets to the solar system.

But the new definition has problems, one of which could eliminate some additional planets. So the debate continues as Pluto support societies form around the world.

New Mexico is where Pluto should expect its most support. Although Clyde Tombaugh discovered Pluto as a young man at Lowell Observatory in Flagstaff, Arizona, his long and distinguished career and all his retired life took place almost totally in New Mexico.

Another hotbed of Pluto support is located in Streator, Illinois, Tombaugh's birthplace, which holds festivals and other events in Tombaugh's honor. Flagstaff has never shown interest in recognizing its part in Pluto's discovery.

Rep. Gutierrez's memorial also mentions Tombaugh's sightings of several unidentified objects in the sky near Las Cruces. It is not unexpected that astronomers would be more likely than most to sight strange objects in the sky.

In fact, Tombaugh was surprised there had been so few. Dr. Lincoln La Paz from the University of New Mexico was one of the few others to publicly reveal their sightings.

Tombaugh charged that some other astronomers were being unscientific by not revealing their sightings publicly or for not entertaining the possibility of their extraterrestrial origin and nature.

In other astronomical news, Discover Magazine

currently has an article on the Sloan Digital Sky Survey being conducted at Apache Point Observatory, in Sunspot, New Mexico, 18 miles south of Cloudcroft.

The 10-year survey, nearing completion, so far has confirmed the existence of dark matter and dark energy, discovered cannibal galaxies, dwarf companion galaxies, the Milky Way, confirmed a major Einstein prediction and observed structures in the universe measuring a billion light years across.

It is by far the most ambitious sky survey ever undertaken. And it's right here in New Mexico. If you've never taken the beautiful drive from Alamogordo, through Cloudcroft, to Sunspot, you must do it. You'll pass through the state's only tunnel along the way and see some beautiful mountain peaks and canyons.

The scientists won't let you look over their shoulders at Sunspot but they have an excellent museum and do a great job of interpreting.

The huge dishes of the Very Large Array telescope west of Magdalena are a sight to behold.

Besides these installations that are part of the public's knowledge, New Mexico also has many other sky search projects, which aren't so well known. New Mexico State University and New Mexico Tech are on the cutting edge as are top secret observatories at Kirtland Air Force Base and the Los Alamos National Laboratory.

Eugene, learned to read and write, and later became a practicing physician for 36 years in Alamogordo.

As for social life, my sister Mary, teenager, had but one girl friend of her age, Florence Nabours. She finally found another congenial friend, Grace Spence, at Carrizozo, whose father was a lawyer and ran a furniture store.

There were hoc-down barn dances at the school house and at Blackwell's store. And all-night and breakfast dance at Mrs. Ellis's ranch was unforgettable, certainly to her two Calfee nieces. Her husband had been killed in the Lincoln County War.

We were really thrilled when our historically important V.I.P. neighbor, Mrs. Susan Homer McSween Barber invited our community to a baile. She was known as the "Cattle Queen of New Mexico". After McSween's death in the Lincoln County War, she had married George Barber. She divorced him in 1897 and moved near to the Three Rivers area of Lincoln County. After selling to Fall in 1917, she moved to White Oaks where she was buried in 1931.

By 1907 our Morgan-breed horse, shipped from Texas, had grazed his teeth to the bone and died of starvation. My younger brother, Donald, then needed a horse for carrying the mail. How we came by two horses is quite a story. The Mecalero Indian family, the Shantas, lived near the northwest corner of the Apache reservation. "Shanta-boy's" wife, after three days in labor, couldn't give birth, and in desperation, Shanta, forty miles from the agency doctor, came to our sick father for help. The Caesarian operation father did in the tepee, removed the dead fetus and saved her life. It was his last medical service.

For the above mentioned service Department of the Interior sent father a check for \$100.00; but "Shanta-boy's" gratitude was greater: and she gave us a black colt which within eighteen months was helping to carry the mail.



