

Water Rights Adjudication Forum Scheduled

The University of New Mexico Institute of Public Law, at the request of the state legislature, will be conducting a series of public forums to gather comments and concerns regarding the state's processes and procedures in the adjudication of water rights. One such forum will be held in Roswell on Saturday, July 18th, at 11:00 a.m. at East-

ern New Mexico University. There are several issues associated with water rights adjudication that will be considered, including the possibility of establishing a comprehensive, state-wide registry of water rights. Currently, a water rights registry is developed only through court proceedings of adjudication. That process often takes years, sometimes decades, to resolve water rights disputes.

Information provided by the Institute of Public Law points out that the current water rights adjudication process, although expensive and time consuming, produces no data that could be readily used to enforce water rights in other ways. Adjudication primarily involves the Office of the State Engineer (OSE) and consists of identifying possible water rights claims and establishing their validity.


The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) and the OSE will focus on four tasks regarding New Mexico's water rights and adjudication processes. First is to identify anyone claiming to have a water right in the State of New Mexico, as well as the nature and extent of the claim. Each claim must then be evaluated to determine whether or not it is legally based. All disputes between a water rights

claimant and the state have to be resolved, either through negotiations or court action. All other claimants must have an opportunity to object to the claims of others within the

same basin, and those objections must also be resolved either through negotiations or the courts.

How the state goes about accomplishing those

C'zozo Preliminary Budget Approved

In his regular monthly statement to the public and Carrizozo Trustees, mayor Bob Hemphill reported on Tuesday, July 14th, that the town's preliminary budget has been approved by the state. The only issue with the budget was what the state deemed an overestimation of revenues from property taxes. Hemphill said that the preliminary budget included revenues from the taxes of the Valle Del Sol subdivision, but the state has not yet tabulated information about those taxes.

"They reduced our income by \$10,000, approximately," Hemphill said. "That left us over \$1,000 in the black."

Hemphill said he chose not to challenge the state's opinion and will have the budget adjusted to show the change. Once the Valle Del Sol tax information is processed by the state, the revenues will be added back into the budget, he said.

The mayor also distributed a chart of gross receipts tax revenues for the town, which show a significant drop from the previous year.

"By June of this year,

we took in \$204,875.80 total gross receipts," Hemphill said. "If you look back to 2007, we took in \$362,361.19. We're down \$120,848.97."

He said that the town had to do a lot of trimming and didn't spend a lot of the monies it had budgeted because of the fall in revenues.

The charts provided illustrated two big spikes in gross receipts revenues in 2007, which Hemphill attributed to construction projects at the Valle Del Sol subdivision.

"They ordered a lot of pipe and culverts and things, and (the developer) told the company that he would order those only if they paid their gross receipts in Carrizozo," Hemphill said. "Those two spikes really helped in '07."

Hemphill said that by not replacing Jim Payne, the town's water system manager, and not hiring a third officer for the Carrizozo Police Department, the budget has balanced in spite of the drops in revenues.

In another matter, the mayor reported that the town has no policy regarding non-employees riding in vehicles owned by the town. He asked the trustees to consider the adoption of an official policy to address that issue, and said

he would review the town's insurance policy to determine whether or not non-employees in city vehicles are protected.

"I know the county has a waiver that anyone who rides along with a deputy has to sign," Hemphill said. "We need something in writing."

The issue will be an action item on the town council agenda for August and will probably also address the personal use of town equipment by employees.

"I can remember in the old days when it was allowed for town employees to use town equipment on their own private property, as long as they did not use it to hire themselves out and earn money," Hemphill said. "I can remember people talking about that, but there's no written policy."

The mayor also thanked *The News* for providing a front-page notice to Carrizozo residents informing them of a temporary water shut-off.

"Starting at about 9:30, we got calls, 80 or 60 of them, asking 'why is my water pressure so low,' and I said read the *Lincoln County News*," Hemphill said.



tasks is the subject of the public forums. The AOC and the OSE have researched the processes used by the states of Colorado, Idaho and Montana and have acknowledged that

the New Mexico adjudication process is unique among western states. In New Mexico, a possible water rights claim is determined by the use of aerial

photography, the examination of historical records and the gathering of field survey data. In other states, according to the Institute of Public Law, everyone must file claims identifying their water rights by a mandatory deadline. Claims are then evaluated for validity by a state water agency.

The Institute of Public Law has issued a list of some of the benefits and drawbacks of the approach that would require claimants to file their water rights with the state. It is suggested that the change would speed up the process of identifying water rights, ensure that ownership information is recorded accurately from the beginning, afford claimants a sense of control or empowerment in regards to their water rights and possibly save in the expenditure of state resources.

Drawbacks of the approach include placing the burden for filing on the claimant, creating confusion among claimants that could result in legitimate water rights claims not being filed and favoring those who have more time and money to devote to making their claims.

If it is determined that the best approach for identifying water rights claims is to require every claimant to file the claim with the state, a change in state law would be necessary. Some method would have to be established to provide claimants the necessary technical assistance in filing claim forms. That assistance could come from an assigned independent agency that holds water rights records and survey information, or from the OSE. If the OSE were to become the agency providing assistance, the role of the OSE would be changed so that it would not represent the state in water rights adjudication. The office of the state's attorney general would assume the role of state representative in adjudication proceedings. A third option would be for the state to fund a separate agency to provide technical assistance to claimants. The forums will also

seek opinions regarding the potential penalties that could, or should, be imposed for the failure to file one's water right claim on time, should filing become a requirement.

Another option to be considered in the means by which water rights are identified would be to initiate a program through which the state would investigate and license water rights claims. The licensing process would allow for the determination that a claim is legitimate before the claimant enters into any court proceeding, and would serve to develop a reliable data base of water rights. The background work involved in licensing would be designed to develop more complete water right records and facilitate in adjudication.

Some of the potential benefits of the licensing approach include a reduction in the amount of time spent in court because the basic details of a claim would be determined before going to court. Licensing would also provide claimants with documented proof of state recognition of the claim.

Among the possible drawbacks of the licensing option would be an inability to challenge the claim in a later court case once the license has been accepted by the claimant.

The fourth step for adjudicating water rights in New Mexico is for each claimant to get a chance to object to other claims within the same basin. According to the Institute of Public Law, it is the New Mexico process of staggering the key stages of adjudication that result in long, drawn out court cases. The opportunity to object to a neighbor's water right is delayed until all claimants rights within a basin have been decided.

A proposed change in the process would allow all involved persons to object to a water rights claim as it is being evaluated by the state. Any legal issue affecting the claim would also have to be resolved at that point, rather than waiting for subsequent proceedings that could occur many years later. The change would require that all objections to each claim be heard in a single court hearing.

It is suggested that the benefit of such a change in the way disputes are resolved would be that issues could be settled as they arise, rather than waiting for all claimants to be joined as defendants.

Drawbacks include problems connected with notification of parties in remote areas, especially if notices of hearings and decisions were to be issued electronically.

Another possible change to the way the state handles adjudication of water rights claims would deal with water organizations, irrigation districts and acequias. Currently, each individual claimant of a water right must participate in the legal process. A change for consideration would be to issue a single license or adjudicate a single water right for the organization on behalf of its individual members. Individuals would retain ownership of their rights, but the organization could act as a representative of all of the members. Such a change would require that some method also be established to deal with disputes among individual members of the organization.

This approach could result in a reduction of the time spent on adjudication, and eliminate the potential need for each individual to pay for his or her own legal services. Members would also be given an opportunity to represent themselves, separate from the organization, if they so desired. Drawbacks of this approach generally would be associated with complications with pending disputes or disputes among organization members.

As the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS goes into its 104th year of being in existence (1905-2009), we will again be randomly publishing articles from old NEWS files. The following article appeared in the "Lincoln County News"

Thursday, July 19, 1962

One Spring Day in Carrizozo, the Year 1914 or Bar W vs. E.P. & S.W.

The short drama which we are about to unfold, took place in Carrizozo one day in the Spring of 1914.

As was customary in those days, the largest shipment of goods for the different business houses over town, arrived by rail, and the draymen of the town, Joe R. Adams, Meyer J. Barnett and Roy Textor, saw to it that perishable merchandise was delivered first. The last and most valuable shipment to arrive that week, two days just before pay day for the E.P. & S.W. railroaders, was a large consignment of cases of whiskey, kegs of Beck beer and bottled light beer packed tight in straw in stave barrels. The draymen worked incessantly those two days, delivering that treasure from the depot platform to the four saloons over town, Campbell's Saloon, the Star, the Headlight, and Joe P. Romero's on the Eastside.

Coincidentally, pay day fell on Saturday for both the railroader and the Bar W cowboys.

The cowpokes had little or no sleep the night before, in anticipation of what was in store for them the following day in the way of merry making. They could hardly wait and by opening time, they were lined up at the door of Campbell's saloon waiting for the sound of the gong and destruction, which they had not dreamed of or even had a premonition.

They had taken a big jump on the railroad boys, who had to wait until a few minutes before noon, when the train with the pay car coupled to its rear, arrived from El Paso. When those boys got their pay envelopes and made it to Campbell's, the cowboys were already "four sheet in the wind" and some were playing poker, while the others were punching the bag, singing, dancing and weeping to the sentimental strains of "La Paloma" by Damian Holguin and Pablo Telles.

Gunslinger Charley was the most polluted of the lot and when the railroad lads were lined at the bar pouring drinks, the resented their intrusion and unleashed a stream of very unbecoming language at them. He kept it up until Bill

Leggett, a big, husky engineer, could take no more and walked up to Charley and tried to pacify him in a gentle way. Charley was too far gone for reasoning of any sort, and he squirted tobacco juice in Bill's face. Leggett clipped him one on his beak and Charley sprawled on the floor. His compadres intervened and that started a free-for-all. The cowboys were at a disadvantage from too much liquor, and the best they could do was to topple over poker tables, chairs and even the stove, when they hit the floor. They were a bloody mess, while their antagonists didn't have a scratch.

Charley got to his feet and someone conked him on the noggin with a brass spittoon and he landed outside of the door. He soon regained his feet and with blood streaming from his face, he staggered around the corner of the postoffice and headed straight to the back of Ziegler's Store, when he had his horse tied to a hitching rail. He had a boot top strapped to his saddlehorn, where he carried his 45 Automatic. He got the gun and started back to the saloon, pointing that mean gat in every direction. When he got to the door, he stumbled and went into the saloon crawling on all fours, but he didn't lose his grip on that menacing gat. Bartenders Tice and Sandoval ducked behind the bar, but before he had a chance to do any damage, his companions disarmed him and sat him in an arm chair and began doctoring him with wet towels and hot whiskey toddies. He passed out completely and was taken to the back room and there lay flat on his back.

Word had been flashed to the saloon of the impending danger and the railroaders being fully aware of Charley's reputation with a gun when drinking, and now coiled and ready to strike, they had scattered to the four winds and had not even checked the bulletin board for their turns out of the terminal. They went in seclusion and

The mayor said that several people told him they don't read the newspaper because it never says anything nice about Carrizozo.

"That made me mad," Hemphill said.

The mayor said that the comments about the newspaper prompted him to review the past several issues of *The News* to see just what had been published about the town.

"They do say good things about the town," he said, and added that the newspaper published out of Ruidoso has also provided good news about Carrizozo events and activities.

"I think the newspaper gets a bad rap if they report the news as news and not cherry-picking," he said. "I want to thank the press for the coverage they give us. Even the bad things have been spotted," he added.

Although the recent "Clean Up Day" in Carrizozo did a lot for cleaning up Carrizozo, it was not a financial success, Hemphill commented.

Almost 22 tons of yard and household waste was disposed of, not including the metals. The disposal cost a total of \$1,773; about \$100 was donated by private individuals to help cover the cost, Hemphill said.

"Financially it's not worth it, but it made the town a lot cleaner," he said.

Heavy rains on the evening of the 4th of July made the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce's fund-raising efforts a bit of a disappointment, the mayor said, and made a big mess at the festival site at the Valle Del Sol subdivision. He reported that the inmates from the Lincoln County Detention Center work-release program headed by Tommy Guevara had participated in a clean-up at the county fairgrounds, and also helped to clean-up the Valle Del Sol site after the Fourth of July.

One volunteer assisting with the fireworks display suffered minor bruises as the result of a defective pyrotechnic device, Hemphill said, and there is now some talk of looking into hiring a professional company to handle the fireworks in the future. Hemphill said that he asked Carrizozo Fire Chief Walter Hill to investigate the feasibility of hiring professionals.

"It may be cost prohibitive, but it would be nice

for the firemen to be able to sit and watch the fireworks," Hemphill said. "Walter said he's been doing it for 15 years."

A new 1,000 gallon storage tank is in place at the Carrizozo Municipal Airport, and all citations regarding fuel storage have been cleared, the mayor reported.

The current stage of improvements to the Carrizozo Animal Shelter are 97 percent complete. Improvements funded in part by a \$30,000 grant from Lincoln County included the addition of four outdoor kennels with drainage and cleaning access, isolation panels in all of the kennels, electrical work and security fencing. The shelter is still in need of some additional electrical work, a ventilation and heating system and some construction to seal the building to prevent rodents, bats, birds and bugs from infesting the facility. The town of Carrizozo currently has no funding for the next stage of improvements.

Carrizozo resident Barbara Culler, a member of the animal shelter committee and founding member of Miracle's Paws for Pets, asked if the town could get a comprehensive accounting of the treatment received by and fate of the animals transferred from the Carrizozo shelter to the Humane Society facility in Ruidoso.

After a renegotiation, the cost per animal delivered to the Ruidoso facility has been reduced from \$200 to \$125, but Culler thinks the town should know exactly what it's paying for and how the animals are managed after leaving the Carrizozo shelter.

Citizens wishing to see what changes have been made at the shelter should contact Carrizozo Police Chief Rachel Weiser for permission to access the facility.

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

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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE -- I always enjoy all the July 4th tributes in the newspapers at this time every year. My favorite this year was one by Colin Powell, whom I wish would have been on the ballot the last three presidential elections.

He said the older he gets, the more he appreciates the Declaration of Independence. He said his favorite sentence is "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

This wasn't the reality of 1776. It was merely a dream, an experiment. No other nation in the world had ever achieved such a thing. Powell says he finds new meaning in the sentence every time he reads it.

Marc Simmons had an interesting column on New Mexico's first July 4th celebrations. Just as we and El Pasoans claim the first Thanksgiving celebration in 1598, well before Jamestown and Plymouth, we also can claim July 4th celebrations before New Mexico became a territory of the United States.

Simmons says in 1825, American traders in Taos put on a showy parade around town. The claim was made that Taosenos were delighted and shouted "Viva la Republica." Simmons wonders if maybe they were cheering the Republic of Mexico instead.

It sounds logical to me. The Americans didn't have a flag so they made one with our eagle on it. Since the Mexican symbol also is an eagle, Taosenos may have been glad to see the Americans adapting to local ways so quickly.

It would be over 20 years before the Norteamericanos would come marching in to take over. And when they did, Taosenos were the first to rebel, killing and scalping our first governor.

Every so often, someone comes up with the suggestion that the nation should change its national anthem. The current one spans nearly two octaves while most people are good for only one. The words are about bombs, war and bloodshed, not American values. And the melody is an old English drinking song.

Columnist Michael Kinsley took the occasion of the Fourth to suggest some alternate anthems. His first suggestion was "America," which he suggested should be called "My Country, 'Tis of Thee" because America

doesn't appear anywhere in the words.

If using the tune to an old English drinking song is bad, how much worse is using the melody to "God Save the King/Queen" -- as in King George, from whom we were trying to wrest our freedom?

Most of us now are proud of our country's English heritage but one would hope we could be more original. Besides, the lyrics are a little weak for a national anthem. I'm not sure about words like 'tis and sweet.

Irving Berlin came up with some nice words and music for "God Bless America." Kate Smith practically made it a national anthem, belting it out before hockey games. Major League Baseball often uses it during the seventh inning stretch. Some would object to God being in there. But every president uses the phrase to say, "My speech is over."

Two Americans collaborated on the words and music to "America the Beautiful." The tune is lovely and the words to the many verses are exceedingly appropriate.

My favorite of the alternatives is "Battle Hymn of the Republic." It's a bit

martial and religious but particularly inspiring. It appears in church hymnals I have seen but since "one nation, under God" passes muster, this should too.

The problem is that it was a Union marching song during the Civil War and might not be too popular in some parts of the South as soon as the word got around.

"Proud to Be an American," also called "God Bless the USA," would be extremely popular with those shunning the "Battle Hymn of the Republic." But it would upset many others.

My preference is to keep what we have. As an instrumental or sung by a trained voice, I think it's great. During medal ceremonies at the Olympics, it is the most stirring anthem of any country.





In the Village of Capitan's Fourth of July parade, this tuba player displayed the nation's colors in a prominent fashion.







the incoming crews had to double-time to keep the trains rolling on schedule. Charley was also well-known for knocking birds off fence posts with that gatg without a miss.

Charley came to late that afternoon and putting his hand to his bruised and aching head, he asked for a double shot of whiskey. "I don't care what happened to me, just so my horse is awright." "You didn't ride no horse here; you came in here crawling and brandishing a gun. Sheriff cole, will be after your hid good and proper, for you pointed that gun at every woman and kid on the street. Don't you remember?" "The only thing I remember is when George and Ed had hold of that critter's ears and when I straddled him, I flew over the corral and landed in that water trough." He was delirious.

"Charley, don't you remember bouncing up and down on this floor like a beheaded rooster? If you call that thing behind Kiegler's a horse you'd better go and take care of him before the vultures takes possession. You haven't fed nor watered that carcass for two days and two nights and you can count his ribs from his shoulder blades to his flanks."

Charley took one more swallow and went to look after his nag. He found him haggard and bleary-eyed and in such a state of emaciation, that he dared not ride home for fear it would disintegrate on the spot. He led him very gently to Charlie Steven's Livery Stable and asked them to stuff him with hay and oats. "I think you can stand a little stuffing yourself", said Bill booth, the livery chambermaid. "No," groaned Charley, "I'm not a bit hungry, but I could go for some sleep if you have an empty stall." "Follow me", said Booth and he bedded him down in a corner of the stable in a nice soft bed made of gunny sacks with a sack of oats for a pillow. He woke before daylight, dunked his head in the water trough, saddled his pony and rode out of town in the direction of the Malpais.

On another drinking spree, Charley locked himself in the old 'dobe' and wouldn't let anybody in. When those outside were insistant and kept pounding on the door with their fists, he emptied his automatic at the door, but luckily no one stopped one of his bullets and nobody was hurt. Joe Lopez stood in the line of fire with an old dish pan, which was perforated twice but the bullets ricocheted and missed Joe by a hair's bre adth.

In later years Charley acquired his own live stock, and he became very moderate with his drinking, carousing and mannerisms. When he sold everything and rode his pon out of Carrizozo for Arizona, from where he had migrated to Lincoln County, he still carried that boot top strapped to the horn of his saddle.

To put a tms to our story, let us remind you that the railroaders never again frequented a saloon when the cowboys were in town. They knew darned well what to expect in a future encounter, for they had taken those cowpokes to a cleaning when they already had two strikes against them.

Jet Rustin was the last of the cowboys of the old Bar W outfit and he reamiend with the company as fence rider and handyman until he passed away a few years ago.

Other cowboys of that era were; Uncle Pete Johnson, sons Tom, Ira, Pete and Carrol; Ed Harris, George and Jet Rustin, Anton Vega, Frank Phillips, George Whitaker, Bob Crenshaw, Les Harman, Joe Stratton, Charley Lemon, Bill Yates and many others whose names we cannot recall.

All have gone to the last roundup, with the exception of Ira Johnson, and possibly Gunslinger Charley, if he left John Barleycorn alone and behaved with that gat in Arizona country.
