

Carrizozo Medical Clinic Sees Changes

Suzanne Dennehy, Family Nurse Practitioner, is leaving the Carrizozo Medical Clinic as of September 4. Dennehy has been with the clinic for two years. The Carrizozo Health Clinic, which includes a medical and dental clinic, is managed by Presbyterian Healthcare Services in Albuquerque.

Dennehy has accepted a position working for Dr. Deborah Hewitt in Ruidoso.

"This is a great opportunity for me, one I feel I couldn't pass up. This is an opportunity for me to focus on providing women's health, improve my gynecological skills and do so in a creative work environment," said Dennehy. "I'd like to thank Presbyterian and LCMC (Lincoln County Medical Center in

Dennehy provided medical coverage at Carrizozo Health Clinic four days a week and at the Corona Health Clinic every Wednesday.

"Suzanne is a product of her own success. She deserves a tremendous amount of credit for her commitment and dedication to providing care throughout Lincoln County and we're thankful for everything she's been able to accomplish," said Al Santos, Lincoln County Medical Center Administrator.

Santos said that LCMC and Presbyterian are committed to the communities served by this clinic.

"We're determined to locate another provider as soon as possible

who will be just as good a fit for Carrizozo and Corona. Until then LCMC Medical Director Dr. Gary Jackson and Dr. Tim Harkins will provide coverage. We wish Suzanne well as she accepts this new opportunity," said Santos.

Lincoln County Medical Center is a county-owned facility leased by Presbyterian Healthcare Services. This partnership has existed since 1972 and is dedicated to improving the health of individuals, families and communities.

Lincoln County Medical Center and Presbyterian Healthcare Services operates a hospital, six clinics and a countywide ambulance service. Lincoln County Medical Center employs more than 250 people, including more than 15 providers throughout Lincoln County.

Ruth Road Residents Want Slower Traffic

Paul Travis, a Lincoln County resident living on Ruth Road in the Nogal/Bonito area, asked the county commissioners on Tuesday for some help in dealing with speeders.

"We have a real problem," Travis said during the public comment portion of Tuesday's meeting of the board of county commissioners. "We have dust that just about chokes us half to death. That's caused by speeding."

Travis indicated that the county was not interested in posting additional speed limit signs on Ruth and LaMay roads.

"I thought if they put two more stop signs on Ruth Road, one coming and going, that we could slow that traffic down," Travis said.

He estimated that some drivers travel at speeds of 50 to 55 miles per hour along the gravel roads, and reported that a roll-over occurred on LaMay Road on Monday evening. He said a woman with a young child was traveling at about 45 to 50 miles per hour and lost control of the vehicle.

"My dilemma is how to slow down these people that are speeding," Travis said. "They don't seem to care about my grandchildren, and I certainly wouldn't go in front of their house at that speed and disregard their dogs and children."

He said that the predominant summer winds blow dust from the road directly at his home on about five out of seven days each week.

County commission chair Tom Battin suggested that Travis speak to the county manager and Lincoln County Road Superintendent Albert Hernandez to see what possible remedies can be applied.

County Holds CDBG Hearing

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners held a public hearing on Tuesday to gather ideas from the public regarding the county's 2010 application for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). County manager Tom Stewart stated in July that his first choice among possible projects for CDBG funding was a new health clinic in the Village of Capitan.

The citizens of Lincoln County own the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) in Ruidoso and health clinics in Carrizozo and Corona. A community healthcare clinic owned by the Hondo school district is leased to the county. Operations at the LCMC, ambulance services throughout the county and the Carrizozo and Corona clinics are managed by Presbyterian Healthcare Services

(PHS) through a lease contract with the county.

The privately-owned Rose Clinic in Capitan is also leased to PHS for its operation and management, but that contract does not involve Lincoln County in any way. Because of its private status, the Rose Clinic is not eligible to receive funding from a mill levy tax that supports the clinics in Carrizozo, Corona and Hondo.

Dora Batista, of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District, Council of Governments, began Tuesday's public hearing by explaining the CDBG program, its history and eligibility requirements.

"The Small Cities CDBG program was established under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act," Batista told the county commissioners. "Its state and national objectives require that assistance be made for activities that address one of the following:

that the primary beneficiaries be 51 percent low-to-moderate income, the project aids in the prevention of slum and blight, or that the project addresses an urgent need that is currently threatening the health and safety of the residents.

"The New Mexico Community Development Council is responsible for allocating these funds. This consists of appointees by the governor, representatives of the Environment Department, the Department of Health, the Department of Finance Administration (DFA), the governor's office, and then one from each of seven regions," Batista said.

Counties and small municipalities are eligible to receive CDBG funding for qualifying projects selected by the Community Development Council. Water associations, sanitation districts and various non-profit organizations cannot apply directly for CDBG funding.

but counties and municipalities can apply on their behalf.

More than half of CDBG funding is allocated for community infrastructure improvements, projects like water and sewer system improvements, water storage, sidewalks, storm drainage, traffic control and street lighting. Health and social services and economic development projects might also qualify for funding through the CDBG program, but the required matching funds that an applicant must provide are at greater percentages than for other types of projects. Qualifying entities can only use CDBG funds for one project at a time,

and funding cannot be used for general operations or to upgrade public buildings, except to make those buildings compliant with standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Funding can be for as much as \$500,000. Rural applicants are required to provide at least a five percent funding match; non-rural applicants must contribute at least 10 percent.

Projects are rated by the Community Development Council based on need, the number of people that would benefit from the project, the amount of money contributed to the project by the applicant and the level

of citizen participation in the process. Batista said that other aspects of community operations are also being looked at during allocation hearings, with applicants being asked questions like "what are your water rates, what are your sewer rates and are you self-sustained?"

Batista reported that, according to data compiled by the department of Housing and Urban Development, just less than 40 percent of Lincoln County residents fall within the low-to-moderate income range.

"As a whole, Lincoln County doesn't meet the 51 percent criteria," Batista said. "But, if you selected a project that targeted a specific group, or a specific type of beneficiary, and we collected the income data and certain demographics and they reached 51 percent or more, then the project would qualify."

Certain subgroups within the population are automatically qualified to benefit from CDBG funding, Batista said. Those subgroups include senior citizens, the homeless, battered women and handicapped children.

Batista explained that the requirements for funding eligibility under the slum and blight criteria have been tightened. Communities now have to prove that at least 25 percent of its buildings or utilities are dilapidated. Qualifying under the urgent need criteria requires supporting documentation from a state agency verifying that a project must be done immediately, she said.

After Batista's presentation, Stewart reported that he has been working with Capitan Mayor Sam Hammons in consideration of a combined senior citizens center/healthcare clinic. The Village of Capitan was awarded a \$500,000 CDBG last year, funding that will be used to build a new senior center there, Stewart said.

The manager has reserved \$200,000 of county funds to support the construction of a new healthcare clinic in Capitan. He said on Tuesday that the \$200,000 would be more than enough to meet the matched-funds requirement should a CDBG be

awarded for the project.

"The only area that I think I may need assistance with is getting the low-to-moderate income (data) for the clinic," Stewart said. "That's not information that can be shared from the clinic itself. That's the only hurdle I see in going forward with the Rose Clinic proposal."

Information regarding the income levels of patients using the Rose Clinic over the past 12 years will be needed to determine whether or not the project will qualify for CDBG funding based on the 51 percent low-to-moderate income criteria, Batista said.

At the time of the last census, about 47 percent of the population of the Village of Capitan fell within the low-to-moderate income levels. The village qualified for a \$490,000 CDBG award for a new senior citizens center because the project targeted limited clientele, senior citizens, that automatically qualify, regardless of income levels.

Stewart said that he and Hammons have discussed plans to build the new Capitan senior center near its current location, and said that there may be an opportunity to save some money by sharing architectural services for the senior center and the clinic design.

"The idea would be to build the senior citizens center, then the clinic. Once the center is built, destroy the old one and turn that into parking for the clinic," he said.

"And the mayor has agreed in principle, subject to his council, to deed the necessary land to the county for the clinic, so we could have a combined kind of facility," Stewart said. "If we don't get the CDBG project, then we could come up with our own funds, by hook or by crook, but we'll do the project," he said. "If this had been shovel-ready, I would have been submitting a different AARA application," he added.

Preston Stone, chairman of the Rose Clinic Advisory Committee, told the county commissioners that the people of Capitan were led to believe that the privately-owned Rose Clinic would begin to receive mill levy funds after the last mill levy election was held. He further said that, while the Rose Clinic building was adequate for current operations, the 1960s-era structure needs to be replaced.

"It's on the boundaries of meeting the code," Stone said. "The people of Capitan were led to believe that, on passing the mill levy, a new Rose Clinic would be built in Capitan. This was our understanding, whether it was a gentleman's agreement or what it might be. We feel like we kind of got lost in a horse trade when the senior citizens was approved for a CDBG grant and Nogal was placed on the agenda instead of the Rose Clinic and it wasn't approved," he added. "We feel like we got lost in the political arena somewhere."

Stone indicated that no one from the Rose Clinic Advisory Committee had been made aware of the discussions between Stewart and Hammons regarding a combined senior citizens center and clinic. He told the county commissioners that first thing people look at when they come into a community is the church, then the school, and then the medical facilities.

"The last thing you want to do, if you build a

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New Machine Enhances Services at Hospital

The Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) Auxiliary donated a new bone density machine to the county-owned hospital in Ruidoso on June 22. A bone density test is a non-invasive procedure that lasts approximately 15 minutes. The test includes scans in three primary areas where bone loss typically occurs; the wrist, hip and lower back.

"I think this machine will really enhance women's services primarily but also older men as age increases the risk for weaker bones that can result in fractures," said LCMC's director of patient care services Patsy Parker, RN MSN.

"This new machine will greatly improve early detection for bone weakness and loss which will benefit many Lincoln County residents and visitors. The Auxiliary has really outdone themselves this year," Parker added.

Parker added that this machine provides better quality scans, is significantly faster and more accurate than before.

Bone density machines use x-ray technology to check bone quality and strength.

Typically, bones tend to weaken with age. Primary physicians refer these tests and adults who believe they are at risk should consult their physician. Adults with a family history of osteoporosis or women who have finished menopause are considered higher risk individuals and should be checked once every two years.

Statistics from the International Osteoporosis Foundation and National Osteoporosis Foundation have shown that vertebral and hip fractures are doubled and two and a half times greater respectively with just a 10 percent loss of bone mass.

Osteoporosis affects an estimated 10 million women in the U.S.

The LCMC Auxiliary has agreed to pay for the machine with donations raised through the LCMC Thrift Shop in Ruidoso.

This donation is one of many throughout the years as the volunteer organization has contributed more than \$1.2 million towards equipment and furnishings for the hospital. Earlier this year, the Auxiliary donated \$200,000 towards state-of-the-art equipment and new furniture for the Therapy Center adjacent to the hospital.

"We realized that this machine was needed so it was real important for the Auxiliary to help," said Maxine Roberson, Auxiliary President. "This was made possible by generous donations to the Thrift Shop and

the many customers that buy the items," Roberson added.

Roberson said that the hospital had requested the Auxiliary's assistance approximately in May and pays invoices directly for equipment.

"I'm thrilled that the community continues to support the thrift shop so that the hospital can improve when needed," Roberson said.

"This machine is the gold standard for bone density machines," said Ken Hunter, LCMC radiology manager. "This should be a real convenience as residents can stay right here and be screened with a high quality machine," Hunter said.

"This machine allows reports and scans to be sent electronically," said Hunter. "This brings us one step closer to total electronic records as

related to radiology and imaging," Hunter added.

Hunter said that LCMC has two employees certified on this machine and tests can be scheduled between 1 - 4 PM Mondays through Thursdays at LCMC.



SANTA FE — With a special legislative session to balance the state budget now a sure thing, the big question is who takes the hit? Does the pain get spread evenly or will it be prioritized?

With state government over \$400 million further in the hole than predicted six months ago, Gov. Bill Richardson and legislative leaders have agreed that a special session is necessary, probably in October.

The governor had hoped to avoid the session but the shortfall is big enough it is dangerous to use all our reserves to plug the gap. And the deficit would be even worse without the federal stimulus money the state has received and that won't be available next year.

The plan is for a task force, representing the governor and legislative leaders, to agree on a proposal to be presented to a one-day special session. Some lawmakers have expressed opinions that the plan is overly optimistic, unless the proposal is extremely simple.

But considering the number of proposed solutions voiced by legislators and interest groups, the solution may not be simple.

Gov. Richardson and legislative leaders have said everything is on the table but tax increases. To that, the governor has added his desire not to furlough or lay off any state employees.

But some legislative leaders, who have addressed the subject, aren't willing to rule out furloughs, layoffs and a reduced number of vacation days.

At least some lawmakers are upset that the state employees union and those representing county, municipal, school and university employees have filed suit challenging the constitutionality of docking their pay 1.5 percent to make up for a similar reduction in the public employer contribution to employee retirement.

The state employees' union and a child advocacy group have suggested numerous ways the state can generate additional revenue through increased taxes on high incomes, large corporations and removal of tax exemptions and deductions given to small interest groups.

The proposals are accompanied by compelling rationale but none will get anywhere because each proposal is opposed by a strong lobbying corps that would extend a legislative session much longer than a day.

That means sacred cows like education may

take a hit. Twice, Senate leader Tim Jennings, of Roswell, has written to school superintendents and university presidents warning them that education must be willing to share the pain.

Public schools comprise roughly 50 percent of the state budget. Colleges and universities add another 10 percent. So a small hit on them would raise significant revenue.

But educators argue that they already took a hit during the regular legislative session early this year. Federal stimulus funds are the only thing that got them close to last year's support level. They wonder if Jennings has sent warning letters to other departments of state government.

Schools are getting some editorial and community support around the

state contending that they should be the last place to cut. What other recipient of state funds holds bake sales and collects box tops to make ends meet?

The most popular place to cut seems to be in areas controlled by the governor. Lawmakers argue that without the necessity of legislative mandate, Richardson could be reducing state agency spending, tightening his hiring freeze and cracking down on double-dippers who retire and then return to state government.

And the sorest point of all is the governor's hiring of hundreds of non-essential employees outside the state personnel system. The hiring freeze hasn't reduced those numbers at all.

brand new medical facility in a community, is place it on a back street where no one can observe it," Stone said. "It's an improvement not only to your community, it's advertising for the government funds that are being placed forth in communities and being spent by the taxpayers dollars."

Stone said he hoped that the county commissioners, Stewart and Hammons will include the Rose Clinic Advisory Committee and the LCMC administrators as they plan for a new Capitan healthcare clinic.

County commissioner Jackie Powell reminded Stone that the Nogal Mutual Domestic Water Users Association project was chosen for representation by the county in its CDBG application for 2009 because it was the only project submitted for consideration.

A physician's assistant from the Rose Clinic said that no one at the clinic was given any notice from the county regarding last year's CDBG hearings, so no one showed up to request funding for a new clinic. She said the biggest problem at the Rose Clinic was that the facility receives no mill levy funding.

A woman in the audience who said she was part of a local domestic violence response team suggested that a recreational facility that encouraged healthy living might be a better use of taxpayer dollars. She also asked the county commissioners to consider seeking funds to create affordable housing for low-income citizens.

The board of county commissioners took no action regarding the CDBG application. Applications are not due for a few more months, and funding for approved projects will not be awarded until March, 2010.
