

County Passes on Fiscal Agency Request

A request from the nonprofit organization HEAL (Help End Abuse for Life) to have the county serve as the fiscal agent in an application for legislative capital outlay funding was denied by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners in January.

HEAL leases and operates the county's first and only domestic violence shelter, The Nest, located in Ruidoso Downs. The county owns the building that houses The Nest and has served as fiscal agent for the organization in previous requests for funding. HEAL executive director Colleen Widell submitted the request for a fiscal agent in hopes of applying for \$225,000 in capital outlay

funding from the state to complete a parking area, perimeter fence and gates at the shelter.

In response to Widell's request, county manager Tom Stewart issued a memorandum to the board of county commissioners in which he recommended denying the request. Stewart cited the circumstances of the state budget and the fact that the application for funding is not currently part of the county's Infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (ICIP) as reasons to deny the request.

"The project was not in our ICIP, not discussed with me prior to January 6, 2010, and I question the validity of spending county effort in lobbying for the project when we lost funding for the Glencoe Fire Station because we did not

have an existing third-party contract at the end of October," Stewart wrote in the memo and added his recommendation. "In light of the dire circumstances of the budget at the state, deny being fiscal agent for the project for this legislative session."

During the January 12th meeting of the board of commissioners, County commissioner Dave Parks said that he had recently attended a meeting with two state representatives and two senators during which he was told that the legislature would not likely be awarding capital outlay funds this year.

"They said there ain't no money," Parks said. "One of them in particular, Senator Rod Adair, you know is the daddy for funding for HEAL, so when he

says there's no money...I would love to get that fence, but I think we'd just be spitting into the wind."

Widell acknowledged that she had been informed that there would only be nominal capital funding awarded by the state legislature this year, but said that the HEAL board of directors wanted to apply for funding anyway. It was pointed out that HEAL likes to stay on the radar of state legislators as much as possible. Widell explained that the desired fencing would be constructed to secure the entire property of The Nest, and is part of the final construction phase.

County commissioner Jackie Powell told Widell that the state withdrew funding to the county for a structure to house a firefighting apparatus in

13 Years of Volunteerism Keeps Capitan Library Going

Thanks to a lot of hard work from some very dedicated volunteers and support from the local community, the Capitan Public Library has had a wonderful year, according to Dr. Larry Miller, who presented a report on the activities and status of the library during Tuesday night's Capitan Village Council meeting.

"There are about 35 individuals in this community that make that library work," Miller told the Capitan trustees. "These volunteers are committed to the library. It's still an all volunteer library, there are no paid staff; we operate basically on the goodness of the volunteers," he said.

The library now holds about 13,000 items for loan to the public, thanks in a great part to private donations. Miller said that when the library receives donations of items that are already included in its inventory, the duplicate copies can be sold in a number of fund raising endeavors that the library holds each year. A permanent book store was added to the library last year.

Now into its 13th year of operations, the library is estimated to serve about 900 patrons every month through almost 7,000 volunteer hours annually. Recent renovations have been done to the library's conference room, office area and the backyard which now has a deceptively green carpet of artificial turf and presents a welcoming environment year-round.

"If you haven't been to the

library to see that, you'll notice that there's a lot of difference in the way the office area looks, and the backyard is just really spectacular," Miller said.

The newly renovated conference room is bringing a variety of groups and organizations to the facility, Miller said. The Lincoln County extension office, the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, the Bureau of Land Management and the Capitan Women's Club have used the conference room; it has also been used as the venue for a yoga class and meetings of a prayer group.

"They ask to use our library during library hours or, a lot of times, it'll be after hours," he said. "A lot of clubs and organizations have benefited from the use of our library, and that's something that we've expanded this year."

The Capitan Public Library has hosted a number of computer classes designed for users of all degrees of aptitude. Another class is scheduled to begin this month, Miller said.

"If you're interested in learning some more computer skills, there are classes at every level that are available in the library. Just go by the library, look at the list and see where you fit in," Miller suggested. "You can still sign up for (computer classes) this month."

Two of the library's volunteers received special honors in 2009. Library director Pat Garrett was named the Capitan Chamber of Commerce's Citizen of the Year, and Tom Mann received the New

Mexico Library Association Amigo Award for his engineered design of the library's new addition, which doubled the size of the library and was completed in 2009.

"Pat has been there for about 10 years. The number of hours that this lady puts in at our library, I don't think anybody could duplicate it," Miller said. "She's really been great."

The library has an extensive list of regular and special activities that go on throughout the year, and it is those special activities that help raise enough money to keep the library operating. Among the regular activities that keep people young and old coming back are the monthly after school children's reading programs, the First Friday of the Month adult lecture series, weekly pre-school reading hours during the school year and summer reading programs when school is not in session.

Special activities at the library include a plant and garden sale in conjunction with Mother's Day in May, and a book, bake and hot dog sale during the village's annual Fourth of July celebration. The Capitan Public Library also participates in a village-wide yard sale in partnership with the Capitan Chamber of Commerce and holds a Christmas Holiday Bazaar during which a large variety of handmade items for home décor, plants and baked goods are sold. Miller said that the library's volunteers are so dedicated that they not only make the items to be sold at the bazaar, they also purchase a great deal of

items for their own use. "All of the money that is raised at those fundraisers goes continu-

ally back into the expenses of the library," Miller said. "Without the fundraisers, we could not exist."

He told the Capitan Trustees that private donations are down slightly from the year

before, probably due to the state of the current economy.

"The library operates on a kind of tenuous approach because we have to just respond to whatever happens," Miller said.

The library's second-hand thrift store, the Not 2 Shabby Shop, has been in operation for three years now, and provides resources for not just the library in the way of funding, but also serves the needs of the Capitan community and the surrounding areas through in-kind donations of clothing and household goods to families in need.

"If you haven't gone there, you have missed a bargain," Miller said. "If you can't walk away from there without a deal, you didn't look very hard. It does a lot to help our library, and has helped us to be able to pay off that mortgage."

The mortgage on the original library building was completely paid off in 2009, partly because of the 50 or so people that shop each day at the Not 2 Shabby Shop, he said, many of whom are regular customers who check each day to see what new items have been added to the shop's inventory.

The thrift shop is open three days a week and also staffed entirely by volunteers. An average of 14 volunteers dedicate about 230 hours per month to keep the shop running. The shop has provided more than \$8,000 worth of merchandise and in-kind donations to the community over the past year, including women and families who are aided by The Nest domestic violence shelter in Ruidoso Downs. The Not 2 Shabby Shop was named the Capitan Business of the Month in January by the Capitan Chamber of Commerce.

"One of things that we do through the Not 2 Shabby Shop is that we give in-kind donations to different people in the area, depending on their need. Sometimes we have families that have lost everything because of a fire. There are women that come out of the HEAL (Help End Abuse for Life) program and just need clothing," Miller said. "We do all kinds of donations, mainly to Capitan residents. It's due to a group of committed people that want to make this thing work. One thing I can say about our library is that the people there have done such an outstanding job of continuing to give support to it."

The library's thrift shop also provides space for e-waste collection for the community, sponsors a donation box for American soldiers in Iraq, including boxes for the Adopt a Soldier Program and collects school supplies for children.

The library recent-

ly had to spend \$2,500 to replace a worn out furnace.

"It's those unexpected expenses that keep things on edge for the library," Miller said. "It's one of things, just like your house. You just work

with it, replace it and go on. Just deal with it."

Capitan Mayor Sam Hammons said that he was glad that the village was able to help support the library, calling it "the crown jewel of Capitan".

Glencoe. County commissioner Tom Battin asked if HEAL could still apply for funding if the county chose not to act as fiscal agent for the project.

"No, we can't receive those funds independently as a nonprofit" Widell explained. "It's an application from HEAL, but it's through the county."

Stewart further explained that serving as fiscal agent for the project requires a written commitment from the county saying that the county owns the property and will administer the project and any funding awarded.


"We would have to do architectural plans and go out for bid, administer the money and own the project" Stewart added.

Parks said that all HEAL was asking the county to do was to fill out the application and send it in.

"We wouldn't have to do the plans and administer the money unless we got the money," Parks said. "All they're asking us to do is fill out the application and send it in. Let's make the application. All they can do is say no," he commented, then made a motion to have the county accept the request to serve as fiscal agent.

Battin seconded the motion, but it failed to pass when county commissioners Powell, Eileen Sedillo and Don Williams voted it down.

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE - To the surprise of many, state senators voted overwhelmingly last Saturday to ax \$130 million of pork projects that were approved in previous years but weren't going anywhere.

It is a sign of how seriously senators are taking the budget balancing process. This column has opined on several occasions that lawmakers must share the budget-deficit pain with taxpayers, public employees, schools and state agencies.

We suggested cutting legislative per diem and travel but cutting their pork will be much more painful because lawmakers believe that pork is what gets them reelected.

Pork money is for community projects but lawmakers think of it as theirs because they can take credit for bringing it home. And if the money is for a building, they might even get their name on it.

People who are closely tied to those local projects won't be happy with their senators who didn't go to the mat to save the projects. But senators don't have to run this year. It may be more difficult, however, for House members to vote for the cuts.

We may see a much closer vote on the pork withdrawal in the House because representatives all have to defend their seats this year.

But what do New Mexicans really want? Do they want those local projects more than they want a balanced state budget? Since the law requires a balanced budget, that means either more taxes or fewer government services.

Last year, a coalition of education groups commissioned a survey that found New Mexicans

would prefer a tax increase to cuts in public schools. If that is what House members are hearing from their constituents now, they may pass the pork cuts easily also.

The elimination of pork projects constitutes less than 10 percent of the \$1.4 billion of the stalled projects around the state. The projects included in this cut are those that never have gotten to the point of letting any kind of contract on them.

Amazingly there are some 1,500 such projects. What happens is that the amount of pork money allocated to each legislator often isn't enough to fund the total project. So the money sits there waiting for more to be added the following year. Often it takes several years to fully fund a project.

What a way to run a railroad. The states that have their act together have created agencies to analyze capital outlay needs statewide, prioritize them and then fund them beginning at the top of the list.

Such a logical procedure is not likely to ever happen in New Mexico. Alan Hall, an Albuquerque attorney, has suggested an alternate procedure in which lawmakers could bank their pork money. Lawmakers could then borrow and lend from their accounts in a more orderly fashion.


Our current system of allocating capital outlay funds argues for setting legislative term limits. If pork money is so important to reelection, we should limit the number of times legislators can be reelected. In that way, legislators could focus more on what is good for the state rather than on taking home as much pork as possible.

In recent good economic times, over \$1 billion of pork per year has been split up among each of the 112 legislators and the governor. That is money we certainly could use now to balance the state budget deficit of at least \$600 million.

The vote in the Senate was 36-4 to take back \$130 million of the \$150 million originally in the take-back bill. The other \$20 million was for projects that communities were able to produce sufficient documentation to indicate a contract already has been executed.

Four senators voiced objections to the cuts contending that rural and Navajo areas of the state received more than their share of cuts.

The current scarcity of building funds also presents an opportunity for the state to examine its tendency to overbuild.




