County's Animal Control Ordinance Reviewed

Whether or not the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners should amend the county's animal control ordinance has been under debate for months now. During its February regular meeting, the board accepted a compilation of the comments and recommendations gathered from local animal lovers, protection activists and agencies by Carrizozo resident Barbara Culler.

At that February meeting, the board of commissioners indicated that they would familiarize themselves with the suggested changes to the ordinance, and county manager Tom Stewart has, in a recent memorandum, suggested that the issue be brought up for discussion again this month.

Culler has stated that participants in the drafting of potential changes to the ordinance, including herself, see the ordinance as a teaching tool as well as a means to protect not only the human residents of Lincoln County but also the animals they keep.

"If local government and the people did everything just right, we wouldn't need an ordinance," Culler told the county commissioners. "But it doesn't and people need guidance," she added. "We've tried to encourage spaying and neutering in

several different ways because it's been found throughout the country that the main way (pet overpopulation) can be controlled is through spay and neutering."

Some of the changes under consideration are additions to the ordinance's definitions section. Documents presented by Culler first suggest that the encouragement of spaying and/or neutering pets be included in the stated purpose of the ordinance. The addition of definitions for animal fighting, commercial kennels, sufficient exercise areas, as well as what defines a dangerous dog or animal cruelty has also been recommended, as has the addition of language defining euthanasia and euthanasia technicians.

Likely to be the most controversial change among the recommendations is in the section of the ordinance titled Identification Tags. The ordinance now states that no licensing of pets is required by the county, but collars with identification tags are encouraged. The recommended change, if adopted, would make licensing mandatory for all dogs and cats over three months of age, and require proof of a current rabies vaccination. The licenses would be good for three years and cost \$25 for an intact animal, \$3 for animals that have been

spayed or neutered. Fees could be waived for seniors and low-income residents.

It has also been suggested that the required amount of time that an animal is held in impoundment before being euthanized be increased from three days for an untagged animal and five days for a tagged animal to 10 days for all animals. New sections should be added to the ordinance, some say, to establish space requirements for kennels and sanctuaries and to specify acceptable means of restraint, including when the animal is traveling in the bed of a pickup truck.

The addition of fines for things like allowing an animal to run at large, neglecting or abandoning an animal or not getting a pet vaccinated has also been recommended.

Culler expressed the importance of licensing pets for identification purposes, especially in the many cases of lost animals that occur every year in Lincoln County. She explained that animal control facilities that destroy dogs and cats after only three days sometimes simply don't allow enough time for the animal's owner to be found, or for a good adoptive home to be provided. That is why the recommendation of extending the holding time was recommended, she said.

County Supports Film Industry, Not Necessarily Incentives

In February, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners heard a plea from Dirk Norris, President of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, to voice their dissatisfaction with a legislative attempt to reduce perks for the film industry in New Mexico.

Norris told the county officials that two of three bills introduced this year, designed to reduce or cap incentives to the film industry, were brought into the legislature by representatives of Lincoln County, Dennis Kintigh and Tim Jennings.

"I believe these two legislators don't represent the feelings of the people of Lincoln County," Norris said. "They certainly don't represent the feelings of the people of Carrizozo."

He asked the county commissioners to notify the governor and the state's film office that they are in favor of the film tax incentives and support the film industry in New Mexico.

County commissioner Eileen Sedillo said that she thought the film industry has been good for New Mexico.

"There's a lot of other places that the governor needs to be cutting, instead of things that are going to help the economics of New Mexico, because it's already in a bind," Sedillo said.

County commissioner Jackie Powell said that she was on the opposite side of the fence.

"I realize the governor could do other things, but that's not where it matters," Powell said.

Sedillo said that the film industry has helped a lot of New Mexico's young people, giving them direction and insights into what's going on outside of the state. She also commented that the tax incentives for the film industry may have served to attract film com-

panies to work here, but now that the state's been discovered, they might not be necessary for much longer.

"Eventually they'll come here without any incentives," she said.

Norris said that, while there have been movies made in New Mexico for many years, without incentives there will not be as many made here as there will be with the perks in place.

"They will go to the other 47 state that offer tax incentives," Norris said. "I think that when they first introduced the tax incentives, the number of films being made in New Mexico quadrupled."

Norris explained that the film industry gets a 25 percent tax credit for monies spent here during production.

"If they spend four million dollars, including the taxes, they get 25 percent of that back, which is one million dollars," he said.

County commissioner Dave Parks said that the incentives are tax rebates combined with subsidies.

County Commissioner Don Williams said that, if the word being spread by the local film commission can be believed, representatives of the film industry are elated by the variety of possibilities for filming in Lincoln County, and the industry has just begun to take off in the state.

Norris added that five films have been produced in Lincoln County since the early 1990s.

Several comments were made regarding the budgetary woes of the state, and county manager Tom Stewart said that no programs should be taken off the table of potential budget cuts.

The board of county commissioners elected not to officially object to possible cuts to the incentives for the film industry, but to support film making in New Mexico.

Powell commented that the suggestions presented to the board of commissioners were good, but opined that more regulations equate to huge costs to the county. She didn't support her comments with any actual figures regarding costs, and said that, while the current animal control ordinance is not perfect, it's not a perfect world that we live in.

"I want the sheriff's department concentrating on the problems we have with crime," Powell said.

Culler responded by saying that the ordinance should be used to assist the sheriff's department. She further suggested that agencies contracted by the county to hold animals that are picked up by animal control officers can be required to comply with the ordinance. The county currently has contract arrangements with the Humane Society of Lincoln County and the town of Carrizozo.

County commissioner Don Williams asked if the recommended changes to the ordinance would require ranchers who have a lot of pets to license them all.

"What would you consider a cat that's a mouser, a cat that you keep around just for mouse control?" Williams asked.

Culler said that the proposed ordinance changes would distinguish between feral and domestic cats and would not require licensing of feral animals.

Powell again referred to her opposition to government involvement.

"Out in the county, bigger government, especially like this, is not good," Powell said. "There's a lot of districts where you can go miles and miles before you even have a neighbor."

Curt Temple, Lincoln County Planning Director, told the county commissioners that one of the recommended changes to the ordinance, an added section about conditional use permits, could not be accomplished.

"First of all, there's no way we could issue a conditional use permit. That's only based on if you have a land use ordinance in your county or city," he said. He added that the county could not afford to notify every resident living within a 1,000 feet of the property owner applying for such a permit, as recommended.

"You can't give a conditional use permit because we don't have any designated uses in the county," Temple reiterated. He suggested that county issued business licenses might be another option to consider.

Lincoln County Sheriff Rick Virden said that he agreed with Powell that the county doesn't need bigger govern-

ment, but asked the county commissioners to read through the recommendations in their entirety because some portions could be beneficial.

"Keep in mind that we are still primarily a rural county. Lincoln County doesn't have one animal control officer, it's got 14," Virden said. "The reason for that is because we have to do it 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and one or two officers just can't do it. We have an animal control ordinance in place now that's worked very well for a number of years and I don't see any reason why it won't continue to work, but the population is continuing to grow. There may be some of this that Barbara's put together that you, as a governing body, may want to implement," he continued.

Sunny Aris, president of the animal protection group Partnership for Animal Welfare (P.A.W.), and Kitty City, a shelter for abandoned or lost cats, told the county commissioners that P.A.W.'s low-cost spay and neuter program is now available to all county residents for a small fee of \$25. The organization will pay for the remaining cost of the procedure, she said. She asked the board of commissioners to strongly consider imposing mandatory spay/neuter regulations.

"All of the problems we've discussed here, including the financial concerns, would be solved with mandatory spay/neuter," Aris said. "Letting pets stray and not be inoculated is a threat to you," she added. "Barn cats can still get rabies and other diseases. They may not need licenses, but if they were vaccinated they would pose no threat," she said. "If they were spayed and neutered, they wouldn't stray off the property and create litters that the rest of us are dealing with. They can pay \$25 with P.A.W. now to spay or neuter their dog or cat. That is the equivalent of a bag of food. If somebody chooses to have a cat, and they can't afford a bag of food, they shouldn't have a pet," Aris said.

One speaker from the audience suggested that the need to keep cats in a barn to control rodents is no longer an issue; a simple, low-cost electronic device can do a better job. She also said that she believed most pet owners in Lincoln County would not object to paying a dollar per year to license their pets.

The next meeting of the county commissioners will be held on Tuesday, March 16th, beginning at 8:30 a.m. There is no public hearing on the animal control ordinance scheduled at this time, but discussion is a definite possibility. Those with an interest in the topic are encouraged to attend.



Moberly received a letter from Carol J. Spencer, Ph.D., president of San Juan College congratulating Moberly on a very successful fall 2009 semester.


"A student of you dedication and ability exemplifies the mission of the College, which is to improve the quality of life of the people it serves," the letter states.

SANTA FE -- Will Gov. Bill Richardson be willing to give lawmakers another extension before he calls a special session? It appears the House and Senate still haven't settled their differences.

Gov. Richardson is antsy to get a budget hammered out. He says he doesn't want to send a signal to financial markets that New Mexico has an unsettled budget situation.

Truth be told, not many states have this year's budget firmed up, much less next year's budget. We're just about all in the same boat except that some states have already started taking much more drastic measures than we have so far.

True, some states are worse off than we are but historically New Mexico has been late getting into economic downturns and late getting out of them. So we should be prepared for things to get worse before they get better.

Just because Wall Street is showing a recovery doesn't mean it extends out into the real world. What we thought was going to be an avenue for financial institutions to start lending more money has instead resulted in the big guys putting all that money in savings and obscene bonuses for themselves.

Meanwhile New Mexico lawmakers still are denying the realities of being in a Great Recession. They barely got a bill passed to sweep up \$150 million of unused capital outlay money to use for balancing this year's budget. For awhile the bill was dead in a House committee before being revived. But it passed too narrowly to include an emergency clause so it can be used immediately to pay bills.

Another bill to allow drug users an option of therapy at their own expense instead of prison

was killed on the House floor before being revived, only to die on the Senate floor.

Meanwhile the prison budget will get a hefty increase while schools get cut. Our society seems to prefer locking up as many people for as long a time as possible, whether they are dangerous or not.

So far, House and Senate leaders appear to still have their differences. Will they go into session without getting them settled? Gov. Richardson says he doesn't want to interrupt election campaigns for House members. Campaign donations can't be solicited during legislative sessions.

The governor waited until too late for many legislators before calling off the session last Wednesday. Many already were on their way to Santa Fe -- in a snowstorm.

House Republican leaders say they have not been involved in any budget negotiations. But Senate Republican leader Stuart Ingle, of Portales, indicates he may have been involved.

Ingle is quoted by the Albuquerque Journal as saying, "The dialogue never seemed to get started. We didn't seem to have anything we could agree upon."

The difference may be that Senate President Pro Tem Tim Jennings, a Democrat, was elected to his post by Republicans.

Many lawmakers from both sides of the aisle are upset with Gov. Richardson for not revealing the list of 59 political appointees whose jobs he said he would eliminate.

The conclusion most people would draw is that our governor is hiding something from us. Various investigative reporters have been able to identify about a dozen of those employees who are still in state government,


although not in their former positions.

They have transferred to other positions, some at the same salary, some at lower salaries. All are in classified positions. The reports emphasize that they have job security and no longer can be fired.

That is only partially true. They have job security but it doesn't kick in for a year. If they are incompetent in their new position, they can be fired. If they are supervised by a political appointee who won't fire them, that appointee is not likely to be there this time next year.

The information uncovered thus far doesn't appear to indicate anything too egregious. Richardson would have been better off had he not appeared to be hiding something.

Maybe it is an invasion of privacy, but political appointees need to expect some scrutiny in return for starting at the top.

VICTIM'S COMPLAINTS

COMES NOW, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, Pro Se and submits her Complaints and states as follows:

IN March of April, 2005, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, was in a serious auto accident in Las Cruces, N.M. around the area of Foothills and Nacho Ave., off of Lohman Ave., in which she was on her son's, Jayson C. McSwane, Fat Boy Harley Davidson, which was totalled and she was in a COMA, for an unknown amount of time.

JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, was told the accident also involved a man, WILLIE HALEY, JR., who was in a work truck of his employer, ZACHERY CONSTRUCTION CO.

FROM what she has been told, she was first taken to the Hospital off of Lohman, off of S. 25 in Las Cruces, N.M., airlifted to Thomassons Hospital in El Paso, TX., where she was on total life support in the ICU Unit, then on the 5th Floor of the Hospital Unit and was released to ROGER A. LINFOOT.

ROGER A. LINFOOT is the one who called an ATTORNEY regarding this accident for JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, due to the fact that her skull was cracked front and back, brain was bleeding, air bubbles in her left lobe, they fed her through her nose, she was in a COMA, on total LIFE SUPPORT, etc. in which he had taken a picture of her with his cell phone while she lie there with tubes and breathing apparatus coming out of just about every part of her body.

1. MARC A. LILLEY, Defendant, had this case from May to July, 2005 to February, 2006 or 2007 and had done nothing. He stated that he needed ROGER'S cell phone so he could get the picture out of it printed of JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, for the case, which was never done. He told me there was a formula in which these cases were handled, so I figured it and told him I wouldn't take less than \$900,000.00, he said, "I asked for more".

2. WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, was a THIRD PARTY, the Mentor of DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, who was used as an ARBITRATOR, in his Office at the time that was at the top of 300 Gold Ave. N.W. in Albuquerque, N.M. and he immediately put CARL GREEN, Attorney for WILLIE HALEY, JR./ZACHERY CONSTRUCTION CO. along with a young black woman, that I don't know who she is, in a separate room and whatever he said to CARL GREEN, Attorney, made him so mad that his whole face was red, then he returned to the room in which I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant and ROGER A. LINFOOT where in and said "there is no formula in which these cases are handled". They made an offer of \$60,000.00. DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, said nothing. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, looked at him and he still said nothing. WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, said "would you like me to leave the room?" I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, said, "No, my medical bills are over \$200,000.00". The next time WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, came into the room, he said the offer was \$390,000.00, minus 10%. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, got up and said, "this isn't an auction and I'm not just a piece of meat", I left the room and didn't return.

3. MICHAEL PADWAY, Defendant, didn't even know that I had gotten my motorcycle license, when I was 13 years old. I asked him if he had gotten witness statements and he said, "yes, do you want me to read them", I said, yes and he only read 2 and those were the 2 witnesses out of 5 listed on the Police Report, that I had called and asked, "what happened to me" and those statements were what they sent. In other words, he hadn't bothered to talk to anyone.

4. DAVID IDINOPULOS, ATTORNEY FOR KELLER & KELLER, Defendants, sent ROGER A. LINFOOT and I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, a corrected Notice of Deposition, with an incorrect address in Las Cruces, N.M. and states, "I'm surprised you were brave enough to come", when we finally found it.

WILLIE HALEY, JRS deposition was done at his ex-wife's house in Texas. On 2 separate occasions, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant had me and/or ROGER A LINFOOT, go to Albuquerque, N.M. for 2 to 3 days at a time, taking every bit of savings that we had, for technically no reason. At ARBITRATION, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, stated that if I had parts of my body missing, it would look better for me, that I was too honest and that will hurt me, that I am to emotional and that because I committed suicide, he refuses to take it to Court. A day or two after ARBITRATION, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant called me at home and said, "they will settle for \$370,000.00, take it or leave it and I'll have to agree", I said, "I won't agree to anything, here talk to Roger", he said, "No, you have to agree" and I said, "I won't". DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, came to our house and gave me a box, which he said, "was my whole file". I got a check from KELLER & KELLER, Defendant, for \$200,000.00, that had printed on it that it was out of the ILOTA TRUST. I have a letter from KELLER & KELLER, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendants, that states in one sentence, I'll get \$200,000.00 and in another sentence, I'll get \$2,000,000.00. DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, again and had several times previous, tried to get me to sign a statement that said, "I was responsible for all of my medical bills, previous, during and after the accident." I had him delete that and I signed it. After he left, I went through the box he had left and it is full of FALSIFIED DOCUMENTS AND PICTURES and ROGER'S cell phone wasn't in it. I did receive my clothes that I was wearing at the time of the accident, size 30x36 wranglers and the one that I wore

after I got out of the hospital, size 32. I had asked repeatedly, medically, what happened to me, what can be fixed, what I will have to learn to live with and what will my old age consist of from the results of these injuries? I have yet to get an answer to this question. I called every name on the medical records and asked, "what happened to me?" I got hung up on, lied to, told they were not suppose to talk to me, etc.

THEREFORE, Plaintiff, JANE CAMPBELL, asks that this Court enter Judgment against the Defendants:

1. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff called the District Court Office in Carrizozo, N.M., so that I could file a CRIMINAL COMPLAINT and was told that the District Attorney's Office was the only one that could do that. I called the District Attorney's Office in Alamogordo, N.M. and was told it was out of their Jurisdiction and to call the District Attorney's Office in Las Cruces, N.M., so I did and no one is available.

2. The ACCIDENT POLICE REPORT has some incorrect information. There are no witness statements. An OFFICER FRANKLIN OR STEWART, who was off duty from the HATCH POLICE DEPT., was an eye witness and not mentioned in the ACCIDENT POLICE REPORT.

3. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff want my cell phone & charger with the picture printed out, proof that all of my medical bills have been paid, proof of exactly what the settlement was, from whom and the letters from each Medical Provider of what they were willing to settle for, exactly what happened to me and everything that was done to me, who gave permission and proof that no Attorney took more than the 20 some odd percent that they agreed upon and any-photos, videos, records, etc.

4. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff want the truth, the whole truth and nothing but.
