

Carrizozo FD Gets New Jaws of Life

Carrizozo Fire Chief Walter Hill appeared before the Carrizozo Town Council on Monday evening to request approval of the purchase of new, more powerful extrication equipment commonly referred to as Jaws of Life.

Hill told the town councilors that, over the past six months, new heating and cooling units have been installed in the fire houses and two new generators have been added to the inventory.

Hill said that his current goal is to upgrade the fire department and its equipment enough to drop the department's state rating from level six to level four by the summer of 2011. Lowered

ratings for the fire department equate to lower homeowners' insurance rates, which could save all of Carrizozo's residents money, he said.

"If we can drop to a four, or even a five, then it starts to affect the commercial properties, as far as insurance, and it will also affect the city as far as the rates we have to pay," Hill said. "We're working on our deficiencies so we can get a better rating."

He said he is hoping to purchase the new extrication equipment, used to cut away the body of a vehicle in order to extricate passengers trapped inside, because the department's older equipment is less effective on many newer vehicles.

"All of these new vehicles are made out of stronger steel," he said. "The jaws we have are not equipped to deal with these kinds of steels and, according to all of the books I've read, they're outdated."

Hill said that the spreading force of the department's existing equipment is 13,000 pounds, but the new tool that he hopes to purchase, the most powerful jaws made, has a spreading force of 79,500 pounds.

"The cutting force on the existing tool we have is 60,000 and the cutting force on this new one is 372,000. You can see there is a major difference," Hill said.

The cost of the equipment, with a free lifetime warranty, is about \$9,000.

Hill said that it was shipped to the department on a 30-day trial basis and can be returned at no cost if the fire department decides not to buy it.

The volunteer firefighters will test the equipment on Saturday, using a couple of cars donated by a local resident, Steve Gore, and run some comparative tests with both the old and the new equipment.

"If we don't like it, we won't buy it," Hill said.

He also told the town council members that many new vehicles pose additional risks to emergency response personnel because of the complicated electrical systems, air bags and other design elements.

New Mayor Questioned About Cats, Solid Waste

In his first action as Mayor of Carrizozo, Mike Petty nominated trustee Dennis Vega to serve as Mayor Pro-Tem and chose to keep the town's current police chief, clerk/treasurer and legal staff.

In the audience participation period of Monday night's town council meeting, Petty was questioned by Rose Kratochvil, a Carrizozo resident and former candidate for a seat on the council, regarding issues surrounding animal control.

"I need to know if you are aware of the city level problems with animal control, and what you plan to do to address these problems," Kratochvil told Petty. "Right now, the city police department will loan out traps to catch loose, but tame, spayed and neutered pets, but there is no accountability as to what is happening to

the pets after private citizens have trapped other people's animals," she said.

Kratochvil alleged that both past and current animal control policies in Carrizozo have essentially ignored cats.

"The problems and issues surrounding the humane treatment of cats being lost and picked up within the community need to be acknowledged and clarified with the public being well informed of the rules," Kratochvil continued. "I'd like to know how and when the current council plans on addressing these problems. It needs to be publicly addressed. There are guidelines at the city level."

She told the mayor and trustees that she recently assisted an elderly resident catch a cat that had somehow managed to get into the woman's home late at night but did not belong to the homeowner. When she called to find out what to do with the cat, she was told simply to find a home for it, Kratochvil said.

"What protocol should the community follow?" she asked. "It's something that I, and other members of the community, would like to see addressed in the future."

When Kratochvil explained that the management of cats by animal control policies is a long-standing issue that should be addressed, Petty responded by saying that he agreed.

"That's a very true and accurate statement," Petty said. "I know we're in the process of some procedural issues; I know that there's some things that we're trying to make run smoother, but, to tell that this is what we're going to do tonight, I can't say that. I need to have the information, all of the facts," he said. "I will do in as timely a matter as I can," he said.

Kratochvil also told Petty that the town's dumpster site needs to be reconfigured to make it more accessible, especially for the elderly.

Trustee Vega suggested that she talk to Judy Fitzpatrick, the GreenTree Solid Waste Authority's representative for Carrizozo.

Petty said that he intended to make the site more user-friendly.

"As you know,

funds have been cut drastically; we're looking at some financial issues that will directly impact the city, and I don't know if grants are there or not there," Petty said, "but yes, I want to make that user-friendly by whatever means we can."

"If you cut the wrong wire on a hybrid, they say it can kill you," Hill said. "We're really gearing towards a lot of training on this stuff. They've got fuel cells that can blow up. The extrication, anymore, is very dangerous. We need equipment strong enough to deal with these new vehicles."

If he decides to purchase the new equipment, the fire department will have two sets of extrication tools, which can be vital in dealing with multiple-car accidents when two or more vehicles are damaged.

The Town Council unanimously approved the purchase of the new equipment and left the final decision about whether to go ahead with the purchase or not up to Hill. The funding for the fire department comes from the state and has no affect on the town's budget.



Premise, Reason, Fact, Point House Bill 203 Provide A Gaming Tax Credit for Certain Gaming Operators

EDITOR — House Bill 203, hb203, brings socialism to Lincoln County in its finest form. The Board of County Commissioners will be able to implement its first full socialist bill by adopting an ordinance permitting Lincoln County to impose a ¼ percent tax on all business receipts. This money will allow Ruidoso Downs Race Track to retain revenues, otherwise sent as income taxes to the State, up to \$750,000 per year, or up to \$3,908,000 over five years. This is taking money out of the pockets of Lincoln County residents and giving it to the owners of the Ruidoso Downs Race Track. The Fiscal Impact Report (FIR) accompanying hb203 indicates that all of the residents of Lincoln County will be affected. Yes, even Corona residents will be paying sales taxes that will be given to the owners of the race track. There is no guarantee the handout to the track owners will be reinvested in the track. HB203 DOES NOT REQUIRE THIS! The FIR simply says: "Assuming the racetracks reinvest the savings (the handout) ... into the racetrack..." The FIR indicates that only Ruidoso Downs would qualify for the gaming tax credit (handout) under this bill's amended provisions: There are race tracks in Bernalillo, Lincoln, Dona Ana, San Juan, Lea and Colfax counties. But, under the bill, only Ruidoso Downs is eligible. The FIR also indicates the tracks are estimated to experience growth of zero



SANTA FE - Some Democrats are destined for problems in the June primaries. There are certain taxes that Democrats just can't touch. The first untouchable came along in 1935, during the Great Depression.

That is why taxes on purchasing a car are kept low. The motor vehicle excise tax is much less than the gross receipts tax. And don't make me pay a lot for registration or a license. And keep those gasoline taxes low. (But make sure my roads are good.)

Democrats learned their tough lesson on the gas tax back in 1994. The state law had been changed allowing state officials to run for two consecutive four-year terms and Gov. Bruce King was the first governor to get a shot at that prize.

Economic times weren't very good. "It's the economy, stupid!" had won the presidency for Bill Clinton two years earlier. Teachers were clamoring for raises. Some of Gov. King's advisers got the bright idea of tacking on a six-cent gasoline tax and earmarking it for school transportation, thereby freeing up a pot full of money for other school needs.

King knew it was politically unwise. But he promised to sign it if it passed. It passed. King signed it. And Gary Johnson became our next governor. "King's" gas tax had a lot to do with Johnson's victory. It almost propelled Lt. Gov. Casey Luna into a primary election victory over King.

Now Democrats seem to be learning to keep their hands away from taxing tortillas. The idea started out as a good one, they thought. If we're going to have to tax something, why not tax things that aren't especially good for you -

like junk food, sugary drinks, alcohol and tobacco?

Besides that, Republicans complain less about a gross receipts tax because it hits everyone equally. But the poor folks point out that they spend a greater proportion of their resources on such a tax. And besides, junk food tends to be cheaper and that is what the poor need to buy.

When it turned out that white flour tortillas fell into the junk food category, it hit the fan. Republicans were thrilled. Poor folks were rebelling against Democrats. Not only are Democrats supporting a regressive tax, their nanny state is discriminating against our favorite food.

Everywhere they turn, Democrats are stymied. There hasn't been a tax increase in 15 years. Times are bad. Money is needed from somewhere to keep state workers working and social programs going. The obvious answer is a progressive income tax. Soak the rich. They aren't going to vote Democratic anyway. But that won't work because the Democratic governor says he'll veto any such tax. It's a recipe for disaster.

U.S. Senators Jeff Bingaman and Tom Udall announced that Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) will receive more than \$2 million from the Department of Energy (DOE) to support the development of new solar energy technologies and the rapid development of available carbon-free solar energy systems.

The funding is part of up to \$87 million that will be made available by DOE to support solar energy development - \$50 million of which will come from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act

(ARRA). These projects will help speed adoption of solar energy nationwide, while supporting development of a skilled workforce, and continuing to pursue new scientific breakthroughs to increase the efficiency and lower the cost of solar technologies.

The LANL projects are:

\$1.04 million for assessment of silicon nanowire architecture for photovoltaic electricity (PV) application \$966,957 for hybrid organic silicone HTF utilizing endothermic reactions for latent heat storage

VICTIM'S COMPLAINTS

COMES NOW, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, Pro Se and submits her Complaints and states as follows:

IN March of April, 2005, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, was in a serious auto accident in Las Cruces, N.M. around the area of Foothills and Nacho Ave., off of Lohman Ave., in which she was on her son's, Jayson C. McSwane, Fat Boy Harley Davidson, which was totalled and she was in a COMA, for an unknown amount of time.

JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, was told the accident also involved a man, WILLIE HALEY, JR., who was in a work truck of his employer, ZACHERY CONSTRUCTION CO.

FROM what she has been told, she was first taken to the Hospital off of Lohman, off of S. 25 in Las Cruces, N.M., airlifted to Thomassons Hospital in El Paso, TX., where she was on total life support in the ICU Unit, then on the 5th Floor of the Hospital Unit and was released to ROGER A. LINFOOT.

ROGER A. LINFOOT is the one who called an ATTORNEY regarding this accident for JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, due to the fact that her skull was cracked front and back, brain was bleeding, air bubbles in her left lobe, they fed her through her nose, she was in a COMA, on total LIFE SUPPORT, etc. in which he had taken a picture of her with his cell phone while she lie there with tubes and breathing apparatus coming out of just about every part of her body.

1. MARC A. LILLEY, Defendant, had this case from May to July, 2005 to February, 2006 or 2007 and had done nothing. He stated that he needed ROGER'S cell phone so he could get the picture out of it printed of JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, for the case, which was never done. He told me there was a formula in which these cases were handled, so I figured it and told him I wouldn't take less than \$900,000.00, he said, "I asked for more".

2. WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, was a THIRD PARTY, the Mentor of DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, who was used as an ARBITRATOR, in his Office at the time that was at the top of 300 Gold Ave. N.W. In Albuquerque, N.M. and he immediately put CARL GREEN, Attorney for WILLIE HALEY, JR./ZACHERY CONSTRUCTION CO. along with a young black woman, that I don't know who she is, in a separate room and whatever he said to CARL GREEN, Attorney, made him so mad that his whole face was red, then he returned to the room in which I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant and ROGER A. LINFOOT where in and said "there is no formula in which these cases are handled". "They made an offer of \$60,000.00. DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, said nothing. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, looked at him and he still said nothing. WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, said "would you like me to leave the room?" I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, said, "No, my medical bills are over \$200,000.00". The next time WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, came into the room, he said the offer was \$390,000.00, minus 10%. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, got up and said, "this isn't an auction and I'm not just a piece of meat", I left the room and didn't return.

3. MICHAEL PADWAY, Defendant, didn't even know that I had gotten my motorcycle license, when I was 13 years old. I asked him if he had gotten witness statements and he said, "yes, do you want me to read them", I said, yes and he only read 2 and those were the 2 witnesses out of 5 listed on the Police Report, that I had called and asked, "what happened to me" and those statements were what they sent. In other words, he hadn't bothered to talk to anyone.

4. DAVID IDINOPULOS, ATTORNEY FOR KELLER & KELLER, Defendants, sent ROGER A. LINFOOT and I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, a corrected Notice of Deposition, with an incorrect address in Las Cruces, N.M. and states, "I'm surprised you were brave enough to come", when we finally found it. WILLIE HALEY, JRS deposition was done at his ex-wife's house in Texas. On 2 separate occasions, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant had me and/or ROGER A. LINFOOT, go to Albuquerque, N.M. for 2 to 3 days at a time, taking every bit of savings that we had, for technically no reason. At ARBITRATION, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, stated that if I had parts of my body missing, it would look better for me, that I was too honest and that will hurt me, that I am emotional and that because I committed suicide, he refuses to take it to Court. A day or two after ARBITRATION, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant called me at home and said, "they will settle for \$370,000.00, take it or leave it and I'll have to agree", I said, "I won't agree to anything, here talk to Roger", he said, "No, you have to agree" and I said, "I won't". DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, came to our house and gave me a box, which he said, "was my whole file". I got a check from KELLER & KELLER, Defendant, for \$200,000.00, that had printed on it that it was out of the ILOTA TRUST. I have a letter from KELLER & KELLER, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendants, that states in one sentence, "I'll get \$200,000.00 and in another sentence, I'll get \$2,000,000.00. DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, again and had several times previous, tried to get me to sign a statement that said, "I was responsible for all of my medical bills, previous, during and after the accident." I had him delete that and I signed it. After he left, I went through the box he had left and it is full of FALSIFIED DOCUMENTS AND PICTURES and ROGER'S cell phone wasn't in it. I did receive my clothes that I was wearing at the time of the accident, size 30x36 wranglers and the one that I wore

after I got out of the hospital, size 32. I had asked repeatedly, medically, what happened to me, what can be fixed, what I will have to learn to live with and what will my old age consist of from the results of these injuries? I have yet to get an answer to this question. I called every name on the medical records and asked, "what happened to me?" I got hung up on, lied to, told they were not suppose to talk to me, etc.

THEREFORE, Plaintiff, JANE CAMPBELL, asks that this Court enter Judgment against the Defendants:

1. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff called the District Court Office in Carrizozo, N.M., so that I could file a CRIMINAL COMPLAINT and was told that the District Attorney's Office was the only one that could do that. I called the District Attorney's Office in Alamogordo, N.M. and was told it was out of their Jurisdiction and to call the District Attorney's Office in Las Cruces, N.M., so I did and no one is available.

2. The ACCIDENT POLICE REPORT has some incorrect information. There are no witness statements. An OFFICER FRANKLIN OR STEWART, who was off duty from the HATCH POLICE DEPT., was an eye witness and not mentioned in the ACCIDENT POLICE REPORT.

3. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff want my cell phone & charger with the picture printed out, proof that all of my medical bills have been paid, proof of exactly what the settlement was, from whom and the letters from each Medical Provider of what they were willing to settle for, exactly what happened to me and everything that was done to me, who gave permission and proof that no Attorney took more than the 20 some odd percent that they agreed upon and any photos, videos, records, etc.

4. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff want the truth, the whole truth and nothing but.
