

County Adopts Cowboy Poetry Week

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, during its March 16th regular meeting, proclaimed the week of April 18th through April 24th, 2010, to be Cowboy Poetry Week in Lincoln County. The proclamation was made at the request of Joe Baker, cowboy poet and radio personality.

Baker told the county commissioners that, for the past five years, the governor of New Mexico

has proclaimed a state-wide Cowboy Poetry Week.

"It's good that the governor does it for the state, but I think that, with Lincoln County's cowboy culture and our western heritage here in Lincoln County, a county proclamation merits higher in my book than with the state," Baker said. "We have the Carrizozo Cowboy Days and the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium. Cowboy poetry complements western swing music and cowboy music. It's all about entertaining

yourself around the campfire and while you're on the herd," he added.

County commissioner Tom Battin said that much of the culture of New Mexico exists because of the preservation of cowboy history and the cowboy way.

"I've always believed that the unique culture of this part of the country is because of the preservation of the cowboy western spirit and traditions," Battin said, "traditions of cowboy moral standards and fair play. The cowboy code of the west

describes so well how most of us feel, and it comes from the preservation of those traditions," he added.

Baker told the commissioners that he has been broadcasting cowboy music and poetry for nine years on the radio and gets a lot of requests for that type of entertainment from his listeners.

The board of county commissioners unanimously approved a proclamation recognizing Cowboy Poetry Week in Lincoln County.



Domestic Violence Escalates to Assault on Peace Officer

A report of a domestic violence situation on March 4th in Carrizozo has resulted in one man being charged with three counts of aggravated battery and an additional three counts of resisting arrest.

According to a criminal complaint filed in the Lincoln County Magistrate Court in Carrizozo, one count of aggravated battery was committed against a household member; the other two counts were against a peace officer and include battery with a deadly weapon.

A statement of probable cause, also filed in Magistrate Court on March 4th, states that Sergeant Ken Cramer, of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department was assigned to investigate an incident involving Carrizozo Police Chief Rachel Weiser, Lincoln County Undersheriff Robert Shepperd and other Lincoln County deputies during a domestic violence investigation in Carrizozo.

The incident began with a call to the Carrizozo Police Department from Michele Lovelace, who reported a domestic dispute involving Michele and her husband and reported assailant, Gary Joe Lovelace. Deputy Baltazar Romo, from the sheriff's department, reportedly responded to assist Weiser in the investigation.

The report states that, upon arriving at the Lovelace home, Weiser made contact with Michele Lovelace and observed bruising and other signs of battery on her person, while Romo went to look for Gary Joe Lovelace. The alleged assailant was soon spotted by Romo driving a loader on 17th Street in Carrizozo, near the railroad tracks, and was asked to show the deputy his driver's license for identification purposes.

At that point, according to the report filed, Lovelace started to

hand his license to Romo, then stopped suddenly and stated that he did not have to show the deputy his identification as he got back into the cab of the loader and drove back to his residence, where

Suspecting that Weiser was unconscious on the ground, Romo turned to check on the police chief and Lovelace got back into the cab of the loader and drove away. Romo radioed the sheriff's

Weiser was still conducting the investigation into allegations of battery.

While Gary Joe Lovelace was still sitting in the cab of his loader, Weiser approached him and asked him to get down out of the loader so that they could talk. Lovelace allegedly initially refused to comply with Weiser's request but, after the request was repeated several times, got out of the loader and stood next to it. The report states that Lovelace denied having committed any act of battery or assault against his wife, Michele, even after Weiser described the alleged victim's injuries to him.

Weiser then attempted to arrest Lovelace, but he tried to climb back into the loader. At that point, the report states, Romo grabbed Lovelace to prevent him from re-entering the cab of the loader and Weiser also stepped onto the loader to assist. Lovelace then kicked Weiser in the face, causing her to fall to the ground.

department from his patrol car, stating that an officer was down and requesting medical assistance for Weiser. Michele Lovelace and a daughter, Dakota Lovelace, reportedly stayed with Weiser until help arrived. Romo pursued Gary Joe Lovelace to the office of Carrizozo Ready Mix, Lovelace's place of business, where Lovelace locked himself inside.

Lovelace's daughter also arrived on the scene at Carrizozo Ready Mix and attempted to speak with her father. Lincoln County Undersheriff Robert Shepperd also went to the Ready Mix office after checking on the status of Weiser and having learned from Michele Lovelace that there were guns in the office. Shepperd attempted to de-escalate the situation by talking to Lovelace through the door of his office. Soon thereafter, Lovelace's ex-wife Kelly arrived at the scene. She and daughter Dakota entered the Ready Mix office before Shepperd

Until then Clinical Nurse Specialist Suzanne Carden and LCMC Medical Director Dr. Gary Jackson will provide coverage. We wish Marilyn well in all of her future endeavors," said Santos.

This partnership has existed since 1972 and is dedicated to improving the health of individuals, families and communities. LCMC Expands Patient Safety Awareness, Joins Nationwide Effort

Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) has expanded multiple patient safety awareness initiatives joining a national effort of recognition and awareness with the National Patient Safety Foundation. These efforts culminated the week of March 7-13, which was national Patient Safety Awareness Week.

Patient Safety Awareness Week is an effort intending to encourage and strengthen collaboration between patients, families, and their health-care providers, all with the goal of improving patient safety. This year's theme is "Let's Talk! Healthy Conversations for Safer Healthcare."

"LCMC has implemented a number of patient safety measures," said Patsy Parker, RN, MSN, LCMC director of patient care services. "The two biggest initiatives have been our 'Red Rules' - ensuring hand washing and using two identifiers for all patient encounters."

Parker also said that a fall prevention program for hospitalized patients was implemented to assess all patients fall risk and prevent any falls from occurring. She added that LCMC is using spe-

cialized mattresses to prevent pressure ulcers (bed sores) from developing.

"All staff members and employees are going through renewal training courses this week on what LCMC has already completed towards creating an extremely safe and consistent patient environment. We're also working towards effective SBAR communication between nursing staff members and physicians, especially during shift or department changes," said Parker.

SBAR stands for Situation, Background, Assessment and Recommendations. A nurse from one shift or department uses this model for communication to another nurse so that patient information is conveyed and transferred throughout the patient's care received at LCMC.





NAPILI BAY, MAUI - Rep. Benjamin Rodefer, D-Albuquerque, wants to see a joint House-Senate caucus called to work out a budget for next year. The freshman representative says current discussions aren't even close to representing the will or intent of either Democratic caucus.

He's right. A similar situation occurred back in the 1970s and '80s when a liberal Democratic group called the Mama Lucys ran the House. One of its leaders was former Rep. David Salzman, D-Mora, who recently passed away. Although the Mama Lucys held a narrow majority in their caucus, a coalition of Republicans and conservative Democrats controlled most of the votes. And eventually, the coalition just decided to take over leadership of the House.

Later, the same thing happened in the Senate. And at that point, minority Republicans controlled both chambers of the Legislature in the early '80s. Primary election battles and party switches sorted out the confusion by the late '80s.

We're seeing a similar situation now at both the state and national level. At the state level, it seems very peculiar to see a Democratic-controlled Legislature supporting increases in the gross receipts tax, which proportionally hits the poor as a greater percentage of their income.

And at the same time, a Democratic-controlled Legislature is putting the stops on making our state income tax a graduated tax again. That is not what one expects to see from Democrats. And it could be very embarrassing for some in the upcoming primary elections.

Similar rumblings are occurring at the national level and it is hard to tell who will be the winner. But it brings back memories of 1994 when Bill and Hillary Clinton were having one heck of a time selling a health care plan. No one had the slightest inkling the result would be a Democratic loss of both houses of Congress. That hadn't happened in decades.

I certainly couldn't imagine such a thing. It was March 1994. I was sitting here on Napili Beach, about 10 steps from our lanai. I was shut off from

the world, with no television and no telephone.

Just then a young woman appeared at my side with a message saying a member of Congress wanted to speak with me. The only way anyone at this hideaway could be contacted was to call and leave a message at the office. That message would then be tacked to my door.

But Rep. Schiff had told the receptionist to find me and deliver the message personally. What could be so important? I hurried to the nearest pay phone at a little convenience store nearby.

The congressman was waiting for my call. He said he wanted me to be one of the first news people in New Mexico to know Republicans would take over both houses of Congress in the November election.

He said a backbencher in the House had a plan. He said Newt

Gingrich was a political science professor who had written a Contract With America that would guarantee voters the changes in government they always had wanted to see.

Among those changes were ethics laws, term limits and all manner of other limits on government. Challengers for Democratic incumbents had already been recruited. Senatorial candidates were pledged to serve only two terms. Candidates for the House were pledged to no more than three terms.

It sounded good. But would it work? "Just wait and see," said Schiff.

He was right. The "guarantees" were just what the American public wanted to hear. Republicans swept both houses of Congress. But then scandals on both sides of the aisle, including Speaker Gingrich himself, brought voters back to their senses. There is no magic formula or contract


March Madness -- Lobo Style!

WEATHER REPORT

There is a low pressure system sitting just north of the Four Corners area that is slowly moving eastward. This low pressure system has the potential to bring some new snow into Lincoln County this weekend.

Once the low pressure systems moves out of the state there will be clear skies both day and night.

Daytime temperatures will be at almost 70 in the high desert and high plains areas of Lincoln County while there will be daytime temperatures from the mid 40s to the mid 50s at the higher elevations of the Sacramento Mountains and across Sierra Blanca.

Cold nights will continue, with temperatures from the mid 20s to mid 30s at higher elevations.

Ski Apache is currently operating 10 of 11 ski lifts, 55 of 55 trails are open for skiing and snowboarding, 100 percent of terrain is open. Currently there is approximately 68 inches of packed powder at the lower elevations with about 1-2 inches of new fallen powder. 78 inches of variable powder/packed-powder at the higher elevations and approximately 6 inches of new snow has fallen since Sunday.

Projected closing date has changed to April 4.

VICTIM'S COMPLAINTS

COMES NOW, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, Pro Se and submits her Complaints and states as follows:

IN March of April, 2005, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, was in a serious auto accident in Las Cruces, N.M. around the area of Foothills and Nacho Ave., off of Lohman Ave., in which she was on her son's, Jayson C. McSwane, Fat Boy Harley Davidson, which was totalled and she was in a COMA, for an unknown amount of time.

JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, was told the accident also involved a man, WILLIE HALEY, JR., who was in a work truck of his employer, ZACHERY CONSTRUCTION CO.

FROM what she has been told, she was first taken to the Hospital off of Lohman, off of S. 25 in Las Cruces, N.M., airlifted to Thomassons Hospital in El Paso, TX., where she was on total life support in the ICU Unit, then on the 5th Floor of the Hospital Unit and was released to ROGER A. LINFOOT.

ROGER A. LINFOOT is the one who called an ATTORNEY regarding this accident for JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, due to the fact that her skull was cracked front and back, brain was bleeding, air bubbles in her left lobe, they fed her through her nose, she was in a COMA, on total LIFE SUPPORT, etc. in which he had taken a picture of her with his cell phone while she lie there with tubes and breathing apparatus coming out of just about every part of her body.

1. MARC A. LILLEY, Defendant, had this case from May to July, 2005 to February, 2006 or 2007 and had done nothing. He stated that he needed ROGER'S cell phone so he could get the picture out of it printed of JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, for the case, which was never done. He told me there was a formula in which these cases were handled, so I figured it and told him I wouldn't take less than \$900,000.00, he said, "I asked for more".

2. WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, was a THIRD PARTY, the Mentor of DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, who was used as an ARBITRATOR, in his Office at the time that was at the top of 300 Gold Ave. N.W. in Albuquerque, N.M. and he immediately put CARL GREEN, Attorney for WILLIE HALEY, JR./ZACHERY CONSTRUCTION CO. along with a young black woman, that I don't know who she is, in a separate room and whatever he said to CARL GREEN, Attorney, made him so mad that his whole face was red, then he returned to the room in which I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant and ROGER A. LINFOOT where in and said "there is no formula in which these cases are handled". "They made an offer of \$60,000.00. DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, said nothing. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, looked at him and he still said nothing. WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, said "would you like me to leave the room?" I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, said, "No, my medical bills are over \$200,000.00". The next time WILLIAM BILL MADISON, Defendant, came into the room, he said the offer was \$390,000.00, minus 10%. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, got up and said, "this isn't an auction and I'm not just a piece of meat", I left the room and didn't return.

3. MICHAEL PADWAY, Defendant, didn't even know that I had gotten my motorcycle license, when I was 13 years old. I asked him if he had gotten witness statements and he said, "yes, do you want me to read them", I said, yes and he only read 2 and those were the 2 witnesses out of 5 listed on the Police Report, that I had called and asked, "what happened to me" and those statements were what they sent. In other words, he hadn't bothered to talk to anyone.

4. DAVID IDINOPULOS, ATTORNEY FOR KELLER & KELLER, Defendants, sent ROGER A. LINFOOT and I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff, a corrected Notice of Deposition, with an incorrect address in Las Cruces, N.M. and states, "I'm surprised you were brave enough to come", when we finally found it.

WILLIE HALEY, JRS deposition was done at his ex-wife's house in Texas. On 2 separate occasions, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant had me and/or ROGER A LINFOOT, go to Albuquerque, N.M. for 2 to 3 days at a time, taking every bit of savings that we had, for technically no reason. At ARBITRATION, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, stated that if I had parts of my body missing, it would look better for me, that I was too honest and that will hurt me, that I am to emotional and that because I committed suicide, he refuses to take it to Court. A day or two after ARBITRATION, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant called me at home and said, "they will settle for \$370,000.00, take it or leave it and I'll have to agree", I said, "I won't agree to anything, here talk to Roger", he said, "No, you have to agree" and I said, "I won't". DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, came to our house and gave me a box, which he said, "was my whole file". I got a check from KELLER & KELLER, Defendant, for \$200,000.00, that had printed on it that it was out of the ILOTA TRUST. I have a letter from KELLER & KELLER, DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendants, that states in one sentence, "I'll get \$200,000.00 and in another sentence, I'll get \$2,000,000.00. DAVID IDINOPULOS, Defendant, again had several times previous, tried to get me to sign a statement that said, "I was responsible for all of my medical bills, previous, during and after the accident." I had him delete that and I signed it. After he left, I went through the box he had left and it is full of FALSIFIED DOCUMENTS AND PICTURES and ROGER'S cell phone wasn't in it. I did receive my clothes that I was wearing at the time of the accident, size 30x36 wranglers and the one that I wore

after I got out of the hospital, size 32. I had asked repeatedly, medically, what happened to me, what can be fixed, what I will have to learn to live with and what will my old age consist of from the results of these injuries? I have yet to get an answer to this question. I called every name on the medical records and asked, "what happened to me?" I got hung up on, lied to, told they were not suppose to talk to me, etc.

THEREFORE, Plaintiff, JANE CAMPBELL, asks that this Court enter Judgment against the Defendants:

1. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff called the District Court Office in Carrizozo, N.M., so that I could file a CRIMINAL COMPLAINT and was told that the District Attorney's Office was the only one that could do that. I called the District Attorney's Office in Alamogordo, N.M. and was told it was out of their Jurisdiction and to call the District Attorney's Office in Las Cruces, N.M., so I did and no one is available.

2. The ACCIDENT POLICE REPORT has some incorrect information. There are no witness statements. An OFFICER FRANKLIN OR STEWART, who was off duty from the HATCH POLICE DEPT., was an eye witness and not mentioned in the ACCIDENT POLICE REPORT.

3. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff want my cell phone & charger with the picture printed out, proof that all of my medical bills have been paid, proof of exactly what the settlement was, from whom and the letters from each Medical Provider of what they were willing to settle for, exactly what happened to me and everything that was done to me, who gave permission and proof that no Attorney took more than the 20 some odd percent that they agreed upon and any photos, videos, records, etc.

4. I, JANE CAMPBELL, Plaintiff want the truth, the whole truth and nothing but.

- (2) Be contrary to the conservation of water within the state or detrimental to the public welfare of the state, provided that the objector shows how they will be substantially and specifically affected by the granting of the application.

Any person, firm or corporation or other entity having standing to file objections or protests shall do so in writing (legible, signed, and include the writer's complete name and mailing address). The objection to the approval of the application must be based on: (1) Impairment; if impairment you must specifically identify your water rights; and/or (2) Public welfare/conservation of water; if public welfare or conservatom of water within the state of New Mexico, you must show you will be substantially affected. The written protest must be filed, in triplicate, with John R. D'Antonio, Jr., P.E., State Engineer, 1900 West Second Street, Roswell, New Mexico 88201, within ten (10) days after the date of last publication of this Notice. Facsimiles (fax) will be accepted as a valid protest as long as the hard copy is sent within 24-hours of the facsimile. Mailing postmark will be used to validate the 24-hour period. Protest can be faxed to Office of the State Engineer, (575) 623-8559. If no valid protest or objection is filed, the State Engineer will evaluate the application in accordance with Sections 72-2-16, 72-5-6, and 72-12-3.

Lincoln County Sheriff Rick Virden then arrived at the scene and also attempted to talk Lovelace into surrendering, but Lovelace refused. Virden and Shepperd forced the office door open and rushed the suspect. Attempts by Lovelace's ex-wife and daughter to prevent him from grabbing a rifle were unsuccessful. According

to the report, Lovelace battled with law enforcement personnel, with the 30 caliber Winchester in his possession, until Shepperd and other deputies were able to restrain him and remove the weapon from his hands.

Lovelace was taken into custody and charged with one count of battery on a household member, one count of battery on a peace officer, one count of battery on a peace officer with a deadly weapon and three counts of resisting arrest. Weiser was transported to the Lincoln County Medical Center for treatment of injuries to her face.





of Agriculture, as advised by an advisory committee. In Fiscal Year 2010, Congress appropriated \$10 million dollars to the fund. To ensure that the recommendation of the Committee have taken into account the needs of the diverse groups served by the Department, membership shall include, to the extent practicable, individuals with demonstrated ability to represent minorities, women, and persons with disabilities.
