County Manager's Report

During his regular monthly report to the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart said that he, county commissioners Bileen Sedillo and Dave Parks, road superintendent Albert Hernandez and undersheriff Robert Sheppard attended a meeting facilitated by the U.S. Forest Service to discuss future plans for the Bonito Lake area.

According to Stewart, representatives from the city of Alamogordo, the Department of Game and Fish and Holloman Air Force Base were also in attendance at the meeting, which focused on the development of a plan to improve cooperation between the agencies that share jurisdiction of the area.

"Game and Fish was interested in improving access to the lake for fishing, the confusing maze of law enforcement jurisdictional issues were discussed, and Lincoln County requested assistance from all for the maintenance of the roadways," Stewart reported. "It was significant to learn from officials that 50 percent of the water needs for Holloman and Alamogordo come from the lake."

Stewart also reported that, in June, the county's emergency services director and coordinator worked with the Civil Support Team of New Mexico on a weapons of mass destruction mediation exercise at the Spencer Theater and at Ski Apache. Stewart said that Major Dennis, the commander of the National Guard organization was appreciative of the assistance provided by the county.

"He said his 22 assigned soldiers really appreciated seeing the wildlife, elk, bobcat and a bear, as they received valuable training that was evaluated by experts," Stewart said.

On June 11, Stewart attended a meeting at Fort Stanton with representatives from New Mexico State Monuments, Fort Bliss and Fort Stanton to discuss a potential use of Fort Stanton for officer and noncommissioned officer professional development excursions.

"We'll have to wait and see what develops," Stewart said, "but an additional visit by Fort Bliss officials may be in the near future."

Further cuts by the state to the county's senior citizens programs will affect the local budget. Stewart reported that Lincoln County's Senior Center programming

Rule Changes for Double-Dippers

During the June 22nd meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart issued a reminder of changes in the rules governing public employees

who elect to retire and then return to work while drawing both salary and retirement pay.

"We currently have seven employees who are considered double dippers, not including two elected officials who are exempt from the new rules," Stewart reported.

He explained that the seven employees will be required, beginning today, to pay into the public employees retirement fund 9.15 percent of their gross pay without receiving any additional benefit, while they receive both salary and retirement pay.

"Each employee in this situation is evaluating the effect on their pay, and we may experience some resignations as a result," Stewart said.

The new retirement rule requires that any public employee that retires after June 30th must wait at least one year before returning to work in the public arena, and

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Looking Back

'Through Our Old Files'

As the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS goes into its 106th year of being in existence, we will be randomly publishing articles from old NEWS files. The following article appeared in the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS on ...

Friday, April 6, 1956

At the Cowboy Dance Tonight

(A la Bill Knox)

Early in 1903 Clement Hightower of Capitan mailed the editor of the Capitan Progress some verses which had been published a few years previously in a Silver City paper. Hightower remarked that it might be a little early for verse, but these were the real thing. The verses were published on February 13, 1903, under the above title. They follow:

Git yo' little sage hens ready;
Trot 'em out upon the floor -- Line up there, you cusses! Steady! Lively now! One couple more. Shorty, shed that ol' sombrero! Broncho, douse that cigarette! Stop you cussin', Casinero, 'Fore the ladies; Now all set!

S'lute yer ladies; all together!
Ladies opposite the same; Hit the lumber with your leather! Balance all, and swing yer dame!

Bunch the heifers in the middle! Circle stags, an' do-se-do -- Pay attention to the fiddle. Swing her 'round an' off you go!

First four forward! Back to places!
Second follow! Shuffle back! Now you've got it down to cases! Swing 'em; till their trotters crack!

Gents all right, a heel an' toin' -- Swing 'em; kiss 'em if you kin! On to the next an' keep a goin'! Till yo' hit yer pards again!

Gents to center; ladies 'round 'em.
Form a basket; balance all! Whirl yer gals to where yo' found 'em! Promenade around the hall!

Balance to yer pards an' trot 'em Round the circle double quick! Grab an' kiss 'em while you've got 'em! Hold 'em to it if they kick.

Ladies, left hand to yer sonnies!
Alaman! Grand right an' left! Balance all an' swing yer honies -- Pick 'em up an' feel their heft! Promenade like skeery cattle!

Balance all and swing yer sweets; Shake yer spurs an' make 'em rattle! Keno! Promenade to seats.

The Diamond Fake

Late in 1900 reports became widespread that diamonds had been discovered at Capitan. The editor of the Capitan Progress, a weekly newspaper energetically scotched the rumor.

The story on the diamond fake, which appeared in the Progress on January 4, 1901, follows in part:

A report which has created much comment, has gone forth that rich diamond deposits have been discovered in Capitan.

This report first originated in either Alamogordo or El Paso and was wired out to eastern dailies. Within the past few days inquiries by both mail and telegraph have been pouring in seeking information about the rich and valuable fields of "diamonds in the rough" at Capitan.

One newspaper, the Denver News, published a cartoon representing John Bull looking across the atlantic Ocean through a magnifying glass. In front of the glass is an outline map of the United States with the New Mexico diamond fields marked thereon. John's glass is centered on this spot. Under the cartoon is this inscription: "By George! That appears to be entirely out of my reach."

The report has caused a sensation throughout the civilized world and we fear, will revert to the injury of our town since its truthfulness exists only in the diseased imagination of a few sensational newspapers.

The only diamonds that exist here at Capitan, aside from our inexhaustible supply of "black diamonds," are those work by real estate dealers, coal barons and newspaper men.

In the February 11 issue of the Progress, the editor reported that George F. Kunz, the diamond expert of Tiffany's, New York, pronounced the Capitan diamonds very good crystals. So ended Capitan's diamond "find".

Fire Restrictions Remain in Place

On June 22, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners adopted a resolution to continue the imposition of fire restrictions in the unincorporated areas of the county. With the fire danger on that day listed as "high-to-very-high", and after several wildfires have occurred in and around the county, the commissioners unanimously agreed to continue the restrictions.

"The relative humidity is still pretty low, so Travis and I are concerned about it," county manager Tom Stewart said, referring to Travis Atwell, Lincoln County's Emergency Services Director.

County commissioner Jackie Powell commented that the runoff from last winter's heavy snowfall was expected to be three times the normal flow this spring, but those expectations have not matched the reality.

"The Bonito is dry at the bridge (before reaching Lincoln), and the

river does not cover the top of your shoes," Powell reported.

County commissioner Tom Battin remarked that it is amazing how fast the forest has dried out after the significant amounts of precipitation that fell over the wind; Stewart attributed the conditions to dry winds, warm temperatures and little rainfall in the spring.

According to the national fire rating system, high or very high fire danger conditions can result in dead fuels igniting readily and fires spreading very rapidly.

The resolution passed last week continues the ban on any outdoor fires or flames, including the burning of trash, rubbish and shrubbery except by permit, as well as the sale or display of fireworks.

The ban on outdoor burning and fireworks will remain in place for 30 days unless rescinded by the county commissioners.



Kid's Pardon A Publicity Stunt

SANTA FE -- I recently wrote of Gov. Bill Richardson's request that I sample public sentiment concerning a pardon for Billy the Kid. Thus far, the sentiment has ranged from excitement to disgust. The following example of the latter was received from Dr. Gale Cooper, author of "Mega Hoax: The Strange Plot to Exhume Billy the Kid and Become President."

In the good old days (1878-2002), Billy the Kid aficionados had only one problem: to decide if he was an outlaw or a rebel with a cause.

In 2003, everything changed because of Gov. Bill Richardson's quixotic scheme to hijack Billy's history as a publicity stunt for his planned presidential run; and as an apparent favor for his major donor, Attorney Bill Robins III, an Old West buff seemingly attached to pretender "Brushy Bill" Roberts (two years old at Billy's death).

Called the Billy the Kid Case, the stunt was a real murder investigation filed in Lincoln and De Baca Counties against Pat Garrett. Why? Garrett was accused as the murderer of an innocent victim instead of Billy, on July 14, 1881, to fill the Fort Sumner grave. Why? Because "Pat Garrett did not kill Billy the Kid" grabbed headlines. Was it true? No. Billy's corpse had enough eye-witnesses (including coroner's jury-men) to rival Abraham Lincoln's lying in state.

So the endeavor was actually the most elaborate historic-forensic hoax ever perpetrated. And in its seven years, it produced no evidence to contradict established history. But it made great sound bites like: "Why are they so afraid of the truth?"

What was done? As the country's only governor selling his state's iconic history for a bowl of political porridge, Richardson - with recruited lawmen and with Bill Robins III appointed as the attorney bizarrely "speaking" for dead Billy - sought to exhume Billy and his mother to "compare DNA."

Omitted for the public was that their

grave sites were just tourist markers, and the state Medical Investigator refused digging permits based on silliness. So legal opposition in Silver City and Fort Sumner stopped that phase.

But it did not stop hoaxers' digging. TV programs and a movie were at stake. So backhoed were Arizona pretender, John Miller, and a random man buried beside him, William Hudspeth, to compare their DNA with alleged DNA of Billy the Kid.

Where did the hoaxers get Billy's DNA? Creatively fabricating, they claimed acquisition of Billy's blood from a carpenter's bench on which Billy was allegedly laid out (abandoning their "innocent victim" ploy, and floating humorously that Billy had merely "played dead.") Flashy forensic expert, Dr. Henry Lee, used to swab the bench, and under American Academy of Forensic Sciences Ethics Committee investigation, denied making any conclusions attributed to him by the hoaxers.

What happened to the "DNA matching results?" They are concealed by the hoaxers; even defying a three year open records case. Why? Apparently the "results" are of fake Billy-bench-DNA matched to random man William Hudspeth's

(no DNA came from John Miller)!

So if there is a living Hudspeth relative reading this: Congratulations; you and your chosen attorney just won the death lottery for his indignity. And you - and he - are now part of Billy the Kid history.

What about "Brushy Bill" Roberts' bones? In 2007, local officials laughed the hoaxers out of Hamilton, Texas: location of his gravesite.

Gov. Richardson is now in the last gasp of his hoax: pardoning Billy. Or is it Billy? As Attorney Bill Robins III states in his exhumation petitions: "he" deserves a pardon for having led a "long and law-abiding life" as "Brushy Bill." Real Billy had a short one. And law-abiding was not his strong suit.

The only pardon in question, is whether New Mexicans should pardon Bill Richardson for seven years of using their taxpayer dollars for sheriffs' departments, district courts, and public attorneys to oppose open records act requests in an attempt to give to Texas New Mexico's Old West Billy. And, ironically, Richardson wants to schedule his pardon charade during the October balloon festival. So there can be hot air in two places at the same time.




