

County Schedules Auction

On Tuesday, August 17th, county manager Tom Stewart presented a list of vehicles and equipment that the county no longer has need of, and asked the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners to authorize disposal of the properties through an auction to be held in November.

The list of obsolete items

includes a pumper, a tanker and a fire truck from three of the county's volunteer fire departments, several Ford Crown Victorias, passenger vans, sports utility vehicles, a pickup truck, a dump truck and a backhoe loader.

Smaller items will be auctioned as well; among them are a television and video cassette recorder, a fax machine and an exercise machine. An industrial

dishwasher, stainless steel table and cabinet from the detention center will be part of the disposable inventory, along with handheld radio equipment from fire departments.

Stewart said that he has invited the county's municipalities to participate in the auction and several have indicated an interest in doing so.

The county must receive approval from the state Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) and the state auditor before disposing of the properties, all valued at less than \$5,000. Three county officials must oversee the disposition.

The auction is scheduled to take place at the county warehouse in Carrizozo on November 6.

Capitan Street Addressing Issues Remain Unresolved

During the Tuesday, August 17th, meeting of the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart strongly expressed his frustration with what he sees as the slow-moving progress of the Village of Capitan in updating the 911 addressing system for that community.

The 911 addressing system is used to pinpoint the location of any call coming into the dispatch office of the sheriff's department through the 911 emergency number. Duplicate street names and addresses that are out of numerical sequence can create problems when emergency responders are dispatched to an address that can't easily be found.

Stewart said on Tuesday that resolving such 911 addressing problems in Capitan have been nearly impossible, and without a serious commitment from that village's administration. He said that the village has neglected to provide center-line address information, has yet to rename certain roads and loops that are confusing because of a similarity in names or questionable boundaries and is unreliable at handling telephone extracts that require verification.

Connie Stone, the county's rural addressing officer, told the county commissioners that she had been attempting to work with Capitan Village Clerk Kay Strickland and officer Kevin Kennedy in efforts to fix some of the problems with the village's addressing system.

"Going back to the basics of land-line telephone calls, if a customer calls for new service, they call Windstream," Stone began. "They give Windstream their physical address. If they omit a prefix of north, south, east or west, for example 103 Smokey Bear Boulevard, that is not in the 911 data base. They

must say east or west."

Stone used images of the information that appears on the monitors at the dispatch office to illustrate how, when a call comes in through the 911 emergency line, the dispatchers are provided information about the location from which the call was made and which emergency response teams should be contacted. In the case of a call coming from 103 Smokey Bear Boulevard, such information is not available to the dispatchers because the address is not complete, she explained.

"It cannot be mapped, therefore we cannot respond to a call without a voice telling us specifically where it is," Stone said. "It doesn't exist in the 911 system. East Smokey Bear Boulevard exists; West Smokey Bear Boulevard exists; Smokey Bear Boulevard does not exist. It gets real specific, which is why the county, in 2005, revamped our ordinance."

Stone said that the words north, south east and west have been removed from streets names in the county.

"That has worked very well for us in the unincorporated areas of the county," she said.

Road ranges, the span of addresses on any given street, also need to be accurate in order for emergency responders to quickly locate the source of a 911 call, Stone said.

"A call comes in from 223 West Second Street. If the road is grid ranged from 200 to 299, the subject will appear one-quarter of the way up the street on the left-hand side of the road. If it's ranged from 200 to 225, that's going to make a difference on where that location comes in," she explained.

If the road was ranged from 200 to 225, the same house would appear to the dispatchers to be at the end of

the road rather than one-quarter of the way down the road.

Stone and the county manager have asked Capitan officials to eliminate duplicate road names, to avoid more confusion for emergency responders. Stone said that there are three streets in the village that are all named Valley View. In another area of Capitan, there are even and odd numbered addresses on the same side of a street.

Because the Lincoln County Sheriff's office is the central point for all 911 calls coming from the unincorporated parts of the county as well as from the municipalities of Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona, the county is responsible for maintaining records of streets and addresses in accordance with state regulations. It is the county's responsibility to ensure that 911 emergency calls are responded to in the quickest possible manner, but without accurate addressing by the municipalities, the county is hindered in those efforts.

Stewart expressed his frustration with the village of Capitan's failure to remedy its addressing problems according to a timeline he presented.

"What I'm recommending is that we acknowledge that the village of Capitan wants to run their system the way they want to run it, but just don't hold the county liable when an ambulance can't find somebody," Stewart said. "This is very hard stuff. It's hard to go in there and tell somebody that they need to change their address. What I'm saying is, if the Village of Capitan wants to do its own thing, fine, but the county's not going to be liable."

Stewart went further by recommending that the county give the village 30-days notice of termination of the agreement that has the county handling all

Looking Back

'Through Our Old Files'

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

Tape Recorded Interviews With People Who Helped Build Lincoln County

Another time, in 1923, we had a wind-storm and a big snow. It was one of the worst blizzards, I guess, that was ever known in this part of the country. It froze 18 or 20 head of cattle in one corner of the fence out here at the Reservoir. The storm blew down 49 telephone poles on the company's line that went to Coyote. In a day or two I took two men and we went out to set up the bunch of poles that day and started back at dark along the pipeline road. Just as we drove through the gate on the White Oaks road, about 2 1/2 miles east of the railroad tracks, we ran out of gas. I said: "Boys, do you want to sit here all night or walk back to town?" They said, "We're ready to go." So we went out and walked eight miles into town.

Lots of time we'd work on the pipeline all day fixing leaks and then we'd get a call from the Bonita or somewhere that the line had blown out. So we'd head for that. Once we had worked all night in White Oaks canyon. It was an awful place. We uncovered about sixty feet of pipe and took out one joint and put in another. Along about daylight we got it fixed and also fixed some other leaks on the way back. Then about five that evening we got word that another leak had broken out on Nogal Mesa. We went over there and along about 9 o'clock that night. A bunch of the boys, were in the ditch digging away. I heard something that sounded like somebody snoring. I looked around and there was one of the boys asleep and snoring like a horse, standing up.

Another time we had a blowout on the Bonita and a bunch of us got there just before dark. We found that the pipe had blown out at the bottom. There was a hole 10 feet or more in the ground filled with water. We thought we'd eat first and then go to work and fix the pipe. We built a big bonfire and spread out our lunch. A.B. Zumwalt and one of the boys were a little late getting there. We had the supper prepared and were eating when they drove up. We said, come on boys, the lunches are ready. This boy who was with Zumwalt decided he would walk around the crowd and get on the other side. Doing so he fell into the hole and went out of sight. It was December and we had to do some work to get him out of there and rush him home so he could change his clothes. He happened to live up the creek a couple of miles. Such incidents as that were rather common on the pipeline.

One time when we were working along up there we had a fellow who carried hot tar in one pot and sawdust in another bucket. When we'd make a joint he'd swab and coat that joint with hot tar and then he'd take his hand and cover that over with sawdust to keep the tar from running off. This time he forgot and stuck his hand in the wrong pot. When he did that he tore off down that steep hill. He had run about three steps when one of these old pipe slats slapped him and he also caught his toe on a rock and made a crash landing. We helped him up and doctored him the best we could but in the meantime we couldn't keep from laughing. Every once in a while something like that would happen that would get us to laughing at one of the fellows and he'd usually get mad.

We had one fellow that we'd taken down the line to fix the telephone line. He had told us he was a real telephone man so we took him along to limb the poles. We went down on the flat where some insulators were off the poles. We said: "Put on your climbers and go up and fix it." he put them on but he couldn't any more climb that pole than a Chinaman. He'd press his legs against the pole and couldn't make his spurs hold. He'd get up a few feet and slip back. Zumwalt and I got to laughing. We rolled on our backs and laughed. That made the old boy mad. We said: "Well, you said you were a good climber so we thought we'd give you a chance."

He said: "If you fellows would carry a good pair of spurs I'd show you. When I get home I'm going to sharpen these spurs." We said OK, the blacksmith shop is ready. Help yourself.

From 1926 through 1929 Doug Cain worked with me on the pipeline. He now lives at Truth or Consequences where he owns some big ranches. During the time we worked together we looked after both the Bonita and the Three Rivers pipelines.

emergency dispatches from 911 calls originating in Capitan, and suggested that Capitan should establish its own dispatch system, much like the village of Ruidoso and the city of Ruidoso Downs have done.

"I want to provide accurate service to the village of Capitan, but they're not helping us," Stewart said. "I'm saying, if you're not going to cooperate with us, get your own dispatch. I think that we need to place them on notice. We need to get their attention. They need to get on the stick and properly address those houses or somebody's going to die."

Stewart, the county commissioners and county attorney Alan Morel all agreed that it was not feasible to expect Capitan to establish its own dispatch system at this time, and service must be provided as best as is possible, but the issue of liability is a concern.

County commissioner Tom Battin said that the situation is serious enough that it may become deadly, and suggested that the two county commissioners who represent parts of Capitan meet with the village council and attempt to find a solution.

"If there's a problem with some elected official there, this is not getting moved off dead center for some reason, perhaps they would appreciate the gravity of it if the two commissioners met with them," Battin said.

County commissioners Eileen Sedillo and Dave Parks agreed to meet with the Capitan village council, but Stewart said that he has already spoken with Capitan Mayor Sam Hammons regarding the issue.

"He doesn't want to budge," Stewart said.

Stone reported that her office has offered to help Capitan by using the Global Positioning System

(GPS) to accurately define street and address locations, and has been working with Kevin Kennedy in efforts to establish seamless transitions in the naming of streets and roads that are in both the village's and the county's jurisdictions.

"We've attempted to help them. We've offered to go out and GPS. We've offered to make sure that their address points are correct and give them an Excel spreadsheet so

that they can go through and say 'yes we're implementing this,' and we've been shot down on our attempts to do that," Stone said.

The board of county commissioners agreed to direct Stewart to send a letter to the Capitan officials

requesting that the village council meet with Sedillo and Parks to discuss ways to resolve the addressing issues there and to notify the village council that the continuation of its agreement for dispatch services is contingent upon resolving those issues.



SANTA FE -- August holds no holidays for New Mexicans. Heck, even members of the U.S. House of Representatives have to give up their traditional August recess to work on the ambitious agenda of Speaker Nancy Pelosi.

But August has many days to remember, especially for New Mexicans. We just don't celebrate them because they're all tinged with some bad memories.

Every elementary school child knows Christopher Columbus arrived in the New World on October 12, 1492. But he set sail on August 3 of that year.

They still are teaching elementary students that Columbus was the guy who figured out the world is round. But we have learned over the years that when he set sail, he had no doubt he wasn't going to fall off the edge of the earth.

Many people already knew the world was round and some even knew others had already explored new lands to the west. The only question was how far west.

It was August 1598 when Juan de Onate and his colonists reached Northern New Mexico.

It was August 10, 1680 when the Pueblos, with the help of Apaches, decided they didn't like Spanish rule. Some 400 colonists and 21 Franciscan missionaries were killed.

The rest fled down the Rio Grande to south of El Paso. It is said to be the first and only instance of Native Americans overthrowing their conquerors.

It was August 1846 when U.S. troops, under the command of Gen. Stephen Watts Kearny, invaded New Mexico. On August 22, Kearny declared all residents to be American citizens.

On August 6 and 9, Little Boy and Fat Man were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, assuring a quick end to the war. The dates are not celebrated in the United States. They are mourned by the Japanese and American peace activists.

At the time, it seemed to our leaders like the thing to do. High school graduates were being drafted and quickly sent to the Pacific to prepare for a land invasion expected to take a million lives.

Scientists and engineers from Los

Alamos were sent to the island of Tinian in the Northern Marianas, near Guam and Saipan, to prepare the bombs and the modified B-29s that would carry them.

We knew that American prisoners held in Japan, including 900 members of the New Mexico National Guard, would be shot as soon as a land invasion commenced. But when the two big ones dropped, prison guards throughout Japan ran for their homes and never returned.

Even before the two bombs dropped, Japan had been making efforts toward ending the war. But there were still holdouts in the Japanese high command that either wanted to fight to the end or to bargain for keeping the lands they had taken.

The bombs hastened the decision to surrender. Six days after the second bomb was dropped, Japan surrendered. It was high noon, August 15 in Tokyo and 6 p.m. the day before in Washington, D.C.

There was great rejoicing nationwide. Next to the photo of the

Iwo Jima flag raising, the picture of a sailor sweeping a nurse off her feet on Times Square is probably the most beloved in American history. I was a seven-year-old in Las Cruces watching the celebrating.

But the yearly celebrations didn't last. Although the bombs killed no more than our nightly saturation bombings of Japanese cities, the radiation deaths and illnesses that followed insured that nuclear devices have not been used in warfare since.

August also is the anniversary of New Mexico native Smokey Bear being adopted as our national forest fire prevention symbol in 1944. Even Smokey had a war connection.

All our able-bodied men were fighting elsewhere. And Japan was tying small bombs to gas balloons and launching them into the winds headed for our West Coast forests. Some of them made it. So the American public was alerted to fight forest fires.

FLOY SKINNER

One time we made a trip to Three Rivers. While we were there we stopped at a big corral belonging to the Hatchet Cattle Co. In this corral was a large stock shed, built in an L-shape. We went inside this shed. Cain was some distance ahead of me and turned a corner in the shed.

In a moment he came out with his hat in his hand, running as hard as he could. "Look out, Skinner!" he yelled. "There comes a wild bull!" I turned and made my getaway by scaling an 8-foot fence. When I topped out I looked back to see what had happened to Cain. He was standing there really laughing, I said: "What went wrong with that bull?" He said, "Skinner, I was always curious to know how fast you could run and I thought this would be a good place to test you out."

Some time later we were on the Bonita looking after the pipeline. The Bonita had considerable water in it. We had stopped at a place close to the river. When we started again we had to cross the stream. Cain said, "I believe I'll ride astraddle the hood across the creek." He jumped up on the hood and I started the car. It was a '27 Model T. I gave her all the gas she'd take.

I plowed through the creek as fast as she'd go and Cain got the full contents of all the water in the creek. When I stopped on the other side he said "What's the idea of all this?" I said, "Cain, I was always curious to know how fast this pickup could cross one of these creeks."

Cain and I worked together about three years. We really enjoyed our work together, although we worked hard.

One thing I'd like to mention is that about 1893 my father saw the need for orchards in the county. He got the agency from Stark Brothers Nursery and sold and delivered trees all over the county. He started many farmers in the orchard business.

Later he went into the boot and shoe business. He taught some of the grandchildren the shoemaker's trade. Today, John Skinner of Portales has quite a large boot, show, saddlery and western store. George Skinner of Clovis has a similar type of store.

There are only two left from the family of my mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Skinner -- myself and my sister, Mrs. A.B. Zumwalt. There were six in the family, four boys and two girls.

Next year, as I mentioned before, will be my 50th anniversary with the Southern Pacific Company. Mrs. Skinner and I will also celebrate our fiftieth wedding anniversary.

There will be two more hearings for the CDBG grant monies (Community Development Block Grant). Those meetings will be posted and will be held at City Hall. We are hoping for street, water, and drainage repair.

The Walk-A-Thon for the St. Rita Church went off without a hitch on Saturday and was a success. I spoke with some of the walkers and they said how nice the walk was. The sunrise was beautiful and they wished more people would have been there to enjoy the entire experience. They walked the 10 miles in approximately three hours and 10 minutes. It was a good start and they are confident it will be even better next year.

Don't forget the Fiesta this weekend at the St. Rita Church. Food, fun, games, and dancing are just some of the things that will be taking place. Hopefully you will be able to attend some if not all of the festivities.

FOLKLORE CORNER

(Editor's note: In the spring of 1919 Roy Tiry of Hillsboro, then foreman of the GOS Ranch in the Black Range, brought Ben Lilly, famous New Mexico hunter to the ranch to hunt mountain lions with which the GOS was infested. Tiry became well acquainted with Lilly. These are stories about the hunger that he recalled.)

The Aspen Bark Check

Ben Lilly once obtained a few necessary supplies from the fire guard at Reed's Peak Lookout in the Black Range. The guard did not want to accept any money, but Lilly insisted on paying. Lilly cut a piece of bark from an aspen tree and wrote out a check to the guard with an indelible pencil. The guard later cashed the check at the old Silver City National Bank in which Lilly had an account. Tiry once saw the check on display in the bank.

Barrel Contest

Lilly wore heavy shoes, and he made them heavier by knocking off the wooden heels and putting on pieces of iron. The iron heels were good for sliding down hills, the hunter said. But heavy as his footwear was, he could outjump the cowboys in the barrel contest.

The GOS bought salt in big barrels, at least three feet high. In the barrel contests, the idea was to jump in the barrel and then out of it.

Tiry said the cowboys could jump into a barrel but none could jump out. Lilly could jump in and out of the barrel despite his heavy shoes and the fact that he was then well along in years.
