

County Awards Lodger's Tax Funds

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners granted five requests for Lodger's Tax funding during its regular meeting held on September 24th.

Carrizozo Works, Incorporated, represented by Elaine Brannen, was awarded \$350 for the Music in the Parks program and it's hosting of the Carrizozo Cider Festival on October 3rd. Funding will be used for advertising, posters and flyers promoting the event.

A request for \$2,500 to promote Military Appreciation Weekend (MAW) in Ruidoso on

October 15th and 16th was granted \$1,500, following the recommendation of the Lodger's Tax Committee. The request was presented by Millie Woods.

Kathy Alexander, of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, submitted a request for \$3,000 to advertise the six-week-long Festival of Lights throughout the state and in west Texas. The Lodger's Tax Committee recommended awarding \$1,500, which the board of commissioners approved. The Festival of Lights encompasses a series of events in several venues throughout the winter holiday season.

Alexander submitted a second request for funding to advertise Ruidoso's Aspenfest on October 2nd and 3rd. Advertising for that event will be focused in the areas of eastern Texas, El Paso and Roswell. The request was for \$2,000; the committee recommended an award of \$1,000 which the county commissioners approved.

Nancy Mitchell, representing New Mexico Connection, requested \$3,150 to pay for the distribution of printed information advertising Lincoln County. Mitchell's firm represents about 10 clients, including the New Mexico Department of Tourism, and distrib-

utes promotional information at several national events. Among those events are travel shows, the Texas State Fair, the AARP (American Association of Retired Persons) National Convention, the Winter Texas Travel Show, the Canadian Snowbird Celebration, the RV Adventure and Travel Show in Phoenix and the Travel, Adventure and Boat Show in Minneapolis. The request for \$3,150 was approved in full.

County manager Tom Stewart said that the county grants funding annually to Mitchell's firm to promote local recreation, events and tourist attractions.

Carrizozo Police have issued an arrest warrant for John Ortiz 5'6" 235 lbs brown eyes brown hair Hispanic male

Police chief Rachel Weiser said that on Monday, September 20 at around 1100 p.m. Ofc. Gary Lindsey responded to the area of Drexel and D Ave in reference to several 911 calls about someone breaking into someone's yard on D Ave and subject breaking glass out of houses on Drexel.

According to Weiser, Ofc. Lindsey arrived where Ortiz confronted Lindsey with broken pieces of glass. Ortiz charged at Ofc. Lindsey and then ran to his own car, got into the car and left.

Ofc. Lindsey followed after him awaiting backup.

Carrizozo Releases Animal Control Policy

During a special meeting of the Carrizozo town council last Thursday, September 23rd, the first public hearing on the town's new animal control policies and procedures manual was held.

Carrizozo resident Barbara Culler, founder of Miracle's Paws for Pets, was granted unlimited time during the hearing to express her views regarding the new policies. Culler has been active in working with the Carrizozo animal control officers and staff in the past.

Culler began by asking for an amendment to the policy which would permit dogs held at the Carrizozo animal shelter to be placed together in containment only if the dogs are compatible and of the same sex. She suggested that the policy should also require that a qualified person be on site while the animals are together just in case a problem, like a dog fight, should occur.

Culler cited a recent incident that occurred in a shelter in another state in which several dogs were caged together and a fight broke out. Many of the dogs were injured and one killed as a result of the fight because the animal control workers were not paying attention, Culler said. She

added that the socialization of animals is very valuable to the efforts of placing those animals in new homes if necessary, but the socialization must be handled under careful supervision. She also explained the importance of keeping dogs that are members of the same family together at the shelter because it is emotionally harder on the dogs if they are separated.

Trustee Dennis Vega said that the town has neither the staff nor the budget to have someone supervise animals at the shelter, but Culler said that whoever

is tasked with cleaning the shelter could let the dogs be together during cleaning hours.

Police chief Rachel Weiser said that it's not feasible to keep the dogs under supervision throughout the day; her department has been in charge of animal control since the town's former animal control officer was moved to another department leaving the town without an animal control officer, and placing the extra burden of animal control on the already under-staffed police department. She acknowledged the value of pro-

viding sheltered dogs with an appropriate amount of exercise each day, and suggested that dogs known to be compatible with each other could be left together in a large exercise pen for a few hours during the day without direct supervision.

"If the dogs came in together and they're very good buddies, there's no problem with that," Culler commented, "but I want you to realize there is the possibility of having a big dog fight if there's nobody there."

Culler also recommended that a sec-

Trinity Site Open Saturday, October

Trinity Site will be open to the public Saturday, October 1.

Trinity Site is where the first atomic bomb was tested at 5:29:45 a.m. Mountain War Time on July 16, 1945. The 19 kiloton explosion not only led to a quick end to the war in the Pacific but also ushered the world into the atomic age.

Included on the Trinity Site tour is Ground Zero where the atomic bomb was placed on a 100-foot steel tower. A small monument now marks the spot. Visitors also see the McDonald ranch house where the world's first plutonium core for a bomb was assembled.

Trinity Site is on the White Sands Missile Range. The missile range provides historical photographs

and a Fat Man bomb casing for display. There are no ceremonies or speakers.

A valid drivers license proving U.S. citizenship and proof of current auto insurance coverage for your vehicle are required.

Those planning to visit Trinity Site should have a full tank of fuel and a spare tire because there are no facilities on the range on the way to Trinity Site.

You must carry a picture ID on you while on the range.

Cameras are allowed at Trinity Site but their use is strictly prohibited anywhere else on White Sands Missile Range.

Trinity Site is located on the northern end of the 3,200-square-

Safety Corridor Change from US70 to NM48

The New Mexico Department of Transportation Traffic Safety Section is taking proactive steps to keep traffic moving on US 70 and NM 48 in Lincoln County, while enhancing safety for motorists and pedestrians along those busy corridors. The department is designating NM 48 as a safety corridor and removing the safety corridor from US 70.

Safety corridors are designed to reduce motor crashes, US 70 was designated a safety corridor dur-

ing the US 70 Hondo Valley Project in 2003, and was the second highway to be designated a safety corridor.

The segment of road on NM 48 between Ruidoso and Capitan, from mile marker 9 to mile marker 19, will have new signs notifying motorists of the safety corridor. The change will take affect the week of October 4th.

A safety corridor is designed to reduce traffic crashes and fatalities on certain stretches of a highway that have high crash rates.

The safety corridor designation allows for an increased law enforcement presence, along with an increase in traffic violation fines. Motorists caught speeding in a safety corridor will be assessed double fines. Seatbelt use will also be closely monitored with general emphasis on safe-driving habits.

The primary objective of a safety corridor is to instill safe driving habits among motorists and reduce crashes. Other goals include education, speed control,

heightened inspections of semi-trucks and tractor-trailers and better signage. The department designates safety corridors based on the crash rate per road miles, followed by an action plan to improve safety on the designated route.

There were a total of 303 accidents on NM 48 during the last three years.

Safety Corridors are authorized by New Mexico Statute Section 66-7-301, Subsection A (allows DOT to designate safety corridors), and Section 66-8-116,

subsection D (doubles fine for speeding in the corridor).

Ortiz attempted several times to run Lindsey off the road by reversing the vehicle and attempting to hit Lindsey's vehicle, he also tried sideswiping vehicle at times.

Ofc. Lindsey followed him to railroad tracks where Ortiz became stuck on tracks. He fled on foot.

Other officers arrived on scene where calls continued to come in to dispatch of windows being broken.

Officers responded to the area of Drexel again, spoke with witnesses and made an attempt to contact Ortiz's mother (where he resides). No contact could be made with her.

Officers continued searching the area and speaking with residents until 4 a.m. When he couldn't be located the search ended.

At 6 a.m. Ortiz's mother called to say he had damaged a potted plant on her front porch. She did not want to file charges.

An arrest warrant was obtained for Ortiz and contact was made with Ortiz via telephone and advised of the warrant/charges. He advised he would turn himself in, which as of this date he has not.

The warrant is for criminal damage to property, and two counts (Felony) of Aggravated Assault on a Peace Officer. Subject has an extensive criminal history and a history of resisting arrest and battery on peace officers. Subject stated he would not go back to jail without a fight.

Police chief Weiser said that if subject is spotted to contact Carrizozo Police Department at 575-648-2351 or LCSO at 575-648-2341. And not for anyone to contact subject personally.

mile White Sands Missile Range between the towns of Carrizozo and Socorro.

There are two ways of entering the restricted missile range on tour days:

Visitors can enter through the range's Stallion Range Center which is five miles south of Highway 380. The turnoff is 12 miles east of San Antonio, N.M., and 53 miles west of Carrizozo. The Stallion gate will be open 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Visitors arriving at the gate between those hours will receive hand-outs and will be allowed to drive unescorted the 17 miles to Trinity Site. The road is paved and marked.

The other way of entering the missile range is by travelling with a caravan sponsored by the Alamogordo (N.M.) Chamber of Commerce. The caravan forms at the Tularosa High School Football Field parking lot around 7:00 - 7:30 a.m. and leaves at 8:00 a.m. Visitors entering this way will travel as an escorted group with military police to and from Trinity Site. The drive is 144 miles round trip. There are no service station facilities on the missile range. The caravan is scheduled to leave Trinity Site around 12:00 p.m. - 12:30 p.m. for the return to Alamogordo. The caravan may leave later if there is a large number of vehicles in the returning caravan.

Trinity Site is open to the public only two days a year, the first Saturday in April and the first Saturday in October.

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Altrusa/LCMC Team Up Against Cancer

For the 22nd year in a row, Altrusa Club of Ruidoso will partner with Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) to offer low cost mammograms to residents of Lincoln County. The program is available Monday through Friday, from October 4 through October 29, at a cost of \$55. In order to take advantage of this program, you must be

between 30 and 64 years of age, and be a Lincoln County resident, or have a doctor in Lincoln County. The program offers routine mammograms only, and cannot serve patients with implants or augmentation.

The Altrusa Low Cost Mammogram Program is designed for people who are uninsured or those with high deductibles, who could

not otherwise afford the cost of an annual mammogram. Since the price is deeply discounted, it is not eligible for insurance reimbursement.

Call Terri Trotter in Ruidoso at 258-4615 to schedule an appointment for this life saving procedure. Terri is accepting calls starting September 20, Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. On two days only, October 7 and October 14, Shirley Neuhaus will be available at the same telephone number to assist Spanish speaking patients with making an appointment.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women begin getting yearly mammograms at age 40 if they're at average risk of developing breast cancer. Women at high risk may want to start screening before 40. Risk factors include lifestyle factors such as diet and exercise, and genetic and environmental factors such as a family history of cancer. A woman's chance of getting breast cancer increases as she ages.

Breast cancer is the second leading cause of cancer death for women in the United States.

In 2009, according to the American Cancer Society, an estimated 192,370 women in the United States were diagnosed with invasive breast cancer and about 40,610 women were expected to die from the disease. About 1,910 men in the United States were diagnosed with breast cancer.

Finding the disease early with mammograms can save your life. A mammogram can show cancer that is too small for you or your doctor to feel. And smaller tumors are more likely to be early-stage tumors, therefore less likely to have spread to surrounding tissue or other parts of the body.

Mammogram screening is among the best early detection methods, yet 13 million U.S. women 40 years of age or older have never had a mammogram.

tion of the new policy that said dogs at the shelter will be given blankets to lie on only in the evening before the facility is locked up for the night be amended.

"That's fine in the summer, but what about in the winter when it's cold?" Culler asked. "I'm hoping to be able to get you beds that are a little bit off the floor, but if those are not available, it's cold on the concrete floor."

The discussion provided no information about what happened to the raised beds that were used by the animal shelter until about a year ago and are no longer on the premises.

Culler also asked that the placement of unclaimed animals into an adopting family be added to the list of objectives for the animal shelter. She and her organization have had great successes in placing abandoned animals with qualified families and no-kill shelters. She also asked that the policy contain some wording to establish a policy for calling in a veterinarian at the first sign of an outbreak of disease at the shelter, and suggested that muzzles in various sizes, protective gowns and face masks be included in the equipment list for personnel working with the animals.

The policy states that animals cannot be left in a vehicle for more than two hours when the temperature is above 70 degrees, but Culler said that she thought two hours might be too long, especially when temperatures reach 90 degrees or more.

Mayor Mike Petty said that the animal control officer would not likely leave an animal in a vehicle for any length of time, and the policy would be dictated by common sense.

Culler and other audience members questioned the presence of common sense in certain past incidents involving animal control issues, and said that a specific policy is needed because common sense is not necessarily all that common.

Town attorney LeeAnne Leonard suggested changing the policy to mandate that an animal being kept in a vehicle by an animal control officer must be checked on at intervals no longer than every hour and, after two hours in the vehicle the animal must be delivered to the shelter.

Weiser said that the policy should include some type of protocol for officers to follow in the case of an injured animal being discovered after normal business hours.

"It's nine-o'clock at night; this dog's been hit on Central. What do you do with it? Take it to the shelter and let it sit until you get a vet?" Weiser asked. "We don't have an emergency service for a vet and there needs to be something that spells out what the procedure is."

Leonard said the policy leaves the decision to the discretion of the officer unless the animal's life is in danger, in which case a veterinarian must be called. Whether or not the animal's life is in danger would be a common sense decision left to the officer.

The new animal control policy and procedures manual addresses a wide range of issues that apply to both animal control personnel and the public, including containment and leash policies, humane conditions for animals, making or responding to animal issue complaints and diseases that can affect animals and humans that come in contact with them.



Who sets the dates for DST?

Will Vegas Bet on Billy the Kid's Pardon?

SANTA FE -- Did former New Mexico Territorial Gov. Lew Wallace offer Billy the Kid a pardon? And if he did, why didn't he follow through? Inquiring minds want to know. And that includes current Gov. Bill Richardson.

The most recent installment in The Kid's saga saw five descendants of Sheriff Pat Garrett visit Gov. Richardson to express concern that their grandfather is being maligned by unfounded conjecture that he really didn't shoot Billy.

As a result of the meeting, Gov. Richardson sent a letter to the Garrett family stating that he has no doubt that Sheriff Pat Garrett killed Billy the Kid.

That assurance meant the world to the Garretts because every newspaper story about the current controversies includes a section about the rumors that Garrett shot someone else and the Kid lived a long life elsewhere.

Seven years ago, Gov. Richardson supported an investigation by three lawmen down south into whether Garrett killed the right man. Although that investigation hasn't reached a conclusion, Richardson says he has.

That gubernatorial assurance was greeted with cheers from the many Billy the Kid buffs who were appalled at the gullibility of people prone to believe made-up history.

Gov. Richardson also made it clear that he may still consider a pardon but that if he does, it will focus on the alleged promise that Territorial Gov. Lew Wallace made to the Kid and that he will be fair in his review of the historical record.

That should strip away the fears that Gov. Richardson has something else up his sleeve. It now comes back to the request Gov. Richardson made to me last April to sample Billy the Kid historians to determine their thoughts about granting a pardon.

The response I received from most historians was support for the pardon considera-

tion if it could conducted in a scholarly and dignified manner. It was when the word got around to others that most of the controversy started.

There will still be controversy. Gov. Wallace didn't say much about his deal with the Kid. And some of that was two decades later when he was in a very romanticized frame of mind.

Also at issue is the propriety of second guessing a governor's actions of 130 years ago. What Richardson proposes is legal. The question now is propriety and the historians can discuss it from an historical basis.

Here's what we know about Gov. Wallace and the pardon promise. The only meeting between Wallace and the Kid was in Lincoln in a house owned by Squire Wilson.

We know Wilson was present at the beginning of the meeting. We don't know if he

stayed or participated in any discussion. Wallace never said anything about the meeting. Neither did Wilson.

After the meeting, neither Wallace or Billy ever turned to Wilson for verification of anything said during the meeting.

Billy spoke and wrote often about the deal but he never called it a pardon. Billy said he upheld his end of the deal by testifying against the murderers of attorney Houston Chapman.

It was during the period following Billy's testimony and his conviction for killing Sheriff Brady that a pardon would have been expected. But none ever came.

Following the Kid's conviction, Wallace was asked by a reporter for the Las Vegas Gazette whether he would pardon Billy. Wallace answered that Billy should expect no clemency. That evening, the Kid escaped from the Lincoln

This ordinance as adopted shall be available for inspection in the office of the municipal clerk during regular and normal business hours of the municipal clerk. A copy of the code shall be available upon request and payment of a reasonable charge.

WHEREAS, the major change in the 2010 Compilation is the page numbering system. A new section to 12-1-2.1 Definition of "Access-Aisle", changes to Section 12-6-12.2, Section H and adding Section L, Section O, in Section 12-9-9 add Section F, and add a new Section 12-9-10.

WHEREAS, this ordinance shall take effect on the 16th day of September 2010.

WHEREAS, the 2004 Compilation and all amendments thereto are expressly repealed.

CHAPTER 1, SECTION 5:C(1)

And
TITLE 9, CHAPTER 2, SECTION 3:A
AND SECTION 6:A(1) and 6:B
OF THE VILLAGE OF CAPITAN CODE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF CAPITAN OF CAPITAN, NEW MEXICO.

SECTION 1. ADOPTION BY REFERENCE

Amending Title 9 (Utilities), Chapter 1 (Utility Payments; Fees and Charges), Section 5:C(1) (Late Fee; Water Meter Turn Off; Charges) of the Village Code which reads "Should payment not be received by due date, ten dollar (\$10.00) late fee will be assessed." to read "Should payment not be received by the due date, a ten dollar (\$10.00) late fee will be assessed on the 20th of each month, or the first business day thereafter."

Amending Title 9 (Utilities), Chapter 2 (Water Service Regulations) Section 3:A (Size of Service Tap) of the Village Code which reads "The standard tap shall be three-fourths inch (3/4") in diameter. If requested, considering the water supply and service facilities, the board of trustees may approve a larger tap. Where a larger tap is permitted, the cost of the tap will be fixed by the board of trustees. Cost will be determined by the cost of the materials and labor to provide the connection, but in no instance shall be less than the charge for a three-fourths inch (3/4") tap" to read "The standard tap shall be three-fourths inch (3/4") in diameter. Where a tap larger than one inch (1") is needed, the cost will be determined according to Section 9-2-6:B, but in no instance shall the costs be less than the charge for a three-fourths (3/4") tap.

Amending Title 9 (Utilities), Chapter 2 (Water Service Regulations) Section 6:A(1) (New Tap and Service Connection) of the Village Code which reads "Upon application for a new tap and service connection by any consumer within the corporate limits of the village, the applicant shall pay one thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$1,250.00) to cover the cost of a three-fourths inch (3/4") tap, installation of the tap, and the necessary pipe from the main to the curb box" to read "Upon application for a new tap and service connection by any consumer within the corporate limits of the village, the applicant shall pay one thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$1,250.00) to cover the costs of a three-fourths inch (3/4") and a one inch (1") tap, installation of the tap, and necessary pipe from the main to the curb box."

Amending Title 9 (Utilities), Chapter 2 (Water Service Regulations) Section 6:B (New Tap and Service Connection) of the Village Code which reads "Installation Charges: Installation charges for new meters and water lines larger than three-fourths inch (3/4") meter shall be based upon the invoice cost of said meter, stopcock, box and line, together with a reasonable charge for labor for the installations" to read "Installation Charges: Installation charges for new meters and water lines larger than a one inch (1") meter shall be based upon the invoice cost of said meter, stopcock, box, and line plus a fee of \$500.00".

This ordinance as adopted shall be available for inspection in the office of the municipal clerk during regular and normal business hours of the municipal clerk. A copy of the code shall be available upon request and payment of a reasonable charge.


