

State Closes Fort Stanton Cemetery

During Tuesday's meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart reported having received notice that the historic Merchant Marine Cemetery at Fort Stanton was being closed to future burials. Stewart said he was notified by Larry Holt, a local resident that he said has been involved with activities at the cemetery for many years. Stewart responded to Holt's concerns by contacting the president of the Museum of New Mexico

State Board of Regents to inquire about the alleged closure, and received a reply early Tuesday morning.

Although the cemetery is not technically closed to all future burials, the cemetery plots are now reserved for only those who meet the specific criteria that were spelled out at the time the cemetery was established, Stewart explained.

The cemetery will remain open to the burials of deceased Merchant Marines, spouses of Merchant Marines and people associated with or employed by the Fort

Stanton hospital before its closure in 1954.

Stewart said that the state's justification for the continued moratorium on burials outside of the given criteria stems from the cemetery's status as an historic site; it is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as a Merchant Marine Cemetery.

The state's expressed concern is that the historic integrity and status of the cemetery could become compromised if burials unauthorized by the document that established the site were permitted.

Holt, who identified himself as the volunteer coordinator at the Fort Stanton Cemetery and the Acting Administrative Officer for the Department of Veterans Services, offered the county commissioners a brief history of the cemetery and a list of the many different agencies that have had control of the site over the past few decades, including State Monuments, Veteran's Services and the Department of Corrections. He said for many years the policies applied to use of the cemetery followed national cemetery guidelines and he

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

Nogal Fire Station Improvements Delayed

Efforts by county manager Tom Stewart, emergency services director Travis Atwell and the county's volunteer fire departments over the past couple of years have resulted in not only in better local training opportunities for firefighters, but also in the procurement of an array of upgrades to fire fighting apparatus across the county.

Most of the county's fire departments were, some still are, housed in antiquated structures inadequate for the new fire trucks and other equipment now used by those departments. Among the departments facing such issues is the Nogal fire station, housed in the Ralph Forsythe Hall just off of Highway 37 in the small town site.

The Nogal department is currently

keeping at least one emergency response vehicle off-site due to limited space at the department headquarters, and is slated for expansion with a budget of about \$37,000 to work with.

On Tuesday, during the regular November meeting of the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners, county manager Tom Stewart said that he had received an estimate for adding an additional bay onto the Nogal fire station for something more than \$160,000. He said that he immediately dismissed the bid and requested an inquiry into seeing how that cost can be reduced.

The manager attributed the high cost of the estimate to requirements to bring the structure and grounds into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

"Handicapped parking pads, upgrades to bathrooms and electrical work were included and thought to be required by Construction Industry Division," Stewart said. "I might just add that a federal law goes into effect March, 2011. They will continue to emphasize ADA compliance. I think you're going to see more of this kind of insistence on bringing things up to speed."

Stewart said that he hasn't had an opportunity to read the new law fully, but said it will be costly to the county. He also said that he nixed the estimate based wholly on cost, so he wasn't exactly sure what percentage of the price was due to the ADA requirement compliance issues. He said that because the expansion of the fire station is planned as an addition to the existing structure instead of a separate building activates the requirement to bring the old structure up to ADA compliance.

County clerk Rhonda Burrows added that the fire station in Nogal, as well as one fire station in the Bonito jurisdiction, serves as a polling location.

"It's one of our problem polling locations as far as ADA requirements," Burrows said. "We have issues with polling locations

Resident Frustrated by Animal Control

Carrizozo resident Barbara Culler has been involved in animal welfare activism for many years. She assisted both Lincoln County and the town of Carrizozo in updating and amending their animal control ordinances and is a founder of the non-profit animal welfare organization Miracles Paws for Pets.

During a recent meeting of the Carrizozo Town Council, Culler posed a few questions and expressed some discontent with the slow progress of bringing the Carrizozo Animal Shelter back into full operational status. Most of recent improvements made at the shelter were completed during the previous administration of Mayor Bob Hemphill and funded with \$30,000 from the county taxpayers.

"We've passed policy; we have an ordinance; that's two parts of the way. Now what are you doing?" Culler asked mayor Mike Petty and the town trustees during their regular November meeting.

"I know we're going to lose some police officers, but are we doing anything out at the kennels, the things that need to be done so that when we get another officer we can start right in?" she asked.

Petty responded by telling Culler that the gates at the shelter had been fixed, the grounds have been "worked on", and he didn't know whether any road work had been done or not.

"From where the kennel area is to the office, that's all open," Petty said. "Joey (town foreman Joe Thornton) is going to fix it; I don't know if he has or not."

Petty said that there would be a change in personnel at the Carrizozo Police Department within about 30 days. Responsibility for the town's animal control division was passed on to the police department about a year ago when the town's ani-

mal control officer was transferred to another department following allegations, and an investigation by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, regarding violations of animal control policies and laws.

Culler asked if anything had been done to ensure that there will be heat in the shelter this winter, assuming that the facility will become operational again sometime before next summer, and whether anyone knew the location of the temporary heaters that were used in the shelter in the past.

"For heating, there is nothing that has been done. We could talk about using heat lamps in each individual cell," Petty replied.


"I guess I might sound a little frustrated," Culler told him, "but I sat down the other night and realized I've been discussing this with the town since 2004, almost seven years and, other than having the building better than what was there, we are right in the same place."

Petty said that the animals that are being reported running at large all belong to Carrizozo residents and have been returned to their owners without need for the use of the shelter, but Culler said that, in at least one recent case, a resident took a stray dog to the Humane Society of Lincoln County in Ruidoso because its owner could not be determined and the Carrizozo shelter was closed.

"Why should they have to pay the money to release her to Ruidoso when it's something this town has a contract with?" Culler asked. "We need to do something and we need to do it not five years from now," she added.

Hemphill said that he took exception to the idea that nothing has been done to the kennel in seven years, referring to the \$30,000 of county funds and about \$3,000 in matches by the town that was spent on upgrades to the kennels and drainage system at the facility.

"There's been a lot done in that kennel out there," Hemphill said. "It may not be exactly what she wants right now but, by golly, it's been going in the direction she would like. If we had some more people that were concerned about picking the animals up and helping instead of just

saying 'when are you going to do it', from this side it's a little easier to say those things," he said. Trustee Dennis Vega said that a lot of work associated with shelter operations has gone on behind closed doors, but made no indication of any progress in any particular direction.

that we're really going to have to address."

Stewart agreed. "I think it's time for us to pursue making things as compatible as we possibly can," Stewart said. "It's just going to add to the cost of projects that we've done in the past to

make sure that we follow the guidelines. We'll pursue that."

Another time when I was boarding with the Kemps, I decided to come home. It was in June, and it was raining this time too. I've never seen it rain so hard before or since. You could hardly see your horse's head. The Carrizozo flats were covered with a foot of water. I was riding a fine horse but it did not belong to me. I had on a yellow slicker and a slicker hat. At the culvert at the old Vera Cruz mine a man stepped out on each side of the culvert and pulled down on me. I thought it was a joke. I reined the horse and said: "Why, hello boys. What's up?" They let their guns down and stood there while I rode on. They were looking for a certain man to come riding down that trail, and the man they were looking for was also looking for them. If I'd been that certain man they would probably have shot first and answered questions later.

Harry Comrey was a veteran of the Spanish-American War -- the only war in history with 100 per cent volunteers. He was a private under the command of Col. A. B. Fall. Harry passed away in December, 1937. He is buried in the Carrizozo cemetery. Ed Comrey, who left this earth March 18, 1943 also sleeps there in the family plot.

After Harry's death I worked the ranch for two years until I secured the price that Harry set before he died. It was the water that sold the ranch. It had a spring and one of the best wells in the country.

The Comrey boys were not geologists, but they studied the dirt when they drilled a well. They could tell after they had gone down a short distance whether the location was good. They didn't believe in water watching.

My sister came to New Mexico about 1918. She married Mr. Fisher. She had two children. Ben Greisen is my nephew.

My mother passed away in 1928 at the age of 85. She is buried at Angus in a spot picked out by her. Mrs. Fisher is also buried there.

Heavy Rains on Outlying Flats Produces Flood Conditions in Carrizozo

Property owners in Carrizozo were cleaning up around their places Thursday as the result of a flash flood that poured into town Tuesday afternoon from the flat south of town.

A second downpour in the same area Wednesday afternoon caused an additional runoff into town.

Tuesday's cloudburst was concentrated in a comparatively small area between Carrizozo and Water Canyon. Arroyos and draws funneled the water into the south side of town, which was heaviest hit. One person said it looked like a sheet of approaching water.

The flood poured down all streets on the south side and began to build up in front of the Southern Pacific tracks when the culverts could not take care of the runoff. Water entered at least four homes. They were those of Sally Ortiz, Sabino San Roman, Speedie Jaurequi and Tony Lueras; also the poultry building of Leandro Vega and Sons.

Principal damage resulting from the flood was to the town's streets and to Southern Pacific property.

Mayor Wayne Withers said Wednesday evening that the streets "are going to take a lot of grading and a lot of fixing." The strip of paving on upper E Avenue, south of the tracks, was broken and washed out.

Red Canyon Responds to Call for Assistance

In response to a call, via Oscura, that Carrizozo was threatened by a serious flood, Lt.-Col. John J. McCarthy promptly dispatched Army personnel to give assistance. About 125 men, accompanied by Col. McCarthy, Staff Engineer Major George L. Burch and Chief Warrant Officer Rice, arrived intown at 4:15.

would like to see those guidelines continued.

Holt said that he had been led to believe that federal funding was to be used to expand the Fort Stanton Cemetery to about double its current size of 13 acres, and the added space would be constructed in such a way as to preserve the historic status of the original section. He admitted that he had no documentation to support what he had been told.

"The state turned down the monies for this grant, which one million dollars was going to be spent to do the restoration of the old officers building for the museum, for the cemetery offices," Holt said. "I was told by the Department of Veterans Services that they turned down this money because the government in Santa Fe stated that it is not the state's responsibility to bury veterans."

Holt said he asked state officials about what was to become of all of the veterans that hold letters from various government agencies stating that they and their families can be buried at the cemetery, and that the response he got was "that's a good question".

He appealed to the board of county commissioners to approach state officials with a request to continue to allow veterans to be buried at the Fort Stanton Cemetery, especially those who live in this area, so that their remains are close to home and easily accessible to their families.

County commissioner Jackie Powell suggested that all of the state representatives for Lincoln County be contacted and asked to work on making it possible to continue burials at the cemetery for all veterans.

Commissioner Dave Parks asked Stewart to draft a clearly-stated resolution on the matter.

Tom Battin, chairman of the board of county commissioners, said that, after speaking with Governor Bill Richardson some time ago, he was left with the impression that establishing Fort Stanton as a state monument would make it possible to improve, enhance and continue operations at the cemetery.

Holt said that of the 1,750 or so buried at the cemetery, about 300 are Merchant Marines. There is more than enough land to accommodate at least another 1,750 burials, he said, and those could be in an area away from the existing gravesites that would not compromise the historic value of the original cemetery.


Battin said that he suspected the cemetery policy to be an overreaction to the state's budgetary woes, even though burials would bear no financial burden to the state if the doors were opened to federal funding assistance.

"I would encourage people to make phone calls, write letters, whatever you can do that you think would be effective," Battin said. "I think you have support. We'll do what we can do."

Veterans Get Axed by the State

A week ago today was Veteran's Day and people were asked to pay respect to Veterans. Many did; however the Museum of New Mexico Board of Regents took an entirely different approach and thus caused heartache for many Veterans. One elderly Veteran said for years that Fort Stanton Cemetery would be his final resting place, and a couple of years ago when he died his last request was granted. He did not live to see Fort Stanton Cemetery closed to future burials.

The day before Veteran's Day regents voted to close Fort Stanton Cemetery to future burials except for deceased Merchant Marines, spouses of Merchant Marines and people who worked at Fort Stanton Hospital before 1954.

The sad thing is that numerous Veterans had made arrangements to be buried at the Fort Stanton Cemetery. Now those plans must change and some Veterans are in a quandry as to why. They are asking if their time serving this nation was not valuable or was of no consequence.

Evidently the regents are not aware of how some people view this decision as a tragedy. One person blithely remarked that it didn't matter where a person was buried. Others are asking if there will be a padlock at the Fort Stanton Cemetery to keep people from putting flowers on graves and paying respects. No answer is given.

Much confusion surrounds this decision. Is it because through the years the state General Services Department was thwarted at many of the decisions? It was thought that at one time the General Services Department had plans to sell the water rights at Fort Stanton but it didn't happen. It was also rumored that a portion of the property would become a development with exorbitant prices for the lots. That didn't happen either.

Perhaps the underlying reason will not be made public, shrouded by vague comments about not wanting to endanger the Historical status. But there is a reason, and it has nothing to do with the budget crisis. Closer investigation might show that someone somewhere could benefit monetarily.



Gov-Elect is Ready for Action

SANTA FE -- A hearty thanks to Gov-Elect Susana Martinez for assuring that my job will remain easy and fun. For 16 years, with Gary Johnson and Bill Richardson as governors, this job has been a joy.

I woke up every morning knowing they would give me something to write about that day. Former Gov. Bruce King's motto was "Let's keep it between the fence posts." Not much to write about there.

Martinez is not easing into her office, she is diving head first. With the current economic and political situations, she doesn't have much choice. But she's not being timid about it.

So let's look at some of the big items that are confronting her already. We're at the point where band-aids and across-the-board cuts are worn out. Tough decisions now have to be made on what is too important to cut any more and what may have to be completely eliminated.

The Rail Runner commuter train isn't popular with much of the state. The reality that it is almost exclusively for state employees to get to work is underlined this week by the decision to not run on Thanksgiving or the day after.

Thanksgiving's fine. But the day after is the biggest shopping day of the year. Santa Fe merchants are furious. But what do you do with a train that really isn't needed and that no one wants to buy? Susana will look for answers.

The spaceport isn't universally popular. When most people can't afford a Southwest Airlines ticket to Amarillo, we're building a launch pad for millionaires.

America does have possibilities for the future however. Not only will millionaires and their families be attracted to the area but space industries too. This has been a Las Cruces project from beginning 20 years ago, which may give Martinez a little more enthusiasm about the project.

She wants to see more private investment in the spaceport. Good idea but she needs to assure that the commitment of Sir Richard Branson and his Virgin Galactic remains assured. Any transportation project involves some public investment.

Presumably the state jet is a goner. The plane was built for long hauls and we'll hope Martinez doesn't leave the state as often as Big Bill. It was too much of a campaign issue not to dump the jet.

Albuquerque and the University of New Mexico have long lobbied for a dental school to stand beside its medical school and law school. It would be prestigious and would help students and rural areas. But now is not the time for spending big bucks to build prestige.

Several health organizations recently have announced initiatives to extend dental coverage into rural areas of our state. This will be a non-starter. And if we ever can afford it, how about putting it somewhere else in the state?

Martinez wants to take a close look at the incentives we offer the film industry. A 25 percent rebate on costs incurred in the state is big but it appears the evidence is going to show that we should either stay where we are or get out of the business altogether.

WHEREAS, any meetings subject to the Open Meetings Act at which the discussion or adoption of any proposed resolution, rule, regulation or formal action occurs shall be held only after reasonable notice to the public, and

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1(D) of the Open Meetings Act requires the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District to determine annually what constitutes reasonable notice of its public meetings;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Supervisors on this 9th day of November, 2010 that:

1. Regular meetings of the Carrizozo SWCD shall ordinarily be held on the second Tuesday of each month at

Notice of regular meetings will be given seven days before the meeting to parties who request it in writing. Notice of regular meetings will be released seven days before each regular meeting. Meeting dates for 2011 are: January 11, February 8, March 8, April 12, May 10, June 14, July 12, August 9, September 13, October 11, November 8, December 13 (unless otherwise published in paper).

2. Special meetings of the Carrizozo SWCD may be called by the Chairman or a majority of the members upon seven days notice. Parties who have requested notice of meetings in writing will be notified by telephone. The Ruidoso News and Lincoln County News will be notified by telephone.

3. Emergency meetings of the district are meetings called under circumstances which demand immediate action by the Board of Supervisors. Although the Board of Supervisors would avoid emergency meetings whenever possible, such circumstances may occasionally arise. Emergency meetings may be called by the Chairman or a majority of the members upon three hours notice. Parties who have requested a notice of meetings in writing will be notified by telephone. Notice of emergency meetings will be posted at the district office, at the Post Office in Carrizozo, at Wells Fargo Bank in Carrizozo, and other places deemed appropriate.

4. Pursuant to Section 10-15-1(E) NMSA 1978, the Carrizozo SWCD may close a meeting to the public if the subject matter of such discussion of action is included in Subsection E of the Open Meetings Act, Section 1015-1NMSA 1978. If any Board of Supervisors meeting is closed pursuant to Section 10-15-1(E) NMSA, such closure: (1) if made in an open meeting, shall be approved by a majority vote of a quorum of the Board of Supervisors and authority for the closure shall be stated in the motion calling for the vote on a closed meeting. The vote on a closed meeting shall be taken in open meeting and the vote of each individual member is to be recorded in the minutes. Only those subjects announced or voted upon prior to closure by the Board of Supervisors may be discussed in a closed meeting; and (2) if called for when the Board of Supervisors is not in an open meeting, the closed meeting shall not be held until public notice, appropriate under the circumstance, stating the specific provision of law authorizing the closed meeting is given to the members and to the general public.

The troops brought 2,000 sandbags, two jeeps, a wrecking truck and an ambulance.

When they arrived, flood water was pouring into the business and residential district north of the tracks mainly thru holes in two dikes -- one on First street and the other on Upper E Avenue.

The soldiers started to work at once, filling sacks with dirt and plugging the holes in the dikes.

Utilities Manager H. G. Welk Tuesday night credited the Army's work in sandbagging with diverting enough water to prevent flooding of business houses and homes.

When the troops arrived the flood water, running south along the S.P. right of way, had washed out the dike at the E Avenue crossing. Part of the water flowed across the tracks but most of it ran west a quarter of a mile to a culvert under Highway 54. The tracks were completely covered by the rushing water.

S.P. Tracks Inundated

B.G. Barnum said Tuesday it was not possible to estimate damage to the tracks. He said he hoped that a freight, due at 7 that evening would be able to get through on schedule. (The S.P. trains were able to operate on schedule).

Mr. Barnum said there had also been some damage to the main line tracks at Willow draw, south of Carrizozo.

Tuesday's flood came in two waves as a result of two separate downpours on the flat. Joe West at the power plant reported to Mr. Welk that the First Street drain ditch was running full around 2 p.m. Soon after that one of the town's main water lines was washed out and broken near the round house. There was a temporary drop in water pressure over town.

The second wave of flood water followed about an hour later. Water was still coursing down the streets into the south side of town at 9 o'clock that evening.

A 20-ft. wide hole was washed in the E Avenue dike. A telephone pole, carrying toll lines to the south, was threatened.

The run off through the west part of town caused some damage. Water entered the Masonic building basement and was only inches from the entrance of Thornton's Market. There was some damage to the fences and fields of the Fay Harkey ranch. The flood also threatened to wash out a bridge on Highway 380 south of the Mal Pais.

Christmas Tree Permits Now Available

Venturing into the forest to choose and cut a Christmas tree has been part of family traditions for many years and the center piece of the holiday season celebration.

Lincoln National Forest now has Christmas Tree permits available at a cost of \$5 each, one per household. The permits can be purchased through December 24, or by mail until December 11.

Any live evergreen tree up to 10 feet in height can be cut down or dug-up, in the Smokey Bear, Sacramento, or Guadalupe Ranger Districts as designated by a map accompanying the permit.

Please be considerate (and legal) and do not cut trees on private lands, within Wilderness areas or District Ranger Office locations.


