

Miller Bound Over to District Court on Murder Charge

As Judge Finds Probable Cause

James Luke Miller Jr, 26, has been bound over to District Court on one count of murder and one count of tampering with evidence.

Miller and his attorney Gary Mitchell, of Ruidoso, were present at the preliminary hearing

before Lincoln County Magistrate Judge Martha Proctor on Tuesday, April 26.

Assistant District Attorney Reed Thompson presented three witnesses who testified on behalf of the prosecution.

"Preliminary hearings are only held on felony cases," Judge Proctor told *THE NEWS*. "To give time for the judge to determine whether there is enough

evidence to show probable cause. If there is, the case is bound over to district court."

"Most of the time, the preliminary hearing is waived, but not in this case," Judge Proctor added. "I chose to bind Mr. Miller over to district court on the one count of open murder and one count of tampering with evidence."

Judge Proctor said Miller, 26, is accused

of allegedly murdering Fredrick Markant, 39, outside his residence in Oscuro on April 11.

Judge Proctor told *THE NEWS* that Miller's family members were present at the hearing.

After the hearing, Miller was returned to the Lincoln County Detention Center where he is being held on a \$500,000 cash only bond set by Judge Proctor.



State Highway Says White Oaks Sign Has To Go



County Says Sign Directional, Not Advertising

Lincoln County received notice from the New Mexico Department of Transportation that the directional White Oaks sign just off of Highway 54 north of Carrizozo is in violation of the Beautification Act and must be removed.

At the county commission meeting Tuesday, April 19, county manager Tom Stewart said the highway department letter demanded the county remove the sign within 30 days.

Stewart explained the sign belongs to the county and was first put up in 1992. The sign sits on state land office property, from which the county got a permit in 1992, and in February renewed the permit at a cost of \$650, un-refundable.

Stewart said he called the highway department about the letter, to ask if the sign could be considered "grandfathered", only to be told that an anonymous source had made a complaint about the sign, and because the sign is in an unzoned area, it has to be within 1,000 feet of the businesses it was advertising.

County commission chairwoman Eileen Sedillo said the anonymous complaints were happening to signs all over the Carrizozo

County Reverse 911 Emergency System Test Baffles Residents

A test of the Lincoln County reverse 911 emergency call out system left some county residents wondering what was going on.

"The voices were too loud, and too many, I couldn't tell what they were saying," Capitan resident Beverly Holmes said of the call made to every land line and many enrolled cell telephone numbers in Lincoln County at 9 a.m. Tuesday, April 19.

THE NEWS editor Ruth Hammond was also baffled, not sure what the call was about.

Lincoln County Commissioners during their regular meeting in the courthouse on Tuesday, April 19 got the same call except they had been fore-

warned it was going to happen. On the agenda was an item for the All County Reverse 9-1-1 call.

County manager Tom Stewart had prepared commissioners with his memorandum advising that at "precisely 9 a.m. on April 19, 2011, we will be conducting a test call to approximately 25,428 phones throughout the county using the CodeRED emergency notification system."

Stewart said the test would enable the company to evaluate the local telephone infrastructure capacity and adjust it accordingly.

The message, recorded by Stewart, and emergency services coordinators Travis Atwood and Joe

Kenmore, advised listeners the call was a test of the emergency notification system, and advised listeners to go to the county web page to enroll additional phone numbers, including cell phones, emails and text message addresses.

The website also provides a way for listeners to locate their home or business on a map and give a valid rural address.


The system makes three attempts at each number. Once a number is answered, whether live or by voice messaging, the number will drop out. Of the three calls, the first will be used to evaluate the telephone infrastructure, the last two will be used to evaluate data and calls not reached, Stewart wrote in his memo.

All numbers not reached will be called again in the week following the test. Numbers not reached in this attempt will be flagged as non-working and will be removed from the data base.

"So turn on your cell phones, commissioners," Stewart said. "And stand by for the call!"

Right at 9 a.m. commissioners' cell phones, and county land line phones began to ring.

Commissioners answered and listened

Greentree Solid Waste Converts to Compactors

New Highway 37 Unit Damaged

When Greentree Solid Waste Authority (GSWA) operational supervisor Debra Ingle went before the Lincoln County Commission on April 19, she announced the Highway 37 compactor, which was located on Wolf Springs off the highway frontage, was put in operation, but within a week had been damaged due to illegal dumping.

GSWA crews replaced the damaged compactor, but by the weekend of April 24, the replacement compactor was also damaged due to illegal dumping, and subsequently was out of service.

Until the compactors could be repaired, GSWA crews moved in a large roll off container.

"The compactors are for household waste only," Ingle told county commissioners. "And there is a cost involved with the units as people learn to use the compactors."

Each compactor costs \$25,000 Ingle told the county commissioners, and the units are insured, with a deductible.

"We're trying to get dumpsters off the highways and county roads," Ingle continued.

County commissioners were most concerned about the increase of cost on the most recent Greentree Solid Waste Authority bills to county residents.

County commissioner Jackie Powell said she got several calls about the \$6 additional fuel charge on the bills that are sent out quarterly.

Ingle said the GSWA board had put the fuel charge in place based on a 2004 ordinance that allows for fuel charge when diesel prices got to \$3 a gallon.

"The fuel charge can only go as high as \$2 a month, which is \$6 for the quarter (SWA bills on a three-month basis)."

When Powell asked why the regular billing did not cover the fuel increases, Ingle said in 2008 the GSWA board approved a 60 cent a month increase, which at the time covered the cost of fuel.

"This is the fourth year the board has not had an increase, and has held the rates level," she said. "We can do the surcharge without having to permanently raise the rates."

"The board does review the cost of fuel monthly and the board did approve the fuel charge," she added.

The total cost to county residents is now \$62.84 for three months including the fuel charge.

area, and she cited the example of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce signs that the highway department is requiring to be removed. She said people in White Oaks received letters about the sign being illegal.

"This sign belongs to the county and is being taken care of," Sedillo said. "This area is being targeted."

County commissioner Mark Doth said he had experience with this type of issue. He said in his opinion the sign was not an advertising sign, even though it mentions artists' studios, rather a directional sign because it indicates mileage to the historic mining town of White Oaks. "The sign needs to be re-labeled," he added. He went on to say he had talked to the highway department official who said they would act on the complaint, however the department has no manpower to enforce it.

Doth said the federal beautification act allows for location signage.

"We need to re-label the sign as location and avoid further problems," he added.

Sedillo said it was an imminent domain issue, but Doth said that is only based on health, safety and welfare conditions.

County commissioner Tom Battin said the sign has been at its location as long as he has been a county commissioner. "It is not a business sign, rather it is a notification of the historic mining town and we should do all we can to preserve it."

County commissioner Jackie Powell said there are already location signs in the county.

Stewart said he would protest the state highway department on the basis sign is a location directional sign.

County commissioner Kathryn Minter suggested Stewart send copies to the state representative and state senator.

An evening performance will held at the Trinity Methodist Church at 5:30 p.m. There will be a finger food reception following the performance.



to the message, with little comment.

Stewart said more than 440 people had signed up their cell phones through the web page enrollment.

Also there had been some confusion because some databases had local numbers with the old 505 area code, and because some people had enrolled numbers that have the 505 area code.

"We're looking

to assure that we don't have local numbers with the old 505 area code," Stewart added.

The reverse 911 system had been used to call numbers in the White Fire evacuation areas.

County commissioner Eileen Sedillo asked how well the system had worked.

Stewart answered that there

were some areas that did not receive the emergency calls, and the company was working on that. Stewart added that some 128 numbers have been identified as located in the White Fire burn area that could be prone to severe flooding with a substantial rain storm.

Later in the morning, after Lincoln National Forest Ranger Dave Warnack gave his report, Stewart said he

was already getting feedback from the call out company. He said that cell phones with a music answer will not allow the automated call to come through. He advised that people who have music service in their cell phones should call their provider and have them unblock the numbers 866-419-500 and 855-969-4636 and do not have these answered with music.

"It's not just fuel," Ingle continued. "All oil products, including tires, are up 36 percent."

Powell said the increase cost was hard on many residents who live long distances to the nearest dumpster or compactor, and she wanted to know why county residents were paying as much as people who live in the municipalities served by Greentree.

County commission chair Eileen Sedillo also expressed concern that people have a hidden charge with the fuel they have to pay for to get to the containers. Sedillo said Carrizozo charges about \$23 a month of house to house service, and in 2008 a fuel charge was added and never removed.

"I hope we have cleaned up Lincoln County," Ingle said of

Greentree Solid Waste Authority. "There is not as much illegal dumping on the highways and county roads and we're trying to get all the dumpsters off all county areas, especially new roads."

County commissioner Mark Doth asked that the county commission receive the minutes of the monthly GSWA board meetings, because the GSWA was a "quasi-governmental" entity.

County commissioner Kathryn Minter serves as the county representative on the GSWA board.

Powell said she especially wanted minutes of meetings where the GSWA board approves increases. "For my people \$6 is an increase," Powell said. "We hear a lot of increases of only \$10 or \$20, but our checkbooks at the end of the month can't handle any more increases."

In response to a question from Powell on whether the compactors help with fuel costs, Ingle said the compactors when full hold about 9.5 tons and are taken directly to the landfill south of Orogrande, while the large trailers into which the small dumpsters are dumped can hold up to 20 tons per trip to the landfill.

Ingle also reported on the recent landfill board meeting where the issue of raising landfill tipping rates was discussed.

"For 22 years the landfill board has never raised rates, but the landfill has had to spend \$1 million on new equipment," Ingle said. "Recycling efforts are causing a pinch on the landfill," Ingle continued. "But I think we need to continue recycling because it is a 160 mile round trip to the landfill from the Greentree facility in Ruidoso Downs, and even further for compactors."

County commissioner Tom Battin asked if the county commission could get information about the future capacity of the regional landfill (Lincoln County and Otero County are joint owners), and how it is being tracked.

"After 22 years of use, the regional landfill just opened its fourth cell and now has 75 year life span," Ingle said. "We should have been opening our 11th cell."

Battin asked if that was the effect of recycling.

Ingle said recycling has reduced the tonnage of solid waste going into the facility that has had no tipping fee increase in its 22

years. She said Greentree recycled 2,994 tons of materials thanks to the help of Lincoln County citizens, and Otero County now has a grant to construct a huge recycling facility which will further reduce the amount of garbage going into the landfill.

But with less garbage, the landfill makes less money, which it has tried to make up by selling sand, and taking asbestos, the only facility in the south part of New Mexico to do so.

"The landfill board is looking at way to raise funds without raising tipping fees," she added. "The landfill is the most southern in the state, with the lowest of tipping fees at \$13.90 a ton," Ingle said.

In contrast, Chaves County charges \$37 a ton and Torrance County charges \$43 a ton to dump in their landfills.

Doth asked if Greentree was really recycling, or doing like a New Mexico city that took its recyclables to the landfill because there was no market.

Ingle said the Greentree facility has enough area to store recyclable materials until the markets are

The Lincoln County Treasurer's Office does honor the postmark, but your mailed payment **MUST BE POSTMARKED BY May 10, 2011.** If you mail a payment on May 10, 2011, request the postmaster stamp the date in your presence, to insure the postmark of that date.

INTEREST shall accrue at the rate of one percent (1%) per month or any portion of a month, (Statute 7-38-49 NMSA 1970).

PENALTY on taxes that become delinquent, shall be imposed at one percent (1%) of the delinquent tax total, or a minimum of five dollars (\$5.00), for each month they remain unpaid (Statute 7-38-50).

By N.M. State law, property taxes are the personal obligation of the property owner, whether or not the tax bill was received. Mail payments or contact us at the address and phone number below should you have questions regarding your property tax bills.



SANTA FE - Who do U.S. senators look to if they have a tough problem - they want thought all the way through? New Mexico's Sen. Jeff Bingaman probably heads that list.

Whether it's energy, science, education, health care, international competitiveness or any number of other big issues, Bingaman is the go-to guy because of his intelligence, work ethic and ability to work with others toward a solution.

Bingaman also is willing to let others take center stage when it comes to taking credit and celebrating victories. Colleagues use words like unassuming and unpretentious to describe the senator.

In my 2011 political forecast on New Year's Eve, I noted that Bingaman has mentioned the possibility of retirement at the end of his last couple of six-year terms and already was talking about making this term his last. But I wound up predicting that he would succumb to pressures not to leave.

The pressures not to leave are significant. Bingaman is the ninth most senior senator. Sen. Pete Domenici was even higher in the rank when he was forced to step down for health reasons.

Why is seniority important? Even though tea partiers have vowed to kill all earmarks, that's what we call pork in our rural state, and President Barack Obama has vowed to veto earmarks, neither one is likely to succeed.

And even if they do succeed, senior Senate and House members still can funnel great amounts of federal money to their states. New Mexico always is one of the top few states in federal money received per capita. Our small state has three air force bases, two national labs and the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in addition to countless other federal programs.

A primary reason for all that federal largesse is the tremendous seniority many of our past senators have accrued. Some of our biggest projects came in the days of Dennis Chavez and Clinton Anderson. Pete

Domenici and Jeff Bingaman didn't do so badly either. In 2008, before Domenici retired, the two had 64 years of seniority between them.

If we see a situation similar to 2008, in which all three members of our U.S. House delegation leave their seats to run for Bingaman's vacant Senate seat, New Mexico would end up with what would surely be the least senior state delegation in the nation.

Sen. Tom Udall's four years in the Senate would be the grand total of our five-member congressional delegation. We would say goodbye to the big federal money.

For Democrats, Bingaman's departure could be a disaster. During the last two years, Democrats held all five congressional positions. After the 2012 election, Democrats could be down to one member.

New Mexico Democrats don't have an overwhelming favorite for the post, as Bingaman would have been. In 2008, Gov. Bill Richardson's popularity ratings were high enough to make him that candidate but he was busy running for president. Now, he's not a factor.

There will be

plenty of candidates for the job - unless one or both parties' top leaders decide to get involved. Democrats did it in 2008 when they talked former Albuquerque Mayor Martin Chavez into stepping aside in favor of then-U.S. Rep. Tom Udall.

GOP brass, in 2010, threw their weight behind now-Gov. Susana Martinez.

The Senate post is extremely attractive to candidates because it carries a six-year term. House members, with two-year terms, have to run for office full-time. Unless they have a very safe district, they have to travel back to their district almost every weekend.

Sen. Bingaman doesn't like campaigning. He notes that it is very hard work. But he does a great job of it, winning reelection campaigns by large margins.

Some speculate that Bingaman is tired of the rancor in Washington. Others say it's the possibility Democrats could lose their majority in the Senate. Still others opine that it is the extra pressures of being the state's senior senator.

But I'll take his word that he doesn't want one more grueling campaign.

Looking Back Through Our Old Files'

As the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS goes into its 106th year of being in existence, we will be randomly publishing articles from old NEWS files. The following article appeared in the LINCOLN COUNTY NEWS on . . .

Friday, December 7, 1956

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

Tape Recorded Interviews With People Who Helped Build Lincoln County

The horse that Billy the Kid made his escape on was kept up there on the VV ranch. They said that was the horse that Billy the Kid rode out of Lincoln on why he left. I don't remember what they called the horse. I know that ranch owned the horse when it was up there but I don't know who owned him in Lincoln. All we knew was that some officer kept the horse close to the court house.

I remember Pat Garrett very well. After he got out of office he lived on his ranch just four miles from us on Bonito Creek. I've been at his house lots of times. I remember hearing people talking about Billy the Kid when I came here. I remember how the Kid was captured and how Garrett killed him. Garrett might have told me, but I wouldn't say that he did. I saw picture shows at different places and I never saw it just like I heard it.

I guess Garrett was a pretty good shot. I'd been to his ranch you know and everyone had a big yard fence. I'd set on the porch with him and he'd see a nail sticking out in the fence and he'd shoot a nail head down, one right after another. I've seen him do that right in his own yard. I'd guess it would be 40 or 60 feet away. They said there were three men lived up there that could do that. Garrett was a tall man, pretty heavy. He'd weigh around 167 pounds and was very handsome.

There was a fellow by the name of Akins who used to run a store across the creek from old Bonito City. Almost every little store had whiskey then you know. And there was a fellow by the name of James that I knew awfully well. He came from Texas. He lived up close to the Parsons mine. Over on Eagle Creek. I knew a good many Brazels. There was a bunch of them up there, all kin folk.

My brother-in-law, Doctor Collins, had some mining claims up the Bonito. I remember when the Parsons mine was going pretty strong. There were a good many others, but that was about the strongest mine. And there were some pretty good mines above Nogal.

I've been inquiring about the old sawmill on the Ruidoso that was running when I was here. I hauled lumber from there over to my brother-in-law's place on the Bonito to build a house. It was a big sawmill and I think it was owned by the Blazer family.

There were lumber camps and sawmills on the Bonito and Ruidoso. They did quite a bit of logging. They hauled lots of lumber outta White Oaks and that way, with steer teams. My last job was with them. Sometimes there were 75 or 100 work steers in camp. And I had the job of herding those cattle at night, right where the dam is now. They called it the South Fork.

There was a pasture there and I'd take those cattle out in the late evening. I'd go up one of those big draws and build up a log heat fire till about daylight and then begin to round them up. I did that all afoot, and herd them back into camp. There were lots of panthers around then and you daresn't lay down and go to sleep out that way. It's too dangerous. They were afraid of the fire, but I've seen many a panther come up a ways toward the fire.
