

Capitan Hosts 9th Annual Smokey Bear Days

Capitan, the birthplace of one of the world's best loved icons - Smokey Bear, is hosting the 9th annual Smokey Bear Days on May 6 and 7.

"Smokey has always meant a lot to this community," said Smokey Bear Historical State Park organizer David Cunningham. "We started this celebration in honor of Smokey's birthday, and we've just continued the party every year."

This year, Smokey celebrates his 67th birthday, and Capitan is celebrating in style.

The party begins at noon Friday, May 6, but at 7:30 a.m.

Smokey Bear Blvd will be closed to traffic from White Oaks Ave to the intersection of Highway 48, in front of Smokey Bear Historical State Park to allow vendors and exhibits to set up booths. Smokey Bear Blvd will be closed to traffic until 5 p.m. when the park closes. All afternoon Friday, arts and crafts and food vendors will be open for visitors to browse through. Karaoke will be ongoing at the stage by the park.


Things liven up on Saturday, May 7. No home town celebration would be complete without a parade and the official Smokey Bear Days Parade starts at 10 a.m. at the school

and winds its way down Smokey Bear Blvd.

After the parade, at 11 a.m., the street will again be closed for visitors to stroll along booths and to enjoy the various activities of the day. The street will be closed to traffic until 7 p.m.

New this year will be the Firefighters Challenge at 2 p.m. in the park area, Cunningham told THE NEWS. Local volunteer fire departments, the US Forest Service and New Mexico State Forestry have been invited to send firefighters compete in the Progressive Hose Laying and Back Pack Pump

Board of Finance Makes No Changes to Investments

Lincoln County Commissioners made no changes to the investments of county funds, during their official annual Board of Finance meeting held within their regular meeting on April 19, setting the stage for the special budget hearings in May.

The Board of Finance meeting, mandated by state statute, provided commissioners opportunity to review county investments and interest rates.

Her first Board of Finance meeting since her election 2010, county treasurer Glenna Robbins said there was not much to say, as interest rates continued to be low on traditional Certificates of Deposit, and a bit higher for investments into money

markets.

She said there was no need to change any collateral agreements with the financial institutions that hold the county money that require the bank to provide 102 percent collateral. "If a bank does not have an agreement to this, we only invest what the FDIC will cover," Robbins said.

The Treasurer's report showed total budgeted funds at \$19,679,465.15, and \$20,267,666 in "unbudgeted funds" held by the county for other entities such as school districts.

As of the end of March, the county had received 67.93 percent of the 2010 property taxes, which was comparable to past year, Robbins said.

Property taxes not paid for three years

places the property on a list to be considered for a "tax sale." Of the 159 properties that will be subject to this state tax sale, 108 have been paid, Robbins said.

County commissioners commended the treasurer's office for making special efforts to help property owners pay the back taxes.

Robbins also reported the Deer Park special paving assessment - \$13,920 per lot for the 237 lots in the subdivision - had collected \$900,000 by the end of March.

After county commissioners closed the board of finance meeting, and went back into regular session they considered a request to accept the donation of a lot in Deer Park in lieu of the owner paying the paving assessment.

County manager Tom Stewart recommended the commission not accept the donation of the lot. He said the lot owner, Harold Smith of Carmel, Indiana, wrote the county stating he could not pay the assessment for the Deer Park Valley paving lien, and he wished to transfer the property to the county which would then pay the lien.

"In a normal process, a citizen not paying the lien will forfeit the property to a tax sale in three years," Stewart said. "The individual purchasing the property at the tax sale will then be liable for paying the associated lien."

County attorney Alan Morel said the

Lincoln County Begins Budget Process

Lincoln County Commissioners began their fiscal year 2011-2012 budget process with a special meeting Tuesday, May 3.

County commissioners held a preliminary budget hearing to consider standing county government needs, in addition to hearing from 19 entities requesting special funding.

County manager Tom Stewart provided commissioners background information and thanked the county departments for "a most cooperative development of this year's preliminary budget."

He reported that without additional expenses from the "external entities" the preliminary budget he was presenting was balanced, and forecasts spending \$266,031 less than the what the cost forecasts will be taken in.

"The projected balance is \$322,670 over the required reserves at the end of year," Stewart added.

The FY 2011-2012 budget projects to receive \$10,984,481 in the general funding. Of that the preliminary budget projects that \$6,504,515 goes to the departmental expenses; \$1,876,609 supplements the road department; \$500 to special programs; \$51,448 to agreements; \$90,000 supplements the gas

tax; \$31,363 to predator control; \$2,286,672 to the detention center operations; senior citizens require a boost of \$134,637 and \$120,000 is required for juvenile detention related operations.

Property valuations increased from \$1,016,435,872 in 2009 to \$1,038,712,174 for 2009-2010. The newest valuation is mandated by the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) for use for the FY 2011-2012 budget, Stewart explained.

PILT, payment in lieu of taxes provided by the federal government to offset property tax losses due to public lands within the county, is estimated to be \$1,437,375 this year.

External agency presentations and requests were from the NMSU Extension Office-\$63,400; Big Brothers/Big Sister-\$7,500; Capitan Library-\$12,000; Corona Library-\$7,500;

Ruidoso Library-\$25,000; Sacramento Mountain Village (assisted living)-\$2,500; Juvenile Justice Board-\$8,000; Lincoln County Food Bank-\$10,000; Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD)-\$6,000; White Mountain Search and Rescue-\$3,394; USDA Predator Control/Wildlife-\$88,500; Noxious Weed Control-\$50,000; South Central RC&D-\$7,000; Lincoln County Humane Society-\$30,000; P.A.W.-\$13,000; Miracle PAWs for Pets-\$5,000; Ecoservants-\$25,000; LC Community Health Council-\$8,000; Community Youth Warehouse-\$10,000; Lincoln Transit-\$28,874.

Commissioners also considered the FY 2011-2012 Infrastructure and Capital Improvement Plan, with priorities being \$100,000 for a Water Plan for the

Rancho Ruidoso Homeowners Plea for Paving

There are more than 100 homes on the cul-de-sacs in Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates, and the paving on the 25 year old streets is deteriorating with use.

Homeowners sent their representative to the Lincoln County Commission meeting on April 19, to ask the county to put their paving needs on a priority list.

Wolfgang Bean thanked commissioner Kathryn Minter for facilitating his presentation to the commission.

"Better than her predecessor," Bean said. He presented photos of the deteriorating pave-

ment in the Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates (RRVE) cul de sacs and secondary streets. "Nothing has been done in 25 years but on the main loop road," he continued.

"Commissioner Minter has been out there. The potholes are six inches deep."

County road department had been cleaning culverts and bar ditches and filling pot holes in the subdivision, Bean acknowledged to commissioner Eileen Sedillo's question.

"Albert (Hernandez, road supervisor) personally came out and cut vegetation around the culverts, which has helped."

Most people who live in

RRVE are working and unable to come to the meeting in numbers, Bean continued.

Minter said when she met with the RRVE homeowners their highest priorities were for the cul de sac paving, which she inquired whether these could get funding as school bus routes.

County manager Tom Stewart said he asked Hernandez give an estimate to repair and pave the cul de sacs, which would be \$499,000.

He said the Palo Verde Slopes school bus program has another year before completion, after which time the road department could divert its attention to the RRVE cul de sacs and roads.

Nat'l Forest In Extreme Fire Danger

Smokey Bear Ranger District is in Extreme Fire Danger, and the Lincoln National Forest Supervisor is looking hard at issuing Stage III Fire Restrictions, that bans any and all open flames within forest lands--within the week.

Smokey Bear District Ranger Dave Warnack told *THE NEWS* on the morning of May 3, that he was working with Supervisor Robert Trujillo and forest field scientists to determine whether the conditions on the district warrant the Stage III Restrictions. Warnack said the fire danger index--such as "very high" or "extreme"--is determined by the field scientists who use their own measurements taken at various locations throughout the district. "Until the Supervisor issues the order for the Stage III Restrictions, the district will remain under Stage II," Warnack said.

Stage II restrictions allow campfires in established campgrounds and use of gas lanterns and grills, but bans campfires in open

areas, bans off-road vehicle use and smoking is allowed only in an approved area or enclosed car. Orders are posted on the Lincoln National Forest website shortly after they are issued and Warnack said readers should refer to the site for any changes. The website address is www.fs.usda.gov, click on the ribbon for the forest, find "Lincoln" and go. A complete list of restrictions will be posted with the order on the website.

(Editor's Note: Under Stage III Fire Restrictions no open flame is allowed on forest lands, which means no campfires, no open flames such as candles or fire burning lanterns or tiki type torches, no gas grills, no smoking except in a closed vehicle or building, no off road vehicle use.)

The Smokey Bear District is open for public use, except for the White Fire Burn area. Last week, on April 28, the supervisor issued a temporary closure order for the White Fire Burn area on the Smokey Bear Ranger District.

Capitan PTA will also have a jumping house.

All are free to the public.

At 7 p.m. the party continues with a street dance featuring the Graham Brothers of Ruidoso. Free to the public, the dance held in the cul-de-sac by the park will provide plenty of opportunity for visitors to kick up their heels!

And at 7:45 p.m. the crowd will celebrate Smokey Bear's 67th with a birthday cake. The dance concludes at 11 p.m.

"This is something we look forward to every year", said Cunningham.

"The whole town helps to plan and present Smokey Bear Days. It's a true hometown celebration, and everybody is invited!"

property owner had always opposed the special paving assessment district, "which I believe was lawfully created and set up."

Morel said the issue was whether the county wanted to accept lots people do not want. "I researched the lot and have prepared responses," Morel said. "I advise that it is not a good precedence for the county to accept lots (for payment of past taxes)."

Morel said the Deer Park

Valley lot would have transfer fees, social membership fees and the county would be responsible for any unpaid taxes. "I recommend the county not take this lot," Morel also said.

County commissioner Kathryn Minter said Mr. Smith contacted her and she told him that accepting a lot would be a bad precedence for the county.

Morel said 20 years ago a paving assessment in Alto resulted in

the county owning about 30 lots because the owners did not pay the liens.

"The problem is the lien never goes away," Morel said. "About 15 years ago, the county sold more than 15 of the Alto lots as quit claims deeds and the money was put into the general fund."

"The county does not have to take this lot," Morel continued. "After three years of unpaid taxes the property will be sold in a tax sale,

and most likely the liens, penalties and interest will vastly exceed the value of the lot."

Commissioners unanimously voted to not accept the donation of the lot.

Minter commented that she had received emails from the owner, but she felt comfortable with the process of the special paving assessment district. "I followed every step of the process and I feel it was good," she concluded.

"We're looking to finish the paving projects in Ranches of Sonterra, Alto and Palo Verde Slopes (next to Ruidoso Downs)," Stewart said. "So it is in the cards for Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates."

"If you cannot do paving in the next year, if we have to wait until 2013, can we get a commitment it will be looked at?" Bean asked. "After 25 years we are asking for pavement."

Stewart com-

mented that he would prefer the subdivision roads be gravel, but Bean was adamant the road be gravel, because when the county took over all the roads were great. But now with 230 homes in the development, the roads get a lot more traffic, than Ranches of Sonterra, Bean said.

County commissioner Jackie Powell said Ranches of Sonterra roads to be gravel also. "Lincoln County can't afford

paved roads."

"So you are going to blow us off again," Bean responded.

"If you're in the country you live with gravel," Powell said. "But I'm only one vote."

"Why always RRVE?" Bean said. "We pay lower property tax. I moved to RRVE because it has paved roads."

County commissioner Mark Doth asked why the decision was made to pave Ranches of Sonterra.

Stewart said the county has several roads in areas to maintain -- Ranches of Sonterra roads were "not a good job"; Alto; RRVE; Gavilan Canyon, the priority; Palo Verde Slopes; lower Eagle Creek; and Cedar Creek.

"Albert is trying to address the areas in a logical fashion," Stewart said.

The main road into RRVE was repaved two years ago because it was in bad shape, he added.

Stewart said in 2010 representative from Ranches of Sonterra came to the commission and made a plea for their roads. "Now a year later we are fixing their roads," Stewart added.

Linda Stanford, another RRVE resident, said she put her house on the market three years ago, the comments she gets from potential buyers is the house will not sell because of the roads.

"People won't come out there if we don't have decent roads to their homes," Stanford added.

"We are asking for a commitment from the county it will be done in 2013, if not done in 2012," Stanford concluded.

Stewart said the county has one more request for proposals for the Sonterra, which was held off until the county has the funding.

"If the county commission directs it we could include RRVE in the rfp," he said.

Powell said the county is trying to upgrade roads systematically on affordability and rotation. "We can't just jump around," she said. "And one big snow and the pavement is gone."

County commissioner chair Eileen Sedillo suggested commissioners go out and look at the roads, but commissioner Tom Battin said the county has been aware of the needs in RRVE, as well as Ranches of Sonterra roads which the county "should have never accepted."

With the item listed on the meeting agenda as discussion, commissioners took no formal action.

Also in the

meeting, commissioners awarded bids for paving in the county: -- Star Paving of Albuquerque was the low bidder at \$185,340.64

milling, placing base course and resurfacing Pecos Court and San Pablo Heights in Ranches of Sonterra III, a state CAP project with a budget of \$172,844;--

FNF of Albuquerque with low bid of \$77,119 for milling, base course and resurfacing Caprock Court in Ranches of Sonterra III, another state Co-op

LINCOLN COUNTY TREASURER reminds Lincoln County property owners, they must pay their Second Half Property Taxes by May 10, 2011 to avoid penalty and interest.

ACCORDING TO N.M. STATE STATUTE 7-38-83, TIMELINESS-B. ALL ACTS REQUIRED OR PERMITTED TO BE DONE BY MAIL ARE TO BE POSTMARKED ON THE REQUIRED DATE

The Lincoln County Treasurer's Office does honor the postmark, but your mailed payment **MUST BE POSTMARKED BY May 10, 2011.** If you mail a payment on May 10, 2011, request the postmaster stamp the date in your presence, to insure the postmark of that date.

INTEREST shall accrue at the rate of one percent (1%) per month or any portion of a month, (Statute 7-38-49 NMSA 1970).

PENALTY on taxes that become delinquent, shall be imposed at one percent (1%) of the delinquent tax total, or a minimum of five dollars (\$5.00), for each month they remain unpaid (Statute 7-38-50).

By N.M. State law, property taxes are the personal obligation of the property owner, whether or not the tax bill was received. Mail payments or contact us at the address and phone number below should you have questions regarding your property tax bills.

Four day school week.

Now a similar situation is happening with minor differences, mainly that the reason for this unpublicized suggestion is budgetary cuts. If that is true, why the secrecy? Everyone knows there are budgetary cuts across the state, and changes must be made, but why try to bamboozle people? Why not be open and talk to people? One thing that was said during an unpublicized meeting on Monday was that the administration room was not large enough to hold people from the community to discuss the possible four day school week. But in the past large crowds could be accommodated in the old gym. Why not now? Secrecy again?

Yes, matters need to be discussed, but it would be in the best interest of everyone if these discussions were out in the open. Rumors are that someone has already made the decision to go to a four day school week. Who made that decision and when? Is the reason to save money or is there some other reason for disrupting people's lives?



Not Willing To Do What It Takes

SANTA FE - The United States never again will be a world leader in education. Our culture, traditions and the American way will preclude it from happening again.

It's a bitter pill to swallow but we must admit that our society is unwilling to do what it takes to be first again - or anywhere near it. The major component of our decline began around the middle of the past century when psychologists decided children should have fun and enjoy their childhood.

Contrast that with the trip news-woman Diane Sawyer took to China recently. Many of us saw her on the newscast she anchors asking a classroom of Chinese students what they liked least about school. The answer was "the pressure." Then Sawyer asked what the children liked most about school. Again, the answer was "the pressure."

The responses were too choreographed to have been unrehearsed. But the message likely was very accurate. Read about Chinese tiger moms and learn that Chinese children don't like pressure any better than American children but when the pressure forces them to master a

subject or activity, it is a source of lifelong joy.

We've heard about the high teen suicide rate in Japan and the same may be true in China because of the pressures put on their youth. But it's not going to make Asians less demanding of their children. One reason for Chinese pressure on their children is that they only are allowed one per family in order to solve the country's overpopulation problem. With only one child, all the parents' energy goes toward making that child the best.

Contrast that with American culture. We have family planning clinics but part of America is opposed, sometimes violently, to such operations. A family with many children has much less time to spend with each child. And even that time is diluted further by both parents having to work extra jobs to support a large family.

China isn't even the leading example of pressure put on students to excel in school. Singapore pulled itself up from one of the poorest economies in the world to one of the top through installing perhaps the most rigorous of education systems anywhere. Schools are ranked by quality as are

children. Students are ranked from number one on down and everyone knows their ranking. Singapore educators insist it doesn't cause self-esteem problems. It merely is a message to students' to try harder.

Pieces of Halley's Comet will be visible late tonight, May 5, into early tomorrow morning, May 6. Each spring the earth passes thru the debris trail of Halley's Comet that burn up as the bits and pieces enter the atmosphere.

The meteor shower will start as early as 11 p.m. tonight, May 5th, continuing until about 5 a.m. tomorrow, May 6th with an approximate rate of 40 to 60 meteors an hour. The best viewing conditions are a dark, clear sky away from city lights. The best times for viewing are in the hours just before dawn.

The forecast for the upcoming week for Lincoln County shows daytime temperatures climbing back up to the low 80s at the lower elevations and from the low to mid 70s at the higher elevations.

Nighttime temperatures will be from the low to mid 50s at all elevations.

Expect to see light winds out of the east until the weekend when the winds SHOULD mellow a little and then start coming in from the west and southwest.

Hondo Basin; \$280,000 for a new Fort Stanton Fire Station; \$280,000 for a new Loma Grande Fire Station; \$175,000 for expansion of the White Oaks Fire Station; \$485,000 for planning on a new District Court complex, with a \$1 million county match. Staff will incorporate funding changes discussed during the preliminary budget hearing and present them to commissioners for final approval at the May 17 regular county commission meeting.

countries know that education is their only way out. American middle class students figure they will wind up at least as well as their parents. As a result, they aren't as likely to take the hardest courses.

Under Gov. Susana Martinez, New Mexico students may see some tougher standards. Her Education Department designee wants to retain third grade students who can't pass a national reading test. And schools will be given letter grades A through F. We'll see if they become law.

Third grade retention passed the House 62-5 so it appears to have a good chance of becoming law. The idea is appealing. It was appealing 30 years ago when I taught.

We held students back occasionally but it was based on more than reading scores. Most often the major component of our decisions was the maturity level of the child and whether we felt another year would do the trick.

Social promotion always has been controversial. Parents have to be a part of the decision-making process throughout the year. If it is sprung on them at the end of the year, parents almost always veto retention.

Of course, if parents are involved throughout the year, their child usually improves reading skills through more parental support and private tutoring.

project with a budget of \$73,855;—FNF of Albuquerque with low bid of \$69,112 for resurfacing Rawhide, Hitching Post, Verna, Reynolds Circle East in Palo Verde Slopes subdivision, a state School Bus Route project with budget of \$71,901;—Star Paving of Albuquerque with low bid of \$324,426.01 for milling, base course and resurfacing Chama Canyon and Tierra Nueva in Ranches of Sonterra III. The County budgeted \$524,087 for the project;—Star Paving with low bid of \$569,009.24 for resurfacing 4.7 miles in Alto on Flicker Court, Ferret Court, Mink Lane, Wolf Run Lane, Raccoon Court, Bull Elk Court, Fawn Court, Fox Hollow Court, Partridge Court, Bobcat Trail, Pheasant Court, Wild Turkey Lane, Quail Lane, Dove



Looking Back 'Through Our Old Files'

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

Tape Recorded Interviews With People Who Helped Build Lincoln County

B. F. Richardson

I wasn't present when my brother-in-law, Doctor Collins, was buried because I had to go after medicine for my mother. My mother was taking some kind of morphine for years and years. And of course that kind of medicine you couldn't get much of it at a time, only two or three bottles. She'd been sick and run low on her medicine and we had to come to Fort Stanton to get government drugs for her. And the evening he was buried there was 12 to 15 inches of snow on the ground. She'd been almost out of medicine and I'd come to Fort Stanton that evening and got her medicine and went home that night. That's why I wasn't at the funeral. The snow was about 10 to 15 inches deep and the horse had to struggle all the way. I had to take time. You can't crowd a horse in the snow. You see that was about a 20 mile ride down and back and that was a pretty good ride on a horse in the snow. Back in the 80s the snow was pretty bad, really deep.

There was a little mail contract from Bonito City to Nogal, horseback through the mountains. I had the contract one year. It was only about 15 miles through the mountains by horseback. Sometimes the snow would get so bad we'd have to come down the draw and go around the roadway to get out of that mountain snow. A good many times we'd have to go around on a 25-mile ride to get the mail to Nogal on horseback.

We didn't come to Lincoln County very much. They used to have dances in the court house, but 20 miles down and back was a long ways. White Oaks was our main trading point. That was about the best one we had then. One time some drummers came in and made White Oaks their headquarters. I worked for them several months, driving their wagons and teams. White Oaks was a mining town then. The ore was hauled from the north of the hills down to the mills, four horses to a wagon. It would take four horses to pull a wagon up there and of course they pulled it back with them too.

At that time Fort Stanton was supplies by mule teams. They brought a lot of their stuff about 80 or 90 miles to Nogal from the Rio Grande. They drove the mule teams with one line a jerk line. It was a pretty sight to see. Water was scarce and the mules got mighty thirsty at times. "The lost a lot of mules at Nogal from the colic.
