

County Continues Fire Restrictions

Lincoln National Forest Closed As of Today

County Fire Restrictions continue.

Ruidoso Downs in Level III: Restrictions prohibiting all open flame.

Ruidoso in Level III: but will allow gas grills in controlled areas.

Lincoln County continues under county-wide fire restrictions for another 30 days. At their meeting May 17, county commissioners unanimously approved the fire restrictions resolution, that by county ordinance must be renewed every 30 days, based on drought-related fire hazard conditions.

Fire hazard conditions in mid-May were in fact worse than in April when the county commission first imposed the formal restrictions.

After approving the resolution, county commissioner Mark Doth asked

why fireworks are allowed under the county fire restriction ordinance.

County attorney Alan Morel said state laws prohibits the county from banning all fireworks, then he referred to the county ordinance that provides for the fire restriction resolution: It allows certain non-aerial fireworks (such as sparklers.)

"If you have to light it," Doth said. "It should be banned!"

County restrictions ban all burning of open flames, fires, campfires (except in designated areas), trash, rubbish,

shrubbery or other material, and bans the sale or use of display fireworks, missile type rockets, helicopters, aerial spinners, stick type rockets and ground audible devices, in all unincorporated areas of the county, and for Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona which do not have their own fire restriction ordinances.

Fire restrictions in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs also continue, with ban on all open flame. Ruidoso has made an exception to allow gas grills in very controlled locations. Earlier in the May 17 county commission

meeting, Lincoln National Forest Smokey Bear District Ranger Dave Warnack updated county commissioners on the forest closure which took effect May 12.

At that time

Lincoln Historic Board Seeks Help to Enforce Preservation Ordinance

The Lincoln Historic Board wants to change the belief that the county will do nothing to property owners who violate the Lincoln County Historic Preservation Ordinance. So announced board chair Linda Fox who came before the Lincoln County Commission at their May 16 meeting, seeking the county's support in enforcing the preservation ordinance.

"Will the county commission, in these tough economic times, support the historic ordinance, and the historic board's decisions with fines or litigation?" Fox asked.

Fox presented a copy of the letter sent by the county planning department sent to property owners who have buildings falling into severe disrepair.

"These are buildings that have architectural and historic value to Lincoln and to the county. Once they collapse, a part of history is gone."

At the time of the meeting, seven letters had been sent by the county planning department, with three follow up letters from county attorney Alan Morel.

"What further can be done to get response from these property owners?" Fox asked. "The board's decisions are based on adherence to the ordinance guidelines, and not on personal bias or taste," Fox said. "Is the commission willing to enforce our decisions?"

Morel said the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance was adopted in the late 1970s and has been amended twice in the 16 years that he has been county attorney. Over the years the ordinance and board have had varying degrees of support from county commissioners. He said the current board has a legitimate question.

As for the deteriorating buildings, Morel said one of the weaker parts of the ordinance concerns these and has no specific

guidelines or standards on the level of decay.

"This is very important to the Lincoln Board that has an incredibly hard job," Morel continued.

As for enforcing the ordinance, he said the letters were sent to owners whose properties can be viewed from Highway 380, unless they have a permit.

Fox said the board is not so interested in having property owners make these structures liveable, rather to stabilize them to avoid collapse.

In response to a question from county commission chair Eileen Sedillo, Fox said the buildings are empty.

"Lincoln has done a good job, it looks really nice," Sedillo said.

County commissioner Mark Doth said something prompted the board to come to the commission. "The ordinance seems to have plenty of remedies," Doth said. "I'm not sure what your board wants from us."

Sedillo said the commission since she has served has been behind the Lincoln Historic Board to enforce the ordinance.

Fox said there are new members on the Historic Preservation Board who want a sense of the expectations from the board.

"But what happened?" Doth pressed.

Fox said the condition of two properties in particular have "worried the board."

Morel said concerning the seven letters sent, he was not ready

What to do With Trashy Abandoned Lots

Along the byway to some of Lincoln County's most picturesque locations are some of the most trashed out abandoned lots.

Wanting to create a volunteer effort to help clean these highly visible properties, Mathew Midgett of Nogal, approached the Lincoln County Commission for advice.

"This is such an extreme case," Midgett said at the county commission meeting May 16. "This property is an affront to all."

Property in question is a lot across from the Bonito Lou's store on the Bonito Lake Road. The property is held by Deutsche Bank.

"There are enormous piles of debris and it is a health and fire hazard, it's wrong," Midgett said.

He then volunteered to organize a team as he did in California, that would clean up abandoned lots.

But county attorney Alan Morel said the county does not have the authority to approve other people going on to a private property for a clean up.

"This has been a problem property since October 2008," Morel said. "I have sent numbers of letters to the bank that owns it, but does-

to bring these to the county commission to file action against the property owners.

As for the historic deteriorating buildings, Morel said he will ask the commission to consider these issues at their June meeting.

"Today, the board is asking how to proceed," Morel said. "The board has no authority to file suit."

County commissioner Kathryn Minter said the board needs the county commission support.

Sedillo said it is the law and the commission should stand by it and enforce it, "whether we like it or not."

County commissioner Jackie

Powell agreed the ordinance needed support, but argued that these are tough economic times.

"I would like to see the board work with these property owners to do what they can," Powell said. "Some are not able to do anything. We should update within reason. That is the issue of enforcement in tough economic times."

Minter said some properties in Lincoln belong to absentee owners, some who inherited and are not responding.

Doth said he read through the ordinance and found it self explanatory with remedies and courses of action. "Let's see what comes up."

County Joins Protest of Dunes Lizard Listing

Lincoln County added its name to a list of local governments that are adopting resolutions protesting the proposed federal listing of the dunes sand lizard as an endangered species.

At their meeting May 17, county commissioners approved a resolution opposing the listing of the Dunes Sagebrush Lizard, scientific name *Sceloporus arenicolous*, as an endangered species and encourages the New Mexico congressional delegation to "work vigorously to defeat this proposal."

The lizard lives in the sand dune areas of southeastern New Mexico and west Texas.

County commission chair Eileen Sedillo said the county was "late in passing a resolution" but it wouldn't hurt to have it on record that the coun-

ty supports efforts to public and private land. defeat the listing.

The resolution states that the listing would "adversely effect a wide range of recreational and responsible commercial activities across hundreds of thousands of acres of

New Mexico Association of Counties (NMAC) has also sent a letter of opposition to the listing, said county assessor Paul Baca, county representative to the NMAC.



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Looking Back

'Through Our Old Files'

Friday, December 21, 1956

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

The Hoyle House at White Oaks

The Watt Hoyle House in the Lincoln County ghost mining town of White Oaks stands as a symbol of a romance broken more than 60 years ago.

Hoyle and the woman to whom he had been engaged are dead. But the once-elegant home built on a hill and a little apart from the houses of the "400" when White Oaks was a thriving gold-mining town, retains its fine symmetry of brick and stone, and fancifully, it seems as though the pride of the owner had been built into the house and had kept its "head up" despite many years of unoccupancy and neglect.

David L. Jackson, 87, who has lived in White Oaks about 60 years worked for Hoyle when the latter was a partner in one of the rich gold mines.

"Watt Hoyle was a man who kept his own counsel," Jackson said, "and no one seemed to know just why he and his fiancée didn't marry."

"Hoyle let contracts to the Gumm boys for a residence costing \$40,000," Jackson continued. "He sent to St. Louis for rock masons who dressed stone for the building for a year before he commenced to build. When the house was complete, his plans went haywire, he and his fiancée had fallen out. Hoyle left White Oaks soon after the turn of the century and finally lived in New York City."

"This girl married some 20 years afterwards, and neither she nor her husband (also dead) ever saw the house except a picture of it."

Jackson said the last time he heard of Hoyle's former fiancée she was living in southwestern New Mexico. He did not recall her name. About 20 years ago, Jackson said he believes the woman sent a friend to White Oaks to photograph the house.

Hoyle's brother, William his wife and their daughter, about 12, came from Ohio and lived in the house for a time with the owner. Mrs. Hoyle, who had come to White Oaks for her health, died there, and her husband was killed in a fall in a prospect hole. The child returned to Ohio Jackson said.

Hoyle built his house so that there was a mountain view from every room. The picture window in the living room frames Patos Mountain, thickly covered with cedars and pinoes. As though the mountain views from the windows were not enough, Hoyle constructed an observation platform, with metal railing, atop his house. One of its purposes was to provide a cool place to sit on warm summer nights.

Fireplaces with wooden and tiled mantels and mirrors are in the two living rooms and the large dining room. The sliding doors between the rooms still slide smoothly. The woodwork, of California redwood, has withstood years of unoccupancy and neglect fairly well.

The kitchen is sizeable. The commodious pantry between kitchen and dining room is as old fashioned as the plumbing in the bathroom on the second floor.

From the head of the front stairway one steps into a hall off which open four bedrooms, the bath, and the stairway to the large attic in which there are porthole-type windows.

Hoyle built his house with tall double windows so that the sunshine would stream in and the rooms would be cheerful, light and airy. Beautiful as the house must have been in its well-kept days, only disappointment and death came to it for Watt Hoyle.

I'm so happy to have lived in this beautiful old mining town during the boom days, with a population of nearly two thousand composed of Irish, Scotch, Italian, Spanish, Chinese, Americans and Texans. The main street at Christmas time was alive with holiday shoppers.

A few ox teams from the Capitan mountains, wagons, buck boards from Texas Park, saddle horses tied to hitching posts,

n't want it."

Under the county's solid waste ordinance the county can send notice to property owners to clean up or the county will clean the property and place a lien to cover the cost.

"It would cost several thousand dollars to clean this property," Morel said.

The county has no budget to pay for property clean up, which he estimated could cost \$3,000 to \$5,000 plus tipping fees, he added.

The other option is to let the property go to the tax sale and let the new owner clean it up, Morel continued. But that could take up to another year.

"We have an obligation to the environment, ourselves and tourists to remedy this situation," Midgett said. "Once the debris occurs, then it attracts more."

County commissioner Kathryn Minter suggested having Deutsche Bank hire someone to clean the lot, as was done with a house in Sun Valley.

But county planning officer Rene Santos said this was a different situation, because the house had a mortgage and a rural address, and the Bonito lot had no rural address and was listed on the deed as meets and bounds which Deutsche Bank did not recognize.

Santos agreed that the lot has gotten worse because it is an opportunity for dumping. "It is quite an eyesore, one of the worst in the county," Santos added.

When asked what would keep the lot from becoming a problem if cleaned, Santos said none, "but a clean lot does not attract illegal dumping."

Minter said there are many more lots that are worse, but hidden.

When commissioner Mark Doth suggested a "no dumping" sign be put up at the lot, Morel said the county could only put such sign in the road right of way, not on private property.

"This property looks bad, but there are probably 50 or more out there," Morel said.

As for the tax sale, Morel said tax sale buyers are not given a guaranteed clear title. He then said he thought the property, a half acre, would be bought in the tax sale.

But county commissioner Jackie Powell was hesitant. "If the county begins projects like this, there will be no end and we would be liable," she said. "The lot has been like this for a while."

Powell suggested going to Greentree Solid Waste Authority and the bank.

Santos said it is the bank's problem. County assessor Paul Baca cautioned county commissioners about placing a lien on a property, because it could become higher than the value of the lot and it might not sell in the tax sale. For example he told of a property in Alto that had accumulated the paving district assessments to the point they were higher than the value of the lot.

County commission chair Eileen Sedillo suggested making no decision on the lot until they knew the estimated cost of the clean up.

"This is so visible," Midgett said. "The area is a treasure, so do what's right."

"There will be no stopping," Powell said again. "It is ugly and awful that no one is taking

responsibility, but I will not have us step on someone's land.

County commissioners took no action to remedy the situation, rather asked for estimates on the clean up costs, and estimated value of the land.

Morel said the past due property taxes total \$269.68.

Santos said neighboring lots have sold for \$11,000.

Minter commented that it would be a "good deal" for someone in the tax sale.

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



SANTA FE -- Gov. Susana Martinez appears poised to follow in Gov. Bill Richardson's footsteps as the second governor in a row to be considered for the U.S. vice presidency during her second year in office.

But her path will be very different. Richardson had to work for his consideration all the way. Like Martinez, Richardson's goal was not to be just vice president. He wanted to be president.

And while working toward that goal, he was busy building the best resume of any possible presidential candidate.

Richardson began his career by getting a masters degree in international relations from the prestigious

Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy.

Next, he joined the staff of the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Then he moved to New Mexico as executive director of the state Democratic Party.

Losing that job to a change in administrations, Richardson briefly became an international trade consultant. From there, he ran for Congress until he won and served in the U.S. House for 14 years, becoming a deputy Democratic whip and chairman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus.

During his congressional career, Richardson went on numerous foreign policy missions for President Bill

Clinton. He left Congress to become Clinton's United Nation's ambassador.

After two years in that job, Clinton moved him over to become secretary of the U.S. Department of Energy. While in that position, Vice President Al Gore considered him as a vice-presidential running mate in 2000. Security problems at the Energy Department's Los Alamos National Laboratory plus the rising price of gasoline derailed that possibility.

But soon Richardson was on the trail of running for governor of New Mexico. If successful, he could add that to his two years experience at the Department of Energy to give him more administrative experience, in addition to his legislative experience, than any other expected presidential candidate.

As governor, Richardson didn't slow down on the national scene either. He became president of the Democratic Governors Association and chairman of the 2004 Democratic National Convention.

During his first year as governor, Richardson was a whirlwind of action with numerous "bold initiatives." Included were a commuter train, a space-

sioner Kathryn Minter said in her previous life in California she dealt with endangered species issues. "I am not against the lizard," she said. But the problem with the endangered species listing is there are no plans on how to protect habitats for the more than 2,000 listings, she added.

What they found in California, Minter continued, was a certain endangered lizard was living in oil patches, not in housing areas, because it was relatively undisturbed in "the pipe yard."

County commissioner Mark Doth said it is "ridiculous to spend time and energy to do this (work to defeat the listing), yet if we don't the environmentalists are determined to shut the public lands down."

County commissioners unanimously adopted the resolution.

Also at the May 17 meeting, commissioners adopted a resolution setting liquor license fees at \$250 a year for dispensers license; \$25 for club license; \$250 for retailer license; \$250 for canopy license; \$250 for restaurant license; \$25 per day for special permits. The fee period begins July 1, 2011 and ends June 30, 2012.

Commissioners also awarded two bids. The contract for court ordered mental health counseling at the Lincoln County Detention Center went to the only bidder Substance Abuse Counseling of Lincoln County for unlimited counseling services for \$5,975 a year, or \$50 an hour -- no change from the current contract. The bid to resurface Altamira Drive, Vio Vilante, Cimmarron Trail, Gaucho Court and Sacramento Court in Ranches of Sonterra I was awarded to Star Paving of Albuquerque for \$395,944.



SANTA FE -- Gov. Susana Martinez appears poised to follow in Gov. Bill Richardson's footsteps as the second governor in a row to be considered for the U.S. vice presidency during her second year in office.

But her path will be very different. Richardson had to work for his consideration all the way. Like Martinez, Richardson's goal was not to be just vice president. He wanted to be president.

And while working toward that goal, he was busy building the best resume of any possible presidential candidate.

Richardson began his career by getting a masters degree in international relations from the prestigious

Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy.

Next, he joined the staff of the U.S. Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Then he moved to New Mexico as executive director of the state Democratic Party.

Losing that job to a change in administrations, Richardson briefly became an international trade consultant. From there, he ran for Congress until he won and served in the U.S. House for 14 years, becoming a deputy Democratic whip and chairman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus.

During his congressional career, Richardson went on numerous foreign policy missions for President Bill

Clinton. He left Congress to become Clinton's United Nation's ambassador.

After two years in that job, Clinton moved him over to become secretary of the U.S. Department of Energy. While in that position, Vice President Al Gore considered him as a vice-presidential running mate in 2000. Security problems at the Energy Department's Los Alamos National Laboratory plus the rising price of gasoline derailed that possibility.

But soon Richardson was on the trail of running for governor of New Mexico. If successful, he could add that to his two years experience at the Department of Energy to give him more administrative experience, in addition to his legislative experience, than any other expected presidential candidate.

As governor, Richardson didn't slow down on the national scene either. He became president of the Democratic Governors Association and chairman of the 2004 Democratic National Convention.

During his first year as governor, Richardson was a whirlwind of action with numerous "bold initiatives." Included were a commuter train, a space-

sioner Kathryn Minter said in her previous life in California she dealt with endangered species issues. "I am not against the lizard," she said. But the problem with the endangered species listing is there are no plans on how to protect habitats for the more than 2,000 listings, she added.

What they found in California, Minter continued, was a certain endangered lizard was living in oil patches, not in housing areas, because it was relatively undisturbed in "the pipe yard."

County commissioner Mark Doth said it is "ridiculous to spend time and energy to do this (work to defeat the listing), yet if we don't the environmentalists are determined to shut the public lands down."

County commissioners unanimously adopted the resolution.

Also at the May 17 meeting, commissioners adopted a resolution setting liquor license fees at \$250 a year for dispensers license; \$25 for club license; \$250 for retailer license; \$250 for canopy license; \$250 for restaurant license; \$25 per day for special permits. The fee period begins July 1, 2011 and ends June 30, 2012.

Commissioners also awarded two bids. The contract for court ordered mental health counseling at the Lincoln County Detention Center went to the only bidder Substance Abuse Counseling of Lincoln County for unlimited counseling services for \$5,975 a year, or \$50 an hour - no change from the current contract. The bid to resurface Altamira Drive, Vio Vilante, Cimmarron Trail, Gaucho Court and Sacramento Court in Ranches of Sonterra I was awarded to Star Paving of Albuquerque for \$395,944.

burros and mules with pack saddles. The miners, cowboys, merchants, doctors, lawyers and business people all mingled together in the crowd. We knew nothing in those days of race, color or creed -- we were just one happy family with holiday spirit.

The only street light -- a brilliant moon shining on the fallen snow -- a few strollers with lanterns making their way over the wooden sidewalks and lights from the windows of the business houses.

The pleasant memory of those days long gone, is a beautiful picture of the "Old Home Life," with all the joys and sorrows of childhood. I believe we derived more real pleasure and joy from the few things we had then than do the young people today; for simple pleasures are the best.

There were no elaborate decorations. Our nearest railroad was a hundred miles away, and huge freight wagons drawn by four or eight mules made weekly trips to San Antonio to bring merchandise for the stores. Each year the merchants would clear the center aisles and a long table running the entire length of the building would be laden with their Christmas goods. Gifts and toys for every age from grandma to the baby.

As soon as Thanksgiving had passed, practice for our Christmas program would begin. Every evening after school and on Saturdays, from two until almost dark, we were drilled in marches, pageants, Christmas carols, and let me tell you, these programs were in no way mediocre. These good ladies from the East brought their religion with them and gave graciously of their talents for the improvement of our Western life.

As Christmas drew near, a huge tree-it must be spruce or fir-was brought down from near the top of old Carrizo. It was there I believe God planted the most beautiful ones in the world. It was placed at the side of the platform, its top reaching to the ceiling. The windows were outlined with evergreen, a large silver star, cut from cardboard and covered with foil, saved by merchants from plugs of Battle Axe, Brown Mule and Horseshoe chewing tobacco, hung from the center, with a lighted candle on each window sill.

By mid afternoon, the people from the surrounding country would begin to arrive in wagons, buckboards, and on horseback. Once, I remember, a terrible snowstorm had been raging for days. Most roads were impassable. Even the town people couldn't get through the huge drifts to the church. One of the teamsters who had large freight wagons put runners on the wagon, filled the bottom with hay and drove all over the town gathering children and grownups, bringing them to the church.

This proved quite an ordeal in some instances. At one home he found a mother and three children in tears. They were all dressed and ready to go, but papa hadn't shown up. He loaded them into the wagon and took them off, to find later "Old Santa" was down at the corner saloon (muy borracho since mid-afternoon.) He had forgotten all about the Christmas tree program.

At another house the old man had come home under the influence of Christmas cheer, locked the children in the bedroom and proceeded to beat up his wife. So, he just took the old man, locked him in the bedroom, took the children and mother and away they went. On their return they found the old man sound asleep. Next morning he had no recollection of the night before.

No children were allowed near the church on Christmas Eve until time for the program. All day the good brothers and sisters were decorating. Gifts for all the families were brought in, unwrapped, tagged and hung or placed beneath the tree.

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County Continues Fire

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Warnack said several people had come into the Ranger District office in Ruidoso seeking permits to allow them to hike or ride horses on the forest or other nonessential activities.

"Very few exemptions and permits will be issued," Warnack said. "I am trying to handle the requests for permits consistently and I advise the public to consider whether or not their entry into the forest is really necessary before coming in to ask for a permit."

Warnack said the forest is well staffed with firefighting resources and were ready to respond.

On Tuesday, May 31, Warnack told THE NEWS that the requests for permits for nonessential purposes has stopped and the public has been "very supportive", even during the busy weekends with the motorcycle rally and Memorial Day.

"Only one citation was issued over Memorial Day," Warnack said.

New Mexico Department of Transportation, Village of Ruidoso and City of Ruidoso Downs have also been supportive in providing message boards about the forest closure and extreme fire hazards.

Warnack also thanked the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office which continues to help with patrolling the roads into National Forest areas.

No new fires have been reported on National Forest lands, but crews and several engines from the Smokey Bear District and the Sacramento District responded to help contain the 500 acre fire that originated on state land at Fort Stanton on May 19, and burned into Bureau

of Land Management lands, Warnack said.

The Rifle Fire as it was named, was reported at 10:15 a.m. and was human caused. While the investigation on the exact cause continues, the fire originated in a mitigation area where thinning and chipping was taking place, said State Forestry spokesman Dan Ware.

State Forestry crews, under command leader Eddie Tudor from the Capitan office, volunteer fire departments and Bureau of Land Management crews responded and had the fire at 80 percent contained by the evening of May 19.

As for the White Fire area, restoration efforts with helicopter aerial seeding and dropping of mulch, will be done June 13-16, Warnack said. Awarding of those bids was held this week.

port, many environmental initiatives and a big tax cut directed mainly at higher incomes to attract new businesses.

Richardson was mentioned frequently as a vice-presidential candidate again in 2004, two years into his gubernatorial term. He frequently denied it and eventually released a letter to Democratic nominee John Kerry asking not to be considered.

Three years later, we saw Richardson begin a grueling effort for the presidential nomination. It was uphill all the way. He had little support from national figures. And he had to raise a huge amount of money.

He led the bottom tier of candidates but despite a tremendous amount of effort, his candidacy never really got off the ground. And with an Anglo name, he had trouble identifying himself to other Hispanics as one of them.

In contrast, Susana Martinez is obviously Hispanic and obviously female -- two demographics national Republicans are trying hard to attract. She is the first and only governor to fit those qualifications, making her a very hot commodity.

The only Hispanic Republican woman in Congress is Rep. Ileana Ros Lehtinen, of Florida. She

is Cuban and has been in the House for 20 years.

Martinez had no trouble raising money for her primary or general elections or her inaugural events. She appears to have strong support from national GOP leaders.

Her road to national office appears far easier than Richardson's if she doesn't trip along the way. And it should allow her to remain in our state much more than Gov. Richardson did.

If her first year in office is successful, expect to see Martinez seriously considered as a vice-presidential running mate for anyone but Sarah Palin in the spring of 2012.




There seems to be some confusion about Planning and Zoning (P&Z) and how it affects the town. Every structure, building, or property located within the city limits of the Town has a zone designation. It might be zoned Residential, Commercial, Light Manufacturing and Industrial, Planned Unit Development, or Agricultural depending on the location. There are requirements within the zoned area. For example, R-1 Single-Family Residential lists the Purpose and Intent of the zone. It lists the Permissive Uses or that which is allowed within that type of zone. It lists Conditional Uses which are other things allowed within that zone. Area Height and Setback Regulations are also listed. The requirements of R-1 Single-Family Residential are obviously different than say Agricultural for example, where you could keep a horse or cow. The number of horses or cows you can keep is determined by the land mass required for each animal. Horses and cows are not allowed in R-1.

If you were planning some type of construction or remodel you would need to contact P&Z for their assistance and insure you are within the guidelines required by the town. This could be as simple as contacting the Zone Administrator and telling them what your plans are. They in turn could tell you if you need to fill out an application and meet with them or continue with your plan, which means you are within the guidelines.

Some construction projects require State Permits. The State Permits are not supposed to be issued without P&Z approval within the municipality of the construction project. J'Lane Zamora is the Zoning Administrator for the town. She is the person you should contact if you have any questions or concerns.
