
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

Lincoln County Medical Center helped celebrate the grand opening of the Capitan Medical Clinic last Thursday, Nov. 17, by providing a luscious chocolate cake from the Ruidoso Lawrence Brothers bakery which decorated the cake with an edible photo of the new Clinic. The Clinic was constructed with federal Community Development Block Grant dollars, and Lincoln County matching dollars. The land was donated by the village of Capitan, which enabled the county to qualify for the CDBG. The clinic, formerly known as Rose Clinic, will retain its staff of Suzanne Carden, CNS, Jessica Herbert LPN and Wafawn Fitzpatrick, office manager. The facility has three exam rooms, and an isolated laboratory draw room. The clinic number is 354-0057.

New District Lines Approved

New Mexico State Senator Rod Adair appeared before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners during a public hearing on October 18th to talk about redistricting the county. He touched on a few of the statistics and areas of information provided by the U. S. Census Bureau that are reviewed and incorporated into the process of dividing the population into equal parts.

He cited the square mileage of the county and the number of residents that fall into each of more than 100 ethnic or racial categories, adding that Lincoln County is unusual from most New Mexico counties in that there are no disputes over racial issues during redistricting.

"In New Mexico we're generally concerned with two or three categories at most," he said. "Lincoln County is almost 67 percent Anglo, but the important category, the eighteen-plus population, it's about 71 percent Anglo and, and about 25 percent Hispanic, under two percent Indian and, certainly, under one percent Asian and all other minorities," he said.

Redistricting occurs every 10 years after updated information about the population is provided by the census bureau. The purpose is to maintain an equal number of residents in each voting district, while not unfairly dividing communities or placing unfair burdens on any voting block.

The target population for each of Lincoln County's five county commission districts is 4,099, based on the Census Bureau's figure of Lincoln County's population, which was determined to be 20,497 at the time the data was collected in 2010. Each district must have a population of within five percent of 4,099, or from 3,894 to 4,304 people-per-district.

Adair said that one of the goals of redistricting should be to maintain the large rural precincts, which cover large areas of land but contain small numbers of residents, in order to guarantee fair representation of the rural communities. He presented four or five redistricting options for the board of county commissioners to review and consider.

Lincoln County held its final



medical group. Presbyterian employs more than 9,500 people, including more than 500 providers, throughout New Mexico with approximately 250 in Lincoln County.



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Santa Fe Opera To Present New Productions in 2012 Festival Season

The Santa Fe Opera 2012 Festival Season features five new productions -- Puccini's Tosca, Bizet's The Pearl Fishers, Rossini's Maometto II, Szymanowski's King Roger and Richard Strauss' Arabella.

Of the five operas chosen for the 2012 Opera Festival Season, three will be "firsts" for the Company. Two will not have been seen for a dozen years or more.

New to the Company are Bizet's The Pearl Fishers, Rossini's Maometto II and Szymanowski's King Roger. Returning to the repertory are Puccini's Tosca, last performed in 1994, and Strauss's Arabella, not seen since 1997.

The opening night performance, Tosca, is scheduled for Friday, June 29. The season ends on August 25 with The Pearl Fishers.

"The 2012 Festival Season represents the best tradition of The Santa Fe Opera," said SFO General Director Charles MacKay. "It could be called a season of history and romance. Two operas depict actual historical events, and two are passionate love stories."

Among the season's composers, Rossini and Bizet are represented by operas other than their best-known. Strauss aficionados will be happy to see his name, and Arabella is one of his most beloved works.

"There is more good news for opera goers," MacKay continued. "Over the last several years our patrons have asked that we consider starting performances earlier. I am happy to say that from opening night on June 29 through July 28, performances will begin at 8:30 p.m.; on July 30 and for the remainder of the season at 8:00 p.m. We have studied the times of sunsets and worked closely with directors and lighting designers to make sure the performances will not be impacted by daylight."

Mezzo-soprano Susan Graham will be the host for a special Gala Concert on Saturday, August 4, featuring singers appearing in the season. Details will be announced later.

Family Nights, which offer greatly discounted tickets at selected summer performances, will again be available in August. The program differs from Youth Nights offered at final dress rehearsals, in that Family Nights provide the opportunity to attend a regular full performance and at an early 8:00 p.m. starting time.

public hearing on redistricting during the county commissioners' regular meeting on November 15th. As in the first hearing, the public response was minimal.

County clerk Rhonda Burrows began the conversation by explaining how much time and effort her office has devoted to the complicated matter of redistricting, and said that she was about to propose another precinct split. Burrows has often, over the last many months, emphasized that the voting system is built upon the foundation of precincts, which form the basis of county commission districts as well as districts of state and federal representation.

She explained to the county board members that it was important to resolve any precinct boundary issues before getting down to the commission district lines.

"We could not formulate contiguous precinct plans that would meet the population requirements of plus-or-minus five percent," Burrows said. "As we began to assemble these districts, we definitely encountered some problems." Burrows said that she would be presenting two possible redistricting options for consideration but, one option included a district with a population of 4,357 and another of 3,665, one too far above the target population count of 4,099 and the other too far below.

"Those two districts were not within the percent of deviation that's allowed," Burrows said.

The second possible option had similar population disparity issues, as well, she added.

"One of the challenges of doing redistricting right now is that it affects other redistricting that is going on," Burrows said. "As you recall, we adopted new precincts back in June, so we were stuck with those but, under law, we can do another precinct split in order to accomplish our redistricting."

Burrows said that, in recognizing the need to create another precinct in order to meet commission district population requirements, the question then became where to do the precinct split. She said she looked for a precinct split that would have the least impact on ongoing redistricting efforts.

She asked the county commissioners to look at an option that would create a new precinct, Precinct 22, by dividing Precinct 18 at the municipal boundary between Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. Including the new precinct in Commission District 5 instead of District 2 would shift 440 people from District 2 to District 5.

"Once we identified this area, we went through a number of steps before we made a final decision on this, to include working with Research and Polling, the firm that has the state contract to develop precincts within the counties for purposes of redistricting," Burrows said. "We had to vet any proposed changes through this agency because redistricting is going on at all levels and we had to see if we could accomplish this with a minimal impact."

Burrows said that she had hoped for a simpler solution that wouldn't require any additional precinct splits.

"But, in discussing it with Research and Polling, it appears that this split between 18 and 11 may be a part of a senate redistricting planned

split," she said. "It was suggested that we go ahead with this split as proposed."

Burrows said it is true that there were an infinite number of possible precinct splits throughout the county, but the proposed change provided the only option for one simple split that made good sense, because it follows municipal boundary lines and creates the required balance in population of Districts 2 and 5. The split would also work in either of the two redistricting options she was about to propose to the county commissioners, she said.

"The difference between these two options affects Commission District 1 and Commission District 4," Burrows said.

ACCORDING TO N.M. STATE STATUTE 7-38-83, TIMELINESS-ALL ACTS REQUIRED OR PERMITTED TO BE DONE BY MAIL ARE TO BE POSTMARKED ON THE REQUIRED DATE

The Lincoln County Treasurer's Office does honor the postmark, but your mailed payment **MUST BE POSTMARKED BY December 10, 2011**. If you mail a payment on December 10, 2011, request the postmaster stamp the date in your presence, to insure the postmark of that date.

INTEREST shall accrue at the rate of one percent (1%) per month or any portion of a month. (Statute 7-38-49 NMSA 1979).

PENALTY on taxes that become delinquent, shall be imposed at one percent (1%) of the delinquent tax total, or a minimum of five dollars (\$5.00), for each month they remain unpaid. (Statute 7-38-50).

By N.M. State law, property taxes are the personal obligation of the property owner, whether or not the tax bill was received. Mail payments or contact us at the address and phone number below should you have questions regarding your property tax bills.





In the first option, Commission District 4 would be made up of Precincts 4, 5, 14 and 21. Under this option, the Village of Capitan would continue to be split into two separate commission districts.

The second option would have District 4 made up of Precincts 4, 5, 17, 20 and 21. Precinct 14 would be part of Commission District 1 and the Village of Capitan would be consolidated into a single commission district.

"It's my recommendation, considering all of the factors that go into building these districts, communities of interest, etcetera, etcetera, that (the first option) would be most like the configuration that we have now," Burrows said

Redistricting will bring at least small changes to each district in the county, partly due to shifts in the population. Some suggest that the inclusion of Precincts 17 and 20 in District 4, instead District 1, could represent a shift from rural to a more urban-style representation for those precincts. It has also been suggested that including the Nogal area in the same district as Alto will make it much more difficult for a candidate from the Nogal area to be elected to a county office.

County commissioner Kathryn Minter, who represents Commission District 4, said that she was torn between the two redistricting options offered by Burrows because, she said, either way her district would change with a loss of some of her current constituency and the addition of people from another district.

"Sun Valley, those folks want to stay in District 4," Minter said. "People in 14 want to stay in District 4, and Nogal is not part of mine, so it's a hard decision for me to make. I've heard from a lot of people. I'm going to concentrate on Sun Valley because that's where I heard from Jim Miller. He feels like Sun Valley has more in common, like neighborhoods and communities, with Alto than it does with District 1," she said. "He's talking about water; he's talking about other things that they do in that area, the post office and fire districts."

Minter also commented that the second option came the closest to the target population count of 2,099 per district, although both plans fell within the acceptable five percent deviation limit. She added that the people of Nogal might be the most affected by the redistricting because they would be in an altogether new district.

County commissioner Mark Doth made a motion to split Precinct 18 into Precincts 18 and 22. The motion passed unanimously. Minter made a motion to adopt the second redistricting option. Her motion passed 3-2, with Minter, Doth and commissioner Tom Battin voting in favor, commissioners Eileen Sedillo and Jackie Powell voting against.

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

Lincoln National Forest Hosts Collaborative Forest Restoration Workshops

The Lincoln National Forest will host Collaborative Forest Restoration Program (CFRP) workshops during the month of December. In Fiscal Year 2012, the USDA Forest Service expects to distribute approximately \$3 million through cost share grants to implement forest restoration projects on public lands in New Mexico. Projects must be designed through a collaborative process that includes affected communities and stakeholders.

The workshops will be held on the following dates:

- Ruidoso - Monday, December 12, Smokey Bear District Fire Operations Building
- Carlsbad - Tuesday, December 13, location TBD
- Cloudcroft - Thursday, December 15, Sacramento Ranger District Office

All workshops will run from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. with a break for lunch around noon. Participants will learn about the CFRP, review the 2012 application, network with potential collaborators, and have questions answered.

"We encourage our area tribes, state and local governments, educational institutions, private landowners, conservation organizations, non-profit groups, and other interested public and private entities to participate in these workshops so they can successfully apply for this funding," said Lincoln National Forest Supervisor Robert Trujillo.


By working together to apply for these grants, small business owners, conservation and environmental groups, community groups, tribes, universities and other organizations can help

reduce the threat of wildfire, improve forest and watershed conditions, and bring jobs and job training to local communities.

Applications should reflect local and traditional knowledge in developing creative ways to reduce the number and density of small diameter trees on public lands. Proponents are encouraged to submit proposals for projects that facilitate landscape scale, multi-jurisdictional efforts such as National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) planning, landscape assessments, or Community Wildfire Protection Plans.
