

# Shots Fired at Mayor's House; Man Arrested

On November 17 at approx. 11:38 p.m. the Carrizozo Police was dispatched to 1003 A Ave., Mayor Dennis Vega's residence in reference to a shots fired call.

Carrizozo Police Chief Barnett along with officers Brisen and Samter arrived at approx. 11:43 p.m. to a male subject lying in the ground just inside mayor Vega's property, with County Deputy Brawley

holding him at gun point. Officer Brisen patted the subject down and discovered a handgun in his front pocket and a homemade black jack in another pocket along with a pair of nunchucks on the ground next to him. The handgun was secured by Chief Barnett and the subject arrested and placed in officer Samter's patrol unit. The subject was identified as Douglas

Whittaker by his driver's license that was on him. Investigation revealed Whittaker was allegedly upset after discovering a flat tire to his vehicle while it was parked at the Carrizozo fire station earlier that evening. He allegedly went home retrieved a second vehicle he owned and drove back to town to mayor Vega's residence where he entered the house and called

out to the mayor to confront him. Not finding mayor Vega he left and drove away only to return a second time and discharged a weapon on 10th St. in front of mayor Vega's home, again challenging him to face him. Once again not making contact he left and returned a third time where he was confronted by Deputy Brawley.

Whittaker was originally charged with Aggravated

Assault, Discharging a weapon from a Motor Vehicle and Carrying a Weapon While Intoxicated. The Criminal Complaint was amended to include Burglary of a Dwelling.

Whittaker posted a \$20,000.00 cash only bond on Nov. 18 and is currently scheduled to appear in Lincoln County Magistrate Court on December 6.



## Town of Carrizozo Zoning Challenged as Selective

During the November 14th meeting of the Carrizozo Town Council, the trustees heard a plea from one of their constituents regarding a zoning conflict and a desire to keep some beloved pets. At issue is the right of a resident to keep housing two miniature horses on property that she moved onto a year ago and wasn't told until about six months ago that her horses violate a town ordinance.

When mayor Dennis Vega introducing the item on the town council's agenda listed as "discussion and possible action on Cheri Cloudt horse compliance", Cloudt stood up and asked for permission to speak. Vega attempted to deny her request.

"On action on general business, when I put a motion on the table, the discussion is for the councilors only," Vega said, although no motion had been made concerning the item. "When I put a vote, I need to have a vote and a motion," he said.

"But if you vote against me, I won't get to talk," Cloudt said.

"Then I'll have to do that at every meeting, and my rule is, and is the law, states when I have a motion on the table it stays that way," Vega said, still acting without a motion.

"So I have no say at all?" Cloudt asked.

"You had your say," Vega said. Cloudy argued that she had never had an opportunity to present her case to the town councilors and Vega's response was to tell her that he intended to run the meeting according to the law. He restated his apparent belief that a motion had been made and was still on the table, and then said that he had an action on the table but no motion yet. Vega told Cloudt that the councilors could discuss the issue, but the public could not comment on agenda items except

during an audience participation period which had already come and gone. He told Cloudt that she would have an opportunity to present her side of the issue to the Carrizozo Planning and Zoning Committee (P&Z).

"The application has not gone through P&Z," Vega said.

Carrizozo resident Barbara Culler asked why the matter was being voted on by the town council if the P&Z hadn't even seen Cloudt's application yet.

"The horses have been there for a year," Vega answered.

Culler, repeating her question, asked "how can you be voting on it if it hasn't been to the P&Z?"


P&Z member and newly appointed volunteer zoning administrator for the Town of Carrizozo, Judy Fitzpatrick, said that Cloudt's case had come before the town council because Cloudt had failed to attend a meeting of the P&Z during which her case was to be reviewed.

Cloudt admitted having missed a meeting of the P&Z committee, explaining that she was given five days notice through an email message that she was expected to be present at a meeting of the P&Z. She said that she told at least one P&Z member that she couldn't attend the meeting because it conflicted with her graduate school class schedule. She added that, when a resident wants to bring an issue before the P&Z committee, the committee requires an advanced notice of no less than 10 days.

Vega said that discussion of Cloudt's application for a livestock permit was tabled by the Carrizozo trustees in December of 2010 because Cloudt had not presented the application to the P&Z. Cloudt said that she was never told that her application was going to be an item on the December, 2010 town council agenda.

da, so she did not attend the meeting. She added that she was not contacted by the P&Z committee until sometime in May.

Linda Rodriguez, a former P&Z member, said that animal permit applications never went before the P&Z for review until some of the town's ordinance enforcement procedures were restructured in June or July of this year.

"When she was told to fill out an animal permit by city hall and she complied, that went nowhere," Rodriguez said. "It had no process to come to planning and zoning. It had no process for approval at any point, but she was told to do that, which she did."

Rodriguez said that Cloudt had been keeping her horses on the Carrizozo property for five months before it was determined to be a violation of the town's zoning ordinance, and attributed some blame to Cloudt's realtor for not making sure that Cloudt was aware of the zoning restrictions before purchasing the property. Rodriguez said that some town officials knew before the sale that Cloudt was specifically looking for a place where she could keep her animals.

Vega said that there had been a failure to communicate, but that it is the responsibility of a potential buyer to know whether or not the property they are interested in carries restrictions.

"The bottom line is, she was not in compliance," Vega said. "We're not going to have this blown out of proportion, and we're going to communicate. Okay? She does have the right to appeal," he said.

When the discussion became arguments about when citizens are, or are not, permitted to speak at town council meetings, and whose responsibility it is to understand the town's P&Z policies and procedures, Culler suggested that Cloudt be granted a few minutes at the podium to tell her story. Vega reluctantly agreed to let Cloudt speak, but not before he attempted to place a call to the town's attorney, Julianne Leonard, who could not be reached.

Cloudt told the trustees that she purchased her Carrizozo

property on October 31, 2010, and moved the horses onto the site the following day. She said that both of the realtors she dealt with told her that she could keep the horses there. She said she had spoken with the mayor at the time, Mike Petty, about having the horses on the property and he welcomed her without any mention of zoning or issues with keeping animals on the property. One of the contractors she hired to work on the property was also a member of the P&Z, Cloudt said, and he never mentioned that having horses would violate the town's zoning ordinance.

"Ned and his crew were at my house for almost two and a half months and saw the horses every day," Cloudt said. "One of the first people to welcome me to Carrizozo, and



**INTEREST** shall accrue at the rate of one percent (1%) per month or any portion of a month. (Statute 7-38-49 NMSA 1979).



came to the house a couple times a week to check on the progress, was Ray Dean. Ray was also on the planning and zoning board."

Cloudt said that she went to the Carrizozo city hall in December, 2010, to pay her first bill for city services. At that time, she was told that she would need to get a permit to have the horses on the property, so she filled out an application for a permit and paid the associated fee.

"She said that an officer would come and make sure I had proper enclosure," Cloudt said. "I went home knowing that I had done what was asked of me to keep my horses."

According to Cloudt, even the chairman of the Carrizozo P&Z at the time stopped by to welcome her to town. Nobody ever mentioned zoning or that Cloudt was in violation of a municipal ordinance by keeping her horses on her property, until then P&Z Chair J'Lane Zamora came to Cloudt's home in May, 2011, with a police officer.

"He informed me at that time that my property was zoned R-1," Cloudt said.

She said that she questioned why she was being singled-out for having two miniature horses when one of her neighbors keeps full-sized horses on his property and another neighbor has sheep.

"I talked to my neighbors and no one had a problem with my horses," she said.

Cloudt said that, in July of this year, she received a letter from the P&Z telling her that her application for a permit for the horses had been denied because of the property's R-1 zoning. The residential zoning does not permit livestock on the property.

Cloudt alleged that she was told in August by Chris Ventura, who is currently a town trustee, that he and Vega had discussed her situation and she didn't need to worry about having to get rid of her horses.

"I felt relief at that time, knowing that the town trustees were on my side and recog-

nized that mistakes had been made from the start," she said.

Cloudt said that, in October, she received an email from Fitzpatrick informing her that her name would be on the P&Z agenda for its upcoming meeting in five days. Citizens requesting placement on the P&Z agenda are required to make such requests at least 10 days prior to the date of the meeting. Cloudt's schedule prevented her from attending the meeting; the item was tabled by the P&Z.

Cloudt, who said she owns 12 lots in Carrizozo, told the town council that she felt like she has been singled-out and harassed for the past seven months.

"I need to be given an option," she said.

Vega recommended that the town council ask Cloudt to file a request with the P&Z committee, to be reviewed by that committee before being readressed by the trustees. The trustees voted unanimously to do so.



## WEATHER REPORT

Lincoln County is in for some moderately heavy snowfall starting late this afternoon/evening and continuing throughout the upcoming weekend, then it will clear and warm up a little for the beginning of next week.

Expect strong winds out of the east for the next couple of days, with gusts as high as 45 miles an hour.

Daytime temperatures will be from the high 30s to the high 40s at all elevations. Nighttime temperatures will be from the high teens to the low to mid 20s at the higher elevations and solidly in the mid 20s to low 30s across the lower elevations.

Ski Apache opened for the 2011-2012 ski season over the Thanksgiving holiday weekend. Current snow and slope conditions at Ski Apache; 3 of 11 ski lifts are currently operating, 3 of 55 trails are open, approximately five acres of the 750 acres are open for winter sports. There is 14 inches of machine groomed and packed powder at all elevations. The most recent snowfall of approximately four inches was on November 26.

### NM Took 66 Years to Achieve Statehood

**SANTA FE** – On Aug. 28, New Mexico Gov. Susana Martinez kicked off our state's centennial celebration. The governor may have been a little early for our Jan. 6 birthday but despite being the Land of Manana, New Mexico seldom is late to start a celebration.

On Sept. 1 Gov. Martinez ordered that all state agencies promote the centennial. One of the first agency promotions we saw was some magnificently large posters documenting New Mexico's significant events from the time the United States occupied our territory in 1846 until today.

One three-foot by two-foot poster tells the story of New Mexico's long, 66-year effort to gain statehood. The other poster chronicles important New Mexico events from our state's past 100 years.

The posters have been produced by the New Mexico Department of Cultural Affairs and are targeted primarily at schools libraries and museums. They also are available to the general public by contacting Sarah Ives at the

Department of Cultural Affairs, 505-984-2012. You may email her at sarah.ives@nmcentennial.org.

The following are some of the important events leading up to statehood that are listed on the chart. (My comments are in parentheses.)

1846 – Mexican American War begins. US Army under Stephen Watts Kearny occupies New Mexico.

1847 – U.S. forces suppress the New Mexico Revolt of 1847. (This often is referred to as the Taos Revolt, in which Gov. Charles Bent was scalped, then killed. The lives of his family and Kit Carson's wife were spared.)

1848 – Mexican American War ends with the signing of the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo.

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## Letter to the Editor

### Are you the problem or the solution?

The recent furor about a Zoning Administrator and other sensitive issues before our trustees may need some clarification. At one point my wife and I were considered outsiders in Carrizozo. She taught music at the schools and I volunteered for several school and community activities. One of my volunteer positions was on the Planning and Zoning Commission. Over time I ascended to the position of Chairman of the Commission and in doing so presided over several controversial issues. The billboard which sits prominently at the intersection of Hwy 54 and 380 was one of the controversial issues that brought outright anger to our commission meetings and community. The Trustees overruled our recommendation to deny the erection of this billboard which was in gross violation of our ordinances. Rumors of payoffs and outright corruption cast a cloud over our community all because of Trustees not following the Commission's recommendation. Law suits also were threatened. Some battles by community activists were won and the size of the sign was reduced plus the proposed lighting of the sign was overruled. Again the citizens of Carrizozo spoke loudly and definitely about what they wanted and didn't want in the Town limits.

We are truly a "Funky Town" to use Mr. Peter Wolfe's characterization of this community. We might even be called a "feisty" town although we will embrace new comers who have a zeal for volunteering by placing them on commissions, committees and other levels of community activities. That's how we say, "Welcome to Carrizozo." This welcome mat can and does get rather dusty when the new comers bring ideas from the "outside" or their place of origin that are not compatible with "our traditions". This open arm welcome to outsiders by the town has three distinct objectives even though they are not written in the Planning and Zoning Handbook. One of the requirements is commission members use common

sense, number two is how well do you know the cultural makeup of your new community, and three how do those who have lived here, some for almost 100 years, define "quality of life"? We must all acknowledge, shedding the label of outsider can take decades and for some even longer!

Today common sense, a rare quality indeed, has given way to emotionalism and my vision of community is better than yours. Questions arise about, is miniature horses "poop" more aromatic than cat, dog, rabbit and chicken "poop"? Does a miniature pony take up any more space than a Great Dane or an FFA project animal? These are questions that seem to arise and will require a Zoning Administrator to judge one way or another. Will they use common sense or, "this is how it was done where I come from"? What are the qualifications for a volunteer administrator? If they follow the letter of the existing guidelines, one day a citizen may have a knock on their door by one of these "well intended new comers", or recent volunteer telling a "life long resident" to clean up their act or yard.



600,000 acres along the border.  
 1854 - Gadsden Purchase from Mexico adds 45,000 square miles to New Mexico territory.  
 1862 - Civil War battles of Valverde, Glorieta Pass and Peralta are fought ending the invasion of New Mexico. The California

Column of Union troops arrives in New Mexico.  
 1863 - U.S. Territory of Arizona is established.  
 1872 - New Mexico Territorial Legislature approves a constitution.  
 1875 - Act enabling New Mexico statehood fails in U.S.

Congress.  
 1876 - Another enabling act for New Mexico statehood passes in Senate but dies in U.S. House.  
 1878 - Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad tracks cross into New Mexico at Raton Pass.  
 1880 - Railroad reaches Santa Fe., end-

ing commerce on the Santa Fe Trail.  
 1885 -- New Territorial Capitol Building is completed in Santa Fe.  
 1889 - Act enabling statehood for New Mexico (which called for a name change to the State of Montezuma) fails.
