Tres Hermano Mine.

Punta Arinas

Costa Rica

INTERPRETER.

Dear Sir:

According to promise, I write you these few lines, to let you know that I arrived here all right. I did not come here direct. when I left White Oaks, as you are no doubt aware, but went up to Wallace, Idaho. I was to have sailed from San Francisco, in company, with Mrs. S. B. Schrontz and W. W. Dodd, on the twenty-second of November, but received a telegram telling me to remain as I was, until further advice. That did not suit me very well as you can imagine. After going to the expense, and trouble that I had gone to, I did not propose to remain in San Francisco indefinitely, so Dodd and myself went to Idaho and Mrs. Schrontz went to Denver Colorado. Well I had just settled to work in a mine about four miles from Wallace, when I received a telegram from Fraser and Chalmers, telling me to go down at once to Mr. Schrontz so I started once more for the promised land, and arrived here on the 10th of Jan. a little homesick but determined to fill my part of the contract under which I left home. I found Mr. Schrontz looking well and hearty. He was very glad to see me and explained the reason he had telegraphed Fraser & Chalmers, to stop us in San Francisco. It appears that there had been some little misunderstanding between some of the stock holders of the company, and Mr. Schrontz did not want us until everything was settled. They had not ceased work at all, but things were a little unsettled for awhile, hence his message to Fraser and Chalmers to stop us. The trip from San Francisco to Punta Arinas, is a long and tedious one. It takes eighteen days to make it. I did not suffer any, from sea sickness, but the time passed very slow, for the first eight days there was nothing at all to relieve the monotony. Eat and sleep, sleep and eat, was the order of the day. Now I was always renowned, as a sleeper, and my appetite is something immense, when I am in good trim, which I usually am, but even I get tired of eating and sleeping, and was sighing for some other mode of killing time, when on the morning of the ninth day, after leaving San Francisco, we reached Acapulco, Mexico. This is the most beautiful harbor on the Pacific coast. We stayed there

a day, taking in freight, coffee. I went ashore and had a walk through the sleepy old town, the inhabitants of which, are at best, a thousand years behind the age. After leaving Acapulco, the time passed a little quicker, as we touched at San Jose De Guatemala the day after and reached a new port every day for the balance of the voyage. When I reached Punta Arinas, I was greatly disappointed to find that I was still two days journey from the mine. I had telegraphed Mr. Schrontz and expected he would meet me at the port but I was disappointed, and found out afterward that he had not received my message, so did not know I was coming. I was a little surprised to see Orange trees growing along the sides of the streets, in Punta Arinas, for shade trees. It is summer here now, and as the Oranges get ripe they drop off the trees. I would have picked some of them up, but was a little ashamed to be seen picking anything from off the street. Well I walked around awhile and tried to find out how far it was to the mine, and how, or by what means, a person could reach there. But I could get no information whatever. Now I have always thought that I could speak Spanish, and have often put in words in that language, when English would have been more to the purpose but then, I was so overburdened with Spanish that I used to forget myself and branch off into it against my will, so I used to tell myself. But the time had come at last for me to make use of my Spanish, thus far I had accosted the people in English, now I would speak to them in their own language and gain the information I wanted. So I stopped the next person. I met and began to air my knowledge, of the language of the country. I trotted out all I knew and, I am afraid, a little more, all to no purpose for after listening for awhile, with a polite smile, he shrugged his shoulders in the most approved fashion, and muttering no Intenda Ingles he hurried away. That was all I could get out of any of them. The next day however I had better luck. I accidentally ran across the American Consul, and he took me to the Companies Office where I found that I would have to wait two days more, before I could get away, as the company's boat was away and not expected back until that time. I got away at last and reached the mine which is a very good one. This company is an English one and very wealthy. They own about fifty thousand acres of land here, all mineral and valuable timber land. Mr. Schrontz has full charge of all the company

affairs here. He has had a great many difficulties to contend with since he came here, but has proved himself equal to the occasion. He had to cut roads through the jungle for a distance of about thirty miles. He also had to make wagons with which to haul the machinery from the river. I may here state that we are about five hours ride from Punta Arines on a small steam boat and about five hours ride on horse back. The mill site is about three and a half miles from the mine, that is, about that distance by the trail, but only about one and a half in a direct line. The mill is not finished yet. They are going to put in a wire tramway to carry the ore from the mine to the mill it will be what they call an air tramway. The ore will be conveyed in buckets which are suspended in the air from an endless cable the buckets will be, perhaps, seventy or eighty feet apart and the weight of the full buckets going down will carry the empty ones up. They will be self dumping. This is a very inexpensive mode of handling ore. It will not cost more than twenty-five cents per ton to carry the ore from the mine to the mill. The mill will be worked by water power as there is an abundance of it here for all purposes. Mr. Schrontz has used great forethought in laying out the plan of the whole works, and I am very sorry that White Oaks lost his services. The labor is very cheap in this country wages range from fifty cents to one dollar and twenty-five cents per day and board. Miners wages is one dollar and twenty-five cents per day and board. But the natives here are too indolent to work. The few who do condescend to do so, go at it in a half hearted fashion that makes a person feel sleepy to look at them. I would rather have the crew of men who were on the South Homestake than all the native miners in Costa Rica. This country is as hot as hell at present, the rainy season which they call winter, starts in, in May. The country is very fertile but there is very little farming done. Their chief product is coffee which they export to the United States and Europe. Parrots can be seen in droves flying from one place to another chattering as they go. You can also see the monkeys swing themselves from branch to branch in the trees as you pass along. But I am afraid you will not have patience to read my letter through, if I don't bring it to a close. But before doing so I must tell you that although I have seen the famed city of San Francisco, and have traveled through Oregon and up through the new state of Washington on into Idaho and back again to the Pacific coast and sailed down the coast and touched at Mexico, Guatemala, San Salvador, Nicaragua and on down to Costa Rica,

but I have not seen a place since leaving White Oaks that I like half so well. It makes me weep when I think of the good old times we used to have there. I wish you would send me the INTERPRETER. Although I don't know whether I will ever get it or not, even if you should send it. There is no post office nearer than Punta Arines, and they take two days to make the trip although they only travel about four or five hours each day and could make the trip in one if they wished to do so. There are no regular mail carriers in this country. Mail is something they don't bother with themselves and they don't see why they should be troubled with other people's mail who certainly ought to be able to get along without mail if they themselves can. But for the accommodation of the few foreigners who are selfish enough to have a letter or a paper come to them occasionally, they open the Post Office twice a day from nine till ten o'clock in the morning and from twelve till one in the afternoon. But you will need seventeen INTERPRETERS before you can induce them to look the mail over to see whether there is anything for you or not, for instance you have to produce an old envelope addressed to yourself or write your name so that they can compare it with all the mail they have in the Office and if you have written your name in full and there should happen to be a letter there addressed to you in your initials only, they insist that it is not for you. And you have to talk like four lawyers before you can convince them that you are not trying to get away with some one else's letters, so that you can see what a slim chance a man has of getting his mail if he is not there himself to attend to it. I can imagine how tired you will be before you get through reading this letter so will finish before branching off into another subject. Give my kind regards to all my friends and tell them I remember them all. I promised to write to a great many but have not had time to do so yet. You can, if you see fit put this letter in your paper it will give the boys some faint idea of the country. It would give me great pleasure to answer any letters of enquiries from any of my friends, as to the resources of the country as far as it is in my power to do so. And now with kind regards to all in White Oaks, permit me to remain,

THE WHITE OAKS ROAD.

A Number of Suggestions That Should be Carefully Considered by the Citizens.

EDITOR HERALD;

Will you kindly allow me space in your columns to make a few sug-

gestions to the citizens of El Paso regarding the White Oaks railway enterprise. This road so far as it has progressed is indebted to the amount of \$105,500, a good portion of which is due El Paso, fully one-half, the balance being due for steel, ties and freights in or to New York people and the T. P. Railroad. There are some fifteen or twenty attachment suits and laborers liens now entered in the courts of this county on these claims. Now why cannot this city, through its solid citizens, take hold of this road guarantee those claims to be paid a year or two hence, get the property out of its present entangled condition, release all the suits and discharge the receiver. Then put the property into the hands of some practicable business man, giving him authority to place the enterprise and a sufficient length of time to do it, say six months or one. That is about the only way that this road will ever be built, for neither capitalists nor railway builders will invest in any enterprise, no matter how good it may be, that is covered knee deep with law suits, hanging over it. Neither can any man succeed in placing an enterprise in the condition that this is in, where he has to call an army of creditors together and consult with them every time he makes an offer to anyone to furnish the money to build with, to see if his course meets with the creditors approval.

This road never can nor never will be built so long as it remains in its present shape, for the reason that the investors will not take hold of it while it is so covered up with

litigation; and while it is not and cannot be doubted that this is one of the best enterprises in the Southwest, it must be handled by a practicable business man who knows what he wishes to do, and does it.

It seems to me that the property holders of this city could well afford to make some move in this direction and they would be paid ten-fold in the enhanced value on their property; and I am fully satisfied that such an arrangement could be made with the creditors of the road both at home and in New York and it will well pay this city to guarantee this debt. But the longer it stands in its present shape the harder it will become to untangle it; and the more it is hawked about in its present condition the harder it will become to interest capital in it. Hence the necessity of some action to put it into shape, that it can be handled by business men in a business way.

There is not and can be no doubt of the excellence of the enterprises for, by building to White Oaks and thence to Liberal, in Kansas, it will bring this city and all points in Mexico 275 miles nearer to Kansas City, St. Louis and Chicago and all points east connecting with Denver & Fort Worth road in the Panhandle, thus bringing us 200 miles nearer Denver and all points north. And in addition of this opening up of vast bodies of coal and timber along the line of this proposed road, that this city and Mexico are so badly in need of at the present time it would develop various other industries from which El Paso would derive great benefit.

## PALMER ELECTED

Palmer was elected to the U. S. Senate from Illinois, to succeed Farwell on Wednesday last. This has been the most remarkable Senatorial contest that ever occurred in this country.

The Illinois Legislature is composed of 101 Democrats, 100 Republicans, and 3 alliance men. 103 was therefore necessary to a choice. Prior to the last November election the Democrats in State Convention formally nominated Gen. Palmer for Senator, and made his election the issue in the selection of members to the Legislature. It was the beginning of a needed reform in the selection of U. S. Senators which should bring such elections within reasonable control of the people, instead of subject to the corrupt methods that have prevailed in so many of the States. Palmer's friends received at that election a plurality of some thirty thousand votes. The Democrats therefore felt bound by the instruction of their State convention, and for sixty days the one hundred, and one Democratic members have day after day cast their votes solidly for Palmer. They needed but two votes to elect, and those two—of Cookrell and Moore, farmers alliance democrats—finally came in and with the 101 Democrats elected Gen. Palmer by a majority of one of the entire membership.

It is a grand victory for popular elections to the highest branch of the National Legislature, and its influence for good will be effective and far reaching.

It is public notice that there is force and vitality in the movement for the purification of that high legislative court—that the time is near at hand when money-bags must go to the rear—that brains and honest

devotion to the interests of the great common people, and not bullion, must hereafter control in making the laws of the country. It is a victory for the cause of better government.—Headlight.

Since General Palmer's election as United States Senator from Illinois to succeed J. V. Fawcett, the Republican party has only four majority in the higher branch of congress. Through the admission of six borough states, two of which have only half the population of New Mexico, the Republican party gained twelve United States Senators. But for the stealthy legislation of a senator from New Hampshire, and the admission of Idaho and Wyoming neither of which has fifty per cent. the population of the territory of New Mexico, the democratic party would now have two majority in the United States Senate.—Democrat.

The following personal notices we copy from the Las Vegas Optic of the 13th.

GRANVILLE A. RICHARDSON,  
of Chaves county, appeared in the  
Senate, this winter prominently.  
Mr. Richardson is thirty years of  
age: was born in Kentucky: in ap-  
pearance, he is of medium size, of  
spare form, and rather sharp fea-  
tures of the blonde cast.

He took his seat in the Senate as a member from Chaves county, one of the new counties created two years ago.

He was a stranger to most of his brother members and a democrat in politics, but he at once took a front rank as an able debater on the floor and as a hard and clear-headed committee worker. His persistent and conscientious attention to all the duties of his position, together with his able advocacy of all general measures which met his approval commanded the respect of his opponents, as well as maintained the confidence of his friends. Mr. Richardson retired from the Senate an acknowledged leader among the few who have achieved such a distinction in that body. It is no flattery to say that his work in aiding the passage of the public-school law and many other measures of almost equal importance to the whole people, has proven him to be a safe legislator. Independent, when the needs of the hour demand of party trammels or any other influences antagonize duties demanded to be performed by original public interest. The memory of the services performed, this winter, by Mr. Richardson and by others of his stamp, in both houses, should not so be forgotten by the people. Neither should their personalities. The day may come when such men will again be needed.

WM. C. McDONALD,

member of the House from Lincoln county, is thirty-two years of age. He was born in New York and has a fine general and legal education. Mr. McDonald was admitted to practice as a lawyer, but for several years has been employed in mining matters, and is now superintendent of an extensive cattle ranch, known as the Carrizozo ranch, near White Oaks. He is of medium size and has a decided florid, or what is called a sandy complexion. He entered this legislature, politically, as a democrat, but being of a very independent turn of mind, and having no direct personal objects to maintain, through legislation, Mr. McDonald has proven to be one of the most useful and respected members of this legislative body. He has been a cogent and forceful reasoner on all subjects on which he has chosen to speak from his place on the floor of the House.

While he has not occupied the time of the House in discussion as frequently as many others, it has been apparent that no member has been listened to with more attention, nor has there been one whose opinions have carried more weight in the lower House.

No measure before the House of merit or public importance failed to receive Mr. McDonald's hearty support, and he is entitled to the credit of formulating two of the most important measures introduced during the session, namely, the road and jury laws. New Mexico can ill spare from her legislative halls such men as Wm. C. McDonald. He and his work here during this session of the legislature should be kept green in the memories of the people. They will be very sure to have use for him in the future.

It is an undisputed fact that the New Mexico legislature which recently adjourned and of which Mr. Burns was speaker, accomplished more important and beneficial legislation than any similar body ever convened in the Territory. On entering upon the discharge of his duties as speaker, Mr. Burns appointed committees whose investigation disclosed most rank corruption in every department of the

territorial government. The Republicans had run things with an utter disregard for the interests of the people, and prostituted their official power to most flagrant violations of the law and all sense of common decency and honesty. Every lever of the government was used for personal aggrandizement. These evils were remedied by Speaker Burns, committees.—El Paso Times.

SYNOPSIS OF THE NEW LAND  
LAW.

Section 1 repeals the timber culture act, but saves the rights of all existing entries, and gives a right of commutation to those who have for years in good faith tried to comply, at \$1.25 per acre.

Section 2 provides modification of the desert land act, providing fully for actual reclamation of the land entered, and preventing speculative accumulation of the land, with a saving of all rights under existing entries.

Section 3 enlarges section 2288, Revised Statutes, by including reservoirs or ditches for irrigating purposes.

Section 4 repeals the pre-emption laws, with a modification of the homestead law, and with provisions more strict as to proofs of entry and all final proofs, extending the commutation from six to fourteen months.

Section 7 and 8 provide details as to final action in the Interior Department on final entries, and provide limitations as to contests, and suits to cancel patents, fixing the latter at five years as to patents now issued and six years as to future ones, and provisions as to timber trespasses.

Section 9 prohibits offering of public lands at public sale hereafter thus preventing private or cash entries.

Sections 10 to 17 relate to lands in Alaska, for their acquisition for manufacturing and commercial purposes and for townsites.

Section 17 allows mineral entries in addition to the maximum allowance of 320 acres allowed by existing law.

Sections 18, 19, 20, and 21 relate to ditches and reservoirs, and providing for their construction.

Section 23 cures defects in the titles of settlers on certain former Indian lands caused by different rulings of the Department of the Interior.

Section 24 authorizes the President to set apart trust reserves, where to preserve timber, he shall deem it advisable.
