THE GREAT RAILROAD STRIKES.

Fergusson as Special Attorney for the Prosecution.

Catron as Attorney Without Fee for the Defense.

Twenty-five Hundred Dollars Fee Received by Fergusson for Prosecuting Railroad Employees during 1894 Strike.

Herewith are published the official records of the railroad cases, growing out of the railroad strike in July 1894 in New Mexico, and in which H. B. Fergusson was the aid attorney for the Government and for the prosecution of strikers and T. B. Catron was attorney, for defendants in the Santa Fe district court case, without pay and without fee, and simply because he believed that the men charged with contempt of court were not guilty and because he is the friend of the laboring men.

Actions are stronger than words and deeds stronger than palaver. Fergusson now goes about the country asking for railroad men's votes, making them Judas promises and posing as the friend of the railroad man. In 1894, for a fee he did the very best he could to send them to the penitentiary, have them lose their places and inflict all sorts of punishment on them.

The court records are meager, but they show how he acted and how Catron acted on those occasions.

True to his nature and character, Fergusson appeared as little as possible upon the surface, but though paid a very large and liberal fee by the government, but did all he could underhandly and secretly to injure and punish the railroad employees, who were charged with contempt.

Here is the official record, obscure, because the officials are friendly to Fergusson, but plain enough to show that he prosecuted and did all he could against the class of men he now asks for votes, and that T. B. Catron stood by them in their hour of need, did the best he could to have the cases against them dismissed and fought for them, insisted on the punishment of the county, and would inflict and the easiest penalty it was possible to obtain.

The court, having heard the testimony of the witnesses produced in support of the affidavits filed herein, and upon the said affidavits and answers, finds said Martin O'Connor, James Clare, and Jesse Stewart guilty of contempt of this court, but as said Martin O'Connor, James Clare and Jesse Stewart, suspends sentence herein, and the court further finds said Robert P. Bland guilty of contempt of this court, assesses his punishment to imprisonment for the term of sixty days; and the court further finds George Runyan and F. M. Walters guilty of contempt of this court, and assesses their punishment therefore to imprisonment for the term of fifty days beginning with today; and the court further finds Fred Hollowell guilty of contempt of this court and assesses his punishment therefore to imprisonment for the full term of fifty days beginning with twentieth day of July, 1894.

It is therefore considered and adjudged by the court, that said Robert P. Bland be and he hereby is remanded to the custody of the sheriff of Santa Fe county, to be by him conveyed to the New Mexico Penitentiary, to be there confined for the term of sixty days, beginning with today, and that a warrant of commitment issue against him, and

It is further considered and adjudged by the court, that said George Runyan and F. M. Walters be, and they are hereby remanded to the custody of the sheriff of Santa Fe county, to be

by him conveyed to the territorial penitentiary, situated at Santa Fe, New Mexico, to be there confined for the full term of fifty days, beginning with today, and that warrants of commitment issue against them, and

It is further ordered by the court, that said Fred Hollowell be and he hereby is remanded to the custody of the sheriff of Santa Fe county, to be by him conveyed to the New Mexico penitentiary, to be there imprisoned and confined for the full period of fifty days, beginning with the twentieth day of July 1894, and that a warrant of commitment issue against him.

And it is further ordered by the court that said persons shall be committed for safe keeping only, and shall not be, under the commitment to be issued herein, subjected to the usual prison discipline of convicts confined in said penitentiary.

Came now the said plaintiffs by their special attorney, H. B. Fergusson, Esq., and moves the court to strike from the files of this court the answers of the respondents and each of them filed in this cause, for the reason that said answers are not verified by the affidavits of the respondents, and the court after argument of counsel denies the motion.

NOTE.

This was done by H. B. Fergusson in order to deprive the defendants of their defense in this answer unless under oath, which was not required by any law of New Mexico, in order that he might get an indictment for perjury.

Now comes said plaintiffs by their special attorney, H. B. Fergusson, Esq., and moves the court for leave to file interrogatories directed to said defendants, and for an order that defendants answer such interrogatories under oath, and the court after argument of counsel denies the motion.

NOTE.

This was done to compel them to answer under oath. Contempt proceedings being criminal in their nature he urged the court by his motion to violate the law, by forcing them to testify against themselves which they could not be compelled to do, this also in order to get an indictment for perjury.

Defendants are charged with contempt for refusing to take their trains out. H. B. Fergusson prosecuted, Charles Wagg was found guilty of contempt by the court and sentenced to serve fifteen days in the county jail and served his full term.

REASONS WHY.

Republicans should vote for T. B. Catron, as Delegate to Congress in 1896.



REPUBLICAN RESOLUTIONS.

Adopted at the Territorial Convention at Las Vegas.

The republicans of New Mexico in convention assembled in the city of East Las Vegas do hereby declare as follows:

We heartily endorse the platform adopted at St. Louis by the republican national convention; we are in favor of bi-metalism on the coinage and concurrent circulation of both gold and silver as money, on a parity with each other in debt-paying and purchasing power. We are in favor of international bi-metalism as a final and desirable settlement of the money question, inasmuch as it would open the markets and mints of other nations to the coinage and use of silver as money, and establish and maintain at all times a parity between the metals.

We believe it to be the duty of the United States to coin, free of charge, the product of its gold and silver mines, so long as the equality of the dollars coined be preserved; we are opposed to the coinage of foreign silver in the American mints as an unjust discrimination by this nation against its own citizens, and we denounce the democratic party for declaring in its platform, national legislation in favor of opening our mints to the free coinage of foreign silver and its refusal to declare in favor of preserving the parity between the metals coined, thus endangering the equality in the value of our money and jeopardizing the business interests of our country with a fluctuating and unstable currency.

We hold that American citizenship is understood when an American citizen may be compelled to wait while foreigners are using our mints for free coinage of foreign silver. We are opposed to the exclusive use of gold or the exclusive use of silver as a money metal, but are in favor of the use of both as a fixed policy of the American government.

We demand for all of the industries of this Territory and particularly those of silver, wool, live stock, hides, coal, timber, lead and fruit growing, such legislation by the congress of the United States as will protect these industries against the cheap products of foreign countries.

We demand protection against cheap foreign labor.

We insist that the laboring classes should be bettered in their condition, dignified in their character and their wages maintained so that they can derive a reasonable product beyond their actual necessary expenses, and we insist that the markets of the United States, which are the best in the world, shall be preserved for our own people and for our own products.

IRRIGATION.

We favor assistance by the federal government for the irrigation of all our lands and insist that proper measures shall be adopted under the interstate commerce power of congress to protect the people of this Territory against the unlawful and extravagant appropriation of the waters of any and all streams which rise outside of this Territory and flow into it, from which our people derive and have heretofore derived waters for irrigation of their lands, and we favor an extensive system of reservoirs and catch water basins, to be constructed by the federal government in the Territory for the betterment and development of our arid lands, and that the same lands shall be donated to the Territory under suitable restrictions for its disposal and use.

We, also, favor a system of experiments to be adopted and carried on by the government in sinking artesian wells on the arid lands, and the development of water supplies for our agriculture and mining interests, believing that by so doing great benefit will result to all interests in this Territory.

We are opposed to any substitute in congressional legislation of a free silver provision for a tariff measure, or a tariff measure for a free silver provision, but insist that all legislation on these subjects shall stand on its own merits.

PENSIONS.

We insist upon a liberal administration of the pension laws, providing for the care and maintenance of the disabled soldiers and sailors of the union and those dependent upon them, and condemn the policy of the present administration which has sought by unfair construction to diminish rather than to increase the debt due by the government to those whose valor preserved it.

REWARDS. That the infamous conduct of the democratic secretary of the Territory, in overthrowing the will of the people as expressed at the last election, when a legislature republican in both its branches was elected, meets the severest condemnation of all lovers of good government. Elections have become a farce if results are to be changed by a single appointed officer and the fundamental principles of republican government, which is the majority shall rule, have thereby been entirely subverted.

We are in favor of the public celebration of Labor day, as of other annual holidays, and censure the present democratic governor for not issuing a proclamation for its celebration on the first day of September last.

The republican party stands for the nationality of the American government.

This is a nation and not a league of states.

We believe it is the duty of the government and it has the power to enforce its laws in all parts of the country.

We are in favor of and demand the immediate admission of New Mexico as a sovereign state, in-as-much as we now have all the qualifications required for the admission of other states.

We commend our present delegates in congress, Hon. Thomas B. Catron, for his able efforts in behalf of the admission of New Mexico as a state, and other interests beneficial to the people of our Territory.



FIFTH NATIONAL IRRIGATION CONGRESS.

Pursuant to the order of the Fourth Irrigation Congress and to designation by the national executive committee, the fifth annual session of the national irrigation congress will be held in the city of Phoenix, Arizona, upon the dates of December 15, 16 and 17, 1896.

The membership of the body will be made up as follows, in accordance with the resolutions of the third and fourth congress: BASIS OF REPRESENTATION.

- 1. All members of the national executive committee.
2. All members of state and territorial commissions.
3. Five delegates at large, to be appointed by their respective governors, for each of the following states and territories: Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.
4. Three delegates at large for each state and territory not heretofore enumerated, to be appointed by the governors of said states and territories; or in the case of district of Columbia, by the president.
5. One delegate each from regularly organized irrigation, agricultural, and horticultural societies, and societies of engineers, irrigation companies, agricultural colleges, and commercial bodies, such as boards of trade, chambers of commerce, etc.
6. Duly accredited representatives of any foreign nation or colony, each member of the United States senate, House of Representatives, and each Governor of a state or territory will be admitted as honorary members.

THE WORK of the national irrigation congress has now continued for more than five years. The first session was held in the city of Salt Lake, Utah; the second in Los Angeles, California; the third in Denver, Colorado; and the fourth in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Each session was marked by keen interest and by intelligent and effective work in the cause of irrigation and the reclamation of the arid lands of the West. To the sessions have come the brightest minds of the union, seeking to solve in concord the vexed questions upon the solution of which depends the future development of the western and west central plains. The work has not been without its fruit. Interest has been awakened in points remote from the irrigated regions and the reclamation of the waste areas is now regarded in all justice as one of the most important problems awaiting legislation.

THE FIFTH ANNUAL SESSION. The coming session at Phoenix will, it is not doubted, be the most effective of all. Particularly prominent will be made the discussion of points of legislation in order that well-digested measures be prepared for the consideration of the federal congress and state legislatures. Though able authorities will be in attendance and have been placed upon the programme for the presentation of subjects of technical and economic interest, it is designed that the fifth congress shall be a body with work far more general than has been the case in any of its predecessors. Addresses presenting subjects shall be limited to fifteen minutes and the subsequent discussion to half an hour, this ruling of the executive committee not applying, however, to the discussion of legislation or resolutions.

A WORD IN CONCLUSION. Railroad rates will not exceed a single fare for the round trip from all points between Chicago and the Pacific ocean; details of transportation and ticket limitations to be later announced by the interested railroads. Passengers may be routed into Phoenix over either the Santa Fe or Southern Pacific railway systems. Opportunity at low cost will be given for side trips to the Grand Canyon of Colorado, to the City of Mexico, to southern California and other points.

It is especially desired that governors and others with the power of appointment advise the secretary of the executive committee at as early a date as possible of the names of the appointees, and correspondence will be welcomed by the secretary upon all the details antecedent to the congress.
