## A REPUBLICAN VICTORY.

The City Election Passes Off Quietly, the Democrats Making Only a Feeble Effort to Win.

Tuesday's city election was one of the quietest that Socorro has known in many a day. The Republican ticket was a strong one, as the event well shows. The Democrats, for reasons best known to themselves, held no nominating convention. In fact it was not until late Monday that they decided to put up any ticket at all. The Republican candidates for mayor, clerk, and treasurer were then endorsed and Democratic candidates were named for members of the council and the board of education from the various wards. Following is the vote by wards, viz:

Third ward—For mayor, M. Cooney 120; for clerk, Rob't T. Collins 120; for treasurer, Ricardo Abeyta 120; for the council, Abran Abeyta, R., 100, Solomon Baca, D., 19; for the board of education, Remigio Peña, R., 88, Doniciano Torres, D., 32.

Fourth ward—For mayor, M. Cooney 37; for clerk, Rob't T. Collins 37; for treasurer, Ricardo Abeyta 37; for the council, Florentino Gallegos, R., 22, Jesus Martinez, D., 15; for the board of education, Martin Lopez, R., 25, Eliseo Baca, D., 12.

JERRY SIMPSON.

The "Sockless Statesman" is Now a Cattle Raiser.

HE MAKES PREDICTIONS. "Jerry Simpson, Roswell, N. M.," is the apparently misleading name and address that appears on the register of the Albany hotel, says the Denver Republican. There was considerable discussion in the lobby last evening as to who this unknown Jerry might be, but investigation revealed the fact that he is none other than the "Sockless Statesman of Medicine Lodge." "No, I don't live in Kansas any more," said Mr. Simpson last night. "I have gone into the cattle raising business in New Mexico, where I and my son are stocking a ranch and I expect to make that territory my future home. I am a full fledged cattleman now, and I am entirely out of politics. The fact that I have moved into a territory ought to prove that statement absolutely true. What show will I have in politics down in New Mexico, I would like to know.

It isn't much use for me to say anything about politics since I am out of the swim. Still I have opinions as to what I think will happen. I don't think Bryan will be the candidate for president in the next campaign. What the democrats want is a man from the middle west who hasn't expressed himself definitely as to the issues of the party. Carter Harrison might do, or Dockery, of Missouri. I think it will be difficult to eliminate Bryan from the fight, but his ideas are too definite for the democrats in the next campaign.

LIKES ROOSEVELT. Mr. Simpson also said that he did not believe that Theodore Roosevelt would be the republican candidate in 1904. "I like Roosevelt," he said, "but I think the republican leaders are afraid of him. He has the unhappy faculty of doing what he believes is right without consulting the party leaders. But, as I said before, I am out of politics and am not supposed to know anything about it."

Jerry Simpson is emphatically opposed to the oleomargarine bill, which puts a tax of 10 cents a pound upon oleomargarine and butterine.

"It means," he said, "that it will turn the entire butter business of the country over to the creamery men, and all substitutes will be driven out of the market. It is liable to send the price of butter up to 50 cents a pound. I was surprised that two of your Colorado congressmen, Shafroth and Bell, voted for the bill, and I am unable to understand why they did this. The bill is decidedly against the consumer and is entirely in the interests of the creamery trust. I was forced out of congress two years ago because I would not agree to support such a bill. Because I would not promise to do this I was refused the nomination, and it was given to another man. I have been fighting this proposition ever since I went to congress, and I shall continue to oppose it.

"I shall be in Denver for a day or two. I am interested in the work of the National Live Stock association, and today I met John C. Springer, the president of that organization. We propose to make the next convention in Kansas City the greatest in the history of the association. I am going from here to Ogden to address the state convention of cattlemen of Utah, and from there I go into South Dakota and Idaho and other western states for the same purpose. My object is to stir up interest in the association and to urge upon the cattlemen of the northwest the necessity of getting together. They are realizing more and more that if they want to accomplish anything in congress or anywhere else they must pull together and exert their influence as a body. It is through this method that other interests have been so successful, and the stock growers must adopt the same tactics.

WANTS A WESTERN MAN. "What we need more than anything down in Washington is a secretary of the interior who is from the west. Nearly all the business of that department has to do with the country west of the Missouri, and the man who is at the head of that department should come from this section. Just now we are fortunate in the fact that the man who is in the president's chair understands the west, and I believe he will do great things for us before

his term expires. "I speak of this especially in regard to the order of the secretary of the interior for the removal of fences from the public domain. Down in my part of the state the summary removal of the fences from the public land will work great hardship to the small cattlemen, the very man whom it is the declared intention to protect. It will mean that the man with a small herd will have to hire herders, which he is unable to do, and that he will have to sell out to the big cattlemen, who will in a short time have complete control of the range. I think the leasing system that is advocated in the west will solve the difficulty to a large extent, but of course that is experimental."

Jerry Simpson dresses much as any westerner who is used to the hardy life of the plains, with a serviceable suit, a turn-down collar, and socks. As the statesman from Medicine Lodge sat in his room with one foot thrown over the other knee he flaunted a pair of socks that were quite up to the requirements of the style of the present year. Whatever his failing may have been during the days of his political glory, there is no disputing the fact that now he has recognized the demands of Society in regard to the clothing of his pedal extremities.

The rocks and soil are largely of volcanic origin, and the sulphur mines in some places penetrate deep into the earth. A common sight is a train of freight cars loaded with bars of sulphur as yellow as gold. Some of the greatest mines are close by Girgenti, the celebrated Agrigentum of the Roman historians. About 90 per cent of all the sulphur comes from Sicily.

A Summary of Important Events Condensed from the Press Dispatches, Chicago and Milwaukee went Democratic.

The oleomargarine bill passed the Senate Thursday.

Fifteen hundred Cincinnati brewers were on a strike the first of the week.

Peace negotiations in South Africa are not progressing very satisfactorily.

The five largest cities in New Mexico went almost solidly Republican Tuesday.

Thomas Dunn English, the writer of "Ben Bolt," died in Newark, N. J., Tuesday.

Texas is going into the sugar business. A 100-ton mill will be erected on the state farm.

Judge B. S. Baker decided that registration in Albuquerque after March 27 was illegal.

Seventy thousand deaths monthly from the plague are reported from the Punjab, India.

Five large frame hotels along the famous board walk at Atlantic City were burned Thursday.

It is stated that the Navajos are settling on land outside their reservation in northern New Mexico.

Great success is reported in the cure of consumption in all of its stages at the Fort Bayard sanitarium.

Miss Ellen M. Stone, the American missionary, sailed from Southampton for New York yesterday.

The ways and means committee of the House decided Monday to report favorably upon the Cuban reciprocity bill.

Speaker Henderson is said to be opposed to the omnibus statehood bill but he has promised it his early consideration.

Lyman J. Gage, former secretary of the treasury, has been elected President of the United States Trust Company.

According to the report of the weather bureau at Santa Fe the month of March this year was colder and wetter than usual.

A Burlington train was held up by four masked men yesterday morning three miles north of the city limits of St. Joseph, Mo.

Miss Ruth Hill, daughter of President James J. Hill of the Great Northern, was married in St. Paul Tuesday to a New York attorney.

Ex-Governor Clark of Arkansas was endorsed at Democratic primaries to succeed Senator Jones, who was a candidate for re-election.

There appears to be a wide spread unrest in the labor world. Numerous strikes are reported from various points in the United States and Europe.

The will of the late Cecil Rhodes provides for the establishment of two Oxford scholarships for each state and territory of the United States.

According to a statement given out by the directors of the United States Steel Corporation, the net earnings of that corporation for the year ending March 31 amounted to \$111,067,195.

There was severe fighting Tuesday on the Harts river in South Africa resulting in the defeat of the Boers. One party of Canadian Rifles held its post until every man was killed or wounded.

The United States Steel Corporation is about to erect an extensive steel tube mill near Conneaut Harbor, Ohio. The concern will be capitalized for \$17,000,000 and will furnish employment for 5,000 men.

A terrific wind storm accompanied with snow and rain swept over Pennsylvania and West Virginia Sunday. Many hundred thousand dollars worth of property was destroyed and a number of people were killed while at worship by the falling of the churches.

The House committee on the purchase of the Danish West Indies have begun the hearing of testimony concerning the charges of one Doctor Christman that half a million dollars was to be used to influence American newspapers and congressmen in connection with the purchase of the islands.
