## THE STATEHOOD BILL

The Bill as Passed by Congress and Signed by President Taft, Monday.

## A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION

Electors of Territory Authorized to Vote for and Choose Delegates to Convention.

For lack of space the Chieftain is unable to give its readers but a portion of the statehood bill. The remaining sections will be given in next week's issue.

### AN ACT.

To enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitutional and state government and to be admitted into the union on an equal footing with the original states; and to enable the people of Arizona to form a constitution and state government and to be admitted into the union on an equal footing with the original states.

Be it enacted by the senate and the house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled: That the qualified electors of the territory of New Mexico are hereby authorized to vote for and choose delegates to form a constitutional convention for said territory for the purpose of framing a constitution for the proposed state of New Mexico. Said convention shall consist of hundred delegates; and the governor, chief justice and secretary of said territory shall apportion the delegates to be thus selected, as nearly as may be equitable among the several counties thereof in accordance with the voting population, as shown by the vote cast at the election for delegate in congress in said territory in 1908: Provided, That in the event that added after said election, the apportionment for delegates shall be made proportionate to the vote cast within the various precincts contained in the area of such new counties so created, and the proportionate number of delegates so apportioned shall be deducted from the original counties out of which such counties shall have been created.

The governor of said territory shall, within thirty days after the approval of this act, by proclamation, in which the aforesaid apportionment of delegates to the convention shall be fully specified and announced, order an election of the delegates aforesaid on a day designated by him in said proclamation, not earlier than sixty nor later than ninety days after the approval of this act. Such election for delegates shall be held and conducted, the returns made, and the certificates of persons elected to such convention issued, as nearly as may be, in the same manner as is prescribed by the laws of said territory regulating elections therein of members of the legislature existing at the time of the last election of said members of the legislature; and the provisions of said laws in all respects including the qualifications of electors registration, are hereby made applicable to the election herein provided for; and said convention, when so called to order and organized, shall be the sole judge of the election and qualifications of its own members. Qualifications to entitle persons to vote on the ratification or rejection of the constitution formed by said convention when said constitution shall be submitted to the people of said territory hereunder shall be the same as the qualifications to entitle persons to vote for delegates to said convention.

Section 2. That the delegates to the convention thus elected shall meet in the hall of the house of representatives in the capital of the territory of New Mexico at 12 o'clock noon on the fourth Monday after their election, and they shall receive compensation for the period they actually are in session, but not for more than sixty days in all. After organization they shall declare on behalf of the people of said proposed state that they adopt the constitution of the United States, whereupon the

said convention shall be and is hereby authorized to form a constitution and provide for a state government for said proposed state, all in the manner and under the conditions contained in this act. The constitution shall be republican in form and make no distinction in civil or political rights on account of race or color, and shall not be repugnant to the constitution of the United States and the principles of the Declaration of Independence.

And said convention shall provide by an ordinance irrevocable without the consent of the United States and the people of said state.

First. That perfect toleration of religious sentiment shall be secured, and that no inhabitant of said state shall ever be molested in person or property on account of his or her mode of religious worship; and that polygamous or plural marriages, or polygamous cohabitation, and the sale, barter, or giving of intoxicating liquors to Indians and the introduction of liquors into Indian country, which term shall also include all lands now owned or occupied by the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico, are forever prohibited.

Second. That the people inhabiting said proposed state do agree and declare that they forever disclaim all right and title to the unappropriated and ungranted public lands lying within the boundaries thereof and to all lands lying within said boundaries owned or held by any Indian or Indian tribes the right or title to which shall have been acquired through or from the United States or any prior sovereignty; and that until the title of such Indian or Indian tribes shall have been extinguished the same shall be and remain subject to the disposition and under the absolute jurisdiction and control of the congress of the United States; that the lands and interests therein, including within the said state shall be taxed at a higher rate than the lands and other property belonging to residents thereof; that no taxes shall be imposed by the state upon lands or property therein belonging to or which may hereafter be acquired by the United States or reserved for its use; but nothing herein, or in the ordinance herein provided for, shall preclude the said state from taxation, as other lands and other property outside of an Indian reservation owned or held by any Indian, save and except such lands as have been granted or acquired as aforesaid or as may be granted or confirmed to any Indian or Indians under any act of congress, but said ordinance shall provide that all such lands shall be exempt from taxation by said state so long and to such extent as congress has prescribed or may hereafter prescribe.

Third. That the debt and liabilities of said territory of New Mexico and the debts of the counties thereof which shall be valid and subsisting at the time of the passage of this act shall be assumed and paid by said proposed state, and that said state shall, as to all such debts and liabilities, be subrogated to all the rights, including rights of indemnity and reimbursement, existing in favor of said territory or of any of the several counties thereof at the time of the passage of this act: Provided, that nothing in this act shall be construed as validating or in any manner legalizing any territorial, county, municipal or other bonds, obligations, or evidences of indebtedness of said territory or the counties or municipalities thereof which now are or may be invalid or illegal at the time said proposed state is admitted, nor shall the legislature of said proposed state pass any law in any manner validating or legalizing the same.

Fourth. That provision shall be made for the establishment and maintenance of a system of public schools, which shall be open to all the children of said state and free from sectarian control, and that said schools shall always be conducted in English.

Fifth. That said state shall never enact any law restricting or abridging the right of suf-

frage on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude, and that ability to read, write, speak and understand the English language, sufficiently well to conduct the duties of the office without the aid of an interpreter shall be a necessary qualification for all state officers and members of the state legislature.

Sixth. That the capital of said state shall, until changed by the electors voting at an election provided for by the legislature of said state for that purpose, be at the city of Santa Fe, but no election shall be called or provided for prior to the thirty-first day of December, 1925.

Seventh. That there be and are reserved to the United States, with full acquiescence of the state, all rights and powers for the carrying out of the provisions by the United States of the act of congress entitled "An Act appropriating the receipts from the sale and disposal of public lands in certain states and territories to the construction of irrigation works for the reclamation of arid lands, approved June 17, 1902, and acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, to the same extent as if said state had remained a territory.

Eighth. That whenever hereafter any of the lands contained within Indian reservations or allotments in said proposed state shall be allotted, sold, reserved, or otherwise disposed of, they shall be subject for a period of twenty-five years after such allotment, sale, reservation, or other disposal to all the laws of the United States prohibiting the introduction of liquor into the Indian country; and the terms "Indian" and "Indian country" shall include the Pueblo Indians of New Mexico and the lands now owned or occupied by them.

Ninth. That the state and its people consent to all and singular the provisions of this act, and to the ratification and confirmation of the same, the terms and conditions upon which said grants and confirmations are made, and the means and manner of enforcing such terms and conditions, all in every respect and particular as in this act provided.

All of which ordinance described in this section shall, by proper reference, be made a part of any constitution that shall be formed hereunder, in such terms as shall positively preclude the making by any future constitutional amendment of any change or abrogation of the said ordinance in whole or in part without the consent of congress.

Section 3. That when said constitution shall be formed as aforesaid the convention forming the same shall provide for the submission of said constitution to the people of New Mexico for ratification at an election which shall be held on a day named by said convention not earlier than sixty nor later than ninety days after said convention adjourns, at which election the qualified voters of New Mexico shall vote directly for or against said constitution and for or against any provisions thereof separately submitted. The returns of said election shall be made by the election officers direct to the secretary of the territory of New Mexico at Santa Fe, who, with the governor and the chief justice of said territory, shall constitute a canvassing board, and they, or any two of them, shall meet at said city of Santa Fe on the third Monday after said election and shall canvass the same. If a majority of the legal votes cast at said election shall reject the constitution, the said canvassing board shall forthwith certify said result to the governor of said territory, together with the statement of votes cast upon the question of the ratification or rejection of said constitution and also a statement of the votes cast for or against such provisions thereof as were separately submitted to the voters at said election; whereupon the governor of said territory shall, by proclamation, order the constitutional convention to reassemble at a date not later than twenty days after the receipt of said governor of the documents showing the rejection of the constitution by the people and thereafter a new constitution shall be framed and the

same proceedings shall be taken in regard thereto in like manner as if said constitution were being originally prepared for submission and submitted to the people.

Section 4. That when said constitution and such provisions thereof as have been separately submitted shall have been duly ratified by the people of New Mexico as aforesaid a certified copy of the same shall be submitted to the president of the United States and to congress for approval, together with the statement of the votes cast thereon and upon any provisions thereof which were separately submitted to and voted upon by the people. And if congress and the president approve said constitution and the said separate provisions thereof, or if the president approves the same and congress fails to approve the same during the next regular session thereof, then and in that event the president shall certify said facts to the governor of New Mexico, who shall, within thirty days after the receipt of said notification from the president of the United States, issue his proclamation for the election of the state and county officers, the members of the state legislature and representatives in congress, and all other officers provided for in said constitution, all as hereinafter provided; said election to take place not earlier than sixty days nor later than ninety days after said proclamation by the governor of New Mexico ordering the same.

Section 5. That said constitutional convention shall, by ordinance, provide that in case of the ratification of said constitution by the people, and in case the president of the United States and congress approve the same or in case the president approves the same and congress fails to act in its next regular session, all as hereinafter provided, an election shall be held for the purpose of the confirmation of the governor of New Mexico, provided for in the preceding section, at which election officers for a full state government, including a governor, members of the legislature two representatives in congress, to be elected at large from said state, and such other officers as such constitutional convention shall prescribe, shall be chosen by the people. Such election shall be held, the returns thereof made, canvassed, and certified to the secretary of said territory in the same manner as in this act prescribed for the making of the returns, the canvassing and certification of the same of the election for the ratification or rejection of said constitution, as hereinafter provided, and the qualifications of voters at said election for all state officers, members of the legislature, county officers and representatives in congress, and other officers prescribed by said constitution shall be the same as the qualifications of voters at the election for the ratification or rejection of said constitution as hereinafter provided. When said election returns thereof made, canvassed and certified as hereinafter provided, the governor of the territory of New Mexico shall certify the result of said election, as canvassed and certified as herein provided, to the president of the United States, who thereupon shall immediately issue his proclamation announcing the result of said election as ascertained, and upon the issuance of said proclamation by the president of the United States the proposed state of New Mexico shall be deemed admitted into the union, by virtue of this act, on an equal footing with the other states, until the issuance of said proclamation by the president of the United States, and until the said state is so admitted into the union and said officers are elected and qualified under the provisions of the constitution, the president and territorial officers of said territory, including the delegates in congress thereof as in congress thereof elected at the general election in 1908, shall continue to discharge the duties

of their respective offices in and for said territory: Provided, That no session of the territorial legislative assembly shall be held in 1911.

Section 6. That in addition to sections 16 and 36, heretofore granted to the territory of New Mexico, sections 2 and 32 in every township in said proposed state not otherwise appropriated at the date of the passage of this act are hereby granted to the said state for the support of common schools; and where sections 2, 16, and 32 and 36, or any parts thereof, are mineral, or have been sold, reserved, or otherwise appropriated or reserved by or under the authority of any act of congress, or are wanting or fractional in quantity, or where settlement thereon with a view to pre-emption or homestead, or improvement thereof with a view to desert land entry has been made heretofore or hereafter, and before the survey thereof in the field, the provisions of sections 2, 275 and 2, 276 of the Revised statutes are hereby made applicable thereto and to the selections of lands in lieu thereof to the same extent as if sections 2 and 32, as well as sections 16 and 36, were mentioned therein:

ADVERTISING is the education of the public, as to who you are, and what you have to offer in the way of skill, talent or commodity," says Elbert Hubbard in the June "Philistine." The importance of the new science of advertising has never been more thoroughly emphasized than by Fra Elbertus in the current number of his little magazine. He says in part:  
"Let the truth be known about your business,  
"The only man who should not advertise is the one who has nothing to offer in way of service, or one who can not make good.  
"All such should seek the friendly shelter of oblivion, where dwell those who, shrouded in Stygian shades, foregather gloom, and are out of the game.

An exchange figures out that the constitutional convention will consist of 61 Republicans and 30 Democrats with nine delegates classed as doubtful. But the same exchange places Lincoln, Otero and Sierra counties in the Democratic column with Union county as doubtful. Each of those counties will select Republican delegates to the constitutional convention and Union county will do so by 500 to 1,000 majority. The constitutional convention will consist of at least 72 Republicans and probably 77, or three-fourths majority, as the county of Torrance will likely fall into the Republican column. Of course, had the apportionment been made upon the 1910 census

figures as the Democrats demanded, the Republican majority might not have been quite so overwhelming, but it would have been large enough nevertheless, to carry every point except where a two-thirds majority would be demanded.—Santa Fe New Mexican.

THE government has issued a report stating that tuberculosis is costing the United States something like \$14,000,000 a year. It is stated that 10 per cent of our dairy cattle are afflicted, 5 per cent of our beef cattle and 2 per cent of our hogs. If this be true, it would look as if this \$14,000,000 was worth looking into and saving if it is within our power to do it.

Tuberculosis is a contagious stable disease. It affects the glands of the body but is liable to affect any part of it. Most people think it is a disease of the lungs only. There isn't a man living who is bright enough to pick the tuberculosis cattle out of a herd. For that reason we must resort to the only test we know of, now known as the tuberculin test. I feel that there are a great many stock owners at the present time that are firm believers in this test, and at the same time there are a great many that are not. If it is a proper thing to test our cattle we ought to do it. If not, some one ought to show us why. If there were no state laws whatever requiring the use of this test I feel that it ought to be applied for your own personal benefit. If you have a herd of fifty cattle and apply the test, finding four or five head affected, you can save the balance of the herd. If the state is to pay for these condemned cattle you save the state from paying for the balance of you: cattle, which are liable to become afflicted later.—Dr. David Roberts.

### KELLY MINING CAMP

Not a Vacant House or an Idle Man in Camp at Present.

**MANY NEW HOUSES ERECTED**  
The New Graphic Mill Completed. Germany Company Install Compressor.

The old Kelly mine has produced enormous tonnage of carbonate ores and has large area of undeveloped limestones, and may remind the camp of its palmy lead days by further development work.

The Mistletoe company are making some alterations in their mill and will begin mining in a few days. This company has a large group of excellent claims and no doubt will make a big mine with more extensive development work.

The New Graphic mill has been completed and running two weeks. The results obtained so far have been very satisfactory. They are increasing daily output of sulphides and no doubt will increase the capacity of the mill in the near future.

The wheels of activity are grinding along with a merry whir in the Kelly camp and vicinity. Not a vacant house or an idle man in camp at present. Many new houses have been erected, but still insufficient to supply the demand.

The Cook lease has also opened up a 4-foot shoot of lead and zinc carbonate ores near these old stopes. He is making good average shipments of zinc carbonates from old caved ground and lead and zinc from new find.

The general supposition was that the old Kelly stopes were practically exhausted of their lead carbonate ores, but the Brown lease has opened up a largebody of these ores and are now "shipping" more lead than zinc carbonates. It is said that this new discovery contains a higher grade of lead and more rare and beautiful specimens than has ever been produced before in the history of the camp.

The Germany company have completed the installation of their new compressor and a mile of new pipe line, connecting the plant and their new tunnel on the north end of their property. This plant is located about one-fourth mile east of the Tri-Bullion will and is of sufficient capacity to operate machine drills on their various properties. They are now running machines night and day and pushing their development work rapidly.

The Tri-Bullion mill is running night and day and producing and shipping normal amount of concentrates. Their Grand Tower property is still making good production of Sulphides and will be milled instead of shipped. A new roaster is being added to their plant and will increase output soon as completed. Their new contract shaft is now down 80 feet and is already showing good ore indications. Their second diamond drill hole has been badly delayed owing to the loss of two drill bits and slight breakage of machinery. It should be in good repair and
